County Wide Farmers Meeting To Be Held At Veterans Hall Monday Night

There will be a county-wide meeting of all farmers and farm bureau members in the Veterans Hall next Monday, March 1 at 7:30 p. m. in Morton. This is ladies night so bring all members of the family. Coffee and doughnuts will be served. There will be a round table discussion on Farm Bureau matters that are now confronting the farmers of the nation. This discussion will be led by D. E. Benham.

At this meeting 52 working members will be given a job to do. They will be divided into pairs consisting of 13 teams each. Each team will contact 26 prospective Farm Bureau members. They will explain what the Farm Bureau has done and is now doing.

The side that gets the least number of members will furnish the other side with a free steak supper about the middle of March. All teams will work about 2 days or as long as it takes them to contact the 26 members. The Board of Directors of the Farm Bureau has discussed and approved the above method of getting Farm Bureau members.

Ordinance Passed On Assessment Of Paving Project By City Commission

The City Commission met Monday night and passed an ordinance concerning the estimated assessment against owners of property abutting the street paving project.

Twelve of the fifteen blocks to be paved will be 60 feet wide from face to face of curbs and the estimated cost will be \$3.91 per front foot. The other three blocks will be 50 feet wide and the owners will be assessed approximately \$3.47 per front foot.

A hearing will be held before the Governing Body of the City March 12 in the City Hall. Any interested party will be fully informed as to the amount of assessment, benefits to be derived from the improved streets, regularity, validity and sufficiency of the contract.

Chester Lee Richards, 44, Cochran County resident of 20 years, died by suffocation Tuesday afternoon, when several hundred pounds of grain fell on him at the Hawkins Elevator at Lehman, according to a verdict returned by Alvin O'Pray, Justice of the Peace.

Richards, who had been helping load maize into a large tank container, had been missing approximately an hour and a half when a fellow workman in another part of the plant became alarmed and began a search which led to the discovery of the victim buried beneath the grain.

Help was rushed from here, including Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Dove who went out with the portable pulmotor. Approximately 45 men took turns in working to free Richards finally resorting to the use of a blow torch to cut into the side of the storage bin, permitting the grain to spill out side on the ground and allowing the body to be recovered.

Funeral services are tentatively scheduled for 2 p. m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church with Rev. W. C. Wright officiating. Interment will be here with Singleton Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Survivors include the wife and eight children: Mrs. Jaunita Newman, Mrs. Corine Chambers, R. V. Chester, Jr., Louis, E. Donald Ray and Billie Jean. The Richards lost two children several years ago. Other survivors include five sisters and four brothers.

Swing Of Southwest Farm Markets

Cotton, grains and livestock partly recovered recent losses last week, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration reports.

Cotton trading increased sharply at southwest markets, and prices advanced around \$3.50 a bale, Dallas closed Friday at 32 cents a pound.

Grains made a strong comeback from sharp declines of recent weeks. More active demand brought out materially increased marketings as the situation became more stable. Sorghums gained around 16 cents a hundred for the week, as corn advanced 19 to 23 cents a bushel, barley 16 cents, oats 5 1/2 cents and wheat 8 1/2 cents.

Hogs recovered mostly 50 cents to \$1 or more of recent losses during the week's trade, though off weights and sows suffered further losses at Wichita and Denver. San Antonio paid a top of \$23 for the week as Fort Worth gave \$23.50, Oklahoma City \$24, Wichita \$23.25, and Denver \$23.75. Sows ranged from \$16.25 to \$17.50.

Most cattle classes sold strong to \$1 higher for the week, though bulls tended lower at some markets and cows lost at Houston. Common to medium cows brought \$15 to \$18 at Houston and Wichita, while medium and good grades moved at \$17.50 to \$19 at San Antonio and \$17 to \$20 at Oklahoma City. Fort Worth bought beef cows from \$15.50 to \$18, as Denver took common to good kinds from \$16 to \$18.40. A spread of \$11 to \$15 took most canners and cutters, though Denver paid up to \$15.50.

Eggs sold lower at Fort Worth and poultry weakened slightly at Fort Worth and Denver, as most other southwest markets remained steady to firm. Dallas bought eggs around 40 cents a dozen, Fort Worth 40 to 42, and Denver 39 to 40. Fryers ranged from 33 to 35 1/2 cents a pound at Dallas, Fort Worth and New Orleans.

LOOKING AHEAD

By George S. Benson, President, Harding College, Searcy, Ark.

FALSE EARNINGS

Would a 3,500 per cent increase in wages or salary interest you? If your income sky-rocketed like that, you wouldn't be much worried about the high cost of living, would you? Wait a minute. Are you sure you'd be on easy street? Perhaps you will be surprised to learn that workers in France have had that amount of increase in their money earnings since 1914, and they still lack the necessities of life.

A brick layer in Paris worked 48 hours a week in 1914. He took home 45 francs a week, slightly less than one franc per hour. But today he gets 35 francs per hour. In 1914 he could buy four quarts of milk for his franc or a dozen and-a-half eggs. But today for an hour's wages he can buy less than three quarts of milk and barely 7 eggs—if he can find them. Both items, plentiful in 1914, are now hard to obtain.

Hold Your Own?

This means that there are things more important than increases in wages. The consequences of inflation are such that costs of living manage to keep a step ahead of wage boosts. The lesson is this: the average breadwinner cannot hold his own once the inflation spiral gets going. No matter how often wages are increased, he gets farther and farther behind.

Costs always outrun increased earnings—unless someone stops the spiral. To stop a runaway team, you have to do more than holler "Whoa!" You have to pull back on the reins, set your heels in the dirt, and maybe make a little sacrifice in terms of direction and effort. Inflation is like that. Some of us fail to see the brink of the precipice ahead. We take our increases, and discount the dire results.

\$10,000 Trifle

When I left China in 1936, a comfortable home could have been purchased there for 10,000 Chinese dollars. Today you'd be lucky to buy a loaf of bread for \$10,000. Matter of fact, a Chinese friend of mine recently enclosed a \$10,000 note to me in a letter. The note was not a gift, nor a repayment on a loan, nor a sum for investment. It was merely a souvenir, virtually worthless.

"Printing-press" money is sometimes resorted to by governments, in an attempt to keep ahead of problems created by inflation. In Germany during that period of financial havoc following World War I, the values of money in circulation were changed daily. Banks had to tally everything at the close of each business day. Nobody knew what money would be worth the next day.

Pull Together!

Oh, this can't happen to America! Anyone who utters that statement is confused, chances are. Actually it has already been happening to America. The spiral of inflation has cut down buying power, cheapened our money. To

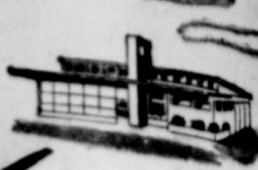

THE SOON COMING OF CHRIST Article 3.

The question has been raised time after time; Who are the Arabs? Where did they come from and why are they and the Jews fighting so? Let us make a close study of the Bible and see about all of this. Bear in mind that both the Jew and the Arab claim that the Lord promised this land to them. It is a settled fact that He did not promise this to both people. In studying Genesis we find that Abraham and Sarah became disturbed that they had no children. Knowing that the promise could only be fulfilled through their children, Sarah gave Hagar, her Egyptian maid to Abraham as a concubine. This was done that Abraham through her might begat children and so fulfill the promise. The son born to them were named Ishmael and Abraham was over 80 years old. In a short time Sarah conceived and both women bore a son and Sarah's son was named Isaac. Abraham offered Ishmael but God said no; It was through Isaac that all nations were to be blessed and not Ishmael.

Sarah and Hagar fought over their sons and Hagar had to leave for the safety of her child. They fought before the children were born, they fought after they were born and their descendants have been fighting ever since. Their fighting however holds no great significance, other than it is drawing the attention of the whole world. The thing to watch is the partitioning of Palestine. One of these days the Arabs are going to have to move out. I am not saying just when this will be, neither am I venturing to tell you just what will bring it about. However there are a few things of interest that I want us to notice and you can make your own conclusions.

The 35 chapter of Ezekiel tells us that the land will blossom like a rose. To day the waters of Jordan are being directed into the desert lands. These lands are on the eyes of being fruitful. If geological ideas continue this is going to be a great step in making this land bloom like a rose. Then we have the rich oil de-

posits of Iraq, the greatest in all the world. Then there is the great quantities of chemicals which has been discovered in the Dead Sea, to say nothing of the cattle and other things that they have. Noticing the 38th of Ezekiel gives an account of what will happen.

The northern quarters (perhaps Russia) will visualize the great riches of that country and will march down to get a prey. Then the rest, (perhaps Great Britain and the young Lions which are the nations that come out of Great Britain) will try to stop this move. This will be done but only when one sixth of her people remain. Just when this will happen no one knows but it seems that it might be very soon.

Spring Edition Of Texas Highway Maps Released

AUSTIN—The Spring Edition of the Texas Highway Department's official travel maps is being released for public distribution. State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer has announced.

The new four color map incorporates all changes in the state road system through December occasioned by the Department's vast postwar road building program.

There is a generous display of color pictures representing a cross section of the State's industrial and recreational assets.

A message from Governor Beauford H. Jester is printed on the cover. Addressing "Motorists everywhere," the Governor invites all to "see and travel in Texas, revel in its sunshine, its modern cities, and scenic beauty."

Except for revisions in the road system and the new pictures, the edition is similar to others issued since the war which have been acclaimed among the best of the state road maps published throughout the nation.

Size of the Lone Star State is again graphically told by a table of comparative distances. The 868 miles from El Paso to Orange is greater than the 815 miles from El Paso to Los Angeles. It is also further than the 760 miles from Laredo to Mexico City.

Included also is a small scale map of the United States showing all state capitals and major federal highways.

The Texas map is published under the direction of R. M. Stene, who performed all the cartography, made the color photographs, and attended to the technical details of production. At 76, Mr. Stene's boundless energy and versatile talent uphold his contention that "life begins at 70."

A registered professional engineer, he came with the Highway Department in 1927. He had previously built dams in Arizona and worked for railroads in Texas.

Copies of the new Spring Edition are available to the traveling public at the Highway Department's main office in Austin, its twenty-five district offices throughout the State, and at its nine information bureaus operated at ports of entry into Texas.

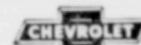

Ralph Brock, Lubbock, Announces For Senator From 30th. District

Candidacy of Ralph Brock, Lubbock Attorney, for Senator from the 30th State Senatorial District was announced Saturday.

Brock, 32, former Lubbock County Attorney before he waived deferred classification and volunteered for military service, was born on a Crosby County farm December 2, 1915. He was educated in Lubbock Public Schools, graduating from Lubbock High School in 1933 as the highest ranking boy scholastically.

He was a Texas Tech honor student from 1933 to 1935, then transferred to the University of Texas law school. He was graduated there was an LL. B. degree

in 1938 after receiving recognition for scholastic accomplishments, including appointment to membership of the Board of Editors of the Texas Law Review and, his last year, having been awarded a first prize for the best case note of the year.

Brock worked his way through high school, Texas Tech, and the University Law School. His work included employment in an ice plant, laborer, in the Texas Tech Library, a life guard at the Lubbock swimming pool, and as a newsboy. He was a guard on the state capitol ground, an elevator operator, a creamery employee, a clerk in a state senator's office, a mailing clerk in the state parks board, and an employee in the oil and gas division of the state Railroad Commission.

Brock began practice of law in Lubbock in June of 1938.

He was elected county attorney of Lubbock County in the summer of 1940, at the age of 24, and took office Jan. 1, 1941. Re-elected in 1942, he resigned to enter service, after waiving deferred classification. He entered service July 2, 1942, resigned the office he had been re-elected to without opposition, and relinquished the right to salary amounting to more than \$9,000. He separated from the U. S. Navy as a Lieutenant (senior grade) in October of 1945, having spent 40 months in service, 20 months of that time in the Pacific theatre aboard a seagoing tug.

Brock resumed practice of law in Lubbock upon separation from the Navy.

He is a member of the Board of Stewards and a Bible class teacher of the Methodist church, and a member of the American Le-

gion. Veterans of Foreign Wars, Knights of Pythias Lodge, and active in Boy Scout work and in civic improvement projects.

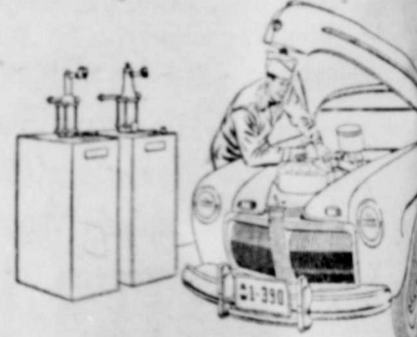

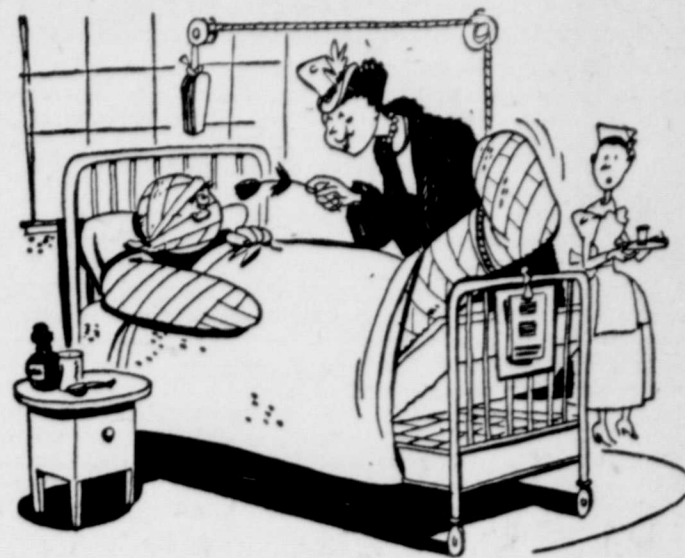

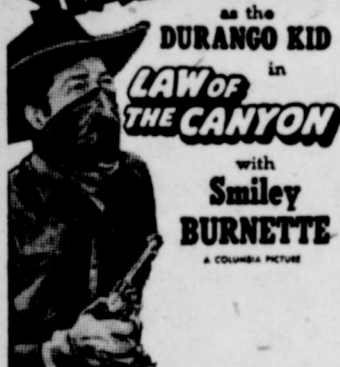
