STATE LETS 19 HARD SURFACED ROAD PROJECTS

POTTER AND DICKENS COUNTIES INCLUDED IN CONTRACTS
THREE CANCELLED
MORE THAN \$400,000 WILL BE EXPENDED UNDER TERMS

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 9.—Finishing the heaviest monthly "docket" it has encountered, the state highway commission today let contracts running to more than \$400,000 for about 225 miles of hard surface maintenance work on roads in 19 Texas counties.

Practically all work will be one course surfacing. The J. C. Warr company, Dallas, got eight of the contracts on bids totaling \$181,425 as follows: Hunt county (two jobs consolidated in bidding) 2.61 miles of highway number 1 between Sulphur river and Commerce and on 16.5 miles on highway number 34 from six miles south of Greenville to Stamford county line, \$27,983.

Comanche, 15.43 miles on number 47 from Eastland county line southeast to Ketchikan county line, \$27,656. Bunk, 12.4 miles on number 64 from Smith county line east to Hefner, \$26,522.

Wood, 2 miles on number 15 from Smith county line east to Mineola, \$7,256. Polk, 42.1 miles on number 25 from San Jacinto county line north through Livingston in the Neches-dwain county line, \$11,500.

Dickens, 1.97 miles on number 18 and 12.75 miles on number 23 from four miles north of Dickens, north to the state line, \$11,500. See ROAD CONTRACTY Page 5

2 Men Killed When Engine Turns Over

PARIS, Texas, Sept. 9 (AP)—An automobile crashing into a switch stand is blamed for the wreck at Trout Spur, 13 miles north of here, shortly after noon today in which Cecil Stafford, fireman of Fort Smith and J. H. Harlan, engineer, were killed.

The big locomotive of Frisco passenger train number 4, northbound, overturned, the tender, baggage car and another car left the tracks, but no passengers were hurt, according to a division official.

Nearly an hour before the wreck an automobile truck in which two negroes were riding struck the switch stand, according to a negro man who lives near the scene of the wreck. The car was repaired and continued on its way. Railroad detectives late today were searching for the drivers of the truck.

Mary Atkinson, 26-year-old private nurse, who followed the Hester family here from Gainesville, Tex., was in the Charlton county jail tonight while an affidavit awaited the report of an Oklahoma City pathologist who is making an autopsy of the daughter, who died yesterday morning of an illness that attacked three other members of the family.

Mr. Bailey returned to Tulsa this morning from Trinidad, Colorado, where he took care of the daughter's funeral. He said that the daughter was ill because of his double family tragedy, his friends shielded him from newspapermen today insisting that he was anxious to have any mystery cleared up and that his connection with the case were of a fatherly nature.

OCEAN FLYING IS DONE WITH PROTESTS SHOW

PLANES STILL "LOST" AS FALSE REPORTS COME IN
FLIER IS RECALLED
PILOTS GIVING UP IDEA OF OVER WATER FLIGHTS

(By The Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—Old Glory and Sir John Carling the most recent planes to try the Atlantic crossing, were definitely labelled "lost" today and their disappearance marked a sharp break in public enthusiasm for long distance ocean flying.

Plain indications multiplied during the day that the public had had its fill of this type of adventure, and public opinion was mirrored in numerous ways.

Curtin Recalled. The navy recalled Lieutenant Lawrence Curtin from his leave of absence to fly with Rene Fonck, and Fonck acknowledged that his flight would probably not be made this year without Curtin.

The Canadian committee in charge of the proposed flight of the Royal Windsor notified Phil Wood and Duke Schiller to abandon the flight. A rising tide of public opinion against the flight was given as the reason for the cancellation.

The Kinkadee, Wright motor plane, left London to sail for America saying that he had returned to give "Charles A. Levine a certificate of air worthiness and that a "would be" suicide to attempt." Levine and his pilot, however, insisted they would make the attempt if the favorable weather in Germany, Captain Sherman Keith pilot of the Junkers plane, Bremen was fighting what seemed to be a lone battle with the strong tide of public opinion against making a trans-Atlantic attempt.

London newspapers carried caustic comment on "Fool flights" and opposition to further Atlantic flights was expressed in an interview in the London Evening News with Lord Thomson, former British air secretary.

The Kinkadee representative of Edward P. Kinkadee and William E. Lloyd world gliding fliers on the way that from Hong Kong, announced that he was arranging to charter a boat to take them to the Midway Islands, the most difficult ocean hop of their flight.

FALSE REPORTS COME IN. WASHINGTON, Sept. 9 (AP)—State department officials said tonight that they had received no word of the sighting of the Monoplane Old Glory off St. Johns, and that apparently some mistake had been made in press dispatches from Ottawa quoting the American embassy there as receiving information from Washington to this effect.

It was suggested by department officials that confusion had resulted from a dispatch sent earlier in the day to the embassy requesting Canadian naval officials to broadcast a message urging Canadian ships to engage in the search for the missing plane.

J., Sept. 9 (AP)—The crown of "Miss America" of 1927, was placed tonight upon the fair brow of a 16-year-old girl from the middle west, Miss Lucile Delander, Toledo, Ohio, who has been crowned in the Atlantic City beauty pageant as "Miss America." Before a crowd of more than 10,000 persons that crowded the million-dollar pier she was chosen as America's new beauty queen, receiving eight of the 10,000 votes.

The second choice and her coronator was "Miss Dallas," who is Miss Mossie Johnson, of Dallas, Texas. She received five votes. The new "Miss America" is a Junior in the Glens township high school in Toledo.

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DEMAND GREAT FOR HAIR CONCESSIONS

I. C. C. GIVES ITS APPROVAL TO DENVER SOUTH PLAIN ROAD AND GRANTS LEASE PERMIT

AUTHORIZES SALE OF SHARES OF STOCK BUT FULL CAPITALIZATION IS POSTPONED PENDING COMPLETION OF LINE

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—In an uncontested finance case, the Interstate Commerce Commission today authorized the Colorado and Southern railway to acquire control by purchase of capital stock of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains railway, which under previous authority of the commission now is engaged in constructing 202 miles of line in Texas.

At the same time, the commission granted permission to the Fort Worth and Denver City railway, a subsidiary of the Colorado and Southern to lease the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains. The latter, in turn, was authorized to issue \$200,000 of capital stock to partially defray expenses in connection with the instruction.

Shares To Be Sold. A total of 1,911 of these shares will be sold at par for cash to the Colorado and Southern to furnish funds for preliminary construction, the remaining nine being directors qualifying shares.

The lines now under construction by the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains extend from Goodsville, Texas, a distance of 122 1/2 miles to a point in Castro county, with two lines intersecting with the Fort Worth and Denver City. One of these will extend to Lubbock, and another to Silverton.

When completed, the lines will form a connecting and continuous line of railroad with that of the Fort Worth and Denver City. Full capitalization of the cost of the construction has been postponed pending its completion.

We discussed things in general. I felt him immensely and hope he felt that he did not squander his time talking to me. Indeed, he showed great interest in New York City. Our meeting was undoubtedly a most delightful occasion for me.

In substance I found him a man of great personal attraction, like all great men a man of great strength and at the same time of great sympathy. Obviously he is a man of superb attainments. His outstanding success lies in the fact that he is a genuine humanitarian.

I do not believe it would be good form for me to repeat what he said, especially since when he wants to be quoted he knows how and where to do it.

In conclusion while we were together there was no minority. There was only unanimity.

REBELS CAPTURE TOWN

Mexican Municipality, Colotlan, Is Reported As Taken By Troops Under Quilpan

NOGALIER, Ariz., Sept. 9 (AP)—Dispatches to the Herald from Guadalupe, Jalisco, Mexico, today said that the town of Tototicha, situated in the municipality of Colotlan, Jalisco, had been taken by a large force of rebels headed by Pedro Quilpan.

One woman, Paula Herrera, was said in the dispatches to have been killed during the bandit attack which was made Thursday following several days of intensive activities in the district.

Telegraphic communications with Mexico City were severed by the rebels and a number of villages near Tototicha were sacked by the band.

Federal troops guarding the town were quickly dispersed due to the superior numbers of the rebels, who were said to have marched into town with some semblance of military order.

WATER NOT YET CUT OFF IN SOLES TEST HERE... It was thought by Tolbat and his crew that the water that has been causing so much trouble in their No. 1 well, located in the northeast corner of the southeast quarter of section 21, block 8, of the E. J. Ellwood survey, five miles east of Lubbock in Lubbock county, had been cut off but after several hours the water still flowed up. So, they began this test to determine whether the water was coming from a little more than 100 feet below the surface. This time they will have a packer on the bottom of the well. NEW ORLEANS COTTON: NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 9. (AP) -The cotton market was quiet today in comparison with the excitement and activity that characterized yesterday's stormy session. Trading was mostly of a reactionary tendency, although the market encountered good support on all days, October after trading up to 23 1/2, soon after the opening session, off to 23 1/2. Near mid session the market rallied to 18 to 19 points but during early a.m. in the afternoon and October dropped to 22 1/2 and closed at 22 1/2, compared with 23 1/2 at yesterday's close. The general market was finally barely steady at net losses of 27 to 28 points.

The opening was easier, in sympathy with lower Liverpool cables, the market rallied promptly however, and the initial loss was recovered. October sold to 23 1/2 and December 24 1/2, one point down to close. Future prices proved to be the highs of the day. Prices turned easier, however, on

receipts and by the middle of the morning the market had sold off 27 to 28 points under the previous close. This recession attracted good buying support and near mid session prices rallied 18 to 19 points to net losses.

A reversal of realizing turned the market downward in the early session and before offerings were absorbed prices had made new lows with October and December 47 to 49 points under the previous close. The market rallied slightly in the final trading but closed barely steady.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON FOR SEPT. 11, 1927

General Topic: Solomon Dedicates the Temple.

1 Kings 8:1-11, 22, 63.

1. Then Solomon assembled the elders of Israel, and all the heads of the tribes, the princes of the families, the heads of the families of Israel, unto king Solomon in Jerusalem, to bring up the ark of the covenant of Jehovah out of the city of David, which is Zion.

2. And all the men of Israel assembled themselves unto king Solomon at the feast, in the month Ethanim, which is the seventh month.

3. And all the elders of Israel came, and the priests took up the ark.

4. And they brought up the ark of Jehovah, and the tent of meeting, and all the vessels that were in the tent; even these did the priests and the Levites bring up.

5. And king Solomon and all the congregation of Israel, that were assembled unto him, were with him before the ark, sacrificing sheep, and oxen, that could not be counted nor numbered for multitude.

6. And the priests brought in the ark of the covenant of Jehovah unto its place, into the oracle of the house, to the most holy place, even under the wings of the cherubim.

7. For the cherubim spread forth their wings over the place of the ark, and the cherubim covered the ark and the staves thereof above.

8. And the staves were so long that the ends of the staves were seen from the holy place before the oracle; but they were not seen without; and there they are unto this day.

9. There was nothing in the ark save the two tables of stone which Moses put there at Horeb, when Jehovah made a covenant with the children of Israel, when they came out of the land of Egypt.

10. And it came to pass, when the priests were come out of the holy place, that the cloud filled the house of Jehovah.

11. So that the priests filled the house of Jehovah.

12. And the king, and all Israel with him, offered sacrifices before Jehovah.

13. And Solomon offered for the sacrifice peace-offerings, which he offered unto Jehovah, two and twenty thousand oxen, and a hundred and twenty thousand sheep. So the king and all the children of Israel dedicated the house of Jehovah.

14. Time: The temple was dedicated, B. C. 1011.

Place: The temple hill, on the east of Jerusalem.

Golden Text: I was glad when they said unto me, "Let us go unto the house of Jehovah."—Ps. 122:1.

A Description of Solomon's Temple.

This great edifice, for its beauty, splendor, cost, and size, easily obtained rank among the Seven Wonders of the ancient world. Thirty thousand workmen were required to cut the timbers for the building, eighty thousand to quarry and trim the stone, seventy thousand to transport it, more than three thousand to oversee the work.

The temple faced the east. The sacred inner portion, or sanctuary, was small. On the east was an oblong room, the Holy Place, measuring twenty by forty cubits (thirty by sixty feet), and back of it, to the west, was a square room, thirty by thirty feet, the Most Holy Place, where the ark was kept. In the Holy Place were the golden candlesticks (the room was lighted only by windows high up and admitted little light), the table of shewbread, and the golden altar of incense.

The Most Holy Place had no windows, but was full of dazzling light from the Presence of Jehovah above the ark. Everywhere the woodwork was richly carved and was overlaid with gold, and the heavy hangings of costly cloth, were brilliant with beautiful colors and adorned with rare embroideries. In front of the Holy Place was a great porch, its chief feature being two lofty pillars of bronze with ornamental capitals.

The Value of God's House to a Community.

"The dedication of a house of worship to the glory of God and to the service of man's higher life was a great hour in Israel's history. It is a great hour in the life of any community. Many of us still associate with certain houses of worship some of the richest experiences of our lives. There little children dear to us were consecrated in baptism. There brides and bridegrooms have pledged their fealty. There our dead have been brought for the last sweet, sad words of comfort and our faith in Jesus Christ. There we have sat at his table, communing with him and with our fellow believers through the medium of the broken bread and wine poured out in our behalf. As long as we nurture faith in our hearts we shall be impelled to embody it in stone and mortar, in glories of stained glass and in stately carvings, all of which shall combine to convince the world of the reality of our faith."

Solomon's Prayer of Dedication.

"Solomon's prayer at the dedication of the temple is remarkable for many things, but for none more than for its wonderful combination of brevity and comprehensiveness, with specific adaptation to many varieties of experience."

This is the longest prayer recorded in the Bible.

Adoration and Thanksgiving.

Solomon began with blessing God for a good father, the greatest of earthly blessings, and then for a good country, with a providential history, full of God's guidance, with specific prayer, of fulfilled promises. "There is no God like thee," Solomon said, and then, filled with awe at the thought of the majesty

of the Most High, he added: "But will God in very deed dwell on earth? Behold, heaven and the heaven of heavens cannot contain thee; how much less this house that I have builded!"

Petition for Temple and People.

Solomon's prayer began with adoration and thanksgiving, as all prayers should and only then passed into the realm of petition. Moreover, the petitions, when he came to them, were not for himself, for his power and happiness and the prosperity of his throne, but they were all for his people and for the honor and glory of God's house. He acknowledged the sinfulness of the nation "for there is no man that sinneth not." Over and over he prays, "Hear thou in heaven thy dwelling-place; and when thou hearest, forgive." The prayer looks forward to days of national defeat, to days of famine, of pestilence, and of siege; it remembers the captives; it does not forget the foreigner, "when he shall come out of a far country for thy name's sake," and asks for him the same blessings as for Israel, "that all the peoples of the earth may know thy name, to fear thee, as doth thy people Israel." Nor is it a prayer for the great emergencies only, but for the constant upholding of divine aid "as every day shall require." It is a wonderful prayer, an evangelical prayer, a New Testament prayer before the New Testament. That prayer was Solomon's crowning glory.

Our Love For God's House.

"Reverence the empty church; it is never fuller than when it seems to be empty. As you have entered before now the house of a friend, and waited for his approach, you have noticed how he has expressed himself in the furniture with which he has clothed his room, the books he reads, the pictures that hang on his walls. So as you look around the empty church, see the expression of the life of God. It is hung with beneficence, it is paved with reverence, it is roofed with majesty."

We are to show our love for God's house in essentially the same way in which Solomon showed it, namely, by our gifts to God's house and its work, gifts of time, of thought, of prayer, of careful planning, of ardent testimony, of zealous advocacy, with generous gifts from our possessions. These are proofs of our love, and if the proofs are not given, it may well be doubted whether we have any love to prove.
