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Lamesa Schools To Open Monday

Over Forty-five Tons Scrap Metals Brought In During August; Drive Continues

The McCarty Epworth League was the winner of the \$65.00 first prize in the Scrap Metal Contest staged in Dawson County all last week. The Nolan Chapel Church won the second prize of \$35.00.

During the scrap drive of August 22 through August 29, 64,435 pounds of scrap metal was brought in to the local collection center. The first part of August 26,400 pounds was turned in making a total of 90,835 pounds for the month.

The drive for scrap metals and rubber has not ended, and is to be continued until every piece of scrap metal and rubber in Dawson County is turned in, reports C. M. Burton, Scrap chairman for Dawson County. All who have not brought in the metals from their farms are urged to do so as soon as possible.

The following wire was received by Joe M. Peterson, Chairman Dawson County USDA War Board Tuesday, September 1:

"It is imperative that every effort be made to get all scrap iron off farms and ranches at once since mills are running short of material. Please urge every county chairman to put forth every effort to get all surplus scrap turned in. I believe farmers and ranchers will respond when they understand the situation and realize the importance of scrap in the war production program. Scrap iron drives should at once be intensified. If practical plan not being followed one should be developed. Suggest sending short concise letters at once to each farmer and rancher giving scrap iron situation. Survey of AAA community commitment farms, indicates eighty thousand tons of scrap still on farms and ranches of state. Mills are in need of this scrap for war production program. Urgent that action be taken at once."

Mr. Burton urges the people of Dawson County to go over their premises in search of all kinds of metals and scrap rubber. If you have already turned in your scrap, he asks that you look again, you'll probably find more. If you have an old heater or boiler in your home too heavy for you to move, get your neighbor to help you, he'll be glad to do it.

It is not enough to pile up a little stuff and expect somebody to come and get it. Most of the work is being done by patriotic volunteers with inadequate facilities. They need your help in collecting scrap materials in the largest possible amounts and in getting it to the right place.

The situation is serious. Your help is needed now.

Some Scrap The Japs May Get

According to Joe M. Peterson, chairman of Dawson County War Board, R. L. Butcher, newly elected Commissioner, precinct 2, in a recent meeting with the War Board, has offered to wreck several buildings on his farm in the Hancock community, to aid the scrap drive. Mr. Butcher has a barn, hen house and garage built from pieces of scrap iron secured in 1935 from a junk dealer in Forsan, Texas. The iron slabs estimated to weigh about 8,000 pounds were scheduled to be shipped to the Japs when purchased by Mr. Butcher. In addition to making this offer Mr. Butcher has already brought in to Lamesa junk dealers 11,720 pounds of scrap iron and 300 pounds of rubber.

The Dawson Independent School will open the Fall Term on Monday, September 7, and are now short two teachers, school officials report.

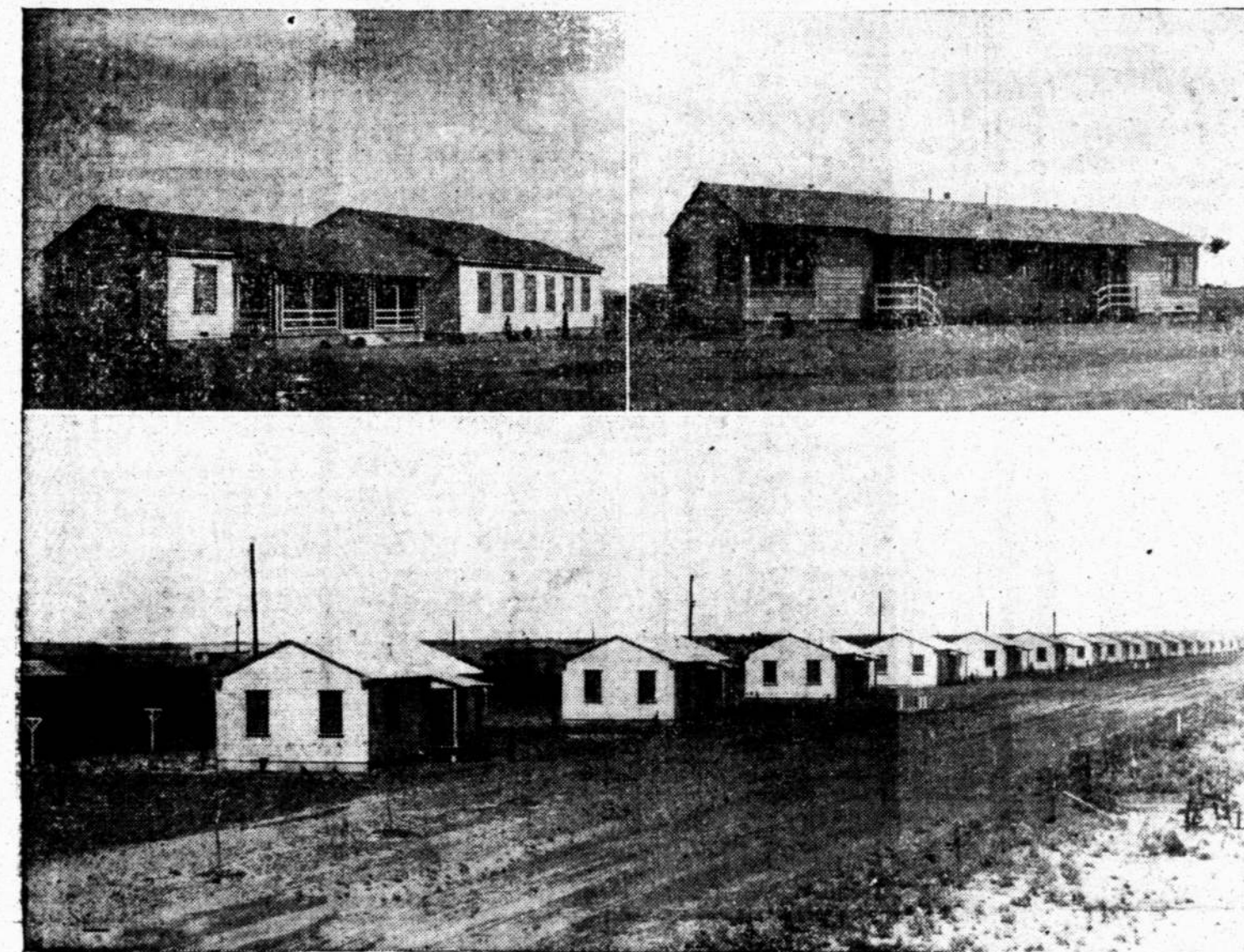

Views Of Lamesa's Migratory Labor Camp



United States Army Air Force Cadets are sharing housing facilities with migrant agricultural workers at the Farm Security Administration's farm workers community just completed at Lamesa. Upper left is the camp's community building where agricultural workers will have church services and recreational programs. This building also is equipped with facilities for entertaining and caring for small children while their mothers are employed on the farms in the South Plains cotton area. Playground equipment is installed near this building. One of the 24 four-family apartments is shown at the upper right. Migrant workers will be housed in these structures, while (below) is a panoramic view of the section of the camp devoted to resident agricultural workers. Each resident home has a small garden plot, chicken house and cow stable. A completely equipped first aid station is housed in the administration building near the entrance to the camp, located at the edge of Lamesa. Cadets and civilian personnel of the Army's Air Forces Advance Glider School at Lamesa will reside at the farm workers community until dormitories at the school are completed.

V. O. Key Has Nephew Killed In Action

Capt. Eugene M. Key, 26-year-old former reporter for the Dallas Times-Herald, has given his life for his country.

Key's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Ira F. Key of Bryan, disclosed Wednesday they had been notified by the Navy Department that their son was killed in action with the United States Marine Corps. Although the telegram did not say so, the parents believed the death occurred during the recapture of the Solomon Islands from the Japanese.

Key enlisted in the marines 19 months ago and was sent into the Pacific war zone on his request for active duty. Only last Saturday his promotion to a captaincy was announced.

Eugene M. Key is the nephew of V. O. Key of Lamesa.

Soldiers Of Soil—Soldiers Of Uncle Sam Occupying Lamesa Migratory Camp

Soldiers of the Southwest's agricultural lands and soldiers of Uncle Sam's armed forces are sharing quarters in the Farm Security Administration's newest farmworkers community at Lamesa.

Completed in recent weeks, five shelters in the farm workers community have been leased to the United States Army Air Forces advanced glider school. About 80 cadets are housed in the community.

In addition to housing cadets, pending completion of dormitories at the flying school, the Farm Security Administration has assigned 20 labor homes to civilian personnel of the school.

The farm workers community provides housing facilities for 124 families who have begun arriving in the area to begin harvesting the South Plains cotton crop. In addition to shelter, the community provides sanitation and health needs for many migrant agricultural families in the South Plains cotton area.

Located at the gateway for migrant farm families who move East and West across Texas toward Oklahoma to New Mexico and North and South through Texas, the community will facilitate contracting and routing arrangements for the Texas State Employment Service.

Twenty-five of the 50 structures are four-family apartments. The remainder are cottage style, three-room homes for resident agricultural workers. Each resident home has a small garden plot, chicken house and cow stable.

The community has a central water supply, sanitary toilet facilities, showers, and laundry facilities. A large community building for church services and recreation, includes a nursery and playground equipment for children whose mothers work in the fields. A completely equipped first aid station is housed in the administration building.

The community will help produce in the South Plains area a secure adequate seasonal farm labor.

Sugar Ration Card No. 8 Good Until October 31st

War Ration stamp number 8 will be valid for the purchase of five pounds of sugar during the ten-week period beginning August 23 and ending October 31, Dixie Kilgore, chairman of the Dawson War Price and Rationing Board, announced today.

"This is a larger amount of sugar and the ration period is longer than has been assigned for any previous stamp," Mr. Kilgore explained, "but each person will have to continue using the original rate of no more than a half a pound a week to make the five-pound ration last ten weeks."

Mr. Kilgore said the allotment of five pounds on Stamp No. 8 will permit household users to buy sugar in larger packages, and also will help to dispose of five, ten and 25-pound packages.

Albaugh Well Drilling Below 4250 Ft. In Lime

Dawson County's only active wildcat, the Albaugh-T. L. Higginbotham No. 1 located about eight miles east of Albaugh's Handley No. 1 which is Dawson County's first and only commercial producer, was drilling below 4250 in lime.

The Higginbotham well was reported to be running higher structurally than the producer. The Yates horizon had not been determined but the salt section was reported to have thinned considerably, which is a favorable indication.

The driller's pick of the top of the brown lime was around 3800, and the top of the solid lime was reported around 4234 feet.

This well is being closely watched by all the major companies who are interested in this area.

Continental Oil Company Dan Auld, eastern Terry County wildcat, was drilling below 6065 feet in lime.

Dawson County Assigned 18 Navy Recruits For Sept.

Dawson County was assigned 18 Navy recruits today as its quota for September in the North Texas district's drive to enlist 3,600 men between the ages of 17 and 50 during the thirty-day period.

Figures released today, crediting the North Texas Navy recruiting district with enlisting 3,243 men during August, showed that Dawson County, with a quota of 15 recruits, contributed 12 recruits to the monthly total, the highest in the history of the district.

Encouraged by the banner month of enlistments, 243 above the assigned quota and 1,116 more than before sworn in during a single month in the district, Lieut. L. H. Ridout, Jr., officer in charge, established 3,600 recruits as the September quota.

"During August, more than 3,100 men left their homes in North Texas to join the Navy. The month's quota, which was the highest ever realized in the district, was only

3,000 recruits. That is why our September quota has been set twenty per cent higher."

Thus Lieut. L. H. Ridout, Jr., officer in charge of the district, stated simply plans to make this district as representative as any other in the nation in the Navy's combined fighting force.

"We can enlist 3,600 men in thirty days because we have only started our campaign to sell the Navy," he insisted. "The country is becoming more war-conscious every day. 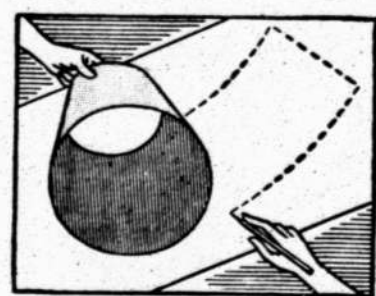
All Set for School ..but ARE They?



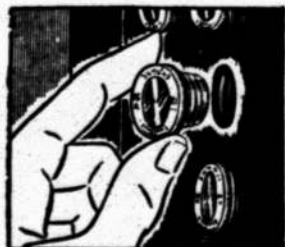
SUMMER vacations are over, and it's school time again. Books, pencils, lunch kits, clothes and other needs for students have been assembled. They are all set for school... but are they?

Proper light while studying is as important to your children as the right books. The right amount of glareless light safeguards their eyesight and enables them to read and study easier and faster, for they can see better.

Most homes now have desk lamps or other study lamps which are suitable for students, but here are some points to check, now that boys and girls are going back to school. Be sure to remove the diffusing bowl and lamp bulb to clean off the dust that has accumulated during the summer. Be sure the lamp has a bulb of the correct size to provide enough light. Most study lamps should have 150-watt bulbs.



Another way to increase the amount of light at small cost is to relined dark shades with white paper. Put the lamp shade on a sheet of good white paper and mark the outline as you roll it around one time. Then cut out the strip and trim it to fit inside the shade, fastening it with scotch tape. A good light and a quiet place to study make homework easier for students.



KEEP SPARE FUSES on hand to save you time and trouble if a fuse blows. First, turn off the main switch and pull the cords out of wall outlets. Then replace the blown fuse, but don't reconnect any lamps or appliances suspected of having caused the fuse to blow out until they have been repaired.

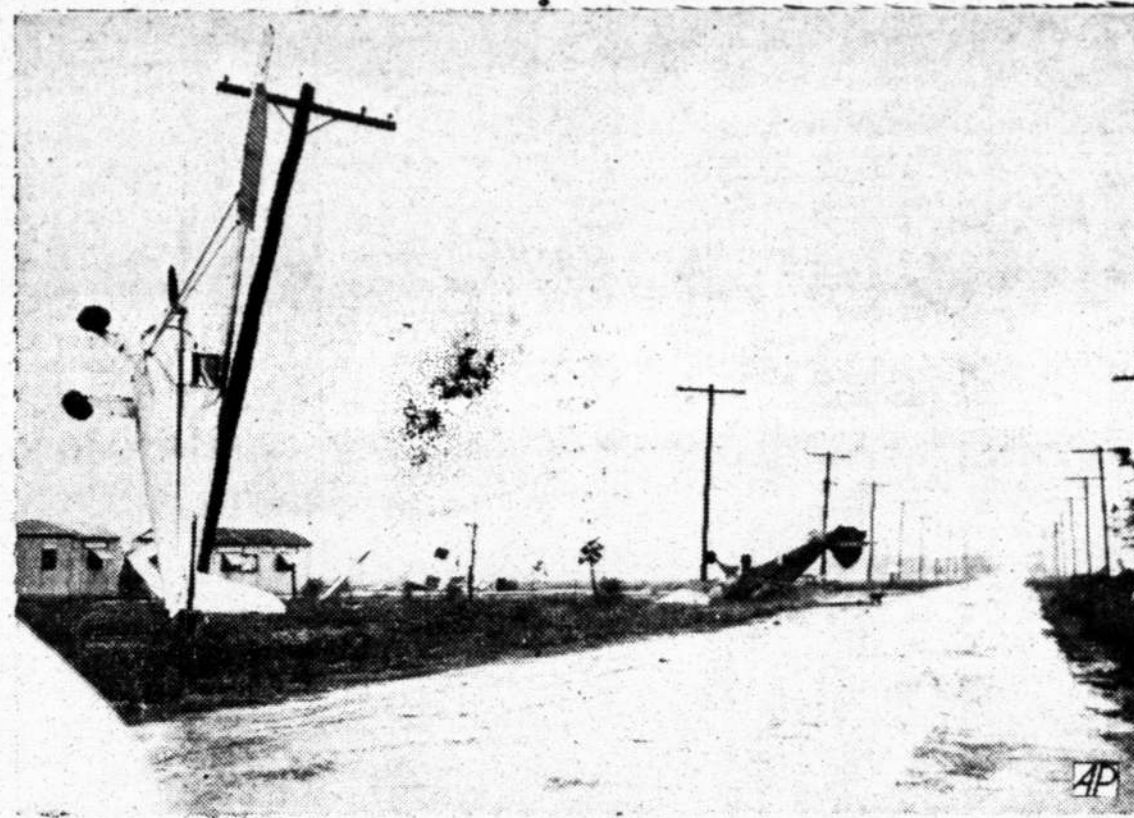

ers when they are most needed, and also promote more satisfactory standards of health and sanitation of migrant farm workers. Its construction is a part of the Farm Security Administration's plan begun in 1936 to help the states meet some of the most urgent health, housing and economic problems which had been created by mass migration of farm workers.

"The farm workers' community was constructed in Dawson County," said Jesse B. Gilmer, regional director of the FSA, "in response to urgent requests by farmers, community leaders, ministers, merchants, school officials and women's club leaders in the area, and because of the need to serve some of the half million migrant agricultural laborers in Texas.

"Farm Security has in use or under construction more than 100 camps with these accommodations for thousands of families at any one time," Gilmer continued. "These are chiefly on the Eastern Seaboard, where heavy war industry demands have aggravated labor shortages.

Already, however, appeals for more camp facilities are being made by groups of growers, civic organizations and local state officials in the South Plains and throughout the country. The demand for this assistance far exceeds funds with which to expand accommodations now available," he said.

Gilmer said the simple housing plans in the communities provide far better shelter and sanitary arrangements than most of the migrants had before, and that they have done much to relieve suffering, protect children and check the spread of disease.

"In addition to benefiting farm laborers, it is hoped that Lamesa camp will aid materially to offsetting the threatened shortage of farm workers this year in that area," said Gilmer.

John A. Flache, Dawson County native and graduate of Texas Tech, has been named camp manager. He will be assisted by a small staff, including a full-time registered nurse.

extremely large cotton crop and the absolute certainty that former transportation methods cannot be used, on account of the critical time situation, South Plains farmers may not be able to get all their cotton to the gins, unless some practical and feasible substitute for trailers and trucks can be developed for the moving, sponsors of the September 8 mass meeting assert.

Many people have not yet grasped the dire seriousness of the situation. It is declared. There appears to be a tendency among many farmers and business people in many places to "let the matter slide with the hope that some substitute will be pulled out of a hat" at the last moment by the government or somebody.

Many people have failed, up to now, to realize that the rubber and tire supply is becoming shorter every day. Some people may not wake up until their tires wear out or become unusable and then they cannot get any sort of replacements. Men who have analyzed the matter point out that such will happen.

American people, and particularly Texans, have met and solved many situations when necessity demanded. It is hoped that out of the September 8 meeting, a workable plan will be developed for getting all South Plains cotton to the nearest gin.

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the meeting, is requesting that all individuals who may have a suggestion as to how this situation can be handled write a letter to the organization before September 6 in which they outline their ideas and plans. All such letters will be turned over to government officials for study and checking—so that if any of them are found to have possibilities they can be publicly explained and organized at the regional meeting.

FARM NEWS

from YOUR COUNTY AGENT

TEXAS EXTENSION SERVICE



Stinking smut in wheat can be controlled by the use of the Improved copper-mercury compound in the dust form, says B. J. Baskin, County Agent of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. The same dust may be used to control smut in barley and oats.

Loose smut in wheat can not be controlled by normal or usual dust treatment. The "hot water treatment" can be used to control smut in wheat, but due to the time involved few farmers practice using this method.

In using the commercial copper-mercury dust it is recommended that 1-2 ounce of the new improved dust per bushel be mixed with the wheat, oats, or barley. Care should be taken to insure the seed being covered with the dust. For the best results the seed should be treated about ten hours prior to planting, states B. J. Baskin, County Agent.

Many farmers are interested in purchasing seed wheat for their fall seedling, states B. J. Baskin, County Agent of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. The first question asked is "what variety of wheat does the best locally?"

There are three varieties, namely Turkey, Tenmarq and Standard Blackhall, that are adapted to this area. Either one of these will produce good yields, and will take the average winter conditions that we have. Most producers have their choice of one of these varieties, and yields are satisfactory, states B. J. Baskin, County Agent.

The county agents of this area will visit the Experiment Station at Lubbock, Friday, September 4 for a days instruction in new varieties of grain and sweet sorghums, sudan and cotton production, states B. J. Baskin, county agent of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. Development of the new type of combines within the past few years has created a demand for a type of maize suitable for harvesting machinery. Now that war has come to use, and the resulting shortage of labor for harvesting of maize has developed, the demand for a combine maize is growing in leaps and bounds.

Several years work on the developing of combine maize will be Children born in December 1935, or in January or February, 1936 will report to room 3. All other children for first grade will report to room 4.

explained at the meeting, states B. J. Baskin, County Agent. Inspection of the many seed plots will follow.

In the developing of combine maize the chief problems are the (1) secure adequate leafage to furnish food for grain development, (2) development of a strong, straight "neck," and (3) height sufficient to carry the proper amount of leafage and yet not be too tall for combine harvesting. Much progress has been made on this work.

A new type of sudan is also in the process of development, states the County Agent. This sudan, a cross of sudan and sweet sorghum, has (1) fewer seed, (2) sufficient sugar content to make it much more palatable for livestock than sudan itself, and (3) higher yield of forage per acre. Once this type of sudan is available for planting the demand for seed will exceed the supply for several seasons.

License Plates For 1943 Will Be Miniature

Motorists of Dawson and nearby counties were advised last week by the Texas Highway Department that small metal plates, one inch by four inches, to be bolted on old plates, will be used in 1943 by the department to evidence payment of 1943 automobile and truck license fees.

The smaller plates, it is reported, will save about 140 tons of metal. Colors in reverse to those of 1942 plates, will be utilized on the new tags. Tax assessors-collectors of the state were notified this week of the contemplated changes.

All Counties Will Receive Feed Wheat This Year

Farmers in any Texas county can obtain feed wheat this year.

Feed wheat will be distributed directly by the Commodity Credit Corporation or through the regular channels of trade, B. F. Vance, chairman, Texas USDA War Board, announced.

Producers may have wheat delivered at their customary shipping point upon proper certification that it will be used for feeding livestock and poultry, but purchase of wheat at some delivery point outside the immediate community will require proper approval and identification from local county AAA committee.

"Producers who truck livestock and produce to a point outside their immediate territory may find it advantageous to bring back wheat on the return trip," the War Board chairman said.

Large distributors and processors will be required to designate the area they propose to serve, Vance said and explained that a nominal fee wheat price will be established for the point at which CCC makes delivery. Refund claims may be made by the distributors and processors if the county feed wheat price at final point of delivery is less than their feed wheat cost plus appropriate transportation cost.

Through recent Congressional action, 125,000 bushels of CCC wheat at 85 per cent of parity price for corn, have been released for feeding purposes.

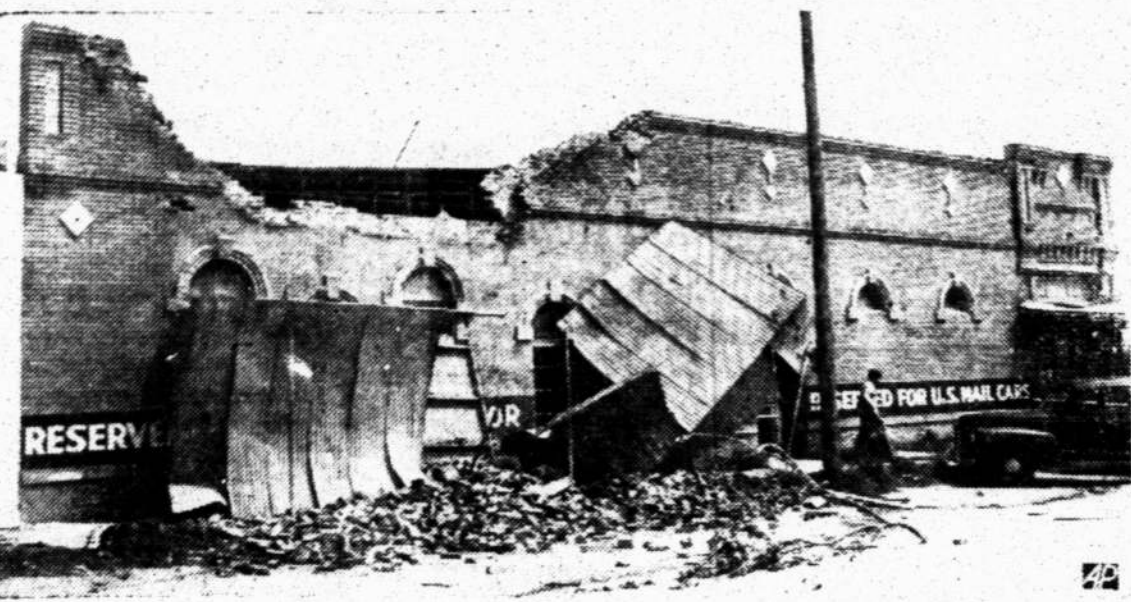

Hotel and Resort Employees Are Covered By S. S.

There is one aspect of the taxes levied under the Social Security Act which is of especial importance to owners of summer resorts and hotels, and boys' and girls' summer camps, it was stated today by Elliot W. Adams, manager of the Big Spring field office of the Social Security Board.

Under the provisions of the Act, wages do not include cash only. The Act defines wages as "all remuneration for employment, including the cash value of all remuneration paid in any medium other than cash."

In many hotels and summer resorts, employees are paid a certain amount in cash, and also receive food and lodging. In making the tax deductions, these items are included. In other words a value must be placed on them, and the tax paid, it was explained. For instance, if it

Navy Urges 20 Per Cent Increase For Sept. Enlistment

Following the most successful month in the history of the Navy's North Texas recruiting district, each county was urged today to raise its enlistments quota twenty per cent for September.

"More than 3,100 men joined the Navy in our district alone during August," Lieut. L. H. Ridout, Jr., officer in charge announced. "Since our August quota was only 3,000, a September quota of 3,600 seems to be within our sights now that the ball has started rolling."

"Never could we have gone over the top last month without the tireless effort shown in each community by civic leaders, luncheon clubs, patriotic organizations, and service groups. For this reason, I am again requesting your unstinted aid in devoting time and effort to meeting this new demand for volunteers," he said.

The 3,600-man quota for September means that enlistments must average 120 men daily, he estimated. "And we are equipped to handle many more," Lieut. Ridout pointed out. "During the final week of August, we swore in 176 recruits one day, 161 the next, and 159 the following day. With a record like that, we'll be happy to see even more than 120 men every day of September."

is determined that the employee's food and lodging are \$50 a month, the total wage on which the tax would be paid would be the cash wage plus \$50.

Another point for employers to remember: the tax is collected by the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The Social Security Board has no connection with the tax collections, or with the rules and regulations concerning them. Therefore, any tax problems in connections with the Social Security Act should be submitted to the district Collector of Internal Revenue, at Dallas, Texas.

Information about the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance program under the Act may be obtained from the Big Spring office of the Social Security Board, at 206 Petroleum Building.

What 'Penny Milk' Program Means

Thousands of Texans are familiar with the community school lunch program, and in time they may become equally familiar with the school milk program which is being expanded by the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

Details of the plan recently were explained to the home demonstration staff of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service by Grace I. Neely, nutritionist for AMA's southern region. Formerly, Miss Neely was an extension specialist.

Milk used is purchased from local farmers and dairymen, who receive the price prevailing locally for unprocessed milk which is sold for fluid consumption. The USDA Agricultural Marketing Administration pays the farmer's price for the milk to local schools, which in turn pay the dairymen.

Schools participating in the program make arrangements with dairies for supplying, processing, and delivering the milk, and provide for serving milk to the children. In addition, schools must arrange for payment to the processor of the difference between the price of unprocessed milk paid by AMA and the cost of processed milk delivered to the school. Co-sponsors, such as Parent-Teacher Associations, may bear this expense.

All children in schools taking part in the new school milk program will be eligible to receive a half pint of milk each day. The school may charge up to one cent a half pint to defray the school's cost of the program. That's way the project often is called "the penny milk program."

HE'S COLLECTED 621 ARMY INSIGNIA

MCCHORD FIELD, Wash. (AP)—When a friend retired from the Army in 1926 and gave him his 35th infantry insignia, Warrant Officer Joseph Berst began collecting the badges. NEWS RELEASES FROM OFFICE OF WAR INFORMATION

ON THE HOME FRONT

"We are all in this war all the way," President Roosevelt declared in his address to the nation, December 9, 1941. "Every single man, woman and child is a partner in the most tremendous undertaking of our American history."

Since that statement was made, practically everyone has become aware of his partnership, as the various phases of the nation's war program have been developed.

Developments in the last week have brought a fuller realization of the Home Front.

Included was the War Manpower Commission's announcement that all able-bodied male students enrolling this month in colleges and universities are destined for the armed forces, and that all others must prepare themselves, physically and vocationally, for appropriate war service.

Responsibility for determining the specific training for students destined for the armed forces is a

function of the Army and Navy.

In addition to students, all sound and physically fit men face the possibility of being called into selective service. And, to keep war production and essential civilian industry going, their places must be filled by women, older men, and those whose military usefulness is slight.

To our mobilization of manpower and womanpower, the nation also is about to add the mobilization of youth and children. The National Institute on Education has called upon educators from all parts of the country to consider the most effective way to make use of all the students in the country. The Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and other groups already have shown their mettle in various drives, but the new program will go further. Schools may furnish volunteer battalions for harvesting, rationing programs, civilian defense, and other activities, while school buildings will

be used for classes in radio operating, war work training, and pre-military preparation in specialized subjects.

LIVESTOCK CEILINGS PLANNED

Assuring livestock producers that anything in the way of surprise action will be avoided, OPA has announced that definite plans are in process for placing a price ceiling on live hogs and similar action is contemplated soon on cattle prices. Working out of ceilings will be undertaken in close consultation with producers, and completed plans will be submitted to the Secretary of Agriculture for concurrence. With a strong demand for beef cattle in prospect, the market will be more stable, as compared with other years, and feeders who buy carefully may look forward to the coming year with confidence.

HOME-MADE DRESSES CONTROLLED

WBP's new limitation order L-153, effects the same conservation of materials in women's dresses and other garments made at home as those set up for ready-made garments in order L-85. The new order applies to paper patterns used by home dress-makers. The more severe measurement restrictions on wool garments ordered by L-85 for ready-made garments are not included in the pattern order, as manufacturers "cannot know for what material the pattern will be used."

RADIO CAMPAIGN PLANNED

Beginning September 14 and continuing through October 26, the Federal Government will conduct a national radio campaign designed to inform the people of the facts of the nation's war effort. Announced by the Office of War Information, the program was described as the most important ever un-

dertaken in this country. All radio stations will be sent transcriptions featuring such news commentators as William Shirer, Walter Winchell, John Gunther, Lowell Thomas and Raymond Gram Swing. These commentators will report war effort facts on 14 of the major United Nations, including England, Russia, China, Greece and the Fighting French.

BICYCLES QUOTA ANNOUNCED

September rationing quotas of new adult bicycles for the State of Texas is 2968.

RUBBER SHRINKS AGAIN

Tightening up still further on the use of vital rubber supplies, WPB has prohibited sale and use of elastic fabric, rubber yarn and elastic thread except in nine specified health and industrial articles, including gas masks, goggles, surgical stockings and artificial limbs. Use of rubber fabric and thread even in these items is forbidden after September 9 except on permission granted by WLB on specific applications.

NEW TYPEWRITER RENTAL BANNED

A ban on rental of new typewriters and used non-portable typewriters made since January 1, 1935, has been issued by OPA. All used machines in this classification that are now rented must be returned to dealers by September 15. This action was necessitated by slow public response to the Treasury Department's drive to buy 300,000 used typewriters from their owners to fill urgent needs of the Army, Navy and other government agencies. The new OPA order also placed a three-month limit on rentals of standard typewriters made before Jan. 1, 1935, and all used portables. Although so-called "stripped" portable machines and obsolete typewriters are released by the new OPA order for unrestricted sale.

SHARE A TRUCK PLAN URGED

With a September truck tire allotment for Texas of 18,459, almost six thousand below the August OPA rationing quota, Mark McGee, State OPA director, urges all farmers to plan speedy adoption of "Share-a-truck" plans to insure movement of fall crops. This plan already is being used successfully in Ellis County, he said, and will be presented at Lubbock on September 8 to a meeting of local war price and ration boards of 21 South Plains Counties and representatives of 15,000 farmers in this region.

PEANUT LOADING CEILING RAISED

An adjustment from 50 cents to 75 cents a ton as the maximum charge for loading peanuts in and out of warehouses operating under contracts with agencies designed by the Agricultural Marketing Association has been announced by OPA.

HANGER DEPOSIT ALLOWED

A reasonable deposit, interpreted by OPA as being from one to five cents, now may be required by dry cleaners and laundries to insure the return of wire coat hangers used in delivering finished garments. Manufacture of coat hangers has been halted as a steel conservation measure by WLB. Upon return of the deposit receipt and the hanger, the customers deposit must be returned.

FARMERS COOPERATE IN HAULING PRODUCE

OLDHAM, S. D. (AP) — A "keep 'em moving co-op" has been worked out by farmers in a tri-county area here to eliminate hundreds of half-load trips to market. The group pooled equipment and members take turns hauling. Each contributed 50 cents to cover incidental expenses for the season. The plan saves tires, wear and tear on trucks. It has been endorsed by the Department of Agriculture.

'NO AIR AT ALL, IT BURN IT ALL'

HOLBROOK, Ariz. (AP) — A. C. Whiting, operator of a string of service stations in Arizona, New Mexico and California, received this letter from one of his station managers:

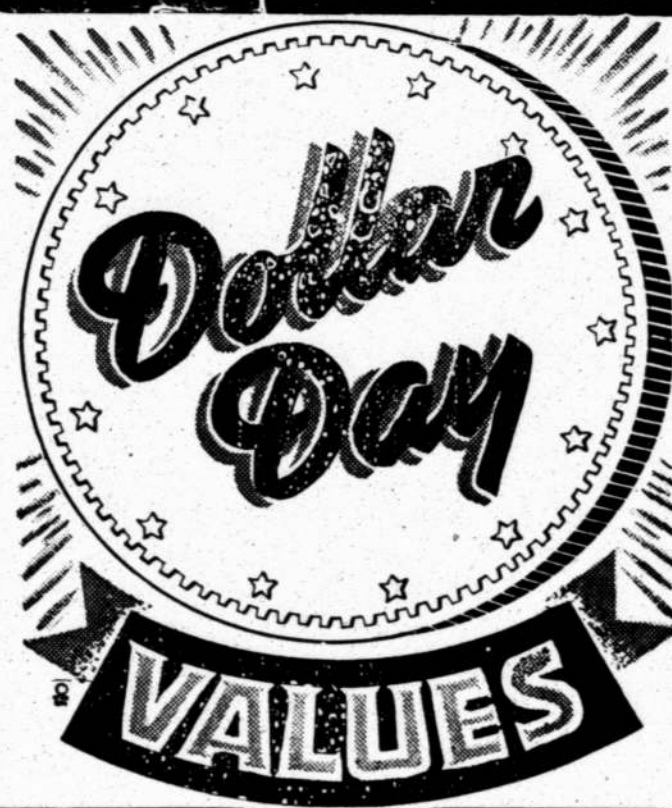
