County Catches Good Rainfall Monday Night

Stanton received three-fourths of an inch of moisture late Monday when hard, fast rains fell over the area.

The rain was accompanied by a thunderstorm, electrical displays, and wind.

At Lenorah, 1.35 inch of rain was gauged. Some wind was reported. At Tarzan from 1 inch to 1.3 inch of rain was reported.

W. E. Kelly, who lives west of Stanton, reported 4 inch of rain, high winds, but no damage.

The Courtney community received one-half inch of rain with heavier rains measuring up to two inches falling north of the community.

George Davis in Stanton reported his rain gauge showed three-fourths of an inch, and other gauge owners reported similar readings.

Eight miles south of Stanton 2 inch of rain fell.

First National Deposits Show Large Increase

Deposits at the First National Bank are up more than \$681,000 from last year's figure.

The June bank call showed deposits totalling \$4,318,414.17. In June, 1958 deposits totalled \$3,636,418.34.

No. 1 Carter Making Hole

Hole was being made below 4327 feet in lime and Husky Oil Company and Pano Tech Exploration Corporation No. 1 Carter, scheduled 12,200-foot wildcat 6½ miles southwest of Patricia in Northwest Martin County.

The deep test is being drilled 660 feet from north and west lines of labor 24, league 263, Kent County School Land survey.

Pan American Petroleum Corporation No. 1-C F. D. Breedlove, slated 13,500-foot wildcat four miles northwest of the Breedlove field in Northwest Martin County, was drilling below 11,896 feet.

Drill site is 657 feet from north and west lines of labor 99, league 257, Briscoe County School Land survey.

Pan American No. 2-A Homer L. Shook, slated 12,600-foot operation in the Breedlove field, was making hole below 4,621 feet on last report.

Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of labor 9, league 259, Borden County School Land survey.

Texaco, Inc., No. 8-B J. E. Mabee is a new well in the Mabee field in Southwest Martin County.

On 24-hour potential test, the new well pumped 25 barrels of 31.8 gravity oil, from open hole section at 4,653-4,732 feet.

Well site is 1,996 feet from north and 1,993 feet from west lines of section 17, block 39, G&MMB&A survey.

Area Gets Rains Up To 1.2 Inch

Stanton received a trace of rain Saturday afternoon late, with surrounding areas receiving a good, quick soaking, measuring up to 1.2 inch.

The unheralded weather pattern took the city by surprise. Shortly after dusk a brisk wind moved into the area and at times the wind velocity reached about 40 miles an hour. Trailing on the heels of the wind were short, peppery rain drops.

For approximately an hour, the kickoff parade for the Martin County Diamond Jubilee Celebration was threatened with cancellation, but at 8 p. m. the windy weather and light sprinkle gave way to calm and clearing skies which enabled the program to proceed.

Rainfall measurements in Big Spring, measured from half an inch to 1.2.

Forsan was hit by a hard-falling rain which caused extensive washing. The measurement was 1.4 inches. The rain came about 5 p. m.

Vealmoor had 6 inch rain but no wind or damage. Hard winds accompanied a good shower at Vincent, but no hail was reported.

At Lomax, the rains went from nothing to .7 inch. Arthur Stallings failed to get any rain while Jimmy Stallings had .7 inch.

Again wind was reported without causing any damage.

The measurement at Garden City was .5 inch but it was reported heavier north of town. Wind was strong enough to break limbs off trees there.

Lamesa had a wide range of measurements, from half an inch to 1.3 inches. Elsewhere in Dawson County, Oscar Vogler, nine miles southeast of Lamesa got half an inch, while Bunk Smith, in the Hancock Community, received 1.3. The G. L. Milledam farm three miles northwest of Patricia got .6. A mile northeast of Key, the gauges showed .9 inch.

Near Knott, high winds knocked down two power poles, cutting the power off for a while. Rain there measured .7.

Report From Washington

This report is about agriculture.

COTTON: There are several items of interest. Certain railroads have instituted action to reduce freight rates on cotton. I have joined with others in asking that this benefit be passed on to cotton farmers in slightly higher purchase and loan rates than those announced by the Department. I believe this will be done in the near future. This may mean about a million dollars to West Texas producers.

GOVERNMENT LOAN LIMITATIONS: Amendments to farm bills have passed both the Senate and the House which would fix limitations on government loan and purchase programs at \$35,000 to \$50,000. I have opposed these provisions. If these provisions should be enacted into law as now written, all farmers, in my judgment, would be affected adversely as a result of the over-all consequence of such action. Quite a large number of West Texas farmers would be affected adversely on a direct basis.

FARM & RANCH REVIEW

Attending the Abilene capon auction sale last Saturday, the first ever held in Abilene, was Elbert D. Steele, vocational agriculture teacher at Big Lake. He had some 300 capons for sale to 4-H and FFA boys and girls. The birds ranged in age from six to 12 weeks.

Bob Cooke, editor of "The Waggin' Tongue," a column appearing in The Abilene Reporter-News, reviewed the record Steele had made in the past eight years "on a breeding program to combine the best characteristics of both the dark and white Cornish Games and White Rocks."

Before going to Big Lake, Steele was VA instructor in the Stanton schools and won many first prize awards at prominent livestock shows. At the Houston livestock show, while he was vocational instructor at Stanton, Steele's VA boys and girls exhibited their capons, and sold the lot for \$8,865. At last year's Houston show Steele won the reserve

champion single capon and the grand champion trio which brought \$1,200.

An added feature attraction to the Texas Cowboys Reunion July 2, 3 and 4 to be held at Stamford will be an amateur photographers contest.

The management will make awards for the best six shots made of the parade on opening day and six for the best photos of action in the arena.

Stamford's professional photographers will judge the entries on the basis of western atmosphere, action, clarity and appeal.

A scene of the Old West Days was re-enacted last week on the Little Hoss Ranch, in Johnson County. Beef cattle to the number of 514 were driven down the highway from the ranch to the shipping pens at Cresson. There were 20 cowboys in the drive, as well as sheriff's posse, and highway patrolman to slow down

automobiles.

The cattle were divided in two herds—helpers and steers.

Reports issued by the district agents of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, show crops, except 350,000 acres of cotton hailed out or washed out in the South Plains and lower Panhandle, as making excellent progress.

Director John Hutchins said: "The battle against grass and weeds and insects is on but with more sunshine and the favorable moisture situations, farmers are optimistic over prospects for a good production year."

Cotton destroyed by hail and washed out by rains is being replanted. Rains ranged up to seven inches in some South Plains counties.

Little rain damage was reported from San Angelo. The small grain crop was stopped and crop cultivation delayed, but the rains filled stock tanks and improved range conditions.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

At it again, for the third time this year, Legislators go into the second special session wearier, but wiser.

Midnight wind-up of the second session brought show-down votes indicating what each house will and will not accept in the way of a tax program. Next conference committee on taxes will know that the line of compromise must be more finely drawn between Senate and House thinking.

In addressing the new session, Gov. Price Daniel reminded lawmakers of the "up against it" state of things. "Every function of state government depends on enactment of an appropriation bill before Sept. 1 with a tax bill to support it," said the governor.

State's fiscal year and present appropriations run out Aug. 31. Unless a new appropriation bill can go into effect the next day, the whole state operation

including hospitals, schools, employ salaries and pensions—will stop.

This is unthinkable, of course. No lawmaker could go home and face the voters with things in such a state.

But there's another pinching factor which the governor emphasized. Cost of deficit financing plus loss of potential tax income means that each day's delay costs the state an estimated \$200,000. Despite this, the House took a four-day weekend and the Senate, 3½ days.

But some lawmakers seemed to feel the delays, deadlocks and head-knocking were not necessarily expensive wasted motion, but milestones along the long, hard road to democratic compromise.

"We've crossed a lot of bridges we won't have to cross again," said Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth.

NO SURRENDER — Legisla-

ture was thrown into another session when the House rejected, 117-to-23, a conference committee tax bill that was largely based on Senate thinking.

Senate approved, 19-to-12. Some House members were indignant that three of the five House appointees signed the conference committee report which House opponents called a "complete surrender" to Senate wishes.

House passed a tax bill that was divided about 50-50 between taxes on business and selective sales taxes. Senate pared back the business taxes to about 18 per cent, added new or heavier sales taxes to make up the difference.

Conference committee proposed a bill that would have raised \$177,066,000 with essentially the same levies approved by the Senate plus a temporary hike from \$1 to \$2 in drivers licenses.

Appropriations conference committee was reportedly deadlocked and never made a report.

After the new session opened, most of the same taxing and spending bills were introduced again, including the twice-killed abandoned property bill.

House quickly re-passed the same appropriation bill it had passed before. Most bills are expected to follow the same pattern they did in the last special session—up to the point where the conference committees start

West Texas Press Comments

Four members of the industrial group of the Graham Chamber of Commerce flew by plane to Philadelphia, Pa., last week for the purpose to contact factories in an effort to bring some industry to that city. The group had several contacts. The Graham Leader said funds to finance the project are being supplied by various business firms in Graham who contri-

buted to the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Fund.

A Colorado City woman, Mrs. Sam L. Majors, has been named alternate poet laureate of Texas. The Colorado City Record says her nomination was approved by the House and Senate on the recommendation of State Representative Max Carrier of Roby, who represents Mitchell, Nolan and Fisher Counties.

Mrs. Majors writes poetry, drama and short stories. She is a member of the Texas Federation of Women's Club and the Poetry Society of Texas.

Lewis Reddell, former owner-publisher of the Seminole Sentinel, has purchased and assumed management of The Electra

Star-News in Wichita County. Following sale of the Sentinel to the present owners, Reddell purchased The Llano News, Llano County. He sold the News recently and bought the Electra newspaper.

The Matador Tribune states that Miss Jan Barton of Matador, is one of 14 young people named by Governor Price Daniel to serve on his committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth. Miss Barton is state vice-chairman of the 4-H Clubs and represents the 111,000 4-H Club members in Texas on the Governor's committee. She is also Area I President of the Future Homemakers of America and has received a state degree in FHA.

ONE MADE IT—Only major money bill to make the grade is the bookkeeping bill, passed by both Houses and signed into law by the governor.

Effect of the law is to change accounting procedures so that an estimated \$28,000,000 more will be credited to the state's general fund when the fiscal year runs out Aug. 31.

It means that much less that has to be raised to balance the books.

STUDENT FEE BILL BACK—Rep. W. S. Heatley, Jr. of Paduach re-introduced a bill to let colleges require students to pay up to \$30 a semester for various campus services.

Bill passed the House last session, but died in the Senate on the last day. Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria was Senate sponsor.

Heatley, Fly and other supporters pointed to the crying need for new money and said college presidents were urging the bill. Opponents said there were better places to get money than from working - their - way college students who would rather do without the football tickets, parking spaces, etc., covered by the fee.

PUBLIC BEACHES ASKED — Providing public access to Gulf Coast beaches is the only non-money matter submitted by the governor to the new session.

House passed such a bill over-

whelmingly last session, but it died in the Senate on the last day.

A recent State Supreme Court ruling changed the general conception of where the boundary line is between private and public ownership along the coastline. To clear up resulting confusion, the House-passed bill provided for a "public easement" of 200 feet from the low tide mark. It also prohibited fences or other obstructions.

Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston re-introduced the bill in the new session.

OIL CUT AGAIN — Texas oil production will take another tumble when the July allowable takes effect.

Railroad Commission ordered production cut by 226,044 barrels a day and run on a nine-day producing pattern. Ten producing days were allowed for June which was a cut-back from May.

Oil men testified that they not only had more gasoline than they could sell, but faced the prospect of running out of storage space.

ARRANGED CONTRACTS HIT — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has filed an anti-trust suit against certain Houston electrical contractors and an electrical workers union.

Wilson said his office had gathered evidence indicating the Southeast Texas Chapter of the National Electrical Contractors

Compromises are being sought which would soften the limitation proposals. One proposal would give any farmer unlimited access to the loan, but would provide that the limitation could not be exceeded at the time the title to the pledged crop is taken over by the government. Details of what may happen are not yet clear, but there is every indication that some limitations on loans and payments will be provided by law.

WHEAT: The House and Senate have passed wheat bills. Agreement between the House and Senate on a final version of the legislation has not been reached. A compromise version raising the support level from 75% of parity to 80% and providing for an acreage cut of 20% has been voted down by the House.

Further efforts to agree on a bill to send to the President are under way. The outcome is uncertain. There is the threat of a veto by the President if the support level is increased, even if accompanied by a sharp acreage reduction.

MILO: There is nothing new on the grain sorghum front. There is still no limit on plantings and the announced support level is 60% of parity, 10 parity points below the support of last year. The support price will be about 31 cents per hundred below last year.

GENERAL FARM LEGISLATION: Everyone seems to agree that the entire farm program needs to be substantially overhauled. It now appears that this will not be done at this session. The groundwork is being laid and agreements are being sought which would make possible a major overhaul job next year.

FARM LABOR: Hundreds of letters from West Texas farmers indicate serious concern over the proposal that minimum wages be established for farm labor. Farmers complained that they cannot raise wages in the face of dwindling income. Their concern is well-founded.

It continues to be true that there is no likelihood that Congress will pass at this session

any of the pending bills fixing minimum wages for farm workers and he has not backed down from his position that he can, under existing law, in effect fix minimum wages and establish standards of employment for farm labor recruited through the United States Employment Service across state lines. He has referred the issue to the Attorney General. Briefs have been filed in opposition to the Secretary's contention. The matter has been before Attorney General Rogers for many weeks, but he has not acted.

As to **Bracero labor**, indications are that the program will operate about as it did last year. Final negotiations on the new agreement with Mexico are now underway. The two-year extension of the law becomes effective July 1, 1959.

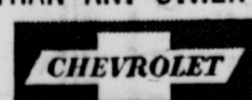

Mrs. June Graham closed the meeting with prayer.

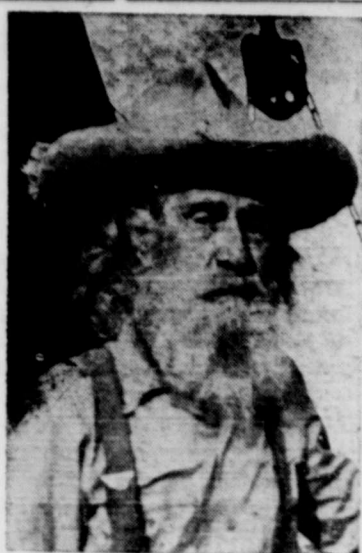
