By half percentage point

State jobless rate up

DALLAS (AP) — Unemployment in Texas rose to 9.2 percent in August, but officials of the Bureau of Labor Statistics today described the half-point increase as insignificant.

BLS regional commissioner Bryan Richey said the increase from July's 8.7 percent was within the possible sampling error for the government's figures.

The August rate, however, was well above the 7.1 percent of one year earlier and marked the seventh straight month joblessness has been above eight percent in Texas.

Nationwide, unemployment dipped slightly to 6.8 percent in August.

As with the July figures, Richey said there were fewer effects from the factors that pushed Texas

unemployment sharply higher earlier this year — the weak oil and gas sector, economic problems on the border with Mexico, the farm economy and rising imports.

"These factors may not be getting any worse," Richey said. "(But) there is no evidence of real improvement in economic conditions."

Labor department figures for last month show 740,000 Texans were looking for work, up from 707,000 in July. At the same time, the total number of jobholders fell to 7.328 million.

July statistics for eight industry groups, which lag behind the overall figures by one month, show a 0.3 percent decline in jobs over the last year. Richey said four of the eight

groups, representing one-third of all jobs in Texas, were responsible for the drop.

Those wage and salary groups that did show gains continued growing at a much slower pace than the nationwide figures, Richey said.

Trade, accounting for one in every four jobs in both the state and the nation, has grown 0.7 percent in Texas since July, 1985. Richey said the nationwide growth for the same period was 3.1 percent.

The service sector and the group including finance, insurance and real estate jobs also grew at much slower rates than the nation as a whole.

Richey said only the defense-related industries in Texas have been keeping pace.

White predicts business will finish in next session

AUSTIN (AP) — Although their first 30-day special session didn't get the job done, Gov. Mark White is predicting that state legislators will balance the budget on their next attempt.

"There should be no break in stride in these efforts. They are moving in the right direction. Negotiations are on-going, and we're going to continue working to hammer out the differences," White said.

White announced Thursday that lawmakers will return to the Capitol at 11 a.m. Monday. He will address a House-Senate session at noon.

The goal is the same one that eluded the session that ended Thursday — eliminating the \$3.5 billion state budget deficit.

"The time has expired on the session which was called, but we're not folding our tents and we're not going home," White said.

"We have to realize that our constitutional duty and our first responsibility is to balance the budget. And that's exactly what we must do."

White renewed his call for a temporary sales tax increase to be combined with spending cuts to wipe out the deficit.

When he opened the just-ended special session on Aug. 6, White urged lawmakers to hike the sales tax from 4½ cents to 5½ cents for a year. Although he told lawmakers then that it might cost them their jobs to

raise taxes in an election year, he said Thursday that remains the best course.

"I think we're going to need deep cuts combined with an emergency, temporary tax increase in order to close the budget gap. That's the reality I described at the beginning of this effort. I think that's the best compromise," White said.

White's election opponent, Republican former Gov. Bill Clements, said the Legislature's deadlock was graphic proof of White's inability to lead.

"The fact there is a second special session is unfortunate for the state. If the leadership from the governor's office had been there during the first 30 days, this crisis would be over," Clements said.

During the special session, in sometimes bitter words, House members led by Speaker Gib Lewis held firm against any new taxes and senators led by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby insisted that a tax hike was needed, too.

The House voted to chop spending by \$740 million, while the Senate cut \$418 million. A conference committee failed to even resolve that issue.

"I'm disappointed that progress isn't being made faster," White told a brief news conference.

"But the budget is a time-consuming affair at any time. It took some 140 days (of the 1985 regular session) to craft this budget, and it's taking more than the 30 days to get it reduced."

The governor acknowledged the deep division between the two chambers. However, he said, a solution can be found.

"The Senate is going to have to give some ground, and so's the House. But that's the process of negotiation, and I think that it will eventually work," White said.

Hijackers seize Pan Am jet

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Four Arabs armed with machine guns and explosives today seized a Pan Am jumbo jet with about 400 people aboard at Karachi airport and demanded an American crew fly them to Cyprus. Pakistani officials said the gunmen killed an American passenger and wounded three airport workers.

However, both State Department officials in Washington and a Pan Am spokeswoman in New York said they were told the wounded passenger was alive. Pan Am said 41 other Americans were believed on the New York-bound Boeing 747.

The gunmen, who security officials said were Palestinians, told Pakistani officials by radio they had

planted explosives on the plane.

"No American should approach the aircraft. Otherwise we will give them a tough fight. We will not commit suicide," said the hijack leader, identified only as Mustafa.

Civil Aviation Administration director general Khurshid Manwar Mirza, who was negotiating with the hijackers from the control tower, said they demanded an American flight crew come aboard and fly the plane to Cyprus.

In exchange, they offered to release "at least the women and children and perhaps more," Mirza said.

Officials quoted Mustafa as saying the gunmen wanted to free Palestinian hijackers jailed in Larnaca.

The three-member Pan Am flight crew escaped through an emergency hatch when the gunmen seized the plane. Mirza said the hijackers set a deadline of 7 p.m. (10 a.m. EDT) for a flight crew to come on board, but did not specify what they would do if the demand was not met.

The deadline later was extended for an hour, Pan Am officials said.

Mirza said the gunmen wanted the American crew to include someone who spoke Arabic. Officials had said earlier that the hijackers wanted an Arabic-speaking flight crew.

Mirza said he told the hijackers that Pakistan was discussing the matter with the United States, and asked them to be patient, telling them, "We are doing our best to get you a crew, but we have to depend on others for this."

Pan Am officials at the airport said the American captain offered to fly to plane to Cyprus if the hijackers were disarmed first.

U.S. Embassy officials in Islamabad said they could not comment on the negotiations.

Lewis optimistic, Hobby cautious about budget

AUSTIN (AP) — Speaker Gib Lewis says he sees something at the end of the legislative tunnel, and to him it looks like a possible solution to the budget crisis.

"I can see a big spotlight at the end of the tunnel," Lewis said Thursday as the Legislature wrapped up a 30-day special session without coming close to balancing the budget.

Gov. Mark White immediately called another special session, to begin Monday and continue work on the projected \$3.5 billion deficit. He seemed glad to hear that Lewis — the prime opponent to White's tax hike plan — could see a glimmer of hope.

"If he sees it, I'm sure that I can see it, too," White said.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, who also views a tax hike as needed, warned Lewis to be wary of the light.

"There's light at the end of the tunnel. But I'm afraid it's the headlight of a train coming through," he said, but added he has "high hopes" for the next session.

During the session that ended Thursday, lawmakers approved bills that add up to about \$560 million in savings for the state, including two measures that won final approval Thursday. The House and Senate approved a compromise version of a bill that would move state pay day from the last day of the month to the first day of the next month.

That would give the state one fewer \$200 million payroll to meet in the current fiscal year.

Also approved in both chambers Thursday was a bill that increases court filing fees.

"Surprising to many of you all, we have made a great deal of progress in the last 30 days," Lewis told reporters.

Major legislation approved included a proposed constitutional amendment that would legalize branch banking, a bill allowing out-of-state banks to buy Texas banks and measures reducing teacher paper-work and increasing their

disciplinary powers.

And in a historic vote, the Legislature decided to let Texans vote on whether to legalize pari-mutuel betting. But White has told lawmakers he probably would veto that bill.

Progress was sorely lacking on the major spending cut bill. House and Senate conferees virtually gave up this week when it became apparent White would call another session.

The House had approved about \$740 million in cuts. The Senate, where a tax hike remains popular, had found only \$418 million to cut.

Lewis said there could be a place and time to consider a tax hike. But it would not be considered until all possible cuts and "cash management" measures are approved, he said.

"Once we have adopted those things, and if we are short at that time, I think you'll see a tax bill," Lewis said. "You don't step out here the first day of the session and pass a \$2 billion tax bill and need only \$500 million."

Convict gets death sentence

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — A one-time Eagle Scout must pay with his life for the murder of a banker's wife, a jury decided after deliberating less than four hours.

Lesley Lee Gosch, 31, was sentenced to die by injection Thursday for the September 1985 shooting death of Rebecca Jo Patton in a San Antonio suburb.

"I'm satisfied justice was done," Assistant Bexar County District Attorney Sam Ponder said. "It was the proper verdict."

Gosch stared at his attorney Rick Woods through thick eyeglasses as a court clerk read the jury's verdict saying Gosch would pose a threat to society and that the slaying was deliberate.

Woods said he is confident the verdict will be reversed.

"He was found guilty because the case was tried by guilt by association," he said. "There is a lot of error in this case."

The attorney said Gosch was not surprised by the sentence. Afterward, Gosch talked to his grandfather, Wesley Gosch, who is also his adopted father.

"I'll see you as soon as I can," the younger Gosch told the 74-year-old. "OK, dad, take it easy."

Midland bank fails

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — Federal authorities were working to find a healthy institution to take over the Western Bank of Midland, which fell apart along with the area's oil-based economy.

The bank on Thursday became the 16th to fail this year in Texas, reinforcing the state's dubious distinction of having more banks closed in one year than any other state.

Oklahoma and Nebraska shared the old mark of 13 in 1985. Ninety-nine banks have failed so far this year nationally.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was named as receiver for Western Bank on Thursday, and federal agents swarmed into the bank to sort through its records and find another institution to take over its deposits and \$72.8 million in assets.

"A concentration in energy-related loans and the bank's liberal practices in granting that type of credit in the early '80s created continuing asset, earnings and capital problems for Western Bank," Texas Banking Commissioner James L. Sexton said.

"A remission, of sorts, had been experienced until the recent decline in oil prices gave rise to substantial further losses and a depleted capital structure," Sexton said.

If the FDIC couldn't find a buyer for the bank today, the agency would act quickly to pay depositors' insured claims, FDIC spokeswoman Julie Amberson said, adding that Western had \$68 million in 13,300 deposit accounts.

OPEC reflects stability

DALLAS (AP) — OPEC overplayed its hand in manipulating the world oil supply, an error that led to the catastrophic collapse in the price of crude, an OPEC official says.

But the oil cartel's recent move to cut the surplus on the world oil market should lead to a permanent agreement reflecting more stability, Alirio A. Parra, Venezuela's representative to OPEC, said Thursday.

Parra, who was among several experts meeting here to discuss the oil-price collapse, said OPEC's interim accord to return for two months to a daily production ceiling of 16 million barrels is not a basic change in policy.

"The recent collapse in prices stems not from design but from OPEC having overplayed its hand," said Parra, past president of OPEC's board of governors.

"Now we have an OPEC that's not looking back on its past. It is not a creature of the '70's. It's much more realistic, organized and understands the market better," he said in a news conference.

In short, the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries hopes to produce an equilibrium between potential supplies and the growing market, Parra said.

OPEC considers 16 million barrels per day too low and 20 million too high for its production ceiling, he said.

Lawmaker wants to retire '72'

AUSTIN (AP) — Rep. Lena Guerrero wants her colleagues to approve a measure to guarantee there would never be another House Bill 72.

The Austin Democrat wants to retire the number 72, not the historic 1984 public school reform bill that carries the number. She wants HB72 to be stricken from the list of numbers assigned to legislation.

HB72 has become an overwhelming burden for a bill to bear, she said.

"It is fair to assume that any measure labeled House Bill 72 and considered by the Legislature in the near future would gain undeserved notoriety, resulting in unnecessary confusion for members and the public alike," Ms. Guerrero said in a resolution.

Landmark legislation in Texas usually takes the name of its subject or sponsors. The previous major education legislation in Texas was known as Gilmer-Alkin, named for its sponsors. But the 1984 school reform act — which made sweeping changes in education, including adding the no-pass, no-play rule — may be the only bill in Texas history that became commonly known by its number.

Secret launch planned for today

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Two satellites scheduled for a secret launch here today are to engage in orbital pursuit, with one crashing into the other in a major test of "Star Wars" technology, sources report.

Neither the Strategic Defense Initiative Office nor the National Aeronautics and Space Administration would acknowledge the launch of the Delta booster rocket today.

Reporters were to be informed a few hours before liftoff and be escorted to a viewing site on Cape Canaveral.

If the experiment is successful, SDIO, which manages the Star Wars missile defense program, planned to discuss the results several hours after launch.

A Delta has not flown since the rocket was grounded after a failure in May.

Success would end a string of four U.S. space launch failures since February and help restore confidence in a space program battered by those and the January explosion of space shuttle Challenger.

Sources who spoke on condition of anonymity said the payload consisted of two satellites that were to separate in orbit and fly intricate maneuvers, using small jet thrusters, as they tracked each other.

The objectives, they said, were to obtain spectral data with infrared sensors and to test guidance, navigation and jet thruster systems.

One of the satellites also might try to track a rocket launched from another site, the sources said.

After these concepts have been tested, they said, one of the satellites was to ignite a small motor and crash into its companion in a test of kinetic energy technology in which one projectile is hurled at another at great speed and destroys it on impact.

Seatbelts preventing traffic fatalities

AUSTIN — Texans, who were buckling up at the rate of 10 percent to 15 percent before the safety belt law, have earned the national spotlight by buckling up in record numbers and staying buckled up since the new law went into effect last September, according to George R. Gustafson, Texas Safety Association president and spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts.

Observations in 14 Texas cities show that 66 percent of drivers of passenger cars and light pickup

trucks are buckling up," he said.

"So far we are avoiding the national tendency of usage rates falling after the first initial public awareness of a new safety belt law," he said. Twenty-six states plus the District of Columbia have enacted

safety belt mandatory use laws.

Dallas and Houston had the highest safety belt usage rates of drivers in 19 cities across the nation observed in a study by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) January through June, 1986.

In the NHTSA study, Dallas was number 1, with 70.9 percent usage, and Houston was second with 70.1 percent. In third place was San Francisco with 52.6 percent.

An observational study of 14 Texas cities done by Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) of Texas A&M University in cooperation with the State Department of Highways & Public Transportation showed the same high range of usage in Dallas and Houston.

The TTI study showed high usage for other Texas cities which were not in the national survey, some even higher than Dallas and Houston. Corpus Christi was the highest with 77 percent and Austin was next with 75 percent.

Observations for the TTI study were done in the same time frame as the NHTSA work, January through June 1986. Penalties under the Texas law began December 1, 1985.

The TTI study also showed that equal proportions of drivers in passenger cars and light pickup trucks were wearing safety belts. Before the law usage in pickup trucks was lower than usage in passenger cars, according to the TTI work.

The TTI study showed an overall usage rate in the 14 cities of 66 percent for drivers, 56 percent for front seat passengers, and 65 percent for the combined driver/passenger category (42,000 drivers observed).

Driver usage in the 14 cities were Amarillo, 65 percent; Austin, 75 percent; Beaumont, 60 percent; Brownsville, 63 percent; Bryan/College Station, 70 percent; Corpus Christi, 77 percent; Dallas, 71 percent; Fort Worth, 63 percent; El Paso, 64 percent; Houston, 69 percent; Lubbock, 63 percent; San Antonio, 60 percent; Tyler, 67 percent; and Waco, 57 percent.

"We in the Texas coalition believe that the positive and vigorous enforcement carried out by our local, county, and state law enforcement officials accounts for a lot of the Texas success story," Gustafson said.

"The work of private and public sector groups doing local and statewide safety belt awareness programs is also a crucial contributing factor to these good statistics," Gustafson said.

"Of course, the most important benefit of these high usage rates is the decrease in fatalities in seating positions covered by the law. Department of Public Safety data show that front seat fatalities in passenger cars and light trucks fell about 13 percent during the first nine months under the new mandatory safety belt law in Texas," he said.

"The only way to make that good news better is for more and more people to buckle up," Gustafson said.

Nearly all have religious choices, most also participate

NEW YORK (AP) — About 60 percent of Americans — 142.2 million of them — are actively affiliated with religion, and about 96 million people — 40 percent of the country's population — attend worship services each week.

Of the overall citizenry, both active religious members and those not on the religious rolls, 91 percent, or about 217 million of them, affirm religious preferences.

These are among the data included in the 1986 Yearbook of American and Canadian Churches, compiled by the National Council of Churches, and published by the United Methodist publishing house, Abingdon Press.

The statistics show a 1.4 million increase in church members, or .96 percent, keeping pace with population growth of .9 percent for the latest period measured, 1983 to 1984. The overall figures regularly lag a year behind.

Among religious preferences of Americans, 57 percent list Protestant, 28 percent Roman Catholic, 2 percent Jewish and 4 percent other religions, Gallup polls included in the yearbook find. Only 9 percent list none.

The Catholic percentage of the population has risen 10 percent since 1947, while the Protestant percentage has fallen 12 percent.

Among various other aspects of religion presented in the yearbook were findings of a study indicating differences among Christian congregations in style rather than by denomination.

The study, initially concentrated in the Hartford, Conn., area, but with similar findings later in the Dayton, Ohio, area, said it evidently reflected a pattern spread throughout America.

Examining the orientation of various congregations, researcher David A. Roosen and associates found they are characterized by one of four distinct tendencies, cutting

across denominational lines, namely:

— "Activist orientation," which perceives the present world as the main arena of God's redemptive activity, with humankind a prime agent in opposing injustice and seeking to implement God's will on earth.

— "Civic orientation," sharing the activist concern for public life, but tending to affirm the dominant social, political and economic structures, shunning tactics seeking change.

— "Sanctuary orientation," focused primarily on a world to come in which the cares of this world will be surmounted, with congregational activities tending to shelter members from a world seen as morally

deteriorating.

— "Evangelistic orientation," also focusing on a future world in which temporal trials are overcome, but with stress on evangelistic action in public life, not to reform it, but to extend the message of salvation.

Despite the overall growth in church membership, most large, mainline denominations had slight declines, but less than over the past two decades, indicating a leveling off, says yearbook editor Constant H. Jaquet.

However, two large religious bodies had significant increases, the 2-million-member Assemblies of God gaining 2.19 percent, and the 14.4-million-member Southern Baptists gaining 1.6 percent.

Ann Landers Tomorrow may be too late

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I came across an entry in an old dairy and found a message for all of us living in a busy world. Please share it with your readers if you think it has merit.

Today, a friend of mine bought a gun and killed herself. Joanne was 43 years old, married, and had an 11-year-old daughter, Mary. I guess that's why I related to her.

We saw each other a few times after Joanne left the office where we both worked. We had lunch together a few times. I invited her and her little girl to dinner and went to a Christmas party at their house a few years ago.

So many times I was going to call Joanne but I was always too busy doing one thing or another.

DEAR POLLY - Do you have directions for making wheat malt? It's a sweetener made from wheat. - CAROLE

DEAR CAROLE - The product is actually called diastatic malt, and it makes a wonderful natural sweetener for baked goods. It's easy to make out of sprouted wheat kernels.

Sprout whole-wheat berries (available in natural-foods stores, grain mills and other places that sell whole grains) as you would any seed or bean. When the sprouts are as long as the original seed, they're ready to make into malt. Dry the wheat sprouts until they are very dry, in an oven set at the

lowest possible temperature (usually about 140 degrees), for about eight hours. Or dry them in a food dehydrator. Then grind the dried sprouts in a blender, coffee grinder, spice mill or other grinder. The resulting powder is diastatic malt. Malt gives homemade Italian breads a delicious, authentic flavor. Use a tablespoon or two to replace ¼ cup sugar, honey or other sweetener in yeast breads, cookies, over cereal, in milkshakes, etc. - POLLY

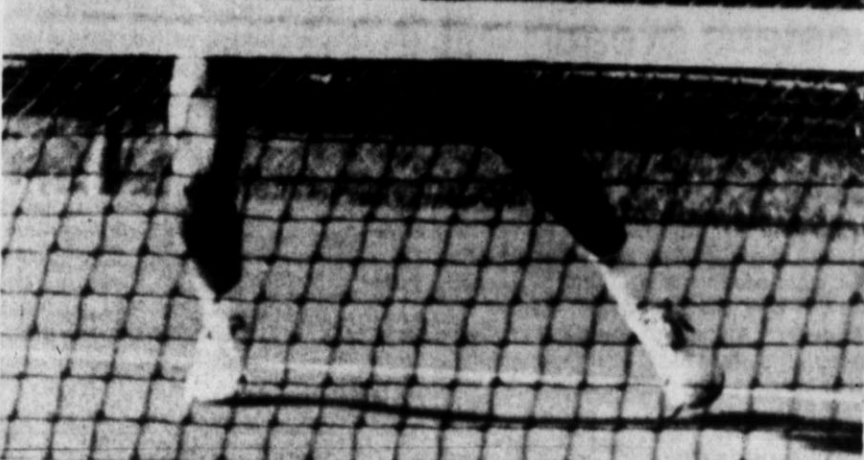

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Cowboys' cornerback leaves just before '86 opener

Walls walks out in contract dispute

DALLAS (AP) — Everson Walls' abrupt walkout in a contract dispute only days before the Dallas Cowboys' season opener amounts to desertion and "it certainly doesn't sit well with me," team president Tex Schramm said.

The 26-year-old cornerback, whose nine interceptions last season led the National Football League, left the club after practice Thursday and said he would not return until the team renegotiated the 1986 and 1987 years of his 5-year contract.

Dallas opens the season Monday night in a nationally televised game at Texas Stadium against the New York Giants, whom the Cowboys consider their biggest hurdle in their bid to repeat as NFC East champions.

"I don't think we'll negotiate under blackmail conditions," Schramm said Thursday night.

"If he makes the decision not to play in the game, then that'll have to be his decision. He will have to accept the responsibility of deserting his team on the eve of what might be

one of its biggest games," Schramm added.

Walls' agent, Steve Weinberg, told Dallas television station WFAA-TV Thursday night that the Cowboys promised in 1983 to renegotiate the final two years of Walls' contract if he had met certain performance standards by 1986.

Walls met those standards, but the

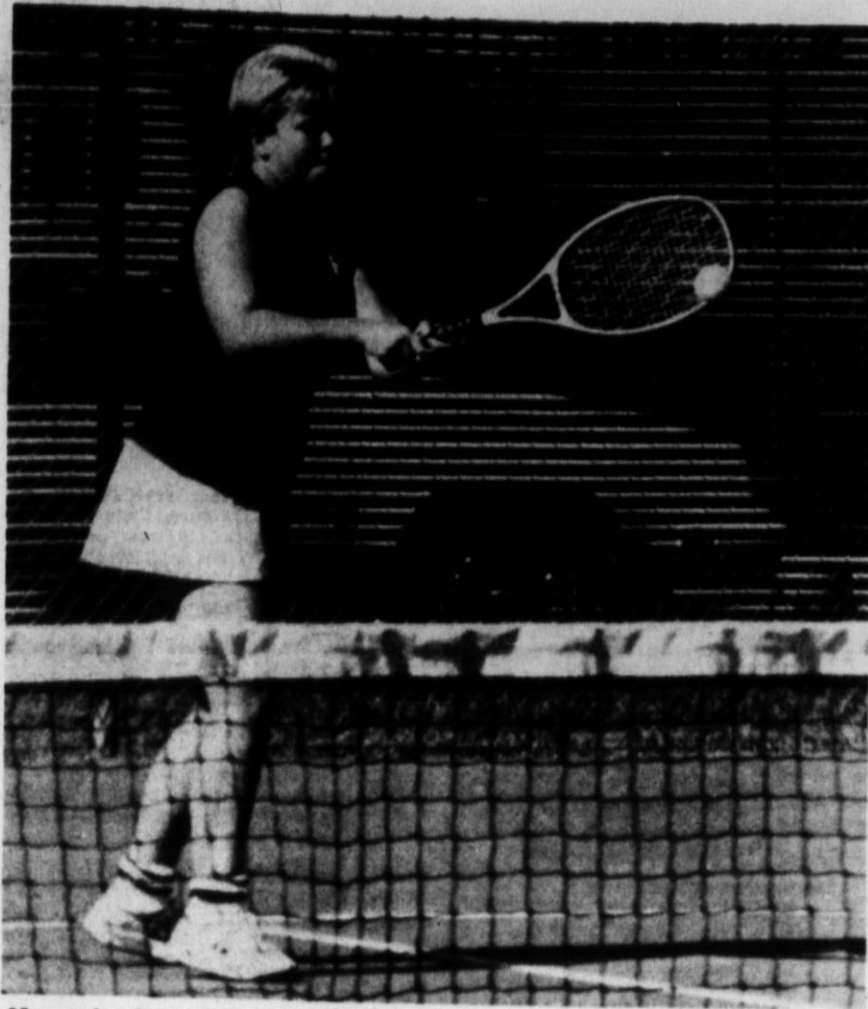
Cowboys responded with an offer that would make the all-pro cornerback only the 12th-highest member of the Cowboys and only the 25th-highest paid defensive back in the league, Weinberg said.

The team was willing to offer more money only if Walls agreed on a new 4-year contract, Weinberg said.

Dallas coach Tom Landry said the

timing of Walls' walkout bothered him.

"I would think it would have to come as a surprise to anybody. After all, we're here to play football," Landry said. "Of course, it's a problem with his contract. I don't get involved in that part of it very often, and I don't have any comments about that."

Free ticket passes at UT investigated

AUSTIN (AP) — University of Texas football players arranged free passes to football games last season for friends who were neither students nor family members, according to a published report.

Pass lists to UT games last year showed that for the first two home games, against Missouri and Rice, 46 players requested that their complimentary passes go to people described as friends, the Austin American-Statesman reported in today's editions.

The newspaper said the pass category is not within the NCAA rules unless the friends are students. Other recipients were listed as students.

For the last eight games of the season, all people designated to receive tickets were described as students or family members, although some were not.

The "friend" designation disappeared after two games because the NCAA clarified that the rule prohibited friends who were not students or relatives from receiving passes, UT officials said.

University athletic administrators said they are complying as best they can with NCAA regulations on free passes. A lawyer hired by UT to look into the Longhorn program said Thursday he will investigate the matter.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association announced on Wednesday it had suspended 60 University of Nebraska players because they allowed unauthorized people to use their free passes to Nebraska games in 1985.

The NCAA, governing body for college sports, said players may distribute their free passes only to family members, relatives and students.

But the NCAA on Thursday granted Nebraska's request for a stay of the suspensions until an appeal hearing Tuesday.

Knox Nunnally of the Houston-based law firm Vinson & Elkins, hired by UT to investigate reports of alleged NCAA violations last spring, said the Nebraska situation "is certainly something that would cause me to look at the (UT) list and see if there's anything I need to recommend changing."

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Dallas Times Herald columnist settle out of court

DALLAS (AP) — Joe Bob Briggs is still going to the drive-in, but you won't be seeing his rednecked, bigoted, sexist self in any court room.

And that's the gospel according to the nation's only drive-in movie critic, whose alter ego has settled a \$900,000 lawsuit against the Dallas Times Herald out of court.

John Bloom, who has penned his "Joe Bob Goes to the Drive-In" column since 1982, now has full rights to the Joe Bob name and can publish

two books that the suit had put on hold, Bloom spokeswoman Paula Bowen said Thursday night.

Monetary terms of the settlement were not disclosed.

Bloom sued the newspaper in February, claiming it and its parent company at the time, Los Angeles-based Times Mirror Co., had used "a series of actions and threats" to prevent him from writing, publishing or speaking about the character of the newspaper.

Bloom, who resigned from

the Times Herald last year, is on the road today doing research for another book, but Ms. Bowen said he was relieved the case over "and that he says the newspapers' officials had 'cratered'."

Times Herald Executive Editor Larry Tarleton said it was just a matter of settling the suit before the newspaper's new owner — Woodbury, N.J.-based Media News Group — signed the final purchase papers today.

"I think everybody wanted to get it over before the sale is final," he said. "We wanted to get it past us, and we wish John well. We don't have any hard feelings."

Bloom has said repeatedly that he doesn't feel the same toward the newspaper, and has dreamed in his stand-up comedy routines of turning his former bosses into "editor fondue."

Joe Bob Briggs, referring to women as "bimbos" and rating movies on a "vomit meter" scale, developed a devoted following almost immediately after his outrageous ramblings began appearing in the Times Herald.

His real name remained a pseudo-mystery for years, and promotional advertising depicted him only as a dotted outline of a man.

But the Times Herald dropped the column after the Joe Bob persona parodied the pop fund-raising tune "We Are The World" with a column called "We Are The Weird."

Its lyrics had sparked a storm of protest from Dallas blacks, who mobbed the newsroom one day and demanded that the column be killed. Then-editor Will Jarrett agreed to comply, and Bloom resigned days later.

Bloom has since signed with Universal Press Syndicate, which distributes his Joe Bob column to about 50 newspapers nationally, Ms. Bowen said. His two books about to be published are "Joe Bob Goes to the Drive-In" and "A Guide to Western Civilization, or My Story."

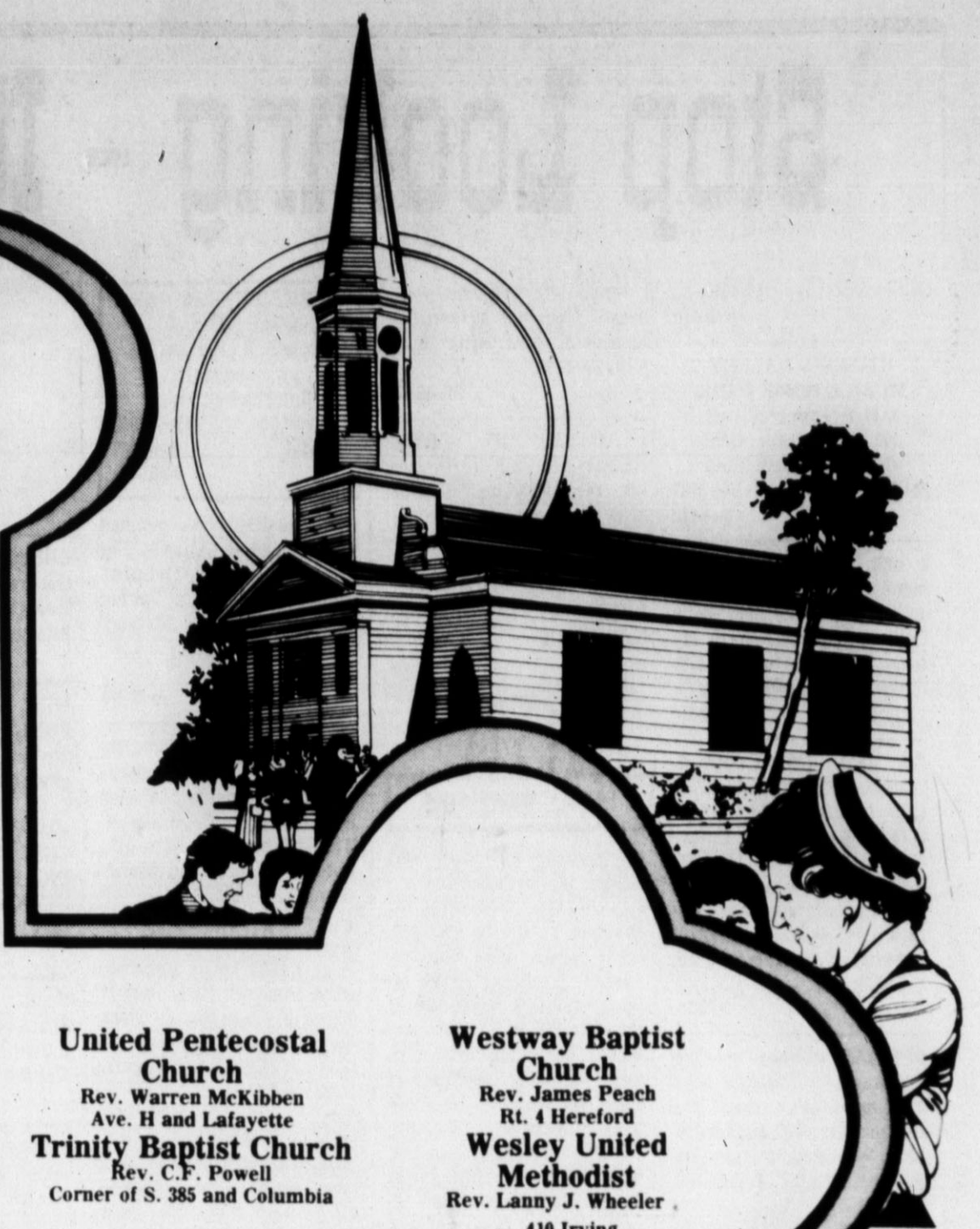
