LUBBOCK SHOULD TAKE LEAD IN MOVE TO GET DROUTH RELIEF FOR AREAS ON SOUTH PLAINS, LOCAL BANKER STATES

"Now that President Hoover has signed the drouth relief bill it is up to us here in Lubbock to get some substantial government aid for the people of the South Plains," W. O. Stevens, vice-president of the Citizens National bank declared today in an interview.

"A part of the county is in as bad condition from the drouth as any other section of the South Plains," he continued. "They are needing help over there and need it badly."

Mr. Stevens said that details had not been received here as to the operation of the proposed drouth relief measures. He is expecting word from Washington in a short time telling how the applications for aid should be made.

Should Discuss Matter
"In my opinion, the chamber of commerce, the bankers, the business men and the farmers should get together and see what can be done," he continued. "Perhaps the county commissioners' court should make application. Perhaps the chamber of commerce. I should like to see every organization do what is necessary."

There are a good many farmers, Mr. Stevens pointed out, who are in such shape that their situation cannot be helped by aid through the intermediate credit banks, such as have been organized at Ralls, Spur, Memphis and Lockney. They need loans on their crops for 1931, with the government aiding, he added.

"The government should be prepared to stand a loss if the crops are not big enough. It should be understood that the government will take the loss if farmers do not get a good crop."

Mr. Stevens pointed out that the eastern section of the Plains country, Crosby, Garza, Dickens and other counties are all seriously affected by the drouth conditions. The situation as it exists in the eastern section of this country, he added, was county-wide in the other counties.

"Lubbock should take the lead and do what it can to get any federal aid for the counties in its territory," the banker declared.

KANSAS COBBLER LOANS KIDDIES OUT FOR AWHILE "UNTIL THINGS BREAK"; TO HAVE CHRISTMAS, TOYS AND SUCH

WELLSVILLE, Kas., Dec. 23.—The seven motherless children of Thomas Dorsey presented a huge problem in domestic economics. As he sat at his cobbler's bench he wondered how he could give them a Christmas without food, warm clothes and a Christmas tree.

Then in the window of his shop he placed this sign: "Children to give away, can't feed them longer."

Some came to scoff at the sign. They said it was heartless. But the same neighbor woman who had been so kind

when Mrs. Dorsey died last spring, did not condemn the cobbler. Through their efforts the four smaller children were placed in homes where they will have Christmas with food, toys and warm clothes. The other three children are boys and work at odd jobs when they can find them.

Dorsey explained that he was just "lending" my babies out until things break.

"It's hard," he said, "to have your little baby put his arms around your neck and say, 'You're not going to give me away, are you daddy?'"

Texas Gets \$5,088,080 Road Aid POOR TO RECEIVE GIFTS

U. S. FUNDS TO BE AVAILABLE AT ONCE

FEDERAL HIGHWAY AID BEING DISTRIBUTED AMONG STATES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—State highway departments were notified today that their respective portions of the \$80,000,000 emergency highway construction appropriation is available immediately.
The Texas share of the fund is \$5,088,080.
The federal aid money is to be officially apportioned today by Secretary Hyde.

Includes 1932
The action will make all of the \$80,000,000 available to the states for use in matching their regular federal aid apportionments, including those for the fiscal year 1932.

Captain C. D. Curtis, chief of the control of the bureau of public roads, pointed out that to the extent that states have plans ready for work the appropriation would mean nearly double that amount of \$160,000,000 of new highway construction.

He estimated more than one half of the money would go directly to the states.

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PLAINS TOWNS PLAN FETES

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS TO BE STAGED BY OLTON-CROSBYTON

OLTON, Dec. 23.—(Staff Special)—When Santa Claus comes to this county seat town off from a railroad, Wednesday night, to attend the union church program to be held at the high school auditorium, he will find that everything necessary has been done beforehand by his fellow workers here to make ready for his visit.

Five of the Olton churches, the Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Church of Christ and Nazarene have united in the program.

Organizations Working
The churches, the Parent-Teachers association and the community relief committee are sponsoring the program. Local business men are also backing the program and it is expected the affair will be the largest ever held here.

In cooperation there will be a distribution of baskets of food and clothing to needy families. The relief committee, organized several months ago, is working on this and has the affair well in hand.

No presents are to be given at the tree. However, a sack of candy, fruits and nuts will be given every child present, whether a member of some Sunday school or not. There will be a huge tree for the occasion.

Christmas carols will be sung at the opening and there will be a pageant in which children of the several Sunday schools will take part.

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SANTA CLAUS IS VIRTUALLY UNKNOWN IN HIS OLD HOME TOWN; CHRISTMAS IN SMYRNA, TURKEY, LIKE OTHER DAYS

SMYRNA, Turkey, Dec. 23.—Santa Claus is virtually unknown in his own home town.

It was here that Santa, or St. Nicholas, whose name is different in nearly every christian country though his spirit is the same in all, probably was born, and it is certain that he was bishop here.

Yet by only a handful of Americans and other christian foreigners in Smyrna is St. Nick honored on Dec. 25. To hundreds of thousands of Moslems that day brings no more hope and no more joy than any other.

Buried in 332 A. D.
Just outside Smyrna, in the bed-ridden little village of Demre, are the ruins of St. Nicholas' church. There, too, are the ruins of the saint's marble tomb where he was buried in 332 A. D. Thousands of Christians made pilgrimages to the tomb until Italian merchants, 700 years after St. Nicholas' death, carried his body away to Italy.

To the Moslem peasants the name of St. Nicholas means nothing, but they are sure the tomb was that of a holy person. They still the bits of the fallen stones in the hope of fulfillment of their heart's wishes.

St. Paul Visited It
When this little village of Demre, now crumbling and ill-kept was the great Myra of antiquity, St. Paul visited it. Beyond the village, carved in stone, are the tombs of early Christians. Turkish goats scamper through the falling ruins now.

To the few Americans and other Christian families living in this corner of Asia Minor, Christmas brings to life many legends of Santa Claus. It was in and about Smyrna that the fabulous miracles and generous deeds that made St. Nicholas the in-

KANSAS CITY, Kas., Dec. 23.—Under the shadow of a life term as a wife slayer, Major Charles A. Shepard prepared to return today to Denver and the solace of his army associates.

Major Shepard accused of fatally poisoning his second wife to pursue an improper love affair, was convicted yesterday by a federal court jury on a charge of first degree murder. Under the verdict, "without capital punishment," life sentence is mandatory.

Mechanical Church Services To Be Given In Four Churches In Houston

HOUSTON, Dec. 23.—A talking picture machine will give mechanical church services in four Presbyterian churches here January 12-15.

ROBBERIES AND HOLDUPS ARE PREVALENT

ACTION IS TAKEN TO RID LUBBOCK OF ITS UNDESIRABLES

A police dragnet was drawn today as orders were issued by Chief of Police John Lemond for the arrest of every suspicious character, the investigation of every dive and a wholesale "house-cleaning" in the City of Lubbock.

Chief Lemond's action follows an unusual number of hi-jackings, robberies and petty thefts which have been committed in the city during the past few weeks and an intensive war will be waged both by county and city officials in an effort to "clean house."

In commenting briefly upon the series of crimes within the city's borders recently, City Manager J. Bryan Miller this morning declared that "Lubbock's police department is just as efficient as that of any city it's size in the state but that it is the aim of city officials to make it the best."

Crime Minimum Here
"We want to make the City of Lubbock one to be feared by criminals of every sort," he continued. "While Lubbock has been more or less fortunate during recent months in holding crime down to a minimum, we will inaugurate every precautionary measure and instruct our men to be even more on the alert in the future."

Charges that Lubbock's police force is inadequate were denied by the city manager and chief today. "We have made investigations, comparisons and our conclusions show that the city of Lubbock is maintaining a force of men quite adequate for its needs. It is physically impossible to employ enough men to cover the entire city."

Season Is One Reason
Both Chief Lemond and City Manager Miller attributed the recent series of crimes to the season of the year, stating that during the winter months crime everywhere is more prevalent than in other periods.

"I have instructed my men to bring in every suspicious character," Chief Lemond said this morning. "The City of Lubbock is not going to be a hangout for criminals."

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DEFENSE NEED O'NEIL SAYS

LEGION COMMANDER IS HEARD IN TALK IN TOPEKA TODAY

TOPEKA, Kas., Dec. 23.—Adequate defense was held out today by Ralph T. O'Neil, national commander of the American Legion, as necessary not only for national protection but to give the United States the prestige needed to take the leadership for further arms reduction for the promotion of peace.

Addressing a chamber of commerce forum in his home city, O'Neil said the legion's position on preparedness was consistent with its efforts to advance world peace.

The legion commander said history of the country's naval program in the past few years proved it could not properly lead a move for future naval disarmament if the navy was not of sufficient strength to give the United States the prestige for leadership.

CHILD'S LIFE GIVES

PARENT BIG MOMENTS

The only child is ill. "Pneumonia," the doctor says, and your heart sinks. Baby steadily grows worse and for a day you can't breathe once in comfort. You wait, and hope and pray. Next morning he looks brighter. When the doctor comes he finds a turning for the better, and the following day you are assured the danger point is past. You still entertain some anxiety, till by and by, you know the child is safe. All else in the world is unimportant. How happy you are now! You try to tell others how you feel but you cannot. You have an adolescent boy who plays on one of the school teams. He doesn't distinguish himself as a player. When the game in which he plays is written up in the paper he gets no special praise. One day you purposely drop in to observe the team practice. You see some boys who are outstanding individual players, you wait and watch, and listen. Finally you inquire about your boy. Bill, as it is, he was a stranger to you. The coach replies: "We have more spectacular players, but no such boy for team work. He is a model in sportsmanship, ready always for self-sacrifice for the team. He seems to have little concern about himself. That boy has a lot of character."

When did you ever have a proud moment?

You have a daughter in her second year of junior high. She seems to have a glorious life of it with lots of friends and not much sign of worry over her home work. You keep inquiring about her lessons without seeing much enthusiasm for them. Her report card has on it some dangerously low grades. You are concerned but you do not scold. You patiently work out with her a regular time for evening home study on nights preceding all school days. She doesn't at first like the interference with her freedom, but by your skillfulness and calmness you help her to adjust herself. You let her know you are available for help, although you don't impose yourself upon her.

Gradually she comes to you for aid, gradually she acquires better habits of home study. You are pleased and tell her so. Next term the grades are better. How you rejoice then! She grows in self-improvement, and at the end of her last year she brings home such grades as will place her on the honor roll. You are so happy, you scarcely can contain yourself.

You are sitting all alone some evening mending stockings, reading a book or writing a letter, and this daughter comes and sits down beside you. You lay down the stockings, book or pen. You welcome her and meet her smile with yours. She is relaxed because you are. You show no haste to return to what you had been doing, she no need to hurry off. She tells you about some of her most intimate experiences at school or outside of school. She and you enjoy each other's company. When finally she leaves you for some other interest, you feel a strong emotion, if you are reflective. That was, indeed, a very happy moment.

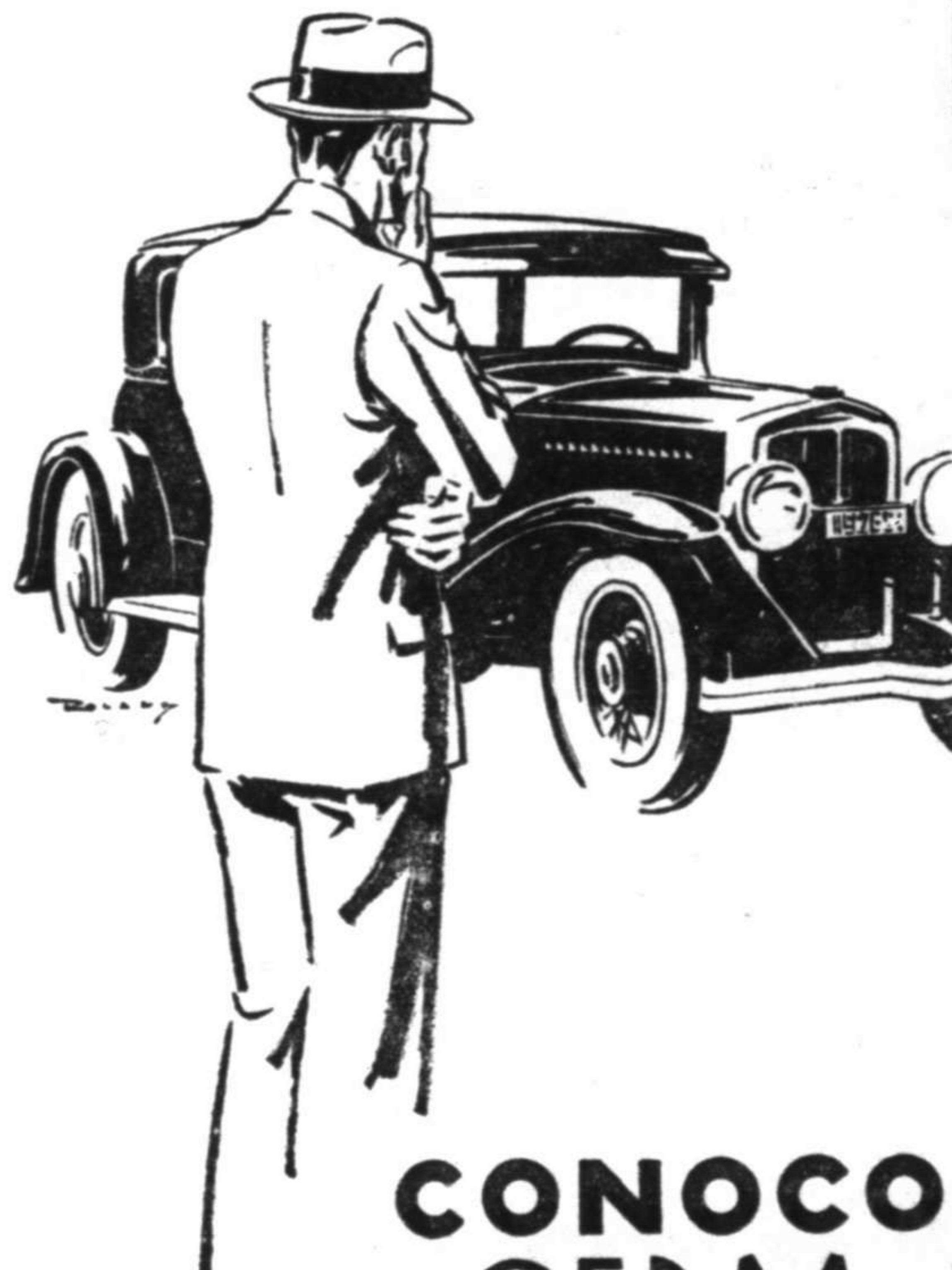

Lewis' Service

When Sinclair Lewis remarked
in Stockholm, that a public de-
mand for sweetness and light has
been a curse on American litera-
ture for many decades, he merely
gave voice to a perfectly obvious
truth. We have produced very few
great writers, and they have been
almost without exception been men
who refused to let business life
interfere with their writing. The great
mass of our reading matter is almost
unbelievably undistinguished.

However, it is quite probable that
Mr. Lewis' belief that better times
are coming is also justified. Writ-
ers are becoming more often the
best of both worlds. They are doing
more, to describe the world as they
see it and not as the great read-
ing public would like to have them
see it. And Mr. Lewis himself has
had much to do with bringing
about this change.

It was "Main Street" that made
it possible for an American author
to suggest that an American small
town could be something less than
a dimwit paradise. It was "Babb-
lance" that got the reading public
used to the idea that business life
is often devoid of spiritual and
intellectual values. If a brighter
day is dawning, Sinclair Lewis is
in large part responsible.

The Lame Ducks

Rodney Dutcher reports from
Washington that the famous lame
duck amendment will probably be
approved by Congress this winter,
but that it is not likely to be the
Norris amendment that will pass.
Instead it will be a sister amend-
ment introduced in the House. It is
almost identical with Senator Nor-
ris' proposal, but the ruling clique
of the House does not want to see
Senator Norris get the credit for
putting through a law which public
opinion almost unanimously ap-
proves.

Fortunately, Senator Norris shows
himself to be somewhat more broad-
minded than his colleagues in the
lower house. He has announced
that he does not care whose amend-
ment is passed; if the House will
only pass somebody's lame duck
amendment, he will do all he can
to get it through the Senate.

This is a statesmanlike attitude.
The important thing, as Senator
Norris says, is that the lame duck
bill be ended. Apparently that
bill is at last to be conferred upon
us. Let us be thankful.

A Tip

A valuable tip for potential
purchasers of articles is contained
in a little article in the current
Magazine of Wall Street. This
article points out that the investor
has learned some good lessons dur-
ing the last 14 months. It lists a
few thus:

"He knows that even the greatest
bull market can terminate; he
knows that bonds, steady and lack-
ing in the spectacular, are in the
main reliable; and he has discov-
ered that the most highly-touted
common stocks suffer along with
those which are frankly specula-
tive when earnings disappear. All
of these things he knows now—the
advantage lies in remembering
them. For the investor with a good
memory and the courage to act, the
possibilities for fruitful reward are
practically limitless."

In that last sentence the words
"with a good memory" need to be
underlined. If we remember some
of the lessons the last stock crash
taught, our next rising market may
not terminate quite so disastrously.

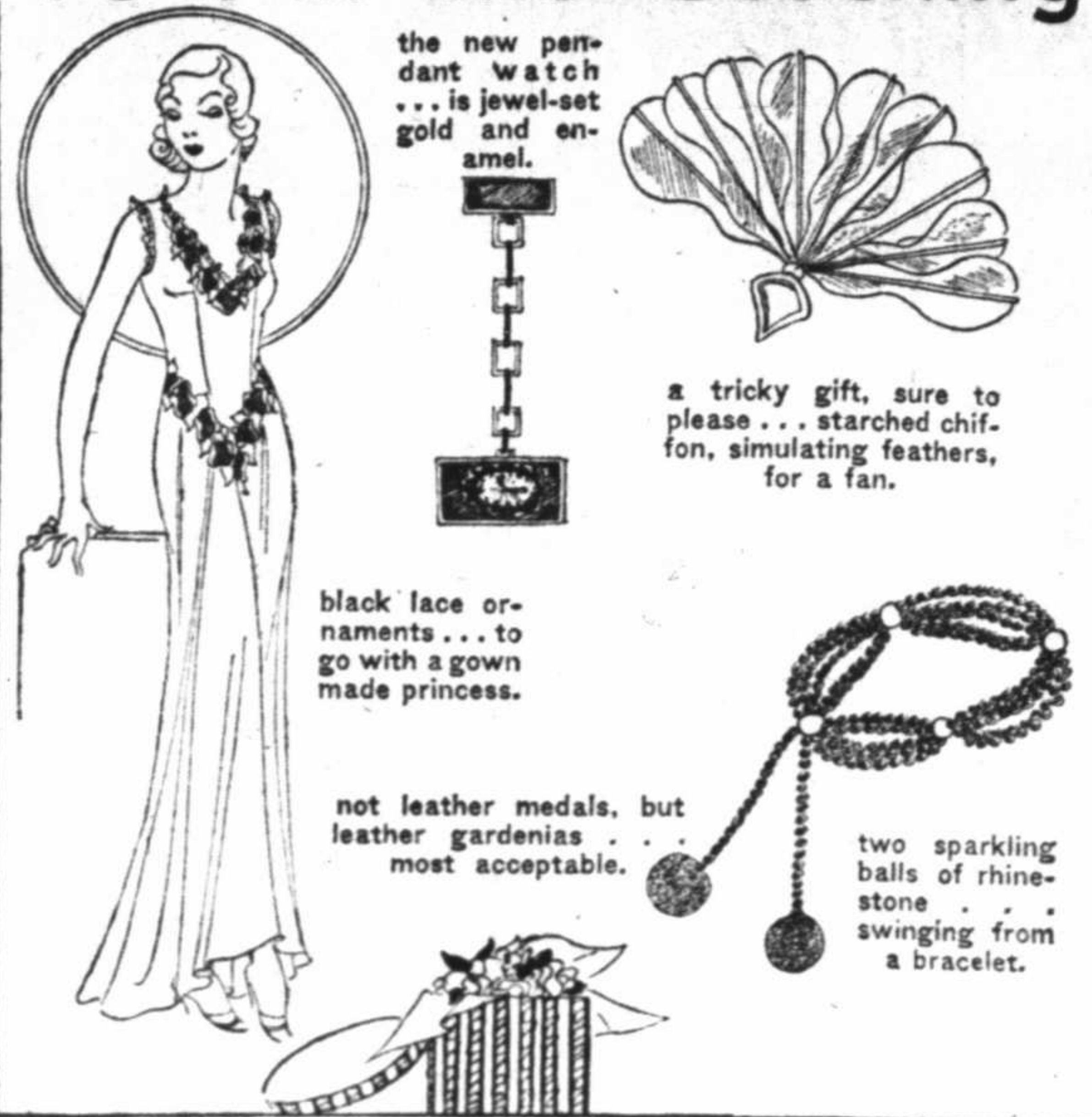

Four Meals To Eat On Christmas

By MISSIS PHYLLIS

OF ALL the days of the year—holidays, birthdays, anniversaries—Christmas is the very biggest one of all. And everyone wants to enjoy it to the full and have the best time imaginable. Also it is the biggest feast day—and it is going to be hard to keep small digestions and tempers in order and serene.

In preparing the feasts of the day, think of the children. And along with the rich puddings and savory meats without which the day wouldn't be itself, plan to have some simple soup or vegetables or fruits for the tinier folk. If you have a small table at which to seat the children, apart from the grownups, you may find it easier to give them plates bearing more carrots and spinach and less of corn fritters or candied sweet potatoes.

We'll plan menus today for breakfast, dinner, tea and supper. Perhaps you won't be having that many meals at your home—you don't need them. But in order to have all possible meal suggestions, we'll put them all in. With an early breakfast (and where there are children who have waited impatiently all night for Santa Claus, breakfast is bound to be early) dinner perhaps one or two o'clock.

Supper time comes round at six or seven. The tea will be the sort of tea you like to have on hand if there are callers, and on Christmas Day there are likely to be callers.

BREAKFAST might consist of a basket of fruit; cereal with green apple sauce and Christmas trees; broiled mushrooms with bacon on toast; coffee; toast, milk or cocoa.

The cereal is especially planned for the children, the bacon and mushrooms for a bit of a breakfast treat for people who usually have to hurry through this meal and get off to work.

For the basket of fruit, hollow out halves of orange, fill with fruit and put a sprig of holly in the top.

The cereal may be any cooked cereal. Make some apple sauce and color it green with vegetable coloring. Put some in the middle of the cereal serving. Then shape a Christmas tree (very simply, of course) with about nine little red cinnamon candies.

FOR dinner, let me suggest: Christmas canape; roast goose; baked apples; mashed potatoes—platter of vegetables; cranberry and raisin conserve; rolls, olives and celery; poinsettia salad; wafers; frozen plum pudding or steamed plum pudding; Christmas cookies and candies; coffee.

For the Christmas canape, spread bread which has been lightly browned in olive oil with pimento creamed cheese. With chopped parsley, chopped green pepper or pimento strips make a Christmas candle in the center, the flame of sifted hard-cooked egg yolk.

For your platter of vegetables, a pretty arrangement is a center mound of beets around which are lots of buttered baby beets and at the sides mashed or cubed turnips, at the end buttered carrots. But be sure to plan something that the youngest of the children may have, especially as "hard" vegetables (turnips, carrots, beets, onions) are a part of winter feasts.

Cranberry and raisin conserve is made with 1 quart cranberries, 4 cups sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup raisins, 1/2 cup blanched almonds, 1 orange sliced thin.

Cook cranberries with water to cover till skins crack. Put through sieve, add water and two cups sugar and boil till sugar is dissolved. Add orange and raisins and other two cups sugar. Cook 30 minutes. Add almonds cut finely. Boil five minutes more. Serve cold. The poinsettia leaves for the salad are made by cutting pimentoes or cold thinly-sliced beets.

CHRISTMAS tea may be simple, with only tiny sandwiches; Christmas cookies; tea or cocoa.

Since you probably won't know how many or how old callers you will have, better not make up any sandwiches until they come. Then make them very small with plain fillings—have a few rolled bread-and-butter ones and a few with a filling made of peanut butter mixed with honey. Those will be good for the children.

One or two kinds of open ones are nice for grownups—cream cheese with a border of curant jelly is very attractive, or sifted egg yolk mixed with mayonnaise and bordered with chopped parsley or pickle or olives.

Christmas supper needn't be elaborate. Try oyster stew or cream of chicken soup with rice, or cream of tomato soup with whipped cream; celery and apple salad; individual apple pies with cheese or whipped cream.

All-state football selections are the order now and sports writers over the state are again laying themselves open for criticism. Jerry Malin, sports editor of the Amarillo papers, and Presy Anderson of Abilene have listed their selections and have done fair jobs of picking their first teams.

Lubbock, undefeated by the loser in the state final, is due to be represented on the majority of all-state selections. In nearly every selection, or proposed selection, we have seen Melton McGee, guard on the 1930 Westerner team and unanimous choice for all-district honors, is given a place in the line. Both Malin and Anderson place the 165-pound ace in the line of the first team, but Malin switches him to tackle. It will be remembered that McGee played the entire game at tackle against Amarillo when the teams played here to a scoreless tie on November 1.

Dub Lawson, quarterback for Lubbock and all-district halfback, was awarded the quarterback position on Malin's all-state second team. Anderson did not name a Westerner on his second team, but proposed Archie Brawley for his third team. Brawley is one of the best tackles in the state, ranking in the state in Loop 1 without a struggle. Again Anderson fails to name Scrap Iron Grimes of San Angelo on any of his honor clubs, and again he will hear from Blundy Cross. Anderson did not mention Grimes on any of his all-district teams, and drew severe tirades from other scribes of the Oil Belt.

The Fort Worth Star Telegram does not announce an all-state team, but is generous in a lengthy honor roll. Herein are found the names of Malcolm Martin, regular end on the Westerner team but who failed to make the all-district grade; Melton McGee, Dub Lawson,

Moody Smith, and Mina Watkins. Smith, who has made all-district honors for two years in just a breeze, found the going tough this year and failed to deliver. Watkins was left off this year, but Lubbock would not trade him for a Burt Dufkin with Glass' thrower in for good measure.

It is hard to see just where Bufkin outclasses Watkins. He, Bufkin, is a little heavier and pulls a bigger show than the quieter Watkins, but had Lubbock been a winning team the Westerner fullback would have been given greater recognition. And speaking of Glass, the Amarillo center who is being ballyhoed for all-state honors, we think Amarillo critics will agree that for the season's work.

Glass was below several others of the district, including Crawford of Lubbock.

The Telegram also announces an honor roll of Class B gridsters, and it is interesting to note the names of several District 2 players. For instance there are C. W. Barrett, Spur end; Flournoy Lockney tackle; Blackwood, Crosbyton tackle; Savoy, Slaton guard; DeCordova, Floydada guard; Arnes, Slaton center; Cannon, Slaton quarterback; Duncan, Lockney half; Bridges, Floydada half; the latter two being the subject of much discussion and debate on their eligibility and finally caused their teams to be thrown out of the race, and Spence, Lockney fullback. Other Class B players to appear on the Lubbock field this year to gain honorable mention in the state paper are Williams, Dalhart end; Childers, Dalhart tackle; Reynolds, Dalhart quarter; and Howell, Dalhart fullback.

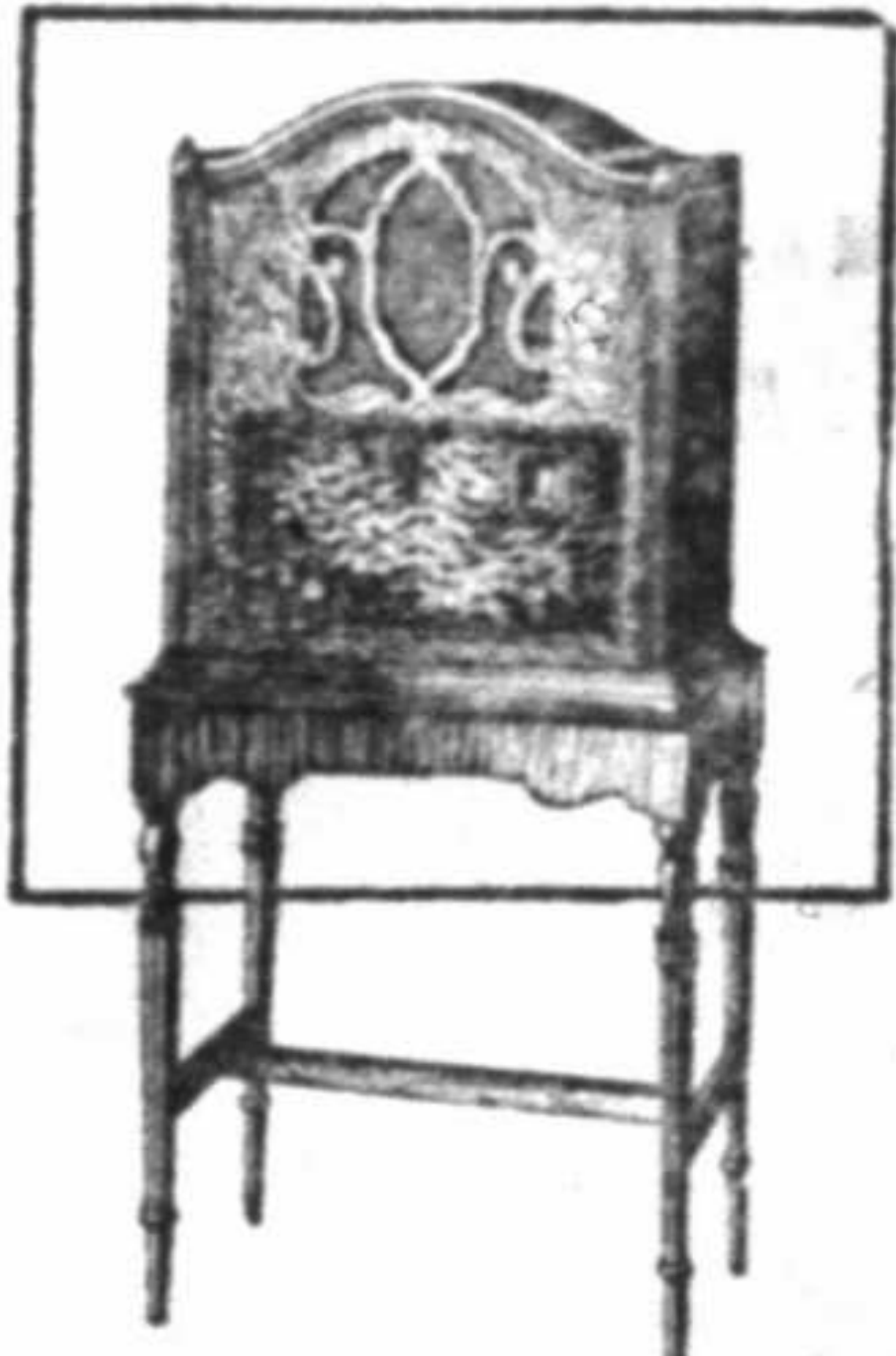

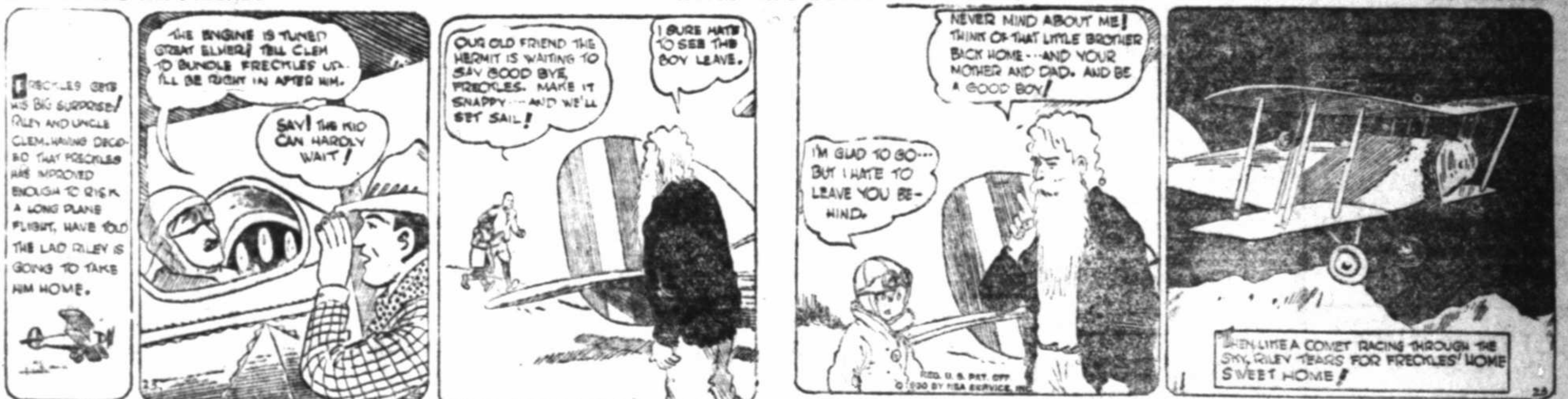

MORE STENCH BOMBS ARE THROWN HERE PAST WEEK

Following recent depredations, in which stench bombs were thrown on three local porches last week, a reward of \$1,000 was announced late Monday for the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for the act and for the setting off of flares in the Lindsey and Palace theatres. A stench bomb was thrown on the front porch at the residence of Ralph Lindsey, 1011 Avenue Q, last Thursday night and on the following night similar bombs were loosed on porches at residences of C. C. Lindsey, 2015 Main street, and Mrs. J. D. Lindsey, 1518 Avenue M. The first flare was set off in the Lindsey Theatre the night of September 29 during exhibition of the feature picture. A similar flare was discharged late the afternoon of September 29 in the Palace theatre. A few days later in early morning before daylight, a stench was created in the Palace lobby by pouring liquid on the lobby floor.
