## COACHING BOOST DUE, TOO

# Pay Boost For Supt. Wilson

School board has approved a pay raise for Supt. Frank Wilson and extended his contract to 1964.

And pay boosts are likely for Coach Sam Christy and his staff.

Trustees of Colorado Independent School District this week hiked the superintendent's salary \$500—from \$10,500 to \$11,000 annually.

At the same time his contract, which still had 2 years to go, was extended an additional year. This lengthens Wilson's contract to July 1964.

The salary increase for Wilson followed a couple of years in which the superintendent did not receive a raise. However, the board has followed the policy of extending his contract 1 year each February, well in advance of the contract renewal date.

Christy, whose football team last fall became tri-champions of District 3-AAA and defeated defending state tittleist Sweetwater, informally by the Sweetwater, may be in for a pay hike next month. That's when the board will begin

considering the principalships and coaches for next year.

However, additional pay for the coach has been discussed informally by the board and the superintendent.

Christy is serving his first year as head coach, having

succeeded Otis Holladay. He is under a 2-year contract and is drawing \$6,200 annual salary while Holladay, who came here after a state Class A championship, was under a 3-year contract at \$6,750 annual

salary.

### Tower Campaigns Monday in City

U. S. Senatorial campaign comes to life in Colorado City Monday with John Tower, Republican Party candidate, coming here for an afternoon appearance.

Tower, who also visited the city during his unsuccessful bid for senator against Lyndon B. Johnson in the presidential election last November, will arrive here Monday at 3 p. m. for a "get acquainted coffee".

The coffee in Garden Terrace Room of the Baker Club, Baker Hotel, will be informal and for the public.

Sponsoring the event will be Republican Party leaders of Mitchell County, according to Glenn R. (Bob) Robinson.

Tower will travel here from Big Spring. In late afternoon he will go to Sweetwater, then to Snyder.

He will be the first of the many candidates in the special April Senate election to make a campaign appearance here.

However, U. S. Representative Jim Wright, first announced candidate in the race, was principal speaker here last month for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

In the general election last fall Johnson, Tower received 926,653 votes on the Republican ticket—41.5 per cent of the major vote.

Until he became a senatorial candidate, he served 9 years as professor of political science at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls. He has bachelor of arts degree in government from Southern University and a master of arts degree in political science from Southern Methodist University. In addition, he has studied at the University of London.

Tower is the son of the executive secretary of Texas Conference of the Methodist Church and is the grandson of 2 other Methodist clergymen. He is a native of Houston and was reared in Doughty, Mich., where his father served as minister.

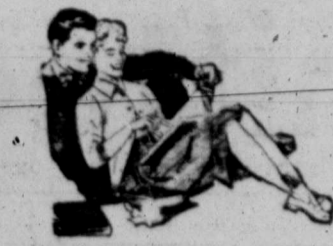

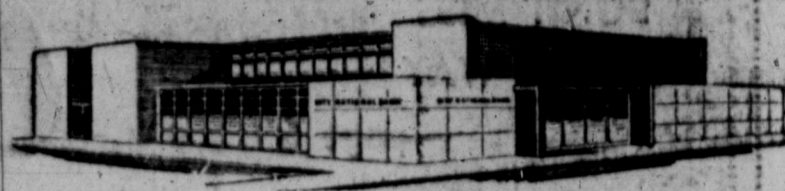

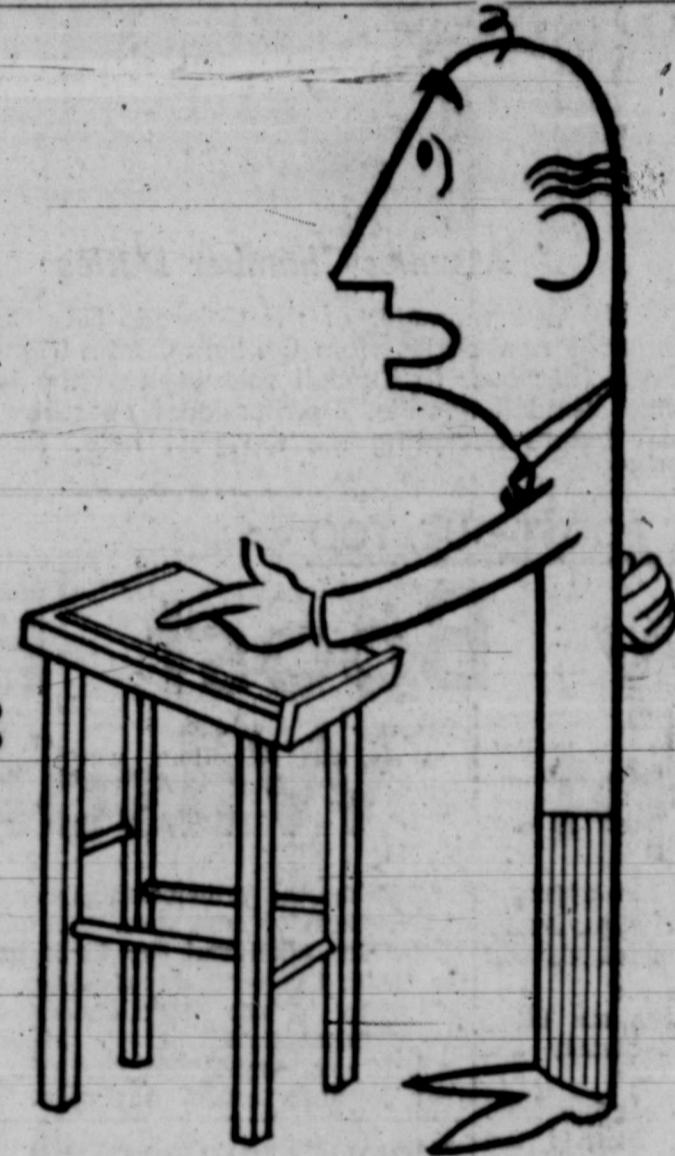

my own home in Iceland. Of course, no two families are exactly alike and my family is different from all other families; but, however, I hope to be able to give you a little idea of what family life in Iceland is like," the speaker began.

"It is not quite as common as here that men participate in the housework. But it is, however, always getting more and more common there. My father never washes dishes or makes the salad or anything like that," was one point that Throun told the women.

"Very few women in Iceland have maids and very few women send their washing to the laundry. In most towns, we even have no public laundry. The Icelandic women, therefore, have to do all the housework themselves, or with the assistance of their daughters."

"As English is taught in all high schools in Iceland, most of the people have fair knowledge of English, so I don't think you would find it hard to get along that way (in Iceland). The Icelandic people are, however, harder to get to know than are the American people. But once you know them, they are good and reliable friends. Just like Texans, they are very hospitable, and they like to have guests to come and visit with them. The Icelandic women, although busy, always have time left to take good care of their guests. They are always well prepared to receive their guests with hot coffee and all kinds of homemade cookies and cakes, no matter what time of the day it is, she concluded.
