Four-County Latin American Crusade In Eastland, Sept. 13-18

Churches in a four-county area, including Eastland and County, will join in a week-long series of gospel services under a tent on the former Douglas School grounds at the corner of Bassett and White Sts. in Eastland beginning Sunday, Sept. 13.

The local campaign is a part of the state-wide crusade known as La Cruzada Bautista Nueva Vida (The Latin American Baptist New Life Crusade), launched Aug. 30, and to continue through Oct. 11. The crusade has been officially proclaimed by Gov. Connally in the state.

Churches in Eastland, Stephens, Shackelford and Callahan counties will participate in the campaign to be conducted at the Eastland site. The Rev. Neal Jones, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Vernon, will preach in English and his messages will be translated into Spanish by Donald T. Moore of Cisco. Rev. Moore is pastor of the Latin American congregation in Cisco, and chairman of the Latin American Crusade for the Cisco Association.

Singer and music director for the local campaign will be Chauncey Handy. Tent for the local crusade is being furnished by a Waco firm and will be erected late this week. Latin Americans are especially invited to the services which begin each evening at 8 p. m. Singing will be in Spanish.

In 1962, when statistics revealed that 38 per cent of the Latin American residents of the state were without church affiliation, the Baptist General Convention of Texas voted to actively direct their spiritual and financial support to this campaign designed to in-

Monday Is A Holiday--Decree Noble Knights

The Noble Order of the Knights of Labor was dissolved in 1917, after 48 years of impact on the American scene. Many ideas originating with the group linger still, the most widely popular being Labor Day, the first Monday in September.

The knights of Labor were holding their general convention in New York City in 1882, when they decided to stage a large parade in honor of the working people. Two years later, they set the day, named it, and made it an annual affair.

In 1887, Colorado declared Labor Day a legal holiday. New York, Massachusetts, and New Jersey followed suit. The United States Congress voted it a legal holiday in 1897 and today Labor Day is one of the few holidays observed in all states, Washington, D. C., Puerto Rico, the Canal Zone, Hawaii, the Virgin Islands, and Alaska.

Eastland will observe Labor Day this year by giving everyone a holiday. James Smith,

President, Chamber of Commerce, said, "As far as I know, everything in Eastland will be closed Monday." This of course, includes the post office. Mrs. Marene Johnson, postmaster, said there will be no mail delivery and no window service Monday.

And — although the Knights of Labor barred physicians, lawyers, politicians, and liquor dealers from membership — the courthouse will also be closed on Labor Day.

Scrappy Mavericks Suffer 18-6 Loss in First Encounter

Jerry McCullough quarterbacked his Mavericks with savvy football against the Comanche Indians Friday night, but the Indians had the odds in their favor and went home leaving Eastland an 18-6 loss for the opening test of the season.

Local fans packed their side of Maverick Stadium and agreed that the Mavs, though small and less-than-fast, are a scrappy lot and want to play football.

The Indian odds include a power push through the middle and Quarterback Gray Jolink who called his shots right too.

Eastland's one score came early in the second quarter, spilling over from a drive that began late in the first.

Gaylon Griffin, 150 fullback, was the man who carried the mail over for Eastland, and

accounted for a lot of yardage in the scoring march and throughout the evening.

The drive begun late in the first and went like this: a handoff from McCullough to Griffin accounted for 10; McCullough kept to pick up a whopping 20; an attempted pass to John Moylan fell incomplete; a handoff to Griffin gained five; a keep for five more; to Griffin for four; to Mickey Sargent, for four; to Mike Miller to five; a pass to Miller for a big 20; which put the ball on the two-yard line. The quarter ended, and after a switchero of the field, Griffin took the pigskin and lunged over for the first and only Maverick score of the game.

Extra point try by Moylan failed — as did all extra-point attempts for both clubs all evening.

The Indians got their first score midway in the first, on a 46-yard pass completion to Back Tom Willis who bedevil-

ed the Mavericks most of the evening. The second Comanche score came with a 10-play drive immediately following Eastland's score early in the second. The Indian QB sneaked and picked up the four yards to pay dirt.

The air got a workout late in the first half as the Indians put the ball up three times — to fall incomplete — in the one series.

The third stanza was scoreless with the Mavs giving the air the try with four tosses — one of which was intercepted.

Mavericks made a break at the beginning of the second when big Mike Miller booted to the waiting Indians — the ball hit a man, bounced back and was recovered by Eastland to set up a series of plays worth about 24 yards.

Midway in the last quarter the Comanche QB went over from the 10 for the third and last score of the game. Tackle Garry Rollins foresaw, and (Continued on Page 2)

Highway 206 Work Due To Begin In County Tuesday

Construction work will begin Tuesday on a 13.8 mile section of Highway 206 that will complete the new Coleman-to-Cisco project, according to a report Friday by R. P. Haun, Eastland County resident engineer for the State Highway Department.

Strain Brothers of San Angelo submitted the low bid for the project at a recent Austin highway letting. The bid was \$935,010.86 to cover grading, structures, flexible base and two course surfacing treatment.

Mr. Haun said work would begin at Sabanno, near the Eastland - Callahan County line, where an earlier project

ended. Early progress will be slowed somewhat as fence moving work remains to be completed in some places, the engineer said.

There will be a construction conference at the county highway center in Eastland Tuesday night to work out safety features in connection with the program, Mr. Haun said.

A total of 325 working days will be used on the project under the contract. The Strain company was expected to open offices in Cisco for the work.

Mr. Haun said Highway 206 would join Interstate 20 just west of Cisco at a big interchange. The interchange, however, will be in another project and a temporary connection for 206 will be built.

Highway 206 will handle traffic from southwest Texas that joins Interstate 20 for east-west movement.

Mr. Haun's office will supervise the project for the state highway agency. Two Interstate 20 projects now are being handled by Mr. Haun and his staff — one west of Cisco and another east of Ranger.

The firm is represented by a full-time salesman and several distribution points. Its products are presently being tested by the Federal Housing Administration for durability. The company is making the furnishings in 12 colors

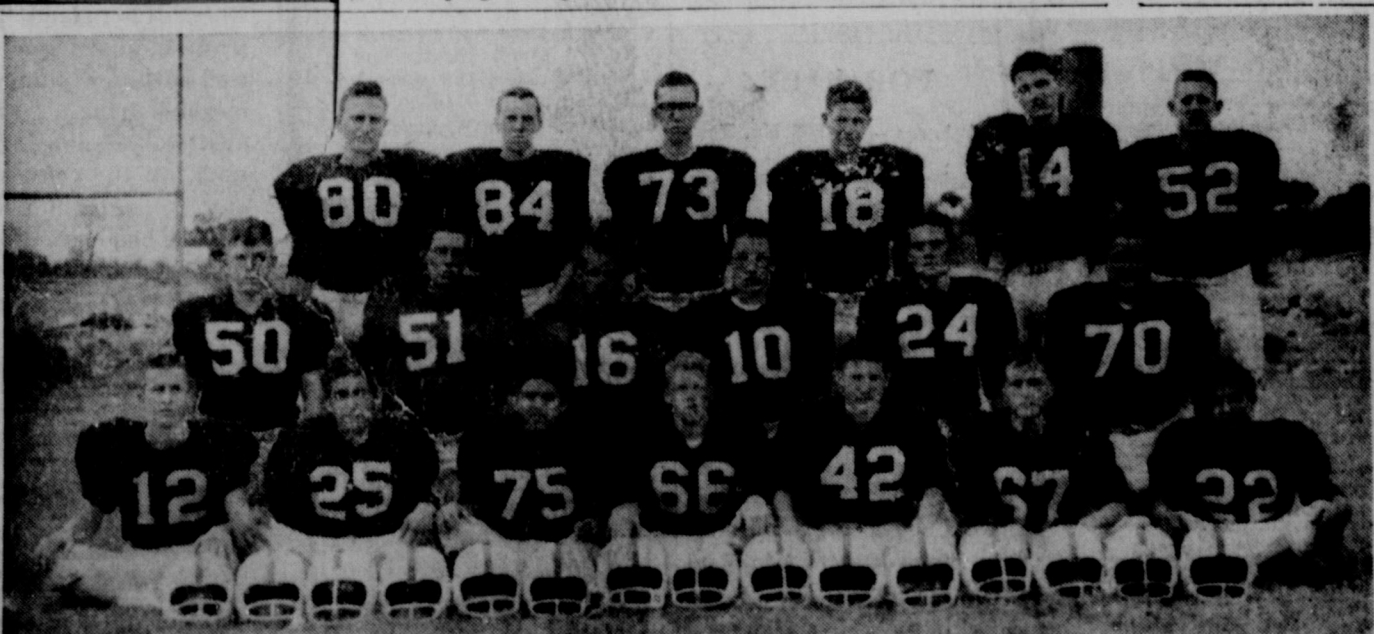

"Implications of our Heritage."
How does that ring to you? Imagine if you can, a model farm — not necessarily modern, but typical — lying along U. S. 80, near or within the city limits of Eastland, open to the public as a permanent exhibit. A typical farm home, barns, pens, stalls the whole works — a show piece of agriculture in this predominately agricultural county. And then scattered around the grounds and lots, displays of early-day farm equipment, walking plows, mold boards, one-row power equipment, steam tractors and so on, throughout the history of farm equipment in this county. Pieces of equipment which have tilled the soil in this county; the predecessors to the modern farm equipment known today.
Would it be an attraction. Would the tourist folks be attracted to it. Would their children want to stop and "visit a farm" and pet the calves, and play with the chickens and turkeys. And would not our own people in this county enjoy seeing collected together momentos of the farming past? Sons could be told, "Now, boy, here's what we plowed with," or "We used to harvest with a machine like this."
These ideas are being explored and your help and comments would be appreciated. Preliminary work is being done by Jerry Carter, land man for Lone Star Gas, and he'd like to hear from you if you have such equipment around your place that would be exhibitable. His idea is perhaps to have the equipment restored as near its original appearance as possible, and giving credit to the donors, place the piece, on exhibit. Don't bring it in yet, just write Jerry, P. O. Box 202, and let him know what you have. Surely there is any number of such decaying antiques around the county, that would if properly displayed, be attractions to all. His idea is to maybe incorporate the plans into the Peanut Bowl event, to which it lends itself perfectly, and perhaps display a few pieces in the parade and have them on exhibit. It would be a long-term project to which all could contribute and result in a fine memorial to the heritage of our past.

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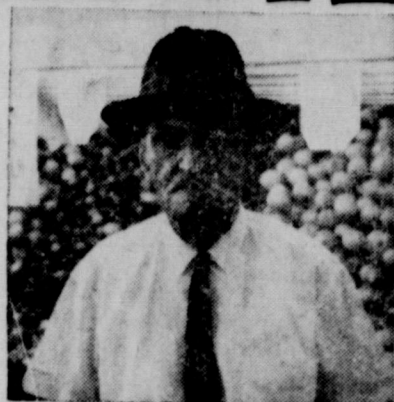

Industrial Meet Is Set To Plan Pilot Program

Will a two-year-old campaign promise result in the industrialization of Eastland County? Will the governor of Texas, through state agencies and officials, be responsible for increased payrolls and economic conditions in this county?

It remains to be seen.

But the first step in this direction may be taken Tuesday when Harry Clark, director of the Texas Industrial Commission, and Larry Milner, a

staff member, meet with some 75 county, civic and business leaders for what could be a series of planning sessions.

The meeting, to be held at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in the County Commissioners Courtroom, is the outgrowth of a statement made by Gov. Connally in Eastland County back in May of 1962.

At that time Mr. Connally, in a primary election run-off with Don Yarborough, was

crossing the state aboard a "Victory Special" train. At two of his stops in Eastland County, he stated that, if elected, he would make Eastland County the "pilot site" for his industrialization program. He had advocated an extensive industrialization program from the beginning of his campaign for the state's top office.

The circumstances behind this "campaign promise" indicate the governor's sincerity in wanting to help certain areas, it would seem. As with most campaign trains, delegations of supporters were welcomed aboard at every stop for brief visiting and traveling with the candidate.

Mr. Connally's train was westbound and several Ranger backers met it in Gordon and rode to Ranger, to be with the candidate when he appeared as he did on the observation platform at each stop to speak to the gathered crowd. Eastland residents met the train in Ranger and joined the party for the trip cross-country as did Cisco citizens in Eastland.

In Ranger Connally praised the progress of Ranger Junior College and recalled the oil boom days, and generally, although not specifically, stated that if elected he would do all in his power to re-vitalize the state with industry.

As the train pulled out of Ranger, bound for Eastland, Mr. Connally invited two county newspapermen into his stateroom for soft drinks, salted nuts and conversation. During the informal "interview" he asked point-blank, of his questioners, "What exactly does your county need most?" Naturally, the answer was "More payrolls, more job opportunities for a declining agricultural work force — industry."

And apparently at that instant Mr. Connally decided himself, to make this county the test location for his industrialization plans.

During his brief remarks in Eastland, this was one of the most emphatically stated points "I will, if elected, make Eastland County the pilot site in my industrialization program." He was greeted with cheers from the throng that had met his train at the T&P Depot — the high school band, chamber and city officials, pretty girls and Old Rin. The Eastland — famous horned toad was "given" to Mr. Connally as a token of his support here. (Rin rode on to Cisco with Mr. Connally where it was retrieved by newsmen and returned to its Courthouse resting place.)

His stop in Cisco too was punctuated by his statement that he would, if elected, make Eastland the pilot site for industrialization. And there, too, Cisco supporters cheered as Mr. Connally promised to "help Eastland County."

The giving of Old Rip to

Mr. Connally was obviously a "gimmack" — but perhaps his industrialization of Eastland County is not.

The meeting in the courthouse Tuesday perhaps will tell.

A County Republican meeting will be held at the County Courthouse Thursday, Sept. 10, at 7 p.m., it has been announced.

The public has been invited to attend.

A — You should mail your change of address notice for any VA payments to the VA regional office where your records are maintained. This is the VA office which authorizes your payments. When you move to another regional office area, the VA will transfer your records to this new regional office if you request such transfer.

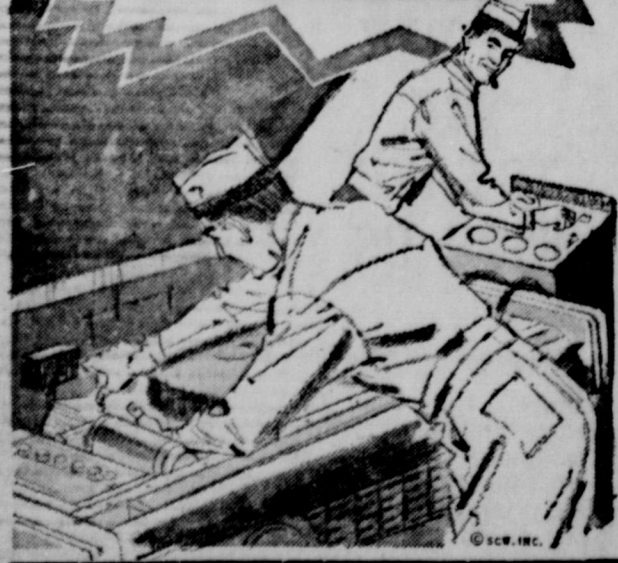

BROWSING with BEV.....

Frozen fish needn't be thawed before cooking — just allow a few extra minutes of cooking time.

However, when fish are to be either breaded or fried, or stuffed, you'll find it more convenient to thaw them first to make handling easier. Thaw frozen fish in the refrigerator in their original wrappings.

Cook thawed fish immediately for best quality. Be sure you don't overcook it. Cook fish just until it flakes easily with a fork.

If you're going to pot a plant or two, it's all right to use some of the soil in your back yard or the nearby woods. But, you shouldn't use it "as is." It needs to be purified to make it as disease-free as possible.

Put the soil in a shallow pan and bake it in your oven at 180 to 240 degrees for 45 to 60 minutes. This will pasteurize it.

Now, mix the soil with one-third sand — also pasteurized in your oven — and pasteurized peat moss. You'll be

able to grow almost any house plant in this mixture.
