TEXAS WAR VET RUNS AMUCK

Drys Ask More Authority In Enforcement

CLOSE OF PROBE FINDS ISSUE TO BE STILL ALIVE

BOTH WETS AND DRYS IN EAST CLAIM VICTORY DURING HEARING

(By the Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Apr. 26.—Blanket authority for the Treasury to issue such regulations as it may deem necessary to carry out the national prohibition act was proposed in one of five administration dry bills introduced today by Chairman Cummings of the Senate Judiciary committee and it immediately brought a chorus of protests from wet members of that branch of congress.
Some of the wet Senators sensed in the proposal a "joker" which they prepared to oppose with all the force at their command.
Even some of the dry Senators, declared that it would not get far in this congress.
The provision was attached to the and of one of the bills which would give the Treasury the right to review all liquor and alcohol permits annually and to refuse to renew any or all of them for cause.
"The prohibition commissioner with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury," the provision read, "may issue such regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of the prohibition act."

WASHINGTON, April 26.—The tumult and shouting of the Senate prohibition hearing have ceased, but the echoes continue to rumble through the capitol and elsewhere.
Both sides apparently are satisfied with their showing during the 3 weeks of testimony. The dries were confident that some of the bills they favored to put more teeth in the Volstead act would be recommended to the Senate. The wets were confident that they had placed their case against prohibition before the country; they would be as greatly astonished as any dries themselves if the committee should make a favorable report on any of their liberalization bills.

Many Statements Made.
A shower of statements that was to be expected after the conclusion of the hearing began Saturday and continued Sunday. Representative La Guardia, Progressive-Socialist, New York, offered a suggestion which he predicted would force the prohibitionists to "admit that the prohibition law cannot be enforced and must be modified."

His proposal was that Wayne R. Wheeler, general counsel of the anti-liquor league, be made prohibition director with a staff approved by "extreme dry advocates" and authority to do "anything they desire to enforce this law" between now and January or February.
Mr. Wheeler explained that he did not take the stand, as he had planned because of the "wets" plan to use up the dry's time by cross-examination. "As it was," he said, "a large part of the dry's time was consumed by filibuster cross-examination."

Disappointment Expressed.
James McGuire, chief assistant to Julien Codman of Boston, counsel for the wets, had expressed disappointment that Mr. Wheeler did not "substantiate this law" between now and January or February.

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LYNCH DAVIDSON PROPOSES A NEW PLAN OF MANAGING HIGHWAY WORK

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French Debt Plan To Be Revised, Is Commission's Rule

WASHINGTON, April 26. (P)—France must revise its new offer for settlement of its war debt to this country, the American debt commission decided today.

The decision of the American Commission to study the proposal put forward last week by French Ambassador Boremer, Secretary Mellon will confer with the Ambassador before negotiations are resumed.

Although France will be asked to modify its offer it was emphasized today by the American Commission that the latest discussions have not been terminated.

One of the principal hitches is how much France shall pay at the outset. Mr. Boremer proposed initial payments of \$25,000,000 annually but the commission is understood to desire higher first payments.

France To Pay England
LONDON, April 26. (P)—France will begin to pay her war debt to Great Britain during the British fiscal year. This was one outstanding announcement made by Chancellor of the Exchequer Winston Churchill today, in presenting the budget to the House of Commons. France's initial payment will be 4,000,000 pounds.

Mr. Churchill stated that he had received from Finance Minister Peret assurance that, without prejudice to the forthcoming negotiations, France undertook to make an unconditional minimum payment of this sum. He paid tribute to this action.

ject himself to cross examination by Senator Reed, the Missouri democrat, whose questioning of dry witnesses added many a colorful passage to the long record of testimony.

Senator Reed, said Mr. MacGuire, wanted to question the anti-saloon league counsel about reports that his organization is attempting to collect \$1 million dollars to be used in electing dry members of Congress.

Fund Charge Denied.
The million dollar fund charge was denied by Mr. Wheeler, who countered with a statement saying he had letters and literature showing that the wetts "ask for \$300,000 for this identical purpose in addition to the \$300,000 which they claim they have regularly."

The league's legislative committee, he added, "has sent out an appeal for \$50,000 to offset this," feeling that, "we can make one dollar go about as far as twelve of theirs."

United States Attorney Buckner of New York, whose estimates of cost of enforcing prohibition in that state drew fire from the drys, forwarded to the committee detailed memoranda to support his figures. In the basis of these, he calculated that, with the trial by jury eliminated, the cost would be \$70,076,125.

Estimate Defended.
He also defended his estimate that a bootleg business of more than \$1,000,000,000 a year was based on diversions of industrial alcohol alone. Taking the amount of denatured alcohol produced in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, and subtracting from it the output of a pre-war year multiplied by the normal rate of increase established in that period, he showed a difference of \$6,000,000 gallons, which he held was not reasonably required by industry.

The National Student Federation, with members in 400 colleges, meanwhile, has announced that it will poll 600 stations on the prohibition question.

Slight Damage Done by Service Station Fire

Fire originating in an oil stove at the steam plant for the wash rack of the Super Service Station at the corner of Broadway and Avenue M this afternoon shortly past 3 o'clock was brought under control by the Lubbock Fire department before any material damage was done.

The fire broke from the stove, but did not explode, coursed down a stream of gasoline on the floor to the engine nearby, where it ignited oil that ran off to a waste pit at the rear of the building, catching the waste oil and sawdust pile around it. The flames did not reach the building at any part, and the damage was negligible.

MEXICAN LAW ON DIVORCES IS QUESTIONED

TEST CASE HINGES UPON
DECREE GRANTED TO
RICH CHICAGOAN

(By The Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Apr. 26.—Whether Mexican divorces shall be recognized as valid in the United States, is the question upon which hinges the bigamy charges against Edward Washington Bucken, wealthy board of trade member.

Judge Joseph Sabbath has indicated he would defer decision a week pending examination of new briefs and of the Mexican law.

Mr. Bucken married Mrs. Lida M. Granger of Fort Wayne, Ind., shortly after his divorce from Mrs. Clara Bucken in Cuernavaca, state of Morelos.

Counsel for Bucken in a brief filed said:

"The fundamental rule of reciprocity between sovereigns is that on the principles of comity, a state shall recognize as valid a decree of divorce." Opposing counsel have called attention, the brief added "to the unseemly picture which is presented of would-be divorcees flocking to remote jurisdictions to attain ends not attainable at home."

To this defense rejoined that the "requirement for divorce under the Illinois statutes are not substantially different from those of the State of Morelos."

Bucken's counsel then moved to void the separate maintenance decree on the ground of prior divorce granted in Morelos.

Mr. Stevens, who came to Lubbock from Post two or three years ago, where he operated and still owns a dry goods business, plans to open a loan and commission office in Lubbock in the near future. His son, W. O. Jr., who had management of the store here after it opened until just recently, is now in school in Dallas, and will pursue his studies there.

WASHINGTON, April 26. (AP)—A majority of the Muscle Shoals committee today approved the bid of the Associated Power Companies for the property.

Two members of the committee, Senators Heflin, Democrat, Alabama, and Representative James, Republican, Michigan, refused to endorse the majority recommendations.

Man Falls To His Death In Efforts To Catch Burglar

NEW YORK, April 26. (AP)—Jack Kaye, fur salesman, is dead, a victim of his own tenacity in struggling with a burglar. He fell from a third floor fire escape landing. He heard a noise and investigated. Half-blinded by the burglar's light, he made for the man, who retreated toward the fire escape by which he had entered. The two grappled on the narrow third story landing and fell down one flight of stairs. On the landing below the burglar managed to push Kaye over the railing, but the fur salesman kept his grip on the burglar's coat collar. The salesman's sons, 14 and 12, aroused by their mother's screams, got to the window in time to see their father and the intruder fall. They say the burglar got up and ran away, holding his side as if hurt. They ran down the fire escape and found their father dead.

New Road Between Here And Olton Is Opened

SON OF RABBI TO FORSAKE HIS RELIGION

NEW YORK, April 26. (AP)—James Freeman Wise, 23 year old son of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Jewish liberal leader, has renounced his intention of becoming a Rabbi, and has severed all connection with organized Jewish theology. He is convinced Judaism, as a religion, "has ceased to play a vital part in Jewish life."

He studied two years to become a Rabbi. Now he intends to work to bind the Jews of America to gather on other grounds than those of religion, and will devote the next year to lecturing before groups of young Jews to find out how that can best be done.

Rabbi Wise, said the son, was disappointed at his decision not to become a Rabbi, "but all my life he has taught me it is more important to do what you believe is right than to do anything else."

"The modern Jew, the son thinks, is no nearer, however, to the acceptance of Christian doctrine."

"The religion of the future will deal with earthly, not the heavenly springs of human conduct," he asserts.

Rabbi Wise has made no comment on his son's action.

BERENGER'S PLAN APPROVED

PARIS, April 26. (AP)—The finance committee of the Chamber of Deputies generally approved Ambassador Berenger's tactics in the debt funding negotiations at Washington after Premier Briand and Finance Minister Dorel had explained the situation this afternoon. Consequently, it is learned, the final accord with the United States will find a favorable majority in the committee.

Corsicana Deaths From Autos Are 2 For The Week-End

CORSICANA, April 26. (AP)—A death toll of two is the record of an automobile accidents in Corsicana over the week-end. Saturday night W. S. Nichols, aged 71, pioneer Corsicana business man, met instant death when he stepped in front of an automobile. Late Sunday evening Leo Shivers, aged 19, high school student was killed when a car that he and four boy companions were riding collided with a telephone post in the Northern outskirts of the city. His companions escaped with minor injuries. A negro also sustained a broken leg when an automobile in which he was riding turned over Sunday morning East of Corsicana.

New Jersey Riots Cause Negroes To Flee From Church

CARTERET, N. J., April 26. (AP)—The church of the First Baptist negro congregation, from which negroes were driven by a white mob yesterday, was destroyed by fire early today. Race riots were threatened when Robert Ducaet, a negro was arrested late yesterday, charged with the fatal stabbing of John Carroll, a white boxer. Shortly after the Rev. George V. Reed, pastor, began the usual Sunday singing whites. evening services in the negro church, bricks and stones were hurled through the windows. The worshippers fled from the building and several were struck by stones thrown by the pur-

One-Time Hostler Now Ruler Of His Country-Persia

TEHERAN, Persia, April 26. (AP)—A one-time hostler in the stable of Persian Cossacks is now the ruler of the country.

Reza Khan Pehivi was crowned Shah yesterday amid scenes of Oriental splendor.

Soldier of fortune and bon vivant when he had money, Reza Khan was ambitious. In 1923 he carried out a coup d'etat and ordered the deposition of Shah Ahmed Kajar, who at the time was in Paris. He assumed the role of premier-dictator. At first he declared in favor of a republic but later announced his purpose to become monarch.

Although once a stable man, the new Shah comes from aristocratic stock. His father was master of ceremonies under two Shahs. Reza is described as a charming conversationalist, pianist of fine technique and a witty, well-informed man, speaking Russian, French and German.

At the coronation, Reza's young son, the Crown Prince, stood at the right side of the peacock throne. His father put on the crown with his own hands.

Marrs Wants \$15 Per Capita School Funds

AUSTIN, April 26. (AP)—S. M. N. Marrs, superintendent of public instruction, today urged the Governor, in event she calls a special session of the Legislature, to submit a supplemental appropriation for the State available school fund. He said a \$12 per capita appropriation is in sight for the next school year and inasmuch as there is \$5,000,000 in the general revenue fund, that the apportionment should be \$15.

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
