Abilene Man Enters Race for Congress From 17th District

Bryan Bradbury, former state representative of Taylor County, who recently was given his honorable discharge from the United States navy this week became the sixth candidate for congress from this 17th district.

While in Hico Tuesday, Bradbury made his announcement with the statement that he would stage an extremely active campaign throughout the district.

He made the following statement:

To the people of the 17th congressional district of Texas. I am a candidate for the United States congress because I believe in human liberty. The most important issue facing this Republic today is the issue of liberty.

The greatest freedom for the people is found in a simplified government. The affairs of government have become so complex, so complicated and entwined in "red tape" that we are forced to ask ourselves, "Am I a citizen or am I a political slave?"

We are losing our liberty because the voice of the people is not heard with sufficient force in the halls of our congress. We are the victims of pressure groups, selfish interests, and political plunderers.

One reason for this is due to the fact that our congress is now operating under rules, traditions and procedures that are a hundred years out of date. The procedure is such that the wishes of the masses of the people cannot be effectively carried out.

The "seniority" rule and the "gag" rule and the worn out legislative machinery are the tools whereby a few selfish men can control and dominate our legislation. This is invisible government. Invisible government must go.

Under the "seniority" system a member of congress becomes chairman of a committee just because he has been there longer than anyone else regardless of his ability or his background. Time and not brains is the measuring rod. How ridiculous.

I do not believe that a member of congress should be forced to sit in a corner for ten years before being recognized or given consideration. When I go to congress I will speak whenever I have something to say and won't play second fiddle to any self-appointed congressional dictator.

We need new ideas in congress. The old beaten path is littered with political corpses. We must be willing to dare and to do.

We need men in congress with intelligence to think and with backbone to act and not to be mere messenger boys for some special interests.

As a veteran who served in World War II as an enlisted man, I am well acquainted with the problems of the veteran. The large quantities of surplus property that was to be sold to returning service men in order to give them a new start in life has a large extent been wasted, destroyed, or lost in red tape. Many veterans have traveled thousands of miles, stood in driving rains and held priority certificates for months and have been unable to secure any surplus property at all. This shameful practice must be changed.

Contract for Hico's new hospital and clinic has been let to J. B. Ferguson of Gainesville, and the construction company's foreman was in Hico Thursday preparing to break ground for the project early next week. Sufficient materials are on hand to insure steady progress, according to hospital officials, who expect the building to be completed in five or six months.

Plans call for a 10-bed hospital, with offices for two doctors, operating room, nursery, etc. The structure will be completely air-conditioned and sound-proofed. It is stated, Type of exterior finish is as yet undetermined, pending the availability of materials.

Officers of the incorporated co-operative organization are: T. A. Randals, president; J. G. Gollightly, vice-president; and G. M. Barrow, secretary-treasurer. They with J. W. Richbourg and Dr. H. V. Hedges compose the board of directors.

Announcement is made by officials that sufficient shares have been sold to assure completion of the project along the lines first planned. However, they point out, there are still some shares available to those who may wish to have a part in this civic enterprise.

Hundreds of friends, neighbors and acquaintances gathered at the home of Mrs. J. A. Shaw (better known as Aunt Celia) last Friday, April 12, to join her in a celebration of her 100th birthday. There were in all about 300 who enjoyed the occasion arranged by friends and neighbors to take place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Talley who have so conscientiously and attentively cared for her during her latter years. They live near Johnsville, Erath County, a short distance from the Shaw home place which, as Aunt Celia remembers, cost them \$1200 for 80 acres.

"And I recall," she adds, "that land all through this section could have been bought when we came here for 50 cents an acre. My husband always said he didn't want to own any land."

A fine yearling was killed to furnish the barbecue and the long table was heavily loaded with all kinds of appetizing foods, of which Aunt Celia partook even to a second helping. Photographers, newspaper representatives and candidates mingled with the crowd on hand for the noon meal and the social features in the afternoon. Also present were Coleman D.

Tom Breneman, master of ceremonies on the "Breakfast in Hollywood" radio program, sent an orchid to Mrs. Shaw, intended to be delivered on her birthday but unfortunately delayed until Monday when it was taken out by a rural carrier.

Born in Louisa County, Ala., April 12, 1846 Aunt Celia with her husband and family migrated to Texas, arriving at the site of the little town of Johnsville the last day of 1877, before Hico and Stephenville and Dublin were settled, as she remembers. Mr. Shaw had fought through the entire four years of the Civil War under the leadership of the great Gen. Robt. E. Lee. The husband was buried in the Johnsville Cemetery in 1936, at the age of 92 years and six months. One daughter, Mrs. J. B. Bunch, who is now past 80 years of age, and Tommie Shaw, a son who lives with his mother, and Daniel M. Shaw of Phoenix, Ariz., are her only children.

Aunt Celia does not like to talk of the privations and the many obstacles she encountered back in Civil War days and several years before, although she does have an almost unbelievable memory. She likes to speak of better times, and at her birthday party seemed to be more anxious that her friends enjoy it than that she be catered to.

This pioneer has been a member of the Church of Christ for over 75 years and her most prized possession is her Bible, which she warned the writer to be careful in handling as he searched through the old family album for some dates. This Bible is over 200 years old, having been handed down by the great-grandparents, and the book is in good condition.

Aunt Celia asked that we thank her many friends for the nice presents and gifts of money and for the nice cakes with 100 candles on them. She says it is a great world and she has now been here a long time. To this last statement we must all heartily agree. Stay in there, Aunt Celia, you have been and are a great woman.

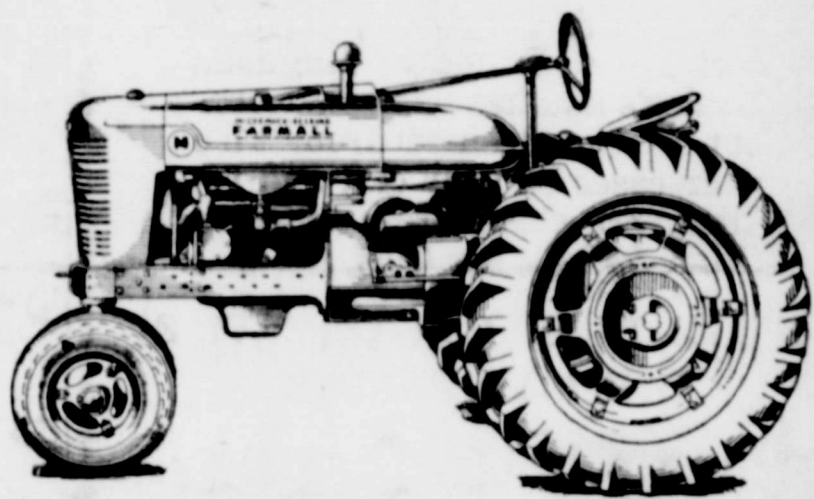

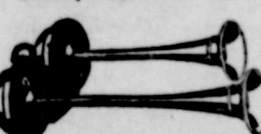

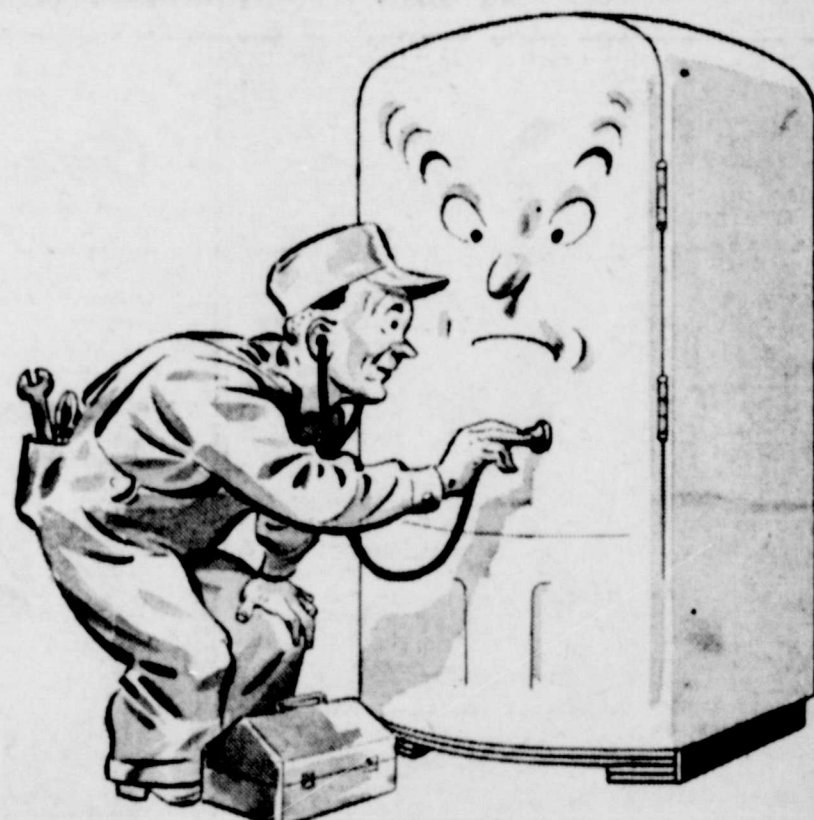

and building materials in closed army camps and navy bases to build a million homes. Unexcused delay should cease. Homes should be immediately provided. It can be done with the use of some initiative and foresight.

The "GI" Bill of Rights has some worthy features but in many respects is the "GI" Bill of Disappointment. It must be amended in order to become the "GI Bill of Opportunity."

Hospitalization, compensation, speedy adjustment of claims, and adequate care for widows and orphans of deceased veterans must be provided together with other humanitarian legislation.

The "caste" system in our military services must be abolished. We must have more democracy in our armed forces. There is too much distinction between officers and enlisted men, too much discrimination between senior and junior officers, and too great a gulf between the professionals and reserves. Terminal leave pay should be granted enlisted men the same as officers. I served in the Navy as an enlisted man wearing the little white hat and I am well acquainted with these conditions.

Strikes cannot be stopped by loud talking or political speeches. Intelligence and courage are needed. When I go to congress I will not be the representative of labor unions as such, or of industry, but of all the people no matter what their occupation or profession.

Because of the cheap dollar and increased cost of living the old age pensions no longer buy as much as they once did. Increased wages have been granted to labor and other groups while the old people have been ignored. I favor materially increasing the old age pensions and favor reducing the age qualifications from 65 to 60.

Rural electrification must be extended to more farm and ranch homes. There is a determined effort under way to destroy the REA. I am opposed to such move and want the REA retained in ownership and operation by the farmers and ranchers. I stand ready to assist in this program in any way that I can. At a later time I will discuss farm problems in detail.

This will not be an ordinary political campaign — it will be a crusade. A crusade for freedom and liberty on behalf of the people. The shackles of invincible government must be broken. We need fresh ideas and a will to work, to study and to courageously forge ahead if we are to meet the challenging problems of this atomic age.

I am nearly thirty-four years of age, married, and have one child. I was admitted to the practice of law in 1934. I am a graduate of Abilene High School and attended McMurray college and the University of Texas. In 1934 I was elected to the Texas Legislature and served for six years. In 1943 I rejected a deferment and entered the Navy, and was honorably discharged in March of this year. I am a member of the Baptist church, Knights of Pythias Lodge, and several civic organizations.
