WILL PROVIDE WORK FOR ALL NOT EMPLOYED

By Fifty Men To Be Used; Is
Opening of WPA Project
No. 599

Construction Is Planned

Location Made For Work On 15
Miles of State Highway
Number 4

Work was scheduled to begin to-
day laying a caliche base on two
and one-half miles of road from the
cemetery to the point
where the old and new highways
meet south of Perryton. This
opening of WPA project No.
599 will provide employment
for 50 men for the next several
weeks.

A few trucks needed for this
work will be furnished by the county,
which has already been secured, it is
thought that this work, and
other WPA projects which are under
way, will provide work for all
unemployed until additional WPA
projects are opened. Applications
when made for work on State
Highway No. 4, between Perryton
and Canadian and it is expected
that if this is approved, work will
begin about Nov. 15. According to
the 15 miles would be caliche,
which is said to take care of
the work for some 80 to 110
men employed in the county.
Applications have also been made
for work on lateral roads in Com-
munity Precincts Nos. 2 and 4.
Over the state highway project
the preference.

TIME EXTENSION ON SEED LOANS

NEW DEAD LINE IS OCT. 15TH;
THE PREVIOUS DATE WAS
SET FOR SEPT-
EMBER 30TH

Local officials of the Farm Credit
Administration have received in-
structions from headquarters to ex-
tend the time for granting winter
wheat seed loans to Oct. 15. The
last date set had been Sept. 30,
while previously the dead line had
been Aug. 31.
The maximum amount which a
farmer may borrow from the gov-
ernment for winter wheat seed is
\$400, the amount being increased
from \$200 the latter part of August.
Many farmers who had already ap-
plied have asked for supplemental
loans that the maximum might be
obtained.

Changes at Courthouse

School Tax Collector and Highway
Department Exchange Quarters;
Miss Ludwick Also Moves

Several changes in office locations
are contemplated at the courthouse
and will be made within a few days.

the Perryton Independent School
District, will exchange offices with

Marie Ludwick, home demonstration
agent, who is now on the third floor,
will move into the office with Mrs.
Wade. A partition will be erected,
separating Miss Ludwick's and Mrs.
Wade's offices.

SWIMMING POOL FINISHED SOON

EXPECT \$20,000 PROJECT TO BE
COMPLETED IN
OCTOBER

The \$20,000 swimming pool being
constructed at the City Park by
WPA labor is nearing completion.
The work began in February and it
is thought will be finished next
month.
The main pool has been completed
and the side walks, which will ex-
tend around the pool, are about one-
half finished. The office building,
living quarters and dressing rooms
have been erected but the stuccoing
is yet to be done, and concrete floors
are to be laid in the dressing rooms.
The living quarters, where the care-
taker will live, are over the office
and are practically completed on the
interior. These quarters are 24 by 24,
and consist of two bedrooms, living
room, kitchen and bath. Construc-
tion will begin soon on the pump
house and concrete filter.
Forty men are employed on the
swimming pool project.

S. R. McCLURE IS TERRACING 200 ACRES OF FARM LAND

S. R. McClure, farmer living 9 miles
west of Perryton is reported to be
busy terracing a 200 acre field which
lays along a draw. By terracing, it
is said, Mr. McClure will be able to
conserve moisture that falls on his
fields also that which runs onto his
land from adjoining acreage above him.

NEW RULES FOR CCC ENROLLEES

CERTAIN RESTRICTIONS FOR
ENROLLMENT ARE LIFTED
IN THE DROUGHT
AREA

W. G. Caldwell, county welfare
and Texas relief commissioner, has
received the information that cer-
tain restrictions of rules governing
eligibility for CCC enrollment have
been lifted in drought designated
counties, which includes Ochiltree
county.
The new regulations require a
former enrollee to have been out of
camp a full year before being eligi-
ble to re-enroll. These regulations
have been lifted. Also the rule has
been lifted requiring a former en-
rollee to have served four full
months before being eligible for re-
enrollment. An honorable discharge
is necessary, however.

The enrollment will take place be-
tween the dates of Oct. 6 and 13.
All applicants to be eligible must
be between the ages of 17 and 28,
inclusive; single, unemployed, and
not in school. The applicant must
be from a family receiving assis-
tance from the local County Welfare
Office, Resettlement Administration
or WPA (with a relief status), or
must be eligible for same. He must
make an allotment to a dependent
coming under the above classifica-
tion of from \$22.50 to \$25.00 monthly.
Ochiltree county's quota for the
enrollment is four and Mr. Caldwell
has stated that he believes this will
take care of the needs.

PRECIPITATION SINCE AUG. 21 IS 5.36 INCHES

Three Rains During Week Measure
1.26; Heavier in Some Parts
Is Report

Crop Outlook Is Bright

Wheat Said To Be Farther Advanc-
ed Than Usual; More Acre-
age Is Planted

The outlook for a wheat crop in
Ochiltree county is the best it has
been for four years, say old timers
in this section. With moisture which
began to fall in August, and which
has continued throughout the month
of September, farmers have taken
on new hope and are making ex-
tensive plans for next year's crop.
According to the findings of the
United States Department of Agri-
culture, there is a direct correlation
between the sub-soil moisture of
September and October, or planting
time, and the production of the fol-
lowing spring.

At this time, authorities say, there
is three to five feet of sub-soil mois-
ture in most sections of the county,
which according to past perfor-
mances would indicate high produc-
tion for the wheat crop of 1937.

The sub-soil moisture in Septem-
ber and October of 1934 was very
light and there was practically none
during these months in 1935, it is
said. Harvest was light, following
the planting season in these years,
it is recalled.

Rainfall in Perryton in August,
1935, was 1.20 and in September,
1.26, making a total for the two
months of 2.46, while precipitation
since Aug. 21, this year, has been
5.36 according to government gauge
records at Jack R. Allen's office.

Rainfall during the past week here
has been 1.26 inches with the north-
west and western sections of the
county receiving a heavier downfall.
In the Booker vicinity, Lipscomb
county, the precipitation is reported
to have been .75 Sunday, and in
Hansford county 1.33. Rainfall in
Perryton, Sunday, measured .69;
Wednesday of last week, .50, while a
shower Tuesday of this week added
.07 to the total.

It is said by those who have been
over the county and are in contact
with farmers that more acreage is
planted in wheat than has been for
several years and that a greater per-
centage of it is up than usual. Ac-
cording to estimates between 65 and
70 per cent of the wheat planted has
sprouted and is growing, in some
sections it being as high as four and
five inches.

Around 85 per cent of the wheat
has been planted, it is reported, and
the balance will be sown in the next
week or two. In the eastern part of
the county the wheat is said to be
more advanced as that section has
received more rainfall and there
were few crops in that area to take
the moisture from the ground.

With the start the wheat is get-
ting, it is pointed out, that it should
be more able to withstand spring
wind storms than otherwise.

ASSISTANT COUNTY AGENT SERVES FIFTY-FIVE FARMS

George Brockman, assistant county
agent, has run level lines on 13,
025 acres of land since Aug. 17, ac-
cording to records in his office. Ap-
proximately all of this is farm land,
and most of the lines are for con-
touring, only 1,200 acres being for
terraces. Fifty-five different farms
have been served by Mr. Brockman.
Practically all of the lines are being
marked permanently, removing the
necessity of running lines next year
on the same land.

Advise Contouring

County Agent's Office Is Planning
Wind Erosion Control Program
For Spring

With the finishing of wheat plant-
ing, of which more than one-third
was sown on the contour, the soil
conservation department of the
county agent's office is turning its
efforts and attention to the wind
erosion control program of next
spring.

Geo. W. Brockman in charge of
the Wind Erosion Control program
for the county is hopeful that all
farmers will run contour lines and
permanently mark them for emer-
gency plowing, if it should be need-
ed in the spring.

After the experience of the past
two years, say those in charge at
the county agent's office, it is felt
that to be prepared is much the bet-
ter.

The program for Wind Erosion
Control will be about the same as in
1937 as it has been for this year,
says J. T. Stovall, County Agent. It
will be necessary for farmers to
work the land on the contour be-
fore the 20c per acre can be collect-
ed from the government.

DROUGHT RATES NOW ON FREIGHT

COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO AR-
RANGE FOR CAR LOT
SHIPMENTS

Emergency drought freight rates
on inbound feed for Ochiltree coun-
ty are now in effect and a commit-
tee composed of L. R. Conner, chair-
man, E. H. Wheat and Audie Con-
ley, with J. T. Stovall, county agent
as secretary will make arrangements
for shipments. The plan is that
dealers will order the shipments,
giving instructions to have them
consigned to the county committee.
The railway agent will be supplied
with a certificate by the committee,
showing that the feed is to be used
for livestock in the drought stricken
areas.

It will be necessary for small
shippers to pool orders as it is
understood that the rate will apply
only on car load shipments. The
saving on freight is reported to be
from thirty-three to fifty per cent.

The object of the occasion is to remind the public of the seriousness of the large fire loss of this country, both as to life and property, and bring to the attention of everyone the fact that nearly all of this destruction could be avoided if greater care were taken in the construction of buildings, if litter and rubbish were removed from homes and places of business, if children and grown people were thoroughly educated in the handling of fire and taught the importance of extreme carefulness.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, W. C. Bryan, Mayor of Perryton, in cooperation with the nationwide movement for the elimination of preventable fires, do hereby designate October 4-10, 1936, as Fire Prevention Week in this city.

On those days I ask our civic and commercial organizations, our school officials and teachers, and our citizenship as a whole, to join with the chief of our fire department and our city fire marshal in helping prevent fires, as well as to impress the seriousness of the wastage that it causes and the need for utmost care for the protection of life and property.

During Fire Prevention Week I urge that a thorough inspection of the entire city be conducted for the purpose of locating and removing fire hazards, and that the work thus inaugurated be hereafter expanded into a Fire Prevention Year.

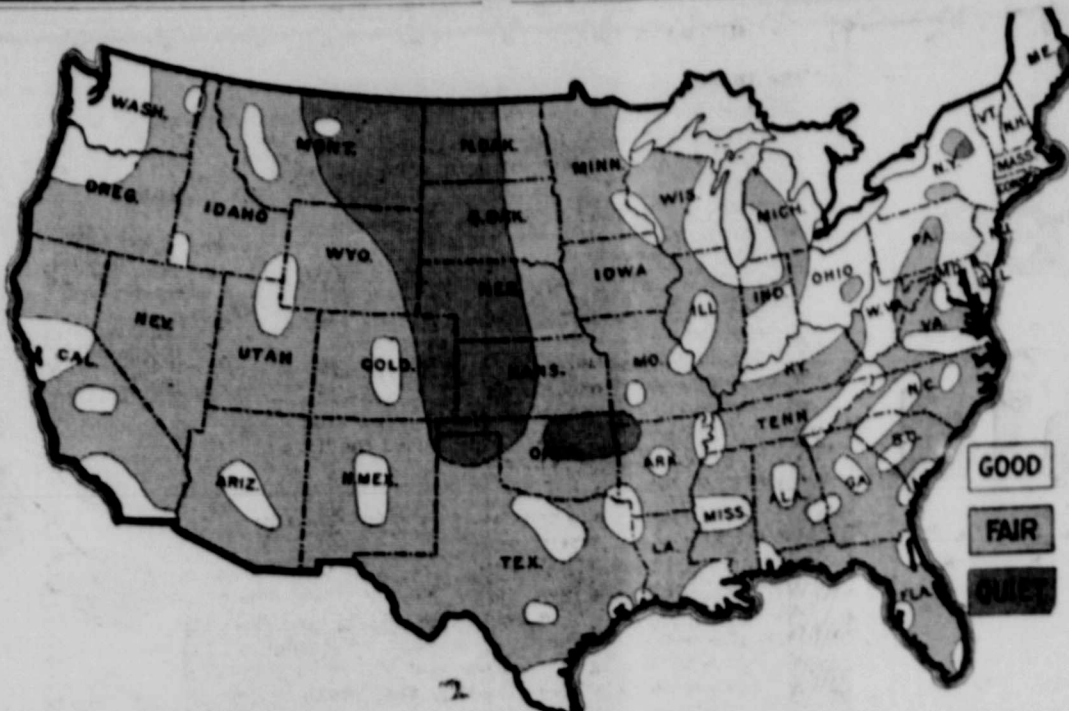

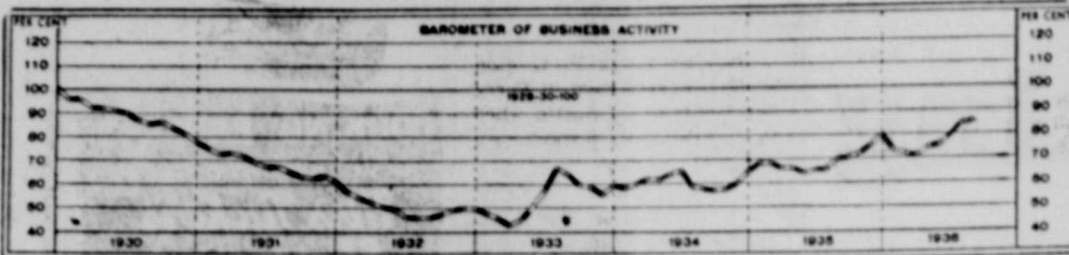

BUSINESS CONDITIONS AS OF SEPTEMBER 1

August heat and drought took additional toll from leading crops. Corn suffered most and doubled in price from mid-June to mid-August, passing wheat for a time. Rains in many states were not expected to add much to corn but should help root crops. Possibly large imports of Argentine corn were indicated. Industry and trade took crop reports equably and maintained a high volume for mid-summer. Steel output reached the year's peak rate.

Model changes retarded automobile production. Electric power made successive new high all time records. Copper continued active. Petroleum output remained high. Gains in carloadings were less impressive, with crop damage assigned as reason. Cattle shipments were expected to be large. Lumber shipments and orders were reported heavy while shoe manufacturing continued above last year. Failures held at the 16-year low

record. Drought aided canned goods buying and prices.

THE MAP

Effects of the drought in August are notable in the west central areas and in parts of the Southwest. Eastern areas present a rather brighter appearance, with seasonal shut-downs shorter than usual.

THE BAROMETER

The Barometer of Business Activity rose slightly during the month but showed a trend towards leveling out at the highest point since late 1930.

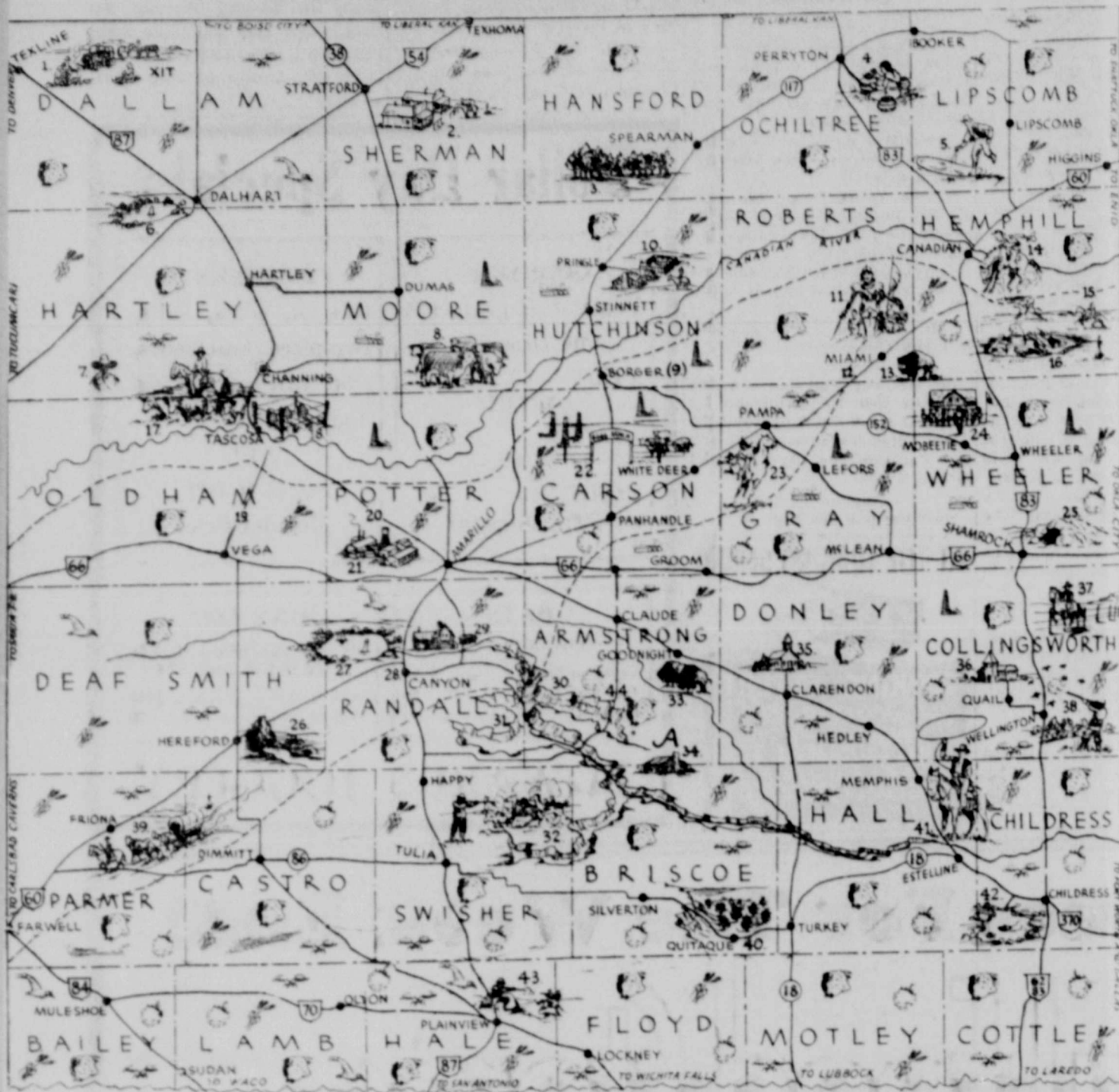

"Where has the Governor been for the last three and a half years? Doesn't he remember that we started with 30c wheat, 15c corn, 3c hogs and 3c cotton? A glance at the market reports will advise him that we are a long way from where we started."—Amarillo News.

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Flood Damage Survey

Texas Planning Board's Water Committee to Determine Extent of Damage

Austin, Tex., Sept. 29.—Although the flood waters of the Colorado, Concho and Guadalupe rivers are still tumbling down to the sea, an immediate survey of the flood damage has been launched by the Texas Planning Board's water resources committee. The survey is under the direction of C. S. Clark, chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers and planning board member.

A hurried survey of the flooded regions by the planning board discloses that property damage will run between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000. Thousands of head of livestock drowned as the raging waters of the three rivers tumbled over their banks and ran rampant over the lowlands. Hundreds of dwellings were torn from their foundations and hurled against the concrete bulwarks of highway and railroad bridges where they crumbled under the terrific pounding of the swirling waters.

Meanwhile, Maj. E. A. Wood, director of the planning board, and Mr. Clark went to Washington to seek funds from the U. S. Geological Survey for the rehabilitation of gauging stations on these streams which had been discontinued before the record breaking rainfall which sent the rivers hurtling toward the Gulf.

NYA Aid For Students

Announcement Made of Available Funds for Jobs at Two Texas Colleges

Austin, Sept. 29.—Allotments of funds for aid of students at two additional Texas colleges were announced Monday by Lyndon B. Johnson, State Director of the National Youth Administration. These were:

Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, \$900 a month for 60 student jobs.

Texas Dental College, Houston, \$105 a month for 7 student jobs.

Students may be employed by college officials in accordance with NYA regulation, on socially desirable work to the extent they may earn an average monthly wage of \$15.

Last week Mr. Johnson announced allotments for 84 colleges providing part-time employment for 5,038 students.

An additional allotment of funds has been made to the Texas division of the National Youth Administration for employing more students from Panhandle and Northwest Texas counties which have been officially designated for drought relief. Allotments to the various schools, which will be made by Washington authorities, will be announced within a few days, Mr. Johnson said.

Allotments for part-time workers in high schools, who may earn an average monthly wage of \$6, will be announced soon, too.

Museum Is Erected

Permanent Structure on Campus of University of Texas. Will House Texas Relics

Austin, Sept. 29.—The erection of a permanent museum on the campus of the University of Texas came one step nearer last week when construction on the Texas Memorial Museum got underway. The imposing edifice will house many of the precious relics of Texas and will stand as a tribute to the history-makers of the Lone Star State.

Through a legislative appropriation of \$225,000 and a congressional allocation of \$300,000 from the federal government the Texas Memorial Museum fund was established. The federal government also authorized the minting and sale of 1,500,000 fifty-cent pieces to be sold

at a minimum of one dollar. The profits of these sales, now being conducted by students of the University of Texas, are going into the building fund.

Construction of the Memorial Museum is being done by J. E. Morgan and Sons of El Paso. Fox-Schmidt Company of Austin is in charge of heating, ventilating and plumbing.

Initial steps in the erection of Texas' finest museum were taken by President Franklin D. Roosevelt on June 11 when he pressed a button aboard his special train at Austin

that exploded the charge breaking ground for beginning of the work. The Museum will stand north of the stadium facing San Jacinto Boulevard, being located with a view to future expansion.

Ralph Boeckman, professional at the St. Cloud, Minn., Country Club, celebrated his birthday recently by sinking two holes-in-one.

NEWS of the WEEK

TOLEDO FALLS TO REBELS

Lisbon, Portugal—Toledo, ancient capital of Moorish and Castilian rulers of Spain, fell before a determined assault by Rebel forces. The force of 1,700 including 400 women and children, which held the Alcazar, medieval fortress, against heavy Loyalist gun-fire, was relieved after a siege of 71 days.

OREGON TOWN DEVASTATED

Marshfield, Ore.—Forest fires which have swept a wide area near here, wiped out Bandon, on Coos Bay, and threatens other coastal cities. Seven deaths resulted, with 1,500 homeless and property damage estimated at \$1,500,000.

EUROPE MAY FORSAKE GOLD

London, Eng.—With France finally joining Britain and the U. S. in abandoning the gold standard, financiers now expect Switzerland and Holland to follow suit. While Italy closed its money markets for three days, no announcement has been made regarding the devaluation of the lira.

CLEVELAND LIKES CONVENTIONS

Cleveland, O.—The American Legion Convention was the 164th gathering in this city since January, and the convention business so far has brought \$11,500,000 to local mer-

chants and hotel men. Legionnaires turned the town upside down; played bridge in the middle of car-tracks shook dice for bonus money on street corners, took over the duties of traffic cops, and paraded a pig and a donkey around Statler Hotel. Clevelanders, however, smiled indulgently; 45,000 veterans and 200,000 relatives and friends spent much more than the \$100,000 the city paid to attract the convention.

UNANIMOUS AUDIENCE

Berlin, Germany—To stimulate business a suburban theatre offered 500 marks to any patron who failed to like the picture shown. There were no takers; the feature was a movie of Hitler.

INSULT OUT OF JOB

Chicago, Ill.—Samuel Insull, Sr., former utilities magnate, resigned from the presidency of the Affiliated Broadcasting Co., a radio chain which he formed last spring. The company expects "to make rapid strides forward" under its new general manager, Clarence Leich, of Evansville, Indiana.

POLITICIANS STUDY PENSIONS

Washington, D. C.—While the American Legion Convention veered away from open reference to further pensions, political observers see a hint of additional benefits in the resolution that "In no event shall the widows and orphans of World War veterans be without government protection." Pensions, experts point out, always cost far more than bonuses. Last year Uncle Sam paid \$47,568,000 to three widows and a child of men who fought in the war

of 1812, a century-and-a-half ago; to 294 widows of Mexican War veterans, who were mustered out 89 years ago, and to 100,290 widows and children of Civil War soldiers. Only 335 veterans of the 900 survivors of the Grand Army of the Republic attended the 70th encampment here last week.

WATCHMAKER BIG BETTOR

New York City—A strong supporter of the President, Arde Bulova, Board Chairman of the Bulova Watch Company, commissioned the owners of a local restaurant to lay \$160,000 to \$100,000 on Roosevelt. Finding no takers, he increased his bet to \$180,000 to \$100,000, in any amounts, raising the odds on the President 9 to 5. So far, Wall Street has covered \$28,000 of the money.

FAMOUS MUSIC BARRED

Ottawa, Canada—In a pastoral letter to the priests of his diocese, Archbishop Forbes restricts music in Catholic Churches under his control to Gregorian pronouncements of the Fifth and Sixth centuries. His order bars "God Save the King," "O Canada," the Wedding March from Lohengrin, both Schubert's and Gounod's "Ave Maria" and many other compositions long associated with religious service.

BRIEFS FROM THE CAPITOL

Washington, D. C.—The Treasury Department announced internal revenue receipts for first two months of new fiscal year at \$542,352,775 an increase of \$75,000,000 over last year. Liquor and tobacco taxes increased nearly \$30,000,000 in the two months. The Labor Department

reports that in August 165,000 workers returned to private industry and pay rolls rose \$7,300,000. August employment stood at 88.7 per cent of 1923-25 average, best month in six years.

KINGFISH LEFT \$153,588

New Orleans, La.—When the late Senator Huey P. Long was assassinated, estimates of his fortune ranged from \$2,500,000 to \$5,000,000. While he left no will, an inventory filed with the Civil District Court revealed the value of his estate as \$153,588.53, which will be apportioned among his widow and three children.

AVIATION FOR EVERYONE

Philadelphia, Pa.—Folding its big rotors back like a bird's wings, a Pitcairn autogiro sped over local suburban roads at a speed of 30 miles per hour, just like an automobile. While this combination airplane and motor-car, which can land on a small field and taxi into its garage, cost the Bureau of Air Commerce \$12,500 as an experiment, its sponsors believe it can be built in quantity to sell for \$2,000.

OLD SLAVERY LAW EVOKED

Little Rock, Ark.—Indicted under a Federal law passed at the close of the Civil War, Paul D. Peacher, City Marshal of Earle, faces trial on the charge of arresting negro idlers found on the streets and forcing them to work on his farm in default of fines and costs imposed by the local mayor. The old law reads: "Whoever kidnaps or carries away any other person with the intent that such person shall be sold into involuntary servitude or held as a

slave... shall be fined not more than \$5,000, or imprisoned not more than five years, or both."

BANKERS HEAR PREDICTIONS

San Francisco, Cal.—Nearly 4,000 members of the American Bankers Association heard Clarence Francis, president of General Foods, detail the results of a cross nation survey conducted by that organization. He stated that 50 per cent of the public expects a new prosperity peak before 1940; that 9 out of 10 predicted another depression, with 4 out of 10 expecting it between 1940 and 1950. Gauged by their financial views, consumers queries rated the nation's most popular men in the following order: President Roosevelt, Father Coughlin, Senator Carter Glass and Governor Landon.

MISTAKEN IDENTITIES

Falfurrias, Texas—When three unshaven men, covered with mud, asked a filling-station operator the time of the next train to San Antonio, he wise-cracked "Freight or Passenger?" Was his face red when he discovered that the trio consisted of Governor James V. Allred, Edward Clark, his secretary, and Homer de Wolfe, prominent lawyer, all returning from a hunting trip.

CODE OF ETHICS FOR MEMBERS OF NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATIONS

Having been elected to membership in this Association, and having subscribed for and become the owner of certain shares of stock in said Association, each member should realize that:

1. A national farm loan association is a cooperative credit organization, chartered under the Federal Farm Loan Act, and is a part of a cooperative farm credit system through which farmers obtain loans on long terms and at a low rate of interest; that national farm loan associations were intended to be the foundation and credit strength of the system and can become such only by members living up to their obligations to both the association and the Land Bank; that the business affairs of the association, including the election of applicants to membership therein, are under the direction of Directors chosen by the members of the association. The success of a national farm loan association is dependent upon each member of the association faithfully performing the obligations of membership.

2. Land bank loans are made by the Federal Land Bank of Houston only to members of national farm loan associations; that each national farm loan association endorses the loan of each of its members and becomes liable for the payment thereof, and in admitting an applicant to membership the Board of Directors does so relying upon the obligations to the association, and to pay promptly the obligations arising under his mortgage to the Bank. A member cannot discharge his obligation to his association by merely surrendering the mortgaged property.

3. Through membership in the association, members have pledged with the association the shares of capital stock owned by them, and each has assumed the stock liability, thereby enjoying participation in terms and lower rates of interest than agriculture can obtain from any other source; that if a member fails in any respect to discharge his obligations, he places a burden on his brother members. No member lives unto himself alone.

Therefore, by reason of the privilege of sharing and enjoying these benefits, it is the duty of each member of the association to do his non-follows:

- (1) To pay to the association before maturity at the Land Bank the semi-annual installments.
- (2) To pay at maturity all taxes on the mortgaged farm.
- (3) To keep in repair the improvements thereon.
- (4) To protect the security of his loan from erosion.
- (5) To perform faithfully all of the terms and conditions of his deed of trust to The Federal Land Bank of Houston.
- (6) To this end, each member should, if necessary, carefully budget both his income and expenses, thereby making advance preparation for meeting promptly these obligations.
- (7) Each member should also endeavor to perform such duties to his association as attending annual meetings, electing qualified directors, and aiding executive officers in the discharge of their duties, and encourage other members to do likewise.

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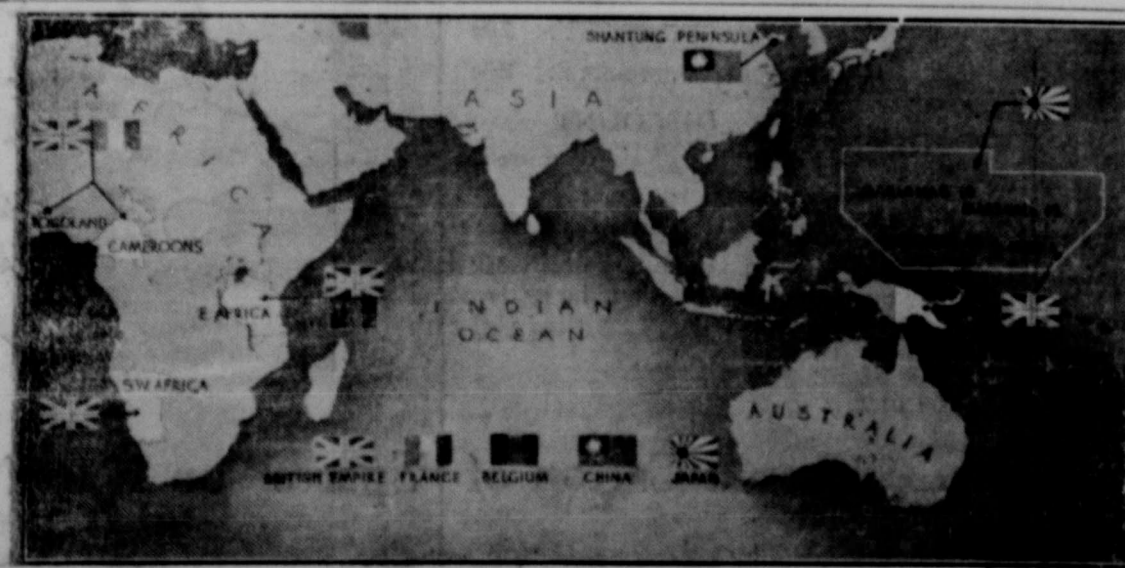
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CHANCELLOR HITLER DEMANDS THE RETURN OF GERMANY'S LOST COLONIES
