NAVAL LIMITATION MOVE IS MADE

DOCUMENT IS RECOGNIZED

OVER WORLD CEREMONY MARKS NEW INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON, July 24.—By its own terms, the Kellogg-Briand treaty for renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy became effective at noon today with the deposit by Japan at the State Department of its formal instrument of adherence.

The document of ratification personally was presented by Ambassador Ouchi of Japan and with this action the treaty became binding upon the 46 nations which have expressed adherence to its terms.

There was no ceremony at the department and immediately after receipt of the Japanese instrument those present for the occasion left for the White House where a short time later President Hoover had arranged to proclaim that the treaty was in force.

IMPOSING CEREMONY MARKS PROMULGATION
WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP).—President Hoover today proclaimed the Kellogg-Briand treaty for the renunciation of war and congratulated "the entire world" upon "this additional instrument of humane endeavor" for the sake of peace.

Ceremonies of imposing attended the promulgation of the pact. Gathered in the historic east room of the White House were former President Coolidge, former secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, and the diplomatic representatives of all but two of the nations that have become parties to the treaty.

TWO KILLED IN BIG BLAST

BERLIN HAS BIGGEST EXPLOSION IN ITS HISTORY
(By Associated Press)
BERLIN, July 24.—Two workmen were fatally injured and many more fatalities were feared to have occurred in one of the biggest explosions in the history of Berlin at the United Oxygen Works today. Four workers, two of them gravely burned, were rescued by firemen.

A big steel container at the oxygen works fell over while it was being refilled, and the contents came into contact with a fire. A flame 300 feet high shot out from the container and was followed by a series of explosions from other steel bottles.

American Plant Vandalized
The American General Motors plant was among the nearby factories which were immediately cleared of workers because of the danger of collapse of walls from the tremendous detonations. The explosions could be heard in the very heart of Berlin. Flying fragments of steel oxygen containers did damage thousands of feet away from the United Oxygen Works. The entire industrial section of Borsigswalde was enveloped in clouds of smoke.

BROOKHART GETS TEXAS OIL DATA

WASHINGTON, Iowa, July 25 (AP).—Senator Smith-W. Brookhart conferred last night with Fred W. Strang, Fort Worth, Texas, oil operator, who delivered to him more than 600 pages of information concerning alleged political corruption in Texas.

The information consisted of copies of court records, affidavits, and photostatic copies of letters written on Texas state stationery which Strang said was gathered in an effort to reveal to the committee political corruption in connection with state university land, oil and royalty leases and state and federal elections.

Brookhart is chairman of the committee which recently conducted several hearings into charges of republican patronage in Texas.

EXECUTIVE IS SEEKING CROP PROBLEM AID

SEVEN OTHER STATES ASKED TO HAVE MEN BEFORE BOARD

AUSTIN, July 24.—Hope that seven other cotton raising states would join with Texas in sending a committee before the Federal Farm Board at Baton Rouge, La., July 29-30, to consider economic problems confronting the South, was expressed today by Governor Moody in telegrams to the chief executives of Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Oklahoma, North Carolina and South Carolina.

"The Texas legislature passed a resolution calling for appointment of a member of the House of Representatives and Senate to appear before the Farm Board and urge some action by that body regarding the marketing of the 1929 cotton crop," Governor Moody's telegram said. "I have appointed that committee and have requested representatives from the University of Texas and the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas to appear before the Farm Board with the committee. Your state is one extensively interested in production and marketing of cotton, a commodity that brings millions of dollars to the Southland."

I hope that you and governors of other cotton producing states will join in sending representatives to Baton Rouge to appear before the Farm Board and ask consideration of economic problems that confront the farmers in the south in marketing the 1929 crop and to take steps to improve the market for the crop."

MAN SHOTS WIFE AND MOTHER-IN-LAW, THEN SUICIDES

SALMON FALLS, N. H., July 24.—Ernest Dupuis, 34, a mill worker, today shot and killed his wife, Mabel, 32, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Maude E. Dyer, and then committed suicide by firing a shot into his head. The shooting occurred in the Dyer home where Dupuis' wife had lived since she separated from her husband three years ago.

Big concrete buildings in the hospital swayed and terror stricken inhabitants abandoned all houses in a few seconds. The shock was most severe near Mount Hekla. No casualties have been reported.

TWO OTHER PLANES UP TO BEAT NEW MARK SET TUESDAY

(By Associated Press)
ST. LOUIS, July 24.—Completing 270 hours of continuous flying at 12:17 p. m. (C. S. T.) today, Dale "Red" Jackson and Forrest O'Brien, new endurance flight champions, were still circling in their "St. Louis Robin" above Lambert-St. Louis field with no sign of weakening. They had bettered the former endurance record by more than 22 hours.

FLIERS WANT MARK "THAT WILL STAND"
ST. LOUIS, July 24 (AP).—Pointing their "St. Louis Robin" toward an endurance flight record "that will stand" Dale (Red) Jackson, and Forrest O'Brien, who yesterday broke the world record for sustained flight, continued their conquest of the air today, flying leisurely over Lambert-St. Louis field.

As they began their twelfth day aloft, the fliers ordered 70 gallons of gasoline and some oil and gave every indication of remaining up at least another day, although Jackson said in a note that some of the cylinders in their stricken Challenger motor "act like they had the toothache."

Express Appreciation
They expressed their appreciation of the socialism given them last night by a throng of 50,000 persons on the field in these words:

"We, pilots of the St. Louis Robin, wish to thank the people of St. Louis and the surrounding country from the bottom of our hearts for the kindness and interest taken in our flight so far. We have not quit, but are still trying to put the record where it will stand in honor of St. Louis for some time."

Can't Hear Engine
"How does the engine sound down there?" Jackson asked the ground crew. "I can't tell any more. I've heard it so long. We sleep by it, eat by it, wake up by it, and do everything by it, around it and behind it. When we are through up here we will need a motor at home to sleep by."

Watchers on the ground the sound of the engine has never varied, and the fliers demonstrated they had plenty of power by gliding to about 300 feet over the field in dropping this morning's note and then climbing back up to 3,000 feet in a brief period.

Gil Offers Ranch To Returning Mexicans

MEXICO CITY, July 24 (AP).—President Portes Gil has agreed to place a large ranch in the state of Tamaulipas at the disposal of Mexican families returning from Texas to be divided among them and paid for in easy installments.

The committee sent by Mexicans in Texas to seek such government aid, however, stated that only a few families would be brought back to the United States to take advantage of the offer at an early date, inasmuch as most of the Mexicans living on the other side of the Rio Grande needed some time to dispose of their holdings.

SHIPS SEIZED BY RUSSIANS IN RAIL ROW

SIX CHINESE VESSELS AND BARGE TAKEN; TAKE PASSENGERS
(By Associated Press)
HARBIN, Manchuria, July 24.—Chinese authorities today declared Russian troops along the Amur river had seized six Chinese vessels and one large barge laden with merchandise, explaining details of the statement issued by the northeastern provincial governments of China, at Mukden.

Seizure of freight cars by the Russians which is also mentioned in the statement, was said to relate to Chinese Eastern Railway cars now held on the Usuri Railway in Siberia.

Cars Detained
These cars were detained by the Russians who forewarned the severance of relations between Russia and China and did not deliver the cars to the Chinese Eastern at Pograni-chaya.

Telegrams from frontier points said all cargo was confiscated on these ships and the passengers held, but it was not made clear whether the vessels were on the Russian side of the river or the Chinese side when seized.

According to information received by Chinese authorities, the Russians at Blagoveshchensk have stated the Chinese vessels in the Amur were seized in reprisal for the Chinese action in taking control of the Chinese Eastern Railway.

The Russians said the passengers would be released in time.

CAR STRIKE IS UNSETTLED

PRINCIPALS STUBBORN IN STAND; GENERAL WALK-OUT KILLED
(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, July 24.—With the hope of a compromise virtually abandoned, the street car strike settled down today into an endurance contest between the New Orleans Public Service, Inc. and the International Carmen's Union.

The two principals held stubborn positions, the company refusing to consider any union shop proposals and the union refusing to discuss any proposition that carried the open shop policy.

At a mass meeting last night of all organized labor, the workers voted against a general sympathetic strike but adopted resolutions requesting Governor Huey P. Long to call the legislature into special session to enact laws permitting the city of New Orleans to take over and operate all public utilities now owned by Public Service.

Three Succumb To Detroit Heat Wave

DETROIT, July 24 (AP).—Heat claimed the lives of three Detroit men yesterday and caused the protraction of several others as the mercury climbed to a peak of 91 at 4 p. m.

The dead are: Garfield Caesar, 43; Earl Bentley, 32, and Anthony Dulittle, 30.

FIGHT PREVENTED

AUSTIN, July 24 (AP).—Intervenor prevented a fistfight between James Shaw, banking commissioner, and W. Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer following a meeting of the state banking board today.

Shaw struck Hatcher once after Hatcher had invited Shaw outside to settle a difference between them, spectators said.

ENGLAND TO HALT WORK ON CRUISERS

MacDONALD TELLS OF PLAN TO SUSPEND CONSTRUCTION
(By Associated Press)
LONDON, July 24.—Prime Minister Ramsey MacDonald announced in the House of Commons today the British government had decided to suspend work on the cruisers Surrey and Northumberland, to cancel the building of the Submarine Depot Ship Maidstone, to cancel two contracts for submarines and to slow down dockyard work and other naval construction.

MacDonald said the British naval construction program of 1929-30 would be considered further before any more commitments are entered into.

Policy Being Developed

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ROTZKY IS STILL LOYAL TO RED ARMY

FORMER WAR LEADER IS STILL BOLSHEVIST; BLAMES REGIME

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 24.—Loyal to the creed of bolshevism, even though in exile, Leon Trotsky, former war leader of the Red army, today declared the "opposition" party in the U. S. S. R. which opposes the present Stalin regime, will in case of a Russo-Chinese war stand firm for the revolutionary principles which prompted the revolution of 1917 and resulted in the downfall of the Kerensky government.

Abolishing the Soviet government of all blame as an aggressor, Trotsky was careful to state that his opinion was expressed only as a private individual.

New Regime Responsible
The conduct of the new national government at Nanking which is responsible Trotsky said, by the fact that this government, which arose from the defeat of the Chinese laborers and peasant revolutionaries, feels its weakness before the forces against which the Chinese revolution was directed.

These forces, Trotsky declared, are British and Japanese imperialism, and nationalist China felt obliged to seek to strengthen its authority by making an adventurous gesture in the face of neighboring country.

War Not Imminent
"I do not believe war is imminent, because the government does not want war, and the Chinese government is unable to wage it," said Trotsky.

Trotsky insisted that America's intervention with the Kellogg pact seemed "unconvincing," because, he said, the United States has not yet recognized the Soviet government and therefore has no foundation for impartiality in the conflict.

Ratification Of Debt Plan Certain
PARIS, July 24 (AP)—After a day of talk about the debt plan in group meetings, committees, and corridors of the senate, it appeared certain last night the upper house would ratify the Mellon-Berneger debt accord by a great majority.

The chamber of deputies approved the accord on Sunday by a margin of eight votes.

General debate on ratification begins in the senate today.

AUSTRALIAN'S FAMOUS PLANE GROOMED FOR ATLANTIC FLIGHT

SOUTHERN CROSS WILL TRY WESTWARD HOP TO U. S. SOON

LONDON, July 24 (AP)—The historic long distance monoplane Southern Cross is being made ready for another trans-oceanic venture.

Mechanics are overhauling the famous tri-motored plane for the latest projected flight of Capt. Charles Kingsford-Smith—a trans-Atlantic journey from England to the United States.

The Australian flier, who made a brilliant crossing of the Pacific a year ago and only recently completed a 12,000 mile journey from Australia to England, will decide upon a route for his England to America flight as soon as the Southern Cross is overhauled. His crew will include Capt. Charles T. P. Uim and two Americans, H. A. Litchfield and T. H. McWilliam.

Present plans indicate they will take the southern route over the Atlantic. If this course is selected they would leave the mainland at Dakar, Senegal, after a flight from England with a stop in Spain. Landing in South America they would then fly northward by easy stages to New York.

However, if they find they can lighten the weight of the Southern Cross so that it can take off with sufficient fuel for 45 hours flying, they might decide upon the northern route and a non-stop flight from Croydon to New York.

Rebuilt from two Fokker planes used by Sir Hubert Wilkins in his polar expedition, the Southern Cross has helped to make air history. It staged the first trail across the Pacific from Oakland, Calif., to Sydney, Australia, in 1928. This spring it was forced down in the wilds of northern Australia on Captain Kingsford-Smith's first attempt to fly to England. The plane was repaired and took off on the successful journey to England.

The Southern Cross has a wing spread of 72 feet and a cruising speed of 100 miles an hour. It is powered with three whirlingwind motors. It was built from the fuselage of a single motored Fokker and the wings and landing gear of the three motored Fokker used by Wilkins in Alaska in 1926.

The planes saw extensive service in the north and were shipped back after they were cracked up in 1927. After the planes were rebuilt, Captain Kingsford-Smith made two attempts to break the endurance record before setting out on the trans-Pacific flight.

Kansas Petroleum Producers Organize
WICHITA, Kas., July 24 (AP)—A Kansas branch of the American Independent Petroleum Producers association was formed here Tuesday at a conference of approximately 50 Kansas producers with Wirt E. Franklin, Ardmore, Okla., president of the National organization.

The conference was held primarily to organize Kansas producers in an effort for a tariff on crude oil.

TURTLE TAKES HELM
FRANKLIN, N. C. (AP)—Chief of Police Henry chased a runaway automobile, which was careening recklessly down the street and was somewhat mystified when he found it driverless. Looking further, he found a turtle had seated himself on the self-starter while its owner napped in a restaurant nearby, after a successful catch in Turtle pond.

A new scenic highway from Cumberland Gap to Pinnacle Mountain, running through Kentucky, Tennessee and Virginia, has been opened to traffic.

YOUTH NEAR DEATH After Gun Accident
GALVESTON, July 24 (AP)—Joe Saladino, 12, was in a critical condition last night from gunshot wounds accidentally received at his home near here. The boy received the charge of a shotgun in his abdomen and his chances for recovery were said to be slight. Reports were that the boy was playing with the shotgun and dropped it, causing it to discharge.

MERSINE, Turkey (AP)—Unearthed by archaeologists and viewed only by occasional travelers, are some 20,000 marble sarcophagi in a region north of this Anatolian town. They are relics of the time when this section constituted the Cilicia of the Romans.

Had the merchants of this city foreseen such an exhibition on the part of the local club, the team management could never have raised a time to defray the expenses of the trip. Quittaque would have been a tough assignment for the Hubbers if they had been able to muster their full strength but as it stands the outcome of the fray is almost certain.

Continued delay on the part of those in charge of the club first caused the team to lose the services of Lefty Hamahl. The elongated southern's called almost a week before he agreed to play with Quittaque. An eleven hour decision to enter the tournament found members of the Hubber nine scattered far and near. The team, strong on throwing Alex McColl at Wellington on Monday, but the big right hander had not been given notice far enough in advance to leave in business.

Demoralized because of the absence of several main cogs in their hurling line, the Hubbers bowed the ball around like a bunch of school boys in Monday's encounter behind the effective hurling of their borrowed left hander.

ONE-ARMED PAPER HANGER SHADED BY MODERN AMBIDETTROUS AIR COURIERS

By W. W. CHAPLIN
Associated Press Staff Writer
NEW YORK, July 24.—The transcontinental air mail lines, three of which are now in operation, besides marking an epoch in the history of transportation may do something toward enriching the language with a few similes and such.

It may become commonplace, for instance, to speak of a man of many duties as being "as busy as a transcontinental plane courier."

Working Way Up
These couriers—there is one on each plane—are combination conductors, porters, waiters, newsboys, counselors and guides. They are young fellows of education and fine upbringing who are starting at the bottom and working their way up, which ought to be easy for them, as they go up a long way from the bottom, as represented by the ground, four to six times a day.

The couriers see that the passengers' baggage is stowed away, big pieces in the wing and small ones in the overhead racks; hand out newspapers and magazines; put up the individual tables, set them, and serve lunch; collect tickets; point out spots of interest in the scenery; distribute cotton for the travelers' ears; and on occasion offer their ministrations to those who find the currents of the air as disturbing as the billows of the deep.

Many Problems
There also are plenty of problems not on the schedule that must be met as encountered. On the recently completed inaugural journey of the transcontinental air transport the plane-train line with which Col. Charles A. Lindbergh is connected, a courier who is the son of a railroad vice president discovered that the gilded aluminum cups in which he apparently was expected to serve coffee, had absolutely no bottoms at all.

It was noticed puzzling over the phenomenon by a passenger who had learned resourcefulness by such things as running a flying school and crossing the Atlantic in a dory and by a reporter who had been here and there, and the three went into consultation.

Problem Solved
As the plane whirled along 3,000 feet over the painted desert of the southwest they pondered the complexities of modern life and the passengers gave it up, declining even to try to drink coffee out of a cup without a bottom. Then the courier discovered that his lunch kit also

contained china cups, which fitted neatly inside the gilded ones, and the problem was solved.

At Kansas City, on the way eastward, a herd of very lively and inquisitive flies stowed away on the plane, announcing their presence when the ship was on its way to St. Louis. The windows were opened and throughout the two hour journey, the courier, the son of a captain in the navy, stalked up and down the aisle lunging at flies with a folded magazine. His attack was so remorseless that most of the flies decided to walk home; the others being swept out by the courier at St. Louis.

And so it goes with the couriers, who thus presumably gain experience and an ability to meet emergencies which will make them in all good time, officials of the line.

PIONEER HALE COUNTY FARMER FINDS WHEAT PASTURING TO BE PROFITABLE

(Special to The Journal)

PLAINVIEW, July 24.—Selling wheat pasture at three dollars per acre a month and making more wheat on the dairy cow pastured land than on any other similar sized tract of his large wheat land operations, L. M. Faulkner, Plainview, pioneer Hale county farmer and land owner, is unique in his farm operations.

M. Faulkner employs a man to look after his farm near Kress. Last winter he pastured twenty-seven to thirty head of dairy animals on the wheat land and delivered three cans of cream per day to the railway station at Kress for shipment. This pastured land made thirty bushels of wheat per acre.

Mr. Faulkner figures that the wheat pasture is worth three dollars per acre per month as dairy cow pasture.

Here in the days when the White Face was the mainstay of the land owner, Mr. Faulkner had adapted

his land operations to the changed conditions and there is no more enthusiastic advocate of the dairy cow for the Plains farm than he.

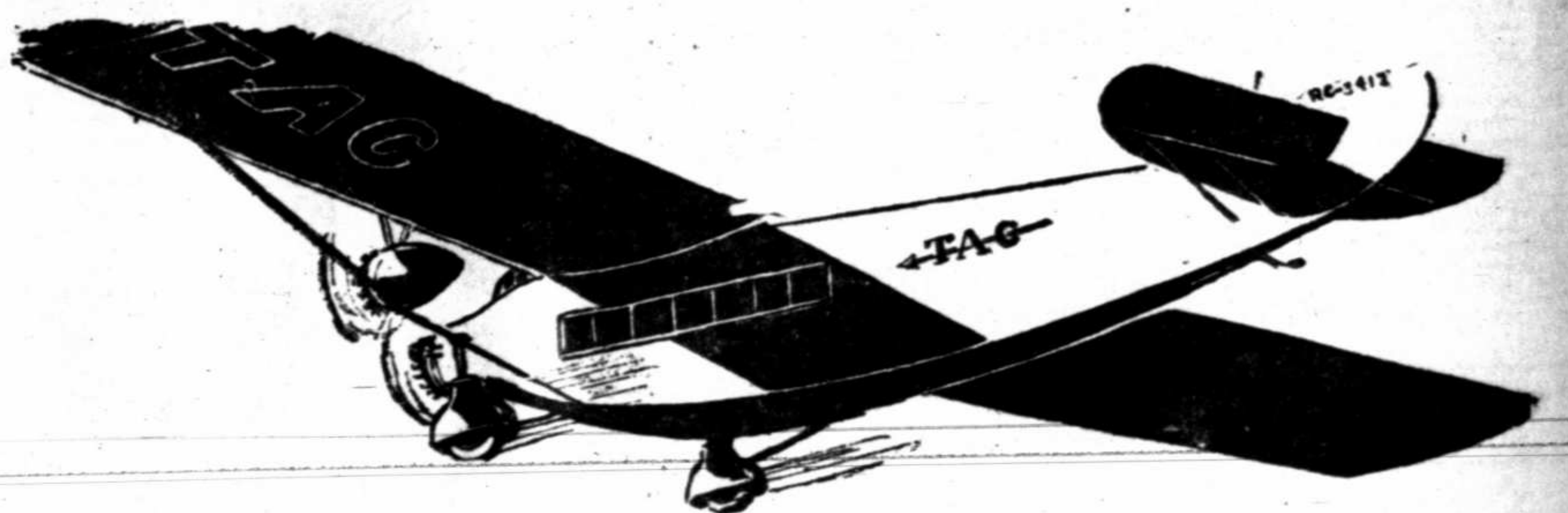
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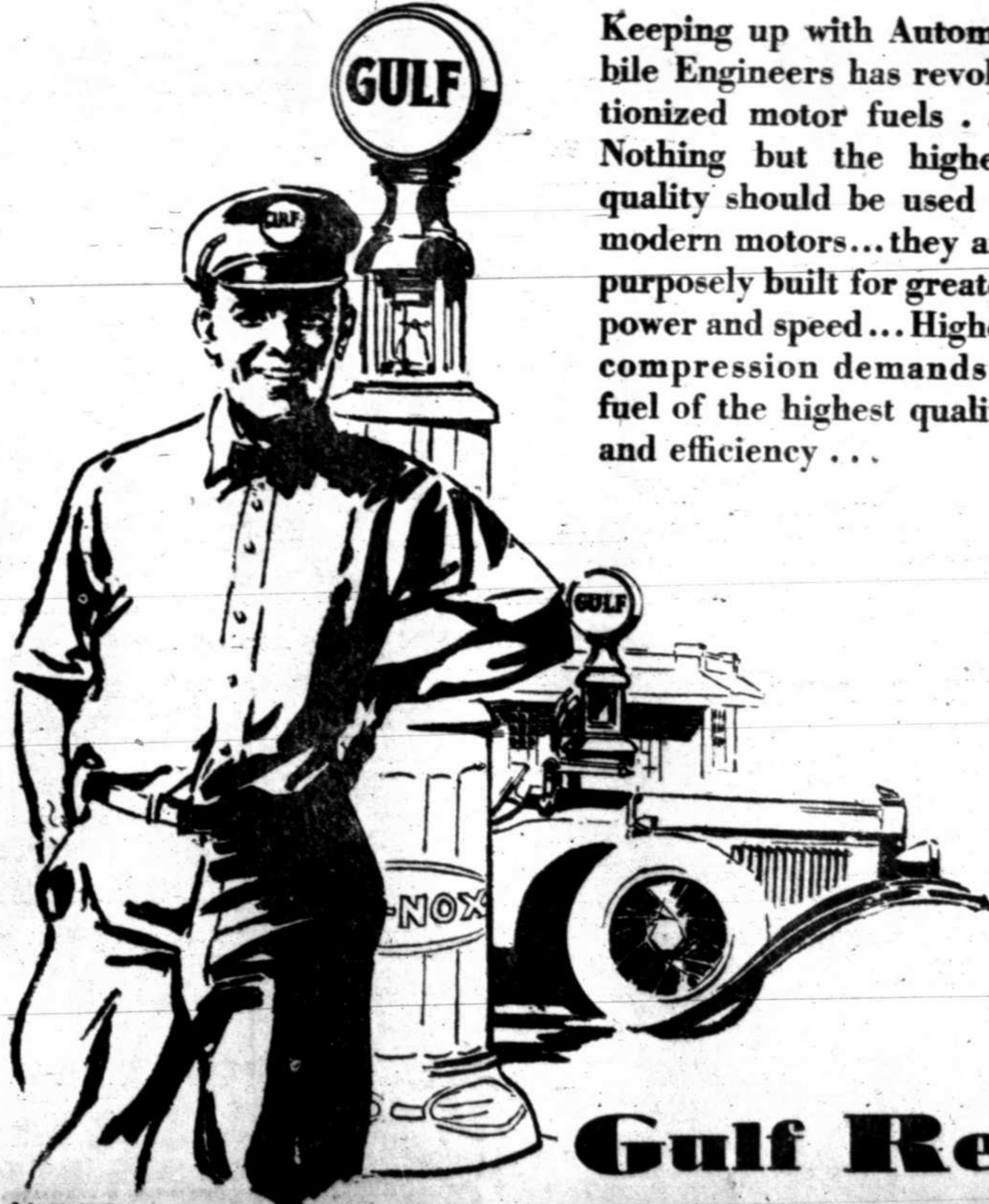

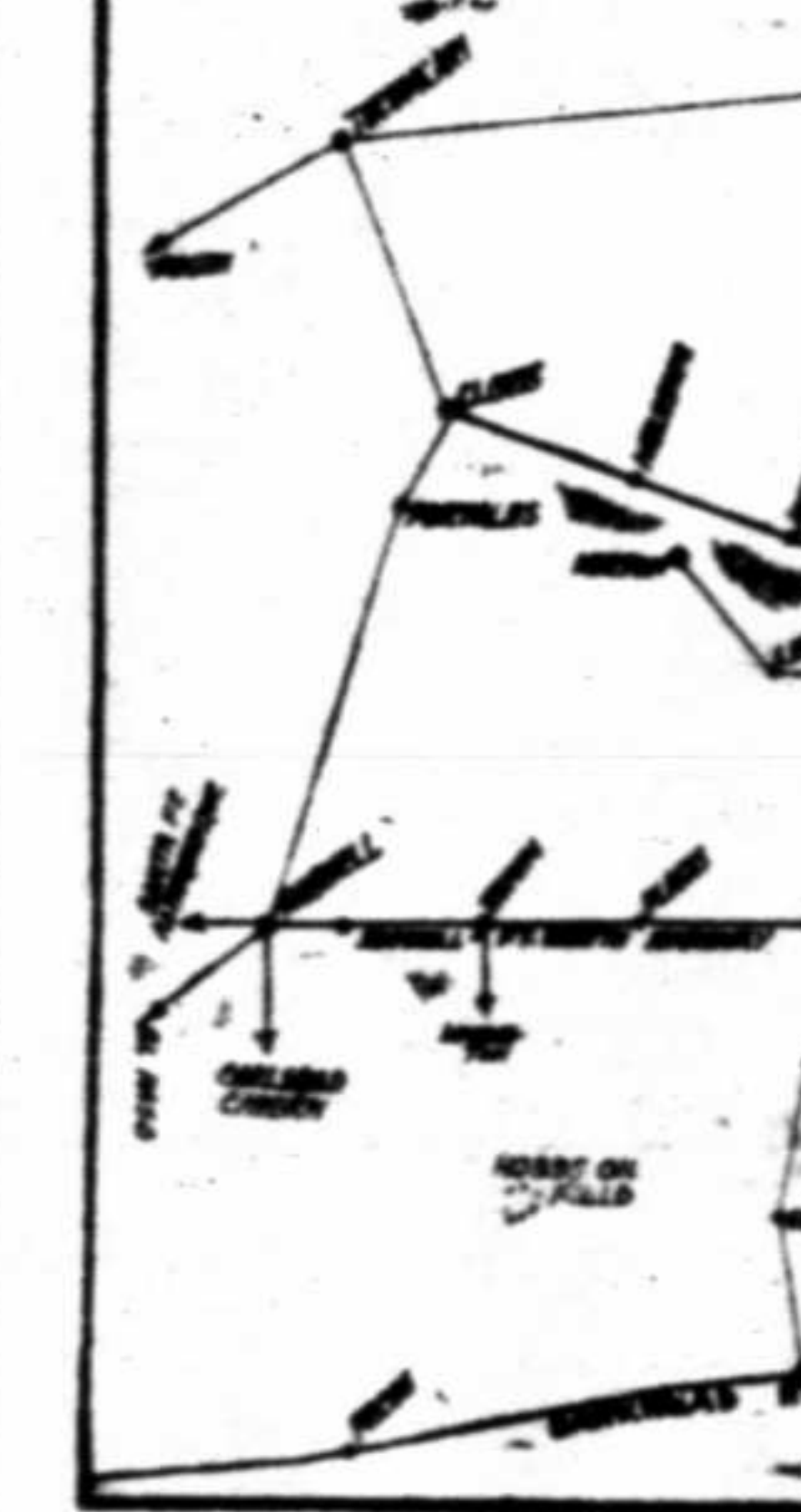

Vernon Martin, teacher of vocational agriculture in O'Donnell schools, is shaping plans for the annual community fair to be held September 20 and 21. The fair in that city last year reflected a splendid agricultural region, and Mr. Martin is planning to have bigger and better exhibits this year.

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"It is well known that in the midst of multifarious concerns which the formation of a new government entailed and the specially pressing and complicated nature of our task, conversations have been actively carried on between the United States and ourselves for the purpose of opening the way for agreement on naval matters which hitherto have defied settlement.

Agreements Coincided
"By happy coincidence our assumption of office corresponded in time with the arrival in this country of the new American Ambassador, General Daves, who came to this country charged by the President of the United States with a mission to prepare the ground for an international agreement for rearmaments."

The Prime Minister said:
"I am now in a position to make a statement as to the immediate intentions of the government regarding the naval building program."

"The government's general position is that the defense of the country must be devised with two main considerations in view.

"First, the chances of defenses having to be used, and then the efficiency and economy shown in their magnitude and character.

"The government has kept in view the changes in policy and in the problem of national security as affected by the peace pact if that pact is to be made an effective influence in international relations."

In an effort to satiate the local demand for American movies, Australia has appointed a commission to see what can be done to establish the film industry there.

ties to the treaty.

Conveyed Appreciation
Delivering a short address, Mr. Hoover asked the diplomats to convey to their governments the appreciation of the United States that "through their cordial collaboration act so auspicious for the future happiness of mankind" had been brought to its consummation.

"I dare predict," he said, "that the influence of the treaty for the renunciation of war will be felt in a large proportion of all future international acts. The magnificent opportunity and the compelling duty now open to us should spur us on to the fulfillment of every opportunity that is calculated to implement this treaty and so extend the policy it so nobly sets forth."

Glad to Pay Tribute
Mr. Hoover declared he was glad of an opportunity to pay "merited tribute to the two statesmen whose names the world has properly adopted in its designation of this treaty."

To Aristide Briand, French foreign minister, the president said, was due the inception of the pact and much of the success of the negotiations which followed, while to former Secretary Kellogg was due the credit for expanding the treaty into a pact of world wide significance.

The chief executive also took occasion to felicitate former President Coolidge for his part in the successful negotiation of the treaty and to thank Chairman Borah, the Senate's foreign relations committee and Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking democratic member, for their efforts in behalf of the pact at the time it was pending in the senate.

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In an effort to satiate the local demand for American movies, Australia has appointed a commission to see what can be done to establish the film industry there.
