STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

— Last week, the Federal Reserve System finally agreed to stop paying direct membership dues to the American Bankers Association. It is true that the Federal Reserve still needs to sever other and similar ties with the banking community, but this is a good, positive, step in the right direction. For years, I have criticized the fact that the Federal Reserve — a Government agency — was a card-carrying, dues-paying member of ABA — the nation's most powerful lobbying organization. There was no excuse for this and I am pleased that the new Chairman of the Federal Reserve, Dr. Arthur Burns, has taken steps to end such payments.

RECENTLY DISCHARGED

VETERANS should again be reminded of the timetable to apply for certain benefits: A veteran has 90 days after separation from military service to apply to his former employer if he wants his old job back; 120 days to convert his service insurance without taking an examination; one year to request State unemployment compensation; one year to apply for VA dental care; and eight years to apply for and receive educational benefits. When making his first application, a veteran should include a copy of his discharge papers (DD Form 214) to establish his eligibility. Application forms are available at most County Veterans Service Offices, but any veteran who wishes may contact me and I will be pleased to obtain any form requested.

WHEN WRITING THE VA regarding any claim you have filed, be sure to include your full name, address and — if you have one — your claim number. This information is important for proper identification since the VA master file contains more than 34 million names — included are over 315,000 Smiths and 215,000 Johnsons — also 1,860 Robert E. Lees, but only 47 Ulysses S. Grants.

CHARITY has been called "the bond of perfectness," and in the midst of the general clamor of anti-American complaints by foreigners and breast-beating accusations by our own citizens, we might pause to note that Americans, in the year 1970, donated more than \$18 billion for philanthropic purposes. In an imperfect world, we too may lack perfection, but on the roster of nations we are surely the most generous.

CLERGYMEN IN UNIFORM

The Chaplains of the United States, with about 4,000 now in service, have a fine and heroic history predating the American Revolution. They have helped our servicemen keep faith with religious precepts, they have given counsel on family and personal problems, and have sustained both morale and morality in the Armed Services. This group of dedicated men is now under attack by critics who would like to abolish the Chaplaincy, and it is surprising to note that part of the problem seems to be that the average Chaplain is a bitter foe of communism. From all I read and hear about the war in Vietnam, I join in George Washington's recommendation submitted 188 years ago asking for more Chaplains.

Austin. — Back-to-school time isn't too far off for more than two million young Texans, and State Board of Education has approved a record \$302.4 million statewide available school fund allotment.

Board set \$121.90 as the state allocation for each pupil in public schools this year. Figure is based on the average daily attendance during 1970-71, or 2,479,400, although actual enrollment was over 2.7 million.

Local school districts may use their allocation to help pay annual operating expenses, including teacher salaries. Available school fund draws investment earnings from the \$835 million permanent school fund.

In other preparations for the upcoming school year, Board of Education also:

• Approved an \$887,500 contract with Southwest Educational Development Laboratory for a bilingual teaching program tailored for four-year-old children of Mexican-American farm workers. Ten bilingual specialists will work with 100 youngsters in McAllen and Hereford to develop an experimental project next school year and field test it in 1972-73.

• Approved a new accreditation plan to provide a computer data to warn of developing weak points in school systems. Data will provide scientific analysis of information needed to decide which schools should be visited by accreditation teams. Such teams visit about 200 of more than 1,100 Texas school districts each year.

• Entered an agreement to link Texas Education Agency and U. S. Office of Education in a \$1.8 million program to evaluate new special education pilot projects expected to have national impact on the teaching of handicapped children.

• Allocated \$23.2 million to buy new textbooks (see below).

DISEASE SPREADS — A sleeping sickness-like disease spread among horses (and in a few humans) in the South Texas-Rio Grande Valley area.

U. S. Agriculture Department which originally had scheduled an experimental vaccine against Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis in 13 counties, later released it statewide and slapped an embargo on Texas horses.

Later, a state Animal Health Commission order halted movement within state or out of state of horses not vaccinated at least 14 days earlier.

Several persons were hospitalized in Brownsville with VEE symptoms. Cases in horses increased sharply, though laboratory confirmation lagged behind discovery of symptoms.

Disease, described as "flu-like" among humans, is deadly to horses, and concern was expressed for the equine population. Emergency situation stopped all rodeos, horse shows, race meets and other activities involving horses.

TEXTBOOKS AVAILABLE FOR REVIEW — Textbooks considered for 1972-73 school adoption can be looked over by interested citizens at 20 regional educational service centers over the state.

Texas Education Agency, the

largest single buyer of textbooks in the world, has \$23.2 million available for the next school year. New books cost an average \$8.10 for each of 2.7 million pupils. Proposed new textbooks can be reviewed at Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Houston, Beaumont, Huntsville, Kilgore, Mt. Pleasant, Wichita Falls, Richardson, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, Abilene, San Angelo, Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso and San Antonio education service centers.

1.5 MILLION NEW VOTERS? — Texas may have 1.5 million new voters in 1972 largely as a result of 18-21-year-olds becoming eligible for all elections, according to a state senator's forecast.

New law goes into effect September 1 which permits registration of a Texas voter for a three year period instead of annually as at present. Registration will also be open year-round except for a 30-day cutoff before any election.

Dallas Sen. Mike McKeel, author of the new registration law, sees youngsters as accounting for a large part of the 1.5 million increase in eligibility rolls and predicts they will vote as well as any age group.

AG OPINIONS — All Texas counties must adopt the jury wheel system and terminate selection of jury panels through use of commissions. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

New state law providing for waiver of indictment in non-death-penalty cases is constitutional, Martin said in another opinion.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- Governor is authorized to make six appointments to Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators — two initial appointees to serve until Jan. 31, 1973, two until 1975 and two until 1977.

HUNTERS IRED — A state proposal to turn Canadian River bottom into a wildlife refuge stirred protests of hunters from the Panhandle at a hearing here.

Panhandle hunters wanted no part of the Parks and Wildlife Commission's closing of state-owned river beds, streams and railroad rights of way to public hunting.

SHORT SNORTS

Governor Smith, House Speaker Gus Mutscher and several others were questioned a second time by Securities and Exchange Commission in its stock probe.

Major Texas crude oil buyers recommended to the Railroad Commission a 30,344 barrel-daily decrease in production next month.

Under a new law motor boat owners must provide Coast Guard approved life preservers for children 12 years old or under.

Traffic accidents killed 1653 Texans this year, compared with 1621 in 1970.

Texas has taken the first steps toward a \$12 million updating of law enforcement communications system.

House General Investigating Committee sent out questionnaires to state representatives asking information on stock scandals — and included questions on whether the press had been "biased" in reporting news.

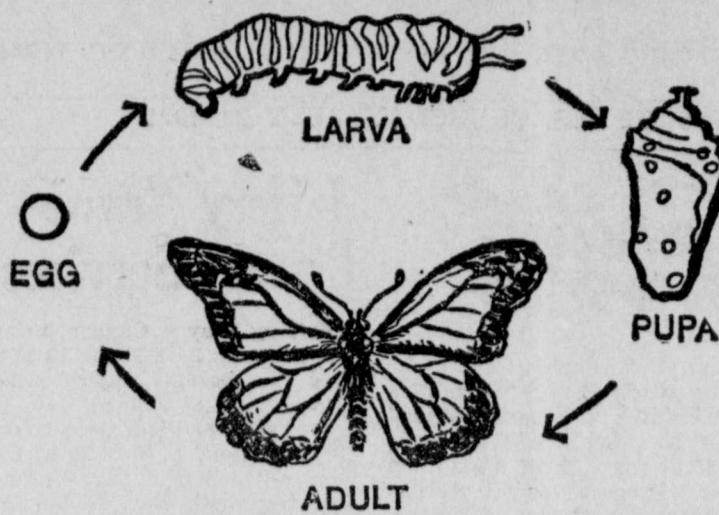

4-H'ers 'Learn Their Bugs' Through Entomology Program



More insects inhabit the earth than all other living things put together. Entomologists estimate there are over 1.5 million different kinds with nearly 1.0 million identified and given names.

Young people find the study of insects fascinating. They collect and identify various species. And they find the life cycles equally interesting. Among the favorites with 4-H entomologists is the Monarch Butterfly and its life stages illustrated here. Their work also may lead them into scientific careers.

Hercules Incorporated, one of the nation's leading chemical companies, in an effort to help provide young people with more knowledge about the insect world, has supported the 4-H entomology program for the past 20 years. In 1970, nearly 56,000 youths between the ages of 9 and 19 participated in various 4-H entomology activities supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

4-H'ers enrolled in the entomology program "know their bugs"—what they look like,

where to find them, and how to control the harmful varieties. The young people find the use of insects, raise insects for experimental purposes, trade specimens and exchange information. Some former 4-H entomologists have broadened their interests through an international teen entomology group.

Adding to the 4-H members' fun of working in entomology are the opportunities provided for recognition. Hercules Incorporated provides medals of honor for four members in each county and a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond to one winner in each state. The company also treats 16 sectional winners to an expense-paid trip to the 50th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 28-Dec. 2. And at that event will award \$700 educational scholarships to six accomplished young scientists.

Over two decades of association with 4-H, Hercules also has supported the development of popular educational materials.

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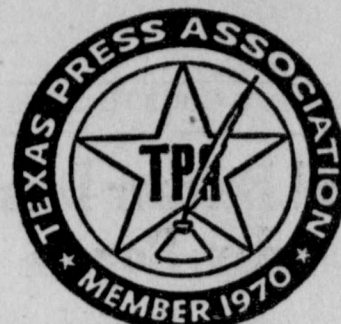

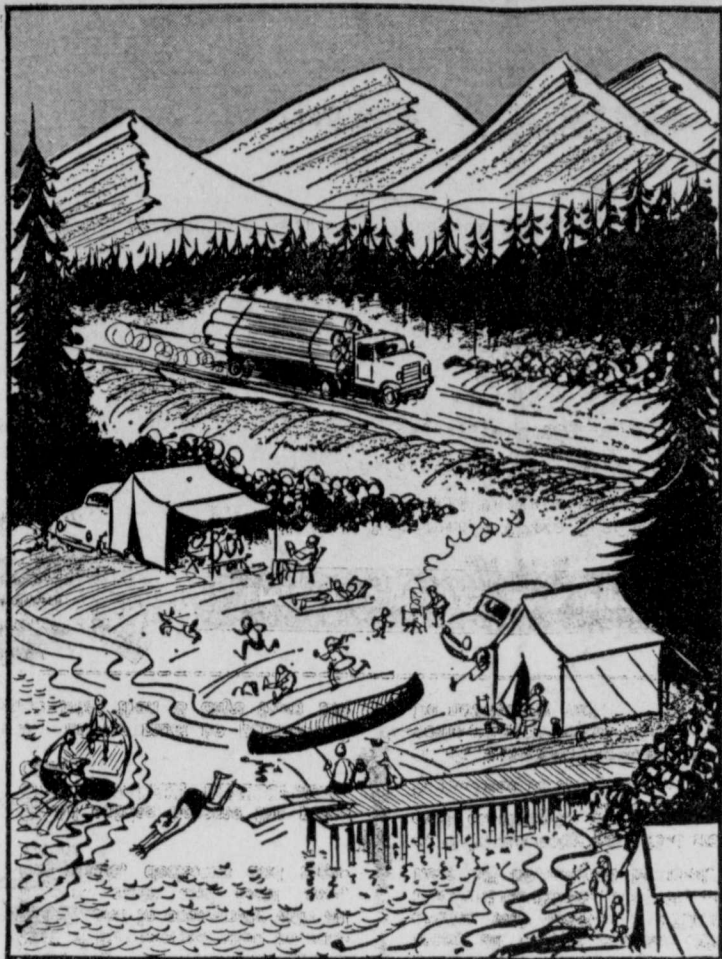

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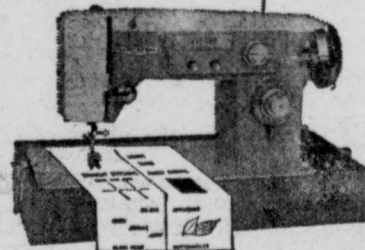
