

Crackdown Seen On Rent 'Black Market'

WASHINGTON, March 30.—Capitol Hill heard predictions today that the new rent control extension will set off a government crackdown on a rent "black market."

President Truman was expected to sign in plenty of time, the "home rule" legislation that continues rent controls for another 12 months.

Presidential Secretary Charles G. Ross said Mr. Truman is getting reports from departments concerned with its administration. He added that the bill will be acted on today or tomorrow.

Tight Woods, housing expediter is known to be preparing a statement in connection with the President's action.

Just two days before the present controls are set to die at midnight Thursday, Congress late yesterday tossed the new compromise bill to the White House by overwhelming votes. Then:

1. Rep. Patman (D-Tex.) said it will mean a "rollback of illegal

rents," as well as increased rents on some properties where landlords are not now showing a profit. He said it will put an end to the rent "black market" that Tighe Woods, rent administrator, reported to be growing throughout the country.

2. House Democratic Leader McCormack (Mass.) said in his opinion there won't be any big increases in rent for anyone, and most rents probably won't be increased at all.

Mr. Truman was described by friends who talked to him as "elated" over the legislation, although it falls short of what he asked.

They said he regards it as an administrative victory, and is sure to sign it. Rent controls are in force on 14,350,000 dwelling places. Mr. Truman wanted a two year extension.

The Senate approved the bill 78 to 11 and the House stamped on a 262 to 143 vote, after weeks of bitter debate.

Senate Heads Refuse To Cut Funds For ECA

Sen. George Warns U. S. May Face Financial Deficit

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—Senate foreign policy leaders of both parties stood pat today against a move by Sens. Taft (R-Ohio) and Russell (D-Ga.) to whack about 10 per cent off the \$5,580,000,000 European recovery program.

But Sen. George (D-Ga.) threw his powerful weight behind the Taft-Russell proposal with the assertion that unless some cut is made this country may face "a serious financial deficit."

Sen. Connally (D-Tex.), who heads the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, predicted defeat for the Taft-Russell proposal. But the Texas admitted the vote might be close.

The committee's top Republican, Sen. Vandenberg (Mich.) would not comment publicly. But he was reported to have told colleagues he is sticking by the full authorization.

Vandenberg has taken the stand that the Economic Co-operation Administration should have elbow room to defend before the appropriations committees alter the amount it says it needs.

If the authorization in the pending bill is cut, ECA would have to stay under that ceiling in its bid for actual funds to carry out its program.

Meanwhile, Sen. Malone (R-Nev.) charged that Marshall Plan countries helped by the United States are actually using that aid to "re-arm Russia for the third world war."

"The recipient nations are shipping everything from locomotives to jet engines to Russia and Russian satellite countries," Malone said in a speech prepared for delivery as the Senate resumed debate on the authorization bill.

"Those supplies are produced with the raw material and money furnished by the United States through ECA while we are severely restricting our own exports to the Iron Curtain countries."

PARENTAL ORDER TAKEN LITERALLY

A parental order is one to be obeyed, at least with a 13-year-old boy apprehended by local authorities Tuesday on a charge of entering a west-end filling station here Monday night.

The lad had left a 22 rifle inside the filling station to go to the show. When he returned, he found the station closed for the night.

Having been cautioned against leaving the firearm anywhere by his mother, he decided to break a window, enter and get it.

Attendants who opened the place the following morning found only the gun missing and suggested to police the boy might be implicated. Rounded up, the youngster readily admitted his guilt.

Authorities decided against pressing any charges after his parents agreed to pay for the broken pane.

Weather In Texas Is Daffy

The state weather scene was daffy today.

Two cold fronts and a warm front wandered over Texas, the Weather Bureau sniffed.

All three of the fronts sailed through Dallas between midnight and 6 o'clock bringing an astonishing run of weather.

First there was a warm front from the Gulf, heading northeast and then the warm weather was quickly replaced by rain and cool air as the first cold front struck.

A second cold front blew away the showers about dawn. Both cold fronts were traveling towards the southeast.

As the cold fronts moved across the Panhandle yesterday, hail, light snow, and light rain fell.

Colder weather was predicted for East Texas tonight and slightly warmer weather was expected in the Panhandle tonight.

Thunder showers were in prospect for the eastern portion of East Texas.

Hail fell in Amarillo. Some stones were a quarter-inch in diameter. Temperature there early in the morning was 34 degrees.

The weather report showed winds of 25 miles per hour. Snow grains followed the hail, the Weather Bureau said.

Wink and Midland reported dust aloft. Childress had winds of 35 miles per hour, light rain and cooling temperatures early Wednesday morning.

WASHINGTON HAVING WORD TROUBLE OVER CURRENT BUSINESS CONDITIONS

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—Washington is having word trouble, mostly over what to say about business conditions.

The economic word game was going along fine until recently. "Inflation" with its -rescues, forces, influences, tides, etc., had a clean monopoly, and seemed pretty well understood by everybody—alike after a few years' run.

Then a new economic problem came along and today's trouble is "what's the situation we're in?"

"Disinflation," said Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, head of the three-man economic advisory council to the president which the Hoover Commission calls a "multi-headed body" and smarties call "the three wise men."

"Recession," said Marriner S. Eccles, former chairman of the federal reserve board.

"Depression," said Robert R. Young, president of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, using a Washington news conference to discuss any word that makes this politically conscious city wince.

"Deflation" has become a chorus or community word, with no special titleholder.

It may be that one man's "recession" is another's "disinflation," or maybe "deflation." And even "depression."

"Disinflation," according to Nourse, takes "pressures off prices" while "deflation" might mean a "price collapse." Only if people get "jittery" will disinflation "snowball into a recession."

Nourse described disinflation as far as "healthy," which happens to be exactly what Eccles said his "recession" has been so far especially since "some recession is desirable."

Young, stuck with a word that is unlikely to go over as "desirable," didn't bother to assess the state of health indicated by his entry.

Babson Forecasts Minor Recession

WINTER HAVEN, Fla., March 30. (AP)—Economist Roger Babson predicts a minor recession from now until 1953, and offers this advice to business men:

Prepare for competition, buy on a hand-to-mouth basis, keep expenses down, keep out of debt, and store cash.

Babson told a civic club yesterday that the recession will be less severe than the one in the early thirties because there are too many cushions—subsidy pensions, government mortgages, high bank deposits, and rental ceilings.

Army Seizes Power In Syrian Capital

Leaders Arrested In Bloodless Coup

DAMASCUS, Syria, March 30. (AP)—The Syrian army seized power in Syria's capital today, arresting government leaders in a bloodless revolt at dawn.

Brig. Hosny El Zaim, commander of the Syrian army, said the military coup was ordered because of "attacks against the army, inside as well as outside the house of representatives."

(U. S. minister James Hugh Keeley, Jr., reported from Damascus to Washington that President Shukri Al Kuwattly, Prime Minister Khaled Bey Azem and his entire cabinet had been arrested.)

Keeley reported the army took over complete control of the capital in the early morning coup d'etat.

Army officials said not a single drop of blood was shed in the lightning coup.

Curfew was clamped on the city at 6 a. m. local time and all was reported quiet several hours after Brigadier Zaim announced the seizure of power.

Zaim said the revolutionary movement was "purely local and has no foreign implication."

This was taken to mean that the new government would probably proceed with scheduled armistice negotiations with Israel.

The bloodless coup was the first serious disturbance since last December when riots forced the resignation of Premier Jamil Mardam Bey.

German Setup Will Be Talked At West Meet

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today major German problems will be discussed with western European foreign ministers coming here to sign the North Atlantic Treaty.

Acheson told a news conference the talks on Germany will be highly informal. But he said he hopes they may bring further progress on problems—such as formation of a German government—which are already under discussion in conference in Europe.

The secretary's principal discussions on the German issue will be held with the foreign policy chiefs of the other two occupation powers of western Germany—Britain's Ernest Bevin, and France's Robert Schuman.

Acheson pointed out at his conference that the Benelux countries also have figured in some discussions on the policy of the western powers toward Germany. He said they might come into the talks here. The Benelux countries are Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The Atlantic Pact is to be signed on Monday.

Acheson said that in the highly important series of talks leading up to the signing he would see Bevin tomorrow, at an hour not yet announced, and also expects to meet during the day with Netherlands Foreign Minister D. M. Stikker.

Acheson also said he intends to discuss Italy's former African colonies with some of the foreign ministers.

Bob Hope To Head NBC Radio Program Honoring VFW

Bob Hope will head the east of a 30-minute all-star variety program to be heard over the NBC network at 11:30 p. m. Monday on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, local post officials said Wednesday.

The radio show will be the first of a series of events planned during the week of April 3-9, which has been set officially as VFW Golden Jubilee Week throughout the nation. Many of the 10,000 posts and 7,000 auxiliaries will have special ceremonies.

Local C. Of C. To Be Represented At San Angelo Meeting

J. H. Greene and H. J. Morrison, manager and assistant manager, respectively, will represent the Big Spring chapter of commerce at the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Managers Association of West Texas in San Angelo Thursday.

Greene is scheduled to make one of the principal addresses at the assembly Thursday morning. His topic will be "Conducting Board Meetings and Committee Operations."

May Delay Action On School Bills

AUSTIN, March 30. (AP)—The House adjourned until tomorrow without acting on the Gilmer-Alkin school bills. Opponents claimed the 73 to 67 vote was a good test of their strength.

AUSTIN, March 30. (AP)—A plan to delay final action on the Gilmer-Alkin education bills until after the present session, took shape in the House today.

Rep. William A. Miller, Jr., of Houston prepared for early introduction a resolution to that effect. It had the signatures of 25 House members.

The resolution looked as the first blow in the renewed battle over the public school bills in the House today.

Miller's resolution noted that the bills are "highly controversial," "far-reaching" and "revolutionary." It said they were complex and difficult to understand.

Many House members have not had opportunity to study them, the resolution stated, and taking up now would jeopardize "much good legislation which should be passed now."

It recommended that hearings on the bills should be held at the special session by the House sitting as a committee of the whole, before any action is taken on them.

Storms Cut Short Red Cross Official's Visit In Big Spring

Destructive storms in Oklahoma and Arkansas cut short a visit here this morning by Mary Alice Harrison, nursing consultant for the American Red Cross.

Miss Harrison had come here to discuss the home nursing program of the Howard-Glasscock Red Cross chapter with Mrs. G. G. Sawtelle, local executive director. However, a message was awaiting Miss Harrison directing her to report immediately to Little Rock, Ark., for assignment to new disaster areas.

The Red Cross is rushing personnel and equipment to communities and towns hit by storms early today, Miss Harrison said.

Firemen Extinguish Residence Blaze

City firemen were called to the N. J. Kennemur residence, 306 NW 9th street, at 10:45 a. m. today when several articles of clothing fell on a lighted stove. There was no damage except to the clothing.

A small outbuilding near the Cap Rock camp on the Lamesa highway was destroyed by a blaze at 5 p. m. Tuesday, firemen said.

Rechecking Delayed In Red Cross Drive

Tardy reports from early canvass work are delaying a rechecking process for the annual Red Cross drive, officials announced this morning.

Jack Y. Smith, general chairman, said it was hoped that rechecking could begin this week since only about 1,000 contributors have participated in the roll call. However, campaign officials are reluctant to begin the new phase of the drive until reports have been received on all previous work. The reports are essential to avoid repetition of canvass work, Smith explained.

Contributions received to date total \$6,738.51, leaving about \$2,500 needed to reach the quota.

Tornadoes Hit Four Times In Oklahoma

CANTON, Okla., March 30. (AP)—Tornadoes struck four times in Northwest Oklahoma today, killing two, injuring 18 and causing heavy property damage.

Canton, Longdale and Blackwell were hit. A tornado also dipped down five miles north of Enid, and wrecked a small airport.

The greatest damage was to the first two—Canton, a town of 1,200 and nearby Longdale, 400.

The dead were in Canton and Longdale.

In Canton the storm hit hardest in the northwest residential area and the business district, but the entire town was damaged.

The tornado in Blackwell struck the south and southwest residential areas of that city of 12,000.

Six persons were taken to hospitals in Blackwell and two were seen released. None of the others was reported in critical condition.

With the coming of dawn rescue workers found the damage in Canton and Longdale not as great as first reports had indicated.

The first tornado started winding up in the farmlands southwest of here ripping open some isolated ranch buildings. It smashed into Canton at 12:30 o'clock this morning.

Without warning and went right through the home and business sections.

Moments later it crashed into little Longdale, located seven miles northeast of here with 400 people. Less than three hours later another twister of lighter force struck the south side of Blackwell.

The Canton area is 75 miles northwest of Oklahoma City, and Blackwell is near the north central border. "This town looks like it had been ground in a sieve," said the first state patrolman who reached Canton. "It's ripped to bits."

Six 'Missing' Draft Registrants Sought

Whereabouts of six men who have not kept the board advised of changes in address are being sought by the selective service board here.

Listed as "missing" are Merced G. Fierro, Matias Perez, T. W. Williams, Alex Banks, Pablo Martinez and Fredrick Lugo.

The board will continue efforts to locate the six men but unless they are successful within the next few days the local board will be required to turn the search over to state selective service headquarters, said Joyce Sewell, office secretary.

GROMYKO IS FELLOW TRAVELER

NEW YORK, March 30. (AP)—A group of voluble Western European foreign ministers arrived today aboard the big liner, Queen Mary, to sign the North Atlantic Pact. A fellow traveler was Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko, still saying "no."

More than 500 pickets marched near the pier in noisy protest of Britain's policy toward Israel—its greeting to British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin. He was one of four foreign officials who will sign the pact in Washington next week.

Gromyko, who arrived to attend

the United Nations Assembly, had "no prediction" on what would transpire there. He answered "no comment" to reporters' other questions.

Other foreign office chiefs besides Bevin who arrived were: Belgian Premier and Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak, Dutch Foreign Minister D. U. Stikker, and Luxembourg Foreign Minister Joseph Bech.

Gromyko told a reporter at his table in the ship's restaurant that he had a very smooth trip, but that he preferred not to say anything now.

Bech, who talked briefly with a reporter, implied that he and other western foreign ministers had discussed a possible Mediterranean alliance on the trip over.

Enthusiastic endorsement of the Atlantic Pact was voiced by Paul-Henri Spaak, foreign minister of Belgium, and Erik U. Stikker, foreign minister of the Netherlands.

When a reporter asked if he believed Russia would agree that the pact strengthens the UN, Spaak laughed and replied: "Ask Gromyko. He's an authority on that."

Are Academy Awards To Be Discontinued?

HOLLYWOOD, March 30. (U. P.)—Big talk in the film capital today is: Will there be any more Academy Awards?

Jean Hersholt asserts that the New York offices of picture companies oppose the awards idea and that the Assn. of Motion Picture Producers will withdraw its support after this year.

At the same time, Hersholt announced his retirement as president of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, sponsor of the annual "Oscar" presentations. He added he won't remain on the Academy board of governors.

"I don't think the Academy will go out of existence," said Hersholt, who has served as its president four years. "But unless the studios take a more active interest... and agree to make financial contribu-

tions, the 1948 awards will be the last."

He declared that without the support of the Assn. of Motion Picture Producers, which Eric Johnston heads, "it will be difficult if not impossible for this program to proceed."

Hersholt said he was speaking in answer to an undercurrent of criticism heard in the industry after the awards ceremony last Thursday. And he declared:

"Voices in the industry say they don't want academy standards foisted upon us. They say 'we want to make commercial pictures unhampered by considerations of artistic excellence.'"

The veteran actor said certain producers feel that "too much time and money are wasted trying to make pictures of Academy Award caliber," they think Academy standards are too high.

Hersholt emphasized that the Academy, in reality the cultural and educational branch of the industry, will not lower its standards. The coveted gold statuettes, presented for 21 years, are awarded for the highest achievements in the motion picture art.

Before this year, the presentation ceremony was an annual Hollywood spectacle with crowds up to 7,000 attending. This year, to cut the usual cost of the affair in half—to \$50,000—it was held in the Academy's own theater, which seats less than 1,000.

There was criticism in the film industry about holding the awards ceremony in so small a theater

this year. The industry also was surprised that the Academy should choose the British film "Hamlet" for its best picture award, the first time a foreign film has been so recognized.

Several major studios, including Columbia, Universal and Republic, did not even contribute this year, Hersholt said.

Arguments Open In Thibodeaux Trial

WACO, March 30. (U. P.)—Arguments in the murder trial of Cyril J. Thibodeaux, Hillsboro, open before the jury here today in Judge D. W. Bartlett's district court.

Psychiatrist John E. Talley testified yesterday he believes Thibodeaux was "temporarily insane at the time of the slaying and did not know what he was doing."

Thibodeaux also took the stand and said he lost his memory as a result of blows on the head in a fight on Dec. 24. This was two days before Staden Sawyer, also of Hillsboro, was shot to death in a West, Tex., tavern. He said the fight was at a tavern at which Sawyer was shot.

Jury Completed In Murder Trial

STEPHENVILLE, March 30. (U. P.)—Introduction of testimony before a jury qualified for the death penalty began today in the murder trial of Robert C. Bagwell, 17.

He is charged with the Jan. 28 five-shot slaying of Crockett C. Ross, operator of a Stephenville service station.

Selection of a jury was completed yesterday, just five men short of exhaustion of the venire of 175. The state tried to qualify jurors for the death penalty. Questioning of prospective jurors began Monday.

Bagwell and his uncle, Daniel White, 48, were arrested Feb. 6 at Vernon. White, charged as an accomplice in the case, was granted a separate trial.

Kenedy County Gets First Grand Jury In Past Four Years

SARITA, March 30. (U. P.)—Charges of theft of edible meat will result April 4 in Kenedy County's first grand jury in four years.

Ranger T. E. Seay Monday night filed the charges against Ollie Kent, 34, and Edwin Crocker, 21. They are accused of killing a prize bull belonging to Earl Thomas and taking part of the carcass. It is alleged the theft occurred on Thomas' ranch in extreme South Kenedy County.

The last felony case requiring grand jury action in the county was on Jan. 4, 1945. Adan Flores was indicted in the slaying of Manuel Riojas. The case was transferred to Kleberg County, where Flores was given a five-year prison term.

Field Work In East Texas Slowed By Wet Weather

AUSTIN, March 30. (U. P.)—Field work in East Texas counties fell behind last week because of continued wet weather, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported today.

Wet fields also hampered work in the coastal area.

In other areas of the state, field work was generally up to schedule because the two prior weeks of open weather were ideal for plowing, bedding and planting.

The USDA report for the week ending March 28 said wheat made rank growth in the plains counties.

Oats in northern Blackland counties had some green bug infestation but damage was light. The rust infestation in southern counties spread some. Early planted corn was up to a stand as far north as the Red River. Considerable cotton was up to a stand in the coastal bend area. Conditions continued favorable for field work in most vegetable area.

ACTOR LEAVES JAIL TODAY

Writing Mitchum's Idea Of New Career

LOS ANGELES, March 30. (U. P.)—Movie Hero Robert Mitchum, who gets his freedom today after a 50-day trick in the county jail, has his eye on another career—writing.

The bobby sox idol, about five pounds leaner than when he started his jail term on a conviction of conspiracy to possess marijuana, added, however, he has a few more pictures to make.

But he talked seriously of the writing idea in an interview shortly before his release. "I would like to exploit and express ideas of my own," he said. "I would like to go back to writing, if I had the time and the courage." He paused and added: "And I think I have the courage."

The 31-year-old Mitchum, looking tanned and fit from making cement blocks at the sheriff's honor farm said he felt no bitterness about serving time. His immediate plans,

he said, were for home, food, bath and maybe a drink or two.

Actress Lila Leeds, convicted with Mitchum, also completed her jail term of 30 days today. She told reporters: "I'm going to be a very good girl from now on."

Mitchum, Miss Leeds, Dancer Vicki Evans and Real Estate Agent Robin Ford were arrested last Aug. 31 when narcotics officers raided the secluded canyon cottage of Miss Leeds. All but Miss Evans were convicted and sentenced to jail. Miss Evans was acquitted by a jury.

No Date Set On Brazos River Probe

AUSTIN, March 30. (U. P.)—Sen. A. M. Alkin, chairman of the Senate General Investigating Committee, said today that no date had been set for the formal opening of a probe into operations of Brazos River water and power interests.

The committee last week was directed to look into a power contract between the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District and the Brazos River Electric Transmission co-operative. At present the co-operative is purchasing from the district all electric power produced at Possum Kingdom Dam.

"We have two auditors gathering factual data now," Alkin said. "When they make a report, I'll call the investigating committee into session."

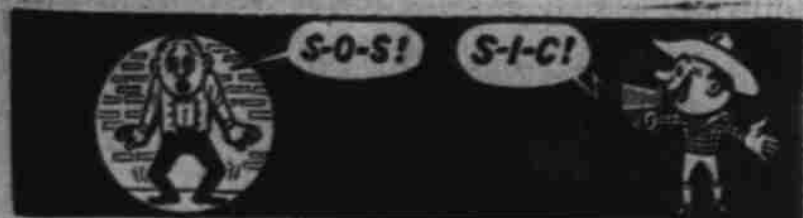

13-YEAR-OLD GIRL IS HAPPY

T&P Replaces Cat Killed By Engine

OXFORD, La., March 30. (AP)—A passenger train made a long, unprecedented stop at this little Louisiana town today. The railroad wanted to give a girl a new cat. The cat, black as midnight, went to 13-year-old Marlene Wendt. Thus the Texas and Pacific Railroad replaced a cat belonging to Marlene which was killed by one of their engines last month.

William Ray Hargrove, 60-year-old red-haired engineer who had piloted the train that destroyed Marlene's cat, made the ceremonial presentation today.

The girl wrote the T&P March 1, saying: "Dear sir: My cat was killed by one of your engines on Feb. 20. He was a black cat named Cinder. I would appreciate another cat."

The railroad thought that one over a few days, and then pushed the throttle full steam ahead. "In the near future we will see that you have a cat to replace Cinder," the T&P wrote Marlene.

Eight railroad employees at Fort Worth built a sumptuous cage, brass hinged and with special water and food receptacles. And on top of the cage, they printed a name: "Cinder II."

Meanwhile, other employees of the railroad scurried around to find a

cat to suit Marlene. "Cinder didn't have any white whatsoever," she had said in a second letter to the T&P.

"Cinder was a big pet. I mean you could pick him up anytime and pet him." At the home of J. H. Hefner in Fort Worth, the railroad's scouts found a seven-month-old tomcat that fitted specifications, except for a single white whisker. The railroad bought him for \$15 and put him in the new cage.

Cinder II still sported his lone white whisker—and a bright red ribbon—when Engineer Hargrove handed him over to Marlene.

India Increasing Paper Production

NEW DELHI, India. (AP)—The government has approved eight schemes for producing a total of 70,000 tons of paper annually.

Industries Minister S. P. Mookerjee said in parliament that the government has allowed the import of the necessary machinery for the schemes. He said a factory is being established in the central provinces for producing 30,000 tons of newsprint annually.

Railroad Engineer Killed Under Train

SAN ANTONIO, March 30. (AP)—Walter F. Angerstein, Southern Pacific railroad engineer, died under the wheels of a train here.

Angerstein, 34, believed to be a resident of Victoria, who lived two days of each week here, was killed last night.

Thompson Will Speak At Meet Of Oil Group

SAN ANTONIO, March 30. (AP)—Col. Ernest O. Thompson, Texas railroad commissioner from Amarillo, described the oil picture for the remainder of 1949 at the noon session here of the convention of Western Petroleum Refiners Association.

The Texas Railroad Commission is the oil production regulatory body in Texas. The refiners were expected to pass a resolution this afternoon opposing congressional bills which would divorce large oil companies and their subsidiaries.

One of the bills would prohibit major oil companies from operating or holding interest in pipe lines.

Gordon C. Locke yesterday said pipeline companies are the only common carriers which have reduced rates in the last few years.

Locke is general counsel and executive director of the newly formed committee for pipeline companies.

Locke said divorce bills had been proposed "13 or 14 times" in the last few years, but none had ever been reported favorably by a congressional committee.

The four pending bills are now in committee or sub-committee. The association elected new officers yesterday.

SMU President Hits Four-Year College 'Joyride'

DALLAS, March 30. (AP)—Dr. Umphrey Lee, president of Southern Methodist University, believes "a four-year joyride" through college is an imposition on the public pocketbook.

Dr. Lee said nobody has an inherent right to college-for-fun "at the public's expense."

It would be foolish, he told the Dallas Technical Club yesterday, "to spend indiscriminately, even in a good cause, and the amount may become prohibitive even in a rich country."

He suggested three things for the public to keep in mind when considering government aid to education. They are:

1. "Institutions of higher learning should be supported only according to real needs. Universities and higher technical institutions should be provided for, but only for those who can and will use such funds."

2. "Junior colleges will supply the need of a large number of people and should be high in standards and open to all."

3. "Privately supported colleges and universities should be encouraged as a matter of public policy."

Prof Will Study Latest Ape Finds

JOHANNESBURG. (AP)—Within the next two months, Professor D. M. Watson, professor of zoology at University College, London, hopes to throw more light on the origin of man by establishing the age of South Africa's man-apes. He has just arrived here by air under a Nuffield Trust grant, and broke his journey at Nairobi, Kenya, to study what he regards as the forefathers of South Africa's man-apes.

The East African finds are apes, he says, and not man-apes. By his study of Dr. Robert Broom's finds in South Africa, Prof. Watson hopes to be able to find out how they fit in with their East African ancestors and with all the other apes such as chimpanzees and gorillas.

"The world's scientists are very excited about the finds in South Africa," he says. "So far as we know they are the only man-apes in the world, the Peking specimen being more of an ape-man. Man originated somewhere in Africa and I hope to discover the age of your man apes."

Now Salmon Must Reveal Their Age

MAYWOOD, Ill. (AP)—Salmon in swimming up their native rivers to spawn next spring must now face an added hazard. They will not only get caught but will also have to reveal their age. Knowing the age of selected fish from the 1949 catch will help scientists of the American Can Company in making quality tests of the new pack.

A salmon's age is determined by putting one of his scales under a microscope. The rings on the scale reveal the fish's approximate age, in much the same way that annual rings tell the age of a tree.

The method also enables the canning experts to tell how much time the fish has spent in fresh or salt water.

Glasscock To Elect Three School Board Members Saturday

GARDEN CITY, March 30. —Three names for as many places will be on the school board ballot when Glasscock county voters go to the polls Saturday.

They are John Bednar, seeking re-election, Glen Riley and Ira Lee Watkins. M. W. O'Bannon, board secretary, and Carl Hightower, are not candidates to succeed themselves.

Voting will take place at Garden City and Lees with Mrs. W. R. Hobbs and Mrs. V. L. Roberts as election judges. Holdover trustees are H. A. Maynes, president, Henry Hilliger, W. E. Hughes and Price R. Stroud.

Last year the company's fleet of cabs travelled enough miles in serving the people of the Big Spring area to have circled the globe 27.4 times. To make this possible, Liner keeps the fleet at full force until about midnight, when it is reduced to six cars while others are serviced and kept in top condition.

A force of 25 drivers, plus three dispatchers, bookkeeper, radio repairman, mechanic, manager, is required to keep operations going smoothly. The number of employees varies between 30 and 35.

The fleet is composed of late model cars, all purchased new. Early in April new uniforms of army pinks, poplin shirts, summer jackets are to arrive for drivers.

DID HE REALLY KILL PAT?

Babich Case Is Bewildering To Citizens Of Milwaukee

MILWAUKEE, March 30. (U)—There seemed to be no reason why Milton Babich should become anything but a model citizen. Certainly, he was a model boy. But something went wrong and that is why Milwaukee is so bewildered by it all.

Milton Babich, 19, faces life in prison, if convicted of the first degree murder with which he is charged.

The state of Wisconsin says that this good-looking, well-mannered quiet youth killed 16-year-old Patricia Birmingham.

It charges that he did so because Patricia was flippant about her sister's pregnancy—the sister, Kathleen, 17, with whom Milton had been keeping company, and with whom he eloped two days before Patricia's bullet-pierced weighted body was found in the Milwaukee River.

Many people still find it hard to believe, despite Milton's statement to Dist. Atty. William J. McCauley, that he shot Patricia on her way home from school Feb. 10, Milton

said it was accidental.

But, says McCauley, Milton admits he bought a .22 caliber revolver two weeks before the shooting, intending to frighten pretty Patricia so she would quit making remarks about Kathleen's condition.

The gun, Babich told McCauley, discharged when Pat grabbed the barrel. His finger was on the trigger. It fired twice. Both shots struck the girl in the head. Desperately frightened, says Milton, he went to a nearby house which was under construction, obtained a building block and trussed Pat's legs with wire and rags. He loaded his grisly burden into the river. Then he tossed in the gun.

Mostly, those who find the story incredible are the people who knew Milton best before this happened. They knew him as president of his class at Suburban West Allis Central High School, as vice-president of the senior student council, winner of scholastic honors, co-editor of the school paper. They knew him as an industrious lad who saved \$1,400, who never got into fights or trouble of any sort, who objected to profanity, who had an intelligence quotient of 120, a youth just embarking on a college career.

"A likeable boy," said Dist. Atty. McCauley, "but still a killer."

McCauley successfully opposed Milton's release on bail pending a preliminary hearing April 12.

Not only in Milwaukee, but the nation, has become interested in this bizarre case.

Babich's plight—and that of his young bride and her unborn child—has been the subject of hundreds of newspaper stories, of sermons and just plain conversation. Babich himself has remained unruffled, cold, unmovable.

His story, as it has been unfolded, has been that of a youth who seemingly was driven to desperation by shame.

"I wish," he told a reporter, "I could take all the shame instead of having it fall on my parents, on Kathleen's and on Kathleen herself."

Even as he made his statement to McCauley, he asked if there wasn't some way to conceal the fact of Kathleen's pregnancy, to keep it out of newspapers.

And what has his 17-year-old wife said?

"Of course I'll stand by him," Later, she said: "To think I lived with him five days without suspecting it."

Said Mrs. Albert Birmingham, mother of Patricia and Kathleen: "We won't believe this terrible thing unless it's proven."

And Victor Babich, Milton's 21-year-old brother, added: "This is absolutely not first degree murder. Milton is incapable of doing a thing like that. He isn't that kind of a boy."

FLIERS CHEAT COYOTES OUT OF A JUICY DINNER OFF OF ANTELOPE

CRAIG, Colo.—(U)—Two civil air patrol pilots cheated a pair of coyotes out of an antelope dinner near here recently.

The fliers, Jay Brinker and P. Jones, were making a routine flight north of Craig. Brinker noticed two coyotes pussy-footing around a buck antelope which seemed to have its hind foot lifted high off the ground.

Brinker and Jones buzzed the area a couple of times and discovered the antelope's foot was caught between two strands of barbed wire. It had apparently tried to jump the wire fence. The coyotes were apparently waiting until the buck antelope became too weak to defend itself with its sharp front hooves.

The fliers returned to Craig and told Game Warden Bill Roland what they'd seen.

Then the three of them bundled into Roland's car and drove to a point within three miles of the antelope. They travelled the rest of the way on snowshoes, rescued the antelope by cutting the barbed wire. Taking it back to Craig they nursed it overnight and the next day the animal seemed in good shape.

Brinker suggested that since this particular antelope seemed "pretty much a fool" and unable to take care of itself properly, something should be done about it.

Warden Roland had the answer: He trussed the 150-pound buck, loaded it in the back of a truck, then began a tour of the region's mountain roads until he located a huge herd of antelope.

"When I let him out of the truck," Roland said, "he really hightailed it for the herd. I guess he figured he'd never see his own folks again."

Aviation Speed Up Getting Underway

SAN ANTONIO, March 30. (U)—Speeding up of the aviation training program at Randolph Air Force Base was getting well underway Tuesday.

First of 238 flying students who are scheduled to start training under the new eight class per year system were arriving. They will start six months of basic training next Monday.

Seven other air bases under the jurisdiction of Maj. Gen. James S. Stowell, commanding general of the Flying Division, Air Training Command, who has headquarters at Randolph, will be affected by the change.

These are Waco, Perrin, and Goodfellow Air Force Bases where basic training is given, and Enid, Okla., Barksdale, La., Williams AFB, Ariz., and Las Vegas, Nev., where advance training is received.

North Texas State To Fete Anniversary

DENTON, March 30. (U)—There won't be much studying at North Texas State College tomorrow.... they're going to celebrate.

The occasion will be the college's 50th anniversary as a state school. In these 50 years it has grown from a small privately operated school to one of Texas' biggest colleges.

Ex-students and others are expected to jam the campus for the occasion.

Established through community effort as a privately owned normal college in 1892, the school was first named the Texas Normal College.

In 1899 the city of Denton offered the building and grounds to the state to establish the state normal college. This donation was accepted in a bill signed by Gov. Joseph D. Sayers on March 31, 1899.

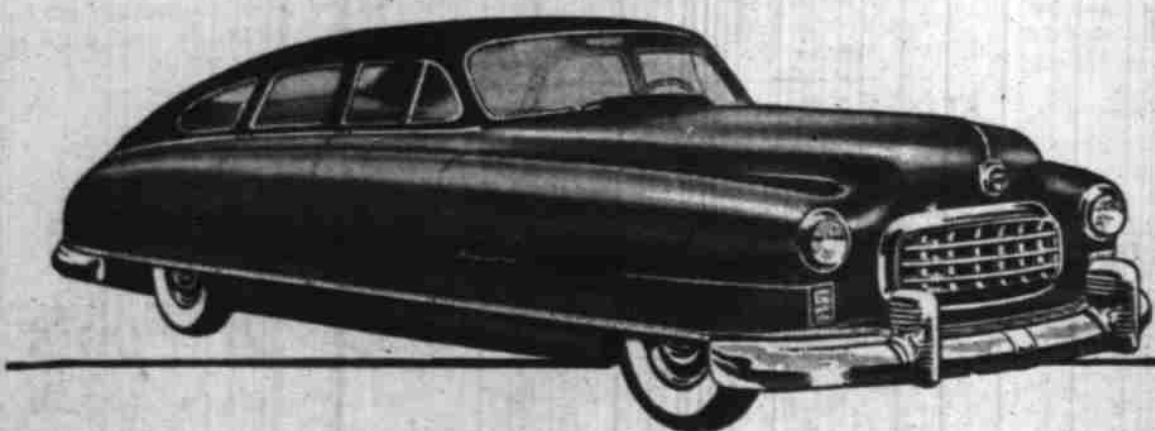

Civilian Women May Apply For WAC Commissions

Civilian women desiring to become an officer in the Women's Army Corps may apply for the third Officer Candidate class, to begin in October, by filing their applications not later than May 15, it was announced today by Lt. Fred N. Massey, in charge of the local U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station.

"Applicants from civilian life who previously have not had basic training will receive such training before starting the Officer Candidate course," said Lt. Massey.

To qualify for OCS an applicant must be between the age of 19 and 28, be single, pass screening tests and have two years accredited college education. An applicant who does not meet the college requirements, but is otherwise exceptionally qualified may establish eligibility by passing an appropriate educational examination.

The Officer Candidate School, located at Camp Lee, Virginia, offers a six-month course. Besides those enlisting directly from civilian life for OCS, selected WAC enlisted women also attend the school.

"Upon completion of the course, the candidates are commissioned second Lieutenants in the Organized Reserve Corps and will serve at least two years on active duty," continued Lt. Massey. Distinguished graduates will be considered for subsequent appointments as Second Lieutenants in the Regular Army.

Other graduates may be placed on competitive tours for one year, and if qualified, may be considered for Regular Army. Enlistees for the OCS who fail to complete the course successfully may be separated from the Army upon request.

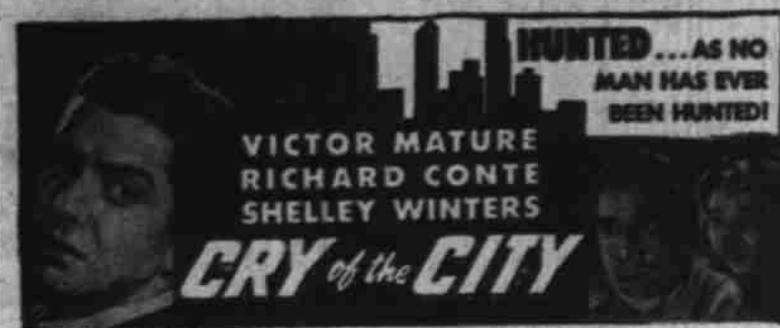

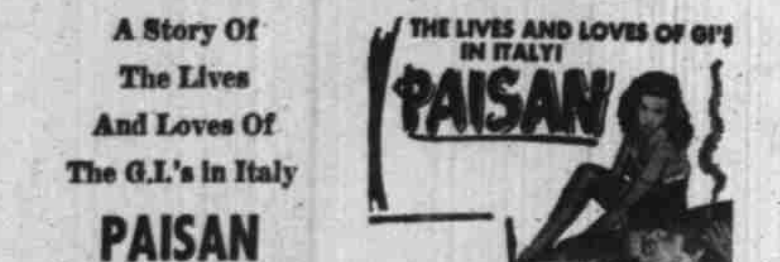

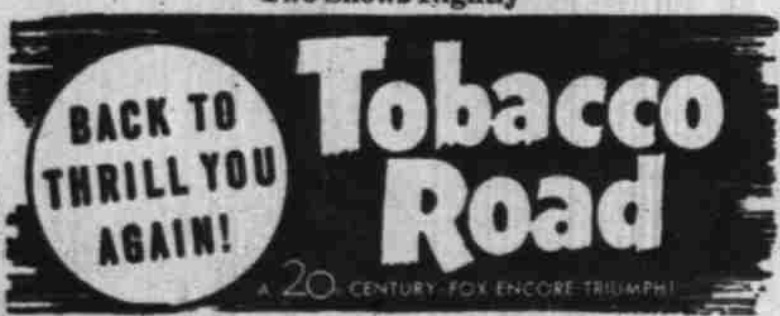

Russian War Hero Heads Soviet Zone

MOSCOW, March 30. (U. P.)—Army Gen. Vasily I. Chuikov, war-time hero of Stalingrad and Lublin, became military governor of the Soviet zone of Germany today, succeeding Marshal Vasily D. Sokolovsky.

Sokolovsky was promoted to principal assistant to the new minister of Soviet armed forces, Marshal

Doug Fairbanks, Junior, Will Be British Knight

HOLLYWOOD, March 30. (U. P.)—Old Doug Fairbanks' boy is going to be knighted by the king of England.

Douglas Fairbanks, Jr. was notified yesterday that he had been made an honorary knight commander of the most excellent order of the British Empire for his work in Anglo-American relations and for his chairmanship of CARE.

"I'm just about speechless," said the 39-year-old actor shortly after he was notified of the award, probably unprecedented to any American in the acting profession. He said he was "taken completely by surprise" by the joint notification from the British consulate here and in Washington.

"It's a tremendously fine gesture," declared Young Doug. "I am only representing the feelings of the average American in the work I have been doing."

He plans to go to Buckingham Palace to receive the knighthood in formal ceremony in late spring or early summer.

Besides his CARE post, Fairbanks is vice president of the United Nations Assn. in this country. He has been prominent in various civilian diplomatic missions, starting with duty as special envoy for the late President Roosevelt.

During the early years of the war he served with Lord Mountbatten's commandos, and later duties as commander in U. S. Navy destroyer forces brought him many honors.

Eve Believes In Mass Production

CHANUTE, Kan., March 30. (U. P.)—Kenneth George was kept busy today counting sheep.

George, a stockman at nearby Thayer, reported one of his five-year-old ewes gave birth to six lambs.

In Kansas City, Glen Thomas, a livestock commissioner, said he had never heard of as many as six lambs in one birth. He said the usual number was one or two, with three, occasionally.

SEN. TAYLOR APPEARS AT HEARING ON APPEAL FROM DISORDERLY COUNT

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 30. (U. P.)—U. S. Senator Glen Taylor (D-Idaho) was on hand today for a circuit court hearing of his appeal from a disorderly conduct conviction.

He said he would base his appeal on a contention that Birmingham's segregation laws are unconstitutional.

Taylor was arrested in Birmingham May 1. He was convicted in police court of disorderly conduct, resisting an officer and assault and battery.

The court fined him \$50 and gave him a suspended sentence of 180 days in jail.

Alexander M. Vassilievsky, Chulikov's appointment also was a promotion.

Announcement of the changes, like others in the continuing shake-up of top level Soviet officials, gave no explanation of the reasons. The people were told of the shifts in a brief broadcast by the Moscow radio and a 50 word item published in the morning newspapers.

Both men are widely known to the Soviet people. Chuikov commanded the 62nd Army Division in the defense of Stalingrad from September, 1942, to February, 1943, receiving the high honor of Order of Suovov, first class.

He participated also in the capture of Lublin, Poland, from the Germans.

His new title is commander-in-chief of Soviet occupation troops and head of Soviet military administration in Germany.

Sokolovsky also is a much-decorated war hero. He was honored for his exploits as commander of troops on the Soviet Russian front and his punishing campaign against the Germans. He became military governor in Germany in 1946, succeeding Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov.

It was Sokolovsky who staged the celebrated Russian walkout from four-power government of Germany.

Police Lineup Procedure Is Put In Reverse

ATLANTA, March 30. (U. P.)—The lights glared. Two men pointed to a nervous Negro in the police lineup.

"That's the man," they said. Detective Lt. Glyn Cowan chuckled and led the two men, also Negroes, off to jail where they were held in connection with a holdup. Then he explained:

It was the usual lineup procedure in reverse. The holdup victim was put under the lights, and the pair held in connection with the robbery pointed him out.

Cowan said Taxi Driver D. M. Strickland was so nervous he couldn't pick out anyone in the lineup.

But Robert Heard and William Burch had no trouble in recognizing their victim. Both admitted the \$7 holdup, the detective said.

Tries To Purchase Nettle In Candy With \$1,145 Check

DILLON, S. C., March 30. (U. P.)—An eight-year-old Negro boy is in jail today because he tried to buy a nettle's worth of candy.

But instead of paying cash for it, he offered a store clerk a check. Officers who held him without charge pending a hearing said the lad told this story:

On his way to school yesterday, he found a post office box key. Going to the post office, he opened a box with the key and found a letter. The letter contained a check. The check, payable to a Dillon auto sales firm, was for \$1,145.

Danish Prince Dies After Long Illness

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, March 30. (U. P.)—Prince Harald, uncle of King Frederick IX of Denmark and brother of King Haakon VII of Norway, died last night. He was 72.

Prince Harald married Princess Helen of Schleswig-Holstein-Sonderburg-Glücksburg in 1909 and had five children.

He was a Lt. General of the Danish army, chancellor of the Royal Orders, and a chevalier of the Order of the Elephant, the Seraphim and the Black Eagle.

The prince had been ill for several years.

Former Ziegfeld Star In Mental Home In California

LOS ANGELES, March 30. (U. P.)—Marion Elizabeth Watson, former Ziegfeld follies beauty, is in a mental institution today.

Superior Judge William J. Byrne ordered her confined yesterday after a Santa Monica rest home physician reported she had slashed her wrists. Previously she had been treated three times for overdoses of sleeping tablets.

Mrs. Watson, a "lady in black" who annually visited the tomb of Rudolph Valentino, reportedly received in 1934 a \$230,000 divorce settlement from Baron Rupperecht Von Boecklin. Later she was awarded \$25,000 yearly in another divorce settlement from Dr. Blake H. Watson.

Testimony yesterday disclosed she was nearly broke.

Woman Hanged

DALLAS, March 30. (U. P.)—The body of Mrs. William A. Allred, missing since last Thursday, was found hanging in the attic of her home. Detective Marvin Creech found the body yesterday.

Blast Kills Horses

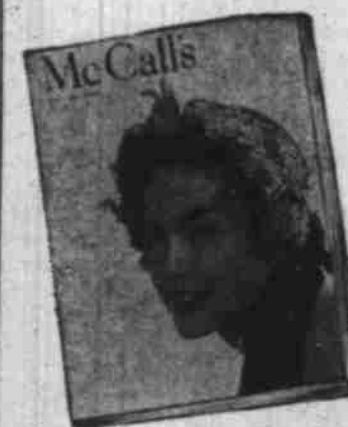
