Dumas Denied Bond on Bandit "Frame Up" Charge Negroes Admit Slaying Farmer; White Man Freed

Body Was Found Knife In Brain, Sunday Morning

Mystery Surrounding Brutal
Killing Is Definitely
Cleared, Investigating Of-
ficers Say.

VICTIM WAS FATHER OF FIVE CHILDREN

Argument Preceded Slaying
Negroes Tell Officers
When Making Alleged
Confession.

(By Associated Press)
COLORADO, April 18.—The
murder mystery surrounding the
slaying of Ernest Hardin, Mitchell
farmer and father of five children,
was believed definitely cleared
Wednesday night when two negroes
Jim Brooks and Henry Davis,
in an alleged confession, exonerated
a white man held pending in-
vestigation.

Hardin's body, the skull crushed
and a knife blade imbedded in the
brain, was found near here Sun-
day. Davis and a white man Tuesday
night the second negro was ar-
rested. Wednesday night the two negroes made
a complete confession, officers said.
Charges of murder were preferred
against the white man Tuesday
night but he was denied impleading. He
was being held pending further in-
vestigation.

The negroes declared an argu-
ment preceded the killing, the of-
ficers, Sheriff Yarbrough of Sweet-
water and Deputy Allen Kuyken-
sell of Colorado, said.

Drexel Made New Official In Bank

Former National Examiner
Here to Take Up Duties
As Cashier of Citizens'
National.

Charles F. Drexel, for the past
three years national bank examiner
with the federal department at
Washington, has arrived in Lubbock
to begin his duties as director and
active vice-president and cashier of
the Citizens' National bank here,
an announcement made by the bank
yesterday said.

Mr. Drexel's family will move to
Lubbock this summer following the
close of school in St. Louis, where
he has two children in school.
Lubbock's new resident is a bank-
er of wide experience. He was for
10 years prior to the war with the
National City bank of New York,
eight years of which he spent
in foreign countries. Later he was
cashier of the Federal Reserve bank
in San Francisco for two years, and
immediately following the war was
with the Guaranty Trust company
of New York for three years. With
this company he acted in the capacity
of a member of the committee
of the general management on
foreign affairs. During a part
of this time he was located in Col-
umbia, South America. He also
spent two years with the War Fi-
nance corporation in Washington.

STREETERS DEFEATED Fight for \$500,000,000 in Property Fails

CHICAGO, April 18 (AP).—The
fight for what is now Chicago
real estate valued at \$500,000,000
began by "Cap'n" George Wellington
Streeter half a century ago,
ended in defeat for his heirs to-
day.

The United States circuit court
of appeals found that an appeal
from an adverse decision by the
district court had not been per-
fected within the legal time of
the statute, and dismissed the
petition.

The action definitely disposes of
the case, said defense attorneys.
When Streeter, a squatter, threw
up a dugout on the Lake Front the
last he claimed as his "dear old
Lake Michigan" was a stretch
of sandy waste, shifted continu-
ously by wind and water. It is
today the near-North Side of Chi-

Unobserved, Bandits Loot Oklahoma Bank Vault, Take Cashier Prisoner

Posse Organized but
No Trace of Men
Reported

(By Associated Press)
ADA, Okla., April 18.—Three men
descended upon the First National
Bank at Stillwell, Oklahoma, 18
miles southwest of here late today,
looted the safe and bore away the
cashier, Roy Whitlock, unobserved
by scores of persons in the streets.
The robbery was not detected un-
til Ben Bass, a telephone operator
who worked above the bank went
downstairs, after he had seen Whit-
lock driven away, apparently much
excited, in a motor car, and found
the bank empty and the vault open.
He notified postoffice and the
sheriff, who formed a posse and set
out in pursuit of the robbers' car.
Nearly two hours later, a car con-
taining four men and similar to the
one which the robbers drove was
reported to have passed through
France, in the northwest corner of
Pontotoc county. Officers in neigh-
boring counties have been notified
and have patrolled the roads.
Bank officials said that not more
than \$1,500 or \$2,000 in cash was
in the bank today.

MOORES ARRAIGNED Hearing At Wichita Falls Case This Week

WICHITA FALLS, April 18 (AP).—
J. W. Moore, 21, Beaumont youth
charged with the murder of Theo-
dore Zimmerman, storekeeper slain
here last Friday night, probably will
have a preliminary hearing before
the end of the week. District At-
torney Ben Allen announced Wed-
nesday. Moore has definitely de-
nied knowledge of the slaying.

A red-headed youth of 19 exam-
ined Wednesday and identified by
Moore as his companion on the night
of the shooting, denied acquaint-
ance with Moore and was released.
Moore, however, said he "might
have been mistaken."

GOVERNOR "BETRAYS" That's What Oklahoma W. C. T. U. Declare

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., April 18
(AP).—Declaring that Governor
Henry S. Johnston had betrayed the
Women's Christian Temperance
Union by aligning himself with sup-
porters of Governor Alfred E. Smith
at the democratic state convention,
for nomination for the presidency,
Oklahoma county members today
mailed the governor resolutions de-
claring further political support.
The resolutions, adopted at a
meeting in Bethany, Oklahoma, last
night, and with the declaration:
"May God have mercy on Okla-
homa and give us speedy relief
from the humiliation and disgrace
that we now suffer because of hav-
ing supported you for the high of-
fice of Governor."

AUTO MARKET UPSET Keen Competition From the Low Price Cars Alarms

NEW YORK, April 18 (AP).—Iron
trade review says there is such keen
competition among low-priced motor
cars, the quality of which has
been improved to such an extent
as to bring them into competition
with medium-priced cars, that mak-
ers of the latter have been forced
to make plans for the new season
earlier than usual. The between-
season period usually means that
car builders will take only such raw
materials as they have on order to
avoid building too many old cars
to compete with the new one.

V. A. Collins Will Take Kirby Place As Dry Crusader

Former State Senator Says
He's Strictly Opposed To
Wet Nominee Or Wet
Platform At Houston.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 18.—V. A. Collins
of Dallas, former state senator, will
continue the work of the Texas con-
stitutional democrats as chairman
in the stead of H. Harper Kirby of
Austin, who died Monday afternoon
at his home. Mr. Collins' selection
was made at a meeting of consti-
tutional democrats leaders here Wed-
nesday afternoon in the office of
State Senator Thomas B. Love.
Party leaders at the meeting in-
cluded George Johnson of Tyler, Mr.
Collins, Mr. Love and others.
Mr. Collins served as state sen-
ator from the Beaumont district.
He also at one time, was a candi-
date for the office of governor and
for that of mayor of Dallas.
On notification of his selection,
Mr. Collins announced that he
would seek to continue the rigid
dry program of Mr. Kirby in an
effort to bring about the nomina-
tion of a dry candidate at the na-
tional democratic convention in June.

"I am strictly opposed to a wet
nominee and a wet platform," he
said.

Convict Converted In Prison Service Confesses to Hall-Mills Murders

Case Which Had Whole Nation Agog A Year Ago Is
Revived By Purported Confession from Elwin F.
Allen, Inmate Oklahoma Jail; Checking Story

(By Associated Press)
EL RENO, Okla., April 18.—A
confession to the killing of the Rev.
Edward Wheeler Hall and Mrs.
Eleanor Mills, near Brunswick, N.
J., September 14, 1922, was signed
in the county jail here today by
Elwin F. Allen, 28 years old, who
recently was converted by a religious
meeting in the jail.

The purported confession, sup-
plemented by a later written state-
ment to W. P. Morrison, county at-
torney of Canadian county, says
that he was paid \$7,000 for the kill-
ing by an Elizabeth N. J. dentist,
who, it says, was a relative of Mrs.
Mills. It says that Allen's common-
law wife held Mrs. Mills while Al-
len shot her. The woman's name is
not revealed, but Allen late today
gave Morrison the name of his other
alleged accomplice. Morrison re-
fused to make it public until after
he had communicated with Francis
L. Bergen, prosecutor of pleas of

Syndicate Reporter Cuts In
As Irish Captain Starts
Interesting Part; Intend
To Repair "Bremen."

LAKE S. AUGUST, Que., April 18
(AP).—A smiling, slim, ruddy cheeked
Irishman wearing the uniform
of a major in the Irish Free State
air force flew into this little moun-
tain hamlet today not as one of
the first three men to have flown
an airplane from Europe to Amer-
ica, but as a man on a stiff job that
has yet to be completed.

"We have not yet reached New
York, and until we do our trip is
not over," declared Major James
Fitzmaurice, who flew with Baron
von Huenfeldt and Captain Koehn
from Dublin, Ireland, last Thurs-
day for New York, but were forced
to land their Junkers plane Brem-
en on that black and sparsely
habited speck of land of the north-
ern end of Newfoundland, known as
Greenly Island.

After Spare Parts
With those words, Fitzmaurice
made known his immediate plans
and those of his companions, who
remained behind with the damaged
Bremen. He is to obtain spare parts
that now are at Montreal, take
them by airplane to Greenly Is-
land, repair the Bremen and then
continue the flight to New York.

"It probably will be two or three
days before I can get away for
Greenly Island," he said, "a lot
depends on the weather. Then I

and fit it for the remainder of the
journey."

a smashed landing gear and a
ruined tire, the latter damaged by
the front fuselage having been

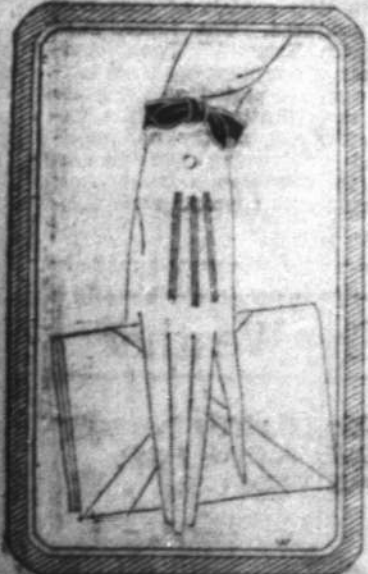

"Nothing Wrong" That's What Teapot Defense Avers

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, April 18.—Denied the testimony of one of its important witnesses, Edwin Denby, former Secretary of the Navy, the defense in the conspiracy trial of Harry F. Sinclair drove ahead today in its effort to show there was nothing corrupt in the leasing of Teapot Dome.

Denby, called to the witness stand after Capt. J. K. Robison, retired, had been put through a grueling cross examination by Owen J. Roberts, special government prosecutor, was not permitted to tell anything of his actions in the Teapot Dome lease negotiations. Roberts objected to his testimony, because Robison had testified that Denby had not talked with Fall or seen him about the lease in any way.

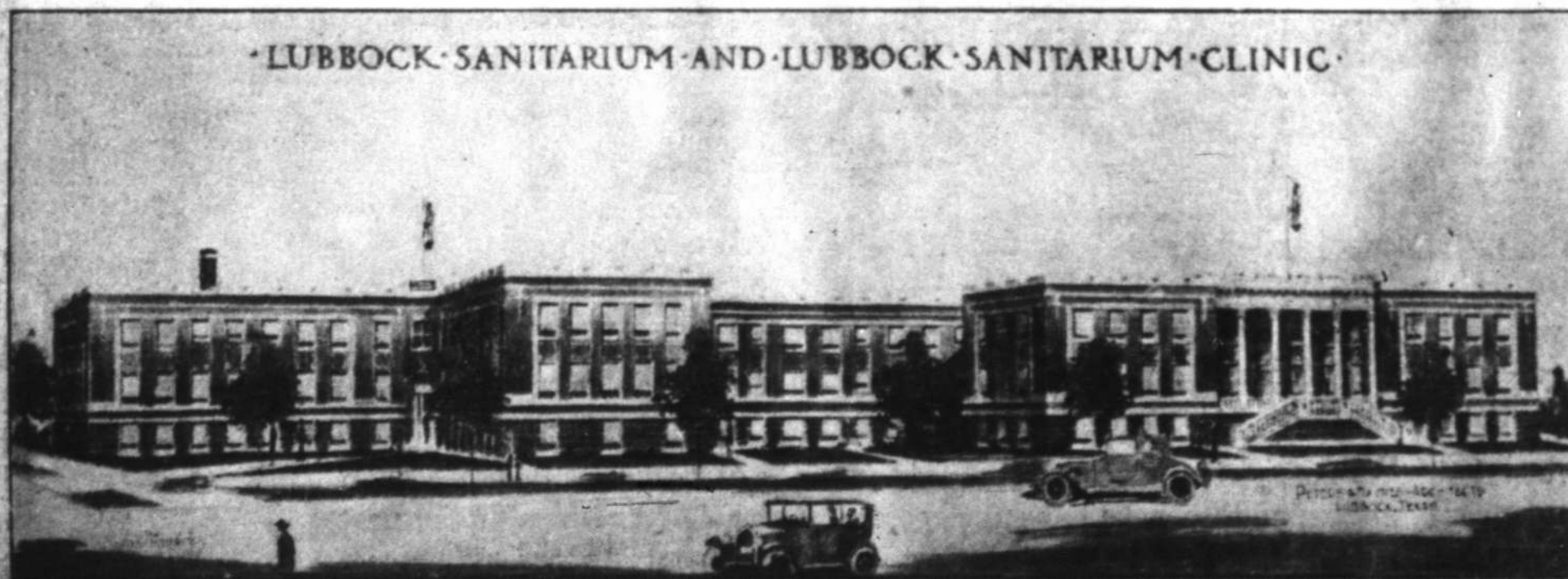

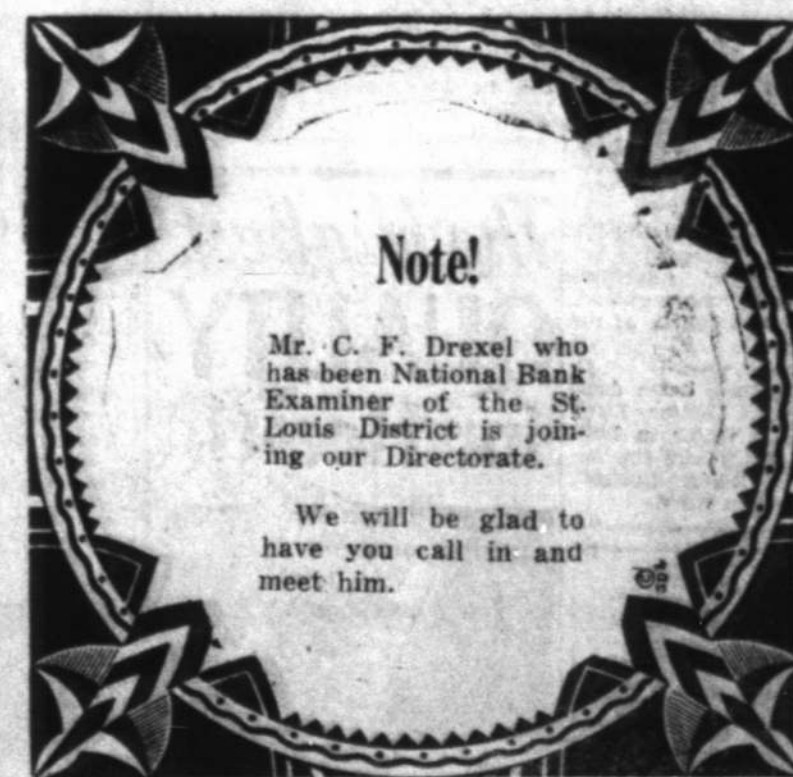

DAILY MARKETS

WALL STREET.

NEW YORK, April 18 (AP).—Selling pressure was lifted from today's stock market and prices moved irregularly higher.

Execution of a large accumulation of overnight selling orders carried prices downward 1 to 4 points the opening, but buying support quickly supplied and a rally developed which carried through until the close. Trading showed a marked falling off in volume, sales totaling only 3,596,400 shares, after a string of seven consecutive 4,000,000 share full sessions.

Lowering of the call money rate from 5 to 4 1/2 percent, in the face of a resumption of gold shipments, layed fears of an immediate increase in federal reserve discount rates which inspired heavy liquidation earlier in the week.

Weekly trade reviews reported that output was being maintained at high levels, particularly in the Chicago district, and that prices were holding steady. Freight car loadings for the first week of April compared unfavorably with the corresponding weeks of 1927 and 1928. Crude oil production also showed a falling off but, in view of the recent over-production in that industry, this was regarded as bullish.

NEW YORK COTTON.

NEW YORK, April 18 (AP).—An opening advance in the cotton market today met a good deal of realizing, but it was absorbed on reactions of 18 to 20 points, and the market firmed up again in late trading. After selling off from 19.85 to 19.65, July advanced to 19.93 and closed at 19.90. The general market closed steady at net advances of 2 to 18 points.

The market opened very steady at an advance of 5 to 11 points, active months showing quick net gains of 8 to 13 points. This was attributed to covering, or rebuying by recent sellers and some fresh buying promoted by a bullish view of the weekly report of the weather bureau, prospects for showers in eastern and central belt sections, and rallies from an early decline in Liverpool.

The advance of 19.99 for May and 19.68 for October met realizing or liquidation, and prices eased off during midday. The favorable showing of the day's weather details and failure of the weekly report to have a more stimulating effect on demand seemed to encourage reactionary sentiment, while it seemed the confidence of recent buyers had been disturbed to some extent by yesterday's report on boll weevil emergence.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, April 18 (AP).—The cotton market here today was quiet, with the exception of one brief spurt near the close, and the price trend was erratic. The general market closed steady at net gains of 8 to 13 points.

Despite unfavorable cables there was a slight gain after the start due to change in sentiment regarding the boll weevil report issued yesterday and indications of unsettled weather. Later, however, the market eased off nearly \$1 a bale on liquidation by recent buyers but soon rallied on a forecast for unsettled weather.

July, after starting at 19.27, 9 points up, sold off to 19.40, then rallied to 19.65 and closed at 19.60, 13 points net higher for the day. Liverpool was 4 to 6 points worse than due but the market here opened at an advance of 8 to 9 points. Weather prospects and an unfavorable crop summary report caused additional gains until May traded up to 19.73, July to 19.37 and October to 19.35, 10 to 11 points above yesterday's close.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK.

KANSAS CITY, April 18 (AP).—(United States Department of Agriculture).—Unsettled conditions on the midwestern markets of markets. Big speculative buying developed in every kind of grain, with particular notice being taken of an official report that the last week has been one of the most unfavorable in years for farm crops in Iowa.

The entire grain list finished buoyant at virtually the day's top-most level, with wheat 3 1/2-4c to 3 3/4-4c net higher, corn 2 1/2-3c to 2 7/8-3c up, oats showing 3-4c to 2 3/4-3c gain, and provisions varying from 7c decline to a rise of 2c.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK.

FORT WORTH, April 18 (AP).—Today's cattle market was about steady. Sales were slow with most of the receipts lacking in quality. Steers sold up to \$12.50, bulls \$7.50 to \$7.75, yearlings \$11.75 to \$13.00, cows up to \$9 and calves \$6 to \$8.90. Sheep were steady. Shorn slaughter wethers sold for \$9.35 and shorn feeder lambs for \$12. Hogs were steady to 10c higher. The top price paid was \$9.10.

Toledo Officers Spread Dragnets For Bandit Gang

Machine Gun Robbers Slay One Officer and Get Off With Express Truck But Fail to Seize Loot.

TOLEDO, Ohio, April 18.—Special details of police combed this city tonight for machine gun bandits, who shot and killed Patrolman George Zientara after they had stolen an American railway express truck and abducted the four men who were guarding it.

The spectacular holdup and gunplay availed the bandits nothing. They left behind in a garage where Zientara and another policeman surprised them, two unopened strong boxes which they obtained from the truck. There was approximately \$4,000 in the boxes but this was left intact.

Five in the Gang. Five men were in the gang that captured the truck after it left the union station this morning, but only two of them were in the bandit car, mounted with a machine gun, which Patrolman Zientara and

Charles Biskupski trailed to the gang's lair. The garage, police later discovered, was in the rear of an apartment house, where the five bandits and two women had been living. Police believed the gangsters came here from Chicago, but were fairly certain they had made no attempt to leave the city tonight.

A few hours after the holdup, two women, alleged to be those who were living with the bandits, were arrested for investigation. With them were two small children.

The robbers seized the express truck after it left the station, and unarmed the guards. Three miles out they transferred the strong boxes to their own machine which had been following the truck. When a Toledo university student attempted to interfere they took him captive. The student and the guard later were released.

Zientara and Biskupski, patrolling the streets in a police car, saw a big machine speed around a corner and pull into a garage. Their suspicions were aroused and they followed. When Zientara alighted from the car he fell before a fusillade of machine gun fire. Biskupski, raw that resistance would be fatal and, he too dropped as though he had been wounded.

Leaving their own machine the two bandits stole the police car and sped away. A short time later the police car was found abandoned on a side street.

FLIER UNREPORTED ON AFRICAN JAUNT

CAPE TOWN, Union of South Africa, April 18 (AP).—A dispatch to Cape Argus from Sierra Leone on the west coast, today states that Sir Alan Cobham who should have arrived there yesterday had not yet put in an appearance. There was no trace of him.

In the program given last night, County Agent D. F. Eaton, Raymond B. McCorkle, and McClelland made talks, emphasizing the importance of a poultry association in the county and the benefits to be derived from its operation.

LIQUOR SUPPLY CUT

Renewed Activity In South Texas Is Effective

HOUSTON, April 18 (AP).—Attorney Horace Soule in a statement saying that his department had resumed war on bootleggers which was interrupted by the killing of Carl Green in a raid near here March 14, credited Green and his partner, Claude Beverly with cutting down the daily supply of Harris county illicit liquor at least 2,000 gallons. Two city policemen, he said, have been assigned to work with Beverly as investigators.

Houston Charge Sets Precedent In Court Trials

Murder Through Terror Is Charged To Attorney In Unique Case As Sawyer Protests Action.

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, April 18.—Murder through terror, the charge on which an indictment against Thomas P. Whiteside, young Houston attorney, was based, was without precedent in American jurisprudence. John M. Cobb, his attorney, said in filing exceptions to the ruling of District Judge White Boyd in Whiteside's trial, preparatory to an appeal.

Whiteside was indicted for murder but was convicted of homicide and was sentenced to 18 years imprisonment. His wife, Rose, was found under the window of their second story apartment here last June with a broken back. She died about three months later. The state asserted that Whiteside so terrorized her that she either fell or leaped to the cement walk below.

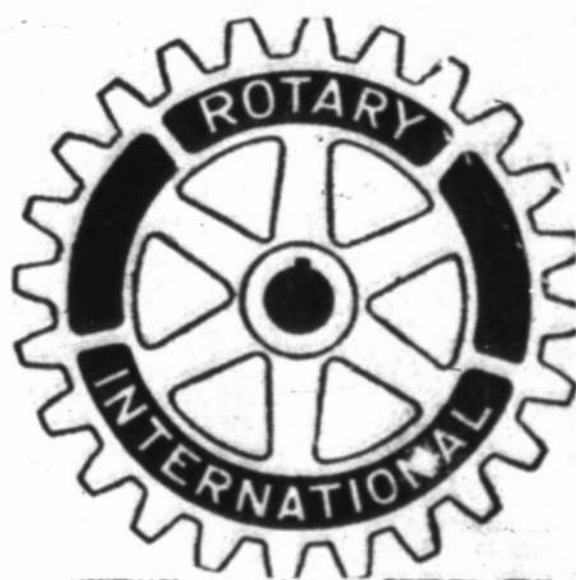
