ENTRANCE EXAMS BE HELD NEXT MONDAY

FORMER TEACHER OF LAMESA SCHOOLS DEAD

Memorial Day Proclamation

Saturday, May 30th, was proclaimed Poppy Day in Lamesa in a proclamation issued today by Mayor J. R. Lowrie. The proclamation urges all citizens of the city to observe the day by wearing an American Legion and Auxiliary poppy as an individual tribute to the American men and women who gave their lives in the World War. It also calls upon the citizens of the city to contribute as liberally as their means will permit to the welfare of the disabled veterans and dependant families of the dead and disabled when purchasing their poppy. The proclamation follows:

"I, J. R. Lowrie, Mayor of the city of Lamesa, remembering the fine young men of Lamesa whom the city sent forth in the years of 1917 and 1918 to defend the honor and ideals of our nation on the battle fields of the world's most terrible war, and who died in the heroic performance of the duty the nation assigned to them, and deeming it fitting that the citizens of the city should pay honor to their memory by wearing the flower among whose bright red blooms many of them died, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 30th, Poppy Day.
 "I urge that this day be observed by all patriotic citizens of Lamesa by the wearing of the memorial poppy made by disabled veterans which will be offered on the streets of the city by the women of the American Legion Auxiliary. I further urge that the citizens of Lamesa, who gave so gallantly of their services and so liberally of their wealth and strength, and when purchasing a poppy give as much as their means will allow to help lighten the burden for those who are still paying in suffering and poverty the price of our glorious victory.

POPPIES WILL BE SOLD MEMORIAL DAY

The little red memorial poppies which disabled World War veterans have been making through the winter and spring, will be sold in Lamesa on Saturday, May 30th. Mrs. Charles Baldwin, President of the Lamesa Legion Auxiliary, announced today. A complete organization which will give everyone in the city an opportunity to buy and wear a poppy in memory of the World War dead is being developed by the Unit under the leadership of Mrs. R. A. Stuart, chairman of the poppy committee. A larger sale of the memorial flowers than ever before is anticipated by the Unit.

"The purpose of the poppy sale is two-fold," Mrs. Baldwin explained, "first, to honor the war dead by wearing the poppy which grows on the fields of France and Flanders where they fell, and second, to aid the living victims of the war, the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead. Every penny of the money which the people of Lamesa pay for their poppies will go to the relief of war sufferers, the bulk of it to needy veterans and families right here in Lamesa.

"Saturday, May 30th, Memorial Day, will see the whole nation wearing the memorial poppy," Mrs. Baldwin continued. "Poppy sales conducted by 7,200 Auxiliary Units will cover practically every city and town in the country. More than 10,000,000 Americans are expected to pay tribute to the World War dead and help the war's living victims back to health and happiness through buying and wearing a poppy on that day."

REMEMBER POPPY DAY

A great national memory and heart test is in store for America Saturday, May 30th. Foreign critics, and some of our own domestic brand, contend that our national memory is as weak as a politician's promises and that our heart is as hard as the ingot gold in our treasuries. They would scoff at the idea that the deeds of men dead a dozen years are still remembered and hold power to quicken the pulse beats of the nation. On Saturday, May 30th we shall see.

Saturday will be poppy day throughout the United States. The American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary will call on the citizens of the country to remember America's World War dead and to wear a poppy in their honor. The Legion and Auxiliary will appeal to the heart of the country for funds to carry on their great work for the men who came back shattered in body and mind. Will America remember its heroic dead and will its heart be reached by the plight of its living war victims?

The answer will be written in bright red poppies on the streets of every city and town in the country May 30th. A poppy worn above the heart will mean remembrance and generosity—a lapel without a poppy will mean forgetfulness and hard-heartedness. We will be able to read the answer right here on the streets of Lamesa and let us hope that it will state in clearest terms that America remembers and is grateful.

The women of the American Legion Auxiliary will be on the streets all day Saturday with their baskets of veteran-made poppies. They will visit all business centers. Everyone will have an opportunity to secure a poppy from them and to give whatever he is able for the welfare of the disabled. Unless the heroic sacrifices of our World War dead have been erased from our memories by a dozen shorts years and unless our hearts have hardened against those who sacrificed all that make life worthwhile, there will be a poppy on every coat by nightfall.

POISONING PRAIRIE DOGS

The United States Biological Survey in co-operation with the County Agent and the County Commissioners Court are carrying on a campaign to control prairie dogs, ground squirrels, and other rodents taking an annual toll from the farmer's crops and the ranchman's grass. Each succeeding year the prairie dogs population is growing less and less.

According to Mr. J. M. Hill, representative of the survey in Lamesa this week, to mix a supply of poison which is distributed at cost through the County Agent's office said: "The Department is constantly working with formulas that will perfect a one hundred per cent kill with prairie dogs in the summer as well as in the winter. Strychnine is still relied upon to do the work, but we have found many improvements profitable in compounding the mixtures for best results. The formula now in use is as follows:

For one hundred pounds of grain, use:

Five ounces strychnine alkaloid; One half ounce saccharine; Five ounces baking soda; One quart "Blue Label" Karo syrup (Don't use "Red Label"); Three ounces of Argo Gloss Starch; Ten ounces of powdered Borax; One half gallon of water.

The above ingredients improperly mixed is not effective, but when they are properly made we frequently obtain a one hundred per cent kill with prairie dogs even when grass and other vegetation is plentiful. We have found the following method in making poison will get the best results:

"First mix the strychnine and soda, dry, adding the syrup, stirring to make a paste. Heat one half gallon of water to boiling and add the borax and the saccharine to the boiling water then dissolve the starch in a little cold water to make a paste, adding the starch paste to the boiling water, then add this solution to the syrup, strychnine mixture and stirring in all the ingredients to complete the mixture. The poison mixture is now ready to be applied to the grain. Pour the grain on a clean floor, press a hole into the top of the grain pile large enough to hold the poison mixture. Mix thoroughly with a shovel until all the grain is equally coated.

"Strychnine is not soluble in water consequently it is necessary to make a paste with which to coat the grain, causing the poison to stick. The borax and saccharine form a combination to counteract the bitter taste of the strychnine, starch is the substance that makes it stick; Karo is the ingredient that makes the paste.

"When the pastures are green, prairie dogs seem to prefer grain and two teaspoons full carefully placed around the outside edge of the hole is sufficient poison to kill a number of dogs. Dogs feed on the outside of their burrows and it is therefore wasteful to put poisoned grain in the dog hole. This is not true with moles and gophers, and where fields are infested with these rodents, take a probe and locate the burrow that leads straight from one mound to the other, and when the runway leading from one mound of earth to the other is located with the probe, drop in one spoon of poisoned grain, cover the opening with the probe, as these rodents feed in the dark underground. We find that jack rabbits eat dog poison when placed in their runways through the fields, rabbit poisoned grain should be placed in little mounds of about two tablespoons full, where their trails or runways appear," Mr. J. M. Hill said.

This poison is now on hand at the court house and all persons having dogs and other rodents to eradicate may obtain poison from the County Agent's office or from Mr. Sutton, the janitor.

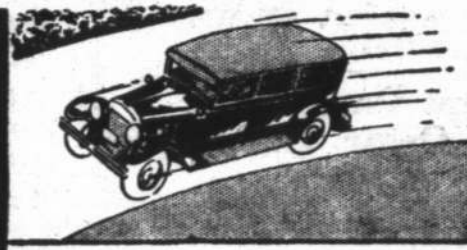

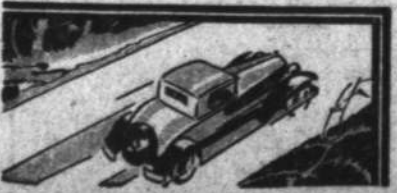

In the District Court of Dawson County, Texas, April Term A. D. 1931.

TO THE HONORABLE JUDGE OF SAID COURT:

We your Grand Jury most respectfully make the following report of our work:

We have now worked as Grand Jurors a part of three weeks of this term of Court during which time we have as per your instructions very carefully inquired into all alleged violations of laws coming to our attention and where warranted have returned Bills of Indictment, having returned into this Court 44 Felony Bills of Indictment and 13 Misdemeanor Bills of Indictment.

Our investigations of law violations have carried us into almost every phase of law violation upon our statute books, and in some instances we found crime on the increase almost to an alarming extent in our County while in other respects hereinafter mentioned, conditions are fair.

With reference to the violations of our Liquor laws, we wish to say that we believe this to be one of the most flagrantly violated of all

Upon an invitation by the City Council of Lamesa, Texas, we have had occasion to carefully examine the City Jail of Lamesa, and commend the City for its splendid jail and the sanitary condition in which it is kept, however we have also had occasion to examine our County Jail and sorry to report that our County Jail is in a most unsanitary condition, due to its inadequate facilities. It is wholly inadequate to the needs of this County and we call attention to our Commissioner's Court and the Citizenship of this County that something should be done quickly to relieve the crowded and unsanitary condition of our County Jail. This jail was perhaps sufficient for a sparsely settled citizenship such as existed some 15 or 20 years ago, but it is wholly insufficient at present and in reality as we see it almost a disgrace to our County. Our officers have no protection for themselves nor safe place for the prisoners therein held. We believe something should be done now to relieve this situation.

We wish to thank all of our local officers, our County Attorney, Sheriff's department, Justice of Peace, Judge Cooper, whom the records show have so efficiently performed their duties since taking office. We also thank our bailiffs, and all citizens who have assisted us in our work. We thank

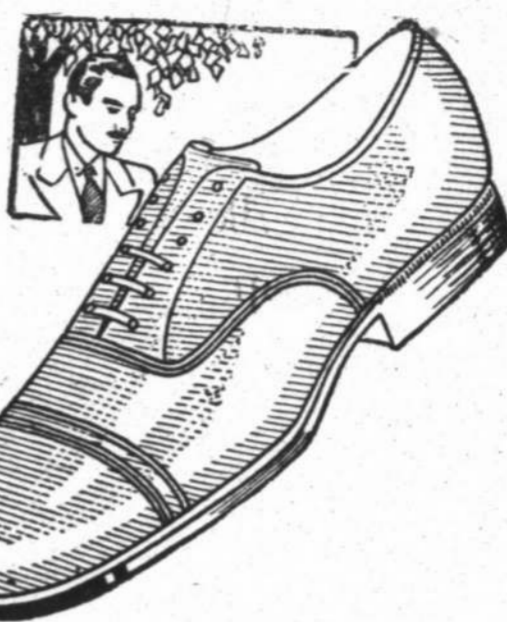

NEW STATE ARSON LAW CALCULATED TO STOP FIRE BUGS OPERATING

The following Act "further defining the offense of an attempt to commit ARSON, was passed by the Legislature on April 23, and approved by Governor R. S. Sterling on April 27, and reads as follows:

AN ACT
to amend Article 1316, Chapter 1, Title 17, of the Penal Code of 1925; further defining the offense of an attempt to commit arson; and declaring an emergency;
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 1316, Chapter 1, Title 17, of the Penal Code of 1925 be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to be and read as follows:

"Article 1316. Any person who willfully attempts to set fire to or attempts to burn or to aid, counsel, or procure the burning of the buildings of property mentioned in Title 17, of the Penal Code of 1925, shall be guilty of an attempt to commit the offense of arson, and shall upon conviction be sentenced to the penitentiary for not less than one nor more than five years. The placing or distributing of any inflammable, explosive, or combus-

tible material, or any substance, of whatever character or kind, or any article or device in any building or property mentioned in the foregoing article or device in any building or property mentioned in the foregoing Article is an arrangement or preparation with intent to eventually, willfully set fire to or burn said building or property, or cause said property or building to be burned, shall for the purpose of this act constitute an attempt to commit the offense of arson, and shall be punishable as provided."

Section 2. (Emergency Clause)
Note: (Became effective April 27, 1931.)

The reports of local Fire Marshals of 425 Texas cities and towns made to the State Fire Insurance Department show that 1,294 incendiary fires have occurred in Texas during the past six years with a total fire loss of approximately \$3,474,943.00. The Department has no means of securing information pertaining to incendiary fires in those towns and cities of Texas that have no Fire Marshal, but I feel safe in saying that

the total fire loss in Texas each year for the past six years, as a result of incendiary fires, would show an annual loss of \$1,000,000.00 if said figures were available.

ARSON—"Burning for Profit"—is a dangerous form of crime, practiced not only against the insurance companies, but against society for it is the people who pay the cost of fire, and it is my opinion that the enactment of this recent Act by the Legislature, "further defining the offense of an attempt to commit arson", will greatly reduce the number of Arson fires in Texas in future years, and I am certain the offending parties will be unable to escape punishment in the future as they have in the past. In this connection, as Fire Insurance Commissioner of Texas, I want to sound a warning to the effect that the State Fire Insurance Department will lend its assistance in the investigation of all Arson fires so far as it is possible for us to do so, and we will insist on prosecution to the full extent of the law in every case.

It is the duty of the local Fire Marshal to make, or cause to be made, a thorough investigation of all fires that occur in their respective communities, and I respectfully request that the performance of this duty in the future, and wherever the evidence warrants the matter should be presented to the Grand Jury for action, and when an indictment is returned, the local Fire Marshal should use his best influence in securing an early trial of the offending party or parties.

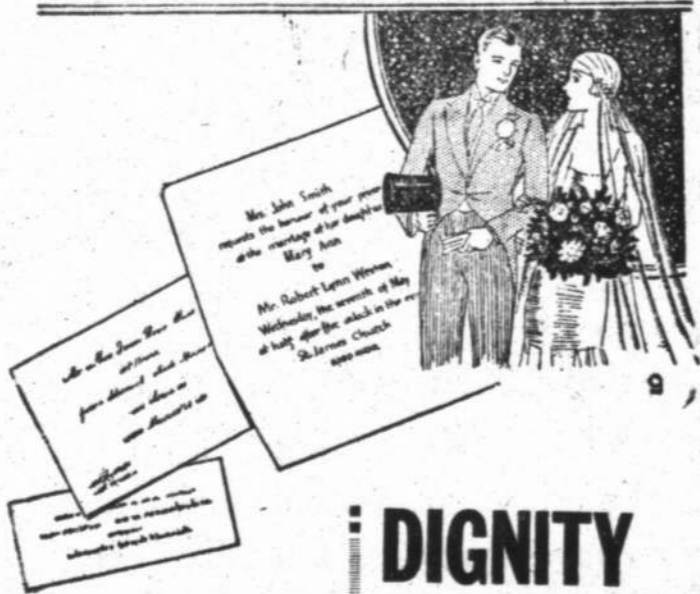
