TALCO'S TROJANS AND COOPER'S BULLDOGS PLAY 6-6 DEADLOCK

Talco's Trojans staged a big push late in the game at Talco Friday night, and came off with a 6-6 deadlock against the Cooper Bulldogs.

Cooper had led in the game with a minute and 48 seconds to go. But the Trojans pushed across their only score to tie it.

Halfback Jerry Russell made it over for the score from the three-yard line with time running out. The Trojans got their break by holding Cooper and forcing them to punt out to the Bulldog 40 late in the game.

The previous record for the Bulldogs was a 6-6 tie with Wolfe and for the Trojans was a 12-0 defeat to the Quitman Bulldogs.

Jerry Russell kicked off for the Trojans and Quarterback Tommy McClung returned the ball to the 37 yard line. In the middle of the first quarter, Cooper completed a series of three passes which brought the ball down to the three yard line, where Bulldog quarterback ran a keeper play over center for the touchdown. Robert House, Bulldog fullback, failed in the extra point attempt.

Bulldog guard, Ellis McGaha kicked off and James Paul Clark, Trojan quarterback, returned the ball to the Cooper 47 yard line after the Bulldogs received two penalties for offside on the kick-off.

In the second period the ball volleyed back and forth with neither team gaining a first down until in the fading seconds of the first half when Trojan quarterback Gerald Morris completed a pass to halfback Jackie Martin for 42 yards which brought the ball down to the 4 yard line with 28 seconds remaining in the first half. The next two plays failed to gain sufficient yardage to score with time running out with the ball on the 2 yard line. The score at the end of the first 24 minutes of play remained Cooper 6, Talco 0.

In the third period, Bulldog guard Ellis McGaha kicked off and Trojan quarterback Gerald Morris returned the ball to the 28 yard line.

In the early minutes of the third period, Cooper completed

two passes and were driving hard when Trojan quarterback Morris intercepted a pass from Bulldog quarterback Davis, which was intended for halfback Wheat of the Bulldogs. The Trojans were unable to make meat of this inspiration and were forced to punt on fourth down.

Later in the third quarter, Fullback Russell for the Trojans recovered a Bulldog fumble and a strong series of drives brought the ball to the 7 yard line where a fumble in the Trojan backfield gave the ball to the Bulldogs.

Early in the fourth period the Trojans presented a scoring threat, where, inspired by a 30 yard pass from Morris to Martin and the Trojans had the ball on the 7 yard line, but just could not manage to click offensively and the ball went over on downs to the Bulldogs.

Late in the fourth quarter the Trojans again attempted a comeback with another pass from Morris to Martin for 33 yards and a series of strong drives to the 2 yard line, where powerful Trojan Fullback Russell ran it over for the much-needed touchdown. Russell also attempted the extra point which was blocked by McClung, Bulldog quarterback, to tie up the score 6-6.

In the fading seconds of the game, Trojan Halfback Martin intercepted a pass and made a splendid return of 12 yards down to the 35 yard line where Cooper intercepted a Trojan pass and returned the ball to the 39 yard line, where time ran out.

Fullback Russell led the Trojan offensive with 68 yards net rushing, followed by Martin with 20 yards and Loftin, 19 yards. Quarterback Davis led Cooper with 94 yards net rushing.

The Trojan backfield was handicapped by the injury of Fullback Hood during practice the previous week. Johnny will be back for the next Trojan conquest.

Tackle Toon led the Bulldog defense while Halfback Martin, Fullback Russell and 210 pound Charles Graf polished off the Trojan defense.

Two Completions Morris Lease in Bagwell Area

Two oil well completions have been reported to the Railroad Commission office in Mt. Pleasant for the I&L Development Co. in the Bagwell sector of Red River County.

One on the E. E. Morris lease, Well No. 5: 24-hour test, 44.80 barrels, gravity 33, water 42%. Another is E. E. Morris lease, Well No. 7: 24-hour test, 46 barrels, 33 gravity, water 30%.

This makes seven producing wells on the Morris lease, and rigging is up to drill an eighth. A ninth well in that field is Ed Jones No. 1. The first well in this field was drilled in December, 1955.

Three were dry holes. Drillers have hit oil in their last four consecutive attempts, however, and now are ready for the fifth.

The wells are located on a 100-acre area, on a strip running northeast to southwest, four wells wide. The most shallow well is 1,800 feet, the deepest 2,058. All are in the Walnut sand.

Heart of the young field is five miles southwest of Bagwell. The highest potential of any I&L well is 96 barrels per day. Allowable set by the Railroad Commission on the I&L wells is 17 barrels per day per well. That's on a 30-day basis.

Small Talco Boy Killed When Hit By Automobile

James Wallace Frye, 10, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wallace C. Frye, died Thursday about 11 p. m. due to an accident which occurred at the Top, an ice cream stand operated by the child's mother.

It was nearing closing time and the mother and child were cleaning the premises of scattered paper.

The child was sitting down in front of a car to burn papers as the mother stood near, speaking to the driver. As the car started, the driver, William Lee Harris, Talco, was unable to see the child as he was so near the car. Mrs. Frye called to the child and as he jumped the car struck him. He was able to get up and ran a short distance behind the building. He was taken to Talco Clinic, where he died of internal injuries in about 20 minutes after arrival.

William Lee Harris, 19, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Harris, a student of Talco High School, was driver of the car. James Wallace was born Dec. 6, 1946, son of Wallace C. Frye, native of Talco, and Wilma (Brand) Frye, native of Worthington, Mo.

Survivors other than the parents are a brother, C. W., a sister, Kay, and one grandmother, Mrs. A. F. Yates of Queen City, Mo.

Jerome Dyer Dies In Auto Crash At Hagansport

A car accident at Hagansport Thursday about 7 a. m. took the life of Jerome Dyer and injured Mrs. Walton Ottinger.

Dyer who was traveling east on Farm Road 71, was driving a county dump truck and came to its intersection with State Highway 37 at Hagansport stores. At this point the dump truck was in collision with a pickup truck driven by Mrs. Ottinger, who was traveling south of the intersection.

Dyer died minutes after reaching Franklin County Hospital, but not before he told officials his brakes failed.

Attendants at Franklin County Hospital report Mrs. Ottinger seriously, but not critically injured, with severe lacerations about the face, but no broken bones.

Funeral services for Dyer were held Saturday at 2 p. m. at the Assembly of God church at Hagansport, with Rev. Charlie Taylor officiating.

Dyer, 53, is survived by his wife, a daughter, Mrs. Stevenson of Mt. Vernon, and a daughter and two sons, all of Houston.

Mr. Dyer had been attending his mother-in-law, Mrs. Mary King, in his home. Mrs. King has been bed-fast for over a year and was not expected to live through the night, and has since developed pneumonia.

At funeral time Mrs. Ottinger was reported improved and resting well in a Mt. Vernon hospital, of cuts about the head and face and shock received in the accident.

Governor Seeks Crackdown On DWI, Speed Cases

Austin.—Gov. Price Daniel asked prosecuting attorneys meeting here Friday to "throw the book at those who drive while intoxicated."

Daniel asked the district and county attorneys to declare "all-out war" on excessive speeders as well as drunk drivers.

He noted that fatal highway accidents which killed 2,611 Texans in 1956 involved DWI offenders in 39 per cent of the cases and excessive speed in 58 per cent.

Daniel said all public officials and citizens should co-operate in reducing the slaughter on Texas highways.

"Law enforcement officers, especially your prosecutors, can contribute greatly by throwing the book at those who drive while intoxicated," the Governor told the District and County Attorneys Association.

"When you prosecute them and they are convicted, their driver's licenses will be suspended for a maximum of six months. As governor, I have not yet restored a single license by clemency action after a DWI conviction."

"Over 15,000 people are convicted each year for driving while intoxicated, and Department of Public Safety officials have estimated that this is only one-fifth of those who annually violate this law," Daniel said. "Stop drunk driving and you will save over 1,000 lives and 40,000 injuries in Texas every year."

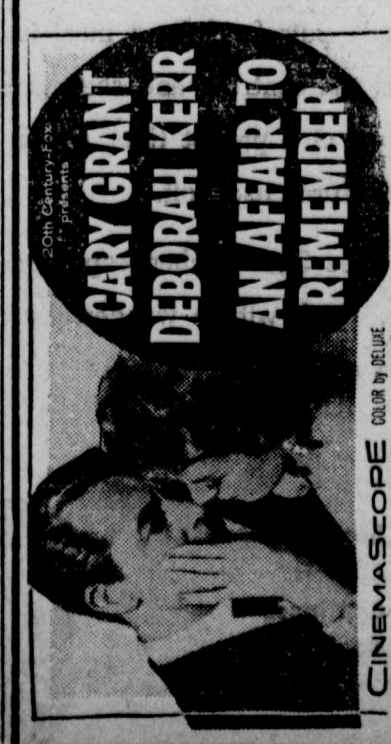

Alcorn Learns From Town Friend Inflation is Bothing Him Too

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, has had a visitor from town, his letter this week indicates.

Dear Editor: I've got a situation this week I don't know how to handle, so I'll just report on it and let somebody else decide on it. A friend of mine from your town was out here visiting me on my farm yesterday afternoon after he got off from work in town and he said he was getting tired of hearing how inflation has hit the farmers.

"You farmers think inflation is limited to the farm, but I'd like to tell you it's in town, too," he said.

"I sympathize with you country folks, I know what it must be to fight low prices and high costs, but I'd like to point out some problems, too.

"One tractor blows out, I know, and you're on the rim, but did you ever stop to think if one motor burns out on one of my appliances, I'm sunk? Have you ever stopped to think what a strain it is on a man's constitution to hear the washing machine motor stop suddenly when the

machine ain't paid for yet? Do you know what it is to have the television set go blank thirty days after the guarantee runs out and a year before the last payment is made? You ever stepped on the starter of your car and found the battery dead on the day you're overdrawn at the bank? You ever stop to think a man in town has problems, too? You know how hard it is to feed and clothe and educate and doctor and entertain a family in town? It doesn't make any difference how much a man makes, it never is quite enough, even when salaries are high."

Well, I said, I guess you've got a point. What I want to know is, what're you going to do about it?

"Well," he said, "I've been thinking about it a lot and I've come to the conclusion that the only way for a man in town to make ends meet is to take on a second job in the country."

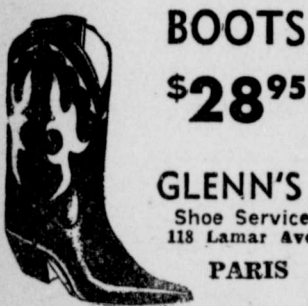
Wait a minute, I said. You've got this thing backwards. The agricultural experts are recommending that us farmers take on a job in town to supplement our income.

"That's where I got the idea," he said. "I'm not making quite enough in town to suit me, you're not making quite enough in the country to suit you, so the only way out is for you to work part-time in town, me to work part-time in the country. This way we'll both get ahead."

Frankly, I don't know whether this idea will work, but it's sure something to think about. I've got plenty of work all right here, but I'd sure have to work a lot extra in town to get the money to pay him for it. Until further notice, though, I believe I'll just stick to the country."

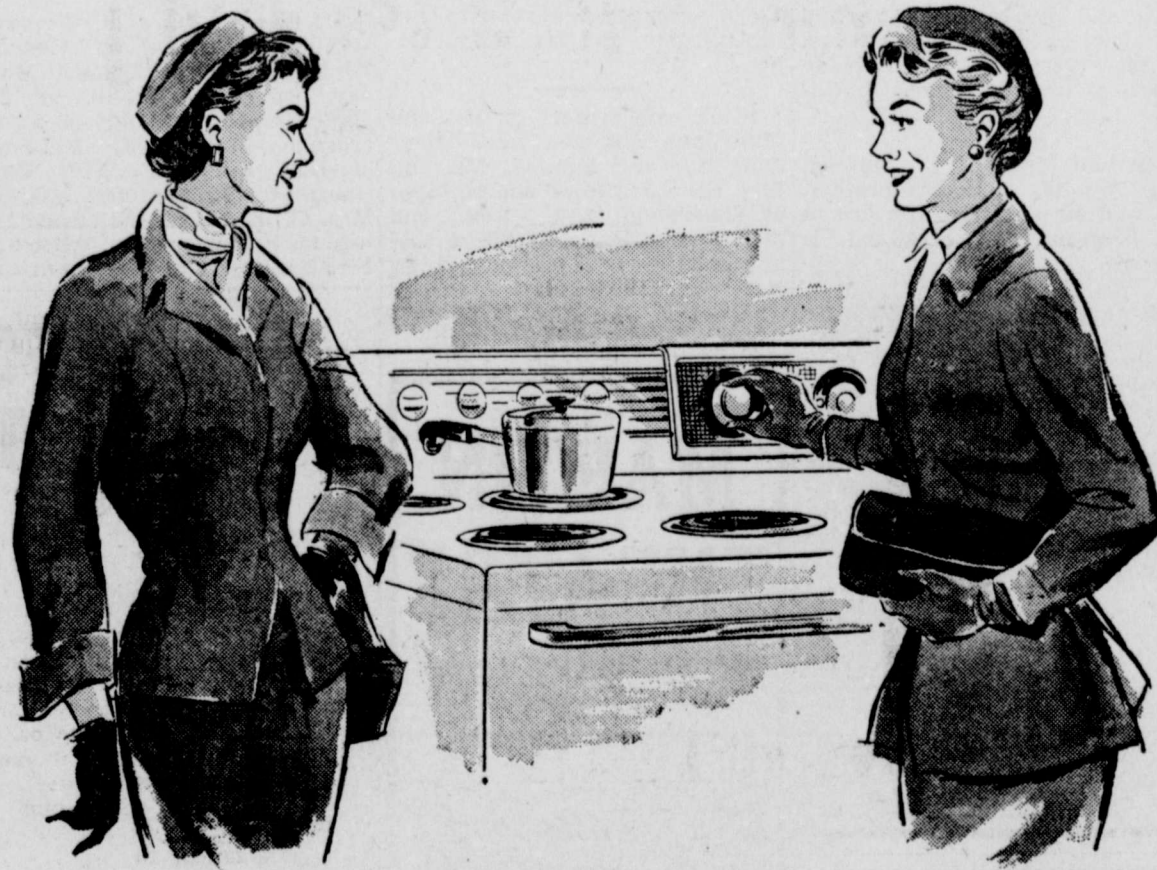
