TO CONTINUE REGIONAL PUBLICITY DRIVE

Plan to Buy New Park For City

MOVEMENT to induce the city to purchase fifteen acres in the southwestern section of the city to be used as a site for a city park, started several days ago by local business men, is expected to culminate at the meeting Tuesday night of the city park commission.

Three blocks of land, extending from 21st to 24th streets, and near Avenue U-V and W, now containing no buildings and part of the land covered by water, are for sale at a reasonable figure. It was pointed out by the business men, A. C. Jackson, owner of the two of the blocks, and Flora Green Atholson, owner of the other, have agreed to sell the entire fifteen acres to the city for \$12,000, a figure which local realtors declare is very reasonable.

This site, now used to some extent as a dumping ground, is one of the eye-sore spots of the city, and it is thought that with proper drainage and possibly some filling in, it could be developed into a beautiful park. The park commission, called for the purpose of park and playground improvement, will take the matter under consideration Tuesday, and possibly take action on the question on the question at that time.

The sponsors of the idea, unaffiliated parties from the different sections of the city, point out that this section of the city is growing rapidly and the proposed park site will in a few years be the center of a residential district of the city. As it will be necessary in the future to install storm sewers in this section anyway, the expense to the city in establishing a park at this place would be greatly minimized.

Several of the lots on the outlying sides of the three blocks are now suitable for residential building sites, and the owners have agreed to sell the entire three blocks if the city desires to purchase them.

Germany Bans Entry Of Communist Chief

LONDON, Feb. 7 (P)—Unofficial reports from Moscow and Berlin today seemed to indicate at least two things—that Leon Trotsky is still in Soviet territory, and that persons approaching the Berlin government and asked informally if he could come to Germany.

These were told it would be useless for the Soviet to apply for a Consular Visa which would permit Trotsky to enter Germany. Domestic political conditions and the fear of Russo-German relations in event of the assassination or untoward political moves of his own were assumed as reasons.

Will Confer Before Selling Ocean Fleet

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (P)—Members of the shipping board agreed today to confer with the senate commerce committee before making a contract for the sale of the Atlantic fleet of the government shipping lines.

N. MEXICO WANTS TO REGAIN CAVE

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 7.—Three years ago New Mexico transferred to the U. S. Government in a land made a piece of land in Eddy county, which, it so happened, contained the Carlsbad Caverns—and now New Mexico wants its land back.

The purpose of the trade was to enable the state to get rid of some worthless land and receive from the government agricultural lands which would bring an income to the common school funds.

The tract which was traded has some one of the show spots of the state.

LAND TRADES RESULT FROM AD CAMPAIGN

THREE YEAR PROGRAM IS SOUGHT BY COMMITTEE

Tangible proof of the success of the 12,000 advertising campaign of the Lubbock Board of City Development was given to the advertising committee of the organization this morning with the report that one-half section of land had been sold as a direct result of the campaign.

Meeting in the city hall, the advertising committee, including the management of the South Plains, Inc., voted to continue the nationwide campaign throughout the year 1929 and requested that the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce appropriate a budget to carry on the work already begun. More than 1,500 inquiries have already been received from the campaign up until this time, and only about \$7,200 of the 12,000 1928 budget has been spent.

The committee hopes in the future to induce the larger land owners of this section and the larger utilities companies, the ones benefited most by the campaign, to contribute funds to the advancement of the advertising program.

Plan Three Year Program. The committee approved the report of the campaign up until this time and expressed the desire of carrying it through a period of at least three years.

A questionnaire to be sent to the parties requesting the follow-up booklet of the advertising campaign was approved by the committee. The questionnaire will obtain desirable information from the parties interested in this section. This information will be tabulated and lists furnished to all local real estate men and land owners, giving them an opportunity to purchase.

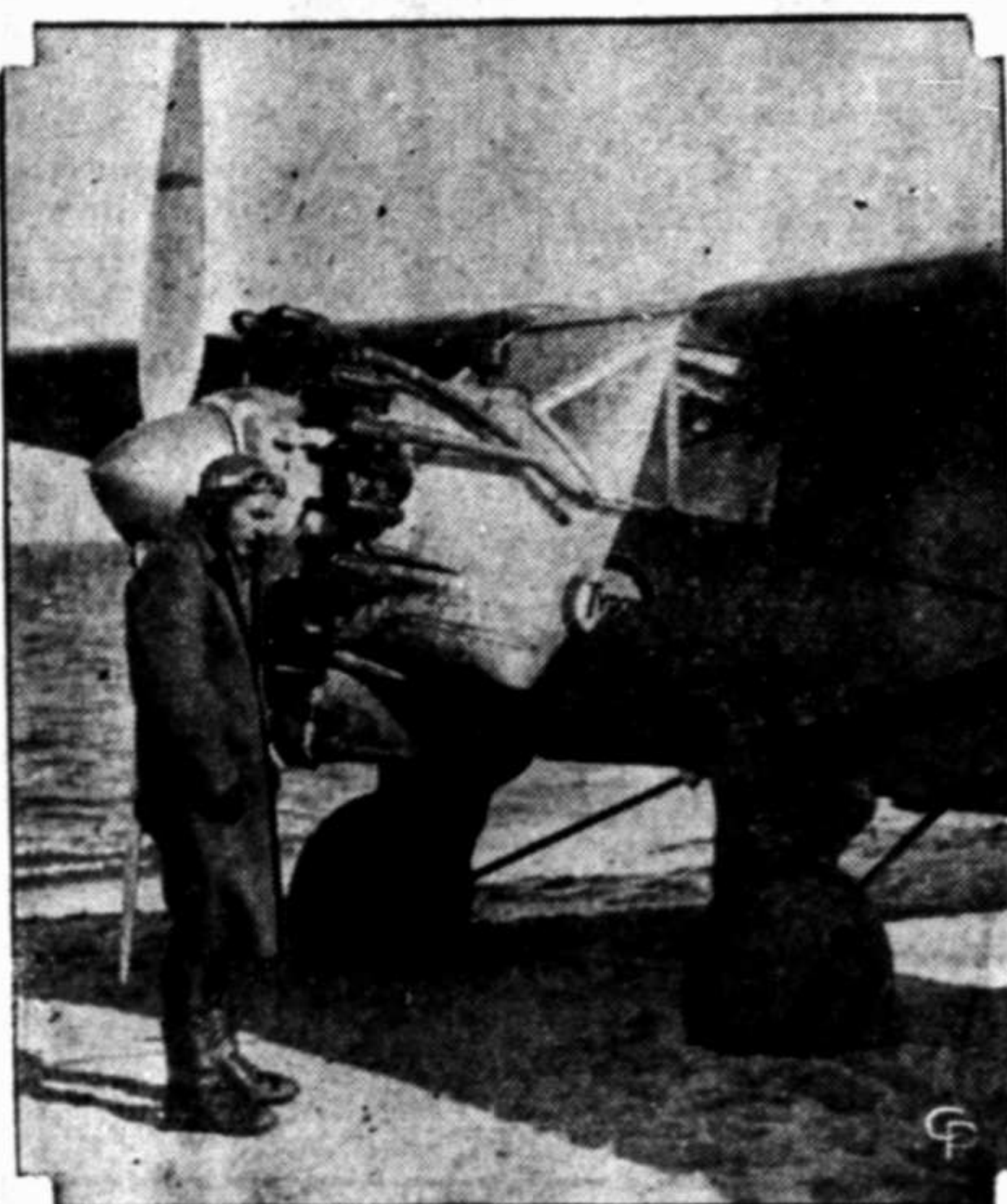
Restrain Building Of Coast Pipe Line

JENSEN GIVES UP ATTEMPTED TIME FLIGHT

FLIER ABANDONS TRY AFTER BATTLING ICE AND RAIN

(By Associated Press) MITCHELL FIELD, N. Y., Feb. 7.—A "hoodoo" that trailed Martin Jensen from the time he took off yesterday in an attempt to break the solo endurance flight record finally forced him down at 2:10 a. m. today with less than half his goal achieved. He had been in the air 17 hours, 6 minutes.

He declared the combination of ice and rain that he had faced all day and night culminated in a series of petty annoyances caused him to give up the attempt.

A minor break in a gasoline pipe, the breaking of the thermostat and the bad weather caused him considerable annoyance. When a gallon of water crashed to the floor of the cabin, sending fragments of the jug into his eyes, he decided he had enough.

McDonald Change Of Venue Sought

PARIS, Texas, Feb. 7 (P)—Charging it would be impossible to get an impartial trial in a county where the case has been before two juries, relatives contesting the will of the late William J. McDonald have filed motion for a change of venue from Lamar county. The will of the Paris capitalist left \$1,250,000 to Texas University for an astronomical observatory. Relatives allege he was not of testamentary capacity.

Tomorrow the 174 will arrive at Manzanillo, Pacific port, and will be put aboard a small steamer which will take them to the penal colony on a tropical island in Las Tres Marias (The Three Marys) group, off the coast of the state of Nayarit.

The complete isolation of the group, the tales of horrors which the Archipelago has seen, and the hopelessness of the lot of those sent there, have given the islands a reputation in Mexico anything but savory. Sentences to penal servitude there are usually reserved for extreme cases.

Weeping relatives and friends of the convicts watched them as a military police guard, more than twice their number, herded them out of the penitentiary here and into box cars. The convicts themselves, determined it seemed, to make the best of their lot, sang popular songs as they filed into the cars.

All of the prisoners are old offenders, and together constitute the largest group which has been sent to Las Tres Marias in a long time. Each prior to departure was given two pesos (less than a dollar) and a supply of food and cigarettes to last him on the journey.

PIPE LINE TO LEA OIL FIELD IS ANNOUNCED

TEXAS COMPANY FIRST TO SERVE NEW MEXICO AREA

PORT WORTH, Feb. 7 (P)—The Texas Pipe Line company is preparing to build the first pipe line into the newly developing oil district in southeastern New Mexico, according to information obtained at the local offices of the company, and its parent company, the Texas company.

The line will be 10 inches, and will be laid 25 miles from the terminus of the present Texas Pipe Line at Wink, in the Hendrick pool of Winkler county, to Jal, New Mexico. Construction to be pushed immediately.

From the terminus at Jal, the new extension will serve New Mexico producing areas by gathering lines. Showings for production in two wildcats, Texas company No. 1 Shepherd and Skelly Oil company No. 1 Joiner, both of which have apparently located new producing areas, is supposed to be the reason for the extension.

Humble Pipe Line company may be a second line in the new territory, it being unofficially reported that company is now surveying for a route to the New Mexico area from the Winkler field.

RAIL PLEA TO BE DECIDED IN FRIDAY MEET

TRAFFIC EXPERT WILL CONFER WITH SANTA FE OFFICIALS

Albert L. Reed, traffic expert of Dallas, employed by the Lubbock Board of City Development to aid the Santa Fe Railway in securing its proposed extension to Lovington, N. M., will meet with officials of the railway at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning at the city hall.

H. C. Pipkin, Santa Fe attorney of Amarillo; T. B. Gallagher, general passenger and freight agent of the railway; and other officials of the company will attend the conference, as will the railroad committee of the local Chamber of Commerce.

The purpose of the meeting will be to determine the way, means and type of data to be compiled as evidence to secure the cooperation of all points. B. Sherrod, chairman of the railroad committee asks the aid of local citizens in making the trips and collecting the desired data and making the survey.

REPEAL OF DRY LAWS IS ASKED

MASSACHUSETTS WANTS AMENDMENT TO BE NULLIFIED

BOSTON, Feb. 7.—Massachusetts, as represented by the state senate, is on record in favor of the repeal of the prohibition amendment to the federal constitution. A resolution requesting Congress to take action to that effect was passed yesterday without debate by a vote of 28 to 6 in accordance with majority roll called up in favor of repeal in 34 of the 40 senatorial districts on a referendum last November.

Shortly before the senate took action the house voted against further consideration of a petition of Representative Charles S. Rackerman of Boston asking that the house likewise memorialize Congress for repeal. By a vote of 130 to 70 the house decided the November referendum applied only to the senate.

SNOW FALLS IN PLAINS REGION

The cold wave which yesterday sent the temperature into a nose dive spent its severest fury in Lubbock this morning, settling down to a slow-falling snow—the first of the year—about noon today. The thermometer experienced a thirty-five degree drop yesterday afternoon, reaching a low mark of sixteen by 7 o'clock this morning. The mercury hovered around the twenty degree mark early this morning.

Sleet which blanketed the South Plains today made streets and highways in every direction treacherously slick. Mist-frozen windshields last night and this morning made motoring exceedingly dangerous. No serious accidents have been reported here, however.

This morning's snow was the first to fall in Lubbock this year. It started shortly before noon and was still falling at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The weather forecast for tomorrow indicates snow and continued cold.

LANDSLIDES BLOCK COLORADO RAILWAYS

DENVER, Feb. 7 (P)—Railroad transportation in the mountainous regions of southwestern Colorado was at a standstill today while section crews began a two weeks task of clearing tracks of the heaviest snowdrifts in many years. Highways also were impassable. The towns of Silverton, a mining community, and Craig on the Denver & Rio Grande Western railroad from Durango, were isolated. Since Saturday nine snow slides have crashed down on the tracks and one of these was said to be from 40 to 75 feet deep and 800 feet wide.

Sub zero weather prevailed in Montana and near Bozeman an ice jam flooded the lowlands forcing farmers to flee their homes. Some loss of livestock was feared.

Highways in Wyoming, Utah and Idaho were blocked by snowdrifts and zero temperatures were general throughout the latter state. Seventy-five motorists marooned on the east-highway out of Salt Lake City last night were rescued by a state highway crew.

A cold wave from the northwest hit the southwest and sent the mercury tumbling to from 10 to 15 degrees above zero. In Kansas and the Texas Panhandle a new snow was reported. Snow was expected in Oklahoma.

LEIDIGH IS NEW KIWANIS LEADER

The resignation of Dorrance D. Roderick as president of the Lubbock Kiwanis club was tendered and accepted at the regular weekly luncheon of the organization at the Hotel Lubbock at noon today. A. H. Leidigh, vice-president of the club, automatically became president with the acceptance of the resignation.

A committee headed by W. W. Rylander was appointed to draw up a statement of regret to Mr. Roderick because of the necessity of his resignation.

Carlson Woodward, of Big Spring, past president of the club here, made a short talk and was presented with a "Past President's" pin by the club. Mr. Woodward was voted an honorary membership.

ACID THROWER IS SOUGHT BY POLICE

Philadelphia Customs Head Attacked While Asleep

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 7 (P)—Believing that a member of a narcotic ring or a young man acquainted with his daughter may have been responsible, federal and city detectives today sought an acid thrower who attacked Joseph L. Green, a customs official, while he slept.

Green, field chief of customs inspectors and guards at the port of Philadelphia, and noted for his prosecutions of smuggling cases, remained in a hospital, his face, neck and chest seared with acid.

Green was attacked early Wednesday when he was asleep at his home. Mrs. Green and two daughters who were in adjoining rooms, did not hear the intruder, who escaped by a rear door after taking several hundred dollars worth of jewelry.

GAS STATION OWNER KILLED IN GUN FIGHT

W. E. DUKE, BAPTIST MINISTER GIVES UP AT LAMESA

(Special To The Journal) LAMESA, Feb. 7.—J. A. Cox, filling station operator of the Klondyke community, fifteen miles southwest of here, was shot and instantly killed late last night.

W. E. Duke, pastor of the Midway Baptist Church, near Lamesa, surrendered to officers shortly after the shooting.

Both Cox and Duke are from prominent Dawson county families. In addition to his ministry, the Rev. Duke is owner and operator of a store at Klondyke, where he and his family live. The shooting occurred in front of the Duke store.

The Rev. Mr. Duke has been pastor there for the past five years. The Rev. Duke would make no statement this morning concerning the tragedy following a conference with Judge J. E. Garland, County Attorney A. W. Gibson announced that the examining trial would be held today. No cause for the shooting could be advanced today by Sheriff Joe L. Ray or Deputy A. M. Bennett of Dawson county.

Mr. Cox is survived by his widow, four children, one brother, and other relatives. The body is being held in a local undertaking establishment awaiting arrival of relatives.

PERMITS NEAR HALF MILLION

\$500,000 MARK SURE TO BE REACHED DURING PRESENT MONTH

Following on the heels of a \$182,220,000 contract for the construction of a subway at the Broadway intersection of the Santa Fe tracks, an additional permit of \$3,500 this morning boosted the year's building total for Lubbock to \$455,450, less than \$45,000 below the half million mark.

The new high total marks a new unprecedented era of building activity for this time of the year. January's total this year experienced a substantial increase over the total of a year before, and the total for February, 1928, was \$122,000 as compared to \$197,222 already this month and with three more weeks yet to go. Several other major projects looming in the near future are expected to boost the building to even higher totals.

Six permits have been issued this month and 72 since the first of the year. This morning permit of \$3,500 was to S. N. King for the construction of a building at 314 Avenue, and yesterday's large contract was issued jointly to the Panhandle Construction company, city of Lubbock and the Panhandle Santa Fe Railway company.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 7 (P)—Mardi Gras in New Orleans will open formally tonight with the arrival of Momus, son of the Moon, and God of Mirth. Momus will assemble his retinue in pageant and more through the principal thoroughfares to the Athenaeum for the annual ball of the Krewe of Momus.

UNCOVER CACHE OF TREASURE

HAVANA, Feb. 7 (P)—Four fishermen browsing about the beach near Batabano, Cuba, Tuesday excavated four old cannons, in the muzzles of which they found ancient Spanish doubloons, pieces of gold, and rare old jewelry of an estimated value of \$50,000. One of the date of 1687.

Cuban law provides that a large part of such treasure when found shall be used to enrich the national coffers. However, Castellanos Mesa, congressman from Batabano, who brought the story of the discovery to Havana, is endeavoring to have the fishermen rewarded with a big share of their find. He believes it to be an old pirate cache.

LOSS BY SALE OF LEASES IS POINTED OUT

LAND SOLD BY STATE AT \$3 AN ACRE SOON COST \$10,000

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Feb. 7.—Laws governing the sale of public lands are so inadequate that recently the state disposed of property at \$3 per acre, that was subsequently sold for \$10,000 an acre and is now producing from \$7,000,000 to \$10,000,000 worth of oil. Judge R. L. Batts, chairman of the board of regents, told the land office investigating committee today.

The land in question comprised 234 acres in either Upton or Crane county and is adjoining or a part of the university lands, he said. "Ownership to the property was established in a vacancy suit of which the university had no notice," Judge Batts testified.

"The public school lands are being dissipated by what seems to me to be a foolish policy," he said. SECRETARY TO GOVERNOR OUT

MRS. HAMMONDS QUILTS AMID OKLAHOMA FURORE

(By Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 7.—The resignation of Mrs. O. O. Hammonds, confidential secretary to Henry S. Johnston, suspended governor, before them, legislators today speculated on what effect her exit from the state's political arena might have on the present situation.

Anti-administration forces led by Tom Knight, representative from Rogers county, branded Mrs. Hammonds' move as a political gesture seeking sympathy for the governor's cause.

Leading the administration forces phoned out "perfect confidence" in the outcome of his case. Adding that should he be acquitted in the state court, Mrs. Hammonds was going to return to the office in any capacity whatsoever.

With the full approval and consent of both parties, Mrs. Hammonds declared her loyalty to the governor, saying "I want you to know that I have full confidence in the justice of your cause, that I am in you and that I am standing squarely back of you in this trying hour."

She attacked foes of the administration, declaring "It has been apparent for some time that state government would be destroyed, if necessary, to destroy individuals who have thwarted the schemes of depriving politicians in their endeavor to control the revenue of the different departments."

She said evidence adduced by the investigating committee "proved beyond a doubt that no honest investigation was desired," and branded the "entire record" as "a lot of foolish statements and misrepresentations to create propaganda that would be sensational enough to throw a smoke screen over their purpose, all with the ultimate aim of accomplishing and carrying out their selfish aims."

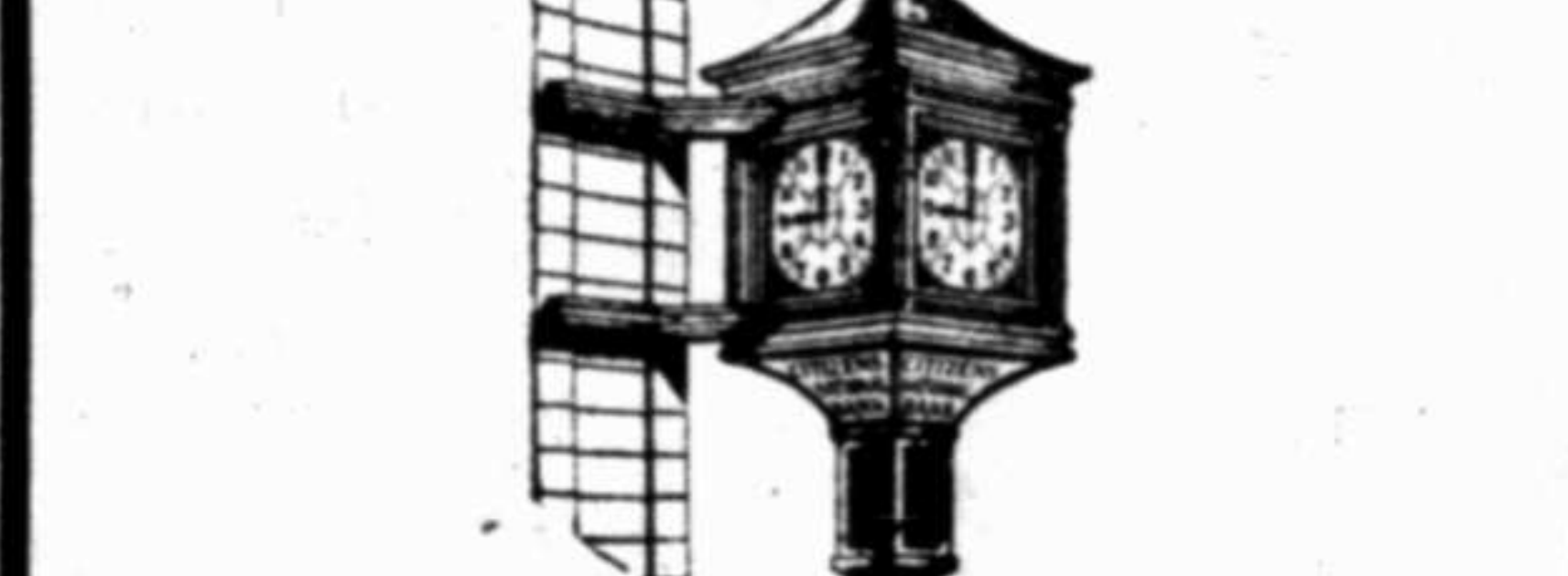

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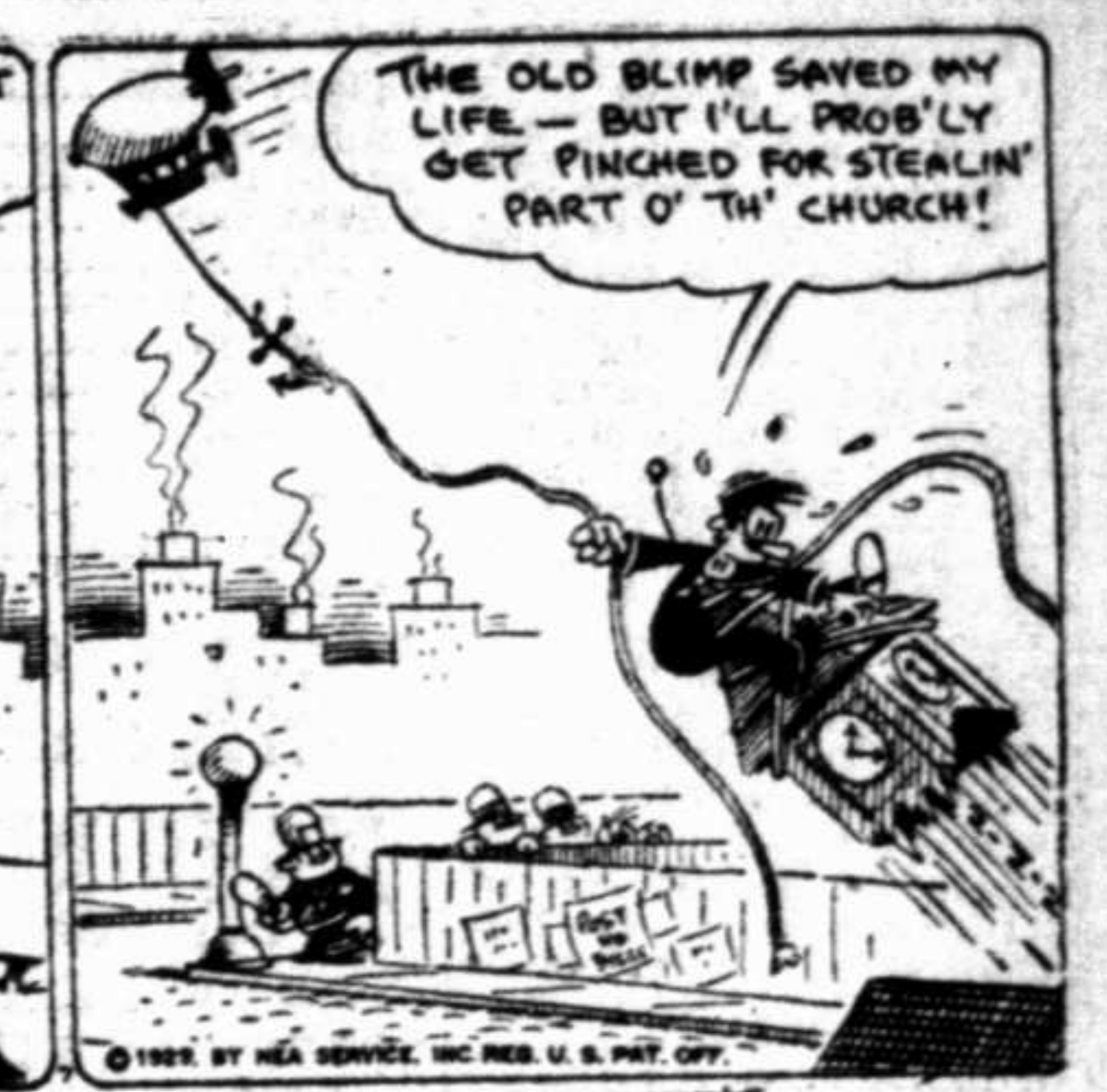

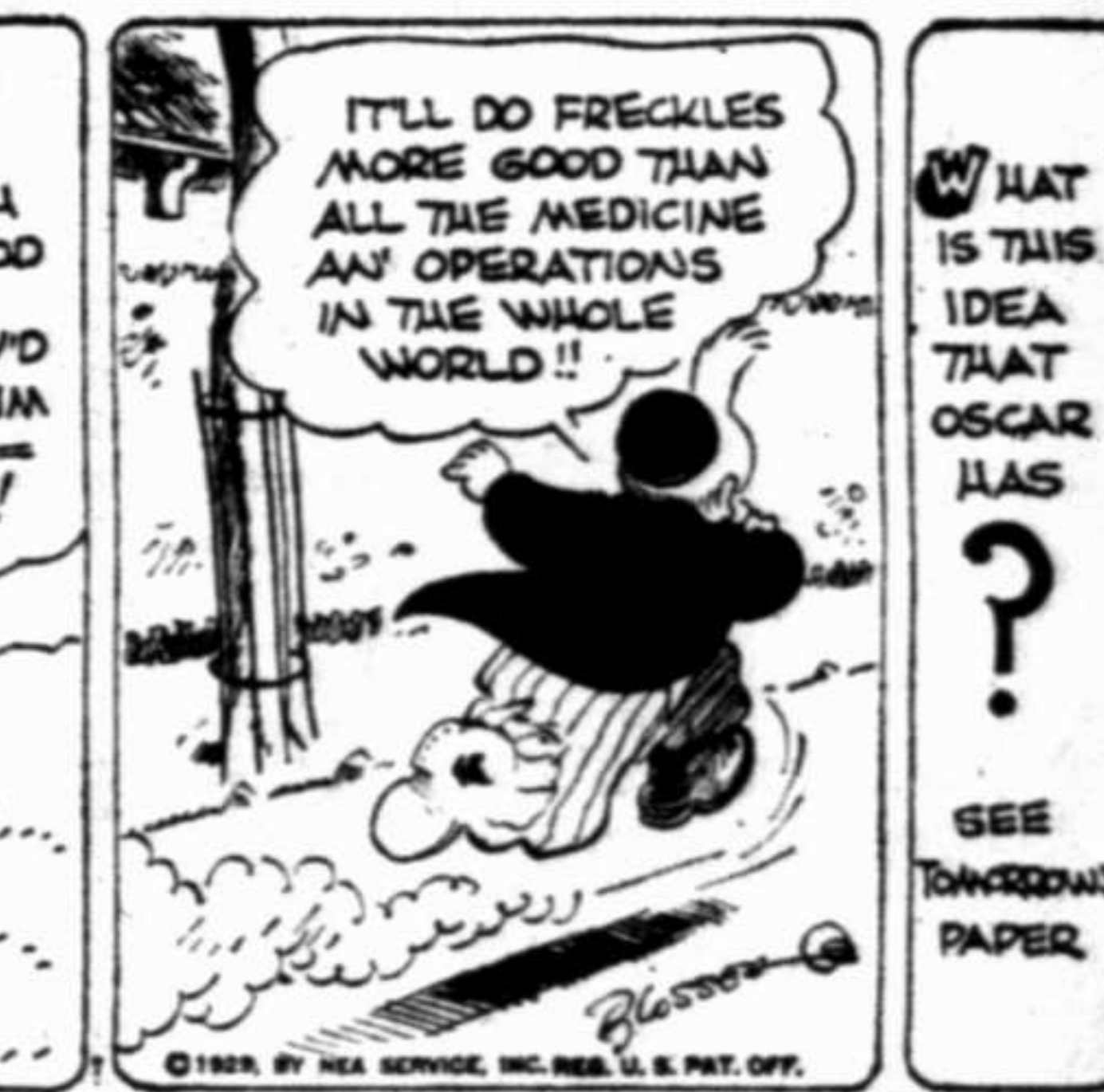

STOCK MARKET TAKES PLUNGE

SHARP BREAK MADE AT OPENING OF TRADING ON WALL STREET

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—The stock market broke sharply at the opening today under an avalanche of selling orders inspired by the federal reserve board's criticism of the use of credit for speculation, and the advance of a full point in the Bank of England's discount rate. Pictures, Nash Motors, Vanadium Steel, Greene Cananea, Talking Machine and Kennecott, Copper, American Metals, Victor fell back 5 to 10 points.

Strong buying support made its appearance before the end of the first hour, and some impressive recoveries took place. General Electric quickly regained 11 1/2 points of its loss and U. S. Steel and some of the other industrial leaders rallied 2 points or more.

Sterling exchange advanced about 3-4 of a cent to around \$4.85-19-32, or well above the "gold import" point.

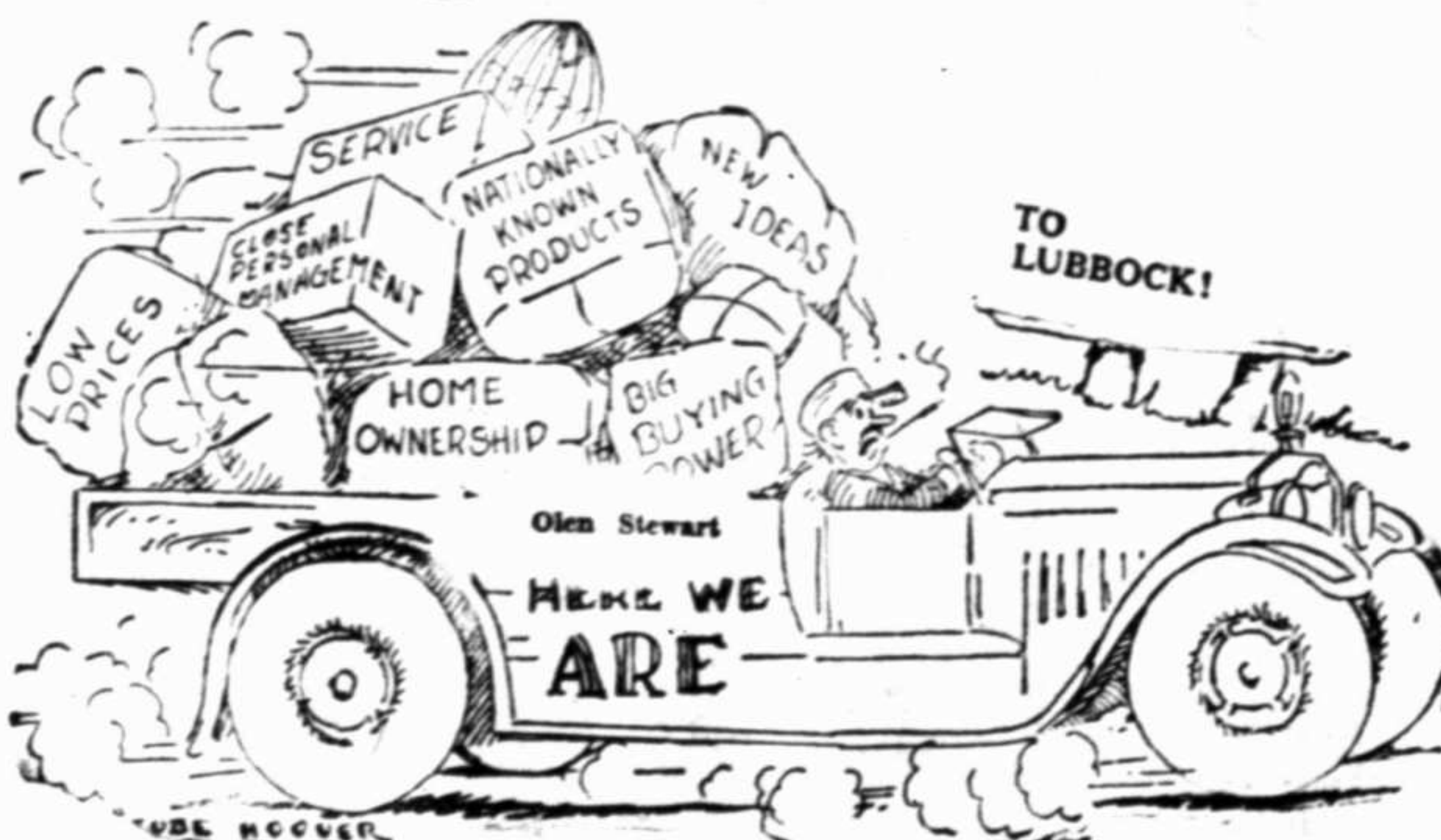

The city ordinance forbidding cars to be parked in downtown alleys was enforced on a number of local business men yesterday by a member of the city police force.

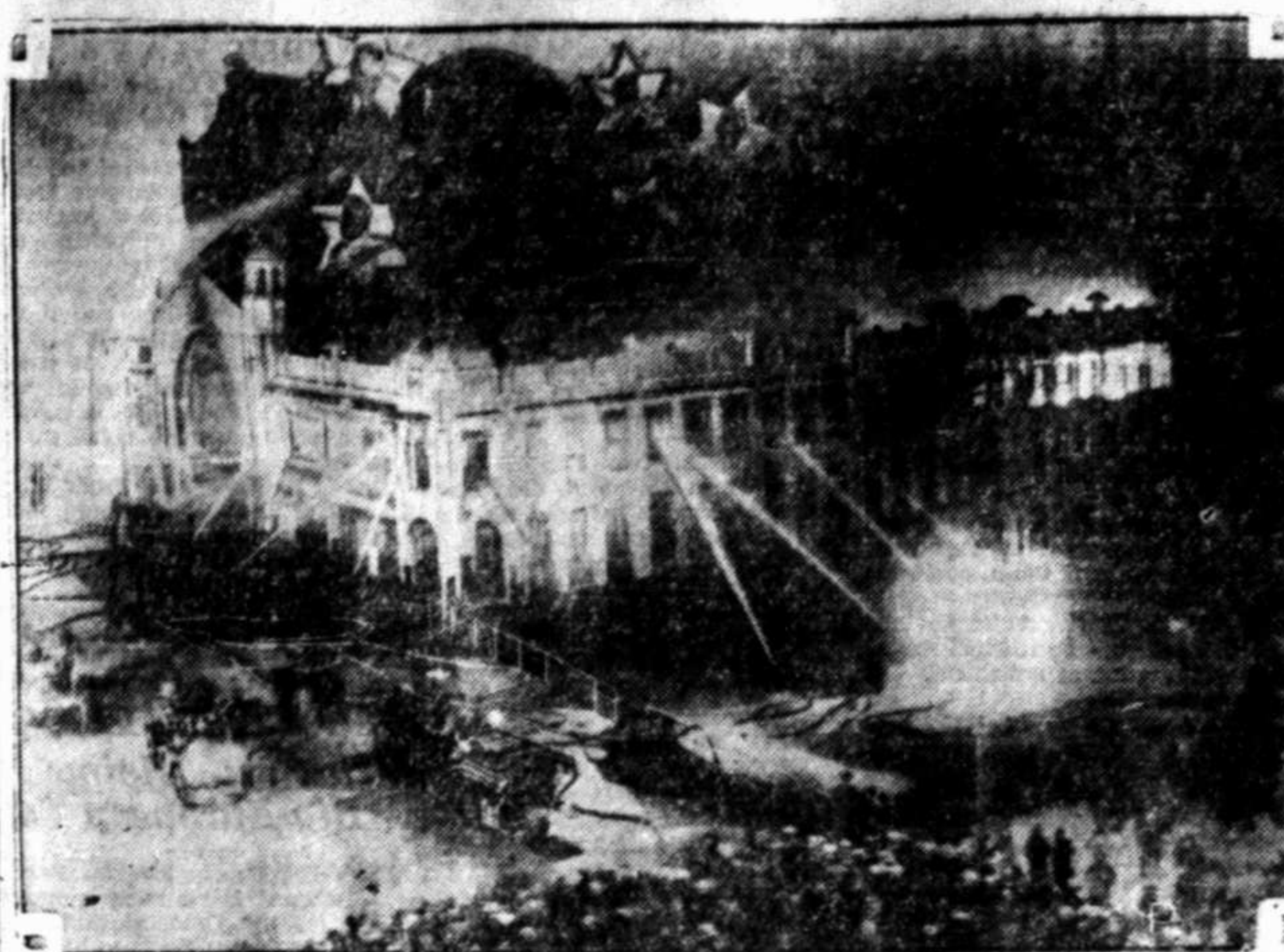
Motorists who park cars in alleys from now on, are subject to a fine. Chief of Police John Lemond said.

MEASURE YET CARRIES TIME LIMIT CLAUSE

CONSTRUCTION OF 15 SHIPS AND PLANE CARRIER OKED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—The naval construction program calling for fifteen cruisers and one airplane carrier was sent to President Coolidge today with house approval of senate amendments.

The amendments were accepted after an unsuccessful attempt had been made to revise the measure to give the president authority to suspend building of the cruisers if an agreement should be reached for a further limitation of armament.

APPROPRIATIONS BILLS APPEAR ON CALENDARS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7 (AP)—Both houses had appropriations bills on their calendars today, although the amended cruiser bill came first on the house program. It was expected to be disposed of in short order and back of it waited the naval supply bill. The senate had before it the \$447,000,000 war department appropriations bill, with passage in sight before adjournment for the day.

The war department bill was taken up yesterday, the Caraway bill to regulate future trading in cotton and grains being shelved for it. This was seen as an indication that both the senate and house plan to concentrate on supply measures.

Four of these measures are in conference, the first deficiency bill and those for the agriculture and interior departments and for independent offices. The house has yet to pass the \$347,000,000 naval supply bill but may send it to the senate before the week is out. Two other appropriations measures are on the house list, the seed deficiency bill and that for legislative expense funds.

ferences which were held between J. T. Robinson, land commissioner, the governor, attorney general's department and university regents when an effort was made to get Robinson to postpone sale of 150,000 acres of land advertised for January.

Replying to a question from Representative Petch, representing the committee, that there is some kind of a charge "that you are an employee of the oil companies," Judge Batts stated that he, as a lawyer, represented several of the companies and that he was a salaried employee of the Gulf Oil corporation.

He said he had received a letter from Mr. Nazro of the Gulf company protesting the sale of mineral leases, leases advertised and that he took the communication to Robinson and gave it to him. Also, Mr. Pugh of the Texas company protested the sale, he said, and on one occasion when he went to Robinson's office, he found Jacob Wolfers of the Texas company there talking to him about the proposed sales.

He said Robinson finally agreed to postpone the sale of all except one tract for which he claimed he had received a specific request. He said he presumed the tract would be merely one section and that he was surprised it meant an entire block. He detailed phases of the litigation which involved several of the land laws and in some of which Batts sided with Robinson against the other regents. He was questioned about the attack on the law of 1917, when Governor Moody, as attorney general, intervened for the board of regents in attacking the validity of the leasing act.

He testified that the board of regents afterwards employed private counsel because when Moody was succeeded by Claude Pollock, Pollock did not follow Moody's position in the matter.

The supreme court sustained you and Mr. Robinson against Governor Moody and the regents, didn't it? E. F. Smith, attorney for Robinson, asked, and Judge Batts replied in the affirmative.

Turner and J. J. Loy by a 10 to 8 vote.

Opponents served notice of carrying both the governor's proposal and a substitute by Representative Leonard Tiltonson of Sealy to the floor on minority report.

The Young-Turner-Loy bill calls for centralization of the present widely-scattered farms on the Darrington farm in Brainerd county instead of appointment of a board, as suggested by the governor, to investigate the situation and later furnish recommendations. Tiltonson's measure provided for merging the system on both the Darrington and Ramsay farms.

The adopted measure directs salvaging of all possible property on the prison and farms at Huntsville and giving it to Sam Houston State.
