Mayor, two Council posts

Incumbents file for three C-City posts

Three incumbents have filed for places on the City Council this week as Jim Baum has filed to keep his Mayor's position. Place one councilman Sammy Contreras has filed and place five councilman Bob Reily has also put his hat in the ring once more.

Nine positions are going to be up for grabs on local school boards as three positions each are to be filled from Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine ISD's.

CISD board positions currently held by Jesse Munoz, Larry Blasingame and Billy Bridgford are up for election.

Blasingame and Munoz have each filed for another term.

In Westbrook, the positions of Clyde Gregory, Walter Smith, Jr., and Elton Carlisle expire.

Gregory and Carlisle have both filed for another three-year term each.

Loraine trustees whose terms expire include Mike Gage, Mary Helen Gomez and Linton Ray Webb.

No one has filed for the Loraine school board.

Filing for these posts started Monday, February 15 and will run through March 17. Early voting for the May 1 election will be from April 12-17.

Also, voters will have the opportunity to decide whether the Texas Constitution should require wealthy school districts to share part of their property tax money with poorer districts.

The Texas Senate voted Monday to accept the House's "share-the-wealth" constitutional amendment that supporters hope will end the long-running court battle over the way public schools are funded.

When speaking at the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce Banquet in January, Speaker of the Texas House Pete Laney told the audience here that "we will not let the schools close."

An Austin District Judge had threatened to cut off all state aid to school districts if lawmakers failed to get this before the voters. This in turn has caused all school districts in the state to reassess all their spending for the remainder of this school year and to have plans in place in case state funds were to be cut off.

Loraine captures bi-district tilt

The Loraine Bulldogs captured the bi-district crown against Christoval last Friday night by defeating the Cougars, 74-49.

They were scheduled to play Balmorhea Tuesday night in Odessa to try to advance to the Regional Tournament in Class A.

The Bulldogs only held a four-point halftime lead against Christoval but pulled away in the second half.

Alvin Crawford led the scoring with 21 points and Fabian Alvarez tossed in 14. Chris Phillips had 9 points for Loraine and David Mitchell and Craig Finley had 7 each.

Others scoring for Loraine included James Loper, Dwayne Starlings and Michael Moore with 4 each and Corey Wooddell had 2.

Dan McGee coaches the Bulldogs.

Farm meeting provides answers

The 1993 farm meeting for Mitchell County was held Tuesday morning at the C.C. Thompson room with some 65 people present.

Don Stewart of the local ASCS office conducted the meeting and explained present and future farm programs that will affect local producers.

Stewart said the 1993 Crop Acreage Bases will be computed using the previous 5 year average of planted and considered planted for wheat and feed grains. Cotton bases will be computed using the previous 3 year P and CP average if the farm had participated in the

cotton program in the last 2 years. A different method will be used for cotton bases if the farm was non-participating in 1991 and 1992.

Sign-up times for programs are set through April 30 and they will be by appointment only at the ASCS Office.

Other items covered at the farm meeting includes:

- * Cross and off setting compliance rules are not in effect for 1993

- * Paid land diversion is not in effect for 1993.

- * The maximum payment limitation of \$50,000 is unchanged

from 1992. Everyone will need to fill out a new Payment Limitation and form AD 1026.

* Set-aside is always on the percentage of the base: Cotton, 7.5%; Grain Sorghum, 5%; Wheat, 0%.

Important dates that were noted are May 1 is the deadline to certify small grain (including CRP and windstrips) and you must certify '0' to protect the base if you wish to keep it. Also, March 15 is the date cattle must be removed from small grain fields.

The following table gives general information for specific crops.

First State Bank of Loraine sold

The First State Bank of Loraine will become a branch of the Coahoma State Bank as soon as the sale of the bank is approved by the Banking Commission of Texas.

Willie Lang, president of the Coahoma bank said "both bank's shareholders have approved the sale and we are just waiting on the paperwork to be approved by the Banking Commission."

"This merger will increase the strength of both institutions," said Lang. "The branch in Loraine will remain a full-service banking facility with all the services the people in Mitchell County have used in the past with the First State Bank."

Lang said the branch would have a Branch Manager at the facility and many of the services - such as bookkeeping procedures - would be upgraded.

The Coahoma State Bank opened a branch office in Big Spring in September according to Lang.

Lang has been with the Coahoma bank since November of last year coming from Beaver, Oklahoma.

He had previously worked at the First National Bank in Big Spring for some ten years.

Youth dies of gun-shot

A 15-year old Colorado City youth died Saturday afternoon in Lubbock's University Medical Center following an accidental gunshot wound to the head.

Justin Lee Ward Hunter was airlifted to Lubbock from Colorado City's airport around 1 a.m. Saturday morning and he died at 12:47 p.m. Saturday.

Lubbock County Justice of the Peace Jim Henson ruled the shooting accidental.

According to Sheriff Patrick Toombs, the youth took four shells out of a .38 caliber pistol and left one shell in the chamber in an apparent game of "Russian Roulette."

Services were held, Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the Bell-Cypert-Seale Funeral Home in Snyder.

He is survived by his parents, Susan Hunter of Colorado City and Johnny Ward of Houston.

CHIEF LONE WOLF

For pretty Ruth Renick, the trail to Hollywood, fame and fortune began in Colorado, Texas. By the time the starlet's film career ended, she had performed in at least twenty-two motion pictures and had reached celebrity status.

In four action packed years the silent film queen starred in some of the top movies of the day, several of which headlined early day matinee idol Douglas Fairbanks, Sr.

Ruth Renick Griffith was born here in 1893. A few years later her family moved to Galveston, then later, to Arizona. It was there she received much of her education.

According to the Motion Picture Almanac of 1933, Ruth attended Phoenix Union and Forbus North High Schools. Upon graduation she enrolled in the Conservatory of Music and Dramatic Arts of Arizona.

The next stop for the five foot, two inch blonde (whose hair was later termed "titian"), was on the stage where she developed her talent over a period of four years. The Texas native landed parts in such plays as "Secret Service," and "Shenandoah."

In 1920, at the age of twenty-seven, the big break Ruth was waiting for occurred; she was "discovered" by Hollywood. During the next four years the young lady from Colorado City was busier than a west Texas whirlwind.

She landed parts in such flicks as, "Hawthorne of the U.S.A.," "The Parish Priest," "The White Dove," "The Mollycoddle," (with Douglas Fairbanks), "She Couldn't Help It," "Conrad in Quest of His Youth," "The Jucklins," "The Witching Hour," "What Is a Wife Worth," "Children of the Night," and "The Golden Snare."

Also, "The Fire Bride," "The Men of Zanzibar," "Rags to Riches," "Rough Shod," "Long Live the King," "Ask Dad, He Knows," "Garden Smear," and in 1924, "Conductor 1492," which was apparently her last film.

When Ruth was in the apex of her career, she was a petite one-hundred ten pounds and publicity materials listed her hobbies as "sports and horseback riding."

Unfortunately there are some puzzling questions we can't answer about Colorado City's biggest contribution to Tinsel Town. For instance, why did her career abruptly end in 1924? And, did she ever marry? (The 1933 Motion Picture Almanac listed her marital status as "not married").

Apparently her skyrocket career burned out after only four years, 1920-1924. The accompanying picture of Ruth, from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, was identified as a 1930 photograph. If so, she was thirty-seven years old at the time. But, unanswered was why she was still having publicity photos taken six years after her last movie was made.

Also, what did she do with her life from 1924 until she died in 1984? And one can't help but wonder if she ever returned to her birthplace, Colorado City. These are things we may never learn, but we do know Ruth was well regarded by her peers.

"I know of no girl in all filmdom who has more friends among her professional associates than Ruth Renick," said Cecil B. DeMille in 1924, who had a pretty good eye for talent. "Her friends are legion among theatre goers and the world at large," DeMille added.

Ruth died May 7, 1984, at the age of 91. Variety Magazine, in its funeral notice for Ruth, said Miss Renick had lived in "a Hollywood convalescent home the past two years." Other than identifying some of the films she had starred in, Variety concluded simply, "She is survived by a sister in Arizona."

More questions; did she die penniless? Other than an unidentified sister, did she have any family? Where is Ruth buried?

The applause and adulation has long since faded for the movie star who started life in Colorado City. It's a long way from here to Hollywood, but Ruth Renick made it. If Colorado City ever has its own "walk way of the stars," she deserves to be among the first enshrined.

Impossible Pie

2 c. milk
1 c. sugar



Dot Oliver

2/3 stick oleo
4 eggs
2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 c. flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt

Mix in order in blender. Spray pie pan with Pam. Pour into pie pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

May add 1 cup coconut or small can crushed pineapple if desired. If adding coconut or pineapple this will make 2-9" pies.

Pudding Chip Cookies

2 1/4 c. flour
1 tsp. baking soda
1 c. butter or oleo softened
1/4 c. granulated sugar
3/4 c. firmly packed brown sugar

1 pkg. (4 serving size) vanilla instant pudding mix.
1 tsp. vanilla
2 eggs

1 pkg. 12 oz. semi sweet chocolate chips

1 c. chopped pecans.
Mix flour with baking soda.
Combine butter, the sugars,

pudding mix and vanilla in large mixing bowl, beat until smooth and creamy. Beat in eggs. Gradually add flour mixture, then stir in chips and nuts. (Batter will be stiff). Drop from teaspoon onto ungreased baking sheet about two inches apart. Bake at 350 degrees 8 to 10 minutes. Makes about 2 dozen.

Texas Hot Coco Cake

1 stick Oleo
1 c. water
1/2 C. Crisco
2 cups sugar
1 tsp vanilla
1 tsp soda
1 tsp salt
2 c. flour
4 T. Cocoa
1/2 C. buttermilk
2 beaten eggs

Add oleo and Crisco to water, bring to boil. Sift sugar and flour and cocoa in large bowl. Pour liquid mixture over flour mixture and beat until smooth. Add buttermilk, eggs, soda, vanilla and salt. Mix well, pour into bundt pan and bake 25 minutes at 400 degrees.

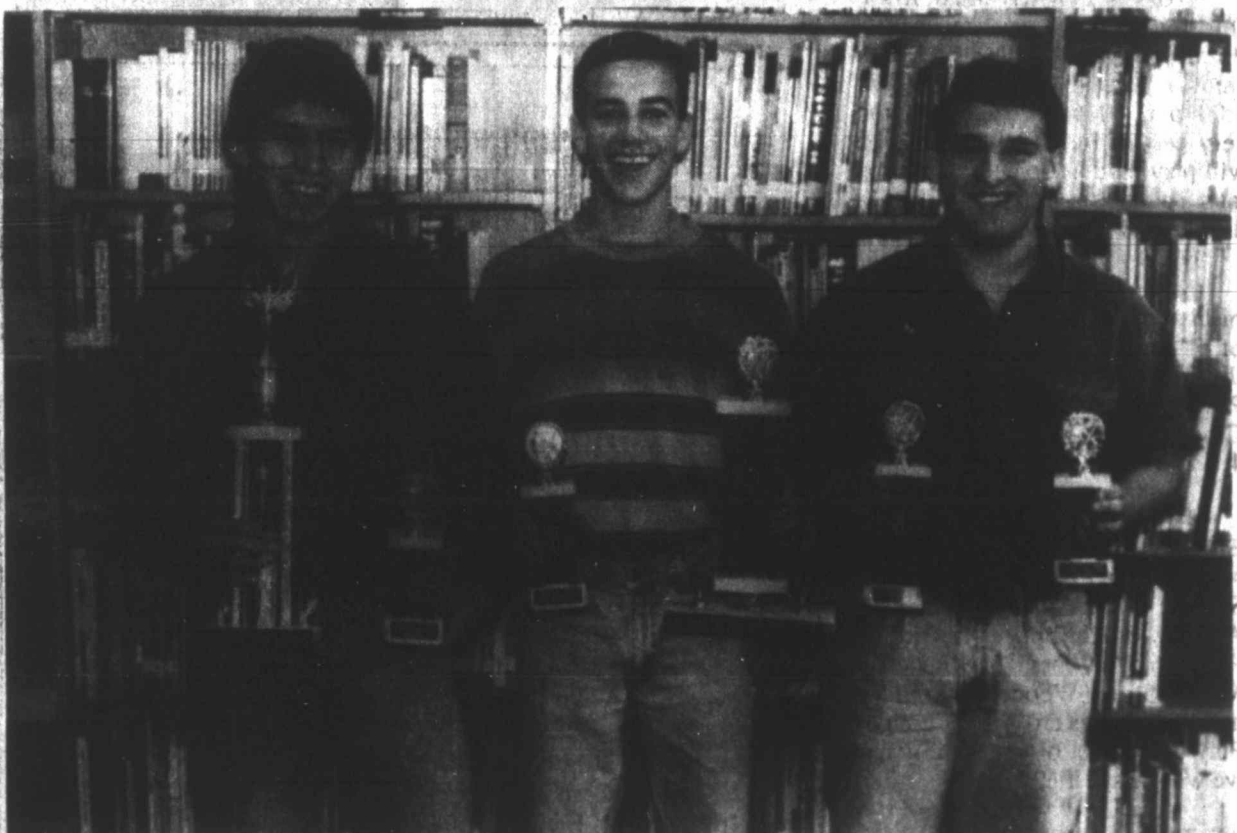

VLB has land catalogue

A catalogue listing 468 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) by calling 1-800-252-VETS. Bids will be opened on April 27, 1993 at 1 p.m.

Located in 124 Texas counties (with the majority in North, Central and East Texas) the tracts, known as Type I properties, range in size from five to 227 acres.

The VLB will finance the full amount of all winning bids. These

is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However, eligible Texas veterans are limited to one land purchase in the sale and must not have previously purchased land through the VLB.

"Texas veterans should take advantage of this sale if they are in the market for land to use for recreation or an investment," said Garry Mauro, chairman of the VLB. "Since these tracts have never been offered for sale by the board, this sale gives Texas veterans an excellent opportunity to buy good land with 100 percent financing."

Tracts not sold in the April sale will be offered to both veterans and non-veterans through local real estate agents.

Eligible Texas veterans will receive a 7.79 percent interest rate with a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee for each bid submitted is required.

The sale will be by sealed bid only, with a minimum bid set on each tract. All bids must be

received by April 27 at 1 p.m. Bidders need not be present at the bid opening in Austin.

Details of the sale and a description of each tract can be obtained by calling the VLB toll-free 1-800-252-VETS.

TEXAS ANGLER

Our wake up call came at 5:30 a.m. at the Sand Castle Condominiums. I jumped out of bed and turned the television on to watch the weather forecast. Just as we'd predicted, the wind was going to blow 15-20 miles per hour.

My wife, Debbie, and I were in Port Aransas, Texas, preparing to go offshore fishing aboard the SCAT CAT. This party boat can fish upwards of 80 people and goes out daily from Fisherman's Wharf. We selected the 9 hour trip rather than the 12 hour.

As we parked the truck in their parking lot, we counted over 20 out of state license plates. These cars belonged to winter Texans who now make their winter homes on our Texas coast.

The manager of Fisherman's Wharf, Roy Schuster, was busy advising the anxious crew of fishermen of the conditions, "the seas were calm overnight, but later on today the winds should pick up pretty good. The boat ride will take about 3 hours to get to the fishing spot. Yesterday the SCAT CAT brought in over 1400 pounds of fish." Even though Roy had warned the fishermen of rough water and high swells, they were willing to take their chances and try their luck. About 15-20 minutes into the trip, the wind had picked up and some

people started to look a little pale. Within a few minutes, some of the people started to look green. They were seasick and we still had 2 1/2 hours to travel until we could fish.

As these people were obviously miserable, I glanced over at Debbie just hoping she'd be OK. Sure enough, she was fine. She said, "Keith, if you can go through 9 months of pregnancy without getting sick, you can do this." Of course she had taken precautionary measures with a patch and motion sickness medication, but I believe she had a good point, because the majority of the sick were men.

When we finally reached our destination there was a huge round of applause and everyone got busy fishing. For several hours people were catching fish one after the other. All fishing equipment and bait is provided by the SCAT CAT. The SCAT CAT also has a concession stand, so you don't need to bring food or drinks. You don't need a Texas fishing license or saltwater stamp because you are fishing in Federal waters.

Red Snapper made up most of the catch, but there were some 4 to 5 pound trigger fish brought in as well. It's not uncommon to catch Tuna, Amberjack, King Mackerel, Barracuda, and many other species of saltwater fish. I'd been on this

trip before, but the action this time was much better.

For some of the older fishermen on board, the deck crew provided electric reels. This allowed them to winch the fish from the bottom with just a push of a button.

Suddenly it occurred to me that no one was sick anymore. For some reason when you're catching fish you forget about your misery.

When we returned to Fisherman's Wharf at 6:00 p.m. everyone was tired but there were smiles all around the boat. Young people and not so young people had enjoyed an affordable day of offshore fishing, and catching. After claiming your catch, Fisherman's Wharf will clean and filet your fish for a nominal charge, ice it down for you and send you on your way.

Offshore fishing is a great way to spend a day. My personal recommendation for anyone who has never been is to check with your physician for a prescription of motion sickness medication. Believe me, it's worth it!
