Availability of some of the titles is limited, so they will be given out on a first-come, first-served basis.

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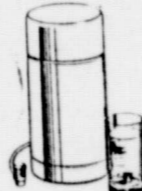
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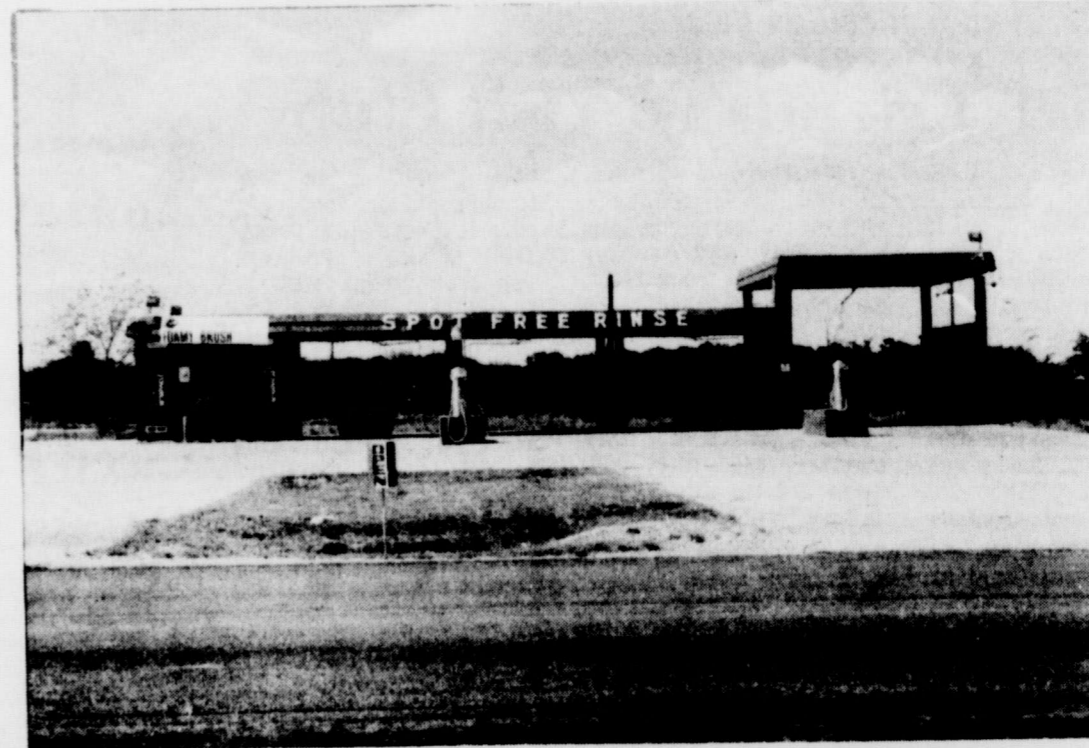
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Area News Briefs

About three days after the small larvae emerge from the eggs they begin eating into the pecans. For more information on pecan pest control and effective insecticides contact the County Extension office.

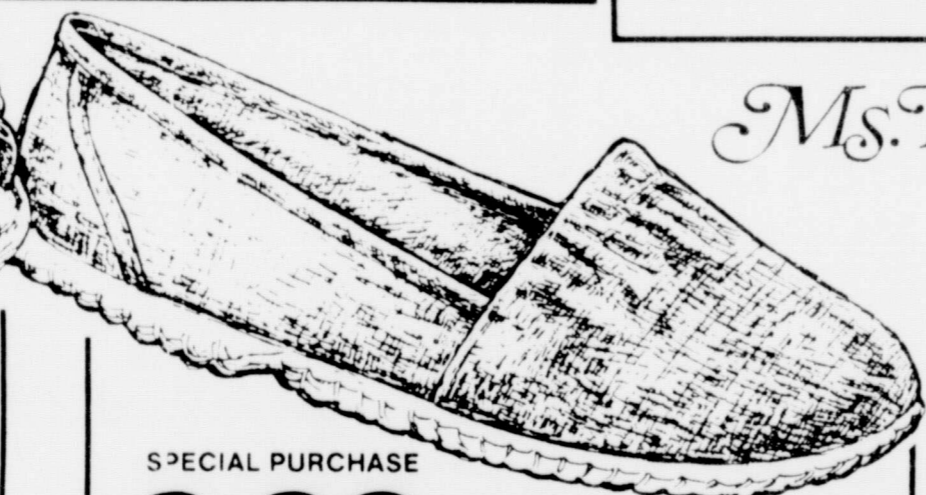

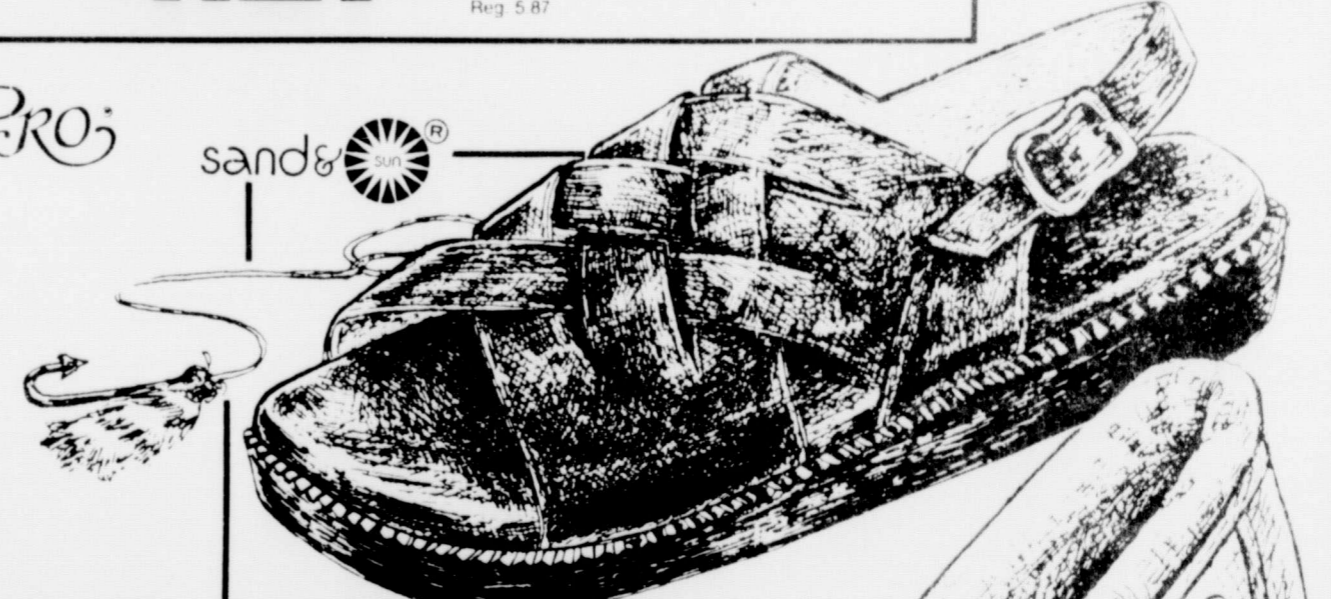

**Fishing
Outdoors**

"Wind - Friend or Foe"
Wind can be a fisherman's worst enemy, or his best friend.

At the first sign of wind, most boaters retreat to the protected side of the lake. Gamefish, on the other hand, head in the opposite direction. They'll often go into a feeding frenzy along the shoreline where the waves are crashing hardest.

Wind causes events which promote intense feeding activity. First, algae is stacked against the windy shoreline, creating a protective umbrella which blocks the sun's ultra-violet rays and allows fish to move shallow.

At the same time, zooplankton drifts shoreward, attracting baitfish. Warm surface water is pushed across the lake and stacked upon the windy shore. Oxygen levels are enhanced with every wave that breaks.

Soon, small fish like perch, bluegills and crappies arrive at the dinner table. They attract predators such as the large mouth bass.

When the wind precedes a frontal system signalling a change from several days of steady weather, be on the water.

In off-colored water, attractor baits like spinners, crankbaits, and spinnerbaits usually are most productive. The vibrations given off by these lures help gamefish locate their next meal. In extremely stained water, fluorescent colors are most visible to fish; shades of red and oranges are proven producers in dark water.

Look for shorelines with bottom-types, drop offs, or weeds, etc., most suitable for species you want to catch. For instance walleyes might be found near a point with a rock or gravel bottom. Bass might bunch up along the outside edge of a shallow weed bed. Cast, troll or drift fish these areas until you contact a school of fish.

The direction in the bait or lure is moving can be an important factor. Most fish like to share will be facing deep water, because food is coming from that direction. In this case trolling or drifting with the wind is preferred. Always use a "controlled" drift using your outboard or electric motor to maintain the proper speed and course.

If the fish move extremely shallow, which they often will, it's usually best to anchor and cast. When you've covered all of the water slip the boat downwind and anchor in new water.

Safety is a prime item. Always wear a personal flotation device and don't take unnecessary risks, no matter how good the fishing. Keep one eye on the shore and be ready to go if lightning approaches. Never overstep the limitations of your boat. If you have any doubt, head to shore immediately.

Fishing in the wind is uncomfortable at best, and can even get dangerous, but it's also an excellent time to catch a real tanker. And as always keep only what you can use and release the rest. Who knows, next time out you might have the chance to fight that same fish again.

Once again we are preparing for our annual BBQ to celebrate the opening of Northview in 1976. This will be our 12th year in operation as in Intermediate Care Facility for the Mentally Retarded. Prior to this date, the facility was licensed for nursing home care. Northview was the first private facility opened in the state to provide residential services for Level 5 clients. Our first 21 clients came from Abilene State School. A second group arrived from Abilene State School 2 months later. At that time, the facility had, and was licensed for 48 beds. Five years later in 1981, 6 beds were added to make our present licensed capacity of 54. We currently are at census capacity, but are always looking for potential clients since we move as many clients as are eligible to lesser restrictive environments or nursing homes, depending upon age and needs. Our ultimate goal is always to promote quality care and insure that each client is provided individualized training so that he or she may achieve the highest degree of independence. For those clients who have accomplished all levels of training we offer, placement is sought in a lesser restrictive environment such as a Level I. A Level I facility has

daily activities such as laundry, house cleaning, meal service, all done by the clients under supervision. The purpose is to achieve a normalized, homelike environment. In Level I's, clients self-medicate and do not have round the clock nursing personnel on duty. In contrast, a Level 5 provides housekeeping, laundry, nursing, and dietary services. Training is provided in these various areas so that clients may achieve greater independence. The staff of Northview provides our clients with a caring, supportive, home-like environment. Unlike a nursing home or hospital, we foster independence as opposed to dependence. Visitors to the facility are always impressed with the feeling of well-being and happiness are clients exhibit. Most visitors have no idea what to expect, but time and time again, I'm told how much they enjoyed the facility and how friendly and happy the clients appear. We are proud of the quality of life that is provided for each client.

Peanut producers in Eastland County can now get the latest market information through a 24-hour national toll-free hotline.

By calling 1-800-346-1066, producers can access a brief, taped message concerning the peanut market and other issues of concern. Recorded messages are updated as needed, once or twice weekly in the off season and daily during the peak marketing period.

In addition to current peanut market information, the service also provides timely reports on such issues

as peanut contracts, legislation, and rules and regulations.

The hotline is provided by the Agri-Products Marketing Services, Inc., whose staff collects, edits and narrates the hotline information. The hotline is supported by state peanut producer organizations, including the Texas Peanut Producers' Board and several commercial companies that serve the peanut industry.

New testing procedures for detecting sulfamethazine and other sulfa products in slaughter hogs will be discussed at an educational meeting at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at Stephenville on May 26th, at 7:30 p.m.

The meetings will be conducted by the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service to brief swine producers and veterinarians on a new sulfa screening program that uses the sulfa-on-site (SOS) test. The SOS test is a quick, in-

plant urine screening test.

By May 28, federal meat inspectors in each major U.S. packing plant will use the SOS test to screen urine from up to six hogs per day. The new testing procedures will effect most Texas producers who sell market-weight hogs.

Sulfa residues can be a particular problem in slaughter-weight hogs fed on dirt or collected for sale at gathering points or auction sales on dirt because sulfa products stay in the environment for years.

In addition to the new SOS test, information will be presented on proper methods for using sulfa products and on procedures for dealing with positive SOS tests. Extension Service Veterinarian Dr. Bruce Lawhorn will be on hand to lead the discussion and to answer questions.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-88-5
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TWO PERCENT GROSS RECEIPTS TAX ON THE CONDUCT OF BINGO GAMES WITHIN THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS; CONTAINING A CUMULATIVE CLAUSE; AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; ORDERING PUBLICATION; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, The City of Cisco has voted to legalize bingo within the city limits of the City of Cisco pursuant to Art. 179(d), V.A.T.C.S.; and WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3 (B) of Art. 179(D), V.A.T.C.S., the governing body of the City of Cisco may impose a two percent (2%) gross receipts tax on the conduct of bingo games within the city;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That there is hereby levied a two percent (2%) gross receipts tax on the conduct of bingo games within the City of Cisco.

SECTION 2. The provisions of this ordinance are to be cumulative of all other ordinances governing or regulating the same subject matter as that covered herein; provided, however, that all prior ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of any such consistency or conflict.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause

or phrase of this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such holdings shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Council of the City of Cisco hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase hereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases be declared unconstitutional or invalid.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall become effective upon second and final passage and the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to publish the descriptive caption of this ordinance in the manner and for the length of time prescribed by the Charter of the City of Cisco.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-88-6
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS CLOSING OAKWOOD CEMETERY DURING NIGHTTIME HOURS; PROHIBITING USE OR RESIDENCE DURING SAID HOURS; PROVIDING A PENALTY; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Oakwood Cemetery has suffered extensive and continuing incidences of vandalism; and
WHEREAS, Oakwood Cemetery is a convenient and attractive location for illegal or illicit activities during the nighttime hours; now, therefore,
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS THAT:

PART 1: Oakwood Cemetery shall be closed to the public during nighttime hours, with specific hours of closing to be established by the City Council. During said hours that Oakwood Cemetery is closed, it shall be unlawful for any person to use, stay in or otherwise occupy said facility.

PART 2: The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to city employees or other authorized individuals in the course of their normal or assigned duties.

PART 3: Violations of provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a misdemeanor. Any person who violates this section shall upon conviction thereof be fined in accordance with Section 1-11 "General Penalty" of the City's Code of Ordinances. Each day such violation continues can be considered a separate offense.

PART 4: This ordinance shall be effective upon final approval.

The letter "r" stands for relatives that can cause stress.

The letter "e" stands for excuses people can give others that can make their life stressful.

The "s" is for sharing a family. A stressful situation can be in a home with either step fathers, step mothers or step children.

The "s" is for schools. Students and teachers alike have to deal with things such as HB-72 and the pressures of passing or failing.

Mrs. Thomas said, "The 'u' stands for how much you criticize yourself or if you set your standards too high."

The "r" is for a person's

residence. Is this the neighborhood or home where a person wants to live?
