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The Good Earth

Bulbs and rhizomes for fall planting are at the nurseries now. Bulbs that are now ready for their winter bed are: daffodils, paper white Narcissus, ranunculus and tulips. Iris rhizomes and Dutch iris bulbs are also on the market. Be sure to spade the bed well before putting the bulbs into the soil.

Daffodils are a hungry plant, so well-rotted manure or rich compost incorporated into the soil before planting, will insure large, colorful blossoms next spring. Set the bulbs about six inches deep and about eight inches apart. Daffodils grow

beautifully around trees and scattered natural-like over the lawn. If they are planted in the lawn, the foliage should be allowed to ripen and die before it is mowed down. The next year's blossoms come from the foliage ripening naturally.

One thing about planting daffodils is they last for years before they require re-setting. Narcissus require the same culture as daffodils. In fact, daffodils are of the Narcissus family.

Tulips, like daffodils, are heavy feeders and well rotted manure or compost should be worked into the bed before the bulbs are planted. The earlier in October the bulbs are planted the longer the stems to the tulips will be next year. Late plantings may result in shorter stems and smaller blossoms. Never cut the leaves of tulips at any time; tulips feed from this foliage and store new food for the next season. After the leaves have died down they can be removed by gently pulling them from the soil. The bulb is then ready to stay in the soil, often as long as three years before re-setting.

Our neighbor, in Abilene, had a clump of Tulips that bloomed every year for at least seven years that I knew of. This clump of tulips ushered the month of May in every year.

Any soil that will grow zinnias will grow irises; the plants like a feeding of bone meal, so a generous sprinkling of this fertil-

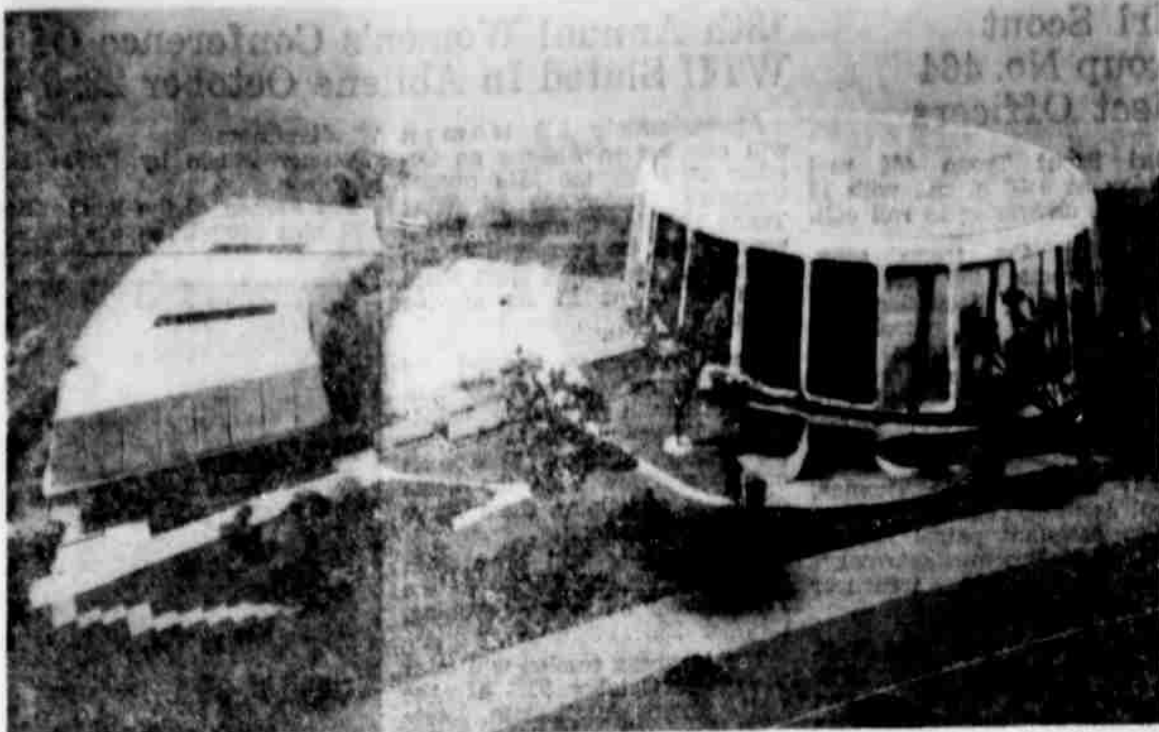
izer on the bed before the rhizomes are set into the soil will make for more colorful and larger flowers next year. Never plant a rhizome too deep. If the soil just completely covers the rhizome, that is deep enough. Be sure to tamp the dirt down firmly. Iris love a sweet soil so Haskell should grow beautiful blossoms from this plant. If three rhizomes are planted in a clump, they make a better show in the spring.

Ranunculus are of the buttercup family, and like their native cousins this species is easily grown. Do not plant the tiny tubers too deep, and be sure to put the tubers straight down in the soil. One year when we lived in Wharton I planted my ranunculus upside down and wondered why I didn't get any blossoms. The tubers should be planted two inches deep and about eight inches apart. These plants like some shade.

I hope the Haskell Garden Club members will plant lots of bulbs this fall.

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OUTDOORS --IN-- TEXAS

Squirrel hunting is taken for granted over most of the state. Many counties don't even have a closed season.

But East Texas does! Here the opening of squirrel season is as much a coveted event as deer season is in other parts of the state.

No. 1 target of the East Tex- an is the gray squirrel, that daredevil of the treetops, a master of the disappearing act, a challenging game animal of the first order.

Gray squirrel population has dwindled in recent years. This has been due to many factors with the main one being an ever-expanding civilization. Tex- as Parks and Wildlife Depart-

ment is experimenting with artificial nesting boxes in trees to add an impetus for squirrels to mate and multiply.

More power to the biologists, for there is no animal quite like the gray squirrel.

Although a diminutive crea- ture, weighing about 16 ounces on the average, the gray is quite speedy afoot. It has been clocked in excess of 15 miles- per-hour along the ground, and it dashes pell-mell through the trees in leaps often exceeding five feet.

Therefore, by necessity the shotgun toting gray squirrel hunter must possess quick re- flexes and a keen shooting eye, for the gray can quickly escape out of range before the fluster- ed hunter can get off a shot.

It takes a considerable amount of food to sustain a hunt- able gray squirrel population. Its favorite food is the ubiqui- tous acorn. But it is an adapt- able animal that can make do with what is handy.

Anything from young tree bulbs and mast to wild grapes,

grasses and even an insect oc- casionally is his food. When the acorns are ripe, however, the gray likes to collect a store- house for the lean months a- head. It will busily gather the nuts and bury them for future use.

A renowned naturalist, the late Ernest Thompson Seton, did some in-depth research on the gray squirrel. He reported that he'd watched a squirrel burying five nuts every three minutes. In three months, Seton claimed, the normal gray squirrel will bury 10,000 nuts!!

It is amazing how quickly and efficiently a family of gray squirrels can strip the nuts from an oak tree. To give some inkling as to how efficient they really are, Walter Hahn did some studies on the gray squir- rel at University Farm in Mit- chel, Indiana.

Through mathematical analy- sis Hahn figured out that each white oak on the farm bore from 2,000 to 3,000 acorns. Over- all, he computed the acorn crop at about 100,000 nuts per acre. On this basis, in two

months he figured that less than 100 gray squirrels had gather- ed and buried some 20,000,000 acorns.

The gray squirrel is a wily little creature with a radar-like defense system that includes fantastic sight and hearing. Nothing around it escapes his attention. It isn't unusual for a gray to go scampering for the protection of a treetop while a hunter is still 100 yards away. Once in the treetop the animal is a master of camouflage, belling down on a limb and re- maining perfectly motionless to escape detection.

But the gray squirrel depends more on sight than hearing for protection. This animal is one of the very few that has per- fect, uninterrupted vision, even when looking upwards. The re- tina of the animal's eyes is com- posed of cones, which pinpoint movement with a remarkable perception.

Family Survives Ocean Shipwreck

Retired San Antonio, Texas, police Lt. Jack Larned and his family are in Sydney migrant hostel after surviving a Pacific shipwreck.

Larned, 51, his wife and their sons were among 60 passengers aboard the 7,500-ton British liner Lakemba which ran onto a reef off Fiji a few hours after leaving Suva the night of Oct. 4. They were bound from Vancouver, B. C. to Sydney.

Passengers have been told their other baggage was recovered later and is expected to reach Sydney toward the end of the month.

The Lakemba slipped off the reef and sank a few days after it ran aground.

Former Haskell Resident Dies

Friends in Haskell recently received word of the death of Mrs. J. F. Morrison, who resided in a home for retired Christian preachers and their wives in Missouri. She was 93 years old.

Mrs. Morrison, the former Flora Pinkerton, was an early day resident of Haskell, where her husband was pastor of the Christian Church for many years.

She is survived by two sons, Ferris Morrison of Buffalo, Mo., and Thomas Morrison of Dallas, also grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

Vietnam era veterans and cold war veterans are eligible for home loans and most other benefits on the same basis as veterans of other wars. They must have at least 181 days active military service with at least one day of that service after January 31, 1955. Veterans can get a VA guarantee for up to \$7,500 of a home loan. Coker said, for 10 years after discharge, plus one year for each three months of active duty.

It was the World War II G. I. loan program, Coker theorizes, that accounted for much of the upgrading in homes for veterans. World War II veterans purchased homes at the rate of half a million per year, he said, and few could afford down payments. A VA guarantee allowed them to get loans from private lenders, and the equity they built up while making payments on this first home put many of them in a position to buy a larger home with conventional financing in later years.

During the housing boom of 1961-1965, when nearly 7.5 million new non-farm homes were started, VA loans financed the purchase of nearly one of every five houses built. More than 70 per cent of World War II veterans have bought homes since returning to civilian life and over 40 per cent used a VA loan.

As of October 1st, the VA will be authorized to make direct loans in certain areas up to \$25,000, instead of being limited to \$17,500 as before. Veterans interested in a guaranteed or direct home loan can secure further information from the Regional Office at 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710.

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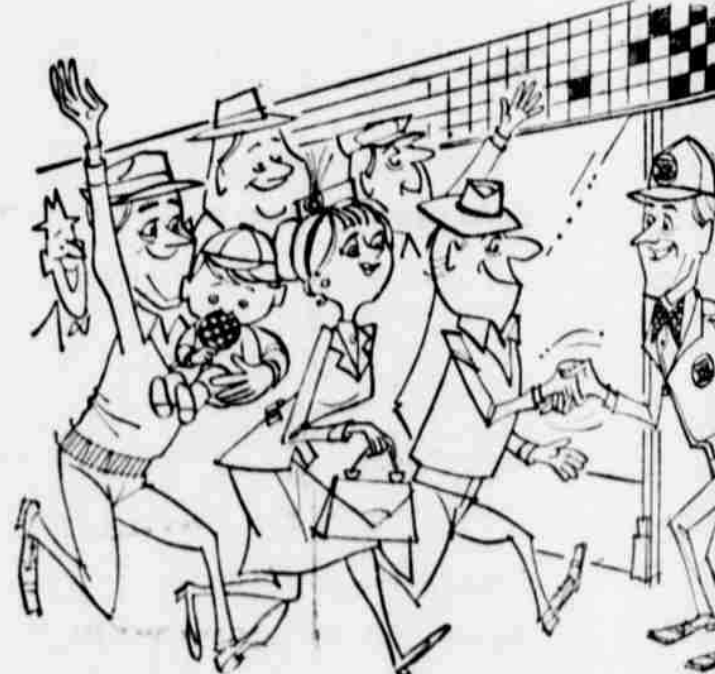

COTTON SKIP ROW PLANTING APPROVED

Edwards pulled quite a bit at Luckett Friday night. The 6-B football team scored a 16-8 triumph over the previously undefeated Panthers.

The scoring in the quarter was by Paul and Bobby Dennison. Bobby made a 22-yard extra point.

Edwards made the game up in the second quarter when John Lewis made a 22-yard TD over from the line.

A 1968 cotton program designed to produce 13.5 million bales was announced this past week by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The USDA also announced that it was removing penalties imposed in 1966 and 1967 on the most popular skip-row planting pattern of 2-2 and 2-1.

A telegram received by the Free Press from Congressman Omar Burleson said the White House announced that the skip-row penalty has been removed and measurements will be done as during the 1962-1965 period.

The USDA apparently believes the skip-row action, plus a downward adjustment in diversion payments will give an adequate boost to 1968 cotton production.

The skip-row announcement was hailed by Charles Stenholm, Executive Vice-President of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, as a "real victory for cotton producers." "The never-say-die attitude of Congressman Graham Purcell and Omar Burleson, along with efforts from Bob Poage and George Mahon played a key roll in the final removal of penalties," said Stenholm. "But a lot of credit also must go to some 7,000 Rolling Plains farmers, who attended protest meetings, wrote letters appealing for justice, sent representatives to Washington, kept in contact with their Congressmen, or otherwise kept the pot boiling continuously for two solid years."

"There is no substitute in farming today for organized effort," said Stenholm. "I hope that the skip-row victory will encourage more farmers in the Rolling Plains to work together more closely in the future on problems as they affect us, because we now know that we can get results," he continues.

The removal of skip-row penalties means that in 1968, only the land actually used for growing cotton will be counted. During the past two years the land actually planted and a portion of the skipped rows where the blanks were less than 4 rows wide, were counted in determining acreage.

The removal of skip-row measurement penalties in 1968 also means that retroactive penalties imposed on yields during 1962-65 will also be removed. "This means that projected yields in many Rolling Plains skip-row counties will be increased over what they would have been had penalties remained in effect," said the RPLG executive. "The value of these increased yields to Rolling Plains counties is over 3 million dollars."

Other major details of the 1968 cotton program included the announcement that growers will be required to divert at least 5 per cent of their allotments out of cotton production to qualify for price support loans and price support payments.

This is down from a 12 1/2 per cent required diversion in 1967. On the required diversion in 1968, growers will receive a payment of 10.76 cents a pound on the projected yields assigned to their farmers by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Payments on the required diversion this year were 10.78 cents a pound.

In addition to the required diversion, growers next year will have a option of diverting another 30 per cent of their allotment from cotton production at a payment rate of six cents a pound.

This compares with a possible voluntary diversion this year of 22 1/2 per cent at a payment rate of 10.78 cents per pound.

The price support loan will be available to cooperating growers next year at a base rate of 20.25 cents per pound for middling inch average location, same as this year.

Growers also will receive a direct price support or production payment of 12.24 cents a pound times projected yields on 65 per cent of their allotment, up from 11.53 cents in 1967.

The USDA said it expects the 1968 Cotton Program payments to farmers to total about \$800 million compared with more than \$900 million this year.

In the Rolling Plains the "blended" payment rate for a farmer who chooses to divert 35% of his allotment from cotton production and plant 65%

next year will be 10.29 cents per pound, compared with 11.27 cents in 1967, a cut of approximately one cent.

"In other words," said Stenholm, "if a farm's projected yield is the same in 1968 as it was in 1967 and the diversion rate is the same in both years, the cotton check for that farm will be reduced 9.3%." "A more positive way to look at it," surmises Stenholm, "would be that if every other Federal program is also cut 9.3% the Federal Deficit will be cut 12 billion dollars and the cotton farmer has done his fair share in cutting Federal spending and balancing the budget."

Students and senior citizens Theatre Discount Card is now being offered by the Texas Theatre.

Price of the card is \$1.00; is good for one year, and admits the student or senior citizen for only 50 cents.

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Telling People How To Live

"A federal injection of about \$6.5 billion has hardly dented hard-core poverty in the mountains and valleys of Appalachia... for two years a showpiece of the government's anti-poverty and development programs."...So began an article recently.

It appears that one of the problems is that so many government agencies are working in Appalachia to improve the lot of the people that there is a great deal of waste and overlapping effort. Innumerable programs are pouring money into housing, schools, roads and health facilities. But, the overall effect of the expenditure of more than \$6.5 billion in two years is hard to evaluate.

Perhaps the biggest lesson in Appalachia may turn out to be that the development of a culture is a slow and painstaking process that must come from within the people themselves. Money alone cannot do the job. Nor can a preconceived idea of how people should live be imposed upon a populous by sociologists and urban developers. In the Appalachian region, many mountaineers do not wish to move to urban centers and live in neatly planned communities. As one said, "I don't like cities. Too much noise." Aside from the economic problems of Appalachia, the comment of this mountaineer may explain in large part why Appalachia may become a classic example of government fouling.

Texas Supreme Court Agrees To Review Two Lower Court Rulings

The Texas Supreme Court agreed to review two lower court rulings that R. L. Force and other producers in the Haskell County Regular Field should take their discrimination charges against Crown Central Petroleum Corp. to the Railroad Commission, rather than the courts.

The case was set for submission to the state's highest court January 3, 1968.

Between October, 1959, and November, 1964, Crown Central Pipeline Co. owned pipeline facilities from the Teague Receiving Station in the Sojourner

Field, adjacent to the Haskell field.

Crown Central Petroleum was both a purchaser and producer of crude oil in both fields.

Force and his fellow plaintiffs charged that Crown Central discriminated in favor of its own production by purchasing its oil at the lease-tank battering stations. This required them to truck their oil from their lease tanks to the station.

They also charged that Crown Central connected its wells in the Sojourner Field by pipeline to the station but refused to

County Farmers, Ranchers Get Sun Perch, Catfish

The National Fish Hatchery of the U. S. Department of Interior, located at Fort Worth, delivered catfish and sun perch to the following farmers and ranchers of Haskell County: J. M. Ashcroft and Gladstone McLennan of Stamford, N. L. B. Davis of Throckmorton, and the following from Haskell: Hubert Bledsoe, Nored Boone, E. H. Burnett, Chas. M. Conner, Joe Davis, Paul Fischer, Henry Harris, Clinton Kimbrough, Fred Klose, Buddy Lane, Kenneth Lane and V. P. Terrell.

These fish will stock various farm ponds, and will be used by the individual farmers and ranchers to establish non-commercial recreational facilities on these lands, according to J. C. Yeary, Jr., Work Unit Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service of Haskell.

"Over 100 such ponds in the Haskell area have been stocked during the last five or six years," Yeary stated. "Some of the earlier stocked ponds have been producing edible size fish for at least three years. Most farmers and ranchers will permit fishing their ponds, but no one wishes the uninvited fisherman to invade his premises. Don't trespass, but ask permission. In most cases it will be granted."

Any Work Unit office of the SCS or the County Extension Agent will be glad to assist with orders for fish, Yeary concluded.
