

Hart Day 'Fever' Rises

Big events are in store next week with the annual celebration of Hart Day, an affair begun in 1966 in conjunction with the Castro County Round-up.

Carnival rides for the young-in-years and young-in-heart will be sponsored by Hart Lions Club and will begin Thursday night to launch this year's celebration.

Friday has been designated as Western Day and any person caught downtown between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. without western costume will be fined.

Lions will begin cooking up their famous charcoaled hamburgers at 6 p.m. Friday with an accompanying Coke concession. Bingo will be on the menu also, sponsored by the Lions. Other organizations will also

open booths Friday evening.

A street square dance will begin at 9 p.m. to climax the first day's activities.

Members of Good Neighbors Club will serve again as this year's official hostesses for the registration of old settlers, out of town visitors and local friends. Registration headquarters, where refreshments will be served, is the community room of Farmers State Bank. Hours are 9:30 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Parking lot of Farmers State Bank will be the setting for an arts and crafts show and sale with local artists and craftsmen displaying and selling their work. Sponsored by Chi Psi Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, the show and sale will feature paintings, macrame, purses and other handcrafted or created

items.

Home Demonstration Club members will be sponsoring a quilt show from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. in the building formerly occupied by Kittrell's Electronics, next door to the city hall. Featured quilts will be fancy and plain, new and old, historic or heirloom.

Local merchants have donated merchandise which will be given away at 9:30 a.m. in a drawing under the direction of Karen Foster, Miss Hart Day 1974, and Roy Taack. Persons must be present to win.

Hart Volunteer Firemen have been accepting contributions for a gun which will be given away during the merchandise drawing. Winner of the gun does not have to be present to win.

Hamburgers will again be served fresh from the Lions grill beginning at 11 a.m. and bingo games will begin.

Various booths will be operated by Xi Mu Iota Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi, Zealot Club, Band Boosters, Castro County Cowbells and Future Teachers of America.

Hart Day celebrants will be on the alert Saturday since rumors have spread that a shoot-out will take place sometime during the festivities.

A gala parade will begin the march down Broadway at 2 p.m. with Charles Black and Cleve McLain serving as parade marshals. Parade entrants will assemble at 12:30 on Avenue A west of Broadway for judging.

New to this year's Hart Day celebration is the naming of Miss Flapper 1975. Local businesses and organizations are sponsoring candidates, 65 years of age and older, in the contest. Votes are one penny and the candidate receiving the most votes will be named Miss Flapper. Her identity will be revealed during the parade.

Sponsored by the Good Neighbor Club, proceeds will be contributed to Hart Cemetery Association.

Volunteer Firemen will sponsor "water polo" at 4 p.m. in front of the Phillips 66 Station.

Climaxing the two-day festival will be the coronation Saturday evening of Miss Hart in 9 p.m. ceremonies in downtown Hart.

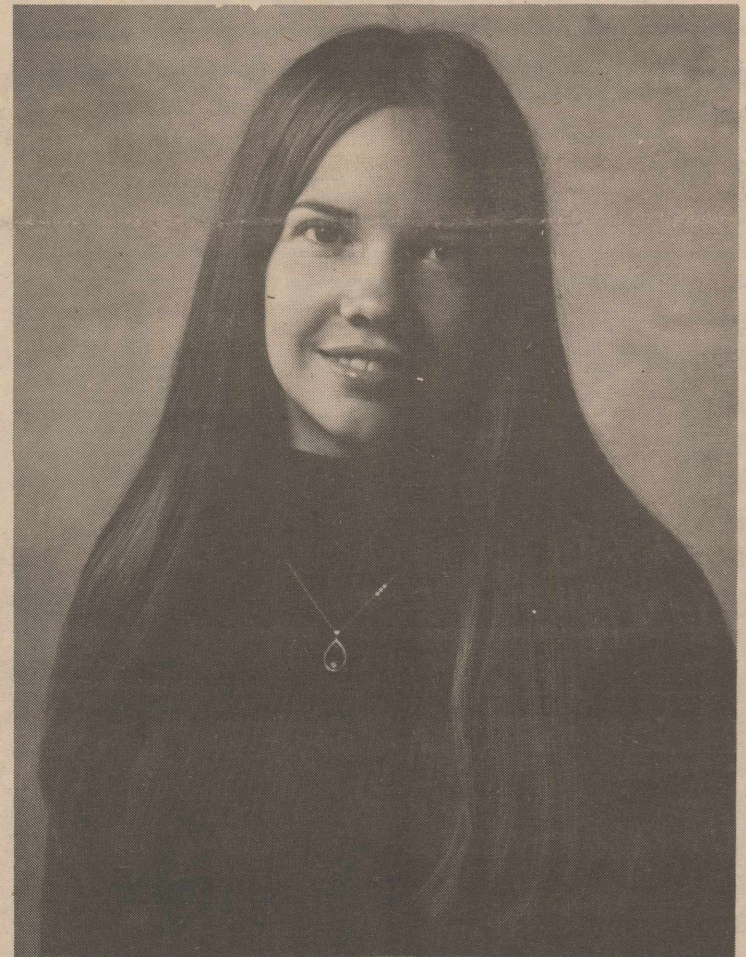
In other action, Lions voted to provide transportation for Patricia Martinez to

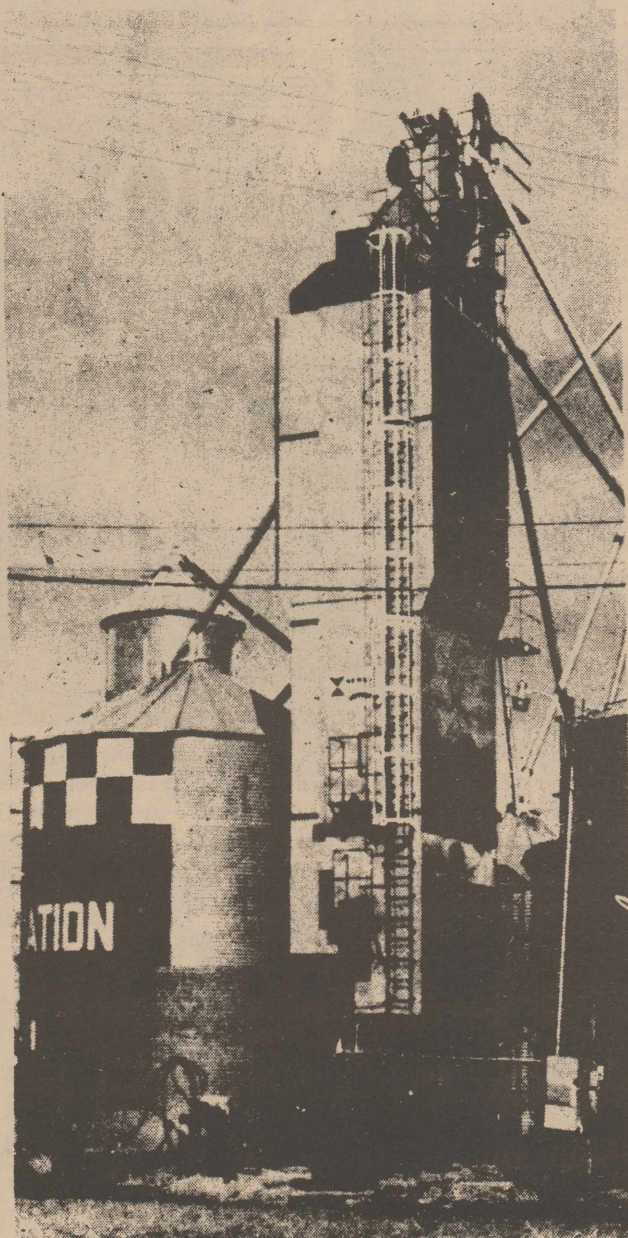

RED CINNAMON PICKLES

2 gal. cucumber rings (peeled and seeded)

Mix 2 cups lime and 8 1/2 qts. water and let stand for 24 hrs.

Drain and wash thru cold waters. Let stand 3 hrs. in cold water. Add ice cubes if available.

Drain and cover with--
1 cup vinegar
1 small bottle red food coloring
1 tablespoon alum
Water enough to cover.

Simmer for 3 hrs. Drain.

Make a syrup of--
3 cups vinegar
3 cups water
15 cups sugar
12 sticks of cinnamon
30 ozs. of red hots

Heat and dissolve and pour over rings.

Drain, heat, and pour over rings for 3 days.

Fourth day, reheat and pour in hot jars and seal.

WESTERN SPAGHETTI

1 1/2 lbs. round beef cubed
5 c. tomato juice
2 c. water

1/2 c. thinly sliced onions
1/2 c. sliced stuffed olives (green)

1/2 c. pitted ripe olives
1 - 8 or 9 oz. pkg. of spaghetti

1 tsp salt
1/8 tsp. pepper

2 c. cubed American cheese

Brown beef in a dutch oven.

Add tomato juice and water and simmer covered about 15 minutes or until tender. Add remaining ingredients except cheese and cook over low heat, covered, until spaghetti and meat are tender (about 30 minutes) Add cheese and toss to blend. Serves 6 to 8 generously.

FRIED CUCUMBERS

Peel cucumbers and slice

lengthwise salted water

Pancake batter (your favorite)

Soak cucumbers 1/2 hr. in salted water, drain and wipe dry. Dip slices in pancake batter and brown in deep fat, slowly on both sides.

Serve immediately.

RED BEAN PIE

1 1/2 c. cooked mashed red beans
1/2 c. sugar

2 eggs
1 1/2 c. milk (part canned milk)

1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. ginger

dash of salt
1 tbs. molasses

Blend ingredients. Cook until thick. Fill pie shell. Bake until knife comes out clean at around 325 degrees.

recipient that same day.
 "In order to get into the program, persons simply bring in their next Social Security check from which the necessary information is obtained. There are no charges for handling, providing the customer does not overdraw his or her account," Werner states.

"We will fill out all the necessary forms, which the customer must sign and from then on, his or her check will be mailed directly to us for deposit."

All other correspondence from the social security office comes directly to those who receive checks. Different ways of handling the account can be set up. Persons wishing to have a portion of their check placed in a savings account and the remainder in checking account may do so by stating on the form. Other ways of handling the account may also be worked out.

In the event a persons wishes to withdraw from the program, all that is necessary is simply to notify the bank of the desire to cancel the agreement.

Additional information may be obtained by calling the bank.

Alfred "Dino" Tilton, brother of the bride, was ring bearer.

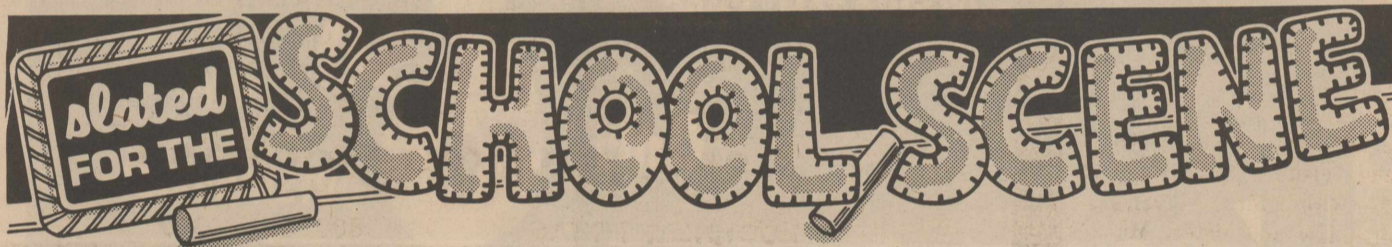
