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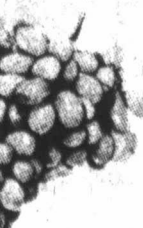

Indictment returned in recent murder case

Eight individuals were indicted by the Mitchell County grand jury Thursday. Included in the felony indictments was Robert Garza for murder in the shooting death of Kelvin Bailey on August 9. Garza was arrested on Monday, August 10 when he surrendered himself to local law authorities. Bond was originally set at \$50,000 but was later reduced to \$10,000 and Garza subsequently made bond.

Ernest Aguilar, 32, of 804 E. 12, was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in an August 2 incident. Jessie Aguilar, Sr., 41, of Route 1, Box 5, Loraine, was indicted on two counts. Aguilar, who is also known by the name of "Lucky", was charged with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and also criminal intent to murder. Benjamin Reyes Gomez, 17, of 1110 Runnels in Sweetwater was indicted on four counts including

two for the burglary of a motor vehicle, one for the unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and one for burglary of a building. Four felony driving while intoxicated charges were returned by the grand jury including Joe Refugio Gonzalez, 36, of Rt. 3, Box 40; Pablo Lujan Rodriguez, 52, of 632 Cypress; Alfredo Pineda, 25, of 312 Cherry and Donnie Ray Upshaw, 38, of 333 N. Chandler Drive of Fort Worth.

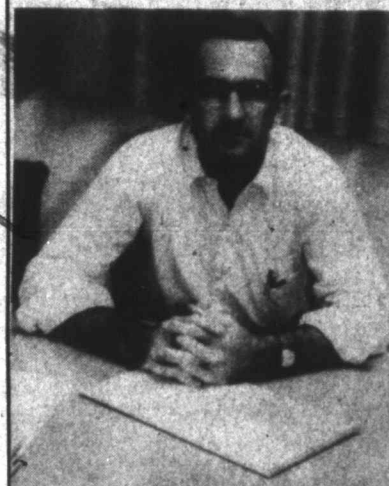
Colorado ISD sets effective tax rate

In a called meeting Wednesday night, the Colorado ISD set the effective tax rate at .515 per \$100 valuation, an increase from last year's rate of .455. The increase is due to the drop in taxable values of the district. The board also dropped the admission charge for volleyball games this school year as the new district Colorado City will participate in voted not to charge to

Rogers to retire from Lone Wolf



Rogers in 1966 Just starting at Lone Wolf

Kenneth Rogers grew up a minister's son. Though his parents urged him to follow in his father's footsteps, he never seriously considered doing so. His life's work lay in another direction. After devoting his entire adult life to electric utility work, Rogers will retire as the manager of Lone Wolf Electric August 28.

Though he was born in Ogilville, Indiana, to Chester and Eva Rogers, the family moved to New Mexico when Rogers was three years old. "With my father being a minister, we moved around

quite a bit," he says. Up until Roger's entry into junior high, the family lived in Albuquerque. After a year in Sacramento, New Mexico, they moved to Lake Arthur, where Rogers finished high school.

After graduation, Rogers returned to Albuquerque, where he attended the University of New Mexico.

Rogers' first taste of the electric utility business came in Artesia, where he went to work for Central Valley Electric Cooperative, as a member of the line crew.

Rogers learned how to climb poles in Artesia and also learned much of what would serve him well for the rest of his career.

"I think this kind of experience helps anyone who later takes over a management position in a co-op," Rogers said. "By working with a crew, you become familiar with the outside work that goes on, you're aware of the conditions under which those crews have to work. I know that because I was aware of the conditions, I tended to always be searching for ways to improve those conditions whenever possible."

went to work on a line, were primitive to say the least. All holes were dug by hand, using a "shovel" and "spoon". One of these long-handled tools was used for digging, the other for removing the dirt from the hole.

In rocky areas, it wasn't possible to use these tools. Instead, a long-handled tool called a "bar" was used to chip away the rock until the hole was deep enough to hold the pole.

Setting the poles was no easier. An A-frame truck was used to set poles - when the truck could get to the work site. When it could not, this job, too, was done by hand.

Tools called "pikes" and "jennies" were used to set poles. The rods allowed the men to maneuver the poles and the jennies were used as a support under the poles until the pikes could be set.

Holes were dug and poles were set, in those days, primarily by brute force. It was hard and dangerous work.

There were no bucket trucks in 1947. "I think being a lineman was a more dangerous occupation than it is today," said Rogers. "We didn't have the technical knowledge we have now, or the

safety devices available today. We learned by doing and, though it's a good way to learn, we had a lot of accidents that wouldn't happen today."

Rogers remembered most of his early utility work as primarily heavy construction, the actual building of the lines. Experienced linemen were valuable commodities.

"We had a lot of what were called 'boomer linemen' in those days," Rogers said. "These were experienced linemen, good at what they did, and hard workers. A lot of co-ops were building lines, and their services were always needed. They tended to move around from one co-op to another, never staying in one place very long."

About three years after Rogers began work for the co-op, he was forced to return home because of his parents' failing health. After moving back, he worked for a co-op in Mountain Air, then for the Socorro, New Mexico, Electric Co-Op. "I guess I had a little 'boomer blood' in me there for a while," says Rogers, "because I changed jobs several times in a short while,

but thank goodness, it didn't last too long."

For the three months prior to his enlistment in the U.S. Navy, Rogers worked as a lineman in Texas. He would never again work as a civilian in any state but Texas. Community Public Service in Pecos hired him as a lineman.

In the Navy, also, Rogers continued his utility line training and work. But first came boot camp in San Diego. After his assignment to the Sea Bees, he went to Oxnard, California, for 12 more weeks of training. Then came 18 months of overseas duty in Guam and the Eastern Carolina Islands of Ponape and Truk, in the Pacific.

Following overseas duty, Rogers was stationed at an amphibious base in Coronado, California.

When Rogers' tour of duty was over, he returned to Pecos and his lineman's job with Community Public Service. His responsibilities were different, however, than they had been when he left the co-op to join the Navy. He brought with him his bride, Shirley Young Rogers, whom he had met in Artesia.

During those nine years, Rogers and his wife, Shirley, had three children. Bobby was born in 1957, Michael in 1961 and Shauna in 1963.

As a JT&S instructor, much of Rogers' time was spent on the road. When his oldest child was eight, he felt he was needed at home more, and he began to look for a job that involved less travel, but was still concerned with the electric utility industry, where most of his training and experience was concentrated.

He found a job that met his needs when James Hull, manager of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, offered him the job of Line Superintendent in Colorado City.

First day on the job for Rogers at Lone Wolf was August 29, 1966. In 1969, James Hull accepted the management job at the Deaf Smith Co-Op in Hereford and the board offered the Lone Wolf management spot to Rogers.

"Change of management was about the only thing that changed when Rogers took over the reins of Lone Wolf. 'James Hull was a good manager,' Roger says, "and no drastic changes were needed."

Rogers managed Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative for 23 years with one main priority: to bring the membership of Lone Wolf the best possible service at the lowest possible cost. One of his management goals was constant improvement of service. And, of course, he never forgot his days of working on a line crew - improvement of working conditions for his employees was always a major concern.

In 1991, Rogers, along with the Lone Wolf board, made the decision to ask for a membership vote on a proposition to combine the cooperative with Cap Rock Electric, headquartered in Stanton. The membership voted overwhelmingly to do so and in late 1991, the Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative became the Lone Wolf Division of Cap Rock Electric Cooperative.

"I feel very comfortable with what has happened at Lone Wolf," says Rogers. "I think the combination with Cap Rock Electric has been the best move we've ever made. I feel that Lone Wolf is stronger and safer now, in no danger of being bought by an investor-owned utility or some other utility giant. We were able to remain a cooperative, owned by those we serve. I feel our employees are in good hands and they all seem very satisfied and happy."

On August 28, Kenneth Rogers will leave the co-op he has led since 1969. Beverly Collier, the co-op's present office manager, will take over as manager.

"I hired Beverly myself back in 1976", said Rogers. "She went to

work as a receptionist. She also worked as my secretary before being named office manager in 1986. She has the support of the employees and the directors. She is a very conscientious person and the interest of the co-op membership is always her highest priority."

Rogers says he has great respect for Collier's management abilities. He said, "I strongly supported the decision of Cap Rock's CEO, David Pruitt, in naming her the Lone Wolf Division Manager."

Rogers can now make plans for his future leisure time, knowing his co-op's future is no longer in doubt. Those plans include logging hours as a pilot. Rogers received his pilot's license in 1951. He started work on gaining the license when he was 18 years old, then put it aside for a number of years. He sold part ownership of a plane in 1990, but his future plans include part ownership of another plane.

"I'll stay busy," he says. "I'll spend a lot of time in my shop and I plan to volunteer many more hours to the Red Cross." Rogers is chairman of the Mitchell County Red Cross chapter and has logged many hours helping people who have survived disasters. Most recently, he assisted citizens of Coahoma after a tornado ravaged that community last June.

In addition to his Red Cross volunteer work, Rogers is a member and twice past president of the Kiwanis. He is Chairman of the Board of the Community Mission in Colorado City and is a lay speaker at his church.

Kenneth and Shirley have six grandchildren. They plan to spend more time with the ones who live close enough to visit on a regular basis. They have no plans to move anywhere else after retirement.

"Colorado City is our home," said Rogers. "We own our home here, all three of our children graduated from high school here. It's been our home for the last 26 years. We plan to stay. I'll stay in touch with my friends at Lone Wolf. We've been staunch and loyal supporters, as well as customers, for the last 23 years, and that's not going to change now."

A retirement reception will be hosted in honor of the retirement of Kenneth Rogers by his fellow employees. The reception is scheduled for Friday, August 28, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Medallion Room of Lone Wolf. All friends of Kenneth Rogers are invited to attend.

Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the freeze and rain.

Mr. Cumbie said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loans needed to continue in business of \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be

accepted until March 1, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.

FmHA office in Sweetwater is located at 103 West Florida and is open from 9:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday.


TWD approves matching grants for testing equipment

The Texas Water Development Board today approved matching grants to 13 districts for agricultural water conservation grants totaling \$84,710.44 for the purchase of agricultural water conservation or water quality testing equipment. The funds will come from the Agricultural Conservation Grants to Districts Program, which allows local conservation districts to purchase equipment for use in district programs to promote agricultural water conservation or water quality testing.

Included in the grants were: Lower Colorado River Authority, \$21,750.00 for irrigation water measuring equipment - canals; Upper Clear Fork S&WCD (Fisher County), \$1,200.00 for video equipment; Plateau UWCD (Schleicher County), \$7,462.50 for water quality testing equipment; Lipan-Kickapoo WCD (Concho and Tom Green Counties), \$2,268.75 for water quality testing equipment; and Mitchell County S&WCD, \$2,238.75 for electronic elevation equipment.

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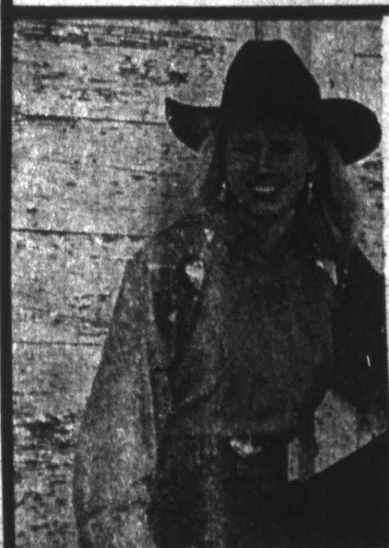

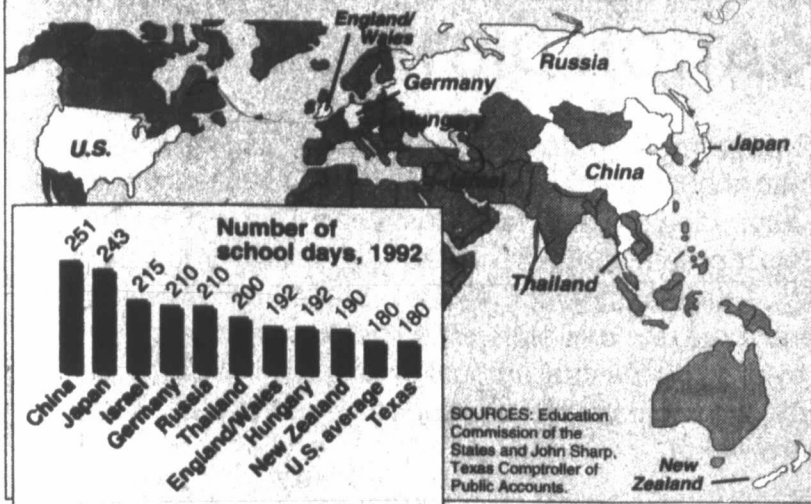

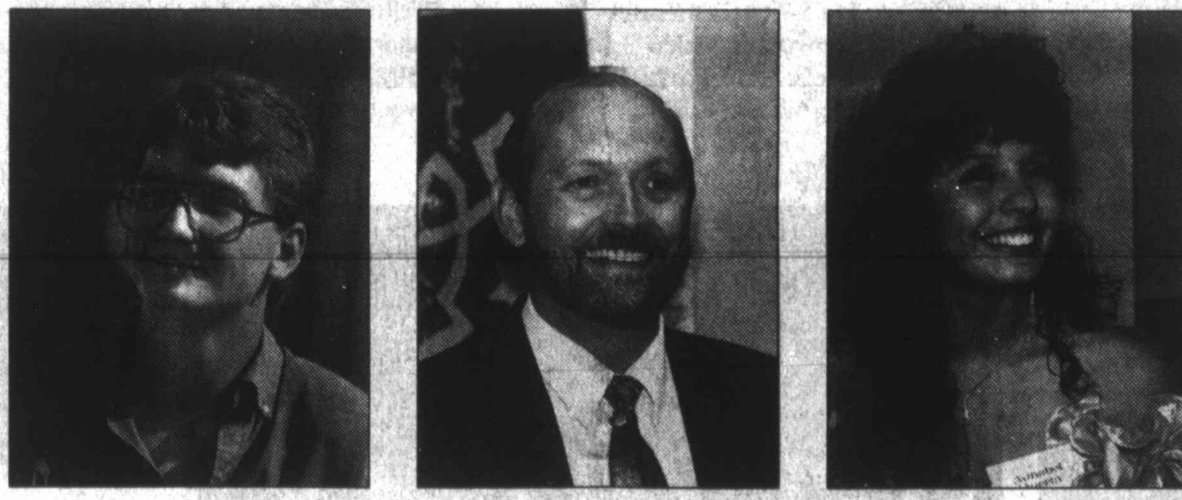

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Dove season opens Sept. 1

September 1 means one thing to Texas hunters, the start of dove season.

Randy Bullard, Game Warden, reminds hunters that last years licenses expires on August 31 and new ones are required to match the hunting calendar-year which begins on September 1.

With Mitchell County being split by interstate 20, the county falls into two dove hunting zones.

North of IH 20 is considered to be in the North Zone. South of IH 20 is considered to be in the Central Zone.

The north zone dove season opens on September 1 and will be open until November 9.

The central zone will have a split dove season. The first will open on September 1 and be halted on October 31. The second segment of the split season will begin on January 2, 1993 and remain open until January 10, 1993.

Shooting hours for dove hunters remain one-half hour before sunrise to sunset at does the daily bag limit of 12 mourning dove.

Bullard reminded hunters that it is unlawful to hunt dove with any other firearm other than a shotgun.

Other unlawful means and methods include:

Baiting (placing feed such as corn, wheat, salt or other feed to lure birds) and hunting over baited areas. Any area that has been baited is considered to be a baited area for 10 days following the complete removal of all bait materials. Standing crops or fields containing shocked grain or grain scattered by normal agricultural activities are not considered baited areas.

Using live birds as decoys. Using recorded or electronically amplified bird calls or sounds.

Concealment by use of sinkbox (a low floating device permitting a hunter to conceal himself below the surface of the water) or by the use of livestock either on land or water.

Hunting from or by means of

motor-driven vehicles and land conveyances or aircraft of any kind except paraplegics and single or double amputees of legs may hunt from stationary motor-driven vehicles or land conveyances.

Using motor-driven land, water or air conveyances or sailboat to concentrate, drive, rally or stir up any migratory game bird.

A hunting license for Texas residents, which will be effective on September 1 and expire on August 31, will cost \$13 this year.

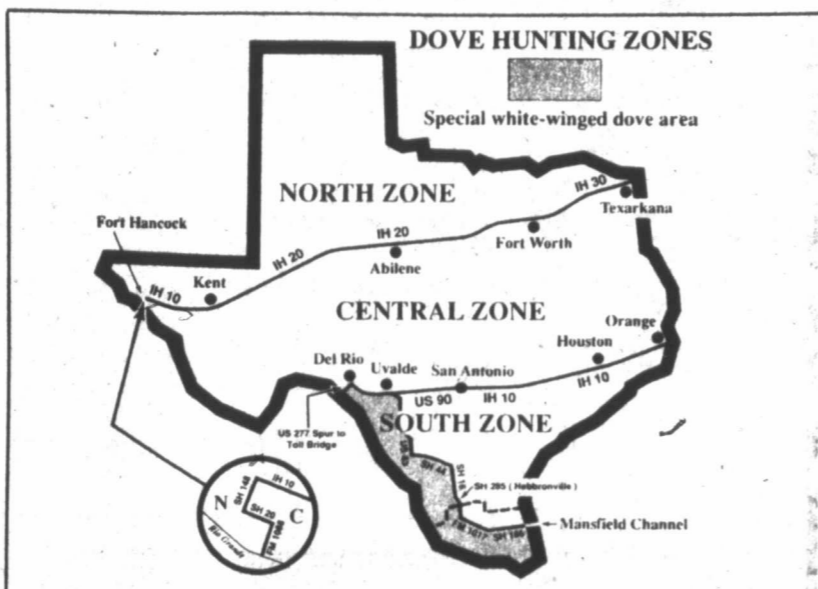
A special resident hunting license, costing \$6, will be required

for hunters younger than 17 or older than 65.

The resident combination hunting and fishing license has a cost of \$25.

Bullard pointed out that new additions in fee requirements include an archery stamp, at \$7, and a turkey stamp, at \$5, which are required beginning this year for those types of hunting.

Also noted was that a trappers stamp, costing \$15, is required for all persons who hunt, shoot or take those species classified as furbearing animals or their pelts.

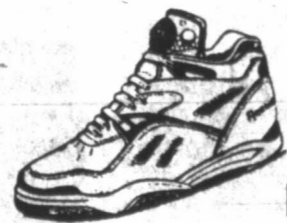

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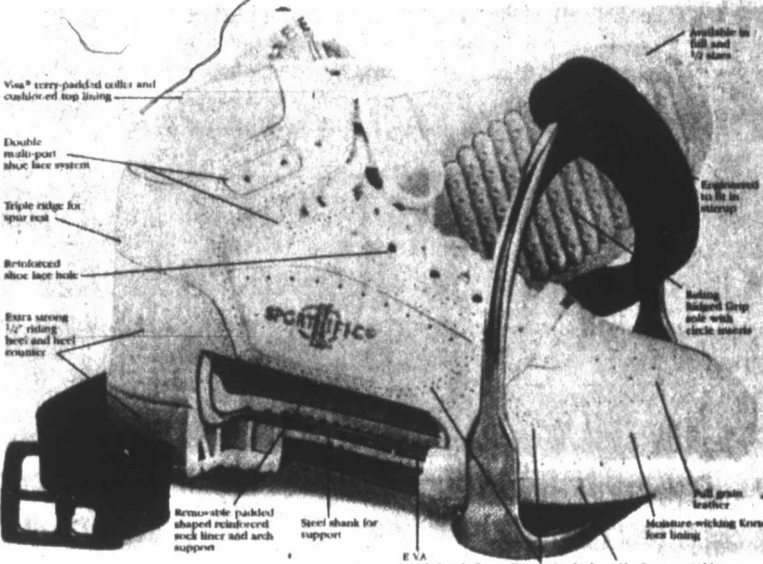
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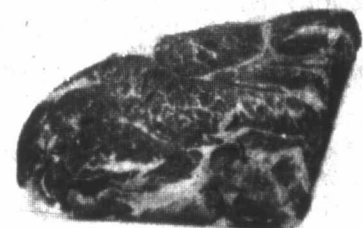
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
