The judges of the newly established court of appeals at Amarillo were appointed first of the week by Governor Colquitt. The appointees are J. A. Graham of Amarillo chief justice, and J. M. Pressler of Roby and R. Walker Hall of Vernon, associate judges.

It may—and probably will—mean increased taxes for the man who lives in a rented house and spends much of his money for drink, but who, when the baneful influence of the saloon is removed, will be able to buy a house of his own and pay taxes, but that sort of increased taxation will be a blessing and not a burden.—Leader.

MORE ABOUT THE DANGEROUS FLY

Many readers of these lines will recall the days when the doors and windows of homes were wide open to the flies. Even the sick room was alive with them, and many a good weary woman has passed the drony summer days seated at the bedside of some patient to whom the flies had brought disease, patiently swaying the flybrush over the pallid features of the sufferer. One member of the family after another would be "taken down" and have to be doctored and fanned and nursed until the end came. The record of suffering (unnecessary suffering) thus makes the heavy heart sink, and brings to many minds and hearts sad losses which

we have proceeded until there is now going on throughout the Nation a persistent crusade against the typhoid fly.

At a meeting of the Biological Society in Washington Dr. W. C. Stiles, who first gave prominence to the hookworm and inspired the movement against its ravages spoke strongly in favor of newspaper publicity of the fly menace in order that the public should be made to realize the danger and be impressed with the need of making special effort to exterminate flies. Complaint had been made that the newspaper war on the fly was to a degree sensational, but Dr. Stiles said the evil could hardly be exaggerated. He said: "I believe that instead of exaggerating anything about the fly, we have not even approached the full truth as yet. There are so many terrific things yet to be told the people about this filthy little National insect that there is only one way to get it abroad, and that is through the newspapers." Dr. Stiles insisted that there was need of arousing the people not only in the crowded cities, but also in the rural districts, to a realization of the menace of the fly.—Ex.

Hedley Wants You

HEDLEY, TEXAS, is located on the Fort Worth & Denver City railroad, in Donley county, 264 miles northwest of Fort Worth and 72 miles southeast of Amarillo, Texas. Hedley is only three years old and already has a population of nearly five hundred and is growing all the time. Hedley is nicely located as to drainage, being almost a level country, but with just enough fall to drain well. The sanitary question is one of our first considerations.

THE COUNTRY surrounding Hedley is without question one of the most productive farming sections in the State. There has never been anything near a failure in crops here; last year when other parts of the country had almost total crop failures, this section had fine cotton and feed crops. This not being a feed farming country alone makes it more sure of producing some money crop each year.

HEDLEY is composed of live, energetic and enterprising people who are wide-awake to any thing that will help the town. We have a two-story brick school building of which a town of three thousand inhabitants might be proud; constructed last summer at a cost of \$8,000; has its own system of water-works and being entirely sanitary. The Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian churches are all well represented here. The town is strictly prohibition, having no saloons and wanting none. The following fraternal orders have good representation here: A. F. & A. M., I. O. O. F., W. O. W., M. W. A., and R. N. A.

HEDLEY has some splendid brick buildings and more being planned. The following business enterprises are here and having good patronage. A State bank, another bank being organized, 3 dry goods stores, 4 groceries,

2 drug stores, 2 hardware and implement stores, 1 saddle and harness store, 1 newspaper—a live wire, 1 barber shop, 2 good lumber yards, 2 well equipped blacksmith shops, 1 vehicle dealer, 1 cabinet shop, 1 splendid telephone exchange with several rural lines, 1 postoffice, five daily mails, 1 R. F. D. mail line, 1 livery barn, 1 wagon yard, 3 dray lines, 1 cold storage, 1 hotel and another under construction, 1 restaurant, 2 millinery establishments, 1 broom factory, a public waterworks, 2 or more real estate offices, 1 fire insurance office, 1 furniture store, 1 undertaking establishment, 2 lodge halls, 2 good physicians, 1 good gin, a pavilion capable of seating 500 people, and a nice park being improved, a depot large enough for a much larger town—the shipping facilities are the very best, having several thousand feet of side-track on level ground.

DURING the year of 1910 we shipped from Hedley 1403 bales of cotton, 175 cars of feed stuff, and about 30 cars of hogs and cattle.

HEDLEY has a Commercial Club that does something. If you mean business write to the Secretary. Perhaps you think Hedley has enough business enterprises, but when you consider that the town has a trade territory of over 336 square miles of thickly settled country you will see that there is room for more enterprises, some kinds that we have and some that we have not. 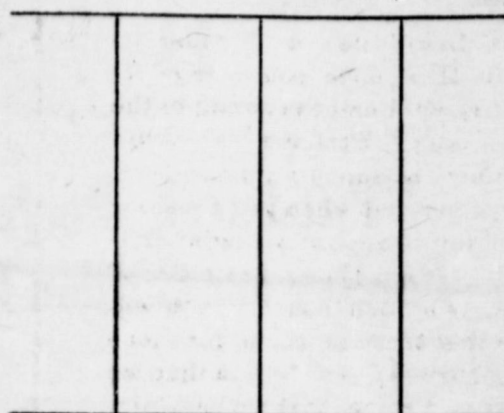

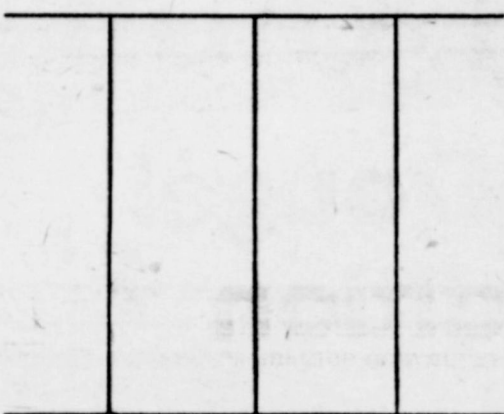

SALOONS IN KANSAS

The Great Bard spoke of sermons in stones. Kansas has found sermons in grocery bills. Wichita, a few years ago, was the Gibraltar of the saloon in Kansas. Its saloons were running years after the Kansas saloon law went into effect. Deals were made at the state conventions and nominations secured through promises of open saloon for Wichita. The protest was long coming, but arrived, and like many other reform movements of the day, arrived with momentum. A "dry" mayor was elected. Heavy penalties for violation of law were exacted. The saloons died hard, but the last vestige of them finally passed. Note the result. Before the saloons closed the bank clearings of Wichita were \$1,200,000 weekly. In three years they had increased to something over three million dollars. The city, instead of going backward, as freely predicted, has steadily grown. A few years ago there were barely ten per cent of the population of Wichita opposed to the saloon. Probably there are not now a very large minority of the population who would favor it. One newspaper changed in a single day from pro-saloon to anti-saloon. In six weeks its circulation had increased six thousand copies. In another Kansas community a merchant declares that his collections increased forty per cent shortly after prohibition went into effect. Workmen paying for insurance. Before the saloons closed forty per cent of these workmen were in arrears. Within a short time after the enforcement of the law these arrears had disappeared and many were paying in advance.
