The Steer Feeding investigation conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Bureau of Animal Industry and Bureau of Plant Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture at the U. S. Field Station, Big Spring, Texas, were concluded June 8, 1926. Three lots of steer calves were fed for 203 days, with the following results:

PIPE LINE FROM CHALK FIELD

The Kay Pipe Line Co., a subsidiary of the Marland Oil Company, is building a pipe line from the Chalk field to the railway east of Coahoma, where loading facilities will be provided. A crew of fourteen men were started on the job this week.

The main line will extend from section 87, block 29, W. & N. W. survey, where a 55,000 barrel storage tank will be erected, to the T. & P. railway a distance of twelve miles. Engineers have surveyed a line in and around the hills and canyons so that oil can be delivered from the storage tanks to the railway by gravity flow. In addition to the main pipe line, laterals will be laid to the following producing wells: the Choate & Henshaw O'Daniel No. 1, on section 34, block 30, Twp 1 S; the Deep Rock Oil Co. Hyman No. 1, on section 88, block 29, W. & N. W. survey; the Chalk No. 1 on section 113, block 29, W. & N. W. survey, and the Fred Hyer Clay No. 1 on section 139, block 29, W. & N. W. survey.

Extensions will be made to any and all wells now drilling in the southeastern portion of Howard county if they come in as producers, and the owners request such extensions.

Sheriffs and Peace Officers have been headed toward Big Spring for the semi-annual convention of the West Texas Sheriffs and Peace Officers Association all day and the number of delegates is expected to reach one hundred or more by Thursday night.

An informal meeting was called at 1:30 p. m. in the district court room so that preliminary business matters might be arranged before the main business meeting.

President R. M. Miller of San Saba county, called on W. Carroll Barnett to take charge of the meeting. The secretary, Carl Adams, of Brownwood, had not reached Big Spring when the meeting was convened so roll call and the regular order of business was postponed.

Five Wells Drilling In Chalk Section

Good Progress Being Made on Five Test Wells—Pipe Line Being Built to T. & P. Railway

Oil Test on Section 126

The Reeves and Apperman test on section 126 on the H. R. Clay ranch which recently spudded in is another interesting test as it is on a direct line and almost midway between the Owen and Sloan Chalk No. 1 and the Fred Hyer producing wells.

At Transcontinental Test

The Transcontinental Oil Co. is drilling below 3400 feet in their deep test on section 100, block 29, W. & N. W. survey, fourteen miles southeast of Big Spring.

It is stated that this well will be drilled to 5000 feet if production is not secured before that depth is reached.

California Company's Test

The California Oil Company's Foster No. 3, located between the Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s Mary Foster No. 1 and Iatan is nearing the depth at which oil in commercial quantity was found in the Magnolia Co.'s well.

This well is now drilling around 2600 feet and the oil sand is expected to be encountered at about 2800 feet.

At Deep Rock Test

All signs point to the Deep Rock Oil Co. Hyman No. 1 on section 88, block 29, W. & N. W. survey, being made a good little commercial well.

The pumping tests indicate it is good for forty barrels of oil per day and the gas showing seems to be increasing.

The Deep Rock Oil Company plans to drill an offset test.

At O'Daniel Test Well

Pumping the O'Daniel No. 1 on section 34, block 30, Twp 1 S in the eastern part of Howard county, has shown that this well is improving. Following the heavy shot some months ago the well looked good for only about 15 to 20 barrels of oil per day, but pumping tests indicate it will produce twice as much at this time.

When properly cleaned out it may do even better.

In the Chalk Section

At the rate drilling is progressing on the wells in the Chalk section, several of these tests should reach the depth at which pay was found in the Owen and Sloan Chalk No. 1.

Of the five wells now drilling the Marland Oil Company's Chalk No. 1, on the southeastern quarter of section 113, is making the best time. On Wednesday afternoon this test was drilling in a brown shale below 780 feet. The drillers were making 75 feet each tower.

Owen and Sloan Chalk No. 2, 600 feet south of the discovery well was drilling below 675 feet. The drill was pounding away in the red beds and they were troubled with caving.

Carey and Lockhart Chalk No. 1, on section 114 and just east of the discovery well, was drilling in the red beds between 500 and 600 feet. Carey and Lockhart Scott No. 1, on section 86, was drilling between 300 and 400 feet.

Carey and Lockhart Roberts No. 1 on section 97, is to spud in before the first of the coming month.

The Magnolia Petroleum Co. spudded in their Chalk No. 1 on section 114, Wednesday morning. They have the equipment and material to make this a thorough test for deep oil should they fail to encounter the shallow production found in the Owen and Sloan Chalk No. 1.

The Magnolia Company has the material at their supply yards at New Iatan for the construction of a pipe line from the Chalk field to their tank farm at New Iatan.

MEN AND WOMEN MUST WORK TOGETHER

The eighteenth biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs has passed into history. From May 25 until June 5, ten thousand women from every State in the Union and many foreign lands met at Atlantic City to talk over the human problems of the home, the community, the State, the Nation and the world at large.

This meeting was probably the greatest women's convention the world has ever known. That is a sweeping statement. But it will do to think about before you contradict it. In the first place it was even made the target of ridicule by some of the great (?) writers of the Nation which is a sure sign of real greatness. Every great cause has had to run the gauntlet of ridicule in order to fire the very best there was in it and urge the promoters to do their best and sanest thinking. Ridicule, if not carried too far, is one of the best goads to the advancement of any worthy cause. It is one of the best publicity agents a cause can have because there are millions of people who would rather read the funny criticisms of prejudiced and narrow-minded people than to read the great good things that are being done. But at least they hear about it. And incidentally they may hear something worth while. It's just like going to church to criticize the preacher. You may hear something that will convict you of your sins and make a man of you.

So, if you are an enthusiastic club woman, do not let it worry you if you read in some big daily that "10,000 women had deserted their homes to talk about better homes." How about WARS? How many daddies have left their homes to go to war, and many of them never came back. How about the fat stock shows, the automobile conventions, the bee keepers' and cattlemen's conventions, the swine breeders' conventions, and all the other meetings that are held every year? Wonder who takes care of the bees and calves and pigs while father goes to all these meetings to study ways and means of raising better calves and pigs and bees.

Anyway, if you had been at that General Federation convention you probably would have noticed that the most active women in that great organization were gray-haired women. Most of their home duties had been completed. Most of their children had left the home nest to build other nests for themselves and their fledglings. The General Federation draws most of its mental and spiritual sustenance from the mature and deep rooted lives and experiences of the mothers of yesterday. And one of the prime purposes of the General Federation of Women's Clubs is to pool this mature and ripened experience and use it to pave the pathways of the future generations of women. Why not? Do women not learn by experience as well as men? Where would the world be today if no one had ever profited by the experience of others?

This is one of the missions of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. To pass the knowledge gained on down the line to help others to live better lives after us.

Even though ten thousand or more of the club women were at that meeting there were still about 2,999,000 of us who could not go, beside the other 25,000,000 women in America who do not belong to the General Federation of Women's Clubs. But most of us could read. And thanks to the national press who served the absent millions, so faithfully during those lively days. And, after all, one of the best ways to get the very best of any big meeting is through the press, for through the press as a great thought separator you get the CREAM of the convention while most of the blue milk goes to waste, and you do not have to pay the high price of the hotels to get it.

And now that it is over we are wondering what lesson you gained from it that will mean most to the future of our country. Was it the stand the women took on prohibition, the child labor bill, the "sob stuff" that floods the daily press on women's and men's weakest natures, our peace problems, the home survey, the music contests, the entertainment provided by Atlantic City, our foreign relations, or what did you think was the greatest lesson taught by the 18th biennial of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Just to bestir every woman's club in Texas to do its best thinking and this means every organization of women no matter what you call yourselves for what's the difference. If you are trying to do good, here is what we believe is one of the best thoughts broadcasted at that meeting. It is a part of the report of

the president, Mrs. John D. Sherman and reads like this:

"Looking to the future of women's work there will come a time when it shall not be differentiated from men's work. The ideal club of the future will be a mixed club of men and women. Women should begin today to arrange frequent meetings at which men are present. There should be an exchange of opinions—the man's point of view and the woman's point of view. New contacts will bring new life. To bring about this new interest women must take home to their families a finer impression of what the club is really doing for her and incidentally for her home and family, her church, and community. Command respect, don't whine for it. Inspire a closer cooperation and a finer, deeper companionship; don't fret for it."

In other words, Mrs. Sherman means the greatest need of the world today is a better understanding and a closer cooperation between the men and women who are the joint owners of the home, the community, the school, the church, the State and the Nation, to the end that the good that both men and women are struggling to accomplish may be more effective. Why teach and preach unity of purpose and a better understanding between men and women in the home and still keep up this everlasting wrangle of women's rights and men's rights outside the home? Especially when the world is our home. Think of the time and brains that have been wasted by men and women fighting one another instead of cooperating in every good work for the safety of their only worthwhile possession—the CHILD.

When men and women both make the child, which is the greatest product of all men and women on this earth, the chief object of their lives then a lot of troublesome misunderstandings will fade into oblivion and we will have taken the first step toward world peace. But until American men and women can work in harmony to build up their own homes and communities why expect the nations of the earth to work in unison for world peace?

STERLING COUNTY OIL NEWS

The California Davis No. 1, on the southeast 1-4 of section 288, block 2, H. & T. C. Ry. Co., 3-4 of a mile north of the town limits, is drilling past 2050 feet. The crew at this test is making rapid progress.

Deep Rock Hyman No. 1, on Section 88, block 29, W. & N. W. Ry. Co., 24 miles northwest of here, is swabbing around 54 barrels of oil per day. The owners of this well are considering another shot at 2770 feet. It is reported that the gas pressure in the Hyman well is constantly increasing.

An offset to the Chalk well on section 113, block 29, W. & N. W. Ry. Co., 24 miles northwest of here, was spudded in last Monday. This makes the second offset well to be spudded in near the Chalk well within the last two weeks. There is great activity around the Sloan-Owen Chalk discovery well and this field is still the center of attraction.

Deep Rock Clark No. 1, on section 17, block 15, H. & T. C. Ry. Co., 8 miles southeast of here is drilling past 2340 feet.

The new well on the northwest 1-4 of section 21, block 11, S. P. Ry. Co., 9 miles southeast of here is nearly ready to spud in. The drilling crew is here and will begin drilling as soon as a few tools arrive. This new location belongs to the Exploration Oil Co. of Texas with headquarters at San Angelo. The company is chiefly composed of San Angelo men. This well will be known as Broome No. 1.

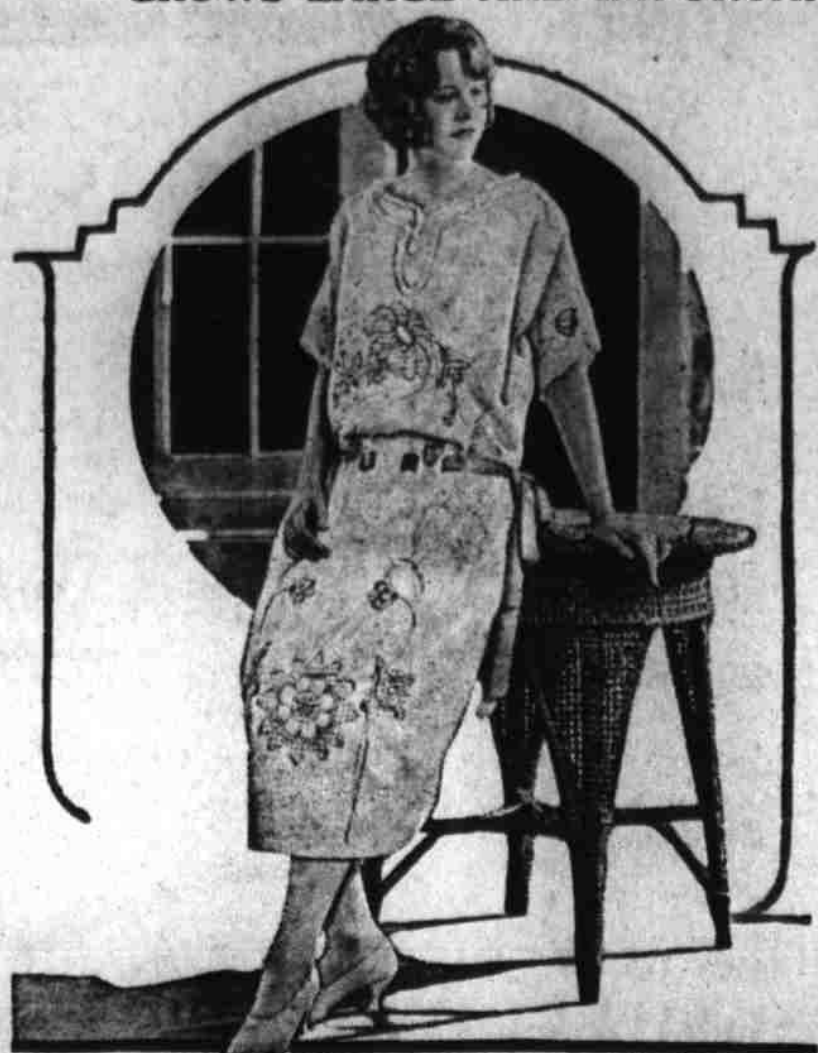

THE FAMILY OF TUB FROCKS GROWS LARGE AND IMPORTANT



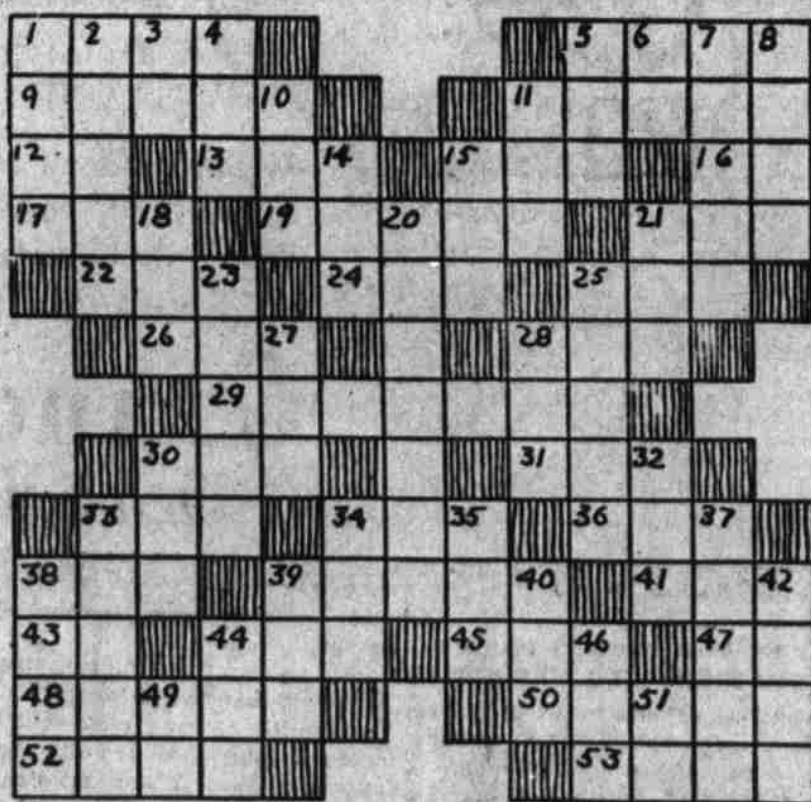

GRASSHOPPER POISON

The grasshoppers are showing up in destructive numbers over the county and are most sure to do a great deal of damage if they are not poisoned.

The following formula has been used extensively and has been found quite reliable and effective:

Wheat Bran.....25 lbs.
Paris green or white arsenic, 1 lb.
Lemons or oranges (finely chopped).....6

Low grade molasses, such as refuse from sugar factories, or sorghum syrup or stock molasses (black strap).....2 quarts
Water.....2 to 4 gallons

The water should be used in sufficient quantities to moisten the bran to the point that it will form a ball when tightly squeezed in the hand.

The bran and poison should be mixed dry. The fruits are then finely chopped or ground and then added. The water and molasses are then added and the mixture thoroughly stirred.

This poison should be sowed broadcast around the ends of the rows and for a few feet into the grass and weeds on the fence rows. As the hoppers mature rapidly after hatching out it is advisable to watch carefully and when the young ones begin to appear the poison should be distributed. Early in the morning or late in the afternoon for distributing the poison seems to have given more satisfactory results.

When I was a boy I set traps for quail. It was customary to bait the traps with corn, which I carried in my coat pocket. While making the rounds of the traps I would crack the grains and chew the starchy kernels. It wasn't long before I found myself eating the kernels after dinner, and after other meals; and when the trapping season closed, I still craved cracked corn after eating food or fruit, or even after drinking water. My companion recommended a sweet moss tobacco which soon became an acceptable substitute for corn, but which claimed more attention than corn. It cost more than corn, was without food value, and claimed my time and attention after each meal, and all day long finally. There was no substitute for it. Corn had now become a passion.

The situation was alarming. Something had to be done right now. I quit while the habit was young. It is so much harder to break a habit than to make it.

The mind, like the body, grows by what it feeds on. A charming personality indicates a bright mind, a healthy body, a sweet spirit, and a well regulated daily life. WHAT ARE ESSENTIAL FOODS IN OUR DIET?

It is impossible to make a list of
the essential foods, says the United
States Department of Agriculture.
There are essential nutrients or
nourishing substances in foods, how-
ever, and we may list foods that con-

a list for a child 1-2 years or older
would contain for a day at least a
pint of milk; an egg or helping of
meat; a whole-grain cereal break-
fast food, or whole-grain bread, or a

meal at least one cooked vegetable
other than potato; at one meal fruit,
fresh, canned or dried; and at an-
other fresh fruit or a raw green
vegetable such as lettuce, or a little

DEMobilize ! !

When the war ended million of
soldier boys were permitted to lay
down their arms and return to pri-
vate life. There was no difficulty
in demobilizing them and removing
their names from the public payroll.

Not so, however, with many thou-
sands of men and women in the gov-
ernment employ—in the nation,
states, and their political sub-divi-
sions. The very thought that this
army of employees should be reduced
because their services were no longer
required, met with immediate pro-
test and opposition. From the date
of the Armistice to the present
moment that attitude of mind has
been largely maintained.

It is estimated that salaries and
wages for people on the public pay-
roll are now in excess of \$3,500 mil-
lions. This amount is going to 2-
700,000 public employees.

A halt must be called. It must
begin with the smallest government
unit. Each board of control, each
group of elective officers, must make
a survey as to the amount of work
that is required in their respective
departments; how many employees
doing a full day's work should be en-
gaged to perform those tasks. If,
then, it is found that the numbers
actually on the pay roll exceed that
number, the process of demobiliza-
tion should begin.

It is estimated that as a result of
this process the number of employees
can easily be reduced to 2,000,000.
This will save the taxpayers about
one billion dollars annually. With-
out impairing the efficiency of gov-
ernment this demobilization will add
to the morale of public service, will
unburden the taxpayers and will re-
lease for profitable employment
these many thousands of men and
women now subsisting upon the pub-
lic.

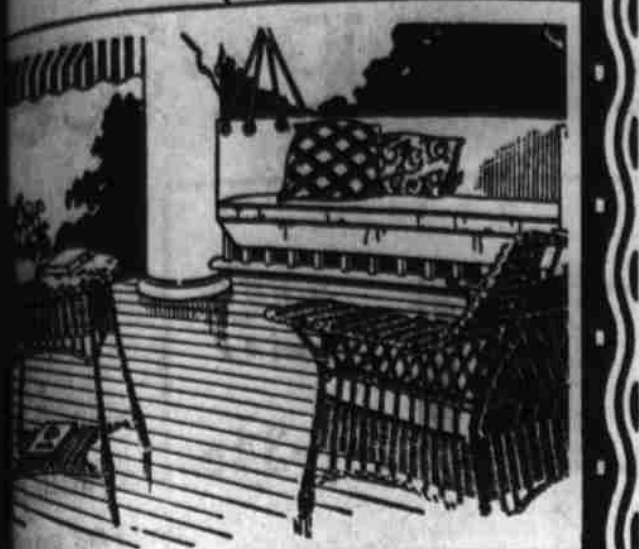

AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION WORK

There is no more important problem confronting agricultural progress than the need for disseminating of agricultural information. This information must of necessity be given to the individual through lectures, demonstrations and home project work.

Agricultural education is as necessary for those who till the soil as is the literary foundation for those who made teaching their profession. If an agricultural education is of no value to the person who either tills the soil or supervises the work then a literary education is of little value to the prospective teacher. Preparation for service is the first essential to success.

If farm boys and girls are to be good farm and home managers they must have schooling that better equips them for these responsibilities.

Can we expect the public schools to do this work as effectively as it should be done and at the same time do its exacted duty in literary. It is an undisputed fact that home project work done through boys and girls clubs develops interest that can be reached in no other way. "Ownership," to the average boy or girl is the first step in interest. The thrill that comes with owning the pig, the calf, the poultry or the dress is a propelling incentive to greater effort and achievement. We learn to do by doing, and the daily task of feeding the pig, poultry or the calf must be kept as a record in order that the profit or loss be ascertained. The spirit of competition is developed and the desire to excel is encouraged by fairs and contests.

That there is an urgent need and demand for Community Leadership would not be disputed. Teaching boys and girls how to work together in groups for the interest of all, allowing individuals an opportunity for expression in projects of interest, develops leaders with ability whose talent needed group action for encouragement. If the Club boy becomes interested in some phase of farm life to the extent that he gives more time and attention to it, or if perchance some association or event has inspired him to greater effort, or an ambition stimulated for better things, these are dividends that dollars cannot buy, and are results of a long time program.

If 200 counties in Texas have County Agents and Home Demonstration Agents, why shouldn't Howard County?

GRASSHOPPERS AND CUT-WORMS IN 1926

Since damage from grasshoppers and cutworms occurs quite early in the season, farmers at this time will be interested in what is anticipated in the way of damage during the spring of 1926.

We feel that Texas in general is comparatively safe from grasshopper damage. So far as entomologists have been able to learn, by personal observation and correspondence, eggs were not deposited in any great numbers last fall. Besides, the relatively abundant rains in many sections during the past fall and winter will have the effect of rotting many of the eggs that might have been laid.

Not much was learned of the abundance of insect enemies of the grasshopper in all parts of the state, but in some sections they apparently destroyed them last summer, and in those sections low infestation the coming season may be expected.

These statements are intended only to allay undue anxiety on the part of the farmer on this matter, but not to make him feel entirely secure. There are isolated regions infested by grasshoppers every year, and all farmers, while feeling relieved, should keep a sharp lookout for the pest in pastures and along streams. If they are found hatching in considerable numbers, prompt treatment of these areas with the standard poison bran mash should obviate the necessity of using this same material over wider areas at a later date after migration.—R. R. Reppert, in The Progressive Farmer.

LEGUMES FOR TEXAS

There are legume crops adapted to every section of Texas that may be used in soil building. For summer growth, East Texas has cowpeas, soybeans, velvet beans, peanuts, and lespedeza. For winter and early spring growth, there is vetch and certain of the clovers. Central Texas has the cowpea, while peanuts do well on the sandy lands of the section. A winter-growing legume has long been needed in this section. Recently, I visited the experiment station at Denton. Up there, I found that Nicholson's Winter pea, an importation from Austria, has given excellent results the two years it has been grown. It has stood winter-killing better than any other legume, and at the time of my visit—February 25—the land was well covered with vegetation. Then in addition to the above-mentioned, there is sweet clover. Our Central and West Texas farmers are slighting a splendid crop when they fail to use sweet clover. West Texas also has its legumes. Cowpeas and peanuts so far have been best for summer growth out there.—Eugene Butler, in The Progressive Farmer.

BETTER COTTON SHOULD BRING BETTER PRICE

The premium on staple cotton except during the year 1919 has not been sufficient to encourage to go in for a better grade of cotton. A few more years such as last when the market was flooded with a low grade cotton for which there was no market may cause mill operators to offer a better premium for staple cotton. West Texas should specialize on a staple cotton as we can produce the strong fibre that is so much in demand.

We should go after that railroad line from Amarillo to San Antonio. Such a line would prove a better paying line than would another railroad from the Panhandle to Fort Worth. The Missouri Pacific and the Santa Fe would be interested in this.

When you note the number of tourist cars passing over the highways in our city these days you can begin to estimate the value of such highway. Better roads are worth the money.

VOTING IS A SOLEMN DUTY

The Government is just what the people make it. The man or woman who refuses to vote has no right to complain if the administration of public affairs does not meet with his or her approval.

Texas will not have an efficient, economical administration of its affairs until the voters of the State cease to follow the lead of the best hand-shaker or that of the man or woman who finds notoriety and secures publicity through some sensational political event. Too long have Texas voters given their support to candidates without other qualifications than that of being able to make a good speech, or perhaps to those who are most proficient in blackening the character of an opponent. Just why we Texans love a "hot" campaign and are willing to place the responsibility of spending millions of public money, our money, in the hands of men and women with no other recommendation than that of being good campaigners, is hard to understand. Why should we vote for a man for governor because he secured newspaper publicity through some act or accomplishment of a sensational nature, and entirely foreign to any duty the governor might be called upon to perform? Why do so many give their votes to candidates who are adept at creating and destroying straw men as a form of entertainment for the people?

Government was created to serve the people. Putting men into office to administer the affairs of Government is a duty calling for careful consideration of every person qualified to vote. The qualifications of every man or woman offering for office should be carefully considered and weighed, and that opportunity is now before us. We have several candidates for governor and numerous candidates for all other elective offices in State, district and county. Let the voters lay aside personal preference and prejudice and give thought to the qualifications and honesty of each man or woman in accordance with the office aspired to, and vote with intelligence and with due consideration for the welfare of the State and the people. It is necessary to have a good lawyer for attorney general. Being a lawyer is not a necessary qualification of a governor. Not that a lawyer would not make a good governor. Some have, but other qualifications are more essential. A governor must be a good business man as well as a good executive. He must have a high sense of duty and the courage to perform it. Put lawyers in where

lawyers can serve best, educators at the head of the school system, and business men in places where their qualifications will prove of most value to the people.

If the voters of Texas want good Government, let them put the various candidates under the microscope and determine their fitness for the office to which they aspire. Don't let any outside and immaterial issues influence the vote on July 24. — Farm and Ranch.

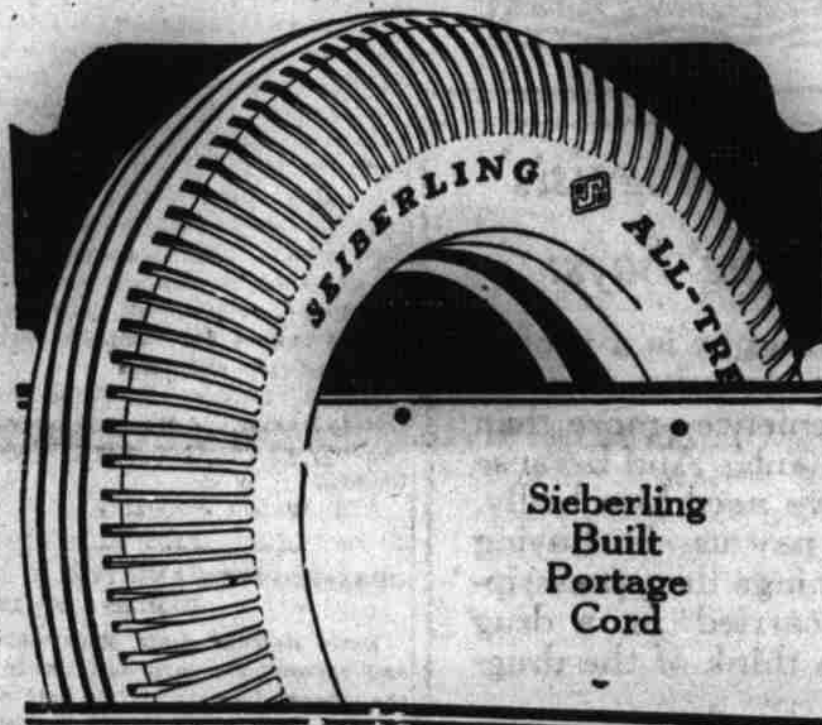

TEXAS POTASH

The finance committee of the board of regents of the University met in Houston the other day to consider the matter of investing the \$3,500,000 which its oil royalties have brought to that institution, but it gave some incidental consideration to the prospective passage of Senator Sheppard's bill looking to the development of a supply of potash in this country. The University has a double interest in that measure. The fact that there are potash deposits in Texas is mostly the discovery of the University's Bureau of Economic Geology, and pretty nearly all that is known as to the extent of them is the product of its investigations. It must seem likely that if the explorations provided for by the Sheppard bill should be made, the Bureau of Economic Geology would have a large part in so much of the work as would be done in Texas. But the University has a larger concern in the fate of that measure because of the possibility, not to say the probability, that potash deposits susceptible to commercial exploitation will be found underneath lands that are a part of its endowment. The prospect of having its oil revenues augmented by potash revenues may well command some consideration from the finance committee of the board of regents.

The promise, or, to state it perhaps better, the prediction that potash deposits worthy of exploitation would be discovered in Texas has not excited much interest among the people of the State, though probably as much as did the promise made by the first oil well drilled inside Texas. That the prospect warrants more interest than has been manifested is suggested by the fact that the subject was discussed rather fully during the recent meeting of the American Mining Congress in Cincinnati. One of the mining engineers attending, Dr. Henry Mace Payne of Washington, made a statement with respect to it which should make the people of Texas sit up and take notice of a prospect toward which they have seemed indifferent. According to Dr. Payne, there is enough potash beneath 60,000 square miles of Texas land to free "America agriculture of its dependence on Europe for its supply of this vital necessity."—Dallas News.

DEMAND GROWS FOR INFERTILE EGGS

The consumers of poultry products are rapidly being educated to ask for infertile eggs. There is a growing prejudice against the other kind, and for that reason infertile eggs are commanding a premium in the larger markets of the country. Now is the time to segregate the roosters. If they are being held for breeding purposes, put them in a yard by themselves. If not, dispose of them by the axe method, or sell them. Roosters are not useful birds except when worthy of occupying the breeding pen. They are an expense in that they must be fed, and the most of them are hearty eaters. The greatest loss, however, comes from the decrease in the price of fertile eggs. Get rid of them.—Farm and Ranch.

LAWYERS ON THE DEFENSE

Interest in the subject of court reform, taken in its broadest meaning is not confined to Texas and the Southwest. Leading publications throughout the United States have been discussing this subject for more than a year. The courts throughout the country have been and are now being severely criticised, while the rules of procedure and the methods employed by lawyers are being severely condemned. In Texas, conditions are about as bad as they can get without bringing about actual rebellion. Many of the defects of our system of courts and the methods employed by lawyers have been exposed in Farm and Ranch in recent issues, and lawyers are now, for the first time in many years, defending themselves. They are even admitting that reform is needed and claim credit for discussing the matter in their bar association meetings. They say, however, that conditions are not as bad as have been pictured, and that there are more honest lawyers than otherwise.

Farm and Ranch has never charged lawyers with being dishonest in ordinary dealings with their fellow men, but has charged that rules of procedure and methods of practice defeat the ends of justice. Farm and Ranch, in the Senter articles and in editorials, has also charged that the practice of law in Texas has descended to the practice of trickery and that many lawyers who are honest in all other particulars do not hesitate to use unfair, unethical, and even dishonest methods to win a case. The most successful lawyers in Texas are the ones who are best able to hide out the facts in a case before the court, or to use to their own advantage technicalities recognized by the court, although having no direct bearing upon the facts in the matter being considered. The most successful trial lawyer is the one who can frighten or confuse a witness and so adroitly question him that he fails to tell what he actually knows concerning the matter on which he was called to testify. The most successful office lawyer is the one who can advise a client how to

get around a law and keep out of jail.

What the Texas people want and what they eventually will have is a system of courts with rules of procedure that will force lawyers to place before the judge or the jury the plain facts in the case without resorting to trickery, or without hiding behind technicalities. Texas people are tired of a system of courts that encourages delays and long-drawn-out trials. They are tired of antiquated rules of practice and tricky lawyers. They want to be able to look at the courthouse as the home of justice and not as an abiding place of grafters and tax-eaters. They want to feel that when they go into court to adjust a difference with a neighbor, that results will depend upon facts and not upon the question as to who employed the best or the most clever lawyer.

If the members of the Texas Bar Association knew how rapidly sentiment for reform is growing, they would do something besides talk and pass resolutions.—Farm and Ranch.

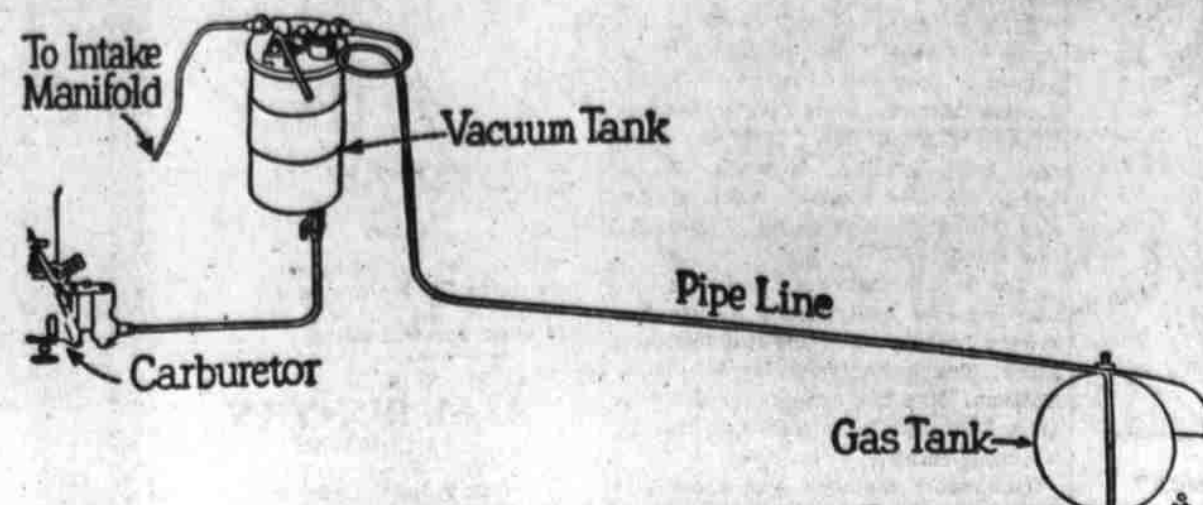

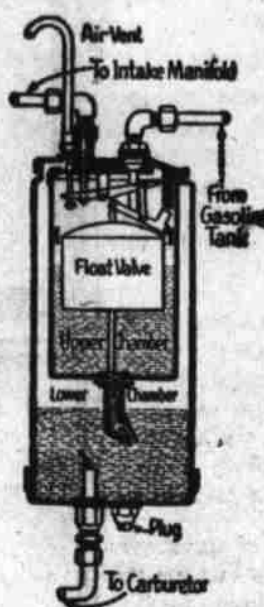

First Aids for Motorists



What Makes the Gas Run Up Hill to your Carburetor?

WHAT ABOUT THE BOLL WEEVIL

Since its entry into Texas more than 35 years ago, the boll weevil has never ceased to be a subject of interest to the people of Southern United States. Now with the advent of another season we find farmers pondering the question. How numerous will the boll weevils be this year? How will I fight them? What percentage of my crop, and of the entire American cotton crop, are they going to destroy?

The number of weevils present in the cotton fields the approaching season, and the consequent damage to the crop, depends largely upon four things—

1. The number of weevils present last fall that found winter quarters.
2. The severity of the winter, affecting as it does the number of the insects that survive until spring, and the consequent early infestation.
3. Weather conditions during the growing season as they affect either the cotton plant or the weevil favorably or unfavorably.
4. The methods and the persistence with which the farmer attempts to control the insect.

Contrary to what many farmers believe, weevils were quite numerous in Texas cotton fields last fall. Although the dry hot weather appeared to reduce them greatly during the summer, so that the damage to the crop was negligible except in some coast counties that experienced considerable rainfall, the cool weather, accompanied by at least slight rains in most places, furnished favorable conditions for the late multiplication. Nor was the defoliation of cotton fields all over the country by the unusually heavy infestation of the leafworm last season a permanent check upon the weevil.

Enough green squares and bolls were left to bring numerous weevil larvae to maturity; and we personally counted on one green terminal bud in a cotton field near San Antonio, in November, four mature weevils feeding, indicating that weevils at that time were numerous, and that even in apparently bare fields, enough green feed was present to enable them to enter winter

quarters in a well-fed condition. Instance might with safety be summed to be typical of conditions those parts of the state that suffer weevil damage.—R. E. F. E. Cans, in The Progressive Farmer.

1,870 P. F. E. CANS HANDLED DURING

Two million three hundred twenty thousand (2,320,000) of ice were required for Pacific Fruit Express car fruit and vegetables at Big Spring during the month of Mar.

1,160 cars requiring about pounds each for re-icing were loaded at this point. In addition cars of precooled fruit and vegetables, 522 P. F. E. cars standard ventilation and 81 cars loaded with merchandise thru Big Spring during the month of Mar. according to E. A. Fathen, Fruit Express agent, located Big Spring.

The car commodity segment passing thru Big Spring was as follows: 593 oranges, 392 cars of cantaloupes, 27 cars of lettuce, 24 cars of lemons, 14 cars of tables, 7 cars celery and 4 miscellaneous; total 1160.

Under standard ventilation were: 392 cars of lemons, 14 oranges, 35 cars of lemons, 2 cars watermelons, 2 cars lettuce, and 43 cars miscellaneous.

The 392 cars of cantaloupes exceeded any previous month of the month of May since the Florida producers started shipping cantaloupes to Eastern markets the re-icing for the month of the heaviest for the same any previous year.

SUCCESSFUL YEAR HAD BY BAPTISTS

Convention at Houston Heard Many
Gratifying Reports on Work.
Evolution Denounced.

\$9,000,000 GOAL IS SET

This Objective for Missions and
Benevolences to Be Sought By
Co-operative Program Commis-
sion for 1927.

Following an unusually good record in the work of the local churches and large achievements on the mission fields, there has just been held at Houston, Texas, one of the most successful sessions of the Southern Baptist Convention in recent years. The session was marked by unusual unity, definiteness of purpose and determination to carry forward the work of the Co-operative Program.

Following the re-election of Dr. George W. McDaniel, Richmond, Va., as president, he sounded in his inaugural address a conviction on the theory of evolution that was promptly and unanimously adopted by the Convention as its own sentiment. Dr. McDaniel said:

"I am happy to believe that this Convention accepts Genesis as teaching that man was the special creation of God and rejects every theory, evolution or other, which teaches that man originated in, or came by way of, a lower animal ancestry."

With the evolution question disposed of, the Convention was able to proceed with a consideration of its great missionary and benevolent enterprises.

Here are some of the outstanding developments of the Convention:

GOAL OF \$9,000,000 SET UP

1. In the hope of enabling the mission boards and other agencies of the Convention to take care of their indebtedness gradually without having to too greatly curtail their present work, an objective of \$9,000,000 for missions, education and benevolences was set up for 1927, on recommendation of the Co-operative Program Commission. This money will be applied to foreign, home and state missions, Baptist schools, orphanages and hospitals and ministerial relief, thus taking care of both the state and Southwide Baptist work. It is hoped the Southwide portion of the budget will amount to at least \$4,000,000.

2. An effort will be made to enlist 500,000 titheers during the next year.

3. The Foreign Mission Board reported 13,369 baptisms on its fields during the year, a gain of about 1,000 over the previous year. The board has 1,215 churches on the foreign fields with 140,488 members, 3,247 out-stations where preaching services are held from time to time, and 528 missionaries and 2,844 native Christian workers employed in 17 countries.

4. Among the results for the year reported by the Home Mission Board were 838 missionaries employed, 19,744 baptisms, 85,226 additions to the churches, 100 new churches and 458 Sunday schools organized, and 402 church houses built or improved.

DENOMINATION GREW DURING YEAR

5. The Sunday School Board reported total business receipts for the year of \$1,710,471. Of this amount \$380,844 was put back into the general work of the denomination. A total of 89,088 awards in teacher training were made, 403 churches were aided by the Architectural Department in drawing plans for new houses of worship, the number of standard Sunday schools reached 546.

With the gains for the past year the main figures of the denomination are now given by the statistical secretary of the Convention as follows: 26,467 churches, 19,908 ordained ministers, 3,649,380 church members, 21,790 Sunday schools with 3,681,828 pupils, 20,965 church houses, 3,197 pastors' homes, \$166,909,278 invested in local church property \$30,771,574 contributed to local church objects, \$8,256,435 to missions and benevolences and \$39,027,099 to all purposes during the past year.

The time is now ripe for a distinct Baptist advance all along the line and especially in a support of great missionary and benevolent enterprises fostered by the Co-operative Program, the Convention leaders believe.

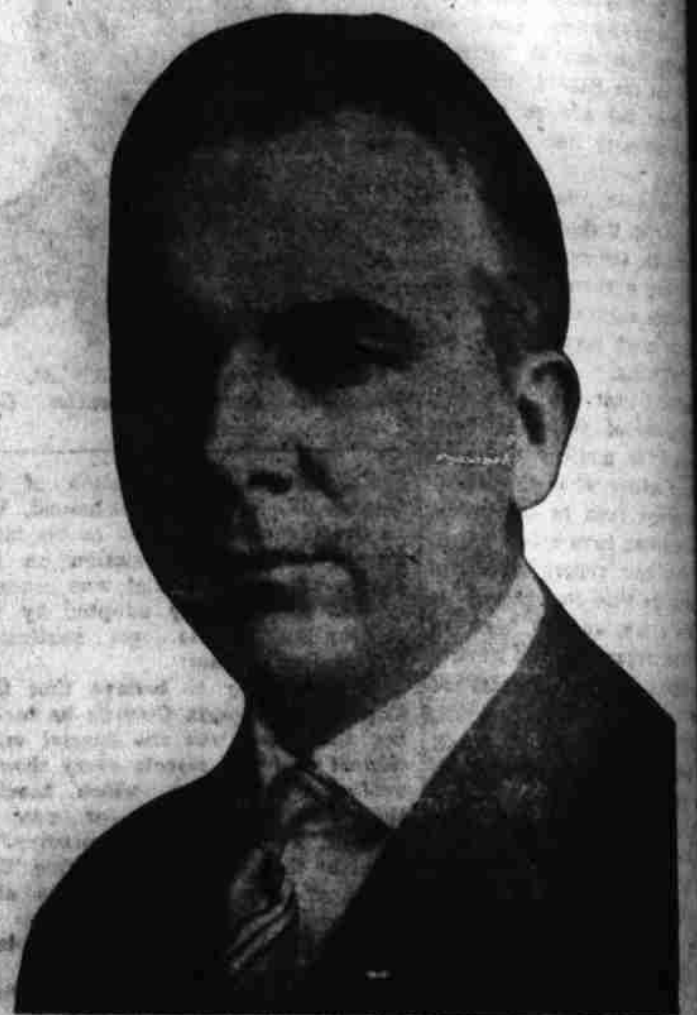
