German Lawyer Indian Diplomat

Baron Otfried Von Meusebach, educated in law and business in a prominent German university, led the expedition which resulted in founding Fredericksburg in 1846.
The colony had difficulty from the first. It was outside the grant made by the Republic of Texas, and hostile Indians were continually resentful of the new encroachment. Meusebach, however, proved an able diplomat among the Comanches and secured treaties which insured peace to the new farmers in early years of the settlement.

Claim \$100,000 Loss in Relief Store Fire

GOODS TO AID STATE POOR IN 13 COUNTIES

FORT WORTH, Jan. 22.—A spectacular two-alarm fire today destroyed the main district relief warehouse here at an estimated loss of \$100,000.
One million cans of beef, several thousand cans of vegetables, 300 mattresses and 200 bales of cotton batting were burned.
These supplies were for distribution over 13 counties of the state.
Firemen were hampered by the severe cold in their efforts to bring the blaze under control. Lester Baker, one of them, narrowly escaped serious injury when he fell through the burning first floor into the smoke-filled basement. The blaze started in the basement where a gas heater was kept burning all night to keep the supplies from freezing.
Seven fire companies answered the alarm turned in this morning. They continued to pour water on the still burning building today as salvage efforts got under way. Relief officials said little if any of the stored material could be saved.

War Veterans Plan Bonus Investments

SOUTH HAVEN, Conn., Jan. 22.—In a canvass of 156 World War veterans, asking them how they would spend their adjusted compensation certificates, or bonus, if Congress should approve full payment now, American Legion officials here learned that the biggest slice, 21 per cent, would go for "investment and savings."
The next largest expenditure, approximately 20 per cent, would go into home repairs. Creditors would receive 15 per cent and 12 per cent would be expended on clothes. Payment on new homes would take 5 per cent and an equal part would go to automobile dealers. The remainder of the \$34, which is the average amount expected, would go for new furniture, electrical equipment, mortgage payments, taxes and the doctor.

QUESTION TWO AS ROBINSON CAR IS FOUND

HOUSTON, Jan. 22.—H. J. Dissell, 34, and Mrs. Lois Dissell, 24, were questioned today by federal officers concerning their possession of an automobile identified as that used by T. H. Robinson, Jr., 27, charged with the kidnapping of Mrs. Alice Stoll, Louisville.
A department of justice agent who arrived from San Antonio and a deputy U. S. marshal made no comment after the interview with the Dissells.
The man previously told officers they had the car in Illinois, and intended to return it. A broadcast by the New Orleans police department of the motor number of the Robinson car tallied with that of the machine.

Mais and Legenza Must Die in Chair

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 22.—Robert Mais and Walter Legenza, leaders of the defunct tri-state gang and convicted of murdering a federal reserve bank truck driver during a robbery today were sentenced to die in the electric chair Feb. 2.
Meanwhile police in Philadelphia found the body of William (Big Nose) Weiss, kidnapped and slain gangster, in a creek near Crofton. The body was near where members of the Mais gang which confessed to the killing, said they had thrown it. It was 20 feet from shore and was weighed down with iron.

FEW WYOMING DESTITUTE
CHEYENNE, Wyo., Jan. 22.—Of the Rocky Mountain states, Wyoming has the fewest number on relief. Only 11.3 per cent of the population is on relief as against 23 per cent on Colorado and 18 per cent in Montana.

Kenamer Asks Venue Change; State Says He "Picked Place for Killing"

TULSA, Okla., Jan. 22.—Swearing allegations that public officials and newspapers have built up public prejudice against Philip Kenamer in Tulsa were made today in the youth's plea for change of venue of his trial on a murder charge.
Hints of bribery and terrorism were scored roundly.
Attorneys for Kenamer asked that the trial be held in a place where Kenamer admitted he killed John Gorrell, Jr., be moved.
Ruling on the plea will come Thursday.
"I will not consent to removal of the trial to another district. He picked his place for the killing. Let the people of that district decide the punishment," Holly Anderson, county attorney said.

Cheap Dress Shops Are Found in Paris

PARIS, Jan. 22.—Specialty shops catering to cheap dresses, coats, hats and blouses are springing up here as fast as mushrooms. Never before in the history of the French capital have the fashionable Champs-Elysees and the Rue de la Paix been so cluttered with modernistically designed store fronts, beaming with glare price tags of from 75 francs to 350 francs.
Across from Worth, Cartier and Paquin in the Rue de la Paix are three cheap dress houses such as might be found on New York's Fourth Avenue, lower Fifth and around Times Square, East and West. In the Rue Royale, sandwiched in between Moynaux, Jenny and Henry Gred are four more, while along the famous one-time most fashionable and aristocratic thoroughfare in Europe—the Champs-Elysees—from the Place de la Concorde to the Arc de Triomphe, both sides of the street are dotted with little ground-floor one-room shops selling cheap copies of wearing apparel designed by the Big House as well as their own designs made up in wholesale lots.
These shops are illuminated like Broadway at theaters and at night they stay open late to catch the eyes of pedestrians, motorists and anyone gazing at the smart cafes and hotels in this particular neighborhood, of which there are dozens.
A few of the Big Houses to combat this unprecedented competition, have added "copying departments" to their own establishments, making reproductions of their own models, at deflated prices.

MOTHER, 94, RECOMMENDS PIPE
CLEVELAND, Jan. 22.—"I'm surprised," says Mrs. Catherine Graves, 94, "that the young girls don't lose all their hair, smoking these cigarettes. A corn cob is the only fit thing for a woman to smoke. I've been smoking one since my girl (now 70) was in rompers."

South Texas Farm People in Meeting

CORPUS CHRISTI, Jan. 22.—Planters and farm people today gathered for a two-day annual South Texas farmers' conference which is sponsored by the South Texas Agricultural Co-operative association and the South Texas Cotton Co-operative association.
The Texas Co-operative council and the Texas Agricultural association also will participate in the conference which was held for the first time last year, according to Hugh Hathaway of Corpus Christi. The conference program will begin with a banquet on the night of Jan. 21 and will continue through the following day.
National agricultural co-operative authorities will attend, Hathaway said.

Big Cop Says He Is No Match For Wife

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22.—Jess Moore, 225-pound policeman testified in District of Columbia Supreme court here that he was no match for his 115-pound wife in a rough-and-tumble fight.
He further asserted through his lawyer in the divorce trial, that his wife "had not hesitated to throw dishes, milk bottles, brass bookends and similar objects at him."
Despite this treatment, Moore asked the court to deny his wife's request for a divorce.

BAD DRIVERS INCREASE
BOSTON, Jan. 22.—Revocations and suspensions of automobile drivers' licenses in Massachusetts during 1934 increased 33.7 per cent, according to Registrar of Motor Vehicles Morgan T. Ryan. During 1934 there were 5,717 revocations and suspensions, compared with 4,274 for 1933.

CISCOAN, EDITING A. C. C. ANNUAL, ANNOUNCES TWO NEW FEATURES

ABILENE, Jan. 22.—Bert Ezzell, A. C. C. senior from Cisco, editor of the 1935 Prickly Pear, announced this week two special features for the year book that are new to West Texas publications.
A special padded cover will adorn the class of '35 book according to arrangements made with the publishers this week. Padded covers of this type have never been used by books in the southwest except for three editions of university annuals.
Another feature of the book will be pictures of Howard Green's victories in the national A. A. U. meets last spring and a snap of his winning the 400 meter race in a meet in Japan when he hung up a new Japanese record for that race, with the United States team last fall.
Ralph Arceneux, senior from Kilbuck, is business manager of the 1935 book. He plans to sell 600 to students on the campus which will be the largest number ever sold. The last date to buy the 1935 Prickly Pear has been set at February 1. Most of the printing and compiling will be completed in February and the books will be issued early in May, the editors say.

CISCO THAWS AFTER WORST COLD OF YEAR

After 42 hours of freezing weather, the coldest of the winter, the mercury here rose at 11 o'clock this morning to 32 degrees and ice on the streets began to thaw. At noon the temperature was two degrees higher. It continued the climb until it reached 45 at 2:30 p. m. Minimum temperature during the night was 16 degrees, according to the West Texas Utilities recording thermometer. The low was from 3 to 5 a. m. The mercury stood at 13 degrees at noon yesterday, but by 5 p. m. had risen to 22. For the next two hours it dropped to 20, and then slipped to 18, where it remained until midnight. After the night's low, it rose steadily throughout the day.

Normally sunny Texas was frozen from one end to the other today with little prospect of being thoroughly thawed out for several days.

The weather bureau's forecast was deceptively cheerful. "Not so cold tonight, Wednesday warmer," it said.
But the ground, said Meteorologist J. L. Clime of Dallas, was frozen to a considerable depth and like a great ice pack would respond slowly to rising temperatures.
The panhandle felt the first effect of the low pressure area which is moving in. The night's low at Amarillo was 18 degrees but at 7 a. m. the thermometer registered 26 degrees.

LOW PRESSURE AREA TO BRING RELIEF

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 22.—A low pressure area was expected to bring relief today to the southwest and Midwest from sub-zero weather of the winter's worst storm.
The high pressure area which brought the cold wave to the Midwest is moving south and east, causing temperature drops as it reaches new points.
Moving into the northwest is a low pressure area which was expected to bring rising temperatures.

Five Children Die In Montreal Fire

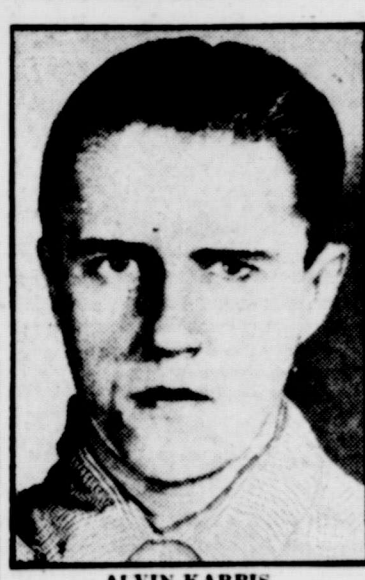
MONTREAL, Jan. 22.—Five children, the oldest of whom was 10, lost their lives today and seven others were injured by fire at the home of Thémile Gadois.

CLASSES ARE RESUMED FOR SCHOOL TODAY

Classes were resumed at the Cisco public schools this morning after a half-holiday yesterday, when small attendance forced the authorities to suspend activities at noon.
Final examinations will begin tomorrow, it has been announced. The examinations will be run on a three-day schedule. Two examinations will be given in the mornings and one in the afternoons. Each test will be of approximately an hour and a half in duration.
Registration will begin for the high school on Friday, it has been announced by Principal H. Brandon. Examinations will be completed Thursday, he said.
At the same time, Randolph college will begin actual work of the second semester this week, it has been announced by Dean E. B. Isaacs. Registration was Monday and Tuesday, and classes were to start Wednesday, he said.
Severe weather caused the college to add a second day for registration and to postpone the first classes until tomorrow, the dean said.

Georgians to Hear Prominent Speakers

ATHENS, Ga., Jan. 22.—A distinguished list of speakers has been obtained for the ninth annual University of Georgia Institute of Public Affairs, to be held here Jan. 23-25.
Among the foremost speakers will be David E. Lillenthal, 33-year-old director of the Tennessee Valley Authority. On Jan. 23 Lillenthal will explain before the Institute an unannounced phase of the government's \$280,000,000 power project in the Tennessee Valley.
On the opening day Hiroshi Saito, Japanese Ambassador to the United States, will speak on "Some phases of Japanese-American Relations."
Dr. Stephen P. Duggan, professor of political science at the College of the City of New York and director of the Institute, will speak Jan. 24 on "Contemporary Russia."

ELEPHANTS IN TEXAS
AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—Mostodons and real elephants flourished in Texas at a relatively late geological period, according to Dr. E. H. Sellards, University of Texas expert. Dr. Sellards is making a special study of prehistoric life in Texas and collecting fossils for a museum. His latest contribution is a mastodon uncovered by Chris Hoover near Brownwood.

SAYS SUSPECT AT HOPEWELL 2 OCCASIONS

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Jan. 22.—A lean mountaineer from the Sourlands today became the seventh government witness to identify Bruno Hauptmann as connected with the Lindbergh crime and the second to place in Hopewell at approximately the date it was committed.

Millard Whited, a woodsman who says he knows everybody in the Sourlands, testified today that he saw Hauptmann on two occasions, first about Feb. 18, 1932, and again on Feb. 25 or 27, skulking in the vicinity of the Lindbergh home.
Amandus Hochmuth, an 87-year-old resident of Hopewell, previously declared he saw Hauptmann "looking like a man who had seen a ghost" in the highway leading to the Lindbergh home, on March 1, when the kidnapping was executed.
In cross examination of Whited, C. Lloyd Fisher, associate defense counsel, did his utmost to discredit the witness and prove his story was incredible. He hinted that perhaps Whited told his story to the police to save himself from arrest and that there were wide discrepancies between the testimony he gave at the Bronx extradition hearings and the present evidence.

CHEVIGNY TO SPEAK TO 100 AT BANQUET

At least a hundred persons, besides the football lettermen, are expected to attend the Lobo banquet at the Laguna hotel roof garden Thursday evening, according to O. J. Russell of the banquet committee today.
"We've got about the biggest man in this part of the country for a speaker," Russell said, referring to Jack Chevigny, coach of the University of Texas Longhorns, who will deliver the principal address of the evening.
"There isn't any way of describing just what that man accomplishes. He is the busiest and most sought after man, next to Jimmy Allred, in Austin, and the best speaker."

Chevigny who, in his first year at Texas, missed the championship by only a half game, was born in Hammond, Indiana and was an all-state halfback for the high school there. Later, at Notre Dame, he was an all-American. He served as backfield coach under Knute Rockne and Hunk Anderson at his Alma Mater.

Coch Shelley of Cisco was under him when he coached the Cardinals pro team in 1932. Coming to Austin, he brought the St. Edwards club out of the wilderness to a title. Then, when Texas wanted a new coach, the university officials searched all over the country for one and finally went across the river and got Chevigny.
He has one of the most colorful personalities in the sports world today, and likes to talk. He spends most of his time, in the off-season, going places where he can meet people and talk to them. O. J. Russell today predicted he would meet all the 6,000,000 persons within the state's bounds within ten years.
Chevigny has asked to have a meeting of all Texas alumni either before or after the banquet, so that he can meet and talk with them.

Nassau Races Will Have Royal Guest

NASSAU, N. P., Jan. 22.—Announcement has been made that yacht races of the Royal Nassau Sailing club, one of the most exclusive sailing clubs in the world, which carries a charter from His Majesty King George V, will get under way here in February.
Five groups of races are scheduled including races for the New York Yacht club trophy and the King's cup, prized trophy presented to the club by his Majesty, His Excellency Captain the Hon. Sir Bede Clifford K. C. M. G., Governor of the Bahamas, is admiral of the club.
Arrangements have been made to sail the final races during the visit here of His Royal Highness, the Duke of Gloucester, third son of the King who will visit Nassau as a guest of government house, March 10-14.
Extensive alternations and changes are being made on the club house of the Royal Nassau Sailing club which is located on the grounds of the British Colonial Hotel opposite Hog Island.

Girl Safe While Police Seek Her

Rotary Helps Prevent Crime

The Rotary clubs of the world are doing a great deal to prevent crime by helping to keep young people at school as long as possible, and by keeping a watchful eye over those who have already become delinquent, in order to turn them from the paths of punishment, according to Robert L. Hill, president of Rotary International.

Believing that two of the most effective means of crime prevention are education and good companionship, Rotarians have developed a number of very practical methods of helping youth to stay on the right track. In the first instance, they believe in lending money to young people to complete their schooling where this is not otherwise possible.

They have over 1,000 student loan funds throughout the United States. These funds are kept busy all the time and are self-perpetuating because the loans are paid back as soon as the students can do so.

"Keeping young people in school and giving them a good sound education such as he can get in our public schools, coupled with the proper cultural background, is not so likely to go wrong."

Rotary clubs also help students in other ways. Some of them clothe needy boys and girls so they can continue in public school and not be embarrassed by their appearance. One Rotary club in a midwestern city cares for about 100 girls each year. The wives of the members take care of collecting the clothing and keeping the girls properly dressed so they can maintain their feeling of equality with their schoolmates.

Hand-in-hand with this work goes that of looking after boys and girls who have already got into trouble, and keeping them from later offenses by giving them "big-brotherly" friendship and guidance. Many of the Rotary clubs have an agreement with the juvenile courts, Mr. Hill said, to take over youngsters who have committed first offenses and be responsible for them. Then the individual members look after these charges.

New Things to Think About

The Administration plan gives Americans new things to think about. Reorganization of industrial returns is involved. Compulsory unemployment insurance would be paid by employers through a pay-roll tax. This would start at 1 per cent with 1936, increase to 3 per cent in 1938. Compulsory old-age insurance reserves would be built up by employers and employees on a 50-50 basis. Old-age pensions would be paid equally by federal and state governments for those now aged and indigent. There would be a voluntary annuity system for those not included in the compulsory plan, usable by persons who can save for old age out of incomes larger than wages. Large federal grants would go to states to aid ill and needy mothers and children — It is the nation compelling its citizens to take care of the expected while they can.

The President's Security Program

President Roosevelt lays before congress his long anticipated program for the social security he regards as demanded by "certain hazards and vicissitudes of life." He recommends unemployment compensation, old-age benefits, federal aid to dependent, homeless and crippled children, and additional federal aid to public health agencies. He does not at this time advise health insurance. Senator Wagner of New York submits a bill incorporating the President's proposals, which are based on the 40,000-word report of the Cabinet Committee on Security. Immediate action is asked, to be followed by co-ordinate legislation in 41 state legislatures. The President declares the importance of careful, cautious procedure to avoid discrediting the necessary policy of federal laws for economic security. He explains why he fully endorses the program outlined by his committee — "It will appeal to the sound sense of the American people."

The Status of Louisiana

Louisiana witnesses vigorous steps by the opposers of Senator Huey P. Long. With New Orleans saved for three months from the Long grasp by turning federal ward, the Square Deal Association demands that Gov. O. K. Allen convene the Legislature to repeal new laws giving Long his vast power. Seeking to build up a strong statewide organization, the Square Deal Association counsels no threats or violence. Meanwhile, Senator Long broadcasts from Washington — Adopting his "share-the-wealth" plan, he says, is the only way "to avoid Huey Long as President."

Politics About The Saar

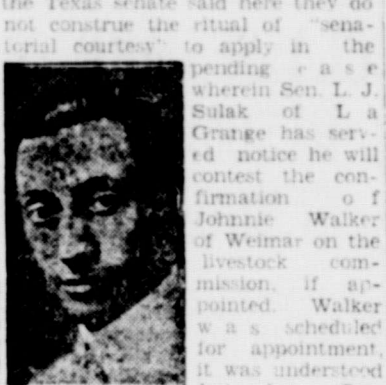
Europe's new chapters unfold rapidly following the Saar plebiscite. France demands that Germany agree not to militarize the Saar and to destroy two strategic railroads. Germany refuses to destroy the rail lines and agrees only in principle on demilitarization. The League Council sustains Germany's stand. France unpleasantly upsetting smooth procedure, is said to have felt it had to bring up its point. France sends notes to Germany and Poland asking them to join the proposed Eastern Locarno — Russian Diplomat Litvinoff backs these invitations with adroitness and ability.

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, Jan. 22 — Veterans of the Texas senate said here they do not construe the ritual of "senatorial courtesy" to apply in the pending case of a senatorial appointment.

The formula of "senatorial courtesy" is that a senator may block the confirmation of anyone from his district for any appointment, regardless of the support the appointing governor may have in the senate, on the statement that "this man is personally obnoxious to me, and engaged in personal political activity against me."

Veteran say that Sen. Sulak's only known basis of opposition would be that he said during his campaign he would oppose Walker, if appointed back on the livestock commission again. They say Walker did not campaign against Sulak, but gave his whole time to Gov. Allred's campaign.

They insist the issue is not between Walker and Sen. Sulak, but between the Allred friends in the senate and Gov. Allred, if the nomination of Mr. Walker should be sent in by Allred.

Gov. Allred already has appointed the other two members of the livestock commission, but left one nomination yet to be sent the senate.

Mr. Walker induced several prominent citizens of his district to go to Austin to attempt to settle the controversy and permit his appointment to have the assurance there would be no fight on it in the senate by the senator-editor from La Grange.

George M. Whitwell, board member, said he believed it is drawing a pretty fine line to say that no teachers should come to school with tobacco on their breath. They certainly have a right to smoke at home.

"Business encouragement is prompted not only by the quantity of advertising but also by the quality of the advertising displays. There is now a marked and growing appreciation of clearer, more revealing and more appealing advertising. This is supported by an appreciation of research and statistical knowledge as a basis for projecting advertising, bringing a more scientific approach, more economic and effective methods in presenting the products to the customers and consumer."

The better quality and larger volume of newspaper advertising prove to be unfounded fears that the future of newspaper advertising is threatened. I confidently predict bright prospects for all good advertising in 1935."

Henhouse Sleeper Draws Work Term

CLEVELAND, Jan. 22 — A combination of 21 stung children, an alcoholic "edge" and a burglar alarm that really worked, conspired to bring John Petrowski, 52, a 30-day workhouse sentence.

Before Municipal Judge Frank J. Lausche, Petrowski was identified by Mrs. Hatti Kraft as the man who thrice entered her chicken coop and heartlessly wrung the necks of 31 chickens.

After the first two assaults Mrs. Kraft was indignant. She rigged up a burglar alarm. Petrowski was the captive. He admitted he was intoxicated, explained he liked to sleep in chicken coops because "they were so soft." But denied he would harm the chickens.

Vets Fight Change In Headquarters

KERRVILLE, Jan. 22 — World war veterans in southern Texas are joining San Antonio forces in fighting the proposal to transfer the regional office of the Veterans administration from San Antonio to the veterans hospital here.

WEATHER SHIFTS BRIDGE

TOLEDO, Jan. 22 — Guards were stationed on the \$3,000,000 Anthony Wayne high level bridge here, following discovery that concrete approach spans had shifted four inches believed due to recent zero weather. The bridge is still being held open to traffic.

NO FIRES IN DILLEY

DILLEY, Tex., Jan. 22 — According to a report made by the city of Dilley to the state fire insurance commissioner, there was not a cent of fire loss during the year 1934.

AMERICA LEADS IN PRODUCTION OF OIL

DALLAS, Jan. 22 — Since the world's first "discovery" well was brought in 76 years ago in Pennsylvania, some 22,729,625,000 barrels of oil has been produced by Jan. 1, 1934.

Of that amount, according to Elmer H. Johnson, regional economist of the bureau of business research of the University of Texas, the United States produced 65.1 per cent.

North and South America together produced 77.6 per cent of the world total. Europe produced 15.8 per cent. Asia and Africa the rest. Russia was the greatest European producer, her wells flowing 12.7 per cent of the world's total production down to the beginning of 1934.

For the period from 1959 to the first of 1934 California produced 25.75 per cent, Oklahoma 22.4 per cent and Texas 21.73 per cent of the United States total oil output. Texas, however, holds first place in current production. For the 1929-1933 period, Texas produced 36.7 per cent, California 23.9 per cent and Oklahoma 22.2 per cent of the nation's total.

During 1933, according to Johnson, Texas' recorded production amounted to almost 45 per cent of the national output, a proportion it held through 1934.

Example of wishful statistics.

Lately an especially prominent official has produced a table purporting to show that there are now fewer people on relief than a year ago. But the administration probably won't make use of these figures. They seem too raw.

The idea was arrived at by estimating that in addition to 11,642,000 actually on relief rolls last year at this time, federal money paid to CWA workers was supporting from 12 to 14 million of their dependents. But although there were 18,000,000 on relief just before CWA became effective, there are now more than 19,000,000.

And most New Dealers refused to make what seems to them the impossible argument that there are now fewer persons on relief in the face of the fact that the number of unemployed increased in 1934.

INCREASING tendency of other militant minority groups to co-operate with Communist leaders was demonstrated at the Unemployment Insurance Congress here, which drew about 300 delegates who came to demand passage of the Lunden bill for payment of unemployment insurance to all unemployed.

Socialist and A. F. of L. local were represented. And several organizations of professional people, Miss Mary Van Kleeck, a member of the Hoover committee on unemployment and business cycles, was an important figure and the chairman. F. Elmer Brown, was from the New York Typographical Union.

But the driving and organizing force appeared to be supplied chiefly by the Communists. Herbert Benjamin, veteran leader of hunger marches and unemployed demonstrations, was the keynote.

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IOWA'S WINE INDUSTRY HAS HUGE REVIVAL

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa, Jan. 22.—The Iowa wine industry is experiencing a revival with the result that vineyards soon may replace fields as the identifying agricultural pursuit of the state.

Southwestern Iowa grape wine now occupies a prominent place on the shelves of Iowa State liquor stores and wholesale dealers in other states are contracting for supplies.

Another enormous boost has been given the industry by a popular vote on the repeal of Nebraska's prohibition law. The legislature of that state enacted a liquor law, casks of wine are being shipped to Iowa.

The Council Bluffs Grape Growers' association already has received orders to sell 3,700 gallons of wine in Omaha, but directors have stated they prefer to wait until Nebraska's prohibition law is wiped out before selling in a state.

The association has 3,700 gallons of two-year-old wine in stock. It was produced from the 1931 stock. The gallons were sold to the Iowa State Liquor Commission at approximately \$13.000.

Ageing Process Helped.—The association has 40,000 gallons of port wine in the ageing process, produced from 450,000 pounds of grapes, representing more than a third of the association's crop. It is ready for the market within a few months due to a special ageing process, which, it is asserted, has reduced the ageing time from two years to six months.

Next year the association plans to produce not only port wine but also white Burgundy and hard apple cider. The association's plant is expected to handle 5,000 to 10,000 cases of wine annually. Directors are confident that within five years the association will be producing 300,000 gallons of wine annually.

NO RED TAPE.—The Houston Burial association closed its books with \$61,752.72 in Houston, Texas. A. A. Fowler, secretary-treasurer, announced in his annual report in which he boasted of absence of red tape when a member dies. "A check for \$1,000 is forwarded to the beneficiary immediately," he said.

CANADA PROSPERS.—MONTREAL, Jan. 22.—Canadian operations paid out nearly \$60,000 more in dividends to shareholders in 1934 than in 1933, figures compiled here reveal. Total dividend distributions were \$188,000, compared with \$141,326.82 in 1933.

Dried Skim Milk To Be Used For Relief

AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—Large quantities of dried skim milk will be made available to Texas relief clients in February as a federal surplus commodity. It has been announced by C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department of the Texas relief commission.

Setting forth some of the benefits to be derived from the use of the milk, Mrs. Helen S. Swanson, consultant dietitian of the commission, stated: "This commodity will do more toward supplying some of the food factors which are deficient, or even lacking in the diets of many of our relief clients, than any food other than fresh or evaporated milk. Dried skim milk contains all the food factors present in fresh skimmed milk except water. It also contains 6 per cent more protein per pound than cheese, and is a rich source of minerals, especially calcium and phosphorus, and vitamins B and G.

One-fifth of a pound of dried skim milk plus one-tenth of a pound of butter is approximately equivalent to one quart of whole milk."

Mrs. Swanson said plans are being made to institute a campaign whereby relief clients can be educated to the use of the commodity.

The milk is bought in 200-pound drums and put up in 2-pound packages. It is necessary to maintain about a 70-degree temperature in the plants, and packers are required to wear white sanitary uniforms. The small packages are sent to county administrators, who, in turn, distribute them to relief clients.

NOT PINNED DOWN

Eddie Cantor, Hollywood Good-Will Man, Crashes Gates at Palace To See Il Duce

ROME, Jan. 22.—Mussolini's Venetian Palace is heavily guarded. Anyone who stands even across the Venetian Square too long, or gazes at the Duce's windows with too much fondness, is liable to find himself in the police station trying to explain why.

A pass was signed by the proper palace authorities and was delivered to Eddie Cantor, a recent visitor with the exact minute designated when he was to be ushered into the presence of the great man. Accompanied by a member of the American Embassy, the movie star drove up to the Duce's offices. Upon descending he was asked for his pass. There was a quick search in his clothes, but in the excitement he had forgotten it.

Eddie Cantor failed. "But I'm Eddie Cantor. Don't you know me?" And he put on his best Cantor look. "I'm going to see the Duce, see. Look at me, don't you know me?"

But the guard evidently was not film fan Al he knew was that here was a crazy lunatic crying out Mussolini's name in a strange language, so he called the rest of his guards and proceeded to arrest Cantor.

The member of the American Embassy staff explained that Cantor had an appointment with the Duce, had forgotten the pass and that it would be sent for at the hotel.

The pass was sent for and in the meanwhile, Cantor acted as a guard to the Palace, stopping all the ministers and employees, demanding in English for their permission to enter. Before the pass arrived he had all the guards in such a good humor that they were willing to let him enter even without it.

Eddie Cantor might make even Mussolini laugh, but the Duce nearly made Eddie weep.

Good-Will Ambassador
Cantor came over as good-will ambassador to Europe from Hollywood—for Hollywood is getting worried over the proposed restrictions of American films on the part of many European countries—arrived in Rome with an important message for Mussolini.

He had a bagful of laughs, but also lots of serious offers. He was told to say that Hollywood was ready to make many concessions if the Duce also made some. That American film magnates were willing to co-operate and build up the fast-dying, if not already dead, Italian film industry. That Hollywood would welcome with open arms any Italians who wanted to come over and study the technique of production and acting, and even suggested that there might be a fair exchange of producers, actors and cetera between the two countries. It was all very much yet in the eggshell, but the Duce was interested and he wanted to talk to Cantor.

Scientists sneer at Perambulating Peak

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 22.—Engineers of the U. S. Bureau of Geological Survey here are interested in latest reports of land movements on Carbon Mountain near Durango as a study in human gullibility rather than as a geological phenomenon.

Inspired residents of Durango have dubbed the mountain various names including "The Perambulating Peak," "Restless Carbon Mountain," "The Rambling Peak of the Rockies," "The Ambling Alp."

The federal men, none of whom want to be quoted on the matter, thus destroying a grand illusion say Carbon Mountain is just another mountain with landslides on its slopes.

A report on its activity was made by a federal engineer last year and submitted to Washington. It said, in brief, that burning of coal in abandoned coal mines near the base of the peak had caused the landslides.

There are many other such subterranean coal fires in Colorado, causing greater landslides than the one on Carbon Mountain. Charles Rankin, a commercial geologist, mentioned one at Coalmont as being more active than the one on Carbon Mountain.

But Carbon Mountain is the only "rambling peak" in the state that has a hot dog stand and a burro route for the convenience of tourists.

29 MILLIONS IN WORK RELIEF FOR TEXAS AUTHORIZED IN 1934

AUSTIN, Jan. 22 — Work relief projects calling for expenditure of more than \$29,000,000 were authorized by the Texas relief commission during 1934. It has been announced by Adam R. Johnson, state relief administrator.

The FERA work program, instituted by the engineering department of the Commission after abandonment of CWA last April, at the end of the year included 6,229 projects in active operation.

"We are proud of the growth of our work program because it has enabled us largely to provide our employable relief people with work program because it has enabled us largely to provide our employable relief people with work and avoid the outright dole," Johnson said. "I believe it has been a determining factor in maintaining the morale of the state's destitute."

The director pointed out how the number of direct relief cases has decreased in percentage in comparison with the number of work relief cases. Although the case load had increased from 206,460 cases in May to 234,282 cases in December, or by 26.85 per cent, the increase in direct cases was only from 160,442 to 169,592, or 1.93 per cent.

Work Relief Greater
Direct relief cases in May were 76.05 per cent of the total case load, work relief only 23.95 per cent. The steady increase in numbers of work projects each month continued until in November direct cases were but 53.11 per cent of the total work cases had climbed to 46.89 per cent.

"Although we haven't completed our report for December, preliminary estimates place the work relief load at 52 per cent of the total. If these estimates are correct, our work relief load now exceeds the load receiving the direct relief grant," Mr. Johnson continued.

As the direct relief case load has been kept at a standstill, the funds paid to the growing number of work relief clients have steadily increased since May, 1934.

At that time, direct relief clients received \$1,210,837.55, or 61.48 per cent of all money granted clients while work clients got \$756,373.35, or 38.52 per cent.

Situation Reversed
In November, the situation had practically reversed itself. Direct clients during the month received

participate to the extent of an amount equal to the estimated cost of materials and non-personal services for the project.

The metropolitan districts, including Dallas, Tarrant, McLennan, Travis, El Paso, Bexar, Harris, Galveston, and Jefferson counties, lead all others in amount of money authorized for expenditure on projects currently under way with a total of \$8,327,589.11. The districts also have the largest caseload, 77,217, or 26.92 per cent of the state's total.

In addition to the current projects, reports to the engineering department indicate value of projects already completed and cancelled at more than \$2,500,000, which increases the total during the year to more than \$29,000,000.

Money for these projects does not become available in a lump sum, but comes in two separate agencies, grants to the Commission from state and federal funds. Completion of the projects, therefore, depends upon continued receipt of relief funds.

DOUBLE BURDEN ON TAXPAYERS BEING STUDIED

CHICAGO, Jan. 22 — The most obvious form of double taxation — collection of revenue from the same source by two separate agencies, such as federal and state or two states — is but one of the methods by which collectors "get the taxpayer coming and going."

There are four other tax confusions, each more serious, according to James W. Martin, research director of the Interstate Commission on Conflicting Taxation.

The general definition of double taxation, Martin said, is a duplicate tax levied that discriminates between certain types of taxpayers, whether it is levied by one jurisdiction or more than one.

Specific Case Cited
Thus double taxation may arise in a single taxing district in the case of a general property tax which defines as taxable property both the stock of a corporation and the realty it owns.

Another taxation conflict reported by Martin is technical difficulty arising from indifference of one taxing jurisdiction to the levies of another. If a corporation does business in several states, it is likely to encounter several bases for computing capital gains or depreciations. Varying legal interpretations of the same statutory provisions present another aspect to this difficulty.

Constitutional Bars
On the other hand there are at least two constitutional provisions which deprive revenue collectors of tax funds, Martin said.

One prohibits state taxation of interstate commerce. If, for example, a shipment is made from Cincinnati, O., to Cleveland, O., freight tariff receipts of the railroad company are taxable. However if the same shipment originates in Ludlow, Ky., a mile across the Ohio border, and travels exactly the same line, Ohio cannot levy the tax.

The second may be the outgrowth of competition between various commonwealths for economic advantage — as seen in the recent Florida constitutional provision exempting movie producers from income tax, Martin said.
