MAKE PLANS FOR NEW \$75,000 HIGH SCHOOL

OVER FOUR MILLION BUSHELS OF 1926 WHEAT SHIPPED—2,782 CARS

ARCHITECT CONTRACT AWARDED WEDNESDAY A. M.

Company, Hutchinson, Gets Architectural Work On Structure

BUILDING TO COST \$75,000 Handling Bonds Will Save \$12,000 Interest On Issue

Meeting of the board of the Independent School district Monday morning, Mann & Hutchinson, Kansas, was held to award a contract for architectural work on a proposed new \$75,000 school building for Perryton. The contract for the handling of the bonds given to Calvert & Oklahoma City. The building will cost approximately \$75,000 of which \$20,000 will be paid by the school board out of the sinking fund. The other \$55,000 will be handled by Calvert & Oklahoma City in the form of serial bonds maturing in thirty years at a rate that interest payments are made, thus saving of approximately \$12,000 more was the plan of handling \$20,000 of the sinking fund, making a total of \$12,000.

Plans for the bond issue will be called for a vote some time in February. However it may be to select the architect for the bonds in order to get the amount of bond issue fixed upon, and to employ a firm to handle the bonds.

Plans are to be sold at par discount and the bonding company to pay all handling costs accrued interest to the bond.

LOAN PAYS 1926 DIVIDENDS

TEN PER CENT FOR STOCKHOLDERS HOLD ELECTION TUESDAY

The five per cent dividend for 1926 was declared Tuesday by the National Farm Loan Association stockholders in their annual meeting, making a total of ten per cent.

The five per cent dividend was declared on September 7, at which time the ninety stockholders in the association since the founding of the association in 1918.

Present time the association has \$2,000,000 in loans in the country and does not have a single member.

ENGINE DERAILS CAR IN SMASH

FAILURE TO SET BRAKES ON CAR WHEAT CAUSES ACCIDENT, MUCH DAMAGE AND DELAY

Failure to set the brakes on a car of wheat that had been switched on to the main line last Saturday morning, resulted in considerable damage as the engine coming off the siding side swayed the car, derailing the car and thus causing much delay.

The accident occurred about nine o'clock Saturday morning on the east bound local freight number 32 which was switching in the yards. The car of wheat had been switched from the house track to the main line and left there without the brakes set. The engine again entered the house track to place other cars. During the meantime the car of wheat had rolled down close to the switch and the engine came out of the siding and struck the car, derailing it and causing considerable damage to the engine and car.

The accident happening where it did would not allow the train to pass and it was necessary to put the car on the track before they could proceed. Nearly five hours delay resulted.

A. B. McAfee has resigned his office of deputy sheriff and will take the office of the city clerk, having charge of the water department and the office.

At the next meeting of the council the city will consider building a new city hall, just west of the present location. The new building will be of brick and tile construction and will house the city clerk's office, the fire department and contain a storage room.

JUNE IS HEAVIEST MONTH WITH 4.11 INCHES—DECEMBER MOISTURE TO TOTALS 1.14 INCH

The total rainfall for the year of 1926 measured 23.71 inches according to the official record of the United States weather bureau maintained in Perryton by Jack Allen.

According to the report, the month of June measured the heaviest with a total of 4.11 inches with May and April close behind. For the month of December, just past, the total moisture received measured 1.14 inches. The lightest month of 1926 was January with only .16 inches received during the month.

'PIN MONEY' FOR FARMER'S WIFE FROM COWS AND CHICKENS AMOUNTS TO OVER \$350,000—MANY CROPS ARE RAISED

Ochiltree county farmers realized \$5,230,340.24 as a result of their labors in 1926 from their crops and produce marketed during the year, according to a survey taken over the county by the Herald.

The most authentic information available gave the actual number of cars of wheat shipped from Ochiltree

county as 2,782. Of this total 1,310 were shipped from Perryton, which when converted into bushels amounts to 1,965,000. The total number of bushels moved from the county during the year was 4,173,000 bushels. In addition to this there were 45,670 bushels stored in elevators on December 31, making a grand total of 4,218,670 bushels of wheat sold during 1926, with of course, some wheat still stored in farm granaries.

Other grains, including barley, kafir, rye, and maize, sold in the county amounted to 118,143 bushels. Fifty-two cars of such grain have been shipped, leaving about 40,143 bushels on hand at the first of the year.

The value of the wheat crop in the county is in the neighborhood of \$4,724,910.40 taking the average market at \$1.12 which is said by grain dealers to be correct. The value of other grain crops totals \$57,942.72, taking its average market at sixty-four cents. This makes a total value of \$4,782,853.12 for grain.

Thirty-five cars of broom corn have been shipped from Perryton containing an average of twelve tons to the car and selling for an average price of \$30.00 per ton, taking a total of 1,050 tons with a value of \$31,500.

In addition, 125 bales of cotton have been ginned in Perryton and with an estimated selling price of \$15.00 to the bale amounts to \$1,875.00.

One item which is commonly considered negligible and is often considered as "pin-money" reached surprising proportions. During the year approximately 15,000 cases of eggs were shipped in the county, valued at \$135,000. This is in addition to local consumption.

Poultry shipments from the county were estimated at 486,000 pounds, which brought in a revenue of \$152,360. Approximately 6,404 cans of cream were shipped during the year. A single can of cream contains about twenty-eight pounds of butter fat which has had an average price of thirty-five cents, making a total of \$62,750.20.

These three items, namely eggs, poultry and cream, added together total \$350,110.00 for the year.

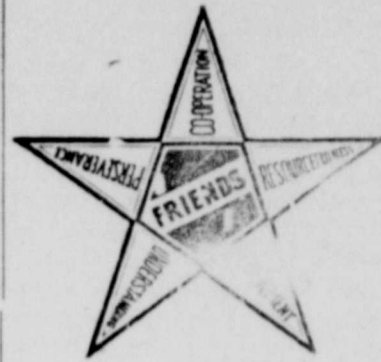
TARNISH

Tarnish on silver can be removed by the electrolytic method. Various commercial devices for this can be bought for use at home, or it can be done in the following way: Fill an enameled or agateware kettle partly full of water in which has been dissolved 1 teaspoon of either washing soda or baking soda and 1 teaspoon salt to each quart of water, heat this solution to the boiling point, put in strips of aluminum or bright zinc, add the tarnished silver and boil it. The silver must be covered completely by the water and each piece must be in contact with the aluminum or zinc, either directly or through other silver. When the tarnish has disappeared, the silver should be removed from the kettle, washed, and dried with a clean, soft cloth.

T. B. DECLINES

Coincident with the decline of tuberculosis among cattle and hogs is an official report of a decreasing human death rate from the disease, says the United States Department of Agriculture. The low mortality of children under four years may be attributed in part to the aggressive campaign for testing tuberculous cattle and disposing of animals affected with the disease.

There remain in quarantine 248 entire counties and also smaller areas, chiefly

individual farms, in other counties. During the last year twelve counties and parts of five counties were released from Federal quarantine and forty counties previously released in Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Virginia and Texas were entirely freed of cattle ticks.

FOOD FROM THE NORTH

The reindeer industry in Alaska, although a comparatively recent commercial undertaking, promises to become an important factor in the future development of the territory, says the biological survey of the United States Department of Agriculture. The original stock of 1,280 animals imported to Alaska from Siberia about twenty-five years ago has increased to nearly 350,000, distributed in 110 herds.
More than 1,000,000 pounds of reindeer meat was exported from

Alaska during 1924 and 1925, and a steady increase in the output and demand is indicated. When properly produced and handled, the meat compares favorably with beef. It is fine grained, contains a good, palatable fat, and when fresh is exceptionally juicy and tender.

PUREBRED COWS LEAD

In the study of 45,000 years' individual production records, a comparison was made of purebreds and grades of the same breed. The grade averaged 6,900 pounds of milk per cow whereas purebreds exceeded this amount by 63 pounds, or about nine and a half per cent. In production of butterfat, gross income per cow and income over cost of feed, the purebreds exceeded the grades by about ten per cent. It should be remembered also

that the average production of the grades was so high largely because of the influence of their purebred ancestry.

USE OF POWER MAKES GOOD LIVING CONDITIONS

In 1869, the first year in which statistics upon the amount of mechanical power available to each American were collected, each wage earner had available to him 0.6 mechanical horsepower.

In 1919 each American wage earner had available to him 3.25 horsepower which means that in the short space of 50 years invention and supply put 3.19 additional horsepower at the disposal of each wage earner and increased his productive capacity 500 per cent.

Thus the progress of invention, development and supply means that the day laborer in 1925 has comfort and luxuries that the great king lacked in 1869, and has enabled the stenographer and saleswoman to array themselves in costumes that would excite the envy of Cleopatra or the Queen of Sheba.

In thus bringing about this condition the electric, gas, telephone, water supply and electric railway industries played a leading part.

use of mechanical power, steam and electricity, gas, the use of the telephone and of the rapid, low cost of transportation afforded by electric railways.

BABY BEEF

Under favorable conditions there are several advantages in producing young beef for market rather than mature beef. Young cattle make larger gains than older cattle on the

same quantity of feed, yearlings being able to make 25 to 40 per cent more gain than mature cattle on the same feed. Furthermore, by raising and fattening calves the money invested can be turned over in a short time. Young heaves offer greater choice in the date of marketing because they hold their bloom longer. This is a decided advantage if the market is unsteady or weak.

Cattle with inferior form and poor quality are not suitable for the production of desirable beef. To produce young beef, grain must be fed in considerable quantities from the time of weaning or even before to the time of marketing. When the feed consists chiefly of roughage, no attempt should be made to feed out calves. Calves to qualify for this purpose must have quality and finish. One of the beef breeds (Short-horn, Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus, and Galloway) should be used in the production of young beef.

THE PROFITABLE PIG

The profitable pig is one that gains continuously from date of raising until marketed. During suckling period the sow should be given feed that will stimulate production of milk. Give her or ground barley as the main supplement by shorts or middling tankage or fish meal, or old-linseed meal. The corn may be on the ear or shelled. The feeds may be fed dry or in slops. Sows should have all the feed she can clean up twice daily in addition to pasture.

It is very important that the make good gains during the suckling period. If the hand-feeding method is followed, the labor of caring for brood sows and their litters is considerable, but where the self-feeding method is used, several days or even a week's supply of feed may be stored in hoppers in a very short time.

SOME GREAT DISCOVERIES IN SCIENCE ARE ACCIDENTS

Humble materials and accidental happenings have played an important part in some of the world's greatest discoveries.

Charles Goodyear, in a fit of disgust, hurled a piece of rubber compound into the stove, and the charred mass which he later removed from the fire gave him the long looked for method of vulcanizing rubber.

Fluor-spar from Greenland, used as ballast by a fishing vessel and discarded as useless on a Boston dock, made possible the aluminum industry of today.

Telephone engineers some years ago developed "permalloy"—a magnetic alloy of nickel and iron—which when rolled into a thin, narrow ribbon and wound around the copper core of a submarine cable increased the speed of cabling six times, but they were unable to find a flux that would weld the ends of the rolled pieces of permalloy into a continuous tape. Every flux known to them was tried without success, and finally a workman in a spirit of fun said, "Let's try salt," and picking up a salt cellar which he had been using in seasoning his lunch shook it on the weld. The cap accidentally flew off and the salt poured over the weld. The experimenters were astonished to see that the salt combining with the borax which they had been using formed a foamlake flux completely covering the weld, and success was assured. An accident to be sure, but it solved the problem of welding permalloy and made possible the two high speed cables which now cross the Atlantic.

TELEPHONE PLANTS ARE MORE THAN INSTRUMENTS

It is estimated that less than 3 per cent of the equipment used in telephone service is visible to the telephone user and is represented by the receiver and bell box installed in his home. The remaining 97 per cent is represented in switchboards, pole lines, cables, conduits, buildings, and a myriad of other items necessary to make an efficient telephone system. Among these items may be

found more than 2000 buildings owned and 4000 buildings leased.

The land occupied by buildings owned represents an investment of more than \$237,500,00.

Eleven thousand five hundred automobiles—mostly trucks—are used to furnish and maintain service, and 2000 other cars are hired for the same purpose.

Motor trucks fitted for digging and hoisting machinery and operated by a gang of 3 men now do the work

of 50 men using the old manual methods.

CANALS, CROPS, PROSPERITY.
WE ARE HOMOGENOUS.
ALL ALIKE.
GOOD NEWS

Its really a prosperous country we live in, and the prosperity has only commenced. Arthur Reynolds, able Chicago banker, says our prosperity will last through 1927. It will also last through 1927 and beyond, if we give it a chance, really work and do not cheat each other too much.

Revised Government reports on crops put corn for this year at two billion six hundred and forty-five million bushels, wheat at eight hundred and thirty-two million three hundred and five thousand bushels—and forty million bushels of rye, forty-one million bushels of rice, eighteen million six hundred and eighty thousand bales of cotton, thirty-three million nine hundred thousand boxes of oranges, etc., and you have a slight idea of what prosperity means.

And unlike oil, those crops are not exhausted, but go on forever, increasing. Land in France planted to wheat for centuries produces more bushels per acre now than it did 200 years ago. The pity is that when farmers have big crops they get small prices. Combination sales and voting could help that, but farmers do not yet know how.

Other good news for all Americans is this: "The lake cities will be connected with the Mississippi, the Gulf and all ports of the world by navigable waterways through legislation that should pass this Winter. And a canal from the lake to the Atlantic also seems probable if an agreement can be made with Canada for joint use of the St. Lawrence.

The right plan would be an all-American waterway from the lakes through New York State, and that will come. But it would cost five or six hundred millions more than the low cost of the St. Lawrence canal, which probably will come first. Farmers are deeply interested in these canal projects, for which Secretary Hoover deserves greatest praise. He is a worker. The canals will cut an average of twelve cents from the freight on export wheat and add twelve cents to the farmers' price.

Harnessing the Colorado River seems not far away, thanks to a number of earnest men, including Senator Hiram Johnson, Secretaries Work and Hoover, and others. The remaining difficulty seems to be arranging an agreement between California and Arizona. The dam would be in Arizona, a great part of the power and irrigation would be used in California. The prosperity of one State is reflected in all States. California cannot thrive without benefiting Florida and Maine.

Arizona, the great State of copper, cotton, citrus, climate and the Colorado, will prove itself the State of brotherly conciliation. The thing designed is to use the country's wealth, water and power especially, and thus build up the entire nation. Arizona will not unwisely withhold from development and use that which, at the moment, she herself cannot use.

I want to emphasize at the outset however, that warm air does not mean impure air, by any means; neither may we look on cold air as always being "fresh air." One of the essentials of air in the living room is, that it be comfortable to the occupants; great or sudden variations in temperature may be exceedingly harmful.

Circulating air is better than stagnant; the outlet for overheated, or foul air should be at the highest point in the living apartment; the inlet for out-doors air at the lowest. If front doors are opened and closed frequently during days and evenings plenty of out-door air may be admitted in that way; and, air should be held inside, long enough to be warmed by the heating plant. It is therefore evident that, the outlet for air should be smaller than the opening for intake.

The closed room is generally to be looked upon with suspicion. No matter if it be a public hall, a church, a theatre, or any place used on occasions. Public halls, should be treated with formaldehyde two or three times a week; the air should be changed daily. A bedroom should always be left wide open after occupation,—the bedding thoroughly "aired" and frequent sprinklings with a solution of formaldehyde may prevent many a respiratory infection. People know these things, but so many neglect them.

Dr. Frank Crane Says

Thus there is direct connection between the superior newspapers of the United States and its superior prosperity.

Whatever induces a people to want more and better goods is valuable, as well as whatever stimulates them to produce more and better goods.

It must always be remembered that prosperity is two-edged. It must include a sharp demand as well as a sharp supply. Because the people of this country live so well and ask so many luxuries, there is a constant demand for the goods we produce.

We sell much goods abroad and the profits from our external trade are considerable. But those profits

are small compared with the advantage of our internal consumption. Andrew Carnegie said some years ago that the Pennsylvania Railroad alone carries more goods than the entire shipping of Great Britain.

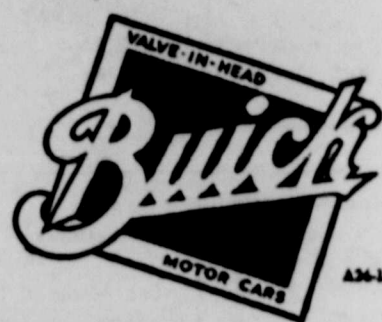

TIME TO SELL WHEAT?

Chances for Spring Wheat to Beat Best January Prices is Not Good

By E. A. Stokdyk
(Marketing Specialist, Kansas State Agricultural College)

Manhattan, Kas.—Those who are holding wheat are becoming anxious about the spring market. So far the best price for No. 2 hard wheat at Kansas City has been \$1.47 per bushel. That price was reached in early July. The next high time was in late October when the top price was \$1.44 1-2.

The next period of strength that can be expected is the early January market. In the last thirty-two years January has witnessed a better market than December, 24 times. This is due to the fact that in Jan-

uary Canadian supplies are shut off from the market due to the closing of the Great Lakes and that it is too early for Australian and Argentine exports to be felt on the world market.

Then Market May Weaken
After January we can expect considerable weakness in the market, due to the heavy shipments of the southern countries. This year we may expect a decline in prices because Argentina and Australia both have more wheat to export than they did last year. This may have the effect that prices will be carried so low during February and March that a good rebound will take place in April—just before Canada can send her grain to market with the opening of the Great Lakes. However, the chances that the April market will be better than the best markets of early July, late October and January are very small. Holding for a spring market will be a gamble that the 1927 winter wheat crop will be small.—Kansas City Star.
