**WSCS Meets For Program & Luncheon**

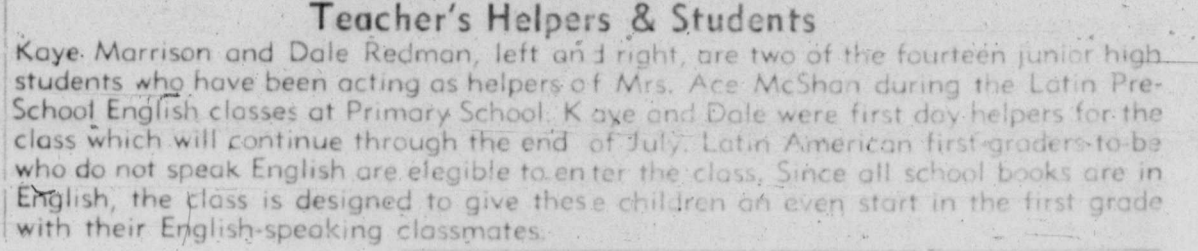

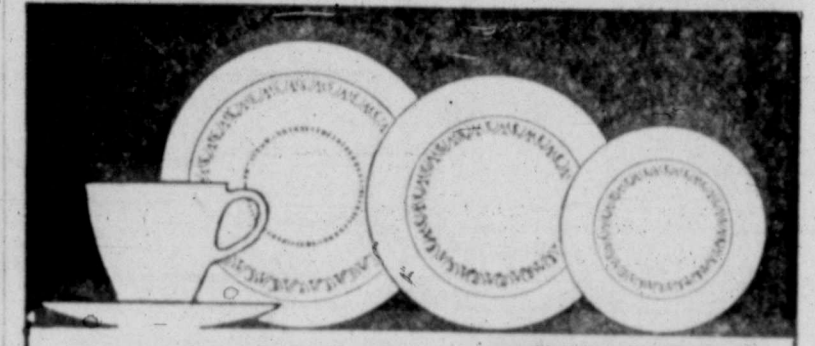
**Judy Root Named To Dean's List**

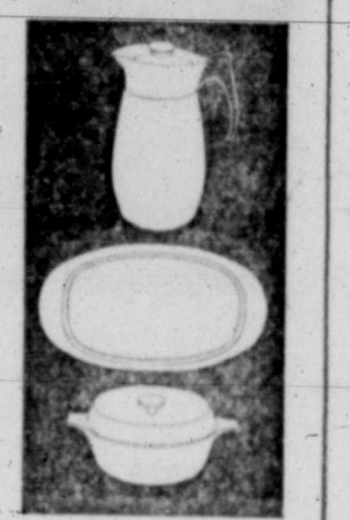
**Baby Daughter Born To Jay Thielens**

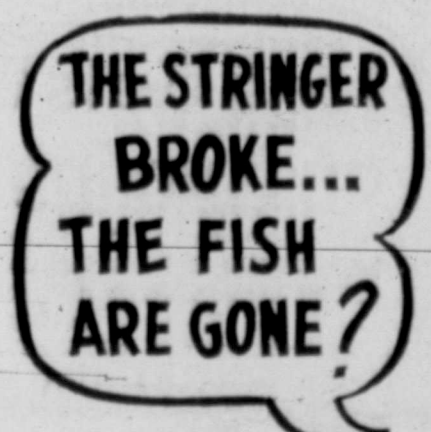
**CLASS AT JUNIOR HIGH**

**Self-Improvement Studied By Teens**

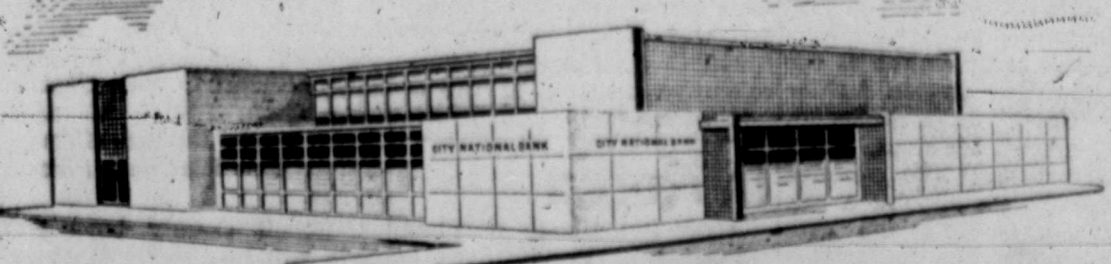

all over him when hull drove up. Daniels was dead in the pickup.  
The victim's father-in-law and daughter, both unhurt, went to Hull's car.  
"Is he dead?" asked the father-in-law.  
And the little girl repeated the question.  
Told there was no chance for life, the girl and her grand father, got in Hull's car and rode to the Daniels home.

Hull then rushed to Rockwell Bros. in downtown Colorado City where Mrs. Daniels, wife of the victim, is an employee.

Mrs. Daniels, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Hull, went to the death scene for a moment, sobbing as she viewed the tragedy. Then she was taken to her home by the Hulls.

Fire and police officials inspected the explosion area, attempting to determine exactly how the accident happened.

It was believed that it centered around the metal rack in the pickup where Daniels was using the acetylene torch.

Ross, who was hampered by wartime wounds like a shotgun blast, said he was eight feet away from the pickup when the explosion roared.

Metal, apparently from the rack and holder on the pickup, ripped through the metal building and buried hundreds of yards away.

A one-inch square metal struck Jay Adams Chevrolet more than two-tenths of a mile west on E. Highway.

Metal pierced the front of the former Ranch House cafe on E. Highway 300 yards north of the blast, and struck Kent Oil Service Station on E. Highway 80.

A chunk of concrete was knocked out of the foundation of a permit cottage at Lone Wolf Campground, south of the blast, where also a broom handle was cut apart by its in metal.

Two sections of the building roof, just above the pickup, were torn out. More than 100 holes were cut in the building's metal sides and roof.

Metal collected at the blast scene probably will be sent to out-of-town laboratory to determine the type of explosion.

J. H. Gueller, Colorado City Electric owner, who was not at his business when blast happened, inspected the scene a few minutes later and said acetylene gas containers were still intact.

But part of the metal on the rack in the pickup was blown out, indicating force of explosion may have come from that area, possibly something inside the rack or holder.

Jay Adams was at his Chevrolet firm when the blast sounded. Some of his employees, after phoning ambulance and police, were among the first at the scene.

"It was loud," said Adams, "louder than a sonic boom."  
"It shook our building... a heavy jar."

"Gray and brown smoke rose up from the explosion where the building just seemed like it expanded out."

Daniels was a material man and work order clerk for Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative Inc., having begun work there Aug. 1, 1960.

Born June 23, 1924, in De Leon, Daniels moved to Colorado City four years ago. He was a Mason and a member of the Presbyterian Church.

His marriage to Miss Dorothy Auvenshine took place in Weatherford, Feb. 17, 1945.

Surviving are his wife, Dorothy; his daughter, Sharon; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Auvenshine, all of the 974 East 15th St. address, Colorado City.

His father, A. C. Daniels of Stephenville; one sister, Mrs. Beth Bolt of Ft. Worth; two brothers, Clyde Daniels of Ft. Worth and Grady Daniels of Stephenville, also survive.

Funeral arrangements were

pending late Saturday. Kiker & Son Funeral Home will be in charge.

Prayer service preceded the regular meeting. It was directed by Mrs. Wilfred Fox.

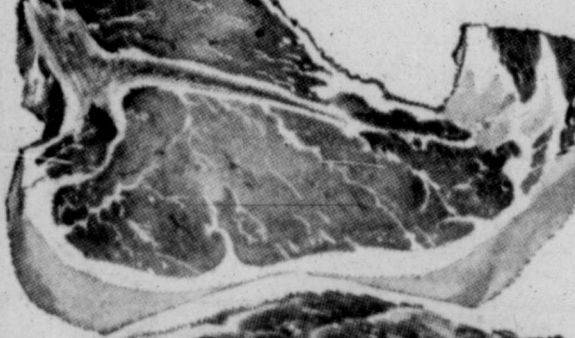
