## Reagan Cites 'Tyranny Record' In UN Address

UNITED NATIONS, (AP) — President Reagan, ignoring a Soviet challenge to renounce first use of nuclear weapons, accused Kremlin leaders today of compiling a "record of tyranny" through global aggression

and trying to manipulate the peace movement in the West.

In a speech at a special U.N. General Assembly session on disarmament, Reagan portrayed the United States as a champion of arms control since

World War II and challenged the Soviets to show by "deeds, not words" that they are sincere about curbing the arms race.

Reagan accused the Soviets of violating arms control agreements and the 1925 Geneva protocol banning use of chemical weapons.

"In the nuclear era, the major powers bear a

special responsibility to ease these sources of conflict and refrain from aggression," Reagan said. "That is why we are so deeply concerned by Soviet conduct."

Reagan spoke before the same forum where Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko drew heavy applause Tuesday with a declaration from Soviet President Leonid

Brezhnev that his country will not use nuclear weapons first in any conflict.

While Reagan did not address that issue in his speech, a senior administration official shrugged off the importance of the Soviet pledge, saying the United States could not base its military planning simply on a declaration from Moscow.

In his speech, Reagan cited a U.S. arms control record that began in 1946 with a proposal to turn control of nuclear weapons and atomic energy over to an international authority, and continues with his recent plan for reducing U.S. and Soviet warhead stockpiles.

Recalling the words of President Eisenhower, Reagan said, "We are for peace, first, last and always."

While committing the United States to work for real arms control measures, Reagan said, "We need more than mere words, more than empty promises, before we can proceed."

## Thursday update

### Argentina Stonewalls Plan

More than 9,000 captured Argentine troops huddled on the freezing Falkland Islands today while Argentina stonewalled British demands for a formal declaration ending the South Atlantic war.

John Woodward said Wednesday that hundreds of the prisoners could die of exposure, disease and starvation in temperatures that dipped to 4-degrees at night unless Argentina guarantees British ships safe passage to carry them home.

"At the moment, there are a lot of partly starved men standing in exposed conditions," he said. "I cannot keep their troops dry and warm and fed while we are still subject to attack."

Some of the Argentines ran amok Wednesday night and "looted and destroyed the post office and town hall," British Broadcasting Corp. correspondent Robert Fox reported from the Falklands today. He said a company of British marines was called in to restore order.

### July 4th Panel Sets Session

The Chamber of Commerce July 4th Committee has scheduled a meeting for 9 a. m. Friday in the chamber-BCD conference room to discuss last-minute details for the annual Independence Day Celebration.

At the same time, it was announced that the starting time had been changed for the White Buffalo Stampede, which will be sponsored by the Rotary Club. Earlier announced for a 10 a. m. start, it is being moved up to 7 a. m. Saturday, July 3, said Jerry Vestal, organizer of the event. Vestal said runners from Abilene, Houston, San Angelo, Big Spring and other points have indicated interest in the Stampede, and they all prefer an earlier start.

"The serious runners are concerned about the heat factor later in the day," Vestal said.

Meanwhile, Murray Anne Ray, general chairman, urged organizations to get their requests in for concession booth space and for the July 4th Queen's contest.

Fourteen requests for booth space had been received at the chamber office this morning, and five nominees for queen had been registered.

The queen candidates

are Jacqueline Pylant, sponsored by the Rotary Club; Amy Beaver, sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's Club; Kary Johnice Fulfer, sponsored by Lannie and Karen McAden; Debbie Foree, sponsored by the Jaycees; and Aileta Hall, sponsored by Snyder Shriners.

"We should have more than this," said Mrs. Ray. Organizations usually operate a number of concession booths in the park during the annual celebration. This year, the July 4th observance will be a two-day event since Independence Day falls on Sunday. Many of the traditional activities will be held on Saturday, July 3, with events in the park continuing through Sunday evening when the fireworks display will close out the celebration.

The five queen candidates already are selling tickets, and potential sponsors of others should register at the chamber office and pick up their tickets as soon as possible. The Independence Day Queen will be determined on the basis of tickets sold on her behalf. Funds from the ticket sales are used to pay for the fireworks display and for other expenses incurred in staging the celebration.

### Beirut Airport Under Attack

By The Associated Press Beirut airport came under heavy shelling today and Israeli armored columns moved against Yasser Arafat's guerrillas east of Lebanon's capital.

The new fighting came amid reliable reports that the Palestine Liberation Organization had offered to discuss with the Lebanese government "a new form of Palestinian presence in Lebanon."

The PLO leadership denied reports it was prepared to lay down its arms, but it engaged in a flurry of secret diplomatic activity involving U.S. presidential envoy Philip C. Habib and Lebanese President Elias Sarkis.

The Tel Aviv command said Palestinian guerrillas bombarded Israeli troops around the airport, damaging three parked airliners. It said Israeli forces east of Beirut also came under a barrage of the rockets and Israeli

troops fired back.

But Salim Salam, the managing director of Lebanon's Middle East Airlines, told reporters that Israeli gunboats shelled the airport and "two Boeing-720s belonging to M.E.A. were wrecked and the airline's building sustained several direct hits."

Salam appealed for neutralization of the airport compound, saying further damage would be a "national disaster."

### Day Care Gets \$4,000 Check

The Snyder Child Day Care Center announced the receipt of a check for \$4,000 from the Shell Oil Company and the Corporate Child Development fund for Texas Wednesday.

The grant will be used to match state and federal funds from the Texas Department of Human Resources to provide child care services in the Snyder area.

Center Director Shirley Fritz said, "This grant comes at a critical time for us." Recent cutbacks in state and federal funding have created a need for greater private funding for the center.

"We very much appreciate the help from Shell Oil and the other companies which made this possible," she said.

The Snyder center provides day care services to the children of working parents. Since many of these children come from low income homes, tuition at the center is subsidized

by both public and private funds.

The Snyder Day Care Center is funded locally by the United Way and several local churches.

The Corporate Fund for Child Development in Texas was established by the Levi Strauss Foundation 3 years ago. Its purpose is to channel corporate charitable funds into community based child care programs.

According to Joe Adams, who represented Shell at the presentation, "Shell Oil, which is working through the Corporate Fund, desires to be a good corporate citizen by helping worthwhile programs in communities where we have employees."

Some 30 Texas corporations and foundations contribute to the Corporate Fund. Some of those corporations operating in the Snyder area include Sun Gas, Atlantic Richfield, Exxon, Getty Oil, American General, Great American Reserve and Allstate Insurance.

## Galtieri Tries To Keep Post

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Gen. Leopoldo Galtieri struggled to hang on to his six-month-old presidency today as public outrage over the British victory in the Falkland Islands fueled the clamor for a return to democracy.

The 55-year-old army commander spent four hours late Wednesday night closeted with the nation's top generals. Similar meetings took place at the navy and air force headquarters.

Galtieri has not been seen in public since British troops defeated their Argentine counterparts Monday. He canceled a scheduled public appearance Tuesday after about 5,000 Argentines rioted outside the presidential palace.

Scrambling to stem the outcry, the government hastily called a meeting of all major civilian political leaders.

But leaders from the five largest parties boycotted the meeting, at which Interior Minister Alfredo Saint Jean promised to ease restrictions on political activity. He set no dates.

Raul Alfonsin, a leader in Radical Party, second largest after the Peronists, called for an end to rule by the armed forces, which seized power in a 1976 coup.

"Nobody has the right to use Argentine unity to shore up governments that are tumbling down," he said.

An influential group of Argentine businessmen, the National Convocation of Businessmen issued a statement calling for new "personnel to recuperate lost confidence" in the government's economic and political policies.

"A change must come now!" it said.

The Argentina Human Rights Assembly criticized the government's handling of the hostile mob that gathered underneath Galtieri's balcony Tuesday night. Club-wielding police, firing tear gas and rubber bullets, charged the demonstrators who responded by burning three vehicles and stoning store windows.

The assembly called the police action "an unthinkable and indiscriminate repression that not only enveloped

demonstrators but passersby, reporters and photographers representing national and international media."

Assistant Secretary of Interior Col. Bernardo Menendez denied the government was in crisis. He told journalists "the government is stable" and the armed forces are united.

The government Wednesday night provided its first official explanation of what happened in the Falklands.

It said the British "par-

tial victory" was do t superior weaponry, including sophisticated new devices that had turned the Falklands into military proving ground.

It blamed the United States for having given Britain intelligence and materiel support.

Although Britain is holding more than 9,000 Argentine war prisoners on the Falklands prisoner Argentina is calling the situation in the South Atlantic archipelago cease-fire rather than surrender.

# Crowd Watches As Man Is Jailed For Killings

KERMIT, Texas (AP) — A crowd of more than 100 people gathered to watch police escort a parolee accused of slaying a Kermit woman and her daughter to the Winkler County jail, officials said.

Justice of the Peace Lee Tutledge said the crowd Wednesday night was orderly "and they had enough police around here to protect him."

Oilfield worker Michael Eugene Sharp, 28, of Desha was arrested at a wastewater bus station at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday after local authorities saw a bulletin that Sharp possibly was headed for Louisiana and traveling by bus, said Nolan County Sheriff Don Nolan.

Sharp is charged with capital murder in the deaths of Brenda Kay Broadway, 31, and Christi

Mechelle Elms, 8, whose bodies were found Friday in a 26-inch-deep grave 16 miles southeast of Kermit.

He also is charged with aggravated kidnapping in the abduction of those two victims plus Ms. Broadway's 14-year-old daughter, Selena Kay Elms, at 12:30 a.m. Friday at a Kermit car wash.

Sharp, who had been sought since an aggravated kidnapping warrant was issued for his arrest Monday, was denied bond when he appeared Wednesday before County Judge Donald Menn.

He was held in the Nolan County Jail until he was transferred to Kermit.

Underwood said Sharp offered no resistance when arrested.

"We suprised him when he got off the bus. He didn't know who we were. We didn't have our badges or anything showing," Underwood said.

Underwood said his office checked the bus schedule and met the bus, which was about 10 minutes late.

Winkler County sheriff's officials said they had obtained the warrant for Sharp's arrest after getting information from Selena Kay Elms, who had

escaped about 2:30 a.m. Friday while her mother was being killed near a cattle-watering tank.

Miss Elms, nude and bound by the hands, traveled five miles on foot over rugged terrain before reaching help at an oil drilling site about 8 a.m., said Sgt. Mike Eggleston of the Winkler County sheriff's office.

The grave with the two bodies was found near another stock tank two miles from the slaying scene, he said.

## Man Indicted For Rooftop Slayings

NEW YORK (AP) — A man arrested with a bloodstained van has been indicted for the rooftop slayings of three CBS employees and a woman who was cooperating with authorities in a \$6 million diamond fraud case.

Donald Nash — also known as Donald J. Bowers — 46, of Keansburg, N.J., was arrested in Frankfort, Ky., a week after the April 12 murders. Nash, who police sources say has been associated with a gang of West Side criminals known as "The Westies," was to be arraigned today on four counts of murder after the indictment was returned Wednesday. If convicted, he faces 25 years to life in prison.

## Tax Refunds Are Delayed

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — The governor of Indiana has decided to delay \$25 million in income tax refunds until after the start of the next fiscal year July 1.

Opponents of the plan announced Wednesday by Gov. Robert D. Orr said it amounted to "a tax increase without legislative action." State Sen. Louis J. Mahern, assistant Democratic minority leader, called it "fiscal sleight of hand."

The state is short of cash because revenue is \$70.3 million below projections. Orr also canceled raises for all state employees.

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Some of the 31 children found packed in two motel rooms have been interviewed by prosecutors trying to determine if other charges would be filed against a man who recruited them to sell candy door-to-door.

## Compromise Under Probe

PEKING (AP) — China and the United States are drafting a crucial compromise document meant to solve Chinese objections to Washington's arms sales to Taiwan, diplomatic sources said today.

Details of the document and exact positions have not been disclosed, but both sides are exchanging drafts and discussing the wording of a formula to solve the problem, said the sources who asked not to be identified.

President Reagan and Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. are closely involved in the process, the sources said.

China's Communist government has angrily objected to U.S. military sales to Taiwan, which Peking considers a breakaway province. Chinese leaders have strongly hinted they will downgrade U.S. relations unless those sales stop. Talks have been held in Peking since November to reach a compromise.

Taiwan, an island of 18 million people, is governed by the Chinese Nationalists who fled the mainland in 1949 when the Communists triumphed in a civil war.

The United States recognized Taiwan as the seat of China's legitimate government until 1979, when Washington broke ties with the Nationalists and established relations with Peking. But under the Taiwan Relations Act, the United States pledged to sell defensive weapons to Taiwan.

Diplomatic sources said in the compromise document, the United States is expected to reaffirm its previously stated position that Taiwan is part of China and U.S. arms sales to the island will eventually end.

## Japan, U.S. Set Talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Amid estimates that the U.S. trade deficit with Japan could reach \$20 billion this year, a top State Department official has announced that there will be a new round of talks between the countries this fall.

Robert Hormats, assistant secretary for economic affairs, said Wednesday that the United States will seek a reduction in the 30-percent tariff Japan has on tobacco goods and a liberalization of quotas on a broad range of other farm products.

with a child for allegedly molesting a 12-year-old girl, who was part of his traveling sales force.

He was being held in lieu of \$100,000 bond Wednesday in the El Paso County jail.

Assistant District Attorney Carol Penneck videotaped interviews with some of the San Antonio children Wednesday and planned to finish interviewing 26 of the 31 children today.

"Until we have interviewed them all, it will be difficult to say what, if any, other charges will be

filed against him," she said.

Five of the children were those of Ali and his wife, Fatimah. They were released into Mrs. Ali's custody Wednesday afternoon after officials decided there was no reason to hold them.

Harry Kincaid, child placement supervisor for the state Department of Human Resources here, said the family remained in El Paso on Wednesday to see what would become of Ali.

Meanwhile, the other 26 children were to be

reunited with their parents in San Antonio this evening, Kincaid said.

He said a bus chartered by the department would leave about 7 p.m.

The children's plight came to the attention of Kincaid's department Monday night when police found some youngsters on the streets and returned them to a central El Paso motel.

There, police found the 31 children, the Alis and another woman all staying in two motel rooms, Kincaid said.

Child welfare in-

vestigators interviewed the children Tuesday and then took them into state custody when Ali was arrested.

Kincaid said the children, who range in age from 9 to 15, had been placed in Ali's care by their parents, who were assured they would be well fed and would earn money for school.

Ali is founder and president of a two-year-old firm called Action Youth Self-Help Inc., which recruits children for the candy sales force.

"We don't have any

reason to think the parents knew what was going on," Kincaid said. "They all thought it was on the up and up. Some of the kids come from pretty poor backgrounds and I guess it sounded real good to the parents."

Instead, the children were worked long hours seven days a week, fed irregularly and didn't receive the promised 75 cents for each \$2.50 box of candy sold, he said.

"They were told they would receive their money at the end of this thing," he said.

Kincaid said the children, who were in good health, crammed into two vans and left San Antonio nearly two weeks ago. They sold candy in several West Texas cities before coming to El Paso on Monday, he said.

Wednesday, the children kept workers at the Southwestern Community Home busy as they played games and ate sandwiches.

"They've been cooped up together a lot and they're pretty wild," said Sue Bates, who works part-time at another

children's home. "We had one little fight, but some of the men working here moved in and broke it up. After they ate lunch, things calmed down a lot."

The normally unused home was hastily equipped with mattresses, food and workers after the children were taken into state custody, Kincaid said.

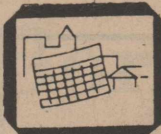

## Sweet Summer Treats Can Sour Kid's Behavior

NEW YORK (AP) — Ice cream cones, hot dogs, marshmallows and soda are typical summer fare for many children. But these foods may make their behavior not-so-typical if they are among the almost 9 million children who cannot tolerate too much sugar in their diets, warns Dr. Jerome Vogel, medical director of the New York Institute for Child Development.

"Nutrition plays a definite role in behavior," says Vogel, "and a diet high in sugar and refined carbohydrates can cause overactive behavior, restlessness and irritability. The sibling rivalry that often develops into full-scale wars during those long car rides to the beach may not be due to cramped quarters but to the milkshakes, french fries and candy bars eaten along the way."

The negative effects of too much sugar on behavior have been documented, Vogel reports, in a research study by the NYICD, a non-profit facility that diagnoses and treats the physical causes of learning disabilities and hyperactivity.

Of 265 children tested, 74 percent were unable to properly handle refined carbohydrates and showed not only behavior problems, but learning difficulties as well, Vogel says.

Even though most routines are forgotten during the hot summer days, don't let children make a routine of junk-food snacks, Vogel urges.

He advises homemade lemonade and iced herbal teas instead of overly sweetened sodas and suggests making ice pops out of fruit juices instead of buying ice-cream bars.

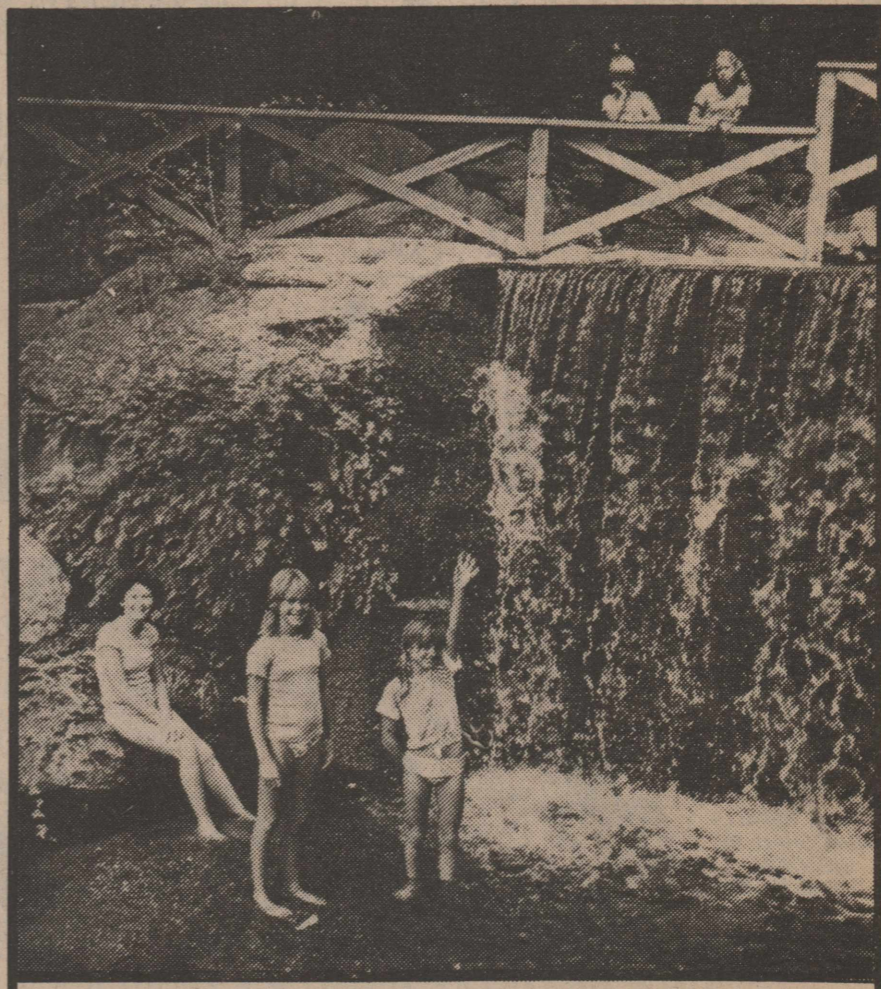
"Take advantage of what warm weather yields and serve fresh summer fruits such as watermelon, cantaloupe, blueberries, cherries and peaches," says Vogel.

One popular treat that is a good snack choice is pizza, Vogel points out. "The cheese and tomato sauce on pizza combines protein, calcium, niacin and vitamins. Hamburgers and baked or broiled seafood are other excellent foods since they are both sources of protein and iron."

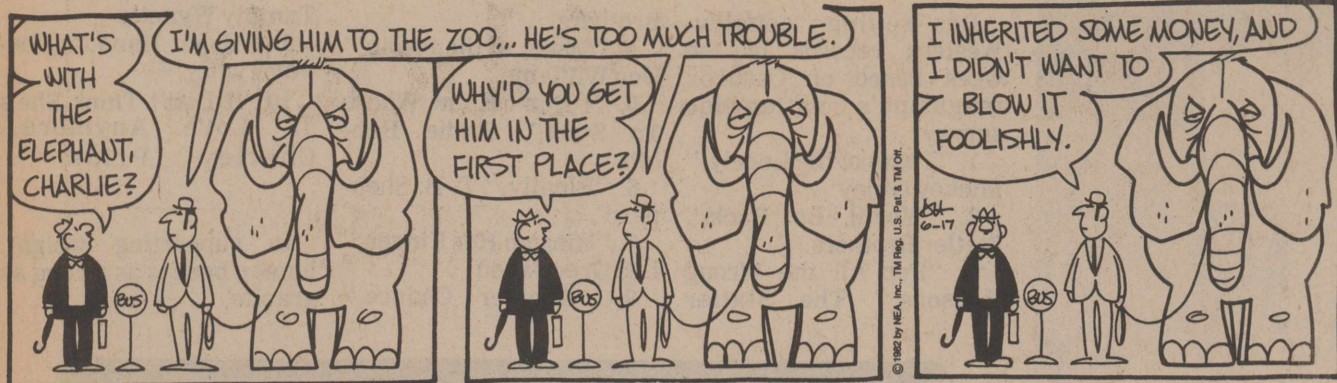

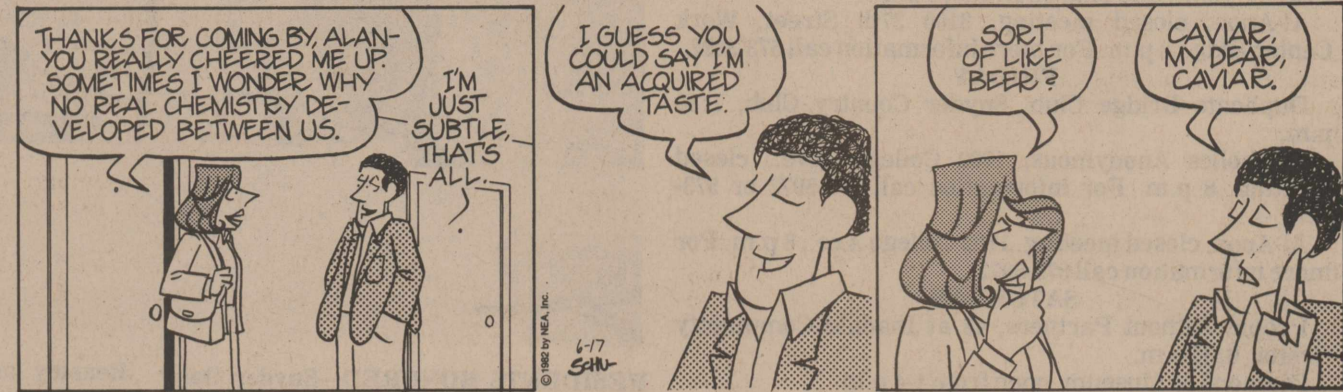

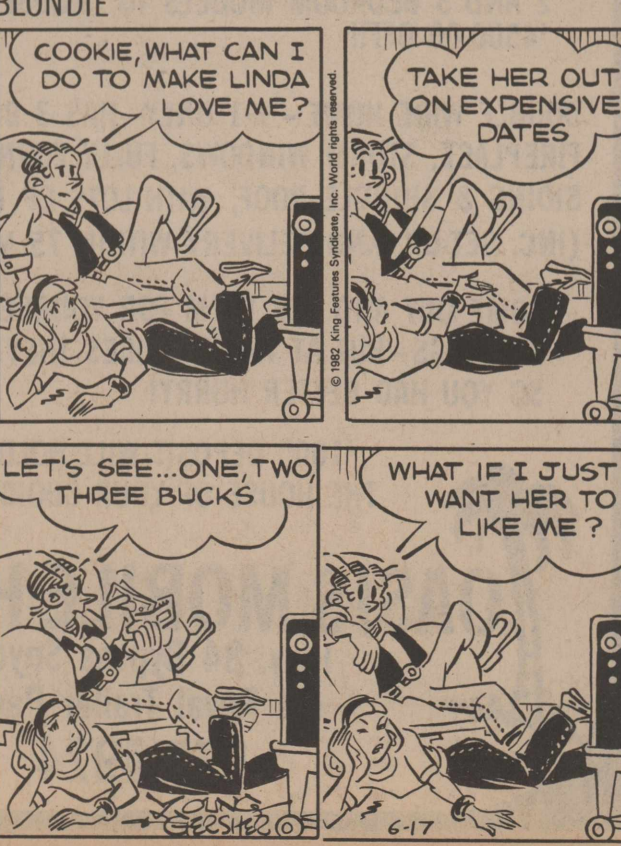

He was born and raised at Fluvanna and is a graduate of Fluvanna High School. He served in the U. S. Navy during World War II, and joining

the staff of Snyder National was one of a series of important events in his life that occurred within a two-month period in 1946.

He received his discharge from the Navy on May 4, came home for about three weeks and then returned to Pensacola, Fla., where he was married on June 2 to Ruby Chavers. A couple of weeks later, on June 17, he went to work in the bank as a filing clerk in the bookkeeping department.

"I was the 16th employee of the bank,"

Boren recalls. "Mr. Erwin (A. D.) was president of the bank, and Mr. Alexander (A. C.) was vice president. Tim Cook was cashier."

The economy was strictly agricultural—farming and ranching. The only oil production in the county came from shallow wells in the Ira area that had been drilled back in the 20s.

Boren said Snyder National Bank had deposits totalling about \$6 million when he joined the staff.

Saturday mornings in the fall were the busiest

time at the bank. He said the lobby would be packed with farmers drawing money to pay cotton pickers. The cotton was harvested by hand in those days and nobody even thought about mechanical harvesting equipment. And the harvest hands were paid in cash on Saturday.

Boren remembers one Saturday especially. "Our money didn't come in for some reason and we got down to 900 one-dollar bills."

Boren has witnessed vast changes in banking. Snyder National now has some 40 employees and deposits of around \$70 million. His 36 years of service make him the senior active executive. He has seen 407 bank employees come and go in his time.

Boren was promoted to the position of assistant cashier in 1949, and in 1958 he was named a vice president.

He and Mrs. Boren have two sons and a daughter, Whitt Boren of Jacksonville, Fla., Jamie and Janet Boren, both of Snyder.

Mr. and Mrs. Boren are members of Colonial Hill Baptist Church.

### Infant's milk allergy

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have an 18-month-old boy who cannot tolerate milk or anything made from milk. It is a terrible problem since so many foods contain milk products. The smallest drop of milk gives him blisters around his mouth and inside his mouth. He develops red wheals all over his face. His eyes will swell almost closed, then he gets nauseated and usually will vomit.

I have taken him to an allergy doctor but it didn't help. I think he is more sensitive than ever now.

Could you advise me on something to do? I read in one of your columns about adding a supplement to milk that would break down the natural sugar. Would this help?

DEAR READER — I usually write about lactose intolerance because it is widespread among adults and more people ask about it. These people do have an enzyme deficiency and have trouble breaking down the lactose sugar in milk. But that is an entirely different problem from the one your son has.

The other problem is a true allergy. The allergic reaction is to milk protein. This is most likely to occur in infants. The immature digestive system allows some of the protein to be absorbed into the bloodstream without being digested. The allergic reaction causes problems as you describe. By contrast, lactose intolerance usually causes bowel symptoms and gas, not hives.

The best way to manage any allergy is to avoid the substance you are allergic to. In this case that means milk and all milk products. It means not consuming foods made with any milk at all.

Now, growing children must have an adequate intake of calcium and the main source of it is milk.

Much of the calcium in vegetables is not absorbed. You should talk to your doctor about a milk substitute for your boy. Some of the milk products made from soybeans that are available do not contain any milk at all and he may be able to tolerate these. Check every label though for ingredients.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My son is 14 and will start his first year of high school this fall. He has a speech defect and takes speech in school but this last summer his speech has really bothered him. I don't know whether someone has made fun of him or not. He has friends and will talk around them but if we have other company he will not say a word. If we go out and eat he tells me what he wants and when the waitress arrives he heads for the rest room. He will not order for himself.

He likes girls but won't talk to them because of his speech. You mentioned once about a person with this problem having a piece under the tongue that the doctor clipped. What do you suggest for my son?

DEAR READER — He should be examined by an ear, nose and throat specialist for any possible anatomical problems. If there are none, which will probably be the case, you would be wise to start him in speech therapy as soon as possible. These techniques often help in such cases. ### Marbles Tournery To Be Held

CUMBERLAND, Md. (AP) — The 59th annual National Marbles Tournery almost was lost, but a "generous contribution" from a manufacturer ensured that the cat's eyes, aggies, immies and steelies will keep on rollin'.

Tournament director Gene Mason said Wednesday the shoot-out would be held as scheduled in Wildwood, N.J., from June 21-24.

Earlier, Mason had warned the tournament would have to be canceled this year if a sponsor were not found to foot the estimated \$15,000 bill.

Mason said no sponsor has surfaced, but a West Virginia marbles manufacturing company has made a "generous contribution" to the tournament. That, coupled with an increase in the entry fee from \$50 to \$80 and reserve funds carried over from last year's tournament, would make it possible to

go ahead — almost as planned.

A banquet had to be cut to pare the cost of this year's tournery, said Mason, who also serves as this western Maryland city's recreation director. That brought the cost of the tournament down to about \$23,000.

Mason said he expected about 65 youths from 15 states to take part.

In previous years, it had been sponsored by IT&T, but the company this year opted not to sponsor the event.

## Stress Affects Schizophrenics

BOSTON (AP) — Bickering and other stresses of home life can drive schizophrenics into mental hospitals, but the patients are far more stable if their families learn to work out their problems calmly, researchers say.

"The average family is too stressful for most people with schizophrenia," said Dr. Ian R. Falloon. "It tends to make them overexcited and overstimulated, and this produces more symptoms."

In a nine-month experiment, researchers followed the progress of mental patients whose families were taught a reasonable, step-by-step approach to settling their differences.

They found that these people were substantially more likely to respond to ordinary schizophrenia medicine without suffering flareups of their illness.

Schizophrenia is one of the most common forms of mental illness, and affects as many as 30 or 40 percent of mental patients, according to some estimates. Its victims suffer delusions, hallucinations or other disturbances in their thinking. According to the National Institute of Mental Health, about 1 percent of all Americans will have

schizophrenia at some time during their lives.

The latest research, directed by Falloon, was conducted at the University of Southern California School of Medicine. It was published in today's New England Journal of Medicine.

### Bill Heading To The Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — An emergency appropriations bill containing \$3 billion in housing aid for middle-income families is heading back to the Senate, mired in a bitter dispute over the personal finances of members of Congress.

Unless senators agree to limit their outside earnings to \$18,200 a year — 58 of them earned more than that last year — the \$8.9 billion bill could die, leaving several government agencies penniless for the next three months.

And even if the Senate settles the question of members' earnings, President Reagan is expected to veto the entire package because he opposes the housing-aid provision. Backers say a vote to override any veto would be close.

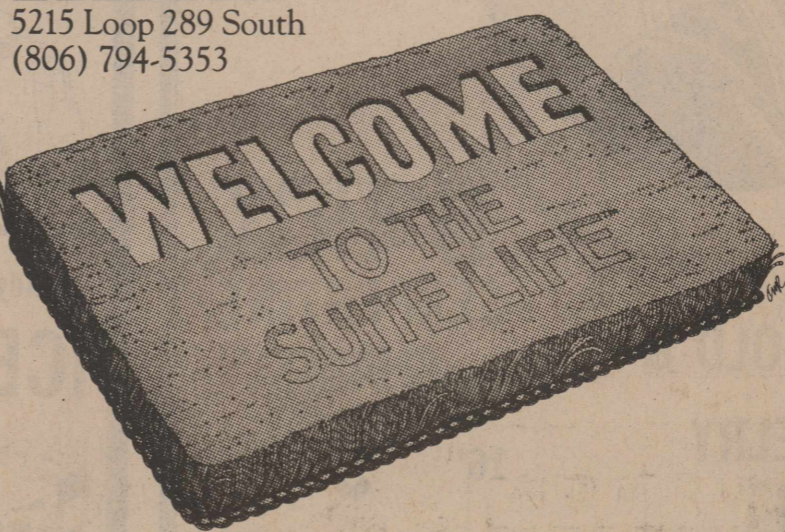

# Woman Speaks Out In National Security Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — "I was really afraid to speak out on these things," said Mary Grefe, who is no shrinking violet.

"I felt I may be the only one in Des Moines who felt that way, and I didn't want to be the only one in Des Moines on anything," she said. "I'm not the type of person who throws herself in front of tanks, you know."

What Ms. Grefe, the former president of the 190,000-member American Association of University Women, used to be reluctant to talk about in Des Moines is the arms race.

It was bewildering; she felt she didn't know enough to express an opinion.

This week, Mary Grefe and about 300 women community leaders who feel that women have been excluded from the great debate — over war and peace, defense budgets and arms control —

gathered in Washington to talk about how they could get a toe-hold in one of the government's last male bastions, the national security debate.

Unlike the rest of government, the top echelons of the Defense and State Departments, the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency and the staff of the congressional committees that deal in those areas remain a man's world.

A few defense jobs went to women in the Carter Administration, but the old order has reasserted itself.

Under the auspices of the Committee for National Security, formed by former arms negotiator Paul Warnke to promote discussions just such as this one, the women talked about ways to breach the gap, and about what difference it might make. A few broke away long enough to discuss their concern with a reporter.

Ann Cahn, director of the committee, said defense experts who ad-

ressed the women were given marching orders in writing: plain English, please; no jargon; skip the acronyms.

"We're not going to be bamboozled any longer," she said.

The special lingo of throw-weights and megatons frightens women (and men) away from even expressing opinions on national security issues, she said.

Ms. Grefe agreed. Congress hears aplenty from women on "women's issues," education funds or abortion, she said. Now women, aware that arms spending is infringing into areas of their concern and fearful of the consequences of a world armed to the teeth, are willing to become knowledgeable about defense and demanding to be heard.

Eleanor Kesim came here talking about sludge.

She is the mayor of Elkhart, Ind. (where one of her first acts in office was to change the population signs outside of town

to read, "41,305 persons" to underscore that men and women are equals in Elkhart).

Sludge, she said, is tied to the arms race because her city has a sewage problem, and Washington is cutting off funds to help fight it.

"I'll tell you, sludge is not a funny subject," said Ms. Kesim, warming up into a speech.

"The infrastructure of this country is decaying and this administration is cutting back on the cities," she said. "At some point this is national security. People are being taxed, almost to the limit, and they're being taxed and watching their cities fall apart. To me, this relates to a nuclear freeze."

Sharon Froom of Kalamazoo, Mich., said women can bring to the national security debate a dimension that men lack.

Mrs. Froom came to Washington fresh from a campaign that in four months gathered 385,000 signatures to put a referendum on the nuclear freeze proposal on the Michigan ballot.

It showed what concerned people can do, she said: "In my community there are people working together who six months ago would not have sat in the same room."

She argued that civilization has given women a skill that can be useful in controlling the arms race.

"That is the art of resolution of conflict," she said. "We've learned that we can't operate from a power base in a family, that we can get what we need for ourselves and

other people can get what they need, if we work for the common goal of getting along. We can teach men that."

Added Mary Purcell of Wallingford, Pa., current president of the university women's group: "Women make it clear that there's more to the debate than just hardware. What kind of country are we going to have left to defend, if we

ignore our home needs?"

And, with a nod toward Ms. Kesim, she added: "The deterioration of our society can bring us down the tubes faster than anything the Soviet Union can throw at us."

Ms. Kesim, the mayor, seized her opening. "This summer our city, with a grant, is feeding about 2,000 children breakfast and lunch. We have to feed

these children. Otherwise they wouldn't eat.

"You cannot have children who are malnourished, who have brain damage. They're our investment. I'm not dealing with this as a woman, but as a woman, I can't let those children go hungry."

What about the administration's argument that Russia has surged ahead in the nuclear arms

race and America is inadequately armed and vulnerable?

"Sure," said Ms. Purcell, "but there is a point that we don't have to go beyond. There is a stopping point. Do they know that?"

At which point, Ms. Grefe interrupted: "That's the sort of thing I used to be afraid to say in Des Moines."

## Tick Inspector Says Alien Was Killed In Accidental Shooting

EDINBURG, Texas (AP) — Investigations were under way today by federal and local authorities into the shooting death of a Mexican who was killed after a federal tick inspector discovered him allegedly smuggling a horse into Mexico.

The inspector told the Hidalgo County sheriff's department that his gun discharged accidentally Tuesday afternoon when he lost his footing on the banks of the Rio Grande, according to chief investigator Erasmo Bravo.

Ruben Marquez Guardiola of Reynosa, Mexico, was shot once in the head and died instantly, Bravo said.

The inspector general's office of the U.S. Agriculture Department also sent agents to investigate the incident. The tick inspectors are USDA employees who patrol the Rio Grande on horseback to keep out livestock bearing dangerous fever ticks.

They won the authority this spring to carry firearms after testifying before congressional committees that they needed protection against drug smugglers and other criminals they encounter along the river.

Raymond Smith, tick force district supervisor, said the shooting was the first since the agents were granted permission to carry weapons. Tick riders have said privately that they have always carried guns on patrol.

No charges were filed in the incident. Bravo said the case will be turned over to the district attorney after the investigation by local authorities is complete for possible presentation to the grand jury.

Hernaro Molina Gonzalez of Reynosa, who witnessed the shooting, had purchased the horse and was seen driving toward the river by the federal agents, Bravo said.

When the agents caught up with Molina, he had already unloaded the

horse but took the inspectors to the spot along the river two miles east of Hidalgo where Marquez was leading the animal, the investigator said.

"Marquez was trying to cross the river with the horse," Bravo said. "He left the horse and started walking toward the inspector, who was walking backward. He (the inspector) said he thinks he lost his step, he had the gun out and it went off."

Bravo would not release the name of the inspector involved because he said he feared for the inspector's safety.

"There were several people on the other side

waiting for him (Marquez) and they were yelling that they were going to kill the inspector," the investigator said. "If we release the name, they might be looking for him over here."

Smith said he has ordered the riders to patrol in pairs following the shooting in case of possible reprisals.

He said the incident might cause some to question giving the riders the right to carry firearms.

"I'm sure that there will be some bad publicity," he said. The inspectors testified before congressional committees that they needed guns for protection against drug

smugglers and other criminals they encounter along the brushy banks of the Rio Grande.

"My son works in Del Rio. He was shot at and missed in February and then shot at and hit in March," Smith said.

The supervisor said that inspectors watch for animals being smuggled into Mexico for several reasons.

"A lot of times, these are horses that are going to match races in Mexico and then they'll bring them back illegally. That is a disease threat to our livestock," Smith said. "It's also a commerce violation to take stuff undeclared by the river."

## Subsidiary Expanding Layoffs In 3 States

DALLAS (AP) — Officials of Dresser Industries Inc. say they will lay off 450 workers this week, while a subsidiary of another oilfield service company has already laid off 650 of its employees in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas since June 1.

Spokesmen for Dresser and Halliburton Co. said Wednesday the layoffs are due to a downturn in drilling activity in the oil and gas industry. They said that the 2,924 rigs operating in the United States are down 25 percent from a year ago.

Dresser's Security Division, which manufactures rock bits, will lay off about 200 salaried and hourly employees at its Dallas plant, effective June 18.

And the Guberson Division plant of Dresser here notified about 150 salaried and hourly employees of their layoffs, effective Wednesday.

"These layoffs are a direct result of the downturn in oilfield drilling and completion businesses which use our

products," said John Ray, industrial relations manager for Dresser. "We do not know how long the layoffs will last."

Halliburton Services Inc., a subsidiary of Dallas-based Halliburton Co., has laid off about 300 workers since June 1 at its Duncan, Okla., plant. Company officials said another 350 have been laid off at Halliburton Services plants in Davis, Okla., Coffeyville, Kan., and Amarillo.

"It's primarily due to the slump in the drilling industry," said John Birdsong, vice president of personnel at Halliburton. "It's industrywide."

He said he did not know how long the present cuts would be in effect.

"The current pessimism in the domestic oil in-

dustry stems basically from reduced demand, declining or unstable oil prices, and high oilfield inflation," R.B. Kyle Jr., senior vice president of operations for Dresser, said in a recent presentation at an oil and gas seminar.

"These three factors together have translated into a downturn in the rig count," he said.

But Hyde added that he did not believe there is an oil glut.

"The domestic oil glut is a misnomer," he said. "The U.S. is importing almost 40 percent of its domestic requirements and will continue to do so for some time."

Industry analysts said the current layoffs are more dramatic than similar layoffs made during a 1976 slump.

## CRMWD To Meet In Big Spring

Consideration of acquiring additional ground water rights will be on the agenda of Colorado River Municipal Water District directors when they meet June 24 in Big Spring.

The district has made some surveys looking toward the strengthening of reserves for meeting demands of cities on the west end of the system in months of peak demand. The board will consider authorizing the general manager to proceed.

Other major items on the agenda include authorizing the president to execute a contract to issue approximately \$16 million in water and sewer bonds on behalf of the City of Odessa; also the discussion of proposals submitted to the City of Midland for increasing the volume of water available to that city.

A request of Sayres Operating Co., tabled at the previous meeting, to reduce its contract quantity by about one-half will be considered again, as will a request from Mabee Petroleum Co. to stay temporarily its contract quantity. The board is due to elect officers at the meeting.
