OIL FIELD PROSPECTS BRIGHT IN KIMBLE

Messrs. N. A. Fleisher and B. L. Rayburn of San Antonio, Texas are making a general survey of Kimble county, preparatory to making purchases of mineral leases.

Mr. Fleisher, who has been in the business for something like twenty years says the prospects are very good for an oil field in this county.

The Dixie company rig on the Bode property is temporarily closed down waiting for casing. The crew struck a hard lime formation at a depth of around three hundred feet, and after losing their drill tools once or twice, and breaking drill stems thought it advisable to await for an eighteen inch casing. The casing will be shipped from Pittsburgh, Pa., and as soon as it is received, drilling will be resumed. The rig used in every respect and the company backing the proposition is a reliable organization so that a good test is assured.

It is worth the while of any party who has lands to lease thoroughly investigating the parties to whom they are contemplating making a lease and in the event they are unreliable, to refuse to lease. This will usually save a lot of trouble and worry in the matter of making land titles merchantable in later days.

GRADE CROSSING GATES AND THE PEARLY GATES

It seems astounding that one railroad should have 390 grade crossing gates crashed by reckless drivers in one brief year. That is more than one a day. Yet this is the 1925 record reported by the Southern Pacific Lines. Six flagmen were run down while trying to warn motorists. Some extra bold drivers had the temerity even to try to push trains off the tracks. A few of them, too proud to pick up one end of a train, which is the right way if you are making a business of it, tore into cars in the middle of trains.

This is getting altogether too ambitious. The only way to save such drivers from their own driving is to eliminate grade crossings or else deny them the right to drive. And speaking of grade crossings, the railroads claim that if all the grade crossings were eliminated it would wipe out but ten per cent of their auto accidents. Maybe so but at least the elimination of grade crossings would save the nerves and the time of hundreds of thousands of motorists who are too careful or too sane to try to crash crossing gates or to beat trains on their own tracks.—October SUNSET.

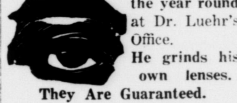

LOOT!

The Pirate Hero of a Novel

ALTHOUGH Capt. John Gow, alias Smith, alias Goffe, had the honor of having an account of his piratical career written by Defoe and ninety years later, as "Captain Cleveland," he was made the hero of a novel by Sir Walter Scott, there was in reality little in his life to justify so much attention. The principal interest lies in the incidents connected with his trial and execution because they show that society 200 years ago was often fully as brutal and cruel in punishment as were the pirates themselves.

Gow's career of piracy began with the usual mutiny and he, the second mate, was chosen leader by the mutineers after they had murdered the officers of their ship, the George. Next they renamed the vessel, the Revenge—a favorite name for a pirate ship, it seems—and began a cruise off the coast of Spain, but plundering the shipping of their own country, England, and of Gow's native Scotland.

Then they sailed for Madeira where Gow established friendly relations with the governor by presenting him with a box of Scotch herring. Their next port of call was the Orkney Islands where they sold most of the cargoes of the ships they had robbed. At Carristown Gow landed his men and began plundering the houses of the gentry, after which, in a spirit of bravado, he marched back to his ship with a baggage leading the parade.

After a series of raids along the Scottish coast, Gow and his men were finally captured by his aroused countrymen and taken to London on the British frigate Greyhound for trial. The trial opened at the famous Newgate prison on May 8, 1725. Gow was sullen in behavior and refused to enter any plea, so it was ordered that he be "pressed," the only form of torture allowed at that time. This consisted of chaining the criminal down upon a floor with arms and legs outspread. Weights were then piled upon him until he consented to "plead." If not, he was "pressed" to death.

At the last moment the pirate leader yielded and entered a plea of not guilty. He was found guilty, however, and hanged on June 11. An old chronicle gives the following naive account of the manner of his dying: "As he was turned off, he fell down from the gibbet, the rope breaking by the weight of some that pulled his leg. Although he had been hanging for four minutes, he was able to climb up the ladder a second time, which seemed to concern him very little, and he was hanged again. His body was then taken to Greenwich and there hanged in chains to warn others." (16, 1825, Western Newspaper Union.)
