HALF MILLION IS PAID FOR PRODUCE HERE

Red Sutton Is Freed Of Murder Charge

Fatal Shooting Of
Maxie Woodroof Is
Unsolved Mystery

Jury Returns Not Guilty
Verdict Last
Saturday

The trial of Red Sutton, charged with the murder of Maxie Woodroof, held-up here a little more than a week ago, resulted in an acquittal when the jury returned a verdict of not guilty last Saturday afternoon.

Sutton was charged with the crime early last fall, following questioning by state Rangers and officers of Lubbock and Dawson county. The fall term of the Dawson county grand jury returned a bill of indictment, charging Sutton with the murder.

District Judge Louis B. Reed called a special session of District Court for last Thursday morning. A special venire of one hundred men was required in the selection of the jury which was completed Friday morning. Examination of witnesses was begun Friday morning and the case progressed with great rapidity to its completion. It was given to the jury and they returned the not guilty verdict in the early afternoon.

Karl Cayton, new county attorney for Dawson county, was appointed by the court to defend Sutton. He was assisted by an attorney from Spring in the defense. The prosecution was handled by District Attorney J. M. Smith, assisted by retiring County Attorney Vernon D. Adcock.

The case grew out of the murder of Maxie Woodroof in a hold-up at the Hurt's Haberdashery in this city, December of 1937. A lone bandit entered the store shortly after dark at the point of a gun took several hundred dollars in cash from the drawer. Woodroof gave chase and caught the bandit and in the process a gun was discharged, inflicting wounds from which Woodroof succumbed at a local hospital the following morning.

Officers over this entire section conducted a wide man-hunt for slayer.

It is understood that Sutton is in confinement in a South Texas prison for a term of two years.

Cream, Chickens And Eggs Account For Large Income

Brings Third As Much As County Cotton Crop

An interesting announcement relative to the amount of money paid to produce growers of Dawson county for cream, eggs and chickens is made this week.

Although exact figures are not known it is conservatively estimated that one half million dollars were paid by the buyers of produce to the growers.

Piggly Wiggly alone has paid \$33,300 for produce during 1938, according to Dan Davis, owner of the store. Figure from other buyers were not readily available, but it is estimated that total will run in the neighborhood of the half million mark.

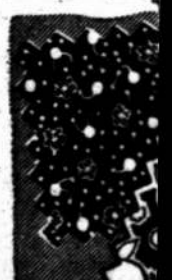

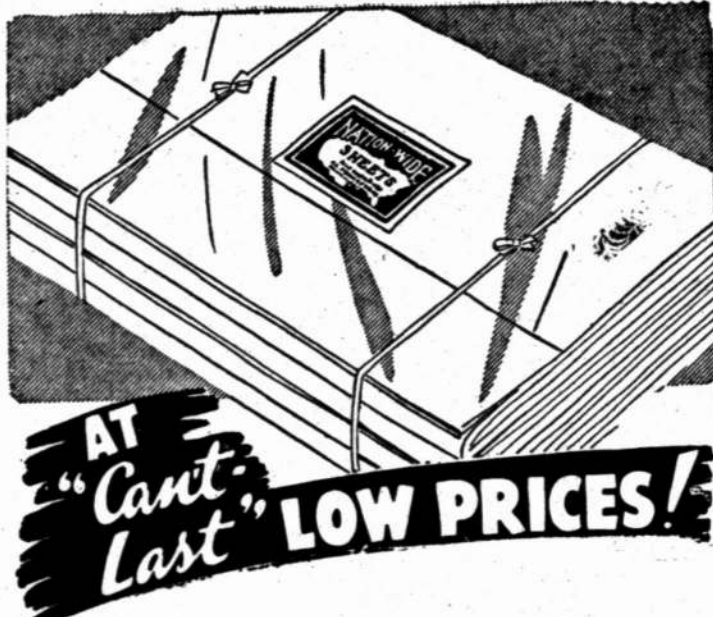

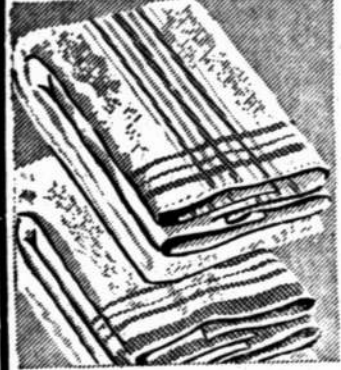

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS TO HAVE RADIO STATION

Austin, Texas—The University of Texas will begin operation of its own radio studio in early January, C. D. Simmons, acting comptroller, announced here today.

The studio will not serve as a broadcasting station, Mr. Simmons explained, but as a service unit from which special university programs may be picked up by individual stations or radio hook-ups.

A two story building on the north side of the campus, gift of Major George W. Littlefield, early University benefactor is being remodeled to house the studio.

Included will be two broadcasting studios, control, reception and rehearsal

rooms. All of the equipment was designed by Dr. C. P. Boner, professor of physics.

Plans now are to sponsor a series of educational programs, Mr. Simmons stated. Besides remote control broadcasts, it is planned to record transcribed programs for distribution among Texas radio stations.

The studio and equipment will furnish a laboratory for student radio engineers and for speech and voice instruction in several of the University's department, the comptroller pointed out.

S. C. S. NOTES

Thousands of acres of cultivated land in the watershed of Lake Creek near Lella Lake, will be terraced during the winter in connection with the erosion control program which farmers

are carrying out in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service CCC camp at Memphis, according to Everett McBride, camp superintendent.

A detailed soil survey has been made on about 35,000 acres to provide a basis for planning treatment of the individual farms.

Engineers of the Memphis CCC camp have been at work in two parties since September 1, making topographical maps of the individual farms, having completed about half of this work.

The laying out and construction of terraces was started early in December by camp engineers and will be carried on through the winter and early spring, the superintendent stated.

When the wind blows, barren soil moves.

During recent drouth years many thousands of acres of once productive fields which were without a protective vegetative cover during the winter have become hummocked or cluttered with soil drifts. In many cases hummocks have reached such a stage that tillage was made impossible.

The first step in restoring to protective vegetation such damaged land is to level the hummocks, the Soil Conservation Service technicians point out. Many thousands of acres have been leveled in the service demonstrations areas within recent years, usually being accomplished with a grader or by dragging a heavy steel rail behind a tractor.

Once the field is levelled, it can be listed on the contour to catch and hold the moisture from the spring rains. Water stored in the soil then enables the growing of a cover crop which will furnish protection for the field during the next blow season, it is pointed out.

In addition to levelling hummocks in the demonstration areas, the service has cooperated with Wind Erosion Conservation Districts in Dallas, Deaf Smith, Hansford, Hartley, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham and Sherman counties in levelling hummocks on 28,662 acres. The service also is furnishing equipment, when available for similar work in the standard soil conservation districts which are being formed in New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and Colorado.

In most instances farmers have found that they can prevent their unprotected fields from becoming hummocked by listing or plowing so that a rough cloddy surface is thrown up to check the movement of soil.

Many stockmen are not receiving maximum returns from their herds because of improper grazing practices, says J. G. Gould, Jr., range examiner, of the Soil Conservation service of the Lamesa CCC Camp.

Since a large portion of Borden, Gaines and Dawson counties is range land, it is of extreme importance that ranchers establish a proper range management system which will bring the greatest returns over a period of years, it is pointed out.

Overgrazing the range is one of the most serious mistakes made by many ranch operators, Mr. Gould states. Overgrazing reduces the forage yield during the following years because the grasses do not have a chance to reproduce. The more desirable plants are replaced by those yielding less forage and which are less desirable. Weeds begin to appear and soon the range losses much of its value for grazing purposes.

Overgrazing not only decreases the carrying capacity of range land, but also increases erosion. Where the grass is grazed closely there is nothing left to hold the moisture on the land and the damage results when heavy rains come. Grazing too early in the spring is another serious mistake made by some ranch operators, Mr. Gould says. Early grazing prevents the plants from starting a normal growth and prevents normal seed production. Much damage is done by livestock trampling the soft, wet sod, thus injuring and exposing the plant roots. Then too little value is received from early spring grazing since stock once getting a taste of the new growth, tends to run themselves down trying to obtain the green, highly succulent grass which has little nutritive value in the early stage of growth. Consequently weight, in many cases, is lost rather than gained.

Many livestock owners are finding that deferred or rotated grazing aids in obtaining the maximum returns from the range, Mr. Gould points out. Under this plan, the range is divided so that approximately one-half can be protected until the plants have completed growth and matured their seed, while the other half is being grazed. After seed production, the protected area can be grazed along with the unprotected portion.

Usually, the area is protected two years in succession to allow young seedlings to firmly establish themselves. The procedure is reversed and the other half is protected for two years. This allows each grazing division to mature a crop of seed for two successive years before being grazed by cattle late in the summer.

There are several advantages to this system of grazing, Mr. Gould points out. First, the more palatable, higher food quality grasses are protected and allowed to produce seed. Second, the grass allowed to mature are more nutritious in the cured stage. Third, the moisture is held by the increased vegetation and thus tends to lessen erosion. Fourth, by increasing the density of

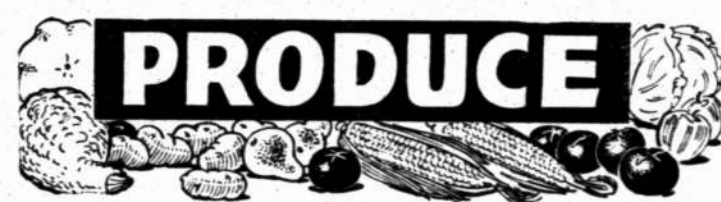

Wisconsin Girl Urges Rural Safety Work

Organization of systematic campaigns for safety on rural highways is urged by Dorothy Pernot, Wisconsin farm girl, in the winning essay in a nation-wide contest conducted by the National Grange in cooperation with the Highway Education Board, results of which were announced at the annual Grange convention, November 16 to 24, at Portland, Oregon. As a reward for her essay, Miss Pernot was given a trip to the convention, where as the guest of honor she was presented with a gold watch.

"Rural safety must be brought about through education, legislation and engineering," Miss Pernot wrote. "It is a challenge to organized community action. Every Grange in every State must be enlisted in this campaign."

Grange members not over 18 years of age in 36 states competed in the safety essay contest. Other prize winners were Irma McGreevy, Hamilton, Ohio; Martha Ann Cottenman, College Park, Maryland; Bessie A. Blair, Knox, Pennsylvania; and Genneth Huffines, Elon College, North Carolina. They received prizes of \$50, \$40, \$30 and \$20 respectively. The subject was "Grange Leadership in Rural Safety."

Miss Pernot went to Portland under the chaperonage of Wisconsin State Master Herman Ihde and Mrs. Ihde. She is returning by way of California, Texas and Louisiana in company with National Master L. J. Taber and Mrs. Taber. All expenses of her trip are paid by the board.

Miss Pernot suggested that Granges promote state-wide educational campaigns for both motorist and pedestrian; direct public attention to the

farm and home accident problem; originate and seek enactment of safety legislation; inspect local highways and use their influence to have them well-marked and well-maintained.

"Through the educational programs of local Granges cooperating with schools, churches, 4-H clubs and other local organizations, relevant facts could be brought to the attention of as many as possible," Miss Pernot wrote. "The causes of accidents may be interpreted to members and all those cooperating persons and agencies who are interested in promoting the safety movement."

"Patrolmen may be enlisted for speaking engagements at schools, before parent-teachers groups, civic organizations and church congregations. Also, illustrated lectures by candid cameramen should show that speed, thoughtlessness and carelessness are causes of accidents. The Grange, as a leader in rural safety, may organize community safety groups throughout the State and cooperate with existing organizations."

She also recommended that Grange members note and discuss road hazards and bring them to the attention of authorities, and cooperate with police and courts in law enforcement.

Miss Pernot is 17 and lives on the farm of her grandfather J. E. Mielke, at Basco, Wisconsin. She is a senior in high school and Madison, and a charter member and assistant lady steward of the Belleville Grange. She has been a 4-H club leader in several projects this year, and for the past two years has been judged dress revue champion of Dane county. The past summer she helped with haying on the 190-acre farm, and helps regularly with milking. Her father is Fred Pernot, a dairy farmer with a herd of registered Holsteins.

S. C. S. NOTES

Even though his crops should fail completely for the next three years Glen D. Young will not have to worry about feed for the fifty seven head of livestock on his farm, five miles southwest of Littlefield. He has a three-year feed supply stacked around his barns.

However, Mr. Young is not greatly worried about crop failures for he has just completed harvesting a ton of maize heads and a half bale of cotton to the acre from his farm although only two and a half inches of rain fell during the 1938 growing season.

"I have learned that terracing and contour strip cropping are practically essential in this section if farming is to be carried on successfully," declares Mr. Young. "By conserving practically all of the moisture I find it possible

to produce fair crops even in dry years and also that soil losses from wind erosion can be checked."

Mr. Young attributes much of his success to the fact that he is carrying out a complete soil and water conservation program on his farm in connection with good farm management. When the Soil Conservation Service CCC Camp was established in the Littlefield area in 1935, Mr. Young was among the first to adopt the erosion control practices being demonstrated.

In 1936, Mr. Young was busy with the construction of the rock home in which he now resides, doing practically all the work himself. However, he did find time to plant his crops on the contour and to strip crop his feed and cotton. Increased yields from these practices and the knowledge that some water still was running off his farm convinced him that terraces would be profitable.

He started terracing his fields in the fall of 1936, using his team, a Fresno plow and a six-foot blade. This work was completed in March 1937, or in time to catch and hold practically all the rain drops on his land where they fell.

Rainfall was excellent in 1937, and, with more moisture stored in the soil, Mr. Young harvested bumper crops, the yields being from 30 to 40 per cent greater than in previous years. He hand-headed two tons of maize and a ton of kafir to the acre, while the hegarl threshed 1,500 pounds to the acre. The cotton yield was three-fourths of a bale to the acre. The stalks were left on the feed strips to provide protection for the cotton strips during the blow season.

"If my fields had not been terraced my crops this year would not have been worth harvesting," Mr. Young declares. "After I planted my my grain sorghums and cotton, there were only two and a half inches of rain before harvest time. The moisture held on my fields and stored in the subsoil by the terraces and contour rows during the previous year furnished the additional moisture needed to bring the 1938 crops through to maturity."

Mr. Young says he is obtaining the greatest value from his feed by marketing through livestock. He now has fifty-seven head of livestock and has built up a three-year feed reserve.

"Since the first of the year I have sold \$400 worth of pigs, which were raised upon feed produced upon my farm. This plan gives me far better returns from the feed than I could get by disposing of the grain on the open market," he says.

\$1,016,000 WILL BE PAID TEXANS IN DIVIDENDS

Earned dividends aggregating \$1,016,000 will be paid on December 31st to more than 70,000 savers in the 120 insured savings and loan associations in Texas. According to figures just prepared by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock, this will be the largest distribution of dividends by the associations in the past seven years.

Since January 1st, savings accounts in the Texas institutions have been growing steadily, showing a gain in the past eleven months of \$8,322,000 which is an increase of 19 per cent for the period. The percentage of increase for the entire district of five states was 11 per cent since the first of the year. Officials of the bank attributed the good showing to better business conditions generally and to the protection afforded savers in the associations through the insurance of their accounts by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, an instrumental-ity of the Federal Government.

Home loans aggregating \$18,854,000 were made by the Texas associations in the past eleven months, approximately one-third of which were for new construction. The loans are payable in small monthly installments, over a long period of time, and collections on them are reported to be excellent. The bank stated the associations have ample additional funds available at reasonable rates of interest for all types of home financing including new construction, repairs and improvements, purchase of homes and rearrangement of present debts.

The local area is served by the Lamesa Savings and Loan Association whose figures are included in the compilation prepared by the bank. The annual meetings of the shareholders of the association in Texas will be held in January at which details of the progress made during the current year will be outlined.

STATE COLLEGE OF PHARMACY MOST POPULAR

Austin, Texas—More students are this year attending the College of Pharmacy, smallest branch of the University of Texas than any other State Pharmaceutical college in the United States, Dean W. F. Gidley announced here today.

A steady increase averaging about 17 per cent for each of the last four years pushed the college's enrollment to 244 this year. Ohio State, just one registrant behind, heretofore has topped the state field, Dean Gidley stated.

Nationally, the college ranks sixth behind five endowed institutions along the north Atlantic seaboard. Columbia's College of Pharmacy shows the largest enrollment in the nation.

Study of pharmacy was introduced into the university curriculum in 1893 at Galveston and was moved to the Austin campus in 1927.

A prominent member of its early staff was Dr. Edward Randall of Galveston now chairman of the University's Board of Regents.

Use Color to Boost Industry's Profits Journalists Suggest

The rainbow has come to earth—to sell products, help health, brighten life. Color, in fact, is coming of age, reports James McQueeny and Edward Podolsky, M.D., in the current Rotarian Magazine, submitting evidence to prove that it affects buying moods, working or fatigue moods, amusement, social and educational moods, and even certain associated with pathological or psychological disturbances.

Color, in a word, has burst like a rocket in the merchandising world, they declare, for it is used not only in packages and containers, but also in the products—green gasoline, red mercurchrome, purple antifreeze and in many others. Business exploring the possibilities of color in 10,000 novel and interesting ways.

"Color is coming to be used in a thousand ways to induce other than buying moods: to promote, for example, efficiency, or mental health and quietness, or relieve eyestrain, or to give a favorable setting for producing almost any desired mood," say these writers. "Metabolism and muscular activity have been found to be stimulated under certain kinds of colored lights, hindered under others."

Inspection tables in certain hosiery mills, for example, are painted blue to relieve eyestrain, according to McQueeny and Podolsky. A manufacturer of radio tubes painted workmen's benches blue to offset the feeling of heat created by a welding process—blue is a "cool" color. The operating room with glue-green walls is restful to the surgeon's eyes, and lessens fatigue and to that extent makes him surer with the knife. Concrete road colored dull orange or marigold has at least 40 percent less glare and less light glare than ordinary white roads. As time goes on, we may buy only books or magazines printed on yellow or green paper, and baseballs of a brilliant yellow hue may replace those now used.

"As for our homes, there seems to be no end in sight to the possible uses of color," they assert, "whether for orchid or cool blue tiles in the bath-

room; or cheerful reds, greens and the oranges in the kitchen; or walls toned light to secure the maximum light reflection in certain rooms or dark to reduce reflection in other rooms. The use of a light color on radiators may increase heat radiation as much as 25 per cent, thus saving fuel costs.

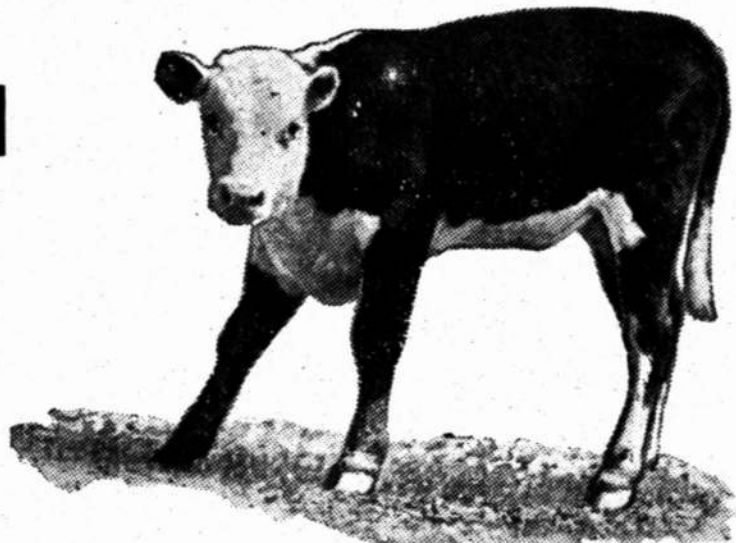

COMMITTEE TO SEEK \$100,000 ON SANITATION

Austin, Texas.—To assist Governor-elect, W. Lee O'Daniel's industrialization program, the yeald-old Texas building Sanitation Council will seek legislative approval of a \$50,000 to \$100,000 annual program for sanitation research, W. R. Woolrich, vicechairman said here today.

The twelve-man council, an outgrowth of a sanitation conference of municipal, health, industrial and educational officials here last spring, drew its proposal after an all-day conference Monday on the campus of the University of Texas.

The council will seek its funds from legislative earmarking and "personal gift." Vice-Chairman Woolrich added.

Engineering heads of the state school are cooperating in the project independent of their schools and strictly as members of the council, it was pointed out.

Included in the research program would be "comprehensive studies" of water sterilization, chlorination, filtration and softening; utilization and sanitary disposal of sewage and industrial waste; expansion and control of housing; and study of refrigeration and air conditioning.

The program was mapped by the deans of Texas engineering colleges and the sanitary engineer of the State Health Department acting jointly as a research committee for the council.

After approving the committee's report Monday, the council predicted enactment by the next legislature of a uniform State sanitary code for State control of problems of sanitation and industrial waste.

POST-GRADUATE COURSE URGED IN HI-SCHOOLS

Austin, Texas.—Two year post-graduate courses in high schools for students who cannot go to college are suggested by the American Vocational Association. Such work is necessary, it is believed to keep the average graduate, who is 16 years old, occupied until legally he can go to work two years later.

Miss Laura Murray, director of the Bureau of Industrial Teacher-Training at the University of Texas, who has just returned from the association's convention in St. Louis, Mo., reports her organization urges high schools to offer two-year post-graduate vocational courses for the young graduates who cannot go to college nor to work.

"This has created a 16 to 18-year-old group for which there is much concern," she said. "The convention was generally agreed that high schools who are graduating their students at the age of 16 should establish post-graduate vocational training courses for the boys and girls who cannot go to college."

"The University's Bureau of Industrial Teacher-Training supports the establishment of a two-year post-graduate course in Texas high schools this work to be offered those graduates who are unable to attend college. A very definite campaign to that end is being planned by the bureau," she said.

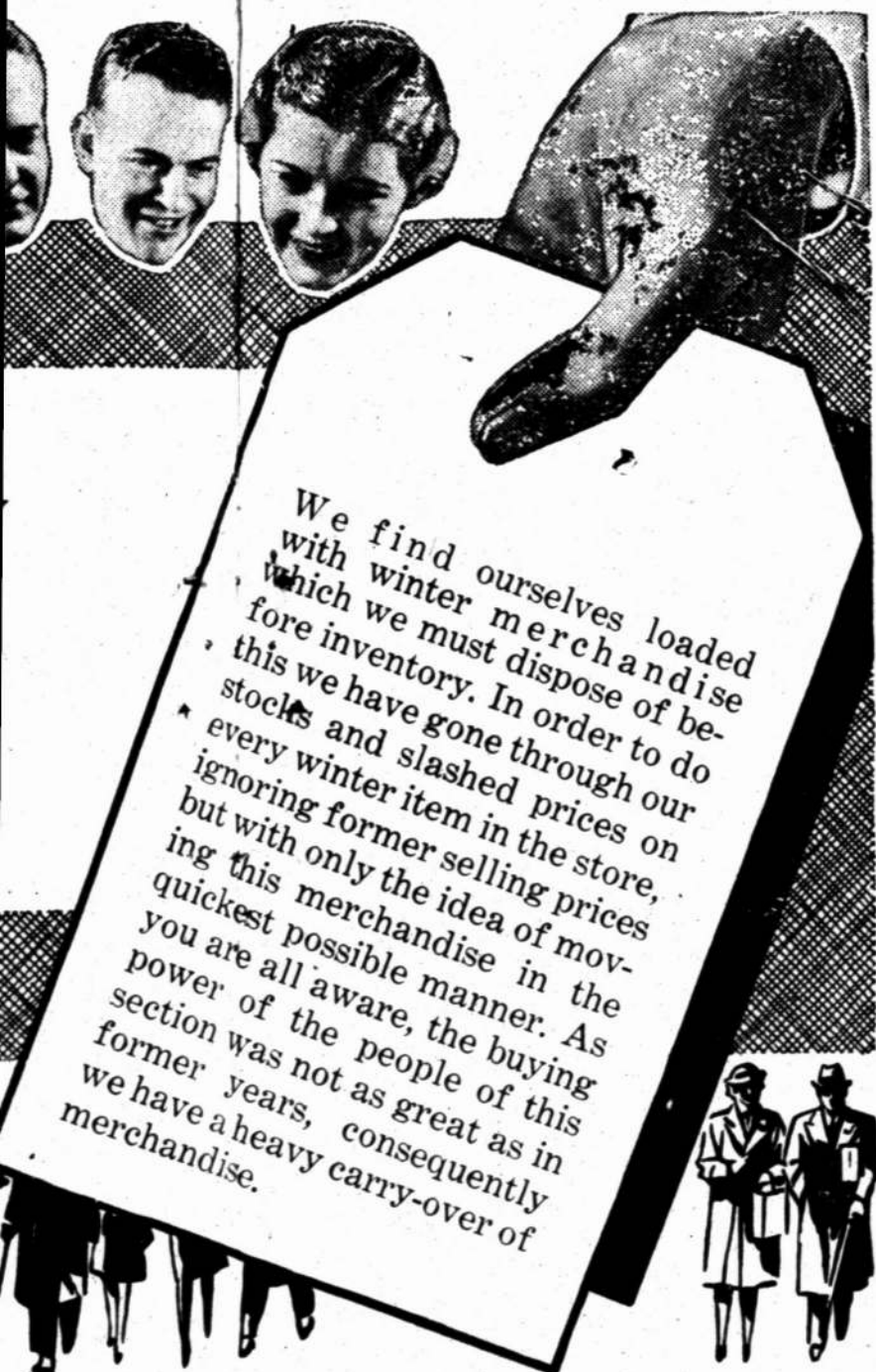
