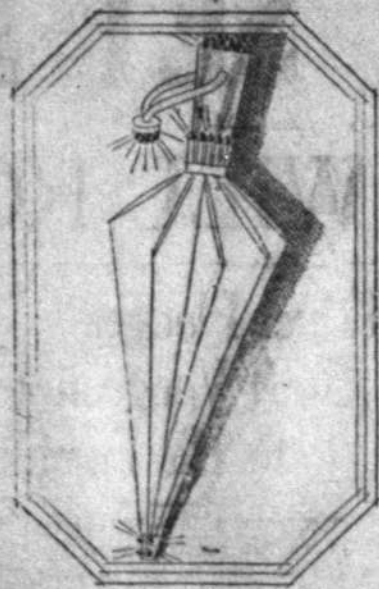

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Baked pears, cereal, thin cream, scrambled eggs with bacon, crisp whole wheat toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Scalloped rice and mushrooms, hearts of lettuce with French dressing, graham bread, baked apple with date and nut meringue, milk, tea.

DINNER—Broiled sirloin steak, baked sweet potatoes, creamed onions, celery and apple salad, rye bread, orange cream pudding, milk, coffee. Whether we gather mushrooms ourselves or purchase them from the ways regard them as a luxury and delicacy. Their distinctive flavor greatly enhances a dish which is otherwise bland and uninteresting. The combination dish in the luncheon menu is an example of such a concoction.

Scalloped Rice and Mushrooms—One half pound mushrooms, 5 tablespoons butter, 2 1-2 tablespoons flour, 2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, 1-2 cup rice.

Wash rice through several waters and let stand in cold water to cover for one hour. Drain and add slowly to 2 quarts of rapidly boiling water. The boiling should not stop while adding the rice. Boil hard for 20 minutes. Do not try to cover the sauce pan. Pour into a colander and pour several quarts of boiling water through the rice. Then rinse with cold water and drain. Peel mushrooms, remove stems in small pieces and simmer three minutes in 3 tablespoons butter. Melt remaining 2 tablespoons butter in a sauce pan. Stir in flour and slowly add milk, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper and add cheese. When cheese is melted, add prepared rice and mushrooms. Mix lightly but thoroughly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake in a hot oven until top is brown. Serve in the baking dish. (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

Wherein a Rich Young Landlord Loses a Tenant and Gains a Wife

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—In the beginning Lillian Glascox paid rent to Harry Wardman. But now it is he who pays her rent—and her other expenses.

The love story of Washington's building wizard and his charming wife began—as his business career began—as a matter of building and renting an apartment.

Wardman was already a factor in the real estate world of Washington, owner of many houses and apartment buildings, well established building contractor and man about town, when pretty Lillian Glascox came with her mother to Washington from her home in Asheville, N. C., and took an apartment in one of his buildings.

"I showed her the place and thought to myself what a nice tenant she would make," he says. "After that, I used to find opportunity to present the rent bill myself and then to bring it back receipted after she had sent her check."

He Lost a Tenant
Business calls developed into social calls, and before long, Lillian had given notice to her landlord that she would not need the apartment any longer—for his home was to be hers. So Harry Wardman lost a tenant and gained a wife.

That was twenty years, more or less, ago. Today, they live in a great house on the grounds of the palatial Wardman Park Hotel, in which a great many high officials of the government live—to say nothing of the picturesque foreign personalities attached to the various diplomatic corps.

The son of poor English working people in the textile mills of Yorkshire, Harry Wardman had stowed away on a transatlantic liner, mingled with the passengers, evaded customs men at both ends and dropped out of the escarpment into New York, catties, on his feet.

He spent a wandering life for a few years, working at all trades, bumming his way to Denver and back to the World's Fair at Chicago in 1893.

But shortly after that he got a job in Philadelphia with a contractor, which determined his future career. He learned his trade from the ground up.

Later he went to Washington and began to take small contracts in his own right, working without capital, on close margins, but always with a small profit.

His business grew, he was able to assemble a crew of workmen, and in a few years was throwing up rows of houses that made Washington gasp. At length he had to his credit the building of nearly 5000 houses and 500 apartment buildings.

he landed in New York. Mrs. Wardman prefers her own home to any hotel. She is extremely interested in domestic affairs, but she likes club work and politics too. She is now the Republican National Committee woman from the District of Columbia.

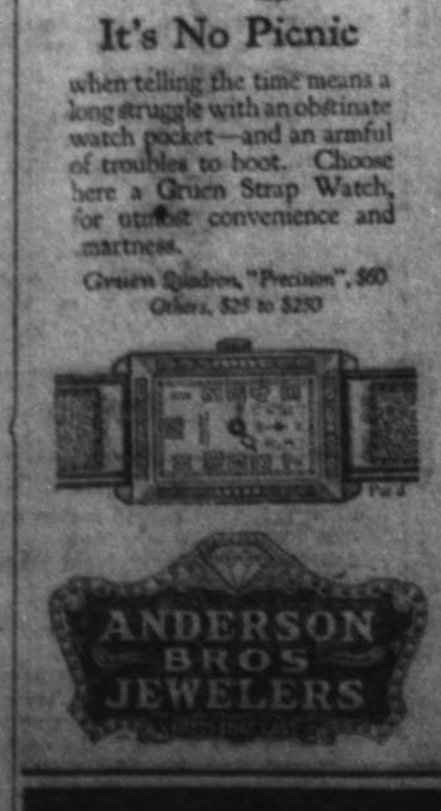
TO BOOST PAVING

THE WORLD TRUST

Consumers are always under the necessity

of fighting efforts of those marketing needed commodities who seek by artificial control to increase profits at the expense of the buyers. Trust and monopolies have been known and advertised in these United States, sometimes they have been "busted" by the Government, but, more often, these trading alliances of competitors have resulted in higher prices and fatter dividends. The vision has been extended in late years. No longer is national control of a product sufficient but world wide concert of action is the present aim. Some products, like coffee and rubber, have been successfully handled even on an international scale, because one great nation was able to regulate the trade. The next step was joint action between the various national trusts to prevent competition in each other's territory and the markets abroad. This has been taken. Steel rivals of Germany and France have entered into a formidable commercial pact, allocating business, regulating prices, and providing for joint aggressiveness against foreign competition. Outside of this combine, there remained other great producing groups, among them those in America. The copper producers have gone a step further however, and for the first time in history an international trust has been organized. The combination will consist of 18 American and 16 foreign producers, and will operate under the name of "Copper Exporters, Inc." By means of two committees, one in New York and the other in Brussels, a standard price will be established, tariff regulations in various countries will be disregarded, an approved form of contract enforced, the copper trade of the world divided upon an agreed basis, and copper will only be sold to buyers who have been recognized. Consumers will have to pay what the sellers want or go without.

The Anti-Trust Laws of the United States are avoided by clever advantages taken under an act authorizing co-operation in export trade. The public of the world faces a new era in "big business," which will now overlap national boundaries and embrace the world. Higher prices will result undoubtedly. The only advantage will be in the creation of mutual interests so large and powerful and so interested in peace and doing business that they may act as a deterrent of war. The removal of economic rivalry will tend in the same direction. This benefit, if it comes, will be helpful, but the public will pay for its welfare.

DRUGS AND THE DRUG HABIT

According to figures given in the daily papers, the drug menace is making alarming increase in America—especially in the form of heroin. In about 1910 the drug heroin appeared first in the practice of medicine, then in the field of exportation. Its rapid spread since then is shown by the fact that in 1917 the number of violations of the drug act was 1,060; in 1926, the number was 10,297. This increase tells a sad tale. From New York comes the statement that fifty per cent of those who appear in the police line-up every morning are drug addicts, and that there are 200,000 drug addicts in New York's underworld. Addicts indicate that heroin addiction is breaking out in the capitals of Europe and has reached the Orient. The whole world is involved, and the foundations of society are being shaken. Broadly speaking, these noxious drugs resolve themselves into two classes. One is cocaine, an alkaloid, that is, a vegetable principle that acts chemically like salts. It is obtained from the leaves of the coca plant which grows in South America and is much used as a local anesthetic in surgery and dentistry, but the consequences due to its misuse are terrible in the extreme. Opium is the second class. This is the dried juice of the poppy, and is extensively cultivated in India. In the mountainous regions of North India, the red and purple varieties are grown, and when in flowers, paint the hillsides in a blaze of gorgeous color. The white poppy is cultivated in the plains of Bengal, where the poppy fields are said to resemble green lakes, studded with white water lilies. It is a far cry from the poppy fields to the ends of Chinatown and the under worlds of American cities, in which white men appear to sound the lowest depths of moral depravity through its use. Laudanum, morphia, narcotine and chloradine, heroin and numerous other baneful drugs have opium as their base, and yet opium is said to be the most valuable remedy of the whole materia medica, and no doubt it is of the greatest service to mankind in dealing with the ills that the flesh is heir to. But it is a remedy that can easily become worse than the disease; therefore, unless taken strictly as the doctor prescribes, it should never be used.

One of the items in the Article of War to which all Salvation Army soldiers prior to enrollment is this: "I do here and now declare that I will abstain . . . from the habitual use of opium, laudanum, morphia, and all other baneful drugs except when in illness such drugs shall be ordered for me by a doctor." Reader, don't have anything to do with baneful drugs, but if you are a slave to the habit, don't despair; the Lion of the tribe of Judah can break every chain. No matter how weak morally or physically you may be thru the effects of the drug, God's grace will be sufficient to enable you to overcome the habit, and instead of being a dopey drug addict you can rejoice in the liberty of God. Those whom God sets free are free indeed.

Public Aid Needed to Save Scenic Gem

By C. E. HOPKINS

COVINGTON, Ky., Nov. 4.—The people of Kentucky are fighting to preserve their finest scenic asset—Cumberland Falls, but to prevent its destruction they need the moral support of the citizens of the entire nation.

The cause is one which should interest the whole country, for Cumberland Falls really is a national asset. It is the largest natural waterfall east of the Mississippi river. Located in a mountainous country of massive sandstones and exotic flora, the falls and its setting possess in marked degree that outstanding natural beauty which we usually associate with the national park areas.

Here, accessible to the large industrial centers of the populous middle west, the state of Kentucky wishes to establish a state park of over 2,000 acres for the enjoyment of this and future generations.

A subsidiary of the great power combine holds options on the land at Cumberland Falls, and as a matter of course, sees the situation differently. The Cumberland gorge at this point makes a great hairpin turn the falls being at the turn.

The hydro-electric company desires to dam the gorge above the falls, tunnel the mountain across the hairpin, and drop the water on turbines located

in a proposed power-house a couple of miles below the falls.

Cumberland Falls would become a bare shelf of rock.

Kentucky is not opposed to hydro-electric development in principle. The state has 12,000 miles of rivers. It is threatened and intersected by gorges, all of which are prospective sites for hydro-electric plants.

Not is Kentucky asking something for nothing. The money is at hand, according to Vance Frasier, Kentucky state park commissioner, to pay the great power combine in full for the options which it holds on the lands around the falls.

Up to Federal Body
The decision, however, rests with the federal power commission at Washington. This commission is composed of the secretary of the interior, the secretary of war and the secretary of agriculture, but its decisions are usually based on the recommendations of the executive secretary.

The secretary is interested in encouraging hydro-electric development and will make no exception of the Cumberland Falls project unless public opinion forbids.

If protests in sufficient number reach the desk of D. C. Merrill, executive secretary, federal power commission, Washington, D. C., the falls will be spared; otherwise Kentucky will be compelled to sell its birthright for a mess of pottage.

WASHINGTON NOTES

OCEAN TRAFFIC
Federal bonds to defray the costs of a ship building program and the proceeds therefrom loaned to the builders is necessary if the United States is to retain its trade-carrying industry according to General Dalton, president of the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

He declares that nations "have declined in their power and influence in the proportion in which their sea power has declined," and all our commercial life is allowed to go out of business. "It is inevitable that by loss of our prosperity and our influence as a world power, we advocate five necessities.

(1) Revisions of the Merchant Marine Act so that we should not remain the United States government intends to perpetuate American marine.

(2) A decision as to what world trade routes will be maintained and tonnage and the type of vessels required thereon.

(3) A large building program by private shipbuilders in cooperation with the government. General Dalton pointed out that the Federal government has contributed \$24,000,000 towards building roads, which is five times that expended on the merchant marine.

(4) Arrangements by the federal government to finance the ship building program by lending to private owners over long periods, the necessary funds; and

(5) The establishment of a national school for training the American seaman.

WANT MOTORISTS TO QUIET DOWN

CLUB APPEALS TO DRIVERS TO CUT OUT NOISES NOT NEEDED

An appeal to motorists generally to aid in the elimination of needless noises and to take the necessary steps to keep their cars in good running order, has been made by W. W. Royalty, president of the South Plains Auto Club. While automobiles have brought innumerable blessings, Mr. Royalty points out, it has also brought innumerable noises that should be eliminated.

"Every motorist is compelled to use the horn on his car. It is vital bit of equipment," says Mr. Royalty. "However, there is an intelligent standard in this aspect of driving that every motorist can try to reach."

A movement has been launched by the American Automobile Association with which this club is affiliated, toward the elimination of needless noises by automobile owners and the arguments advanced are soundly based on facts. Certain classes of motorists entirely thoughtless of course, never find themselves in any sort of traffic predicament that their first thought is not for the horn button.

"When approaching a street intersection, regardless of the fact that a pedestrian has the right of way, they resort to the horn in a seeming attempt to blast the walker out of his legal rights."

"That is only one instance of this sort of careless driving. There are dozens of times when use of the horn is absolutely imperative. When passing another vehicle, one is legally compelled to give a warning. A warning is enough. There is nothing to be gained from pushing on the horn button until one has passed the vehicle ahead. Still, thousands of motorists do it. They are not satisfied with a mere warning."

"Rounding curves usually calls for the use of the horn. Here is another case when there is a reasonable limit to the use of it. A signal is a signal only so long as it does not become a nuisance to the driver. When the attention of a driver is attracted, after that, too often, it becomes a distinct nuisance."

"One of the most annoying noises is that created by the automobile who wants to attract the attention of someone in a building."

"Use the horn, but use it intelligently."

WANT ORMISTON TOO ON TRIAL

DEFINITE MOVES MADE TO PUT RADIO MAN AS DEFENDANT

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Nov. 4. (AP)—Definite moves by district attorneys' officers, to place Kenneth G. Ormiston, fugitive radio man, in the seat in the defendants' row likely to be vacated by Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Sieff, when Alvin Simple McPherson and her co-defendants go before the superior court for trial, were taken here today.

District Attorney Alva Keyes announced he would present the radio grand jury with transcripts of testimony taken at the evangelist's preliminary hearing on criminal conspiracy charges, and ask that body to return a true bill against the former Angeles Temple radio operator. If an indictment is voted, Keyes pointed out, Ormiston can be placed on trial along with the other defendants, provided he has been taken into custody.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Wiseman, chief accuser of the pastor and co-defendant was understood to have decided that before the trial begins in the higher court she would go before the court, plead guilty and ask for leniency. Mrs. Wiseman confessed that she perpetrated the Carmel hoax of the evangelist's disappearance, but maintained that she was employed by Mrs. McPherson to manufacture the false evidence. In case she carries out her plans, she would appear at the trial only in the character of the state's star witness.

With the trial of Mrs. McPherson and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, on charges of conspiracy to defraud, preparing false evidence and subornation of perjury less than 60 days away, Keyes launched a new move today to unearth new evidence to support his charge that the evangelist's kidnapping story was false in every respect and that she left her in Ormiston's company, instead of in the hands of abductors.

KIWANIS HEAR MUSICAL PROGRAM

FIVE NOW DEAD OF TOMBS BATTLE

ANOTHER DIES AFTER FATAL FIGHT TO ESCAPE N. Y. PRISON

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The death list stood at five tonight as a result of the battle in the yard of old Tombs prison when three notorious gunmen sought to blast their way to freedom with smuggled fire arms, regardless of the cost of human life.

All the gunmen had paid the great penalty for their rash daring, the prison warden and a prison keeper had given their lives in the brave pursuit of their duty, another keeper was seriously wounded in a hospital and a bystander was recovering from a bullet wound through the hand.

Two men were held by police; one of them having admitted that he helped to plan the attempt to break out of the prison.

The famous old prison was under heavy guard by special patrols of police, armed against any contingency, extra police were sent to the Bronx county jail, said to be over crowded, plans considered for increasing the guard at other city prisons, and Governor Miller, fearful lest the spirit of mutiny should spread of the riot circled, ordered state troopers on special duty at Sing Sing prison at Ossining.

The three gunmen whose desperate attempt to attain liberty failed were: Oliver Glantz, alias Berg, alias Burke, a Chicago gangster waiting trial for participation in a diamond robbery and Hyman Anshutz and Michael Riedy McKenna, both awaiting trial for murders committed during robberies.

The warden, Peter Mallon, shot through his body below the heart, died shortly after being taken to the hospital. The keeper, Jeremiah Murphy, was killed when the gangsters rushed his sentry box in the prison yard, after being dislodged from their shelter behind a wall of pile of boxes, summoned by a red call, laid down a barrage on the prison yard with pistols, rifles and sub-machine guns.

Instead of taking the prison gate key from Murphy's pocket, which even then might have brought success to their plan, the gunmen ran back to the protection of a curving wall and continued their defiant battle.

At last their ammunition dwindled, police saw their advantage and rushed into the yard, and the prisoners used their last bullets on themselves, preferring death at their own hands to recapture. Anshutz and Glantz died where they fell, but McKenna lived on until this evening. The three prisoners had been released from their cells on parole of Illinois, to visit the prison physician.

During the shooting, Daniel O'Connor, a keeper, was shot through the back, and J. Allen Steadwell, an insurance company clerk, who was watching the fray from the eighth story window of an office building, was shot through the hand.

DAILY MARKET

NEW ORLEANS COTTON
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 4. (AP)—The cotton market was a comparatively quiet affair today with prices fluctuating decidedly narrow. The general disposition was to allow matters to drift until after the government report.

Despite favorable cables prices opened 2 to 7 points down owing to the fall weather and during the early trading prices eased off further to levels 7 to 8 points below yesterday's close. There was a rally about the middle of the morning on reports that a settlement British coal strike was imminent. Two private crop estimates, one of 17,872,000 and the other of 17,300,000 were contributing causes, being smaller than the trade had been led to expect. Prices later lost all the gain and dropped to the early low, January making a new low point on a later report that the settlement of the coal strike was less prominent.

The close was a point or two above the lowest, showing net losses for the day of 7 to 10 points.

Soon after the opening December eased off to 12.25, January to 12.37 and March to 12.55, or 1 to 3 points under the previous close. The rally later in the morning on coal strike news advanced December to 12.37, January to 12.44 and March to 12.65, or about parallel with the previous close.

This rally was later lost during the afternoon and prices dropped back to the earlier low, January actually making a new low at 12.25, December a new low at 12.23 and March at 12.53. Exports for the day totalled 41,049 bales.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (AP)—Cotton followed an opening decline in the cotton market today, but they were not fully maintained after selling up from 12.25 to 12.40. January closed steady at net declines of 7 to 12 points.

The opening was easy at a decline of 3 to 4 cents, active positions showing net losses of 4 to 12 points in the early trading under overnight selling orders from the south, combined with commission house liquidation and local selling promoted by relatively easy cable from Liverpool.

December sold off to 12.25 and March to 12.57, but initial offerings seemed to be readily absorbed at these figures with trade buying considerably in evidence. This steadied the market and there were mid-day rallies on covering, but the volume of business tapered off. After selling up to 12.34 for December and 12.68 for March, prices eased off again in the last half hour. The close showed reactions of 4 to 10 points from the peak.

Two more private crop reports were published, one placing the indicated yield at 17,872,000 bales, while the other made the crop indication 17,300,000, and estimated gins prior to November 4 at 11,100,000 bales. Both these reports showed an increase over the last previous reports of the same authorities, and for that reason, were commented upon as in line with the exceptions of increased figures from the government next Monday. They had no apparent effect on the market, however, and the comparatively small volume of business was considered by some business as indicating that small accounts have been evaded up, with traders waiting for next week's official report.

Stringent cables said hedge selling in Liverpool had been absorbed by trade calling and covering and reported a broadening demand for cotton cloths, from India.

Exports today 41,049 bales, making 2,784,171 on for this season. Port receipts 71,604. U. S. port stocks 2,382,525.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, Nov. 4. (AP)—Wheat, scored a late advance in price today, helped by reports that the British coal strike is likely to be settled within two weeks. DIVERSIFICATION TO BE DISCUSSED

FIFTH CONSERVATION MEET AT BROWNWOOD NEXT MONDAY

STAMFORD, Nov. 4.—Important discussions will come up before the fifth annual meeting of the Texas conservation to be held in Brownwood November 8, according to Manager Homer D. Wade, of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, secretary of the association. One of the outstanding discussions will be on the utilization of irrigation and diversified farming, led by D. W. Ross, San Antonio, expert irrigationist of the southwest.

The second important discussion will be on needed legislation for the conservation and irrigation led by irrigation lawyers of Texas. One object of the Brownwood meeting is to divide upon legislation necessary to conform into the Texas supreme court, defining riparian rights. Another feature of the meeting will be the annual address of president J. A. Kemp, recently returned from a tour of Europe, where he gave special study to the question of irrigation. Results of his study will be told to conservation delegates.

Among those who will be present for the convention, are members of the board of water engineers, state reclamation officers, representatives of the U. S. geological survey, and other state officers. Regional organizations, composed of the Trinity River conservation association and the Brazos river association will also be in attendance.

The meeting will be held at the soldiers' and sailors' memorial hall and is attracting much attention and interest among the Brownwood people who are on the eve of forming a water improvement district here. It is thought that the meeting of the Texas conservation association in Brownwood at this time will give a decided impetus to the movement.

BUSINESS SURVEY BY C. OF C. SHOWS IMPROVEMENTS ON LAST YEAR

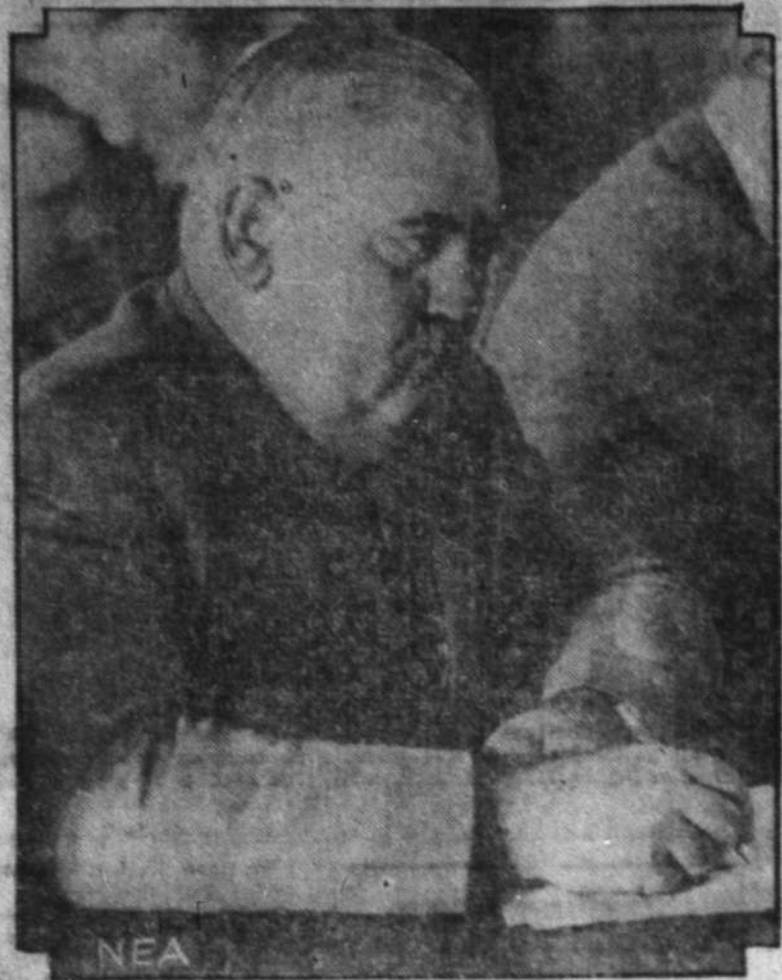

FEDERAL JUDGE ENGLISH, WHO WAS SLATED TO FACE IMPEACHMENT TRIAL IN SIX DAYS RESIGNS; CHARGES KILLED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—George W. English, federal judge for the eastern district of Illinois, resigned today, six days before he was to have appeared before the senate for trial on charges of usurpation of power and other high misdemeanors.

Immediately afterward, members of the house appointed to prosecute the case, agreed to recommend that the impeachment proceedings against him be dropped. They will appear before the senate, called to meet at a court next Wednesday, and ask that nothing be done until the recommendation can be placed before the full membership of the house in December. At that time steps to bring to an official end the long drawn out battle are expected to be taken.

Judge English's resignation was handed in at the white house by Edward D. Kramer, of East St. Louis, one of his counsel, and was accepted immediately. The text was not made public here, but as given out in St. Louis, it said the judge had become convinced that notwithstanding the issues, his usefulness on the bench had been impaired by the proceedings instituted against him.

Senate to Meet

While precedents were plentiful for an impeachment proceeding, regardless of the resignation, party all authorities agreed that the next step would be for the senate to meet and called, receive a witness outlining the charges before it, and then to accept the prosecutor's recommendation and adjourn.

The resignation of Judge English was delivered in the presence of Attorney General Sargent and two of the house prosecutors. Representatives Michigan, republican, Michigan and Sumners, democratic, Texas. Dr. J. L. Boyson, associate professor of Germanic languages, is already looking for an instructor qualified to teach both German and Czech. More than the number required to satisfy the condition set forth by the University to the effect that there must be at least fifteen students desiring to take a course before it will be introduced, have been secured by the club. If Dr. Boyson is successful, the course will probably be introduced at the beginning of the year.

Membership in the club is limited to Czechs and Czech speaking peoples. According to the preamble to its constitution, the club was organized "for the purpose of promoting Czech interest, for the fostering of Czech pride in intellectual pursuits, and for the promotion of fellowship among its members." Organized several years ago, the Czech club was active for several seasons and then became inactive. Last year it was reorganized.

NEED TEACHERS IN JUNIOR COLLEGES

SCHOOLS CALL ATTENTION TO LACK

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—With the number of junior colleges in Texas increasing each year, a genuine need has arisen for teachers trained especially for that type of an educational system, according to Dr. Frederick Eby, professor of education in the University of Texas. To meet this the University is offering for the first time this year, work in junior college organization. It is also the first course of the kind offered in the regular session of any American University, Dr. Eby said.

New junior colleges were opened this fall in Brownsville, Tyler, Ranger and Temple with cooperation from the University of Texas. The San Antonio Junior college, organized under the supervision of the University, started its school year under different management. A number of other cities have junior colleges operated in connection with their public school systems, and in addition to these, there are some 30 private junior colleges in the state, Dr. Eby stated. Each of these institutions employs from six to ten teachers who must have had teaching experience and a master's degree.

VAN ZANDT'S LETTERS LOANED TO LIBRARY

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—Papers and personal letters of Isaac Van Zandt, written to his wife while he was representing the republic of Texas in Washington, from 1849 to 1855, are being loaned to the library of the University of Texas, that they may be photostated. The papers are in the possession of Van Zandt's granddaughter, Mrs. John L. Burgess, of Fort Worth. Others of the letters were written to his wife at the time that he was a candidate for governor. Van Zandt died three weeks before the election. A great deal of material valuable to Texas history is revealed in the papers and letters.

SAYS FRATS HELP IN SCHOLASTICS

GREEK LETTER ORGANIZATIONS PRAISED BY LONGHORN DEAN

(Special to The Avalanche) AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—Fraternities materially improve the scholastic standing of the University of Texas, according to V. I. Moore, dean of men. This fact is evidenced by the grade averages of the separate fraternities as compared with the average of the main University. Only six out of the twenty-six social fraternities there failed to show a better per cent of passing grades than of the institution as a whole.

This condition may be attributed to the initiation requirements that are made both upon the individual members and the chapter as an organization. Dean Moore said. No fraternities are allowed to initiate pledges unless the percentage of work passed exceeds the average of the university. This rule causes the local chapters to strive by means of compulsory study hours and other methods to keep their grades above the average. Therefore pledges may be initiated they must have passed at least four full courses during a long session of nine months. It is a remarkable fact that even with this spur to induce them to study over fifty per cent of the students that pledge fraternities are never initiated due mostly to failure to meet grade requirements.
