Reward offered for criminals' arrest

Colorado City resident Wesley Smith has had enough. He was asleep in his garage apartment at 744 Hickory last week, when an unknown person or persons entered the garage. The suspects stole bicycles, tools and paint, while ransacking his cars. According to Smith, between \$600 and \$800 worth of property was stolen, while he slept.

Smith is offering a \$500 reward for the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for this crime.

"It scares me," Smith said. "I sleep with a gun beside me. If I had awakened during this, I might have been forced into a position where I had to shoot someone. That would be hard to live with if I found out it was someone's kid."

According to the Colorado City Police Detective Kelsey Alexander, that may be exactly who

these people are, kids.

"We believe we are looking for juveniles in this case," she said. "The evidence collected at the scene suggests that at this point, but we will know more once the evidence is processed."

Alexander said the police department has been seeing a lot of what they call BMV's (burglary of a motor vehicle) recently.

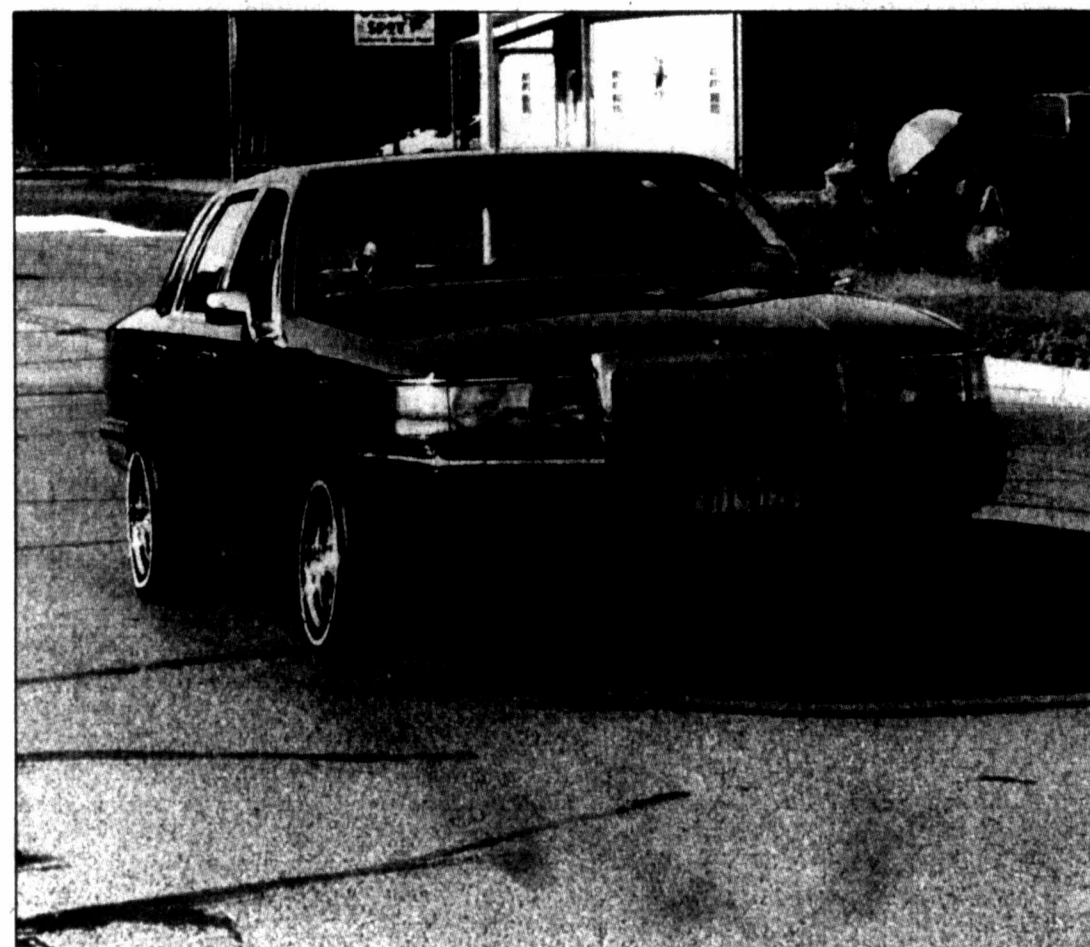
Spray paint stolen from Smith's property is believed to have been used on a neighbor's fence. "853 West Side" was written on the fence, along with several symbols, not immediately discernible. Smith said he had to change his way of life because of the incident.

"I got security lights up and the garage is locked and chained up now," he said.

Smith said he believed there had been a vehicle involved in

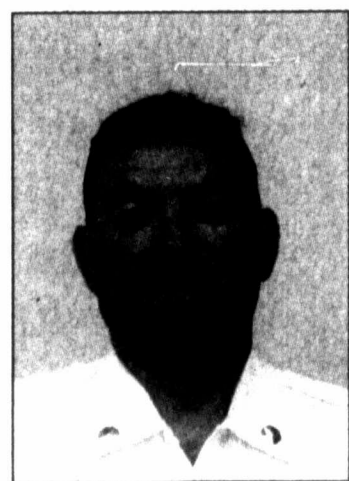
Chief Owens marks 1-year anniversary with fewer crimes

Report shows a reversal of upward trend in cases

It was a year ago this month when Colorado City reached out to 20-year lawman from San Angelo and asked him to be the city's next police chief. Roy Owens accepted the position and has spent the last 12 months bringing the department under control — and bringing it together.

His officers claim a vast improvement in morale within the department since Owens joined their ranks, making the job something they enjoy doing again, but according to Colorado City's Chief of Police, the officers get all the credit.

"All the credit goes to these guys right here," Chief Owens said, pointing across the room at two of the city's officers, Officer Nick Holbrook and Sergeant Traven Berrie. "They simply

make me look good." Criminal mischief cases are down 37 percent and theft in Colorado City has dropped 30.4 percent over the last year, com-

pared to the previous year. Most remarkable is the amount of alcohol related incidents within the city. They have dropped 48 percent.

But the officers have a different take on the improvement. According to Sergeant Berrie, the credit does go to the new police chief.

"It's because of the leadership we have that makes us want to come to work," Sergeant Berrie said. "It makes us want to get out and do the job."

Overall, the city's total cases have dropped 20 percent since the previous year, from 1031 to 824. Sergeant Berrie, who compiled the report, said he knew the previous three years the reports had steadily been going up. To

Rattlesnakes out and about during summer

With summer officially here, there is one unwelcomed visitor ready to rear its ugly head in Colorado City, rattlesnakes. Donna Overton of the Colorado Animal Control said her department has not been called out on a rattlesnake call yet in 2012, but they have responded a couple of calls involving Bull snakes.

"We try to take them somewhere else and release them," Overton said. "They keep the mice population down and that's a good thing."

A low population of mice is a good thing because that is generally what rattlesnakes are looking for. High weeds, wood piles and just everyday junk lying around a house is a welcome mat to the mice...and the rattlesnakes which hunt them.

Overton said if anyone thinks they have a rattlesnake, they should call her office at 728-5294.

One Mitchell County man is

in the hospital in Lubbock, due to a recent rattlesnake bite. According to a family friend, Roger Davidson was on life support after being bitten.

According to Robbie Dewberry, CEO of Mitchell County Hospital District, the hospital has seen two cases in the last six months.

"We keep the antivenin on hand here at the hospital," Dewberry said. "When a case comes in, we evaluate, along with a hospital we plan to transfer the patient to, and decide if a dose should be administered here before the transfer. It is really based on the accepting hospital's evaluation."

According to the Texas Department of Health and Human Service's website, about 7,000 people are bitten annually in the United States, with 1-2 Texans dying each year.

Common symptoms of a rattlesnake bite include: blurred

vision, convulsions, dizziness, excessive sweating, fainting, fang marks, fever, increased salivation, localized pain and burning, muscle contractions, muscle incoordination, vomiting, numbness and tingling, rapid pulse rate, skin discoloration, swelling in the bite area, thirst, tissue death and weakness.

What to do for snake bite victims include

Move the victim safely away from the snake. If you see the snake, try to remember what it looks like or take a digital picture of it if you can do so without putting yourself at risk. This will aid the doctor in determining which antivenin is needed.

Do not attempt to capture the snake; however if the snake is dead, place it in a suitable container and bring it with you to the hospital for identification. Be careful to avoid contact with the dead snake's head however, as it may be able to bite reflexively for

a short time after death.

Keep the victim, and yourself, calm.

Remove jewelry or constricting clothing from the victim quickly, before any swelling begins.

Lift the bitten limb so that it is level with the heart. Raising it above heart level could hasten distribution of the venom to other parts of the body. Holding the limb below heart level could lead to increased swelling of the affected limb.

Limit movement of the bitten limb and avoid any unnecessary exertion by bringing transport to the victim, if possible.

Gently wash the bite wound with soap and water, if available.

Call 911 if available and seek medical attention immediately. If you are transporting the victim to a hospital, call ahead so that the medical staff can prepare the antivenin for administration upon arrival.

Commissioners approve the hiring of new extension agent for Mitchell County

Results from exterior audit are returned to county

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court met in a regular meeting Monday and was given the results of an outside audit of the county's finances for the year 2011. The audit showed an increase of \$1,423,000 in funds, with an increase of over \$550,000 in the General Fund and \$843,601 increase in the Bridge Fund. The increase was attributed to an increase in tax collections.

The funds in the General Fund exceeded the budgeted amount by \$1,080,000, as the total capital assets of the county rose to \$2.4 million.

In other business, the court approved the hiring of Robert Ferguson as the county's new Agriculture Extension Agent. Ferguson, originally from Westphalia, just south of Waco in East Texas, has an Agriculture Development degree and has completed an internship in another county prior to applying for the position in Mitchell County.

Commissioner Jeremy Strain asked Ferguson if he planned to go back to East Texas in the near future. Ferguson responded, "Not anytime soon. I would like to build the

program here back up and I don't see that as something that can be done in a year or two. I see it taking as much as seven or eight years."

The commissioners approved his hiring unanimously, with the exception of Jesse Munoz (Precinct 3), who was not at the meeting.

In other business, the court approved the county's investment policy. There were no changes to the existing policy, which requires the court's approval annually. Also, the commissioners approved the county's payroll of \$68,261.10

Agriculture department offering grants for rural Texas downtowns

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples today announced the Texas Department of Agriculture is accepting applications for federal funds totaling \$1.2 million to revitalize downtown areas in rural Texas. Annually, the Texas Capital Fund awards \$50,000 to \$150,000 in federal grants to rural Texas cities. The grants help fund public infrastructure projects aimed at creating new economic development

opportunities in historic downtown areas.

"Rejuvenating a community's downtown area helps spur business, tourism and entrepreneurship, which leads to job growth," Commissioner Staples said. "Through the Texas Capital Fund, each of the awarded towns will realize the kinds of improvements and upgrades that add vitality and appeal to the community's most visited areas."

The Texas Capital Fund, federally funded through the Texas Community Development Block Grant program, provides more than \$8 million in competitive awards each year to boost economic development in small Texas communities. Projects eligible for funding include land acquisition for public infrastructure; road construction and traf-

fic signals; sidewalk and lighting improvements; and ADA compliance upgrades.

The Texas Capital Fund is administered through TDA's Trade and Business Development division and provides funding for projects through four different programs: Infrastructure Development, Real Estate Development, Main Street Improvements and Downtown Revitalization.

The deadline for submitting applications is July 12, 2012, by 5 p.m.

The Colorado ISD Board of Trustees welcomed new member Henry Reyna to their group when they met Monday in a regular meeting of the school board. Reyna was sworn in by Sheila Redwine and was issued a Certificate of Election.

In other business, the board approved a proposal to consider the greenhouse at Colorado Middle Scholl surplus property and begin the process of accepting bids for the property. Superintendent Reggy Spencer asked that a \$200 minimum bid be placed on the greenhouse.

The board also approved a proposal to allow the FFA officers at Colorado High School to attend the National FFA Convention in October. The convention will be held Oct. 23-28.

After a closed session, the board announced it would accept the resignations of Christie Andrews, Koby Andrews, Jeran Cannon, Nancy Escobar, Ted-dye Harris and Kakai Wulfjen. It was also announced the district would hire Reese Walker.

The board also moved the July monthly meeting from July 9 to July 16, due to the Fourth of July holiday.

Superintendent Spencer gave the board updates on the school's insurance claims after the recent hail and rain storms. Spencer said the claim, which included all shingled roofs in the district, two skylights and a sprinkler system, was approaching the \$60,000-\$70,000 range on a policy which carries a \$5,000 deductible. Spencer said water damage at the administration building would not be covered, since the water came into the building under the door and the district does not have flood insurance.

FSA county committee nomination period begins

Mitchell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Keith Hiser, announced that county committee election nominations begin June 15, 2012. Farmers, ranchers and landowners are encouraged to nominate farmer and rancher candidates to serve on their local FSA county committee by the August 1, 2012 deadline.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity, and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues.

"County Committees are unique to FSA and are a valuable resource that gives locally elected farmers and ranchers who participate in FSA programs the opportunity to impact farm

programs at the local level," said Hiser. "I hope to see a high level of participation during the nomination and election process," he said.

Producers may nominate themselves or others as candidates. Organizations that represent minority and women farmers and ranchers may also nominate candidates. Nominees must participate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area (LAA) in which the person is a candidate. To become a nominee, eligible individuals must sign form FSA-669A. The form and more information about county committee elections are available online at: www.fsa.usda.gov/elections.

"In order to have fair repre-

sentation of the demographics and agricultural interests in the community, I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers to participate in the nomination and election process," said Hiser.

County committees are comprised of three to five members elected by local producers. All newly elected county committee members and alternates will take office January 1, 2013.

Nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 1, 2012.

Beware of rental scam

According to a local realtor, there is a new scam game in the area, but the advice remains the same: buyer beware. Or in this case, renter beware.

Becky Seibold, real estate agent for Larry Jones, says she has come across a new spin on an old scam. Scammers are targeting this area due to a large demand on a short list of rental property. Ads have been placed on several internet advertising sites such as Craigslist, advertising rental property. Ads claim the property is up for rent, and in some cases, even provide photos of the property.

The scam is that there is no rental property available. In a few cases, the property is real but not

available, in others, the property doesn't even exist.

Those answering the ads are, most often, from out-of-the-area and cannot view the properties in advance. Due to the rental property shortage, people moving to the area are willing to send in deposits on houses sight-unseen, just to hold a place for them to live.

Internet advertising sites are not the only place where the scam ads can be found. One of the false ads appeared in an area daily newspaper.

Seibold urges those in the market for a rent house to check with local realtors or abstract offices to verify the owner of the properties listed as rentals.

MCHD receives \$50,000 grant for new ambulance

For over 30 years, the Mitchell County EMS has been committed to providing quality emergency medical services to residents. For about six years, the department was in need of a new ambulance. Thanks to the recent announcement from the Texas Department of Agriculture's Rural Health Facility Capital Improvement Loan Fund Program, Mitchell County Hospital District was awarded \$50,000 to be used toward the purchase of a new ambulance, replacing one that was aging and becoming unreliable.

Upon ordering and receiving the new ambulance, the hospital will be required to match \$5,000 from its general operating fund. The cost of the new ambulance is approximately \$118,000.

"The unit we will be replacing has logged over 80,000 miles. The number of monthly repairs are becoming more frequent and have made this unit very unreliable to utilize for transporting patients and responding to calls," said Jason Gruben, EMS Director.

Mitchell County EMS normally runs three ambulances at a time, including the one being

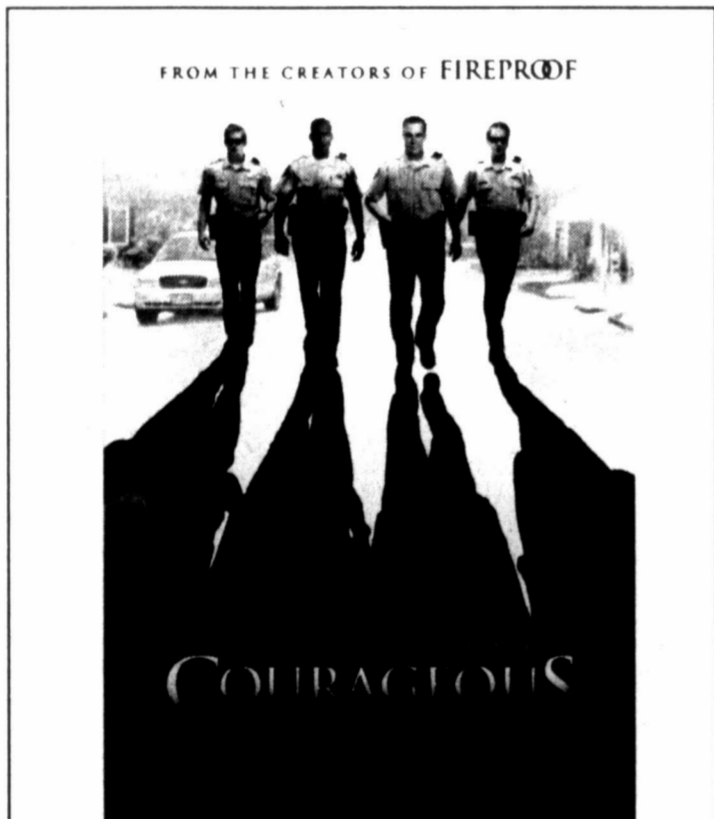
replaced. The EMS service averages 80 runs a month in addition to making 25 transfers a month. They continually provide 911 emergency services to Mitchell County which includes Colorado City, Loraine, and Westbrook; transport services to two nursing homes, a dialysis center and the Wallace and Ware Medical Units, as well as answer the calls of emergency services to many residents that have medical emergencies or residents and commuters that come to the local emergency rooms.

"We transfer patients to tertiary care units in San Angelo, Abilene, Lubbock, Midland and Odessa. We also participate in mutual aid with other EMS facilities in the surrounding counties such as Scurry, Nolan, Fisher, Coke, Sterling and Howard. Receiving this grant makes it possible to accommodate patients without hesitation and reliability," said Robbie Dewberry, hospital CEO. "We are very appreciative of the grant award and look forward to purchasing the new ambulance soon. We have also applied for grant funding for the new ambulance through the EMS Local Project Grant to offset the purchase price of the ambulance as well. We will know

the results of this award in late July 2012."

In addition to grant monies to help support the hospital purchase updated equipment, local support for this project has also been stated. "Mitchell County Hospital District is to be commended for seeking funds to replace an aging and less than reliable ambulance that is not in service," said Mitchell County Judge Ray Mayo.

Mitchell County EMS currently employs eight full-time and seven part-time employees, that include 12 paramedics and three EMTs who are all "Here to Serve."

TUMBLEWEED SMITH A military museum like no other

We arrived at the National WW2 Museum in New Orleans at 9 a.m. just as it was opening for the day. There was still some lingering excitement from the previous day when the three millionth visitor walked through the doors.

Helpful volunteers, who were the age of WW2 veterans, greeted us. As soon as we entered the display floor, we realized we would probably spend the day there because there were so many things to see and hear. We took time out for lunch at the Stage Door Canteen where we listened to three women sing Broadway songs from the war years. We returned to the displays and left just before 4 p.m.

Visitors soon learn it is not a place to rush through. Small plaques on the wall contain excerpts from wartime letters written by servicemen or little tidbits about the war. Numerous oral histories are available with the touch of a button. Small rooms show short movies about the experiences of men who fought the war. Glass cases hold everything from ammunition and weapons to uniforms, packs and equipment. All battles of both the European and Pacific fronts are documented.

The glamour attraction is a 45-minute film, *Beyond All Boundaries*, narrated by Tom Hanks and directed by Steven Spielberg. It is shown in a 4-D theater where audiences experience the smell of gunfire, a snowstorm, come face to face with a large cannon, get caught in the spotlight of a POW prison guard tower and feel the rumble of a tank during fighting in Africa. The theater has sound coming from 27 speakers. The 250 seats are equipped with full oscillating vibration. The film shows 305 archival photographs and more than 500 film clips. Some 6,000 hours were spent searching through photographs and films.

The museum, which opened in June of 2000, is in New Orleans primarily because of Andrew Higgins and novelist Stephen Ambrose (*Band of Brothers*). Ambrose taught history at New Orleans University and Higgins had a boat manufacturing facility in New Orleans that built the landing craft used in most of the amphibious landings during the war. Eisenhower said the Higgins boats won the war.

Congress has designated the facility in New Orleans as the Official WW2 Museum. It is affiliated with the Smithsonian and is in the midst of a 300 million dollar expansion on its six-acre campus. The museum was closed for three months after Katrina. During the storm the gift shop was looted.

I asked one of the volunteers what the D stands for in the phrase D-Day. He told me that is the second most frequently asked question at the museum, just behind "Where are the restrooms?" Historians and etymologists are still trying to figure out the answer. Some say it just stands for Day; any important invasion or military operation. There were several D-Days all during the war in the Atlantic and Pacific. Other suggestions are disembarkation and decision. General Eisenhower said it stands for departure date, shortened to D-Day.

I was still a part of the night, though my time was spent behind the camera or on the side streets, trying to stay out of the way.

Still, no matter how old I get — how wise or respectable — there is a Midnight Black '68 Ford Mustang with my name on it. It has a bored-out 428 under the hood and can go from zero to SEE-YA, in just under five seconds.

We were made to find each other, be it in this life or another. We were intended to squeal the tires, slide the rear end just a bit and dust that kid in his daddy's Camaro. We will not apologize.

For now, however, I will simply settle for loading the family up in the Mystery Machine and pulling into Sonic for some chocolate shakes. But don't let the gentle nature of my van fool you. It has about six seconds of racing left in it and it may have been saving that just for you.

have it drop 20 percent this last year is nothing short of what he called "amazing."

Chief Owens said he saw his position as one of leadership, as opposed to simply barking orders.

He said his position created a natural line of separation between himself and the officers, but it was a very fine line.

"I don't know that any of us actually 'hang out,'" Chief Owens said. "That fine line between

being the chief and being a friend is there, but I do get phone calls inviting me over for an occasional meal."

It was immediately after Chief Owens said this when the relationship he has with his officers was thrown out into plain sight for all to see, as Sergeant Berrie began to speak.

"Or, I'll get a phone call at nine o'clock at night saying do you have a triple charger I can borrow?" he said, quoting his

boss and sending the entire room into fits of laughter, before continuing. "Can I borrow your lawn mower? Do you have an extra hammer?"

The closeness the men felt with their boss was evident as they joked back and forth, but then the chief got serious and said, "We are doing all this, reducing the arrests and coming together as a tight unit, while still short on an officer. I was told before the previous city manager left and

even the interim city manager that they did not support me getting another officer because we did not generate enough money for the city."

According to Chief Owens, requiring his department to raise a certain amount of money was the same as putting a quota on the department. Currently, Texas is the only state in the nation which has a law against law enforcement agencies having a quota.

PASS = Person Appointed to Stay Sober

Summer, a time for fun and celebration. But it also brings many alcohol-related crash fatalities.

Because of this, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is launching its first summer drinking and driving outreach program to encourage Texas drivers to designate a Person Appointed to Stay Sober (P.A.S.S.) before enjoying those drinks.

"A day on the beach, barbecues, outdoor concerts or just lazing the day away on the river, summer days are definitely great fun. But folks should put as much thought into planning for a sober ride home as they do into summer event planning,"

said Carol Rawson, TxDOT Traffic Operations Division director.

"Be sure to include a P.A.S.S. for those events where you plan on drinking," she added.

"It's not cool to drink and drive, even in the heat of the summer," she said. "Be safe, plan ahead, designate a P.A.S.S."

In Texas, 35 percent of all alcohol-related fatal crashes occur in the summer months between May and August. In 2011, there were 321 alcohol-related fatal crashes, resulting in 362 fatalities in that same time period.

Drinking and driving continues to be a national and statewide problem. In 2011, there

were 24,151 DUI alcohol-related crashes in Texas resulting in 1,038 deaths and 15,960 injuries.

According to a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration survey, 40 percent of drivers who consumed alcohol felt it would be safe to have three or more drinks within a 2-hour period before driving. A portion of that 40 percent actually believed they could have five or more drinks.

The reality is quite different. While the signs of impairment differ with the individual, alcohol steadily decreases a person's ability to drive a motor vehicle safely, and the more a person drinks, the greater the effect. In single-vehicle crashes, the rela-

tive risk of a driver with BAC between .08 and .10 is at least 11 times greater than for drivers with a BAC of zero, and 52 times greater for young males. Further, many studies have shown that even small amounts of alcohol can impair a person's ability to drive.

All 50 states have made it illegal to drive with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .08 or higher. But many people, especially young adults, continue to drink and drive. In fatal crashes, the highest percentage of drivers with a BAC level of .08 or higher was for drivers, ages 21 to 24 (35 percent), followed by ages 25 to 34 (32 percent).

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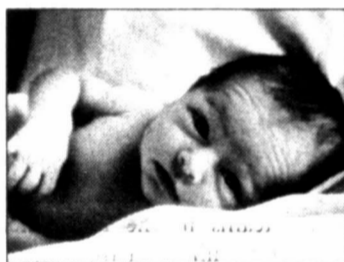
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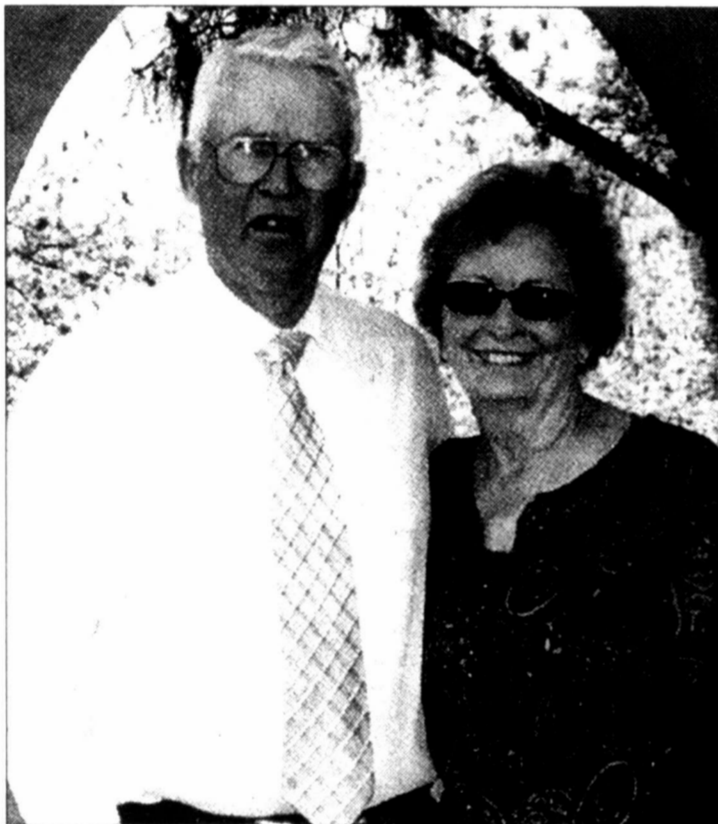

said Carol Rawson, TxDOT Traffic Operations Division director.

"Be sure to include a P.A.S.S. for those events where you plan on drinking," she added.

"It's not cool to drink and drive, even in the heat of the summer," she said. "Be safe, plan ahead, designate a P.A.S.S."

In Texas, 35 percent of all alcohol-related fatal crashes occur in the summer months between May and August. In 2011, there were 321 alcohol-related fatal crashes, resulting in 362 fatalities in that same time period.

Drinking and driving continues to be a national and statewide problem. In 2011, there

were 24,151 DUI alcohol-related crashes in Texas resulting in 1,038 deaths and 15,960 injuries.

According to a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration survey, 40 percent of drivers who consumed alcohol felt it would be safe to have three or more drinks within a 2-hour period before driving. A portion of that 40 percent actually believed they could have five or more drinks.

The reality is quite different. While the signs of impairment differ with the individual, alcohol steadily decreases a person's ability to drive a motor vehicle safely, and the more a person drinks, the greater the effect. In single-vehicle crashes, the rela-

tive risk of a driver with BAC between .08 and .10 is at least 11 times greater than for drivers with a BAC of zero, and 52 times greater for young males. Further, many studies have shown that even small amounts of alcohol can impair a person's ability to drive.

All 50 states have made it illegal to drive with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of .08 or higher. But many people, especially young adults, continue to drink and drive. In fatal crashes, the highest percentage of drivers with a BAC level of .08 or higher was for drivers, ages 21 to 24 (35 percent), followed by ages 25 to 34 (32 percent).

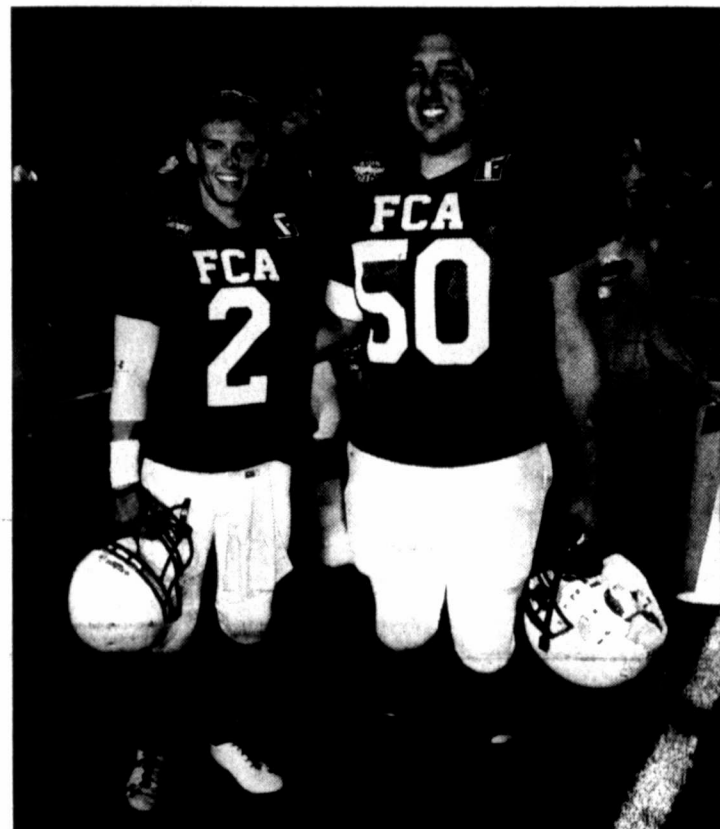
