SCREW WORM ERADICATION

'\$-0-\$' Distress Calls For Million Dollars

An urgent "\$-0-\$" distress call is being sent out to farmers and ranchers of Texas during January by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and supporting livestock organizations. It's an all-out emergency appeal for \$1 million in producer contributions to meet the under-subscribed \$3 million SWAHRF goal required to continue the effective program now in progress to eradicate the costly screwworm from Texas and the Southwest, according to C. G. Scroggs of Dallas, Foundation president. One of the highlights of the big January fund-raising drive will be "\$-0-\$ Week in Texas" sponsored by the livestock auction market industry during a whirlwind six-day statewide campaign—January 21-26. "Operation of the screw worm eradication program is Grover C. Lowry, of Strawn, reaching a very critical stage. TLA executive director in its financial, declares J. R. Taylor of Amarillo, president of Texas Livestock Auction Association, and its host SWAHRF from thousands of that \$-0-\$ Week in Texas producers in their respective areas may result in raising substantial funds to materially aid and assist the Foundation program, projected to cost which represents livestock a total of \$12 million over a period of three years. Taylor and Cecil Ward of Galveston, a member of the Texas Animal Health Commission and the Animal Disease Eradication Division, west Animal Health Research Foundation and a past TLA president, are co-chairmen of the special 20th member "\$-0-\$" 50-50 matching basis. # 39 Feeder Calves and \$667 Offered At Livestock Show

There will be 39 feeder calves offered by young exhibitors this year at the 4-H and FFA Livestock Show. A total of \$667.50 will be distributed among the calf exhibitors. The show has been scheduled for Jan. 11 and 12 at the new livestock barn west of the city. The calves will be judged in three divisions: heavy weight, medium weight and light weight. Exhibitors in the feeder calves division of the show must be between the ages of 9 and 21 years. They must have fed the animal under the direct supervision of the county agricultural agent during the feeding period. The exhibitor must have owned the calf since Sept. 1 of the year preceding the show date. Judging of feeder calves during the 2-day show has been scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 12, at 1 p. m. The calves must be weighed in at 6 p. m. Thursday, Jan. 10. They must be left in the barn and on exhibition until 4 p. m. Saturday. Prizes will be given in each of the three divisions. First prize is \$50; second, \$37.50; third, \$30; fourth, \$22.50; fifth, \$15; sixth, \$12.50; seventh, \$10; and prizes eighth through thirteenth, \$7.50 each. Each boy or girl has between three and four hundred dollars invested in his calf. They care for their calves an average of two hours daily. The calves will be judged on quality, conformation and finish. JOHNNY TILLER, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Tiller, will have 4 Hereford calves in competition this year. He has been a 4-H member for 6 years and this will be his fifth year to exhibit calves. Two Hereford calves and 1 Angus calf will be shown by ROBERT COOPER. There can only be one champion calf however, our goal is not to just raise livestock, but boys and girls."

It teaches boys and girls to work with their hands; breaking to lead; cleaning and bedding stalls; brushing and grooming; feeding; care; foot trimming; teaching to work; and care for animals and the acceptance of responsibility. It offers association with other youth from other counties and states, and with breeders, feeders, bankers and other business men. The relationship with older business men affords opportunity for future expansion and development of our youth. The spirit of competition helps give the young people a goal to work for. If they lose, they must take it on the chin, and this, too, is a valuable lesson. Logsdon said, "I hope the adult citizens and parents realize that we want to make every boy and girl a feeder livestock champion. There can only be one champion calf however, our goal is not to just raise livestock, but boys and girls."

**What is your Question?**

**QUESTION: Did The Church Give The Bible To The World?**

The Bible, composed of the Old and New Testaments, is the Word of God. Since the Old Testament was in general use before the church was established, the church could not possibly have given it to the world. The New Testament, which records the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecies and reveals the will of God through Christ, is the "seed" that produced the church.

Then who did give us the Bible? The Apostle Peter and the Apostle Paul tell us that God is its author. "For no prophecy ever came by the will of man; but men spake from God, being moved by the Holy Spirit" (II Peter 1:21). "Every scripture inspired of God is also profitable . . . that the man of God may be complete, furnished completely unto every good work" (II Timothy 3:16, 17).

In Old Testament days God spoke "unto the fathers in the prophets," but in the New Testament He speaks "unto us in his son" (Hebrews 1:1, 2). Men who were inspired by the Holy Spirit wrote the same message they had preached orally, a complete message, "once for all delivered, unto the saints," designed to meet man's needs until the end of time (Jude 3; John 12:48, 49; 14:26; 17:7, 8; Matthew 28:18, 20).

This message, when preached orally, was received as the inspired Word of God by those who heard and obeyed it (Acts 2:37-42). The same message, when written in books and letters by those who had preached it, was received as the inspired Word of God by the individuals and groups to whom it was addressed (I Corinthians 14:37). No man nor council of men since New Testament days was ever authorized to pronounce the message inspired. It contains its own claim to and bears its own evidence of inspiration. This message produced the church and guided it in the Lord's way during the first century. It will do the same in the twentieth century.

The Bible, with its gracious offer of pardon to all who believe in Christ, repeat of their sins, are baptized for the remission of sins, and live faithfully in His service—originated not with the church but with God. God has providentially preserved His Word through the centuries to make it available to the world, and He has commanded His church, as "the pillar and ground of the truth," to preach it to all men without adding to it, taking from it, or changing it in any way (I Timothy 3:14, 15; Galatians 1:6-9).
