ARTICLE ABOUT TEMPLE HOUSTON ALLEGED DEFAMATORY

(By The Associated Press.)
FORT WORTH, March 28.—Whether the widow of Temple Houston, son of General Sam Houston, should be allowed to recover damages for allegedly defamatory reference to him in Liberty magazine is a dangerous citizen and son of an Indian mother was left to decision of a federal court jury today.

Mrs. Houston sought \$25,000 damages from the magazine publishers, charging the memory of her husband was blackened in a biographical sketch of Sam Houston printed in 1928. Four other suits brought by children of Temple Houston, awaited trial.

The case was submitted to the jury after a charge, covering among other points, the question of malicious intent in publication of the article, was given by Judge James C. Wilson.

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CONCOCTION OF "SHEEP DIP" WITH GINGER FLAVOR HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR MALADY OF "JAKE" PARALYSIS

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, March 28.—Prohibition Commissioner Doran announced today that bootleggers who sold a concoction of creosote, or crude carbolic acid, flavored with ginger, were responsible for the several hundred cases of paralysis in the south and southwest sections of the country.

The commissioner said the concoction, which he termed "sheep dip," had been tested and found to be poisonous. Hundreds of samples, he continued, had been examined and were discovered to be either creosote or crude carbolic acid flavored with ginger.

From three fourths to seven eighths of the solids in the mixture was creosote or crude carbolic acid, Doran asserted.

Drinking the "sheep dip cocktail," the commissioner said, would seriously affect anyone, and samples analyzed indicated it had been responsible for many cases of partial paralysis.

Doran said apparently some shrewd bootlegger had devised a "scheme to get rich quick" and had distributed large amounts of the concoction. He said it was put up in the same sort of bottle as Jamaica ginger and that the first taste was like Jamaica ginger, but after another one or two the flavor would be of carbolic acid or creosote. He said there was just enough ginger in it to give it a predominant ginger flavor.

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BURRUS GIVEN PERMIT TODAY FOR ELEVATOR

\$70,000 BOOST IS GIVEN BUILDING VALUATION TOTAL IN CITY

Lubbock's building again took an upward leap today with the issuance of a permit to the Burrus Elevator company for addition to its plant at 305 Avenue M. to increase its capacity to 1,200,000 bushels, started on March 14 and since that time work has gone forward steadily.

The increased capacity will create one of the largest grain elevators in West Texas. Present capacity is 500,000 bushels. Plans call for the addition of forty-eight huge storage bins to the present plant.

Style of the construction, steel and concrete will conform to the present structure.

At this time there are ten elevators in the Burrus system, the largest, 1,500,000 bushels capacity, is located at Dallas.

Valuations for the year now total \$325,085, for 81 permits.

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SANTA FE IS ASKING LINE TO AMARILLO

ARGUMENTS COMPLETED FOR NEW RAILWAY INTO COLORADO

(By The Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Mar. 28.—Decision on the application of the Santa Fe railway system to construct a new route between Las Animas, Colorado, and Amarillo, Texas, rested with the Interstate Commerce Commission following completion today of final arguments, by attorneys.

H. C. Pipkin, E. H. Ellis and L. P. English, attorneys for the Santa Fe, appealed to Commissioners Meyer, Woodcock and Eastman, who were sitting on the case, to allow the construction. They were supported by S. J. Cole of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, Jack Black, assistant attorney general of Texas, and C. W. Carson, a Spearman, Texas, banker.

Although not an attorney, Carson was permitted by the commission to speak for the business interests he presented the necessity for the increased rail facilities.

Grandy Hillier, representing the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, and K. D. Lewis, of the Lamar Chamber of Commerce, all supported the application generally, but urged that the proposed route be

DIRECTORS LAY FINAL PLANS FOR ANNUAL DAIRY SHOWING

Final meeting of the board of directors of the Panhandle Plains Dairy show was held yesterday at Plainview at which time a last check was made of plans for the exposition which is to be held in that city April 7 to 10 inclusive.

D. F. Eaton, Lubbock county agricultural agent and a member of the board of directors and executive board, attended the gathering.

"From all indications," stated Mr. Eaton this morning, "entries in the show this year will far exceed those of last year, and the attendance, which last year was estimated at 25,000, this year probably will total even more. 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IRON HAND IS PLACED OVER PENITENTIARY

SIXTY-TWO TREATED AS NEW REGIME BEGINS IN PRISON

(By The Associated Press.)
JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Mar. 28.—Inaugurating an iron hand rule at the Missouri penitentiary today, scene of disorders for two days, guards clubbed fifteen unruly convicts this morning when they attempted to "get tough" as they were called from their cells.

The convicts were injured sufficiently to require treatment in the prison hospital. Some of them, the guards said, were accused of having beaten other prisoners for failing to join in yesterday's strikes and other acts of disorder.

Sixty-Two Treated

A checkup today showed that a total of sixty-two convicts had been treated at the hospital for injuries inflicted by guards or, in some cases, by their own companions.

More than 3,000 of the 4,000 prisoners were breakfasted this morning as the prison authorities began to put a new regime of stringent discipline into effect.

Warden Leslie Rudolph said the time for feeding the striking prisoners in their cells had not been determined, but when they are fed, the prisoners will eat as their first meal the same kind of "Irish stew" to which more than 700 of the men

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LUBBOCK GETS FIRE RATING

FIFTEEN PER CENT IS GIVEN AS CREDIT OF INSURANCE POLICIES

Lubbock again has been awarded a 15 per cent credit on all fire insurance policies issued on or after March 1, according to a telegram received here by City Manager Gus McCarty from J. W. DeWolfe, State Fire Insurance commissioner.

The present key rate of the city is 25 cents and the credit is given through the good fire record of the city for the three-year period ending in 1929. The last assessment was made on years 1927, '28 and '29.

City Manager McCarty stated this morning that fire losses in the city for the present year have started bad but that with cooperation on the part of citizens in an effort to keep down such losses, the good standing can be maintained for the next three-year period which will end in 1930. He also pointed out that with an exceptionally bad record a city might be assessed a 10 per cent penalty over the present key rate.

Thousands of dollars will be saved by policy holders of Lubbock through the 15 per cent credit awarded by the state department.

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PRICE FIXING IS CHARGED TO GRAIN AGENTS

REPORTED ATTEMPTS TO MANIPULATE PRICES FOR WHEAT

(By Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, March 28.—The Chicago Tribune today said that, for the first time since passage of the federal grain futures administration act nearly eight years ago, Chicago board of trade members are to be called upon to explain reported attempts to manipulate grain prices.

The paper said that William B. Massey, as agent for Lamson and Co., John S. Reddy and Philip J. Reddy are named in complaints filed by Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde and called for hearing in Chicago April 7.

Charges Attempt
The complaint charges an attempt to manipulate the market price of grain, beginning July 11, 1929. In the period following this date, the complaint alleges, the men, through what were termed "ruses, schemes and devices," caused to be sold not less than 345,000 bushels of December wheat at prices both lower and higher than the real prices existing when the sales were executed.

Factories Closed
Factories at the prison were closed today with the exception of the chair factory, where 100 men who did not participate in the general strike yesterday, were working on some of the unfinished furniture left by the striking convicts when they laid down their tools yesterday.

The factories will be closed until Monday when they will "open for

business as usual" the warden said. The men will either work or take the consequences of the new "hard-boiled" rules, Rudolph said.

To Remove Radicals
Meantime, prison authorities were planning new regulations, designed, as the warden said, to change the institution from a "Sunday School to a real prison." All radicals will be taken from the cells of the prisoners. Playground privileges will be revoked. And the silent system in the dining rooms will be again placed in effect following several years of leniency in this respect.

Late yesterday afternoon a number of men who had no supper began to shout and raise a din in their cells. Deputy Warden W. D. Long went to the affected cell house and ordered the men to be quiet. He instructed the guards to use their clubs on any of the men who violated the order. The cellhouse quieted instantly.

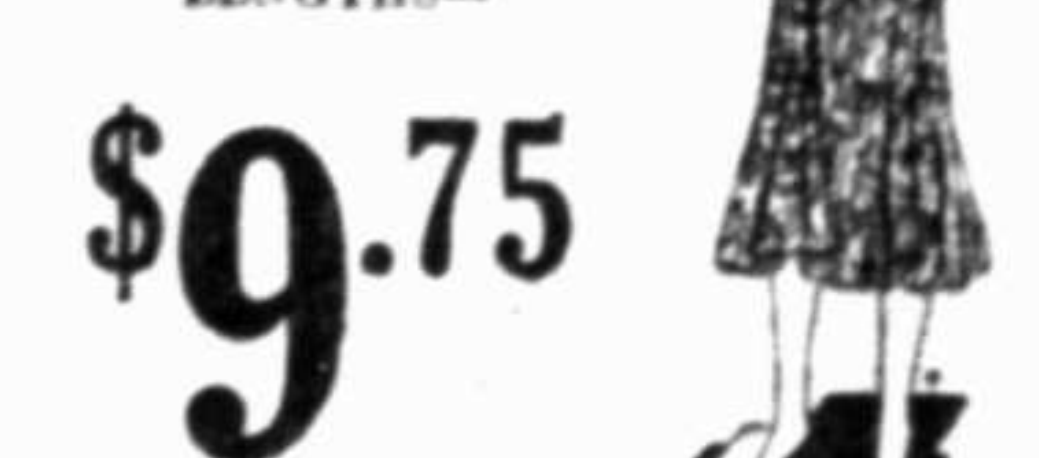

SOUTH PLAINS, INC., IS SEEKING MORE FUNDS FOR BIG ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN

COMMITTEE ASKS CONTINUANCE OF PUBLICITY DRIVE

At a regular session yesterday of the board of directors of the Board of City Development, the advertising committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce voted unanimously to ask the BCD to appropriate \$15,000 for continuance of the national publicity program for the balance of 1930.

The committee, in asking such an appropriation, was enthusiastic in praise of results obtained from the advertising schedule inaugurated in 1928. The committee is composed of R. J. Murray, chairman, also president of the BCD and chamber of commerce; Spencer Wells, H. L. Allen, I. C. Enoch, R. C. Hopping, W. A. Myrick, Jr., W. P. Soash and J. A. Rix.

Thousands of coupon inquiries have been received from South Plains, Inc., advertising in various farm journals, according to report of the committee.

Land men and agents advise that their business for the month of September, November and December, 1929, was from 25 to 50 per cent better than for the same four months of any previous year for the past several years, the committee reported. "Nationally, these four months were very poor over the United States from a real estate standpoint and the month of October was said to be the worst real estate month in the past 50 years. We made a check up with the lumber yards at Amarillo, Littlefield, Amarillo, Sudan, Muenster, Morton, Bledsoe and Levelland and found that from September 1, 1929, until December 1, 1929, there had been 312 new house bills sold out of the yards in those towns averaging \$1,000 per house bill.

Furthermore, we received 9,227 names of individuals who had seen the Panhandle-Plains agricultural exhibits at the 22 fairs covered during last fall.

At the last meeting of the committee it was unanimously voted to have 5,000 booklets telling of our campaign printed. LOVE'S CASE TO COME UP APRIL NINTH

SUPREME COURT TAKES RECESS BEFORE ROW IS TAKEN UP

AUSTIN, March 28 (P)—The Supreme Court recessed yesterday until April 9 when it will take submission of the case of Thomas B. Love of Dallas, seeking to compel D. W. Wilcox, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, to order his name printed on the primary ballots as a candidate for governor.

The action was based on decision of the committee to bar as candidates persons who bolted the democratic presidential nominees in 1928. On the same day the court will take under consideration the case of Edgar Scurry vs. J. W. Nicholson from Wichita county, involving the same question. In the Wichita case, the county executive committee ruled that one who voted for Hoover for president could not serve as a member of the committee, having forfeited his right to do so in bolting the democratic nominees.

The court will devote the next two weeks to studying cases. The court sustained contentions of opponents of incorporation by the town of Fredericksburg and reversed and remanded the case of Ernest Wilke and others against Joe Stein and others. Wilke contested the incorporation and brought suit to dissolve it on grounds the corporate limits included only a portion of the town, thus "fraudulently depriving certain citizens of an opportunity to have a voice in deciding the election."

Previous attempts to vote in incorporation with the entire town in the corporate limits had failed, it was claimed.

**Box Urges Passage
Of Johnson Bill**
WASHINGTON, March 28 (P)—Passage of the Johnson bill to extend the quota system to western hemisphere immigration was demanded in the house today by Representative Box, democrat, Texas, as a means of preventing increased unemployment.

A survey of parts of the country having a large Mexican population had convinced him the Texas said that importation of Mexican labor aggravated unemployment in those sections and caused an overproduction of agricultural products resulting in loss to American farmers.

BYRD TO RETURN
DUNEDIN, N. Z., March 28 (P)—Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd announced today that he would start for New York April 9, aboard the liner Corinthian. He will arrive at Panama April 30, about 20 days ahead of his two expedition ships.

BOXERS TO GET NO GUARANTEES

CHICAGO, March 28. (AP)—No more guarantees will be paid boxers for playing their trade in the Chicago stadium. Henceforth the boys, if they wish to fight, must gamble on a percentage basis.

Sheldon Clark, president of the stadium corporation, announced this change in policy today.

"We have reached the conclusion that boxing must be considered as a business-like basis," Clark explained.

"We found it necessary to call a halt in paying these boxers what they thought they were worth. Their demands were exorbitant. If they are so confident they can draw such big gates, why not let them gamble accepting a liberal percentage instead of demanding guarantees. In the future, they will be paid in accordance to their drawing power, and not a cent more."

ASK WRIT OF ERROR TODAY IN AID CASE

RURAL SCHOOL AID LAW RULING SOUGHT IN SUPREME COURT

AUSTIN, March 28. (AP)—The Supreme Court was applied to today for a writ of error in the case originating in San Antonio, attacking constitutionality of Texas' \$5,000,000 rural aid law.

The suit was filed by Lillie Mae Mumme, student in a small school of Medina county, against S. M. N. Marrs, state supt., of public instruction, and other state officials, to enjoin them from distributing the rural aid fund on grounds the law was discriminatory.

Under the law a school district must levy a minimum maintenance tax of 75 cents to participate in the fund. The Mumme girl claimed this denied the poorer districts relief, and pointed out that her district was able to levy only 10 cents last year.

The district court granted the injunction, but on appeal the fourth court of civil appeals reversed the judgment and dissolved the order.

Enthusiasts of this section who have a name to suggest for the proposed circuit will mail their suggestions to the sports department of this newspaper. The Globe-New at Amarillo will sponsor the contest in Canyon's end of the state, the News-Reporter at Abilene will take care of the ideas sent in by Oil Belt fans and the Times-Herald at El Paso is the headquarters for the Texas School of Mines followers.

A life-time pass will go to the author of the winning suggestion and the runner-up selection will win a ten-year pass to all conference games. There is a possibility that a name will be made out of two suggestions, combining the idea involved in the two. In this event both authors will be given a ten-year pass.

The original name for the conference, Staked Plains, was rejected by certain prospective members that attended the recent meeting at Sweetwater on the grounds that the cognomen failed to cover the territory likely to be involved in the circuit. Someone suggested "West Texas Conference," but W. L. Stangel immediately raised a protest to this. Stangel argues that this name would infer an inferior conference, and that the West Texas baseball league is below the Texas League in standing.

COMPETITION KEEN DESPITE LOW MERCURY

CREAM OF TRACK AND FIELD STARS VIE IN ANNUAL MEET

AUSTIN, March 28.—Approximately 1,000 athletes from 17 states, representing the cream of the track and field talent of the nation, were here today for the sixth running of the University of Texas relays.

The weather for the meet was anything but ideal, the temperature being several degrees lower than normal and the track heavy from rains. Owing to inclement conditions, little hope was held for establishment of more than a few records while last year 15 Texas relay and two intercollegiate marks were broken.

Leland, Bracey Meet

Probably the greatest interest attached to the running of the 100 yard dash between two of the great sprinters the south ever produced, Cy Leland of Texas Christian University and Clyde Bracey, Rice Institute star and holder of the present relay record with the time of 9.5 seconds. The T. C. U. entry recently defeated Bracey in an exhibition match by running the hundred in 9.8.

Another personal duel was arranged between Canby of Iowa university and Warpe of Northwestern in the pole vault event. Canby and Warpe are co-holders of the Texas relay championship in the pole vault with a mark of 13 feet 3 1/2 inches. Warpe also holds the national pole vault record. Increased interest in this event was added by the entry of Mademoiselle of Illinois, who consistently has crossed the bar at 14 feet, 4 inches and who, on more than one occasion, has succeeded in going over at 14 feet, 6 inches.

Champions Entered

Among the stars entered were Bert Nelson of Butler University, holder of the world indoor high jump record, L. D. Weldon of Iowa National A. A. U. junior champion, and a thrower, Nelson Greer, former Rice Institute star, who has title to the A. A. U. 400 meter crown and who also is national junior champion of the United States in the 880 yard run; Robert Greenwade, San Francisco Olympic club and holder of the Swedish record for the 300 yard dash; Todd of Indiana, 1929 all round relay champion, and one of the best track and field men in the nation; Sentman of Illinois, world champion in the 3-yard indoor hurdles.

The list also included several conference and relay champions. The feature race will be a special exhibition between Greenwade Greer and Clyde Blanchard, recognized as three of the fastest men on the track. The race will be over the 660 yard course.

Competition Keen

Every team in the Southwest conference entered the competition with five from the Big Ten and three from the Missouri conference. The Texas A. and M. champions of the southwest conference last year entered a particularly strong squad.

Another innovation was the shuttle race with teams from the University of Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, Indiana and Illinois entered the race as a hurdle event and is run in the form of a relay.

The list showed more than 80 schools, colleges and universities entered the largest meet ever participated in a relay event in Texas. Special events will be held in the University, college, junior college and high school events.

Henry F. Schulte of the University of Nebraska was named referee and Michael Mahoney of Dallas former track coach of Columbia University, assistant referee. Mule Prader, former Baylor star, was designated official starter.

Former White Sox Pitcher Near Death

MERIDEN, Conn., March 28. (AP)—Ed Walsh, Chicago White Sox pitching star of more than two decades ago, was fighting for his life in a hospital tonight after an operation today for appendicitis and peritonitis.

His physician held out strong hopes for his recovery. Walsh was stricken Tuesday while returning from the south, where he had been visiting major league training camp.

He said if the Wisconsin party accepted his invitation he would accompany it personally on the tour.

Conference Held

He made his announcement after a conference with George F. Kull, secretary of the Wisconsin Manufacturers' association, who came to investigate the situation resulting from action of the Wisconsin State Realty board in denying permits to certain Texas concerns to sell land in that state.

Kull said he was pleased to find Governor Moody opposed to a boycott threatened by some against Wisconsin-made articles and products as a reprisal for the board's attitude toward Texas. The state senate had passed a resolution suggesting that Texans refrain from buying Wisconsin goods in retaliation for the land edict.

Kull left for a trip through the Rio Grande valley and said if he found conditions as represented to him he would recommend that the Wisconsin board's order barring sale of the lands be revoked.

KOHLER ACCEPTANCE

"IS DOUBTFUL"

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 28 (AP)—Governor Walter J. Kohler, of Wisconsin, said today that whether he would visit Texas, in response to an invitation of Governor Dan Moody, "is doubtful."

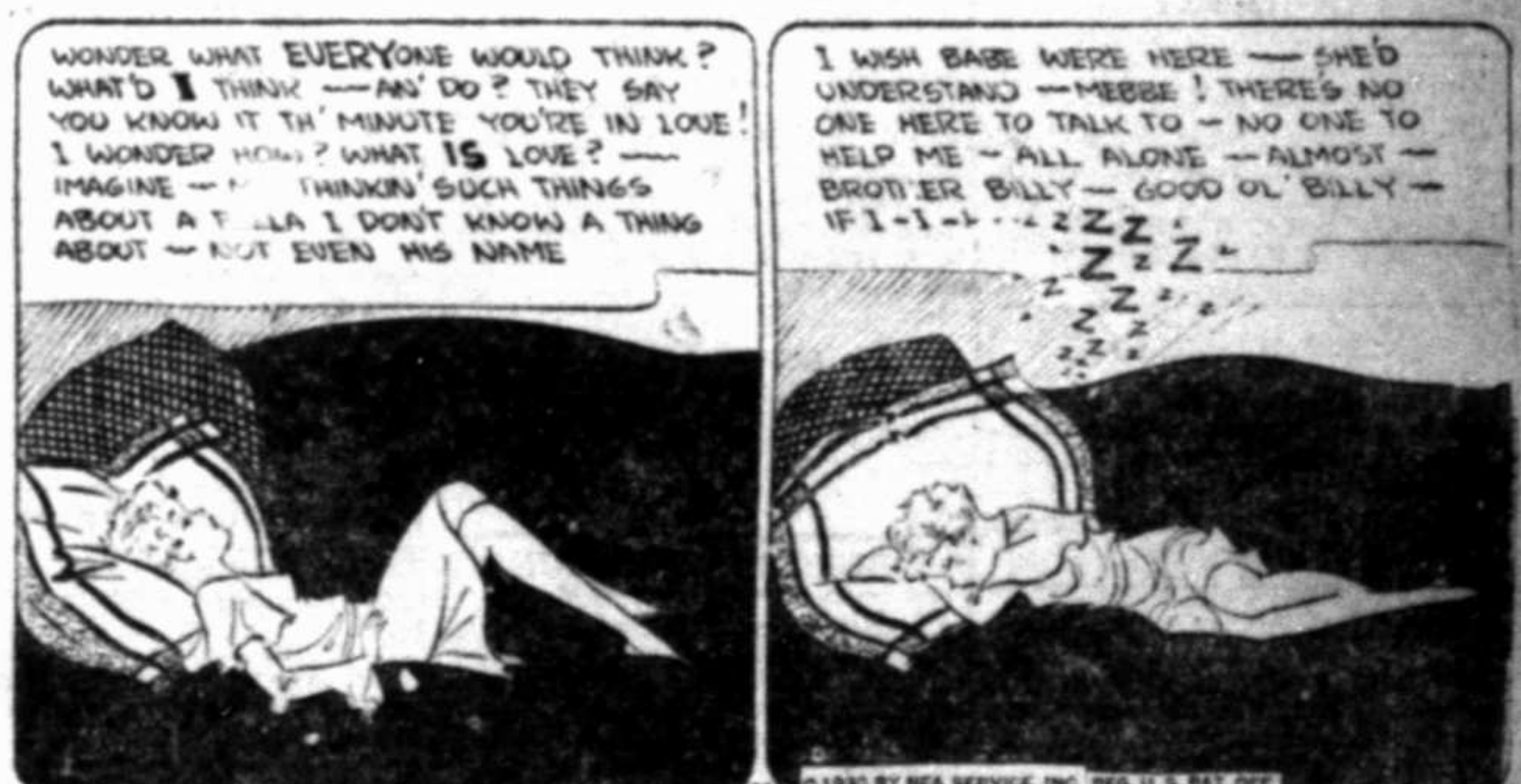

RUM CONTROL SYSTEM WILL BE DEFENDED

PREMIER FERGUSON IS ASKED TO TESTIFY IN PRO HEARINGS

WASHINGTON, March 28. (AP)—Government control of liquor in Canada will be defended by Premier George Howard Ferguson of Ontario province, if he accepts an invitation before the house judiciary committee in answer to charges by former Premier E. C. Drury, of Ontario, that the system "is an absolute failure."

Plans to invite Ferguson were announced late today by Representative Linthicum, democrat, Maryland, in charge of the dry laws. He also said Pierre S. Dupont of Wilmington, Del., also would be a rebuttal witness to answer charges of dry advocates who assailed him in the hearings.

Okch Recommendations
This development came after the house judiciary committee favorably reported the first of the law enforcement commission's recommendations to strengthen the dry laws by authorizing the institution of Padlock proceedings against speakeasies, night clubs and other places where liquor is illegally dispensed. The measure would authorize absence service of summons through publication and posting.

The judiciary committee also considered the Stobbs bill to modify the Jones law by defining misdemeanors and fixing the maximum penalty for first and slight offenses at not more than six months in jail and a fine of \$500. The committee will consider several other measures recommended by the enforcement commission to relieve congested federal courts next Thursday.

Drury Testifies
Appearing for the dry forces yesterday, Drury said bootlegging, drinking in the home, liquor consumption and crime had increased in the dominion under government liquor control. In answer to this, Premier Ferguson said in Toronto, that "the best evidence of satisfaction of the public of Ontario as to the law is shown in the result of the last election."

Officers Have Job In Arson Attempt
FAIRFIELD, March 28. (AP)—County officers today were faced with the task of untangling the several statements made by Miss Wilma Jones concerning the alleged attempt to burn her to death. After a week spent in investigation, State Rangers J. B. Wheatley and R. M. Gault returned to Austin yesterday, turning the case a self-perpetrated hoax.

Chicago Slush Is Two Billion Tons
CHICAGO, March 28. (AP)—Chicago splashed about today in two billion tons of slush.
First came the winter gale, raging madly and whipping spring far southward; then the snow, two days and nearly 20 inches of it, and then the thaw.

Miss Virginia Riggs of Albertville, Ala., and Miss Mary Perkins Bragg of McMinnville, Tenn., also injured in jumping from the third floor.
