WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—The ordering of a thorough investigation of trans-oceanic flights by the assistant secretaries of war, navy and commerce in charge of aviation is under consideration by President Coolidge.

Wreckage Found
At Three Points

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—After-logged airplane wreckage reported found at three widely separated points at sea today, leaving a riddle and part of the wing of an unidentified plane were found on the beach at Newquay, Cornwall, England, and a French fish-boat reported having found wreckage of a plane three miles off the coast of the Azores, N. S. No trace of the fliers reported.

The schooner sighted the wreckage partially submerged about 250 miles off Sable island, a graveyard of the Atlantic. In a report to the French hospital ship Jeanne d'Arc, the wreckage was described as follows:

Three More Held As
Robbery Suspects

AMARILLO, Texas, Sept. 13.—Three young men, arrested Sunday night at Borger after two hold-ups had been committed and a third attempted, were today added to the host of suspects held in connection with the killing Saturday night of Leo J. Laley, druggist, by a bandit. Two men arrested just after the killing were still in custody. A sixth suspect was jailed after being picked up on the road between Amarillo and Tharmond, his conduct causing suspicion. None of the suspects will be released until after Mrs. Laley, widow of the slain man, who witnessed the shooting, has had opportunity to identify them. Up to noon today her condition had not been such as to permit her to go to the police station.

Goff Sentenced On

STATE FILES
SUIT ON NOTESEEKS COLLECTION OF
\$56,250 IN SALE OF
STATE PROPERTY

(By The Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 13.—Suits for collection of two notes totalling \$56,250 and interest, represented as unpaid balance of the purchase price of the state iron ore properties sold in 1920 to L. P. Featherstone of Longview, was filed by Attorney General Claude Pollard in district court here Tuesday against P. P. Featherstone, Longview, administrator of the deceased purchaser's estate and eight bondsmen.

The principal sum represents half the purchase price, one fourth of which was paid in cash and the remainder secured by three notes and a \$100,000 bond. The first of these three notes has been paid, but the others due on September 16, 1923, and March 16, 1924, respectively, have not, the state's petition says. The property is at Rusk, having been operated in connection with the state prison system.

"Cat Bandit" Given
Robbery Sentence

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—(AP)—William Ed Baker, the "cat" bandit, was sentenced today for one year to life on each of five charges to which he pleaded guilty, three being for robbery and two for burglary. The sentences are to run concurrently.

Officials planned to take him to the state penitentiary at Joliet before evening.

Arrested last week, after a period of terror on the north side of the city in which women were attacked and robbed by a mysterious masked prowler, Baker was indicted and put on trial today, setting a record for speedy justice.

Woman Kills Self
In Triangular Row

SHERMAN, Texas, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Mrs. Eva Spencer, 41, died early Monday morning at Orlena, at the home of her former husband, F. A. Spencer, of two gun shot wounds, self inflicted, according to the coroner's verdict. Death came after she had discussed with the great part of Sunday night with her former husband and his wife whether she would marry a man who lives in Whitesboro, testimony at the inquest revealed. Mr. Spencer and his present wife discouraged Eva Spencer in her desire to end her business on earth and aided her in preparations to return to Whitesboro.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Sept. 13

(By The Associated Press)
The move to hold a joint re-union of the Blue and the Gray is a growing topic of discussion among members of the Grand Army in-reunion here, but the proposal seemingly is meeting active opposition in the administration. It is proposed that there be but one more encampment of the G. A. R. and that encampment be a joint re-union of the remnants of the Blue and Gray.

Late yesterday the lobby of the hotel here where the veterans are making their headquarters was jammed with Grand Army members, a woman stepped to the balcony and placed a cornet to her lips. The next moment the strains of "Dixie" went out over the heads of the old warriors. There was an amazed silence for a moment, and the name of the old rebel air ran from lip to lip.

Cheers Rock Building
When the last note died away, there was a roar of cheers, old gold corded hats were in the air and blue and gold buttoned sleeves were waving.

MANY DIE IN
JAP TYPHOONOVER 100 DROWN AND
VILLAGES WRECKED
BY TIDAL WAVE

(By Associated Press)
TOKYO, Japan, Sept. 13.—(AP)—More than 100 persons were drowned and many are missing, victims of a typhoon and tidal wave which inundated villages in the neighborhood of the city of Kumamoto on the island of Kyushu, say dispatches received by Asahi.

The scene of the storm was reported near Omura where the American round the world plane, the Frelife of Detroit, is waiting to take off on its next hop to the Kasumigaura naval station near Tokyo.

(Omura is about twenty two miles northwest of Kumamoto and is about ten miles northeast of Nagasaki which was reported in previous dispatches to have been in the path of the typhoon.)

1,000 Reported Dead
There was an unconfirmed report in Tokyo that besides the one hundred or more drowned, 1,000 persons had perished in one town near Kumamoto.

Dispatches from Osaka said that the typhoon was the most severe for decades and that a number of important buildings in Nagasaki were waving.

"Silent Cop" Maker
Dies In Rochester

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Chief of Police Joseph N. Quigley, inventor of the "silent cop" used in virtually all cities where traffic direction is a problem, died today.

He was president of the International Association of Police Chiefs in 1919 and 1920 and made honorary president after he refused a third term.

BOOSTERS OFF
ON GOOD WILL
TRIP TO NORTHARDOR IS UNDAMPENED
BY RAIN BUT CROWD
IS LESSENER

Assembling at the city hall this morning at 7:30, twenty-four automobiles, carrying about 75 boosters of the South Plains fair, including the 40 piece Lubbock high school band, left for the first of the good will tours which will shake hands today with Abernathy, Hale Center, Olton, Plainview, Lockney, Floydada, Petersburg, Crosbyton, Ralls, Lorenzo and Idalia.

Rain Dampens Ardor
Apparently fearing the roads following the rain of yesterday afternoon and the embankment of heavy clouds early this morning, the caravan of handshakers was not large enough to meet expectations of H. R. Griffin and J. D. Hassell, Jr., the committee in charge of the tour. Supported by the high school musicians, the fair boosters, however will make a favorable invitation for South Plains towns to visit Lubbock.

W. C. Rylander will make the principal talks in each town, the band will render concerts, and three clowns will cavort with antics to evoke laughter. The clowns gave a laughable performance here early today while getting in practice for their stunts in stops north and east and the committee in charge of the trip south expects to sign them up for the Friday trip.

South Trip Friday

The trip Friday will carry a message to Slaton, Southland, Post, Tahoka, O'Donnell, Lamesa, Brownfield, Meadow and Ropes. These towns are located in five counties which will be here with exhibits and many individual entries at the fair. The counties are: Garza, Lynn, Dawson, Terry and Hockley.

Football teams from Slaton and Lamesa will be here to play before the crowds and merchants in each town to be visited have been co-operating for over a month in advertising the fair.

School children throughout the route of the good will envoys will be out en masse, as Thursday, September 23, has been designated as school day at the fair and children will be given free tickets for that day.

L. F. Holland, who is lining up members for the tour Friday, urges that anyone who can go call him or the Chamber of Commerce in order that the committee might know how many to expect.

Report Rapped
Paralysis Scare
At Wills Point
Not Authentic

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Sept. 13.—Not a single case of infantile paralysis is at Wills Point, and only one has been there this year, Dr. Livingston Anderson, director of the communicable disease division of the state division of health, said today in confirmation of reports from Dallas of a threatened embargo on Wills Point dairy products because of an alleged "epidemic."

Statement Confirmed
Dr. Anderson talked with Mayor Henry Gilchrist and Dr. D. L. Saunders, city health officer of Wills Point, by telephone Tuesday, and confirmed the health department's recent assurance that no cases exist at the town.

Dr. Anderson expressed belief that not more than 450 infantile paralysis cases exist in the entire state, judging from the death rate. Newspaper reports from various towns, if correct, would make the total about 700, he said. Only 187 cases have been reported officially to the health department, however, he said.

Situation Not Alarming
The situation "is nothing to be alarmed about," Dr. Anderson believes, since the cases are scattered and are not in epidemic form. Anderson said that Wills Point has reported the most cases, but they are well in hand there.

\$50,000,000 Church
Property Is Seized

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Ecclesiastical authorities here today said that, since the religious conflict started in Mexico more than a year ago, the government has nationalized Catholic church properties amounting to 100,000,000 pesos, or approximately \$50,000,000.

Of this total amount 73,000,000 pesos represents church amusements, of which 14,000 pesos seized when the religious services were suspended and the churches turned over to parishioners' committees appointed by the municipal authorities.

The remainder of the amount represents rural and urban properties throughout the country allegedly belonging to prelates but held in the names of other persons. These were nationalized owing to a constitutional provision forbidding ministers of any religion to own property in Mexico.

Cop Charged With
Slaying His Chief

BLUEFIELD, W. Va., Sept. 13.—(AP)—A city policeman, John L. Williams, today faced charges of having killed his former chief, D. Dow Dillow, 40, who was shot to death on a lonely road across the Virginia state line from here last night while seated in an automobile with Williams' 22 year old wife, Gertrude.

Williams sent for officers following the shooting and surrendered. He declared he shot in self defense when Dillow drew a revolver as he surprised the couple in the car, which was parked along the highway.

Dillow was a federal prohibition officer.

DEFENSE ATTORNEYS CHARGE
JURY PANEL "HAND PICKED"
AS SOONER CASE IS CALLED

(By Associated Press)
OKMULGEE, Okla., Sept. 13.—The trial of five men, alleged members of the Matthew Kimes bandit gang, was delayed today while attorneys for the defense attempted to prove that the jury panel was "hand picked."

Each of the defendants, which includes Kimes himself, who was brought from the state penitentiary where he is serving a life term, charged with the murder of W. J. McAnally, chief of police at Beggs, Okla.

McAnally was shot and killed May 18, when he attempted to halt the robbery of two banks there. Nearly \$18,000 was taken by the bandits.

Actual beginning of the trial may be delayed until tomorrow, attorneys said.

The defendants are Matthew Kimes, Jack Whitehead, Clyde Brandon and Roy (Blackie) Wilson.

WOMAN KILLED
IN CAR WRECKAUTO DEMOLISHED BY
PASSENGER TRAIN
NEAR GAINESVILLE

GAINESVILLE, Texas, Sept. 13.—Mrs. Christian Felderhoff, 66, was killed, and Miss Rose Felderhoff, 23, and Sister M. Conisia, 25, were seriously injured when the automobile was struck at a grade crossing 13 miles east of Gainesville about 9:20 o'clock this morning by Missouri-Kansas-Texas passenger train. A fourth occupant of the car, Sister M. Caludia, 22, was not injured.

Youth Brutally
Slays Parents

ROANOKE, Va., Sept. 13.—(AP)—William Thomas Collins, 17, shot his father and step-mother to death in their home here early today, then struck the dying woman a terrific blow with a hatchet as she lay upon the kitchen floor, detectives quoted the boys as saying in a confession.

"She was good to me, as good as any step-mother could have been. I don't know why I did it. I was just mad, they had quarreled so much; maybe I'd wish I'd killed myself," detectives said the youth declared.

Woman Defeated In
Plans For Suicide

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A 65-year-old New Orleans woman planned to die on the grave of her sister, but circumstances over which she had no control resulted in her death at a local hospital.

Grief-stricken over the death of her sister, Mrs. Jessie Stillman, went to her relative's grave late yesterday, swallowed poison and lay down on the grave. She was found by a negro marble worker and taken to a hospital where she died three hours later. Her sister died two years ago.

Inside her hand bag was found the following unsigned note: "Please don't take me to the hospital, I want to die on my darling sister's grave."

Coolidge To Probe
Needs For Session

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—President Coolidge will investigate further before reaching a final decision as to the necessity of a special session either of congress or of the senate.

His original opposition to a special session will stand, however, unless his inquiry discloses a real necessity for such a call.

At the White House today it was said that such advice as the president had received in the short time since his return to Washington had been that there was no necessity for the convening of congress ahead of its regular meeting here.

Injuries In Ambush
Fatal To Sheriff

SYRACUSE, Kans., Sept. 13.—(AP)—Sheriff Govan C. Mills, of Hamilton county, died today from injuries received when he and a deputy were fired on, when they attempted to take into custody near here Saturday night three men suspected of having a stolen automobile in their possession. Two of the men are being held at Pueblo and a third is held here.

The first cavalry brigade (less the first cavalry), Brigadier General LeRoy Stinger, commanding, left Fort Clark, Texas, September 4, for the overland march to the assembly point, where it will be joined by the first cavalry now stationed at Marfa.

Military observers have been ordered to report to the commanding general, first cavalry division, at Camp Marfa, on September 13, to represent the war department and the service schools during the maneuvers.

Important Results

The war department feels that important results will be achieved through these maneuvers, the first of the cavalry division. In making the division a more efficient combat team, and in the practical instruction of officers and enlisted men in the field, in addition the maneuvers will serve as an exhaustive test for many new articles in the field. Included in the list of items which the cavalry division will be equipped for the first time in divisional maneuvers, will be the machine rifle, the cooking pack, the demolition pack, the pieper line pack, and the machine gun and machine gun ammunition packs, all of which are carried on the Phillips pack saddle.

Co-operation of the cavalry with the air corps in functions of reconnaissance, communication, observation and combat will be an important feature of the exercises.

In these maneuvers the war department also hopes to experiment in the use of portable artillery transported by trucks, tanks and motorized teams with the cavalry division. This is in keeping with the announced policy of including in all major tactical exercises such as problems will test the capabilities and limitations of motor transportation, both with mounted and dismounted commands and whenever possible, the relative merits of motor propelled and animal drawn vehicles over various classes of terrain.

U. S. Troops Ready For War In Asia

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—If and when a war is fought the north pole or in another climate the United States will be ready. It has the third infantry, equipped and trained in the use of ski, snow shoes, toboggans, the like, and thoroughly hardened to the rigors, not only of war, of winter sports.

The third infantry is stationed at Fort Snelling, Minnesota. In Minnesota the winters come early and late. Finding that ordinary drill was impracticable in January and February of each year and the men needed outdoor work, officers carried out the idea of organizing winter sports.

The idea has been to give the United States army its own unit of "pine chasers."

The regiment has gone into detail in its winter training, which will be renewed within the month or so, that complete regiments have been drawn up over the drill tactics, maneuvering, marching with winter equipment. It had advanced so far last year that a review of the entire regiment on ski and snow shoes, possible, the machine gun company drawing their weapons on boggles.

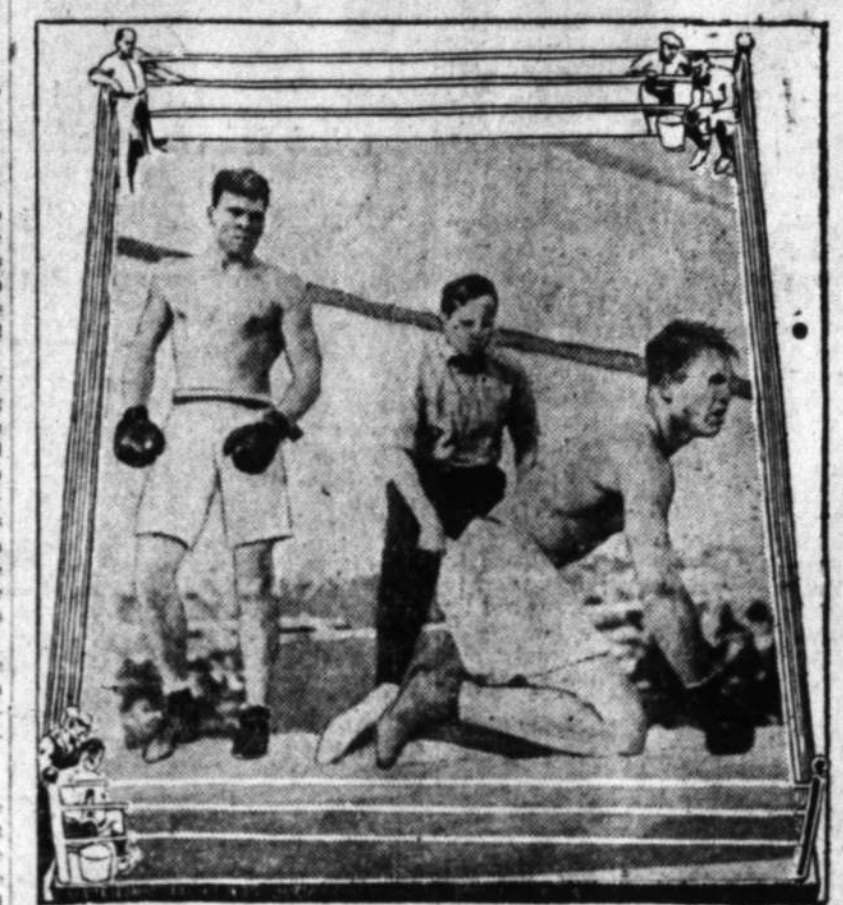
Cards Beat Brooklyn

NEW RECORD IS SET AS FIGHT CHECKS DRAWN

TUNNEY GETS MILLION AND DEMPSEY NEAR HALF OF THIS

(By The Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—The battle of Soldier Field September 22, has been launched formally as the greatest financial fistic spectacle in history.

Checks were exchanged all around last night totalling more than a million and a half dollars to conclude the financial arrangements.

Meet With Commission

Tex Rickard and George Getz, the actual and nominal promoters of the fight between Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey met with the Illinois state athletic commission and the South Park board, controlling Soldier Field, in Rickard headquarters. After hours of conference with attorneys for all parties, the papers and checks were signed.

The check drawn payable to Tunney is for one million dollars; Dempsey's was written for \$450,000. Both checks have been placed in the hands of the state boxing commission to be held until fulfillment of contracts by the two fighters.

The total of these checks, plus the \$100,000 paid the South Park board for stadium rental already is in the Rickard coffers from ticket sales, which have exceeded \$2,000,000.

This is Dempsey's fourth million dollar fight, and probably the greatest of the four by far in gate receipts. His share of the purse will rank only second in the list of big purses he has won. Dempsey as champion received more than \$700,000 for the battle of the Sesqui last year.

Turney Draws Record Sum

As the champion now, Tunney draws the greatest sum ever handed an athlete for one exhibition, and more than any other boxer except Dempsey ever earned in his entire ring career.

Another day of complete rest, except for a little golf, was Tunney's program today.

Dempsey plans to resume his afternoon bag punching and his evening secret boxing today.

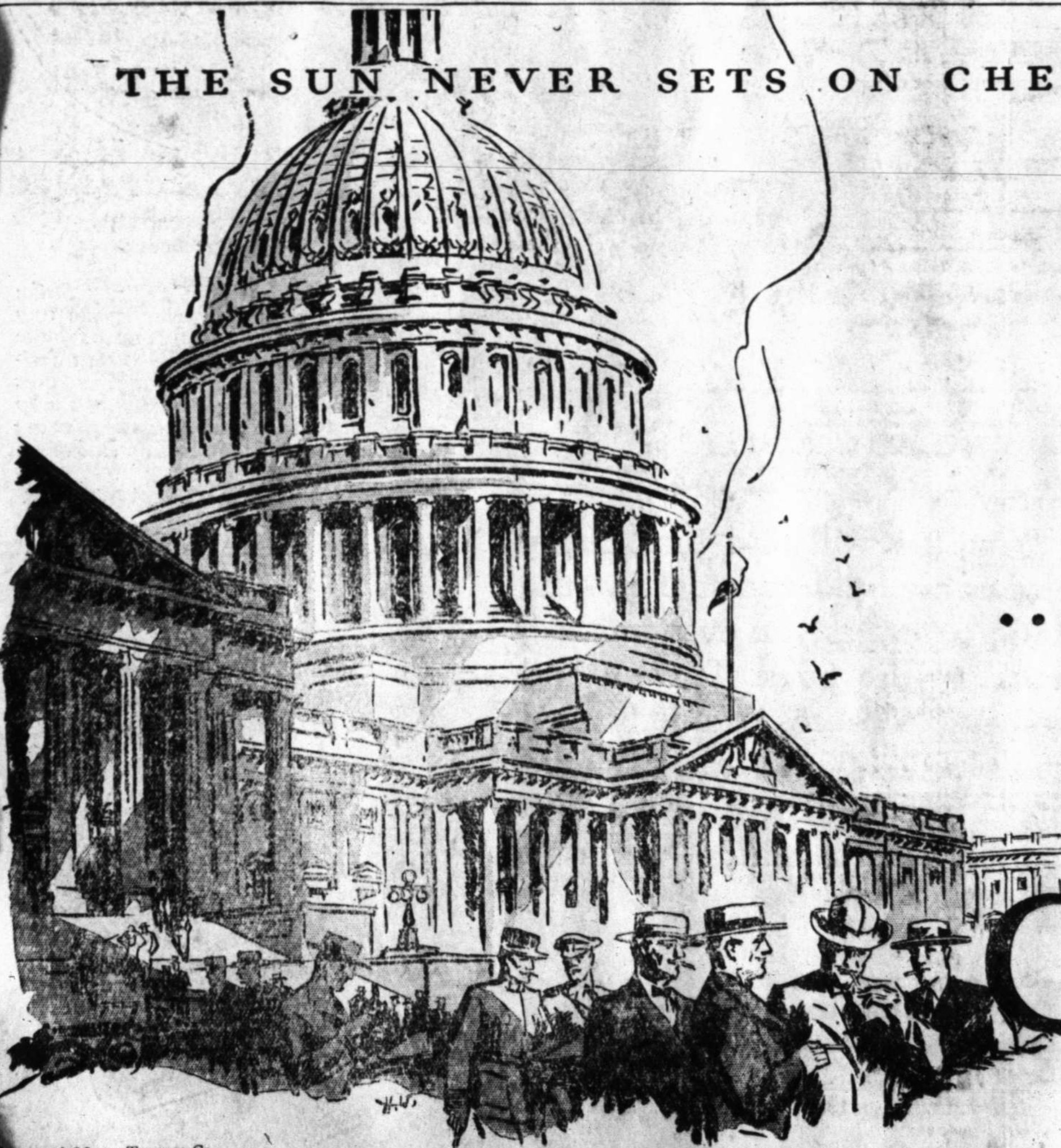

TITLE WILL AID TUNNEY IN HIS FIGHT, HE SAYS

INSTINCTIVE REACTION TO GIVE HIM POWER AGAINST DEMPSEY

CHICAGO, Sept. 12.—Has possession of the heavyweight title given Gene Tunney additional power even though his body has gained not a whit of additional strength since he won the title from Jack Dempsey last fall? Gene thinks so.

"Into the return fight with Dempsey at Chicago I shall carry the subconscious conviction that I am the master of division, that I am the champion—to put it frankly, that I am good and have demonstrated my class."

Instinctive Reaction
"It is an instinctive reaction that probably never will form as a definite thought in the mind during the heat of the contest. But that knowledge of power, now a part of my subconscious mind as a result of my last fight with Dempsey, has increased my confidence tremendously and made me a far better fighter."

The hearing of a champion shows in every move Tunney makes in the training camp. Seekers of autographs determinedly storming his door, meet Gene's polite smile, a word or two, and the desired signature, no matter what important matters may be pressing.

In training Gene is every inch a champion. A sense of security, not at all affected, envelopes him as he smiles, swaps banter with his punch cutters, and then hummers some blows with ease and confidence. The dogged seriousness of pre-fight days has disappeared in the realization that someone else must worry about winning the championship now that his own training mastery has been proved. The burden of proof has passed to other hands.

Gene is absolute master of his own destiny. In training sessions the champion refuses to don the padded helmet that usually protects the face and ears of a fighter. Instead he has absolute confidence in his ability to avoid any extra punishment a sparring partner may seek to dole out when stung.

Gene has a theory, an outgrowth of the early days when he was cut easily about the head and bled freely, that punches taken on the face from a layer of calloused skin over his eyes and across the cheekbones that is difficult to pierce.

How thoroughly the championship virus has seeped into Tunney's bearing shows now and then in these training skirmishes, although much against Gene's real inclination. One of Tunney's proudest boasts is that he has never injured a sparring partner. Yet on rare occasions a punch slips through the champion's guard, bounces into his countenance and for a moment Gene is king, fists flashing furiously and brows lowered, defending his standing as the ruler of his profession. Then Gene appears just a bit sorry, whispers to the youngster facing him, and probably promises himself mentally never to do that again—at least until the night of September 22.

Billy Evans Says:

Curves For Strikeouts

Southpaws once more rule supreme as the strikeout kings of the American League. Shades of Rube Waddell.

Recently when I glanced at the American League averages, "Lefty" Grove and Rube Walberg of the Athletics were running one, two, three and four strikeouts to the credit, while Walberg had registered 191.

In the National League, the right handers hold the advantage. Dazzy Vance, Brooklyn ace, leads with 140 strikeouts while Charley Root, of the Chicago Cubs, leading game winner is second with 123 as I knock off these lines.

While this quartet of twirlers all boast a great fast ball, it is the deceptive curve, of which each is the master, that has accounted for most of the strikeouts.

Curve ball pitching is at present in high favor in the majors, particularly in the National League. The well controlled curve is a great strikeout medium.

Poor Hurling Blamed

When you start trying to dole out the world championship Cardinals are not out in front by a fair margin and why Cleveland, runner-up in the American League last year is sixth this season, just glance at the pitching averages.

As you peruse the work of the twirlers in the two major leagues, look carefully for the names of Uble of Cleveland and Rhem of St. Louis. The figures back of the names of these two hurlers tell story in a brief and concise manner.

Last season Uble won 27 games and lost only 11 to top the pitching averages of the American League. With only a month to play, Uble's name shows only five wins against six defeats. A bad arm has handicapped him all season. Add 20 victories to Cleveland's present average and it would mean a first division berth for the Indians.

That sums up the difference between Uble's work of this year and last. Granting Uble will win only two more games this year, his mark would be 29 short of his 1925 showing.

Rhem Shy 1926 Mark

Last season Flint Rhem with 29 victories against seven defeats, ranked second in the National. Ray Kremer of Pittsburgh with the same number of games and lost one less giving him a few points the better of Rhem.

This spring a salary "difference" caused Rhem to remain away from the training camp. He missed all of his spring work, since the dispute wasn't adjusted until after the season opened. That hurt.

Later in the season he drew a suspension because of some alleged or real infraction of the club's rules. That didn't help. In addition, he just couldn't get the breaks.

While Rhem has pitched well enough, he hasn't been favored with the same good luck that came his way last year. His record, as I write these lines, is nine wins against 16 defeats. If he wins five more games, he will still be six

National League Flag May Be Won With Smallest Percentage In Its History; Evans Produces Figures

BY BILLY EVANS

A Major league club capable of winning 90 ball games is always conceded an excellent chance to win a pennant.

It is possible that the championship in the National League this year will be captured with less victories.

Last season, the St. Louis Cardinals won the flag with 85 victories and 65 defeats for a mark of .578, the lowest figure ever to win a major league championship.

There is more than a remote possibility that the winner this year will finish with a slimmer mark than the Cardinals of 1926 who also went on to win a world championship.

With the four contending clubs all bunched closely together and all of them meeting each other in several "all-in" series, the National League race promises to be a cut-throat affair to the very end of the season.

Going into the home stretch with a month to play, to be exact 31 games, Pittsburgh was leading the league with a one-game margin over Cleveland. At that time Pittsburgh had won 73 games and lost 59 for a mark of .553.

For Pittsburgh to win 90 ball games, the Pirates will not have to pull any miracle stuff, just play ordinary ball to win 17 and lose 14. That would make their standing at the finish 90 wins and 64 defeats for an average of .584.

The National League schedule is filled with potent possibilities. It calls for Chicago to meet St. Louis in the latter city in a two-game series Oct. 1, 2. The pennant may ultimately hinge on the outcome of those two games.

During the third and final trip of St. Louis to New York, rain washed out all four games booked between the Giants and the Cardinals. This will necessitate the playing off of those postponed games in St. Louis.

When New York invades St. Louis today for a four-day stay it means seven games must be played during that period. If either team emerges from that series with a commanding margin, by taking, say five out of seven, it would practically mean the elimination of the vanquished foe from the pennant chase.

Another series that may have much to do with deciding the pennant is scheduled for Chicago on Sept. 25, 26, 27 when Pittsburgh meets the Cubs in a battle to death.

The itinerary of the four contending clubs is such that winning 90 games by any one of the quartet may prove to be quite a task.

There is a chance that one of the contenders may dash away from the rest of the field. This has been done during the month of September. However, the hope of the other five months doesn't make any club stand out that strong.

In the spring I expressed the belief that Pittsburgh and New York were the strongest teams in the National League and would finish in that order, yet both of these teams have disappointed at times. If the Pirates had taken advantage of their opportunities the club would be now enjoying a fairly safe margin.

Inability to beat Boston has been

shy of his 29 victories, of 1925. Six additional wins would mean much to the Cardinals right now.

Bass, recovering more quickly, got to his feet in a few seconds as the referee tolled a count of eight over Chapman, already a bloody figure from a rash over his left eye from being bumped by Benny's head in the seventh round. On his own like a tiger, Bass sent Chapman down again for a count

2,700 Enroll In Rural Schools Of County Monday

Advance indications reveal that approximately 2,700 students took up books in the various rural schools of the county yesterday, according to reports reaching the office of W. M. Pevehouse, county superintendent of education.

There are more than 3,000 school-ages in the county, Mr. Pevehouse said. Of this number several hundred were not permitted to enroll yesterday because of interferences of vacations and the necessary need of laborers on some farms in the county.

Increase Expected
The attendance figures of rural schools will be increasing for the next two weeks, and school authorities expect the enrollment to go beyond the 3,000 mark before November 1.

Figures on the registration of only two schools have reached the county superintendent's office. The Acuff school opened doors to 153 pupils, while 75 enrolled at the McClung school.

Demonstration Of Canning Is Given

A canning demonstration directed by Miss Louise Baird, county home demonstration agent, was a feature of a meeting of the women's and girls demonstration clubs yesterday afternoon in the home-economics room of the school building in the Carlisle community.

Yesterday morning, Miss Baird and another has signified that he will be in the company Wednesday.

Miss Elsie Conner, instructor, said this afternoon.

The school is divided into morning and evening sessions and the children learn here a preparation or their schooling in the form of an orientation course, including games, singing, numbers and reading.

prospect in North Texas were the best in many years but now the boll weevil is causing the crop to open rapidly, prematurely in some instances. While some fields are very poor, there are some localities where yields are very good.

In places cotton is fruiting on lower limbs with a chance to mature as a rule, however, the outlook is below expectations. Root rot, boll worms and leaf worms have done considerable injury to the report says, and adds that the outcome of the large acreage of young cotton is uncertain.

In Northeast Texas it has been found that the crop has gone down badly in the past three weeks and in most cases has done nothing since the heavy rains of late July. Abnormal heat hurt the crop in the uplands and weevil and leaf worms in the bottoms. In sections a good crop is found, in others it is very poor. Leaf worms are stripping the foliage on the late planted cotton, bolls are generally small. Many are opening prematurely and no top crop is expected.

Central West Late
In West and West Central Texas the crop is a little late along the Rio Grande but promises well. Some of the Pecos Valley cotton is very poor. In the east boll worms and drought have materially reduced the earlier good prospects. Weevils, too, have been most active, while the high temperatures have dried bolls or opened them prematurely. The plants are not putting on and the fields are called disappointing as a rule.

Only in exceptional cases have fine outturns been up to expectations in Central Texas, or the staple up to the normal length. Weevil have been very bad, the report says, and boll worms, leaf worms and root rot have taken a heavy toll. High temperatures and lack of rain have hurt the crop, particularly the late planted, shedding has been severe and there are very few squares. In rare instances is there any top crop prospects, root rot is worst in localities than last year but in others it is not general.

East Texas Hurt By Heat
Heat and the driest August in many years has caused premature opening of the crop in East Texas and the near failure of young cotton. Many crops look promising but when ginned the yield is disappointing. Weevils are the worst since 1921 and hardly a bloom has appeared lately. Many bolls are not opening. A rain might help but insects are numerous.

Late cotton felt the effects of the weevil in South Texas, Mr. Schultz finds, but much of the early crop did well. Some planters report the weevil the worst since 1903. The crop has been ginned in many localities and fields are being pastured or cleared. The "Valley" made about one-third of last year's crop but the Corpus Christi-Robstown territory is doing very well in the aggregate. In places there are squares and blooms with an occasional top crop promise but Mr. Schultz thinks insects may get most of it.

Some fields are yielding a half bale or more, some only a tenth in the southwestern part of the state but a few counties are making better than the average. The weather has been good for picking and labor is ample. In some localities weevil have seldom been so destructive. Meanwhile most of the crop will be out in a few weeks.

Planetarium For Chicago Planned

CHICAGO, Sept. 12 (AP)—Construction of a "planetarium", where the heavens will be reproduced by means of moving lights on a huge inverted bowl, is being considered by the South Park board of Chicago. The idea was brought back from Germany by board members.

The "planetarium" would be housed in a building shaped like an observatory, with a special screen fitted to the inside of the roof, and a machine to project lights simulating the stars and other heavenly bodies placed in the center of the vaulted room.

The instrument, which looks like a huge, iron spider, will show both hemispheres of the firmament. Movements of heavenly bodies taking their courses so deliberately as to move imperceptibly to the eye, will be seen to travel their entire distance in the space of a few minutes. They will be shown in accurate relation to the sun. From sunrise to sunset, the sky will be portrayed on the bowl in the space of seven minutes.

There are twelve "planetariums" in Germany and none anywhere else, according to members of the park board. The one projected for Chicago would cost \$250,000.

Edinburgh To Vote On \$200,000 Bonds

EDINBURGH, Texas, Sept. 12 (AP)—An election for the purpose of voting \$200,000 in bonds of the city of Edinburgh has been called for September 27.

The decision to order the election was made by the city commission. Proceeds of the sale of the bonds will be used for the purpose of funding, refunding and cancelling a large amount of warrants of the city issued for street work already completed in the city.

West Texas' Cotton Prospects Good Dependent On Date Of Frost; Other Parts Of State Ravaged By Weevils

By The Associated Press
AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 13—Review of the conditions of the Texas cotton in the various sections of the state, which is appended to the September cotton report of H. H. Schultz, government statistician here, indicates that the crop has been adversely affected in most localities by the boll weevil which is said to have ravaged the fields to an extent, in many instances, greater than ever before.

Northwest Is Best
Probably the best prospects are in the northwest part of the state where Mr. Schultz finds about one

half of the crop on the caprock has better than fair prospects but the remainder in that locality depends upon the date of the first killing frost which usually comes on October 25.

Below the caprock the crop varies from good to only fair with a large percentage of the late cotton subject to injury from leaf worms and boll worms and from weevil in the eastern part. Rain is needed, is recited, shedding has been mad and considerable poisoning has been done.

Edinburgh Permits Pass Four Million

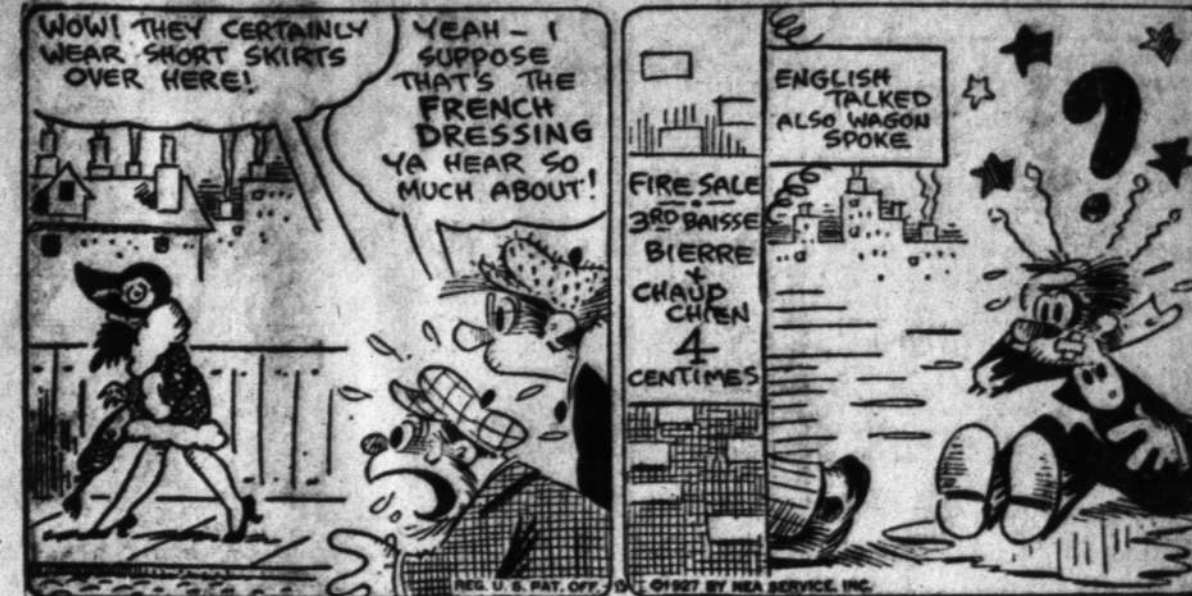

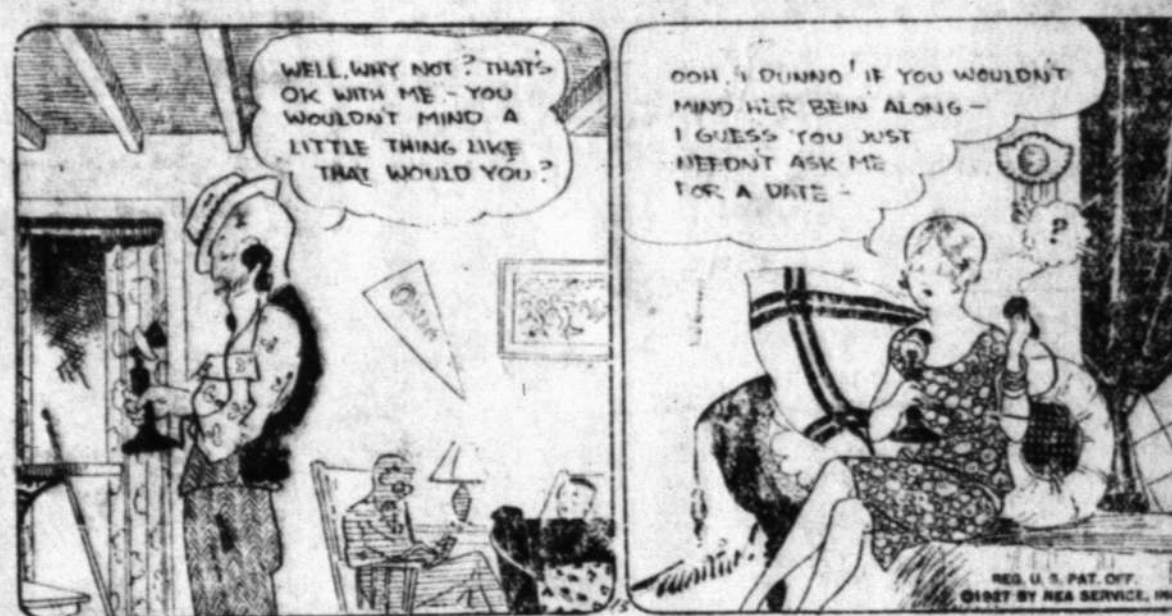

To Catch A Thief

Every person who has traveled in

 dining chairs are piled, according to
 his estimate of financial generosity.

The only comforting thought the

Turning A Rival

IN industry today with new in-
 ventions crowding out old ways of
 doing things, the leaders must keep
 on their toes. Two very good ex-
 amples, out of the recent past, il-
 lustrate the theory that adapta-
 tion often can be made to elimi-
 nate what might prove a costly
 rivalry.

The railroads and motor lines
 furnish the first instance. For sev-
 eral years after the making of
 great trucks and passenger buses
 had begun the railroads suffered.
 Many short lines went broke and
 long roads found they were los-
 ing money on branch roads. But
 the railroads started out to fight
 the bus lines, but found this ven-
 ture a losing one, too. So they took
 the buses and trucks into their
 beam and used them wherever
 they proved more efficient than
 engines. Now trucks and buses
 are used wherever short hauls
 make for expediency, and the mo-
 tor cars have put money into the
 railroads' pockets.

Recently the Postal Telegraph
 Company announced purchase of
 the Federal Telegraph Company.
 The latter concern being a radio
 enterprise, the move means that
 the two great means of communi-
 cation—wire and wireless—are
 linked in one big world-wide
 plan. Each agency of communi-
 cation has its weaknesses and its
 advantages. They will balance one
 another. The public stands to ben-
 efit by this new move in com-
 mercial development.

THE PLAINSMAN



Says:

When adversity hits you from be-
 hind, unexpectedly floors you and
 then follows up the first wallop
 with some good swift kicks don't
 lose faith in yourself. If you can't
 believe in your own ability, who
 will? It is well to remember that
 only game fish swim upstream.

The chances are you haven't
 heard much kick from the kids
 about returning to school this
 year, which is the biggest boost
 that can be given public educa-
 tion in Lubbock. To use a trite
 expression, such is the case all
 over the United States. From the
 rock-bound coast of Maine to the
 sun-kissed shores of the Pacific.

The old system has passed that method to beat
 cuff and scare youngsters into
 a half-way knowledge of the
 three "R's"—and in its place has
 succeeded a kinder, quieter and
 more efficient plan which
 carries with it the practical,
 as well as the theoretical edge
 and which insists that children
 be treated as human beings.

After school has gotten under
 way, drop into a classroom
 some day and note the differ-
 ence in the atmosphere, the
 furnishings, the paraphernalia
 and the discipline as com-
 pared with those days in the dim
 and distant past when you
 crowded into a dark, dingy, un-
 inviting shack, slat under your
 arm, prepared to cause as much
 trouble and learn as little as
 possible. Times have changed
 and so have schools, teachers
 and children. All three have
 changed for the better.

Teachers are better qualified to
 teach modern buildings and equip-
 ment make teaching easier and, in
 addition, offer incentives to in-
 structors and pupils alike. It is
 harder to teach in a school where
 of today, whatever his faults, is
 more awake to the virtues and
 possibilities of education than was
 the youngster of a generation ago.
 They realize that they must have
 an education to get anywhere in
 the world where a generation ago
 it was considered smart to be
 called from school and go to work.
 Civilization is advancing. Schools
 and school children prove it.

Getting back to schools and
 school teachers, which has the
 greatest life work, the lawyer or
 the teacher? The teacher, of course,
 is more important to the good of
 humanity, more essential to the
 life of today and to the generations
 to come. Yet his profession is not
 nearly so closely guarded as the
 lawyer's. The plainman would
 like to see pedagogy be made a
 specialty course to such an extent
 that those preparing to teach would
 be forced to study at least three
 years on general college courses
 before being permitted to take the
 study of pedagogy. Turn again to
 the legal profession. Your best un-
 dergraduate requires three years of
 preparation before the state bar.
 After that he is permitted to derive into
 the art of blackboard. At the end of
 his first year in law—which is his
 fourth year in college—he is granted
 a bachelor's degree in either arts
 or sciences, depending upon his
 preparatory work. After he studies
 for two years longer he receives
 the degree of bachelor of laws. In
 some states a law degree from the
 University admits him to the prac-
 tice of law. In others he must
 pass the bar examinations just as
 if he hadn't gone to college, and
 until he passes those examinations he
 is not permitted to practice in the
 courts. Why can't the teaching
 profession be placed upon a similar
 plane? Why should we flood our
 schools with young, eager but many
 poorly prepared teachers upon
 whose words hang the futures of
 so many unsuspecting youngsters?
 Here is a real problem of life. And,
 incidentally a real objective for the

Little Washington Home Is Mecca For Newlyweds, Says Rodney Dutcher, Brides Are Delighted By 'Dream Home'

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—Massive public buildings, the treasury, the army and navy buildings, legations and embassies, Red Cross headquarters and stately art galleries almost bury a little house in New York avenue which is the Mecca of thousands of brides and grooms on a wedding trip in Washington.

A breath of the artfulness of New England or the moors of Nanterke hovers about the little green and white shingle house, its paneled and trellised doorway, and its welcoming knocker.

The little house is the national girl scouts' headquarters. It was donated to the girl scouts by the National Federation of Women's clubs, who built it for demonstration week in their famous Better Homes movement.

The little house is modeled after the boy hood home of John Howard Payne, author of "Home, Sweet Home."

President Harding called it "the most livable home in America." Brides and grooms at the rate of 50 couples a day have made a beaten track up the walk and gratefully pay their hostess, Mrs. Gertrude L. Bowman, a quarter for the privilege of walking through this dream home of their own.

The quarter goes into the girl scouts' own family slinger jar. The little house should be built for about \$7,000 in any part of the country, the hostess says.

It has a fully equipped basement, a living room, a dining room, reception hall, breakfast nook and kitchen on the first floor, three bedrooms, a nursery and a bath on the second floor.

Furnishings are entirely in the early American design. Sprinkled, chintzy wall paper covers almost every room, and restfulness is the home's keynote.

"The brides," laughs Mrs. Bowman, "rave about the furniture and wall paper, while the grooms go down cellar to inspect the hostess' collection of fine china and silver." The little house was furnished for \$2,000. As one enters the front door the little reception room shows welcome with its sprigged wall paper, oval oriental rug, mahogany drop-leaf table and winding staircase of white steps with mahogany rail.

The dining room, to the right of the reception hall, has a refectory table, Welsh dresser, a sideboard and upholstered chairs in early English design, pewter and willow plates are on the dresser, and electric percolator and silver candlesticks on the sideboard. The rug is of tape velvet. This room cost about \$750.

The living room is 16 by 15 feet. It, too, uses a figured two-tone rug, paper and panel tape rug. A post-colonial design sofa, in brown mahogany and satin, and the baby-grand piano are the only really big pieces in the room. A secretary desk, Windsor chairs, and Colonial tilt-top table harmonize with the old style fire place of red brick, flanked by brass andirons and shovel.

Brides are amazed at a real kitchen," says Mrs. Bowman. "But the ideal home must have one." The kitchen wall is covered with a washable covering, the floor is covered with cork linoleum, there is a double drain board, gas stove with regulator, pressure and broiler cookers, work tables, on rollers, refrigerator (filled from the outside, clock metal waste basket, long handled dust pan, stool and linen

GOOD NEIGHBORS

Back in the old days in the country, a family was considered good neighbors if they were friendly in a social way, and kind and helpful in times of trouble. A great deal of wonderful service used to be rendered by people to their neighbors, and is still in any place where the right spirit prevails.

But the feeling as to what constitutes a good neighbor has changed quite a bit of late years. This is especially true in progressive towns, where people are much affected by the things their neighbors do.

In such a community, if it is reported that a man is going to sell his home, the neighbors feel anxious as to who is coming in there. They ask whether the new owner will be a good neighbor or not. And that question does not relate so much whether he will be social and kind and helpful in times of trouble, as to how he is going to behave in regard to his property.

A family may be very friendly and helpful in the good old fashioned neighborly way, but if they keep their home place in a slovenly manner, if the house and grounds look run down and decrepit, they have an unfavorable effect on the neighborhood. Their personal friendliness is no substitute for the harm they do through creating a depressing effect on the appearance of the locality. Their kind and friendly words do not seem to go very far, if they are creating a blot on the street by neglectful indifference.

The people of a fine city like Quannah have much to do to keep up this spirit of modern neighborliness. This calls not merely for smiles and handshakes and frequent calls and conversation over the back yard fence, but it demands that everyone contribute his part toward the fine appearance of his neighborhood and his community.

BIG OFFENSIVE IS OPENED ON LEGION PLANS

TEAMS TAKE FIELD ON SOUTHWESTERN FRONT UNDER ALLEN TODAY

The first heavy offensive drive of Allen Bros. Post of the American Legion on behalf of efforts of the Post to ultimately secure a memorial hall and clubhouse here, was launched this morning on the southwestern front under command of Major General Hubert L. Allen, who with his staff, is planning to continue the barrage until the salient is taken.

The barrage came as a result of action taken Monday night at a special meeting of the Legion when plans for the humorous lecture to be delivered here September 26 were discussed.

Other Drives This Week
Similar offensive drives will be made in other fronts of the campaign at different times this week and the campaign will not be halted until every individual in the city has been given an opportunity to purchase a ticket for the Hogg program.

It was disclosed by a partial check-up at the meeting that several hundred of the 2,500 tickets already have been sold, and it is known that other hundreds have been disposed of on which no report has yet been filed.

Leaders of the campaign explained that to be sure of a seat in the auditorium for the lecture, it would be wise to buy tickets at once, as ticket holders naturally will have preference over those who buy tickets at the door the night of the program. It was further said that all tickets probably will be placed before the lecture, in which event no seats would be for sale at the door.

Section Reserved For Aged
Although no reserved seats will be available, it was unanimously agreed last night that a special section near the platform will be roped off for Gold Star Mothers, and Fathers, and for veterans of former wars, exclusive of the World War. These seats will be held until a reasonable time before the program starts, after which time they will be thrown open to the public. No extra charge will be made for these seats.

The entire proceeds of the program will go into a Legion fund for a memorial hall and clubhouse and counteracting to scattering reports that the speaker is to receive half of the proceeds, Legion officials said that Doctor Hogg has positively refused to participate in the fund even to the extent of refusing to accept railroad fare either to and from this city.

Hogg Refuses Expenses
Doctor Hogg has repeatedly made the statement that he positively will not accept anything for his services, saying that he wishes the boys to accept this as his present. Much favorable comment has been heard on this phase of the program.

It is anticipated that practically all the tickets for the lecture will be sold at least by the end of this week, and a warning has been issued by Legion officials that, to avoid possible disappointment, tickets be purchased in the next day or two.

Young Girl Cans 500 Containers In Collins Annually

ANNA, Texas, Sept. 13.—Miss Gertrude Arnold, young Collins county girl, cans annually 500 containers, including meats, fruits, vegetables for home use, according to C. W. Smith, secretary-treasurer of the McKinney Chamber of Commerce.

In 1923, Mr. Smith related, she won 20 first prizes in the Collins county fair and 20 second prizes. In the state fair of 1924 she won third on six containers and in 1925 county fair she won 20 first and 13 second premiums. In the same year she won first prize at the Fort Worth fair stock show on 13 containers and 10 products.

Last year she won 32 first and 10 second prizes at the Collins county fair, won first on three containers of preserves and second on six containers of canned products at the state fair and won three prizes at the Red River Valley fair.

Her family plants 12 acres in garden annually. Her father is a five-at-home farmer and buys a new farm every few years.

"What Miss Arnold has done," Mr. Smith said, "entitles her to the respect and admiration of every citizen of Texas."

Presbyterians To Raise \$18,000 Fund

WAXAHACHIE, Sept. 12 (AP)—Completion of a campaign started last year among the Presbyterians of Texas synod to raise \$18,000 to care for an accumulated deficit at Trinity University will be undertaken immediately, it was announced following a meeting in Dallas of the synod's committee on Christian education.

Efforts will be made to raise the remainder of the sum before the synod meets in October.

Occidental Modes Invade Olden City

BACKHISARAL, Crimea, Sept. 13 (AP)—Backhissaral, the city of 60 fountains and innumerable gardens, once the Mohammedan capital of the Crimean Horde and the seat of the Crimean sultan, is rapidly losing its ancient Eastern aspect.

Of 2,000 women living in the city, only two, it is said, are wearing the veil and carefully avoiding strangers. A hundred Muslims, or Moslem priests, are reported to be without occupation and from only two of the 40 mosques may be heard the voice of the Mullah summoning his followers to evening prayer.

The population of the city is rapidly decreasing. From 25,000 in 1914 it has dropped to 9,000 in 1927. The Mohammedan school built by the great Crimean sultan Mengli-Girey-Khan in 1500 still remains, and to penetrate it the visitor, after leaving his shoes at the threshold, must bend his head low, for the heavy chain-placed there by the oriental despot 427 years ago still hangs across the portal.

The influence of modern civilization is apparent. Electricity is in use everywhere in the small flat-roofed houses built of white Crimean stone, and movie posters often establish the walls of old Mohammedan homes.

Slivers Of Steel Cause Bridge Fires

HOUSTON, Sept. 13 (AP)—Southern Pacific lines investigators have found that slivers of hot steel from a brake shoe sometimes cause bridge and trestle fires.

Fire prevention Inspector Richards, while investigating the cause of a small fire in a wooden trestle near Beaumont found another incipient blaze in the same structure just after a passenger train passed. Investigations disclosed a small piece of steel about the size of a silver dime had been ground from a brake shoe and had fallen into a rotten cavity in cross-tie. Richards said that when the brakes were applied, friction had so heated the sliver that it ignited the spunk in the cavity. Possibly, railroads officials said, the cause of other fires in wooden structures on the railroad right of way had been found and they passed the discovery for general benefit.

Barriers At Arch Lifted For Legion

PARIS, Sept. 13 (AP)—When the American Legion parade passes in hushed silence through the Arc de Triomphe, Sept. 19 in the great procession of the convention, the heavy iron chains which surround the Arch and the Tomb of the Un-

known Soldier of France will be removed for the third time in history.

The last occasion was at the march of the allied armies under Marshal Foch in the victory parade of 1918. The first time was when the Germans passed through the arch in 1870. The Legion ranks will march straight through the arch.

The huge chain barrier sur-

rounds the arch in a circle. At night a guard is placed across entrances.

116 BOLLS ON COTTON
ESTELLE, Texas, Sept. 13 (AP)—A cotton stalk with 116 bolls and squares on it was the unusual specimen brought in here by a local farmer. The stalk was a volunteer plant. Its tap root was almost 3 feet long.

PLAN NEW BUILDING

Construction work has started here on a branch office of the West Texas Utilities company. The building has been announced by the chief engineer of the company, whose headquarters are in Abilene, as the most beautiful small building the company has yet constructed.

TOURISTS INCREASE

SAN ANGELO, Sept. 13 (AP)—Tourist crop has become so great here that the Board of City Development has taken official notice of it. It has created a tourist division and has directed his efforts toward erection of facilities for securing and taking care of tourists while traveling through here.

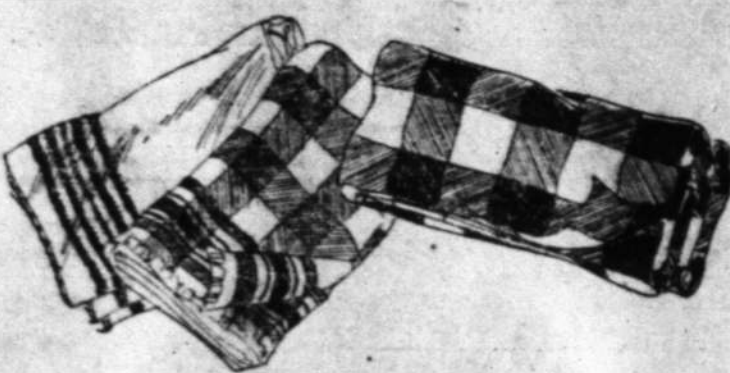

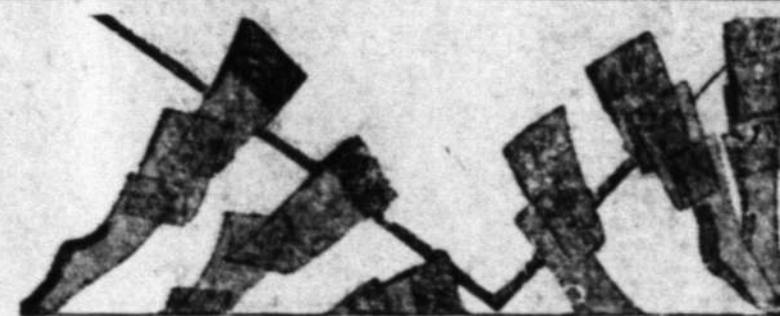
