PANHANDLE-PLAINS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The second regional meeting of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce will be held at Hereford, Texas, on November 21st at 2:00 p. m. President Sam Braswell states that this will be one of the most important meetings to be held by the organization. The matter of organizing a town for the proposed Panhandle Fair will be definitely decided upon. Reports from the standing committees as to progress made will be heard.

The last regional meeting held at October 19th was the most successful in the history of the organization. 102 delegates and directors representing practically every county in the Panhandle-Plains section were present. President Braswell expects this meeting to be more largely attended.

WE NEED A NEW COURT HOUSE AND JAIL

If there is a county in the Panhandle of Texas that needs a new court house and jail, it certainly is Ochiltree County. The growing need of a suitable county administration building has been forcibly brought to our attention during this term of the district court. The present court-house building is an old frame structure that was built in Ochiltree many years ago. If it was destroyed by fire it would destroy many valuable records which it would be impossible to reproduce. The offices for the county officials are entirely inadequate in size. The building has no jury rooms.

As for the jail, we have practically no jail at all. It is a little box affair made out of two by fours and is not much more secure than any ordinary building. No doubt there would be more arrests made in this county if the officers had a decent place in which to house the prisoners.

Probably this is not the time to start an agitation for a new court-house and jail but the time is coming soon when this building will be necessary. Don't put it off until it is too late. Don't put it off until the present structure catches fire and destroys all of the county records. We are not in favor of the county going deep in debt and building a magnificent building as some counties have done, but we do believe that we should have a good plain building that would house all the county officers and provide sufficient accommodations for court proceedings. A jail could be built in as part of the courthouse. Think it over, let's have a building that will be a credit to the grand old county of Ochiltree. Our neighbor county of Lipscomb has a model little building. If we had as good, everything would be "jake."

Mr. and Mrs. Joe French have entered suit in the district court of this county to annul the marriage of their daughter, Miss Ferrell to Chester Wilkin. This young couple were married here on November 2nd by County Judge J. M. Grigsby. The license was issued by County Clerk David D. Shanks and the Wilkins boy and a young man by the name of Raymond Rider both swore that the girl's age was eighteen years. Now comes the parents in their petition and swear that the girl is only twelve years of age and that both of the parties swearing to the girl's age knew that she was only twelve.

As soon as the facts in the case were known, Sheriff Talley put the Oklahoma officers on the trail of the young men but to date they have evaded arrest. The girl is with her parents. Mr. French and his family live in the southwest part of Texas County, Oklahoma, where they are among the most prosperous farmers of that section.

ROBBERY AND MURDER AT CANADIAN LAST WEEK

Jim Anderson, Hugh Howell and Norvel Giddens are in the Canadian jail charged with the murder of a Mexican by the name of Catarino Martinez and with robbing Martinez and another Mexican of \$900.00. The murder was done early on Tuesday morning of last week as all of these men were returning from their work at the Sante Fe round house. The Canadian officers immediately got busy and the accused men were arrested on Wednesday evening. According to the Canadian Record Anderson was the first to confess naming Giddens as the actual murderer. The other two maintained their innocence for several days before confessing to their part in this dastardly crime. All of these men have had a good reputation prior to this time but no doubt they will get their just deserts now.

WAR SAVING STAMPS PAYABLE JANUARY FIRST

War Saving Stamps of the series of 1918 become due and payable on January 1, 1923. The people who bought these stamps will receive their full face value upon redemption and will find the money they saved five years ago has earned every year about four per cent compounded interest. In order to afford holders of war savings stamps an opportunity to continue their investment in a safe government security the Treasury Department is offering an exchange of War Savings Stamps for Treasury Saving Certificates. The certificates are issued in denominations of \$25, \$100 and \$1,000, maturity value, and sold for \$20.50, \$82 and \$820, respectively. Holders of War Savings Stamps can get them at these prices upon application through their own banks or their post offices. Exchanges will be made as of January 1, 1923, upon applications presented between November 15, 1922, and January 15, 1923. Immediate payment will be made in cash of any difference due the holder of War Savings Stamps if he takes the largest possible amount of Treasury Savings Certificates on the exchange.

The growing inclination of the people to save and their desire to find a safe reinvestment for their money leads Treasury officials to believe that a large part of the six hundred million dollars in War Savings Stamps soon to become due will be exchanged for Treasury Savings Certificates.

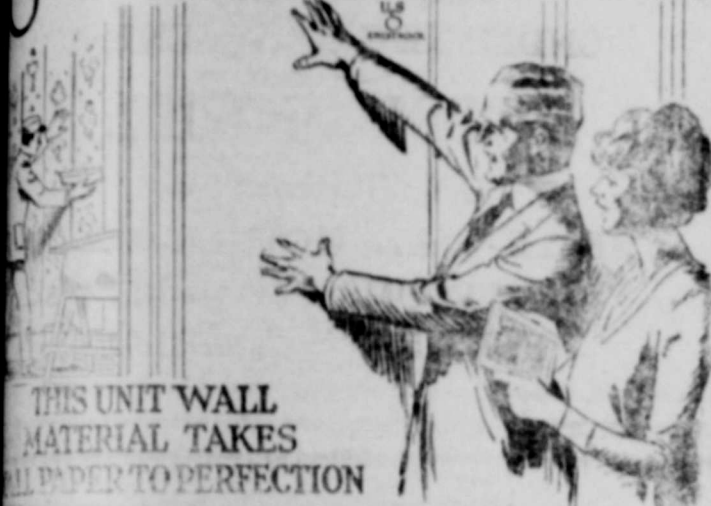

The Annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross for registration of the membership for 1923 will begin on Armistice Day, November 11, and close on Thanksgiving Day, November 30. The ground work for this stupendous task of re-enrolling the membership throughout the world has been laid in a plan for the first complete and comprehensive system of registration of the Red Cross membership in all its 3,900 active Chapters at home and abroad.

An important feature of the round-the-world Roll Call campaign will be a universal effort to re-enlist the service of war-time Red Cross workers in the peace program by their participation in the Roll Call. In this way the vast army of volunteers will once more affiliate with the work of the Red Cross in its manifold phases. Cooperation also has been assured by Government and private maritime interests in a deep-sea Roll Call that is designed to reach every member or potential member in every part of the world who may be en voyage or temporarily in any port.

Thousands of Chapters will adopt the home canvass plan of enrollment which originated in Pittsburgh, where last year it resulted in a membership increase of 50 per cent. All records in this year's campaign will be kept in standard size cards to be filed by each Chapter for future use.

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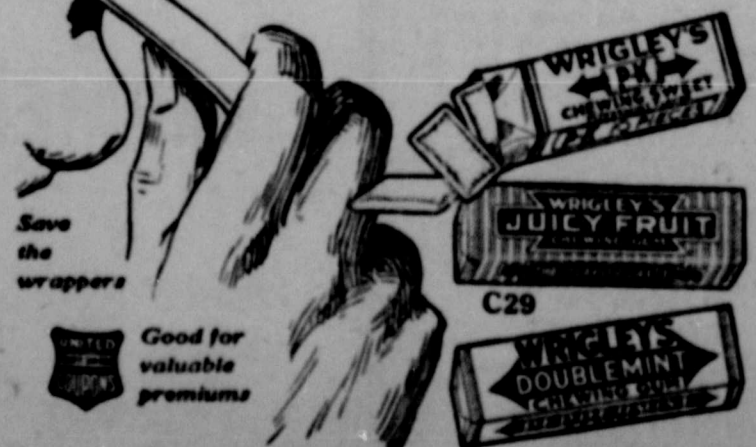
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
