

Region Seeks New Building Fund

This week to complete the building fund for the American Legion building has been set for Friday. A number of plans for the building, a sketch of which has been furnished to the building committee. It includes the front elevation, floor plan, and ground plan. Copies of it were placed this week in a number of local business houses and they have increased the interest in the project, as observers have come to realize that the proposed building will be a great asset to the community, not only as a home for the veterans, but architecturally and as a place which should attract statewide meetings and conventions of various nature to Artesia.

The accompanying picture is of the front elevation, as drawn by Vorhees & Standhardt.

The plans are for the building

to face east, midway of more than midway back from Fifth Street towards Sixth on the American Legion and city property on Texas Avenue. The city owns three of the six lots, which M. E. Baish

gave to the municipality for use as a park, and the veterans' organization owns the other three. It is planned that the entire half block be landscaped and maintained as one of the beauty spots

of Artesia. Already a number of trees, presented the American Legion by H. A. Porter, have been set out on the property.

The floor plan calls for a large banquet hall and ballroom, 49x17

feet, at the south side of the building, ample for large meetings or conventions, banquets or balls. At the west end of the hall is to be a stage.

At the north end of the build-

ing, it is proposed to have a smaller meeting room, maintained as a lounge and clubroom, in which smaller meetings may be held. It is figured it will seat 125 persons comfortably.

Between the two halls will be a kitchen, from which banquets can be served in either.

Also included in the plans are a reading room and two recreation rooms, all near the north end of the building.

And then there will be an office for the service officer and other American Legion officials, from where rehabilitation work and other matters regarding veterans' affairs will be carried on, and rest rooms and storage space.

Facing Fifth Street about half the length of the building will be an arcade or porch.

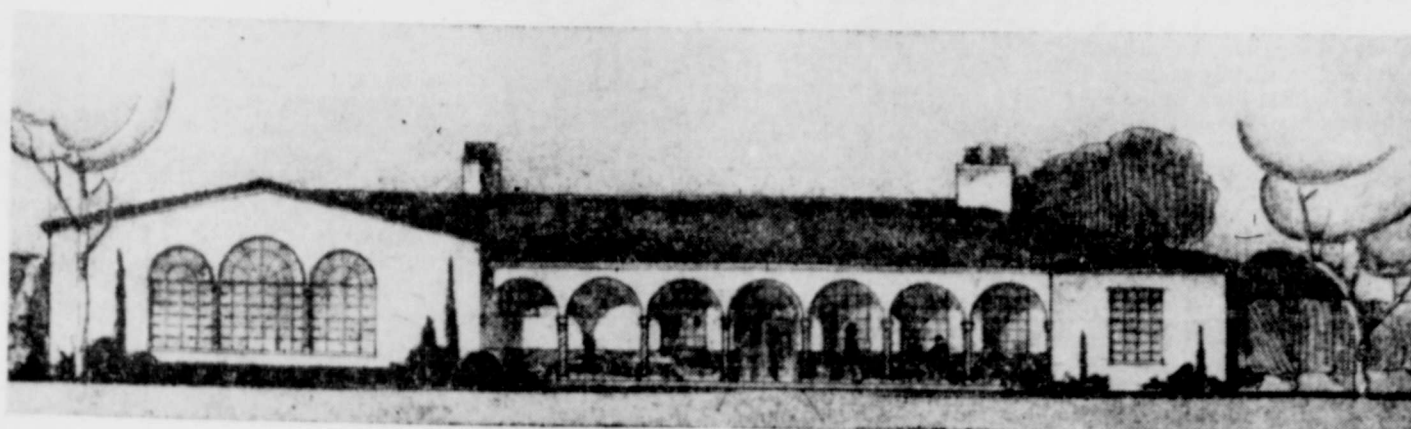
Members of the building committee and other workers met Monday evening and laid out their

plans for the drive this week, and names for calls were assigned to various legionnaires. Working alone, or in teams of two, they have been calling on individuals and business heads this week and will be out in full force Friday, seeking funds or pledges, in order to round out the \$50,000 needed for the building.

The committee is not asking for all of the money at this time, but it is accepting pledges, which state that the signers will pay stipulated amounts to Clarence Kepple Post No. 41, American Legion, when the building is half completed.

All funds given for the American Legion building can be used for that purpose only. They do not go into the post's general treasury, but are earmarked for the new home.

Registration for Enrollment in Schools Announced

Registration for enrollment in the Artesia schools will open here on Sept. 5, with the first-year beginners, on the morning of Sept. 5. Children will be assigned to groups and become acquainted with the building at this time. Parents are requested to make appointments with Miss Woodruff by phone.

Enrollment of primary pupils, grades 1 through 3, except second and third-grade Spanish children, will take place at Central School between 9 and 11:30 o'clock, Sept. 5.

No beginner, it was announced, will be accepted whose birthday falls after Nov. 1. All pupils entering primary grades for the first

time will register at Central School during the week of Aug. 27 through Aug. 31. Parents are urged to call phone 142 for an appointment and to bring their child or children between the hours of 8 and 4 o'clock, so he or she can be assigned to his or her group before enrollment day.

Second and third-grade Spanish children will enroll at the girls' gymnasium of the high school between 9 and 11:30 o'clock. Third-grade Spanish groups should enroll at the north door; second-grade Spanish groups at the south doors.

Many Employees To Be Absorbed Here

While government agencies are discussing and making plans to provide employment for the approximately 7,500,000 men expected to be released from the armed forces in the next 18 months, there is another side of the picture, which employers are viewing and looking forward to with considerable interest.

Although the various federal bureaus are considering the large industries and various projects, which will mean employment for hundreds and in some instances thousands, it will doubtless be surprising, local employers point out, how many employees small industries and small businesses can absorb.

In Artesia for months there has been a real shortage in practically every line of business and industry. Grocery stores, meat markets, drug stores, department stores, cafes, restaurants, and men's furnishings, practically every line of business, has needed and still needs employees.

The building trade can use far more employees than are available or have been available and if post-war building plans are carried out skilled labor will still be at a premium even after the government has released its 7,500,000 men.

Vets In Hospitals Receive Cards, Jig-Saw Puzzles

Approximately 250 decks of playing cards and more than 100 sets of jig-saw puzzles have been sent from Artesia to the veterans' hospitals at El Paso and Santa Fe by the committee, which sponsored the campaign, it has been announced by J. D. Smith.

The first shipment of playing cards, consisting of more than 100 decks, was sent to William Beaumont Hospital in El Paso. The second and third shipments were sent to Bruns General Hospital in Santa Fe.

The jig-saw puzzles numbered more than 100 sets and they were sent with the last 50 decks of playing cards to Santa Fe.

No more cards will be collected at this time, but it is possible that if there is a further demand for the cards and the jig-saw puzzles another campaign will be started later.

Pecos Stops Flowing, First Time 20 Years

The Pecos River ceased to flow Monday, the first time in 20 years, according to the observations of E. P. Bach, who has been a resident of the community 30 years.

Bach, who put in his private gauge in 1928 and started gauging the river for the government in 1932, noticed at 7:30 o'clock Monday evening, when he went to the river to read the gauge, that flow had stopped. The stage at that time was 2.10 feet.

It was on May 12, 1915, that Bach moved to his place south-east of Artesia, and for many years he also operated the bottom farm east of the present Pecos River bridge.

Will Discuss Country Club Friday Night

A meeting in regard to the formation of a country club association has been called for 8 o'clock Friday evening at the city hall by Mayor Emery Carper, who was named temporary chairman last spring, when first steps were taken.

Mayor Carper said this week that 80 acres have been purchased from the Naylor place, west of the 40 acres previously acquired for the use of a country club. Application also has been made for 40 acres of government land, which, if obtained, would give the association 160 acres in the form of a square, west of the Collins farm. 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warm region of the world. The mango tree is a magnificently tall and stately evergreen, which spreads its thick, glossy foliage in shady beauty. The fruit reminds one somewhat of a large flattened and very juicy peach with a strong fragrant flavor; which to some is just spicy, to others faintly reminiscent of turpentine; it has a tendency to be stringy, but culture and selection have made it become sweet and luscious. The fruit is generally peeled and sliced for serving and, like the peach, cannot be kept much more than a week after picking. The mango season is generally from June to August. Green mangos (unripe) are used to make pickles, tarts, and preserves.

The papaya, a true native of the Americas, is also known as the tree melon. The most amazing thing about this fruit is the way it is produced, a single slender stem bearing closely attached to it several dozen papayas which are about the size of a large elongated cantaloupe melon. The papaya fruit is eaten as melon, sprinkled over with salt and lemon juice or as dessert or marmalade. The fruit is the source of papain, a ferment similar to pepsin, which is a powerful digestive and an ingredient utilized in various medicines. The fruit ripens the year 'round but is at its best during the summer months.

Another citizen of the Americas is the guava, particularly known in the form of guava paste or jelly. The small tree, belonging to the myrtle family, has oblong leaves covered with soft down and was cultivated in our continent from Peru to Mexico before the discovery of the New World. The fruit are either round or slightly

pear-shaped, light reddish yellow and filled with a soft pulp with an agreeable flavor. The fruit is highly perishable, which explains the fact that it is mostly consumed as preserves. Guava grows today in various parts of the East.

The cherimoya has an appearance as strange as its name is peculiar. The fruit is yellowish-green, rounded and covered with course scales somewhat like those of the pineapple. This rough exterior, however, conceals a custard-like pulp, white and aromatic, usually eaten fresh and generally found very refreshing. The cherimoya tree is fairly hardy and not as strictly tropical as its close relatives, the Anon and the Guabana. The guabana is not as scaly as the cherimoya. Its fruit is particularly suited for cooling sherbets and ices. Visitors to Havana always recall fondly the exquisite "Champion de guabana" served in the shade of street-side cafes. Russet brown in color and vaguely reminiscent of the coconut is the shell of the mamey sapote, the fruit being heart shaped and about the size of a grapefruit. It is filled with a delicious, soft, and spicy pulp of a bright red or yellow color, in the center of which is a large highly polished black seed. The tree is a native of Central America and it is said that Cortes and his companions in their famous march from Mexico to the Gulf of Honduras in 1526 lived

only of the nutritious pulp of the mamey sapote.

Related to the mamey sapote is the sapodilla, which is of special interest, since the tree is valuable not only for its palatable fruits but for the latex derived from its bark. This furnishes the chicle of commerce, from which chewing course scales somewhat like those of the pineapple. This rough exterior, however, conceals a custard-like pulp, white and aromatic, usually eaten fresh and generally found very refreshing. 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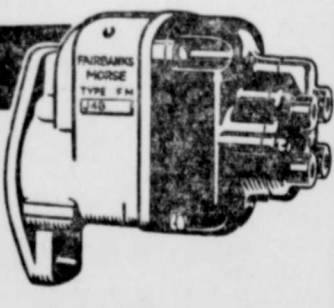

of the soldiers wore size 10 socks,
while 31.8 per cent of the service
men of today wear size 11, and
only 16 per cent wear size 10.
Comparison of the trouser lists
show a 32-inch waist to be pre-
dominant in both wars. But, at
present, the majority of soldiers
require a 33-inch leg length, while
in 1917 a 32-inch leg length pre-
dominated.
While they have gained in

height, men now entering the
Army have lost an inch in their
chest measurement. The average
soldier of World War I required a
coat with a 37-inch chest size,
while most of the soldiers today
take a 36-inch.

The World War I soldiers were
a bit fuller in the neck. About
50 per cent of them wore a 15
to 15½ shirt, while the most fre-
quently issued sizes today are 14½
to 15, with the former predomi-
nating.

The present-day soldier wears a
larger hat. Size 7 predominated in
1917, with 48 per cent of the

troops requiring 7 to 7½ sizes,
and 36 per cent calling for sizes
from 6½ to 6¾. For the soldiers
of World War II, 80 per cent of
the hat issues are in sizes from
7½ to 7¾ with only 7 per cent
wearing the smaller sizes.

Farm Minded Vets Have Choice Several Ag School Curricula

Eight veterans enrolled in the
New Mexico A&M School of Agri-
culture for the summer session are
forerunners of farm-minded veter-
ans who will begin work in earnest,
when the fall term opens Aug.
27 on the special short agricul-
ture courses now being offered at
the college.

The veterans, attending school
under the GI Bill of Rights or the
disabled veterans' bill, will take
either of the two special short
courses outlined in a new book-
let, "Educational Opportunities for
Veterans," or will enroll for the
regular four-year college curricu-
lum in agriculture.

New curricula being offered in-
clude a two-year general course in
agriculture and a one-year voca-
tional course stressing farm or
ranch operation, agricultural me-
chanics, and recreation. The two-
year curriculum is open only to
veterans who meet the standard
college entrance requirements;
any veterans who want practical
instruction in farm and ranch op-
eration may take the one-year
course. The college will grant cer-
tificates to veterans who complete
either.

Carman Continues Discourse On Poor Fish At Warm-Water Hatchery

(In a recent issue appeared
the list of several articles by
L. J. Carman, superintendent
of the U. S. Fish Cultural Sta-
tion at Dexter, where thou-
sands of warm-water fish are
hatched and raised until ready
to place in the streams for
the benefit of anglers. Car-
man continues here his story
about the rearing of finger-
lings for the ultimate pleasure
of followers of Isaac Walton:)

The number of brood fish placed
in an acre of water for spawning
will vary, according to how we ex-
pect to handle these fingerling
later. If the fry or very small
fingerling fish are to be removed
soon after hatching, a greater num-
ber of brood fish can be used,
while if the fingerling fish are
to be left in the pond for several
weeks or months for growing, only
a few pair of bass should be
used per acre.

From five bass to 15 pair per
acre may be used. They are pro-
lific, and one female bass has
been known to spawn 75,000 eggs.
For propagation purposes we usu-
ally have only one specie in one
pond. The brood fish should be
placed in the spawning ponds two
to four weeks in advance of spawn-
ing season. They are held in win-
ter ponds with wires strung over-
head for protection from the birds,
and are fed about three times a
week on fresh cut carp, beef
hearts, or minnows.

If fish are not properly fed they
will turn cannibal and devour their
own kind. This is one of the prob-
lems of a fish culturist. Fish in
the same pond should be of as uni-
form size as possible, as a six-
inch bass in the pond with a 12-
inch bass would have little chance
of surviving unless natural food
were very abundant.

Bass spawning season normally
begins in the Pecos Valley about
April 5 and ends about May 15.
The water temperature governs
the time of spawning. When the
water temperature rises to 63 de-
grees and remains there for 2 or
3 days, you may begin to look for
bass eggs.

The largemouth bass do not
spawn on gravel nests as some
other fish do. At spawning time
the male chooses a desirable spot
for the nest, chews off all moss
and grass to a short stubble, fans
the spot clean (about 12 to 14
inches in diameter), and goes out
in the pond or lake and escorts
his mate to the nest. The eggs are
soon deposited on the newly-built
nest, and fertilized by the male
fish. The eggs are adhesive and
cling to the nest bottom, and stay
put until hatched. They are about
the size of a common pin head.

Just as soon as the "Mamma"
bass lays her eggs, "Papa" bass
drives her away from home and

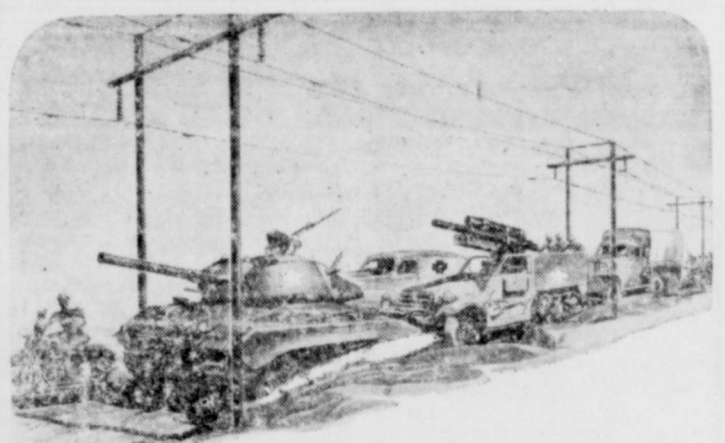
tells her to go free and have a
good time. He stays at home, mov-
ing about over the nest, fanning
the eggs and warding off all en-
emies. He is voracious and will at-
tack birds, snakes, and other fish,
and will even nip the leg of a man
if interfering with his domestic
life.

The eggs normally hatch in six
days. When hatched the tiny fry
are transparent for a few days,
and lie on the bottom concealed
from the human eye and you won-
der what became of the eggs. In
four or five days the little fry
darken in color and have increas-
ed in size until they are visible,
and look like a wave of jelly as
they move on the nest.

About the tenth day they have
used up the food furnished them
by nature, by absorbing their food
sac, and becoming hungry and be-
ing curious to see what the world
looks like, they arise slowly from
the nest bottom and discover they
can swim. They are clannish and
very much attached, and swim in a
school. Now little schools of bass
fry can be seen moving slowly
about the pond, feeding upon tiny
insect life, and the male parent
still remains with them, circling
around the school, guarding his
family and directing them to safe,
protected grounds, where they will
not be disturbed. A school of 50-
1000 bass fry make a beautiful
sight, and even though they will
weigh no more than a pound or
two, they represent two or three
truckloads of fish for distribution
90 days hence.

The fry swim in this school, pro-
tected by the parent fish, for 10
or 15 days. At this stage they have
grown to almost an inch in length,
have become more active, and have
reached a point where they cannot
find sufficient food for so many
mouths in so small a space. Hence
they are by necessity forced to
say good-bye to each other and
break school, each going his own
way, and making his own living.
As they thus scatter here and
there, "Papa" looks on in dismay,
for how can he follow so many
children with each going in a dif-
ferent direction? So he swims
about in deep meditation, taking
a parting look at his headstrong
children, and gives them a final
blessing, and slowly moves away
into deeper recesses of the lake,
forgetting his once-cherished fam-
ily.

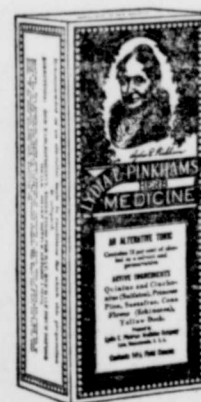

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Ruling by WPB On Print Bags Brings Protests

A mounting storm of protest has swept over agricultural areas of the nation since the War Production Administration recently prohibited manufacturers from using any more dress print fabrics for the manufacture of cotton bags this year than were used in 1944. Particularly have complaints come from farm housewives in areas where beef cattle, dairy herds, and poultry are primary agricultural activities.

Action of WPB eliminates the one bright spot which had been left to farm women in the midst of growing shortages of cotton goods for the family's clothing and household needs. Initial irritation, resulting from the WPB ruling, has been aggravated by reports which have seeped into the grass roots to the effect that the reduction was occasioned by a small group of second hand bag manufacturers out to maintain maximum dollar volume for their own business. The reports indicate that WPB has sided with a handful of reproducers in preference to the needs of farm families.

Farmers fail to see how any fabric will be saved as a result of the WPB ruling. They point out that it takes as many yards of cloth to make an unbleached bag as to make a printed one, that only farm families are customers for materials packed in dress-print bags, and that farm women do not return their bags to second-hand dealers whether they are printed or not.

In short, there is no indication that the ruling will accomplish its purpose of assisting the second-hand dealers, and it is completely obvious that it works a burdensome handicap on farm women who have learned to convert their printed bags into clothing and household necessities almost impossible to obtain through retail stores in many cases.

Careful Selection Pullets May Turn Failure To Success

Careful selection of pullets for the laying flock may be the difference between success and failure, in the opinion of E. E. Anderson, poultryman of the New Mexico Extension Service.

In a recent experiment pullets were divided into two groups according to external appearance. Both groups were of the same age and breeding and had received the same care. Yet well-developed birds outlaid the poorly-developed ones by more than 25 per cent.

Lamb and Sheep Sellers to Get Subsidy Pay

Lamb feeders and sheep raisers can now apply to their county AAA office for commodity credit Corporation payments designed to help them meet higher production costs and increase the supply of lamb and mutton. Applications may be made for sales through next June 30.

"To qualify for payments," A. D. Woolter of the State AAA Committee said, "growers and feeders must sell to a legally authorized slaughterer who certifies that the animals are purchased for slaughter. When sellers apply for payments, they must submit evidence of sale, such as sales accounts, invoices, and other evidence showing the weights and purchasers of all lambs and sheep."

To encourage feeding lambs to heavier weights, payments rates will vary by months and weights. Payments will be highest on lambs weighing more than 90 pounds during the months when fed lambs are usually marketed.

Rates for August through September are \$1.50 a hundredweight for 65-90 pound lambs and \$2.15 a hundredweight for lambs weighing more than 90 pounds. Rates in December, January, May and June are \$2 and \$2.65. Rates for February, March, and April are highest at \$2.50 and \$3.15. Rates throughout the period for all sheep and other lambs will be \$1 a hundredweight.

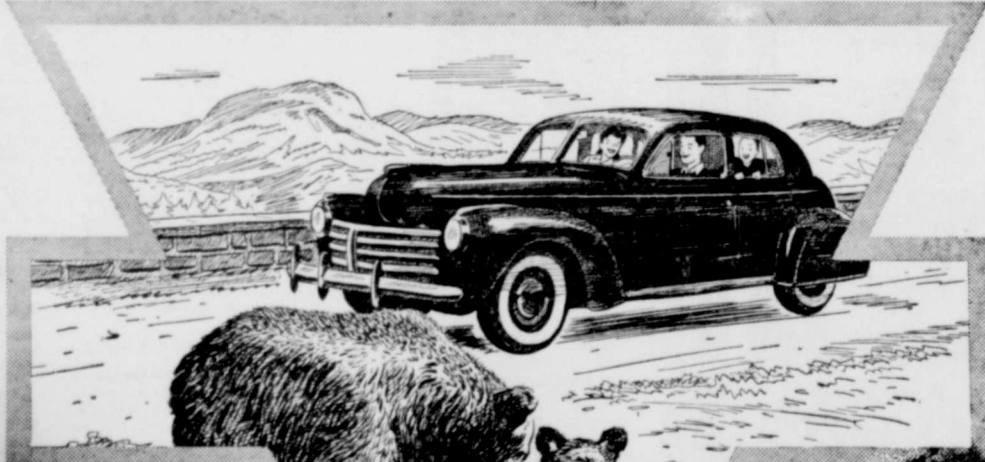

of meeting with road committees of these organizations in these cities.

As soon as the organization can be outlined and perfected in New Mexico, it was pointed out, a joint meeting of the New Mexico committee members and the members of the various Texas cities is expected to be called.

In 1903 Mr. Linell set a world's record shooting clay pigeons, making 100 consecutive singles, followed by 10 doubles, 120 in all. One of the major arms companies gave him a beautiful shotgun for the accomplishment, which Mr. Linell gave to his nephew and namesake, William Linell of Artesia.

Mr. Linell also held the Iowa state championship for 11 years for rifle and shotgun shooting.

ably use more discharged armed service members than any other one industry. Not only are there scores of new homes to be erected here, but many business dwellings are being planned to be erected.

And it is likely that a number of new projects will be started here once the materials are available.

Artesia's oil interests have been short on "good men" since the beginning of war and it is likely that several more employees will be added to these payrolls once the men are available.

There have also been planned numerous new businesses here, expected to be launched when materials are available and when help can be secured. These are likely to be started if and when employees can be secured.

Turnover in some of the present employees may be rather large, some employers stated, if and when competent and efficient help is available. It is a well-known fact that several of the offices and industries, as well as businesses, have gotten along with the help available but the general admission has been that it has been far from satisfactory.

Unemployment, of course, can become a problem in Artesia, but leaders indicate that every effort will be made to see that it doesn't and the outlook and prospects are extremely light at the present time.

There may be a slump between the period of completing conversion and getting civilian supplies available, but if and when building materials and civilian needs can be placed on the shelves there is every reason to believe that the demand for labor here is going to be heavy.

Employers are looking forward with a great deal of pleasure to the time when they can secure ample competent and efficient help to carry on their business as they did back in the normal days and times.

Agriculture, of course, will take over its share of help too after the years of little help and incompetent help and farming and stock raising is expected to become more of a pleasure instead of the drudgery it has been with the lack of help prevailing.

The first event will be a 400-yard water relay. A patrol of eight scouts, each scout swimming 50 yards, will participate. It was announced that troops may enter as many patrols as they desire in this event.

The second event is scheduled for 5:15 o'clock in the afternoon and these will consist of an egg race and a watermelon scramble. The egg race will be open to all scouts. Each scout will hold a tablespoon in his mouth with an egg in it. He is then to swim 50 yards and keep the egg in the spoon. A scout is to furnish his own egg and spoon.

The second event, the watermelon scramble, is open to one team of two scouts from each troop. A watermelon is to be tossed into the swimming pool. The team which gets the melon on to the bank and keeps it wins.

Friday morning they will open the second part of their water carnival with the first event set for 8:30 o'clock. The first contest is scheduled to be a 50-yard freestyle race, open to all scouts and is to consist of three heats.
