## Heart Of Another Nation Conquered By Lindbergh Congress Asked To Approve Gigantic Navy Program

### Seventy-One War Vessels Would be Built Under Plan

Program, Entailing Total Outlay of \$725,000,000 Is Second Largest in History of Nation.

### AIRPLANE CARRIERS INCLUDED IN PROGRAM

Period of 9 Years Proposed for Building New Ships; 25 Light Cruisers, 32 Submarines Included.

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Congress was asked by the administration today to authorize the second largest naval building program in the history of the nation.

It proposes the ultimate construction, at a cost of approximately \$725,000,000 of 71 war vessels which would include 25 additional light cruisers, nine destroyers which are practically the equivalent of scout cruisers, 32 submarines and five air craft carriers.

The plan was transmitted to Speaker Longworth by Secretary Wilbur who said that he had been informed by the director of the bureau that the "proposed legislation is not in conflict with the financial program of the president."

Under Treaty Terms. The naval secretary said that the new vessels would be constructed under the terms of the Washington arms treaty, and that in the event of another naval arms conference the president would be empowered in this direction by the treaty or in part the proposed construction.

Within a few minutes after the program reached the speaker's office, Chairman Butler of the House naval committee introduced a bill drafted by the navy department to put the program in legislative form.

The chairman declared that the navy, in submitting the program had not specified any date for its completion and that until this was done he personally would not vote for it.

At the navy department, however, it was made clear that the navy, once given the funds to proceed, intended to get the program completely under way in five years.

### BOOM NEW RAILROAD

Line from Roswell to Fort Worth, via Brownfield

BROWNFIELD, Dec. 14.—A permit for construction of a new railroad from Roswell, N. M., to Fort Worth will be asked early in 1928, it was stated here today by Ed Kennedy of Houston, promoter of the projected road, whose route would be 87 miles shorter between Brownfield and Fort Worth than any now devised. Including of Brownfield on the route was made certain following a committee conference with Mr. Kennedy.

It is the intention to establish a division point at Brownfield, Mr. Kennedy stated.

### Ten Projects Are Boosted On Slate Of Lubbock C. C.

Advertising Campaign, Civic Planning, Farm Development, Better Homes, Better Schools Sought.

Ten major projects, destined to make Lubbock one of the best organized and best improved cities of the state, were announced as being on the future "slate" of Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, yesterday.

The program represented by these various projects is the result of a series of meetings and round-table discussions which have been held among civic workers by the Chamber of Commerce in recent years.

Several hundred suggestions for the betterment of Lubbock and the region were received last summer, and the program now is outlined in detail. Some of the projects suggested have already been started, some are now being actively sought, and others will require long and arduous campaigns for consummation.

Advertising Campaign.

The first item on the civic program is the promotion of a general advertising campaign for Lubbock and the South Plains. A list of 5000 addresses, adaptability of the land and its use to diversification and stock raising, and other advantages of the region will be emphasized with the end of colonization held in view. Included in this campaign will be a house educational drive, securing of a

### FLOOD IN ARKANSAS

State Already Heavy Loser Is Once More Swept

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 14 (AP).—Arkansas' latest flood, the eighth of a year of disasters which left the state a ruin, tonight reached a stage of uncertainty and dread as more rain threatened the state generally.

South of Russellville, the Arkansas river was rising rapidly, pounding against newly constructed levees. Unprotected farm lands between Russellville and Dardanelle were inundated and several families upped to the Red Cross for aid.

Northwest Arkansas was working frantically to restore wire, highway and railroad service. Highways remained blocked tonight, however, with bridges washed out and roads flooded.

Fogs Caused Him to Lose Way, and Occasioned 2 Hour Delay; Talks to His Mother Over Phone.

### WORLD AGAIN GIVES HOMAGE TO AVIATOR

Ruth Elder Wires Congratulations; Paris and Rome Hold Demonstrations; To Fly on Departure.

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Dec. 14.—At the American embassy tonight under the watchful eye of the ambassador, Colonel Lindbergh laughed as he told of his adventures nearing Mexico City. The delay in his arrival had worried everybody but Lindbergh.

"I wasn't worried at all about being lost," he said. "I knew it was merely a question of floating around until I found some land mark or other. I missed my route from Tampico because of the heavy fog off the coast and in the mountains."

Lindbergh chuckled: "These railroad stations," he said, "haven't any name; at least I couldn't see any. I flew around and finally saw the name 'Toluca' on a railroad station, then I knew I was close to Mexico City."

Talked To Mother. Lindbergh received a tremendous ovation from the huge crowds surrounding the embassy. One of the first things he did was to talk by long distance telephone with his mother in Detroit.

But he had trouble in hearing as his ears were in bad condition because of his flight and the altitude.

Continuing his talk with the newspaper correspondents, Lindbergh said: "I did not realize I had been in the state of Michigan until after I landed. I had expected the trip to last twenty-six hours. I figured I had lost two hours, but thought that previous to that I had been running ahead of my schedule, and so was still on time. But developments proved that I was mistaken."

When asked as to the principal object of his coming to Mexico, Col. Lindbergh replied: "In response to President Calles' much appreciated invitation."

Interested in Mexico. He said he had been much interested in Mexico, and had always wanted to come here since he spent a year at San Antonio, Texas. He expressed the hope that his trip would stimulate aviation in Mexico and Central America, already interested in the development of aviation, although this was not the primary purpose of his trip.

### Oklahoma Senate Votes to Receive Charges of House

Will Not Immediately Suspend Governor and Other State Officials, However, Body Decides Wednesday

(By Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 14.—Moving rapidly as a court of impeachment, the state senate late today voted to receive House charges against Governor Henry B. Johnston, Chief Justice Fred P. Brannon, of the state supreme court and Harry B. Cordell, president of the state board of agriculture, without immediately suspending them from office.

The decision not to suspend the accused officials was made in an effort to avoid a dual government if Governor Johnston ignored the suspension and the senate recognized the succession of Lieut. Governor Frank J. O'Reilly, assistant manager of the New York office of the Burn detective agency, and a member of the squad that kept the Fall-Sinclair jurors under surveillance was the witness. Of Life and Love Affairs Is Given

(By Associated Press) LA GRANGE, Tex., Dec. 14.—Rebecca Bradley Rogers' own story of her life, love affairs and financial troubles that caused her decision to hold up a bank was read today in her district court trial here for robbery of the Farmers National Bank of Buda, Texas, last December.

The story, which has never been seen by defense counsel, was from an autobiography furnished Dr. Joe Wooten, of Austin, who testified for the state that the 32-year-old former University of Texas student in sane. He had required her to write an autobiography as a part of his sanity examination.

LONDON, Dec. 14 (AP).—A payment of \$92,575,000 will be made tomorrow by the British government to the United States treasury of which sum the amount of \$35,000,000 is in repayment of the principal of the debt, the balance being interest.

### WORLD WAS WORRIED OVER FLIER'S DELAY

Lindy was Least Anxious of Them all When He Was Lost for Time; Became Mexico's Hero.

(By CLARENCE DU BOISE, Associated Press Correspondent) MEXICO CITY, Dec. 14.—"Lindy" has done it again—he and the other half of the famous "We."

Without a stop, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, piloting the "Spirit of St. Louis," which earlier in the year had carried him to Paris, flew from Washington to Mexico City. For more than 27 hours he was at the controls.

Perhaps there never has been witnessed such a delirious demonstration of joy by a Mexican multitude as that at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon when, after some three hours of apprehension that misfortune had befallen the flier, the "Spirit of St. Louis" settled on the Valbuena military aviation field, two and a half miles from Mexico City. Lindy and his plane were safe and sound; nothing was wrong except that a miscalculation of direction carried the plane in a great circle from Tampico into the interior, instead of in a direct line to Mexico City.

### Remus Is Held In Contempt, Result Of Wild Outburst

Verbal Assault Against 3 Young Prosecutors Brings Action from Judge; Sentence Is Delayed.

(By Associated Press) CINCINNATI, Dec. 14.—George Remus was found guilty of contempt of court late today, after he again had interrupted his month old murder trial with a harsh verbal attack upon his three young prosecutors, and precipitated one of the wildest scenes of the trial.

Judge Chester R. Shook sharply upbraided Remus for conduct which had produced "almost unparalleled conditions," and announced that sentence would be deferred until after completion of the murder trial.

Remus, acting as his own chief of counsel, interrupted the testimony of his adopted daughter, Ruth Holmes Remus, born of the first marriage of the wife he slew, and demanded that the jury be sent from the court room so that he might argue a legal point.

The Eagles will leave here Wednesday night for the scene of action, not working out in Waco Tuesday afternoon. It will be their third successive season of playing territory in the sub-district. They won the last year from San Angelo 40-0, playing at 4:30 p. m. on December 3, six days later they won the West Texas championship from Cleburne 34-6, playing at 1:30 p. m. 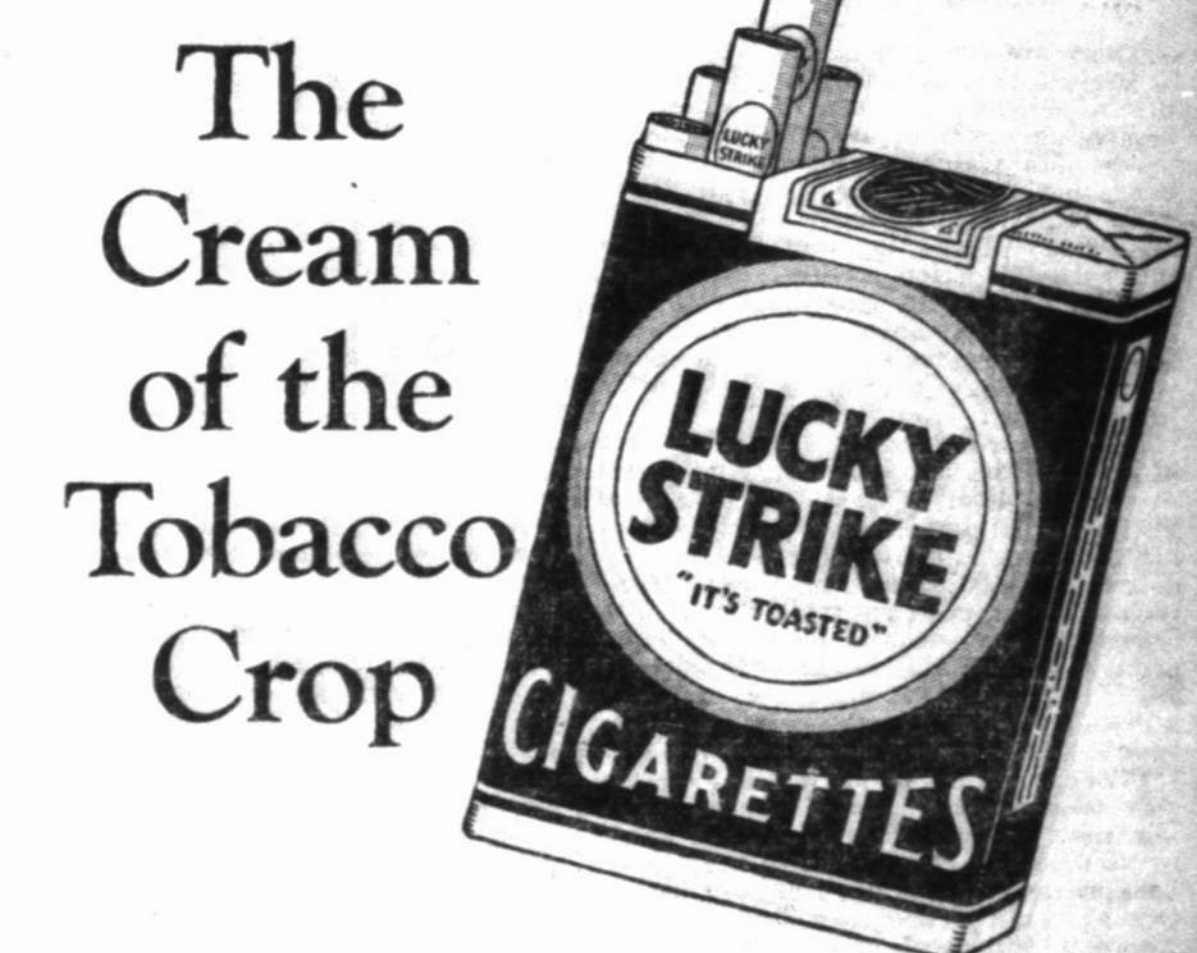

## Traffic Signals Bring New Rules

Police Chief Cautions On  
Obedience to Lights; Will  
Start Usually, 10 o'Clock  
In Morning.

Establishment of traffic signal lights in Lubbock and the first one is already in operation—has made necessary several new regulations, according to Police Chief John Leonard.

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## Postal Receipts Growth Is Large

Chances for New Building  
Believed Boosted by Favorable Record of Town As Evidenced in Survey.

Figures showing that Lubbock led all other cities in the United States—that is, those which have applied for additional postoffice quarters—in percentage of population increase and postal receipts during 1924 are expected to materially enhance Lubbock's chances for additional postoffice quarters, according to Postmaster John L. Shout "Viva Lindy."

Then while the escort of Mexican army airplanes performed circus stunts there began to circle the field a graceful silver lined plane. From over the distant mountains it swept. "Thank God, it's Lindy!" "Viva Lindy," they cried.

No person in all that vast assemblage had been more disturbed over Col. Lindbergh's delay, more apprehensive or more excitedly overjoyed at his safe arrival than President Calles himself. The president, with the American ambassador, Dwight W. Morrow, beside him, had been sitting since early morning, awaiting Lindy.

As noon passed and one report after another had been proven false, the president showed perturbation. He asked the Associated Press to assist him in getting information as to Lindbergh's location and ordered the government telegraph service throughout the nation to make every effort to determine what had happened.

When first rumors were brought to the president's stand the president was worried. His usually stern face became more set, more careworn. He seemed to be more deeply lined. He tapped nervously on the floor with his walking stick, and as then people strained to see Lindbergh, he himself craned his neck, an aide whispered to the president: "It is Lindbergh—it is positively Lindbergh this time."

Overjoyed at News. Calles leaped to his feet as if convulsed by an electric shock. He gave one searching, piercing glance into that aide's face. One felt it would have gone hard with that officer if he had been mistaken in the information he gave the president. Then, completely accepting the information as genuine, Calles' face became transformed instantly from soberness to positive radiance. He glowed; he laughed.

aloud. For hours he had been declining food.

"Bring me a sandwich," he ordered. "Give me a drink." He munched and gulped and then stopped to cheer. Barely, if ever, has Calles been known so to betray his feelings publicly.

They demanded "Lindy," nothing else would do them but Lindy. So the youthful birdman, on the arm of the president, advanced to the edge of the platform and waved and waved and smiled. And the crowd seemed quite as happy as the president and the ambassador.

HAILED AS HARBINGER OF U. S. GOOD WILL. WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP).—Hailed as the harbinger of American good will toward Mexico, Charles A. Lindbergh found on his arrival today in Mexico City that both President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg expected his flight from Washington to Mexico City to assist the two countries in cementing friendly relations. President Coolidge led the way by declaring that Lindbergh's courageous venture would be understood as one of good will and he said that the "true spirit of our mission will be sympathetically understood in the United States and Mexico." To the president's message of congratulations, Secretary Kellogg attached his own—that Lindbergh not only had advanced the cause of aviation, but would "advance the cause of amity between these nations."

error W. J. Holloway to the governor's chair. Under the rule adopted the governor and other officials will be automatically suspended when their trials begin.

Disregarding the warning of Governor Johnston that it had permission to meet only as citizens and not as an impeachment body, the senate met this afternoon and reaffirmed its power to meet as an impeachment court regardless of the opposite holding of the state supreme court.

Not Dispersed. The governor made no effort however to disperse the meeting and there was no evidence of the armed national guardsmen who Monday prevented a meeting of House of Representatives in the capitol.

The impeachment charges, which were voted by House members at a secret meeting in a downtown hotel during the early hours of Tuesday morning were presented to the senate by a house board of managers.

Chief Justice Branson, who, under the constitution, is the ex-officio presiding officer of the senate impeachment court, declined to preside over the court, in a personal statement to the members. After it had voted not to suspend him, the chief justice was asked to preside over the impeachment body.

"You must excuse me from taking any part in any effort to violate the laws of the state," Chief Justice Branson said. "The supreme court has held that the legislature has no authority to convene itself and that any actions of a self-convened session would be void." The chief justice's statement was received without demonstration.

Civic Planning. Civic planning—a comprehensive program—is sought in the third project. This will entail zoning, better streets, sidewalks, parks, playgrounds, subways, water supply, building code, city auditorium, sanitary campaigns and other features of civic work.

Development of agriculture is the fourth project. Included in plans for such development are encouraging of diversification, better livestock, especially hogs, dairy cattle and poultry; advocacy of a "Buy a Home" campaign for produce; short courses, boys' and girls' clubs, community get-togethers, better marketing conditions, and "Live at Home" plans.

Securing of maximum business from Lubbock's trade territory and expansion of this circle constitute the fifth project.

Better Homes Sought. Building of more and better homes is to be encouraged and this is pursued in the sixth project. Assistance to the Tech and the public schools, by advocating a gymnasium and athletic park for the latter, requiring physical examinations of all children, and securing better housing for college students, is to be given under the seventh project.

Went More Industries. Securing of diversified industries for Lubbock, including a cotton mill, brick factory, overall factory, flour mill, wholesale drug concern, and shirt factory is placed as the eighth project.

Cooperation and assistance in making the Panhandle-Plains fair a yearly success is cited as the ninth project.

Lending assistance to all organizations working for upbuilding of Lubbock, is in general the tenth project. A charity hospital, a community chest, better mail service,

of his plea of transitory mental insanity, swept into a legal and medical definition of the terms of his plea and then he became embroiled with the prosecutors in heated exchanges over indictment of defense witnesses. Whirling towards Prosecutor Charles P. Taft, II, and his assistants, Remus sneered. "These three nothings."

It was an old arrangement and for the first time met opposition. Walter K. Sibbald, towering a head above any other man in the court room, advanced towards Remus, and the judicial dais white faced, and roaring an objection which swelled above Remus' stenographic efforts.

Bailiffs rushed to surround Remus and Sibbald. The spectators in the court room, witnessing one

of the wildest of the numerous scenes which have marked the trial's progress, leaped up.

Sibbald continued to follow his objections until he had silenced Remus.

Order quickly was restored, and Judge Black in his accustomed oratorical manner, addressed Remus:

Reprimanded by Court. "The court is not going to permit you to continue your attacks upon prosecutors," the judge said.

"I am I apologize to the court," replied Remus, spreading the last said heavily.

"I have an apology to the prosecutors' office, also," cut in Sibbald.

"You must render yourself as any other attorney would," warned the judge.

Remus interrupted with a reference to the grand jury indictment of defense witnesses for perjury.

"Sit down, I won't hear any more," directed the judge.

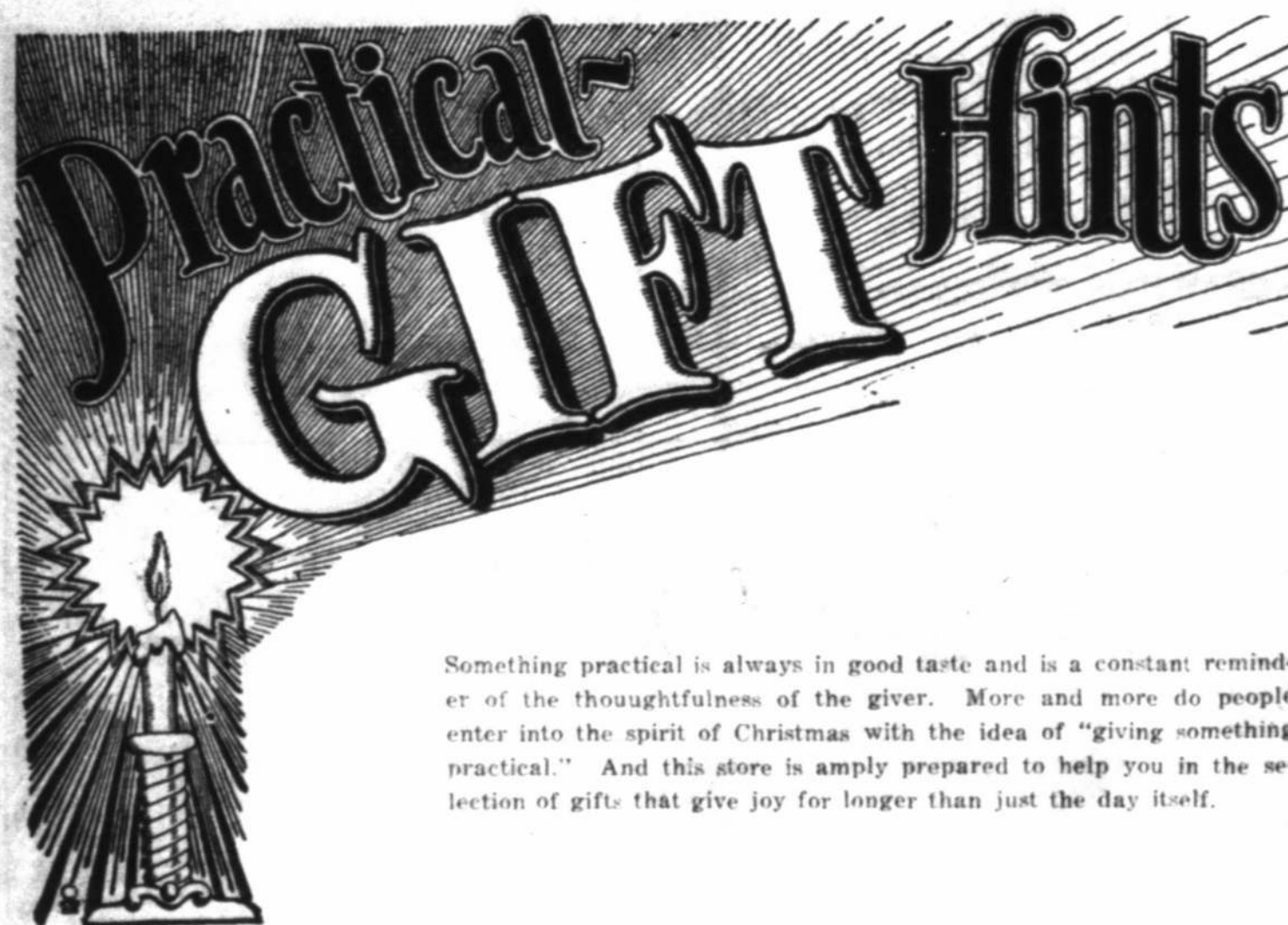

## Slaton High School Merits High Honor

Is Admitted Into Membership with Southern Association of Schools and Colleges, Says Supt. Sone

(Special To The Avalanche)  
SLATON, Dec. 14.—The Slaton high school has been granted membership in the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges. C. L. Sone, superintendent of the school system here, has received official notification of this recognition. Floydada High Adds New Well-Equipped Plant

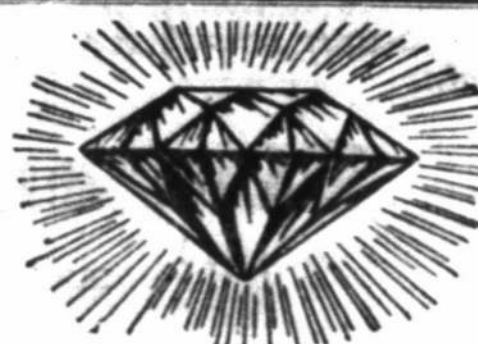

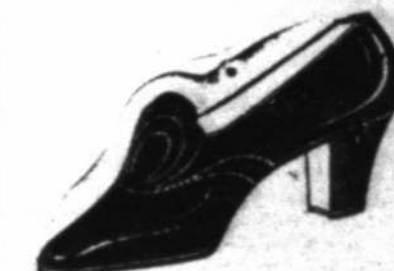

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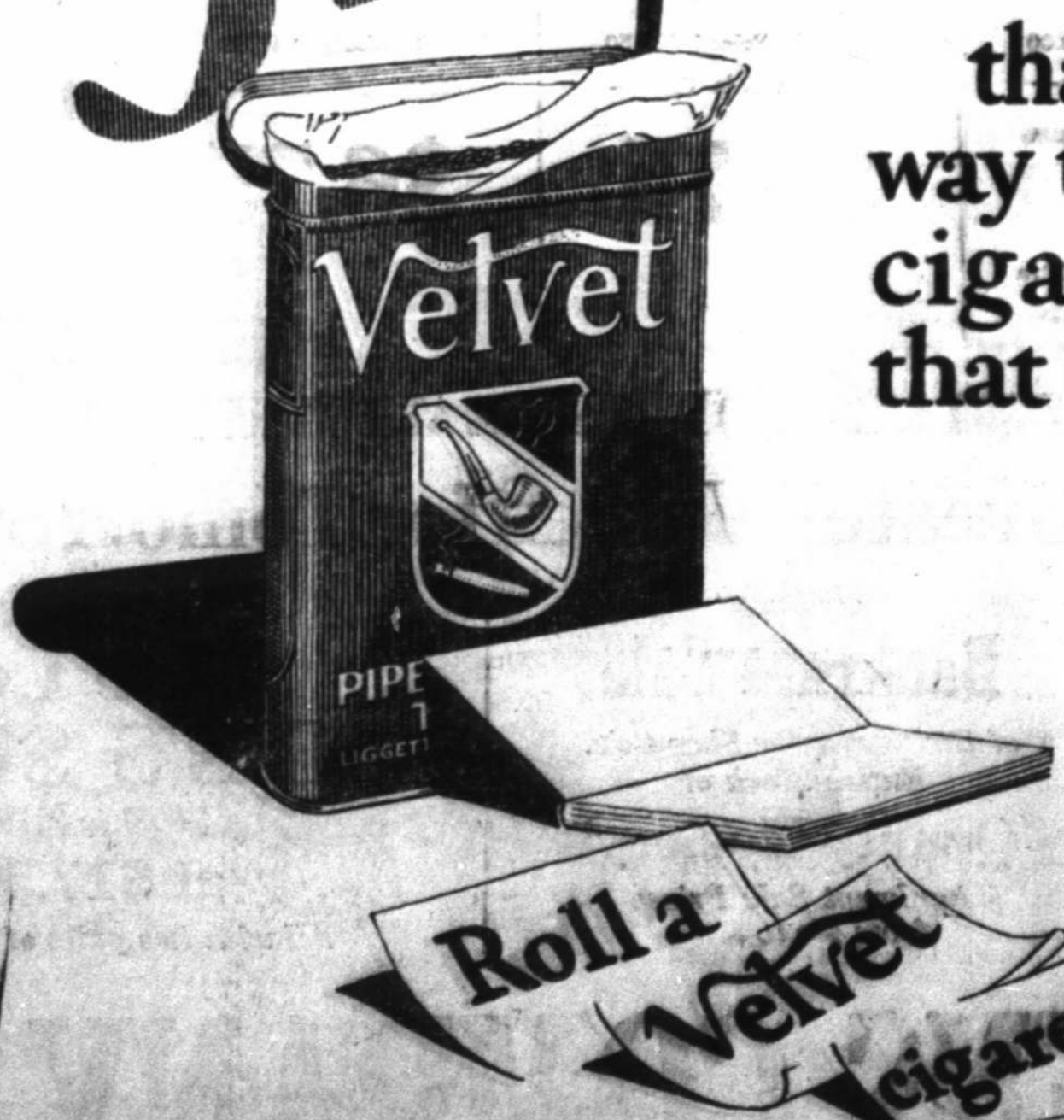

### NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 14 (AP)—Cotton futures advanced sharply today, reaching a new high of 34 1/2 points, after a period of quietness. The market was active and steady, with a strong demand for the cotton market. The cotton market was active and steady, with a strong demand for the cotton market.

An earlier gain on the cotton futures market, which made domestic consumption for November 625,680 bales, a record for that month was almost lost later as the result of liquidation by the state long interests, the market soon jumped upward and reached the early levels of 32 1/2 and 33 points up to 18.52, then made a new high at 18.50, closing at 18.79. Liverpool was 10 points better than due and trades showed gains of 24 to 34 points.

Prices continued to rise in the early trading on the consumption report, January going to 18.62 and May to 18.92, 36 to 37 points. The advance attracted liquidation and hedge selling and before offerings were absorbed January moved to 18.82 and May to 18.63. After a period of quietness prices again started up on reports of a good and demand and during the late trading active months virtually duplicated the early highs, January reaching 18.82 and May 18.92. The close was strong at a point or two from the top. Exports were 10,609 bales.

### NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Dec. 14 (AP)—Heavy futures than expected on the consumption of cotton in this country for the month of November and relatively firm Liverpool cables, seemed responsible for advances in the cotton market today. January contracts sold up to 18.50, or 24 points, and closed at 18.79, 36 points above the low level yesterday, closing at 18.49.

This supplied the opening demand and caused rather sharp reactions in early trading as January sold off to 18.27 and May 18.62 or within 8 or 9 points of yesterday's closing quotations.

Buying on the bullish view of the consumption figures continued, however, while there were reports of a somewhat improved spot demand and the market firmed up again during the afternoon closing within a few points gain in most positions. The volume of general business tapered off on the midday reaction but picked up again in late trading. Buying on the domestic consumption figures and firmer ruling abroad, appeared to be promoted by belief that recent heavy selling and declines had left the technical position of the market much healthier and enabled the market to rally.

Liverpool cables said there had been trade calling and covering in Liverpool and the continent coupled with some buying of cotton here during the day.
