The Common Market Turns Inward

Airman Jackie D. Bedford Serving With Fighter Sqdn.

Jackie D. Bedford, airman USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William G. Bedford of 113 East Sixth St., Burkburnett, who is serving with Fighter Squadron 91 presently deployed aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Ranger in the Far East has seen many oriental ports since the ship left the United States last November.

Far Eastern ports of call during the cruise include Yokosuka, Japan, and Hong Kong, British Crown Colony, and points in the Hawaiian and the Philippine Islands. They spent Christmas in Yokosuka, departed for the Philippines and returned in March in time to see numerous Japanese festivities associated with spring, as well as the famous cherry blossoms of Japan.

The unit is the only Pacific Fleet fighter squadron to hold the Battle Efficiency award for two consecutive years.

The Ranger temporarily deployed with the Seventh Fleet, normally operates out of Alameda, California.

Cadet Donnie D. Culpepper On Trip

Cadet Donnie D. Culpepper of Burkburnett, who recently completed his first year at the Air Force Academy, is on a field study trip to Air Force, Army and Navy installations across the United States.

Cadet Culpepper, a member of the Class of 1966, will receive detailed briefings and participate in actual jet flights and shipboard activities during the trip. The training is designed to give him a thorough indoctrination on major operational commands of the Department of Defense.

Upon completion of his tour, Cadet Culpepper will take parachute jump training at the U. S. Army Airborne Training Center, Fort Benning, Georgia.

The cadet is the son of Mrs. Valrie L. Culpepper of 414 Park Street, Burkburnett. He is a graduate of Burkburnett High School.

As the European Economic Community has developed in recent years, observers have been concerned with a fundamental question: will it ultimately turn outward or inward? Is it a first step toward closer economic ties among all the nations of the free world? Or is it simply the creation of a new unit which, on a larger scale, will seek to protect the established interests of its constituents in the same way as individual nations have in the past?

The more starry-eyed members of the economic profession have — at least until very recently — assumed that the Community would gradually broaden its horizons. The very logic of its own creation would, it was believed, persuade the Community to sacrifice to some degree the special interests of internal groups to the broader interest in expanded economic relationships with the rest of the world. This line of thinking was one of the bases for the passage in this country of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962. The Act greatly extended the President's powers to negotiate tariffs reduction with other countries.

Events of the past few months have thoroughly deflated this idealistic view. In January General de Gaulle flatly vetoed the acceptance of Britain into membership. Last week, again upon his insistence, the Community decided to discontinue consultations with the British Ambassador accredited to it. Participation by Britain would have been a first step toward an integration of several other European nations into the Common Market.

Another indication of inward-turning was the raising of the Community's tariff on American frozen chicken. The subject of American poultry to severely restrictive tariffs has been a sore point for some time.

All this makes it perfectly clear that next year's bargaining session among the GATT nations will not be conducted in an atmosphere of sweetness and light. Preliminary negotiations to establish procedures very nearly broke down but were saved by a compromise. The United States agreed that where "disparities" exist in the form of especially high tariff rates they might be subjected to deeper cuts than would apply generally. This was a concession on our part since while the American tariff system is generally a low one some individual rates are high for special reasons.

Our friends from the EEC are not going to be guided by altruistic concern for the solidarity of the free world in the next year's negotiations. They will be tough horse-traders, and we had better be too. Fortunately, the Commerce Department will play a role in preparations for the bargaining and this will provide a channel for representation of the business viewpoint. American business had better make sure that Commerce is well informed of its interests and its problems, both at home and abroad.

T-B Victims In U. S. Increased Some Over 1961

Tuberculosis victims in the U. S. increased in 1962 over 1961.

That was not true in Texas, but figures from several Texas counties follow the national, not the state, trend.

The number of new active cases of TB reported nationally to health authorities in 1962 was 54,652, compared with 53,726 in 1961. The number of new active cases reported to Texas health authorities was 3,199 in 1962; the total for 1961 was 3,480. Medical men seek full reporting of TB, though some suggest that more TB cases are not reported than are reported. TB is transmitted from one person to another, so the knowledge of who has TB is important.

In Wichita County in 1962, 19 new cases of TB were reported. In 1961, 24 new cases were reported.

It's The Law In Texas

FOLLOW SIMPLE RULES IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Vacation time is here. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. STOP! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. RENDER AID. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) DO NOT move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. PROTECT THE SCENE FROM FURTHER DAMAGE. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. CALL AN OFFICER. Policeman, Highway Patrolman, Sheriff's and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be valuable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. GATHER INFORMATION. WRITE IT DOWN. Don't trust to memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks, step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver — and he must do the same.

6. BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU SAY. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be disquieted. Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. SEE YOUR DOCTOR if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.

8. CONSULT YOUR LAWYER IMMEDIATELY. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from the witnesses while their memories are fresh, and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interviews or statements to investigators or adjusters for the other side.

9. INFORM YOUR INSURANCE COMPANY PROMPTLY. Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. REPORT THE ACCIDENT to the Department of Public Safety. This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceed \$25.00.

An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Department, Highway Patrol, or State Department of Public Safety.

VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q—Is service in the Mexican Border Campaign counted toward the various Veterans Administration benefits?

A—Service in the Mexican Border Campaign is not considered wartime service. However, there are certain nonmonetary benefits for these veterans.

Q—If I do not receive my insurance premium notices from the VA what should I do?

A—Make your premium payment anyway and be sure that your policy number is on the remittance. Enclose a reminder to the VA insurance office that your premium notice was not received. And finally, be sure to sign it and see that the insurance office has your correct address.

Q—If a widow's income was excessive for pension, i. e., over the limit set by law, would her minor children be eligible, assuming that the deceased veteran had qualifying service?

A—Yes, if each child's income, aside from wages, does not exceed \$1,800 annually.

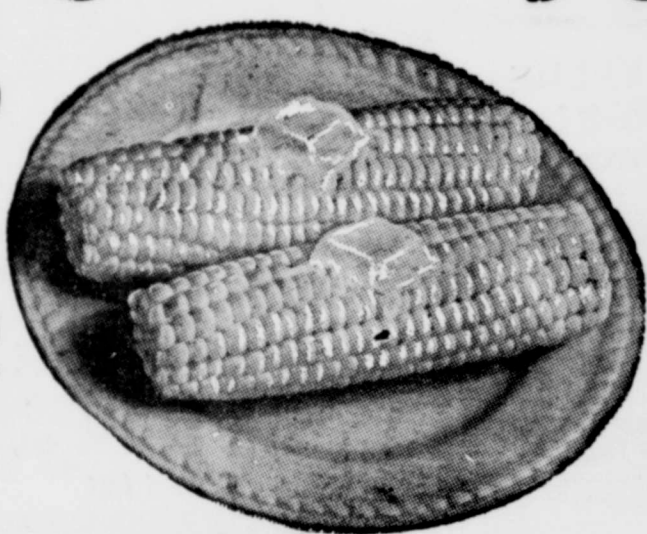

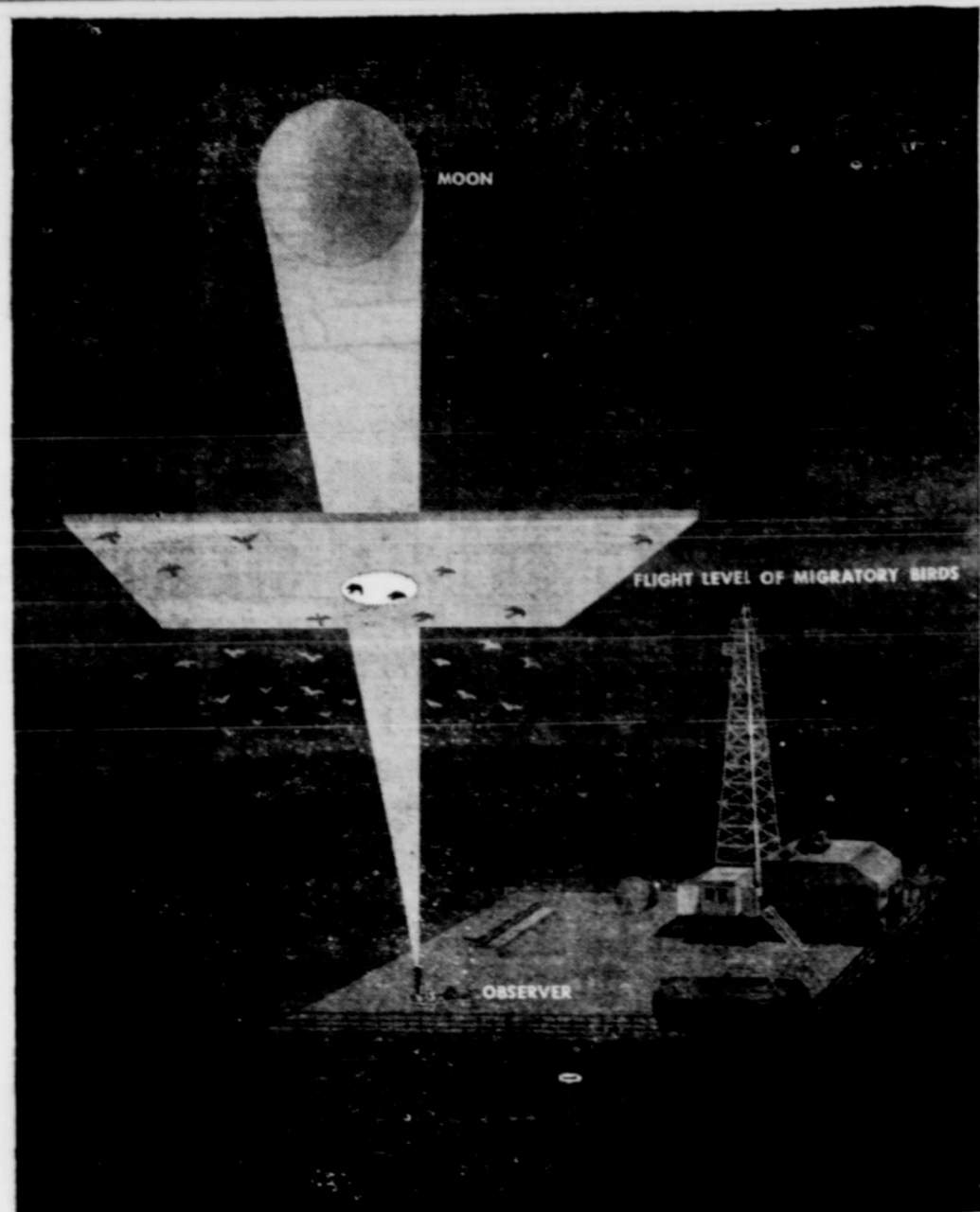

Babson Discusses Forest and Pasture Land

We have been taught since childhood "not to put all our eggs in one basket." That, however, was when our parents knew nothing about stocks and bonds, but even then made the mistake sometimes of putting all their savings in one bank. Well, the investment future is just as uncertain now as it was fifty years ago.

Forest Lands

Forest lands, like all other investments, have advantages and disadvantages. Trees grow during week ends and holidays as well as any other day of the year. These trees have no labor unions and never argue about "wages." Their value depends upon various factors - such as the state the forest land is in and also how near it is to transportation to a cutting mill. Hence, the price varies from

\$10.00 an acre to \$200.00 an acre according to the location and the length of time for the growth to mature.

Cutover land with spruce or pine trees a foot or two high may be the best investment for young people, if it is properly located. However, such trees in the north are not ready to be cut or sold for fifty years. Then too, we must not forget the fire dangers or wind hazards.

What About Pasture Lands?

I have been successful in buying pasture land in Kansas where grass grows which is excellent for feeding cattle. The cattle raisers of Texas buy a railroad ticket to ship their steers to the stockyards in Kansas City or Chicago to be slaughtered and sold for beef. They find that by giving these steers a stopover in Kansas on their way north - to be fed on a pasture like mine for two months - the steers increase materially in weight and are worth much more when they get to market.

Sometimes such pasture land will produce oil. Your real estate agent will send you a map showing what he has to offer for sale and indicating what the chances are that oil might be found on your pasture. Pasture land varies in price - from \$75 to \$150 an acre - according to the availability and quality of water for the cattle and also in accordance with the possibility of oil. I have never heard of anyone taking losses on such pasture land if it was purchased through a reliable broker. When Texas cattle are pasturing on your land it is customary to pay a professional caretaker so much a head for watching the cattle. All this information you can get from many sources; but my business I have handled through the office of Carl C. Chase of Eur-

Trustees Have Their Advantages and Disadvantages

Many readers of this column have put money in the hands of trustees of banks or other trustees in favor of their children and grandchildren. These trustees have their advantages; they are careful, honest, and reasonable in their charges. On the other hand, they naturally do not like to buy forest or pasture land if it pays no income, as their fees depend upon the income from the estate. Therefore, although there are times when certain non-dividend paying stocks are really safer than Dow-Jones gilt-edge stocks, yet trustees refrain from buying them because they yield no income to the trustees.

The trustees' fees, however, can be so arranged that both the principal involved and the income received will be recognized. This is both fairer, and often safer in the long run, for the beneficiaries. Never hesitate to be liberal with the trustees upon whom your children and

grandchildren are dependent. Therefore, whether you are employing a trustee, I urge you to have some of the money invested in forest or pasture estate; but this is somewhat entirely different from what I am writing about this week.

AS HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT BUILDING MODERN SAFETY REST AREAS FOR PUBLIC



The Interstate Highway System in Texas is being blessed with large, elaborate Safety Rest areas for the safety and convenience of Texas travelers. Motorists can now relax and refresh themselves in the first of these rest areas (roadside parks) designed and built on the Interstate Highway System in Texas. This new rest area contains eight arbors equipped with fire places for family cooking, incinerators, fire wood, and big spacious tables and benches for picnicking. The "park" lies on a small knoll ten miles east of San Antonio on Interstate Highway 19 and was formally dedicated May 29.

men in the San Antonio district refer to the new rest area as "Jet Park." It does have a jet-age look. The design certainly belongs to the area because just to the north lies a big jet base — Randolph Field, a landmark in the air age.

The huge, new rest area is really two parks, one on each side of the road. Each one is 1,200 feet long and 107 feet

wide with four "bat wing" arbors spaced to allow for future additional arbors. Each arbor contains a fireplace, fire wood, an incinerator, a concrete table and benches, and a planter box.

Safety rest areas on the Interstate Highway System are generally larger than older roadside parks previously built by the highway Department and contain more arbors per park

Repairing Of The Driveway



After being down for a few years, asphalt driveways develop a common failure. Uneven density of the base, construction over filled ground, penetration of water, freezing and thawing and leaking gasoline can all play a part in the destruction of asphalt. Early repairs will eliminate costly repairs.

The first step in repair is the removal of all loose asphalt. Cut back to solid asphalt or blacktop with a chisel to a depth of

at least 1 inch. Clean hole or crack thoroughly with a broom or brush. An excellent economical and permanent patching material is available at most lumber, building material and hardware stores. The product, a ready-to-use blacktop called Sakrete Blacktop is put into the hole or crack 1/4 inch above the surrounding surface, then packed down thoroughly even with the surrounding surface. Tools may be cleaned easily with kerosene.

with an area on each side of the highway and parking space for trucks. Distance between rest areas will average only 37 miles throughout the state when the Interstate System is completed in 1972. So if you're traveling along and find one rest area filled, it will only be a few minutes to the next spot.

The new rest area was dedicated formally May 29 by chamber of commerce officials from Seguin and San Antonio and members of the Texas Highway Department. Herbert C. Petry Jr., Chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, was principal speaker.

The primary purpose of the safety rest area is to provide a safe place for a motorist to stop

in pleasant surroundings to relax, refresh himself, or to eat something before continuing his drive. An alert driver has fewer accidents, and the highway department says providing rest areas is just one of many efforts to reduce the accident toll on highways. There are now more than 1,000 rest areas and turnouts throughout the state for this purpose.

The Texas Highway Department was one of the pioneers of the rest area or roadside park. In the early 1930's the Department began its roadside park program, and it wasn't long before experience and public demand showed department engineers that the areas should be an integral part of the highway system.

When the Interstate Highway System is completed in Texas, there will be about 85 rest areas for the motoring public. The Highway Department has already selected sites for half the areas and about one-fourth of the 85 parks are in various stages of construction. The average distance between rest areas will be 37 miles — so the motorist will be able to find a place

to rest and relax no matter what part of the state he travels. There are between 15 and 20 different designs for safety rest areas. Landscape architects in the highway department design each facility to its surrounding

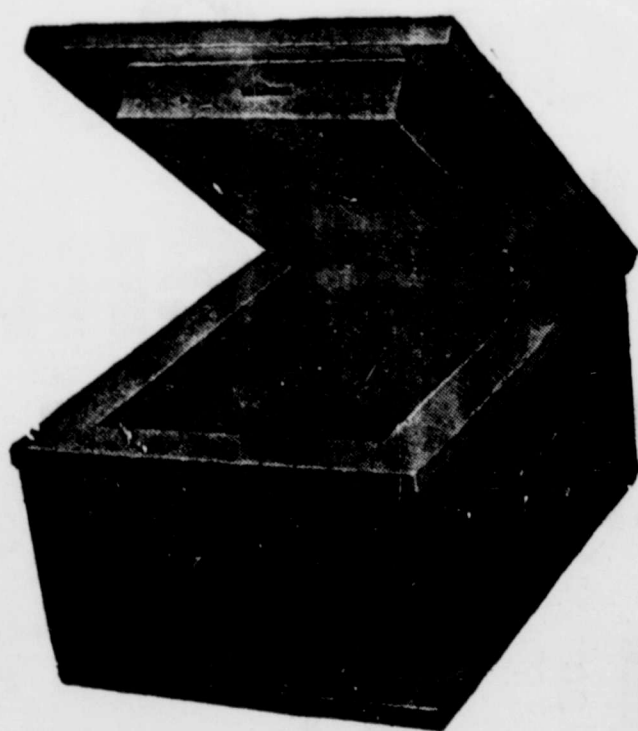
