Crop, Livestock Information Sought

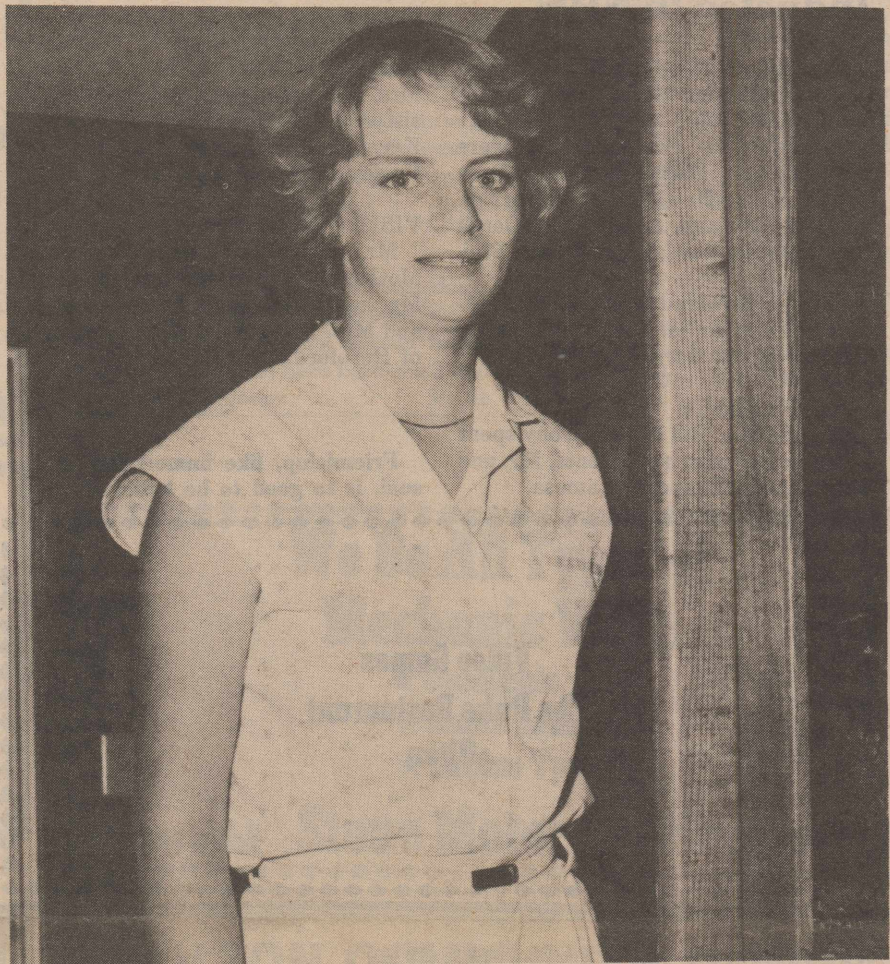
During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The crop and livestock information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews is kept confidential. It is the basis for setting crop acreages and midyear livestock inventories to be published in June for the state of Texas. These crop and livestock reports help farmers and ranchers in working out their production and marketing plans and keep them informed on the current agricultural situation.

Even though response is voluntary, each farmer or rancher who is contacted is urged to cooperate, helping to make the crop and livestock reports as possible.

Achievement Tests Results For Grades 1-10 Received

CAT (California Achievement Test) test results have been received by the Hart ISD. Students in grades one through 10 took the reading portion of this test the first of April. Students in grades six through 10 also took the

math portion.

Any parent interested in the results is encouraged to contact the student's teacher or the counselor in the school. The CAT is a norm referenced test which shows how a student is progressing compared to other students across the United States.

Also the TABS (Texas Assessment of Basic Skills) results have been received. Students in grades, three, five and nine took this test which covers the basic skills of math, reading and writing as prescribed by the Texas Education Agency. The cumulative results of this test will be given to the local school board in June.

Parents who are interested in individual results are encouraged to contact the local counselors. TABS is a criterion referenced test which shows how an individual student is achieving set objectives as prescribed by the Texas Education Agency.

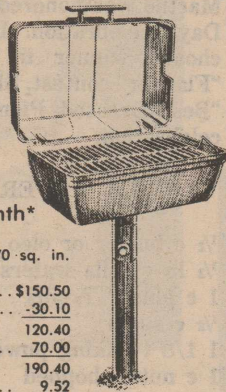

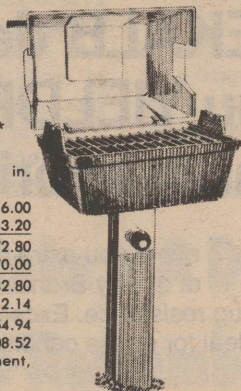

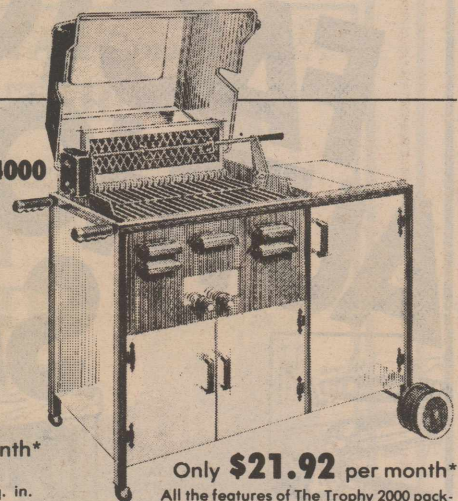

VANILLA WAFER CAKE

1/2 c butter or oleo
 1/2 lb vanilla wafers, crushed
 1 c plus 2 T milk
 1/2 c sugar
 1 1/8 t baking powder
 1 c nuts, chopped
 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten
 3 stiffly beaten egg whites
 1/2 c coconut

Soak vanilla wafers in milk until milk is absorbed. Cream oleo and sugar until fluffy. Add vanilla wafers and milk mixture, mix until smooth.

Add baking powder, nuts and coconut. Stir in egg yolks and vanilla, mix well. Fold in egg whites. Bake at 350° 30-35 minutes in greased, small bundt pan or 9x13 pan. Can be iced or served with whipped cream or Cool Whip.

Graham crackers may be substituted for vanilla wafers.

BUTTERMILK ROLLS

1 c buttermilk
 1/4 c lukewarm water
 1 t sugar
 1/4 t soda
 1 t salt
 3 T soft shortening
 1 pkg or cake yeast
 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 c flour

Scald milk. Cool to lukewarm and add sugar, soda, salt and shortening. Crumble in yeast and stir until dissolved. Stir in flour and beat well. Turn dough onto floured board or pastry cloth. Cover and let stand 10 minutes to tighten up. Knead until smooth and elastic. Shape into rolls and let rise until double in size, 1 to 1 1/4 hrs. Bake at 400° 15-20 mins.

HUMMINGBIRD CAKE

3 c flour
 1 t soda
 1 t cinnamon
 2 c sugar
 1 1/2 c salad oil
 1 t butter flavoring
 3 eggs
 1 (8 oz) can crushed pineapple
 1 c nuts, chopped
 3 bananas, mashed

Mix ingredients by hand in large bowl. Add nuts and mashed bananas, mix slightly. Pour into greased and floured bundt pan. Bake at 350° 1 hr and 5 mins. Cool 10 mins. Frost with glazed icing while cake is still warm.
