We quite often hear others speak of our very friendly town, our good school, and the far above average attendance in our churches. Boys and girls, as leaders in the future in our community, these will be records you will be challenged to meet. Do nothing in your youth that will keep you from being great leaders for the right principles in the future. Lakeview, Abernathy Favor Consolidation

Lakeview Independent school district and Abernathy County Line Independent school district are to be consolidated following favorable balloting at the two places Saturday. Patrons of Lakeview district voted, 43 for and 25 against, while at Abernathy, the balloting was 63 for and 1 against.

Seventy votes were cast in Lakeview trustee - consolidation election, and two of the ballots failed to indicate a choice in the consolidation question. Abernathy election counted 64 ballots, all being marked on the consolidation proposal.

The Hale county board of trustees is to divide the Lakeview district—the west half to Abernathy and the east part to Petersburg. Students in the Lakeview district are now attending the neighboring schools under transfer agreements.

Wednesday will be the big day for judging with both Holsteins and Guernseys to be classed. Milking Shorthorn entries will be judged on Thursday and that night Milking Shorthorn breeders will meet at 8 o'clock for their annual banquet.

The show will end Friday with sale at auction of 48 head of Milking Shorthorn cattle. The auction is scheduled to start at 1 p. m.

New Deal students are to participate in the Lubbock county interscholastic league meet to be held at Lubbock, April 6, 7 and 8.

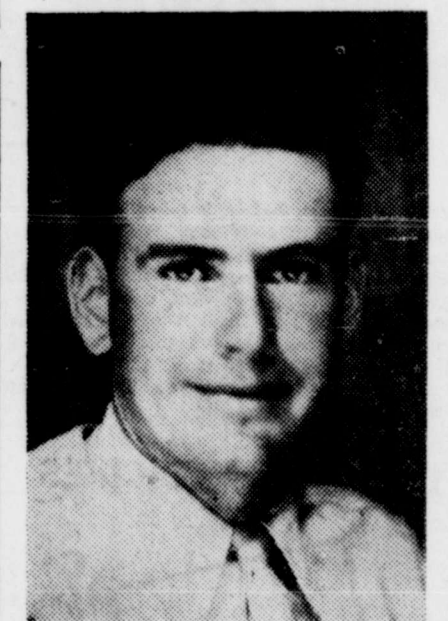

Ernest Tibbets Is County Judge Aspirant

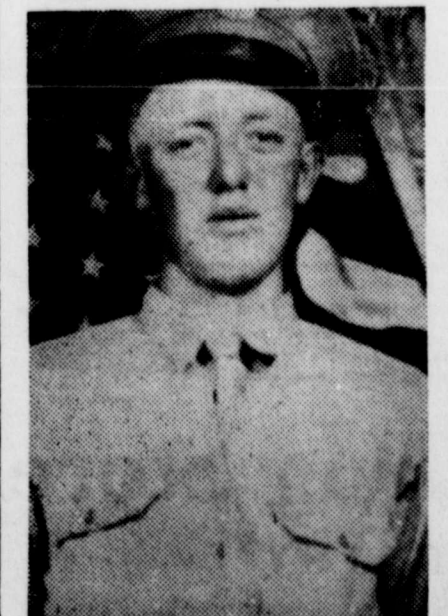
Ernest Tibbets has announced his candidacy for Hale county judge. He is now serving a second term as county attorney. In announcing his candidacy, he stated:

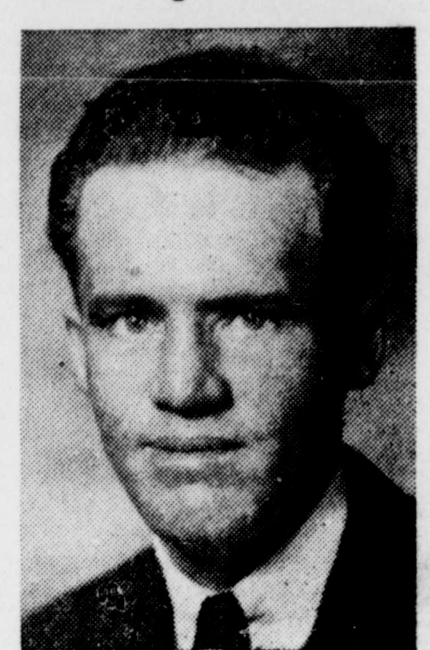

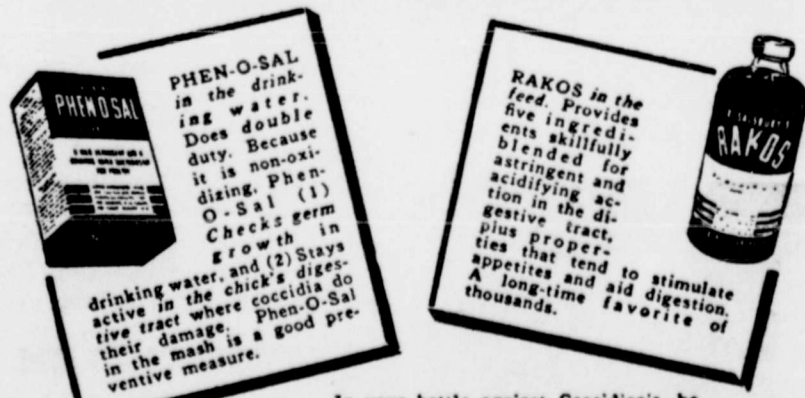

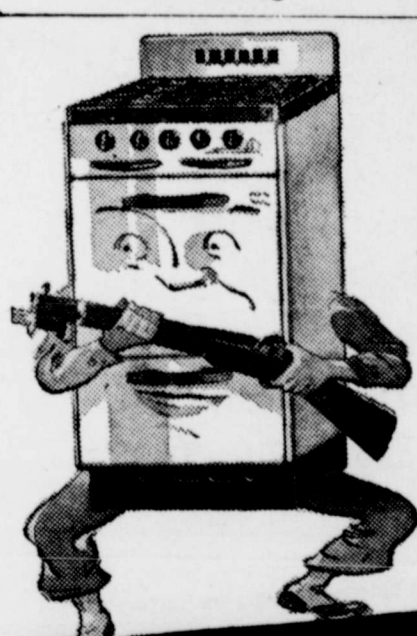

WARNING ISSUED BY OFFICIALS HERE

Warning was issued last week-end by officials against the practice of dumping trash in barrow pits along the highway and rural roads. The city maintains a dump ground a mile east of the northeast corner of the town section.

County Officials Ask Co-Operation

Concerning proper use of the dump ground, L. M. Rankin, county commissioner, issued an appeal for co-operation. The county road by the dump ground and the shoulders and barrow pits MUST NOT be used as a dump ground. Convenient lanes have been made through the grounds for use of those who haul trash. All trash and refuse must be put on the grounds and NOT ON THE COUNTY ROAD or right-of-way. Those who dump trash on the county road property are subject to prosecution, Rankin warned.

WHY MAKE DECLARATIONS?

Income tax declarations required by April 15, this year, of some 15 million persons, are a fundamental requirement in the "pay-as-you-go" system, the Bureau of Internal Revenue explains. Only by means of these declarations is it possible for the bureau to learn how much tax is due from those whose tax obligations are not completely met by funds withheld for that purpose by employers. If taxes are due, those who make deductions may pay the entire tax by April 15, or they must pay the first quarterly instalment of such tax at that time. Other instalments are due June 15, Sept. 15 and Dec. 15. Farmers are allowed to postpone declarations and payment

MATURITY DATES ON CCC LOANS LISTED

(Clip and Save This for Future References)

1942 Farm Storage Wheat Loans

Loans secured by 1942 farm stored wheat mature on April 30, 1944 and must be liquidated either by repayment of the loan plus interest and storage advance, if applicable or by delivery of the grain collateral to Commodity Credit Corporation as provided in the chattel mortgage.

Delivery of grain collateral shall be made to Commodity Credit Corporation Owned grain bins located at bin sites or to approved warehouses. Deliveries can be made prior to April 30, 1944 but must be completed prior to July 1, 1944.

1943 Farm Storage Loans

Wheat—1943 farm storage wheat loans mature on demand or April 30, 1945. However, these loans may be liquidated at any time by the repayment of the loan plus interest and storage advance.

Barley, Rye and Grain Sorghums

All farm warehouse storage barley and rye loans mature on demand on April 30, 1944. Farm and warehouse storage grain sorghum loans mature on demand or June 30, 1944. These loans will not be extended beyond the present maturity dates.

1943 Warehouse Storage Loans

Wheat—All 1943 loans on warehouse stored wheat mature on demand or April 30, 1944. If these loans are not repaid on or before the maturity date, the warehouse receipts securing the loans will be acquired by the Corporation.

Crop Insurance Indemnity Wheat (FCI)

All 1943 loans on "FCI" wheat mature on demand or April 30, 1944. If these loans are not repaid on or before the maturity date the wheat represented by the certificate of indemnity will be acquired by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

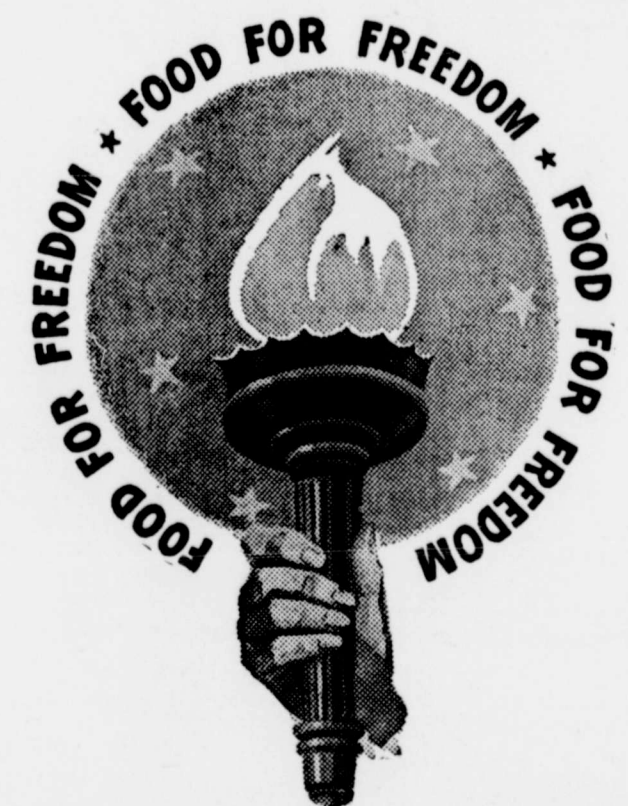
