Refuse hauler, Farwell begin negotiations

It seems to be only a matter of time now before open trash burning ceases in Farwell. At Tuesday's Farwell City Council meeting, Mayor Wendol Christian announced that negotiations have opened with Waste Management Inc. to haul the city's refuse to the Clovis landfill.

Waste Management currently hauls Texico's trash to Clovis. It is in the fifth year of its contract. Rate hikes are tied to the cost of living.

Waste Management has offered a five-year contract which has been reviewed by city attorney Charles Aycock. The council will now meet with Waste Management to further discuss the contract and discuss revisions which Aycock has suggested.

Currently, a Farwell residence pays \$12 a month for refuse collection. Businesses pay \$13.50 a month.

In the past two years, Farwell has raised its refuse rates in anticipation of needing more funds to pay a hauler when open burning ceases. That apparently is working out because Waste Management proposal seeks \$11.75 a month from residences and small businesses. Thus, it appears a rate hike won't be necessary at first.

Large businesses, which would need a larger container, would pay more.

Waste Management is proposing to place metal containers, such as the one displayed in front of City Hall at the corner of First Street and Avenue A, in the city's alleys. One container would service two residences.

The city would handle the billing. Businesses and residences on the city's water lines would qualify. This creates a problem for Farwell Country Club and Tide.

Christian said he was impressed with Waste Management.

In other business, Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams attended the meeting to urge that Farwell hire a police officer or, at least, a night watchman.

By law, the sheriff's department cannot enforce city ordinances.

Williams said that in the past two months, his office has taken between 40 and 50 Farwell calls. They include prowlers, stolen bikeds, vehicle burglaries, vandalism, beer drinking by youths, and hot rodding. Plus, there was an armed robbery (at All-sup's).

The sheriff said two Clovis men who were arrested in connection with Farwell burglaries said they came here because they knew there was no police officer here.

Williams has 4 deputies and none are specifically assigned to a certain community. Deputy Randy Gerles, who has been living in Farwell, has resigned and will be the new assistant police chief in Friona, the sheriff said.

Williams stressed that his office will respond as soon as possible to Farwell calls but if the deputies are patrolling elsewhere in the county, it will take awhile.

"Farwell has a lot of bicycle thefts that Friona and Bovina don't have," he noted.

Williams and the council discussed expenses in having a police department, such as radio, car and supplies. He estimated the salary would be about \$20,000 a year.

Christian thanked Williams for coming and said Farwell would continue to cooperate with the sheriff's office.

The council also:
- Placed its ballots in favor of Mark Schwertner to

continue as a director on the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

- Approved lighting the city mural at night. A police will be placed across First Street. The cost will be about \$20 a month.

- Approved an additional light on San Andres Street.

- Heard Christian report that a rate hike of about 7 percent is possibly upcoming from Southern Union Gas. Christian felt this was reasonable.

- Heard Christian note that the hearing for state funds to help build a new water main on First Street will be held Nov. 14.

- Heard that some of the Christmas lights were broken. New ones cost \$75 each. The council decided to fix the broken ones instead.

- Discussed buying a tranquilizer gun for the dog warden. The legality will be checked into.

- Noted that emus are being raised in the city.

- Discussed the state-owned area near City Cleaners where the state of Texas marker is. The picnic tables and tree recently were demolished by the state. Christian will talk with state officials about the possibility of the city leasing the land and beautifying it, plus adding a parking area.

- Noted that owners of dogs and cats must have city tags, costing \$2, plus proof of vaccination. Otherwise, the owners can be fined. Tags are available at City Hall.

Farwell students request open campus

The Farwell School Board Nov. 7 received a request from High School Student Council representatives asking that an open campus be implemented on a 6-week trial basis.

Spokespersons were Molly Miller, Matt Foster and Angela Cenicerros.

An "open campus" means that students could leave the school campus at lunch time. Currently, students may walk home if they have a note from their parents.

The board took the request under advisement.

In other business, the board:
- Heard senior class parent sponsors Del Lingnau and Gary Foster ask for approval to have the trip to Florida.

The board asked them to find another site and cut down on the expense and length of the trip. The board felt a Florida trip would be too much a financial hardship for some students.

- Approved the textbook committee: Jim Bouse, Merelen Hill, Larry Smith, Kay Stanton, Dorris White and Hayley Christian.

- Delegated its votes to Mark Schwertner so he could continue as a member of the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

- Heard Supt. Richard Boothby report 24 teachers have volunteered for TESA training. This is geared toward having high academic expectations of each student.

Boothby said "this very worthwhile program" includes 10 hours of after-school training. Instructors will be Pat Owen, Brenda Riddle and Candy Dyer, with Gwen Corn as coordinator.

- Heard that Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools

Texico receives grant of \$125,000 for well

As they say, part of the loaf is better than none.

Texico received approval for a state grant of \$125,000 Nov. 7 for a new city well.

Texico had sought \$560,000 to handle its KKR Well contamination problem.

The costs of fixing the well problem are expected to run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars because a four-fold approach is needed:
1. Connect the KKR and Tower wells so water will be diluted enough to keep the contaminant under federal guidelines.

2. Excavate the area to remove the contaminant causes.
3. Install an aerator, costing about \$60,000, at the KKR well.

4. Find a site for a new well and install it.

The state grant will go to No. 4.
A representative of the state Environmental Inspection Division (EID) is expected to attend Texico's Nov. 27 meeting and look into the contamination situation.

What Texico officials now hope is that the source of the contaminant is found to be not caused by the city. If that is the case, then the city

may not be financially liable for solving the contaminant problem.

If the city is forced to clean up the contamination without state or federal financial help, then a bond issue may be likely.

The city will learn more from the EID official Nov. 27.

Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue and councilman Butch Tharp attended the Nov. 7 hearing in Santa Fe. Here's why they consider themselves fortunate to have received some funding:

About \$19 million was available in state grants - but communities were asking for about \$39 million.

So the state committee prioritized the requests into "high priority", "medium priority" and "low priority."

LaRue and Tharp were stunned to find out when they arrived that Texico's request was not only in the "low priority" list - but was second from the bottom.

So the committee first gave approvals for the various "high priority" projects. Then on the third round of approvals for the "medium approval" projects, Robert Cordova, a committee member

from Santa Rosa who is the representative from Eastern Plains Council of Governments (of which Texico is a member), interjected the Texico request - and got it unanimously okayed.

During this time, LaRue and Tharp were working with Cordova to get Texico into the balloting.

LaRue had expected that he and Tharp would be given a few minutes to state Texico's case to the committee. That wasn't the way it was done. Instead, the committee passed out a written list of the prioritization, then began voting.

LaRue was very thankful for Cordova's assistance.

Texico okays \$825,000 bond issue

The Texico School Board Tuesday approved a bond issue of \$825,000 for its building program.

It will be used to add junior high classrooms and possibly expanding the cafeteria.

The election will be Feb. 4. On hand for the discussion were the building project manager and architect.

In other business, the board: - Accepted a donation of \$183 for special education classes from the Knights of Columbus.

- Hired Carlos Castillo to replace Jerry Bradley as a school custodian. Bradley had resigned. Castillo has four children in Texico schools.

- Accepted the bid of McDaniels, Clovis, of \$1,250 to tile the concession stand, which has been moved to the north wall. This will allow for the stand to have running water.

- Bought track uniforms for the girl tracksters.

- Received a request to pay the expenses of the school's coaches if they attend state tournaments. Currently, the coaches must pay their own expenses. No change was made.

- Heard Supt. R.L. Richards report that the enrollment is at 503.5 students.

- Discussed the annual state board convention Dec. 6-7.

- Heard Richards say that the accountability report will be sent to city and rural route box holders Friday. It will include the questionnaire, results and test scores.

Other persons wanting a copy may contact the superintendent's office and a copy will be sent.

Some highlights of the accountability report were:

- The dropout rate for Texico grades 9 - 12 for last year was at 4 percent, below the state average of 10 percent.

- Among graduates of 1990-

91 at Texico were: college, 63.6 percent; military, 12.1 percent; fulltime jobs, 15.2 percent; technical - vocational, 3 percent; and other, 6.1 percent.

- Texico enrollment has climbed from around 390 in 1981 to 500.

- In the high school competency exam, Texico ranked 30th in the state.

- Texico student enrollment by ethnicity: Anglo, 63 percent; Hispanic, 33 percent; Black, 4 percent.

- Revenue sources for Texico: state, 97 percent; local, 1 percent; federal, 2 percent.

- Average teacher salaries, 1st in the state, around \$32,000.

- Expenditures per pupil, 33rd in the state.

- Administrative costs per pupil, 39th in the state.

Lazbuddie enters playoffs...

Longhorns fall to Silverton

The Lazbuddie Longhorns finished second in District 3-A last Friday after falling to Silverton's Owls, 42-12, in an away game.

The Longhorns open state playoff action tonight (Friday) against Meadow at Meadow at 7:30 p.m. Tickets are \$3 for adults and \$2 for students. The game will be broadcast over KMUL Radio.

Lazbuddie finished the regular season at 4-1 in district and 9-1 overall. The Owls were first in district at 5-0 and 9-1 overall.

The Silverton running attack controlled the game as the Owls gained 377 yards on 51 rushing attempts. The Longhorns managed only 133 yards passing and 98 yards on the ground.

Silverton got off to a fast start by racing to a 20-0 lead in the first quarter. The onslaught continued in the second quarter when the Owls were up 42-0 before the Longhorns scored. Kirk Jesko took a kickoff and raced 80 yards for a TD. The extra point kick was blocked and Lazbuddie was down 42-6 at halftime.

There was no scoring in the third quarter and only one tally in the final period - a 5-yard pass to Matt Cozby from Paul

Williams. The extra point kick failed and it was 42-12.

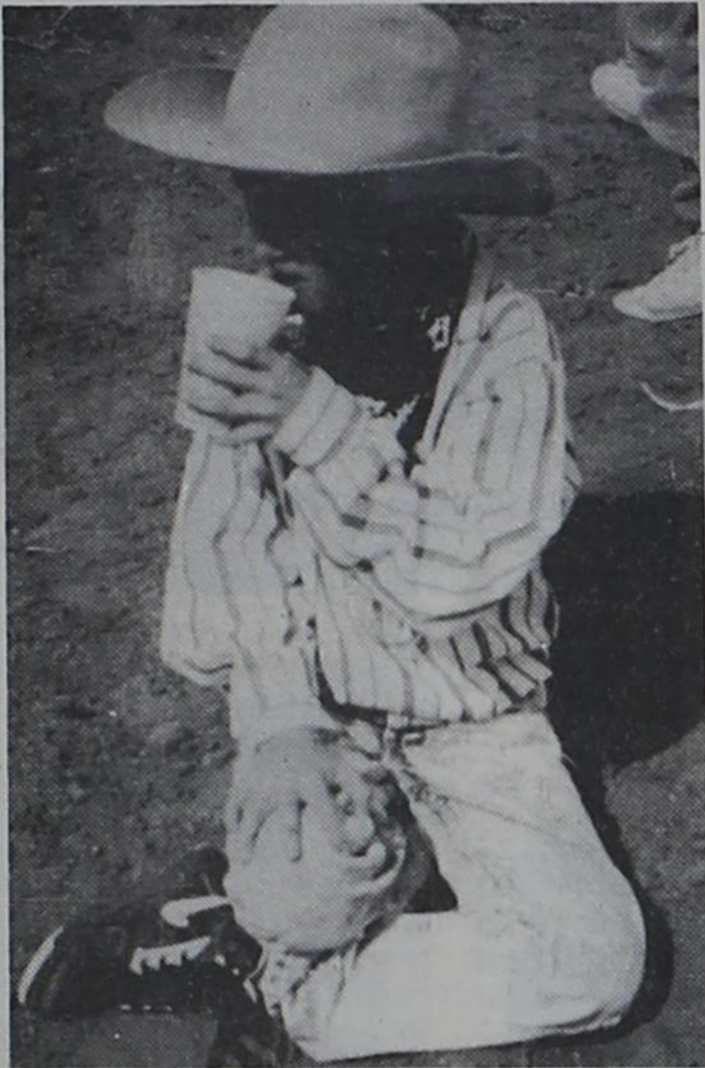

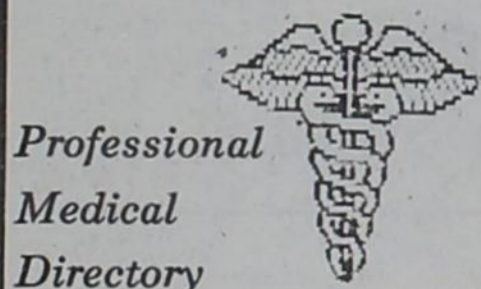
Drunk drivers topic

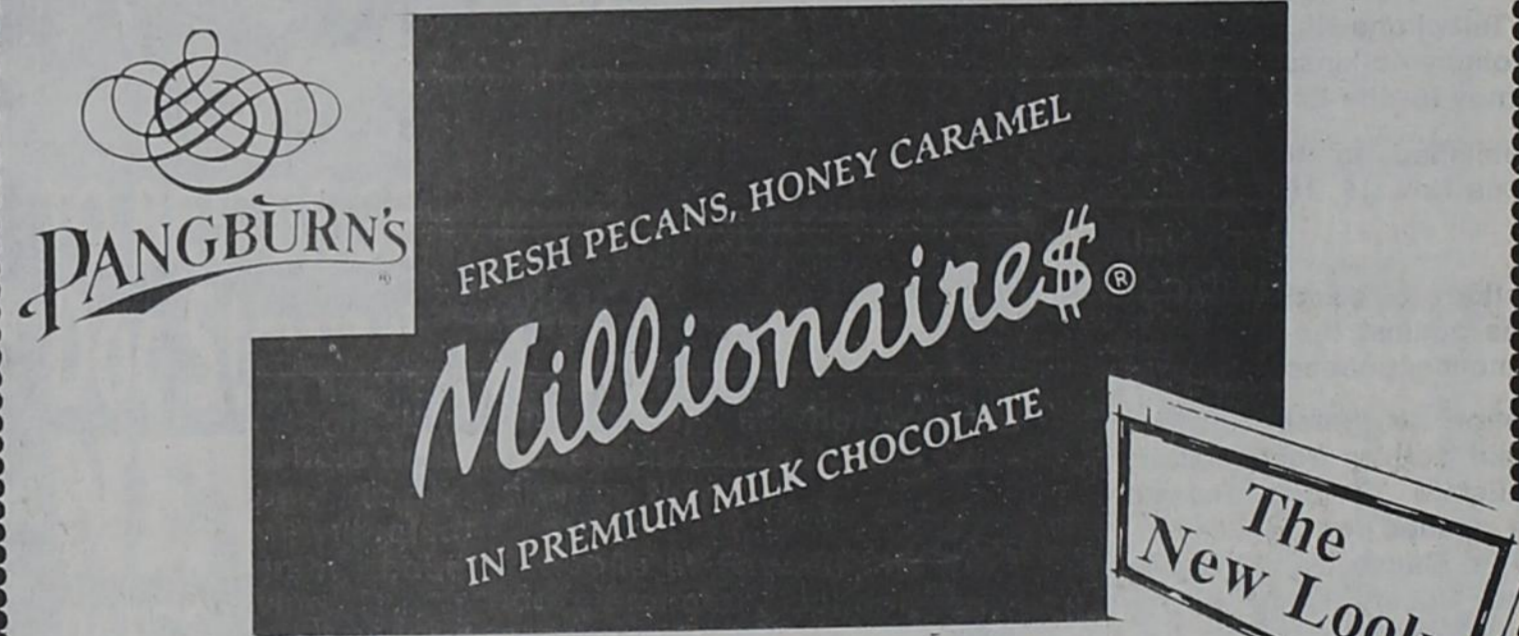

1/2 c. butter or margarine
 1 3/4 c. sugar
 1/4 c. brown sugar
 2 eggs
 2 1/2 c. Martha White Self - Rising Flour
 1 tsp. cinnamon
 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
 1/4 tsp. allspice
 1 2/3 c. applesauce
 2/3 c. raisins (optional)
 1/2 c. chopped nuts (optional)

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease and flour a 13x9x2" baking pan. Cream butter, sugar and brown sugar with electric mixer until light and fluffy. Fold in raisins and nut, if desired. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake 50-55 minutes, or until cake pulls away from sides of pan. Cool in pan on wire rack. While cake is warm spread with Hot Milk Icing.

Hot Milk Icing

Combine 2 c. confectioners' sugar, 1/4 c. hot milk, 2 Tbs. melted butter and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla or rum extract in small bowl.

 1 can (10 3/4 oz.) cream of celery soup, undiluted.
 1 c. chicken broth
 1/4 tsp pepper
 1 c. Martha White Self - Rising Flour
 1 c. milk
 1/2 c. (1 stick) butter or margarine, melted

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a shallow 2 quart baking dish. Spread chicken and vegetables evenly in prepared dish. The 80's Poppy Seed Orange Cake

No stick cooking spray
 4 egg whites
 1 2/3 c. sifted Martha White All Purpose Flour
 2 tsp. baking powder
 1/4 tsp. salt
 3/4 c. sugar
 1 Tbs. poppy seeds
 1/2 c. vegetable oil
 1/2 c. orange juice
 2 tsp. grated orange rind

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Coat the bottom of an 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2" loaf pan with no stick cooking spray; set aside. In a small mixing bowl, beat egg whites with electric mixer at high speed until stiff peaks form; set aside. Combine flour, baking powder, salt, sugar and poppy seeds in a large mixing bowl. Add oil and orange juice; beat with electric mixer at medium speed until batter is smooth (batter will be thick). Add orange rind and about 1/3 of egg whites; stir gently. Fold in remaining egg whites. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake 45 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes; remove from pan and cool on wire rack. Makes 16 servings.

90's Fast Food Biscuits

3/4 c. shortening
 4 c. sifted Martha White Self - Rising flour
 about 1 1/2 c. buttermilk
 melted butter or margarine

Preheat oven to 475 degrees. Grease a large baking sheet. In large mixing bowl, blend shortening into flour by hand, leaving large pea-sized pieces of shortening. Add enough buttermilk to make a soft dough; stir with a fork only until dough leaves sides of bowl. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth; knead gently just until smooth. Roll out to 1/2" thickness. Cut into rounds with a floured 2 3/4" cutter. Place on prepared baking sheet. Bake 12 - 15 minutes or until golden brown. Brush hot biscuits generously with melted butter. Makes 18-29 biscuits.

Note: if using Martha White All - Purpose Flour, sift 2 tablespoons baking powder and 1 1/2 teaspoons salt with flour.

Wonder what your final deficiency payments will be?

Announcement of the preliminary Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) figure and the 1992 Loan rate topped off a hectic week on the High Plains of Texas. Aside from the USDA announcements the 25-county area also received its first killing freeze to bring the growing season to a very abrupt close.

The preliminary 10-percent acreage set-aside percentage doubles the 1991 set-aside of five-percent. According to USDA officials the ARP announced today should allow production in 1992 to meet the 30-percent stocks-to-use ratio mandated by the 1990 Farm Bill.

The target price for the 1992 crop will remain at 72.9 cents. Also announced was a 1992 cotton loan rate of 52.35 cents, up from the 1991 base loan rate of 50.77 cents.

"The announcement of the preliminary set-aside figure of 10-percent, the new loan rate of 52.35 cents and the target price of 72.9 cents gives producers a pretty good idea of what to expect in 1992," explains Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

Aside from the USDA announcements there were several notable events that occurred on the High

Plains during the last week of October. The most notable was the rather dramatic close of the 1991 growing season.

Temperatures across the area plummeted below the freezing mark on Wednesday and Thursday to all but halt the harvesting activities that had been picking up steam across the area. It also ended the progress the area's mostly late dryland crop had made during October.

Overall it is expected that the icy conditions will not severely affect the quality of the crop in an adverse manner. Extension Cotton Specialist James

Supak notes that, following the freezing temperatures, an increase in harvesting activity can be expected in about a week to ten days.

The eventual size of the High Plains crop should be higher than first expected from the generally late crop. Favorable weather during the month of October allowed many of the area's cotton acres to make significant gains. The 25-county crop is still expected to fall well below the USDA's latest 3-million bale estimate. A new crop estimate will be released by USDA on November 12.

* * * * *

With the end of the 1991 crop year just around the corner many producers are beginning to wonder what the final deficiency payment rate will be.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the average price received through the month of August shows that, in general, both marketings and prices are running slightly above last year's numbers. How the marketing year ends will have a big impact on the eventual size of the deficiency payment.

Through August marketings for the year total 5.873 million bales. This is 828,000 bales higher than the 5.045 million bales marketed through August in 1990.

Prices received on the 700,000 bales marketed during August also stayed higher than last year. The average price for cotton in August was 66.9 cents, 2.2 cents higher than the 64.7 cent average from 1990.

The preliminary volume of marketings and prices in cents per pound as reported by the National Agricultural Statistics Service through August appear below.

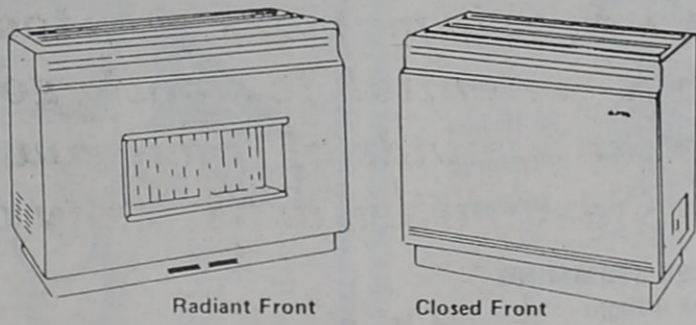

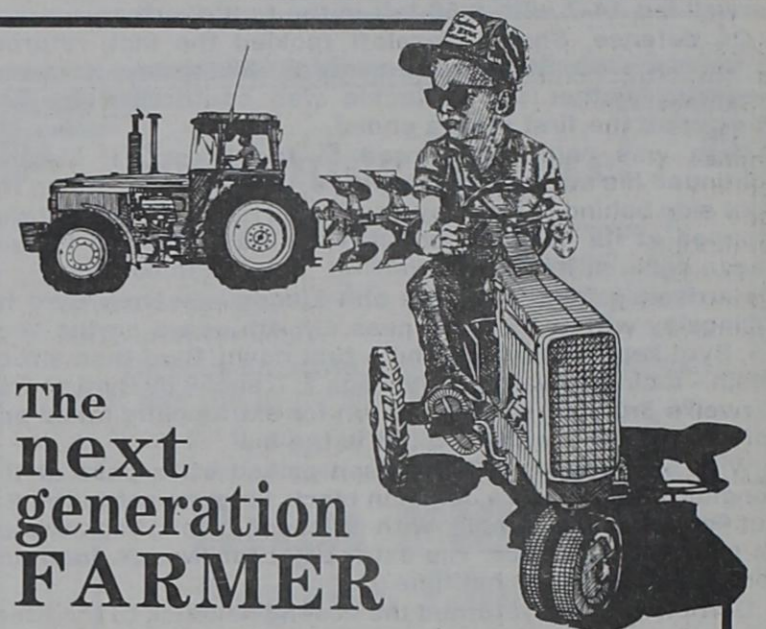

Steers end season with 26-13 win over Vega

The Farwell Steers ended their football season on a high note last Friday by thrilling a Parents Night crowd with a 26-13 victory over Vega.

Farwell finished with a 2-3 record in district and 2-7-1 overall.

Farwell's Kirk Lingnau kicked to the Vega 25 and it was returned 5 yards. Vega gained two first downs despite stops by Brian Johnson, Lingnau, Nathan Richardson, Roger Billingsley and Clint Austin.

After a QB sack by Johnson for a 6-yard loss, Vega hit a pass for a first down at the Steer 40. Then a run up the middle was good for a Vega TD. The kick was good and Vega led 7-0 of 8:56 of the first quarter.

Derrick Haseloff returned the Vega kick 15 yards to the Steer 24. Shawn Haseloff ran for 9 yards, then Lingnau rambled for 8 more. Harrison gained 8 on a twisting run, helped by a good block by Chad Byrd. Lingnau then raced down the left side for a 53-yard TD. Good blocking upfield helped spring this trap play. Harrison's run for the extra points failed and Farwell was down 7-6 with 6:14 left in the first quarter.

Vega started on their own 27 after the punt returner was dropped by Johnson and Austin. After stops by Dean Rubio and Kade Kent, Vega punted to Harrison at the Vega 45; Harrison returned it 11 yards.

On the first play, Lingnau burst through for 22 yards to the Vega 12. Harrison ran to the 5. After a 2-yard loss, Lingnau took a Byrd pitch 7 yards into paydirt. The offensive line blocking was outstanding. Byrd ran for the extra points and Farwell led 14-7 with 2:56 left in the first quarter.

On defense, Shawn Haseloff tackled the kick returner at the Vega 40. Stops were made by Billingsley, Kent and Lingnau. Another strong tackle was contributed by Rob Pomper as the first stanza ended.

Vega was held and punted to the Steer 21. Lingnau continued his strong running with a 13-yard gallop down the right side behind blocks by Garcia and Harrison. Farwell was stopped at its 46 and punted. Vega was held and Farwell began again at its 23.

Harrison gained 11 yards and Lingnau 5. Then Byrd hit Billingsley with a 25-yard pass. On 4th and 5 on the Vega 35, Byrd kept for 8 yards and a first down. Byrd then struck again - racing 26 yards to the Vega 1. A sneak by Byrd scored Farwell's 3rd TD. The Lingnau run for extra points failed and Farwell led 20-7 with 2:16 left in the half.

With 50 seconds left, Harrison picked off a pass at the Longhorn 30. Behind a Johnson block, Lingnau got to the 22. But Farwell lost a fumble. With 18 seconds left, Vega scored on a 70-yard TD pass. The extra point run wasn't good and Farwell led 20-13 at halftime.

Derrick Haseloff returned the second half kick to the Steer 25. On 3rd and 14, Harrison ran up the middle for a first down at the 39. Farwell was held and Byrd punted to the Longhorn 44.

On defense, Lester Pollard and Johnson made tackles. Johnson had another QB sack for a 1-yard loss, followed by a Pollard QB sack. Vega punted to the Farwell 18.

Byrd gained 9, before Farwell lost a fumble at its 16. Shawn Haseloff intercepted a halfback pass at the Farwell 2. Harrison and Lingnau ran for a first down as the third quarter ended.

Farwell kept moving the ball on the ground behind runs by Lingnau, Harrison and Shawn Haseloff. And with 9:23 left, Byrd ran for a 54-yard TD behind good blocking. The extra

Vega took to the air in an attempt to get back into the game but had several incompleting passes. Rubio and Johnson had a QB sack. Farwell took over on its 45. Once again, the trio of Harrison, Lingnau and Shawn Haseloff moved the ball on the ground, getting to the Vega 30 before Farwell lost a fumble.

Vega had four incomplete passes as Farwell took over at the Vega 41. Farwell was held and Byrd punted to the Vega 10. On defense, Shawn Haseloff had a strong pass knockdown.

The teams traded possessions as Roger Billingsley intercepted a pass and returned it to the Vega 39 as the game ended.

Individual statistics were: rushing - Lingnau, 24 for 155 yards; Shawn Haseloff, 3 for 17; Byrd, 11 for 92; Harrison, 17 for 72. Receiving - Billingsley, 1 for 25 yards.

Team statistics were: rushing - Farwell 56 for 334 yards; Vega 13 for 56; passing - Farwell 1 for 4; Vega 7 for 20. First downs - Farwell 19, Vega 6. Penalties - Farwell 5 for 35 yards, Vega 1 for 5 yards. Punting - Farwell 4 for 31 yard average; Vega 4 for 37 yard average.

Coach Rex Cumpston said: "We finished on a strong note. We were able to play a mistake-free ballgame on offense. That allowed us to hold the ball and get a great number of snaps. Our season didn't go exactly like we had hoped. The players hung in there and played hard each game. We look forward to next year and hope to do better. We will work hard in the off-season, trying to improve."

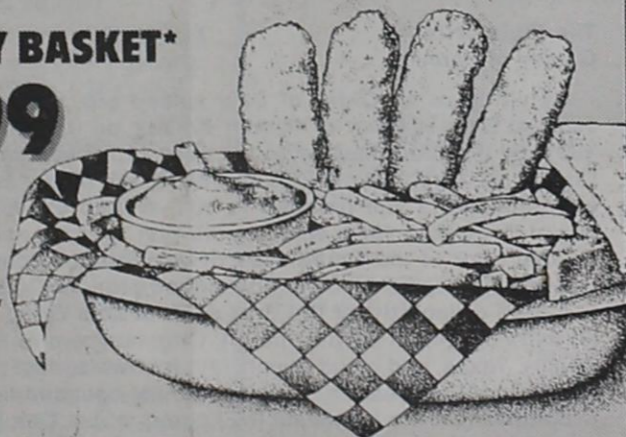

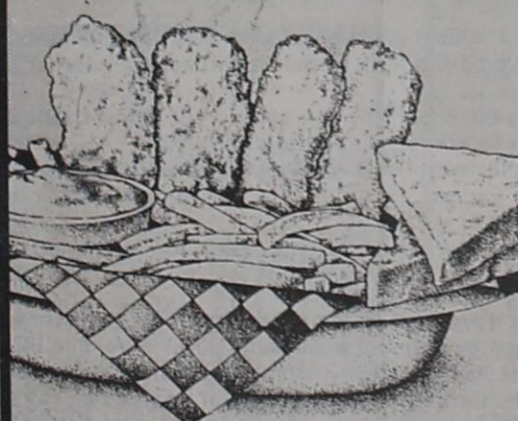

Curry County approves new redistricting plan

The Curry County Commission approved a new redistricting plan on Nov. 5 which will equalize each of Curry County's five districts. Each will contain about 8,000-8,630 residents.

The so-called Plan C will now go to the New Mexico Secretary of State for review and ratification.

Four Commissioners, including Paul D. Barnes and David Snider, voted in favor of it. Only First District Commissioner Johnny Chavez voted against it.

Texico residents who were in voting precinct 16 will now be in precinct 33. Very few

changes have been made in this district.

The new district starting at the southeast corner (the Texas- New Mexico line and the border between Curry and Roosevelt Counties are: CRA to CR3; CR3 to CRG; CRG north to CR10; CR10 to CRB; CRB north to CR10.5; CR10.5 to CR3.

Texico is represented on the Curry County Commission by David Snider.

Voters in Texico will still vote in the Texico Community Center.

Pleasant Hill used to be precinct 17; it is now precinct 2. Its boundaries are (starting

at the southeast corner) CRA and CR10.5 west on CR10.5 to CRB; South on CRB to CR10; east on CR10 to CRG; north on CRG to CR13; west on CR13 to CRJ (Grady Highway); north on CRJ to CR22; east on CR22 to CRA; south on CRA to CR10.5.

Voters in Pleasant Hill will still vote at the Pleasant Hill

Fire Station. Pleasant Hill is represented on the County Commission by Paul Dee Barnes.

The new election boundaries will go into effect for the next primary election in June. The new districts will be in effect for the next general election.

State Legislature seats held by state Sen. Walter Bradley and state Rep. Blake Curtis who currently represent the Texico and Pleasant Hill districts will be up for election in 1992.

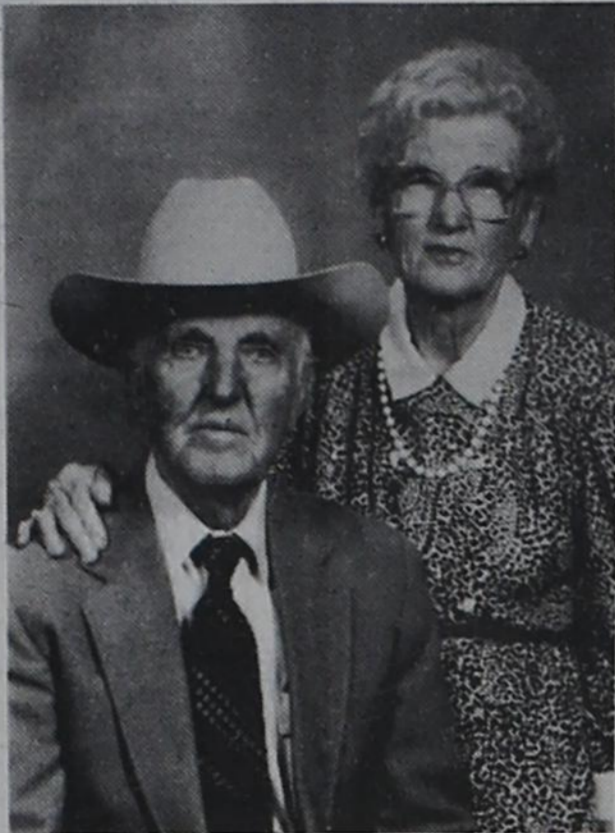




