HOUSTON'S 'PHANTOM' BANDIT IS CAPTURED

WOMAN OIL MAGNATE IS DEAD

SAN ANGELO 'STORMY' PETREL PASSES

(By Associated Press)
SAN ANGELO, Texas, April 19.—The long battle of a gnarled pioneer Texas woman, who rose from a lowly state to be an oil millionaire despite the handicap of blindness and lack of an academic education, is ended.

Mrs. W. A. Monroe Smith, 75, who to retain and develop her vast Pecos county oil holdings fought single handed through years of litigation, some of it brought by sons and daughters seeking to have her declared mentally incompetent, died here yesterday. Old age was the primary cause of death.

With a picturesque and homely philosophy she turned back lawyers in many a courtroom. Once, in a federal court case, she admitted she hadn't heard of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and could not name the boundaries of certain states, but confounded the opposition by asking from the stand: "Is this a school lesson or a lawsuit?"

Came First As Rancher
Years ago Mrs. Smith came to Texas with her first husband, John Monroe, to wrest from wide acres of grass a living at ranching. Monroe died and W. A. Smith, a cowboy, the second owner by the unending struggle against drought and its attendant hardships, followed him.

The alliances brought to the widow a vast stretch of grazing lands that developed into an oil kingdom.

Empty of some of her children, she had her adjusted income, and thus invalidate leases had entered into with oil companies, ended in failure. She herself began the first intra-family litigation by suing a son, Henry Monroe, over a grazing lease.

STATE TO AID HIGHWAY NINE

IMPROVEMENTS ALONG ROUTE IN LUBBOCK COUNTY ARE DUE

Improvement of Highway No. 9 from Leann county line to the state county line with state funds will be recommended to the State Highway Commission by Gibb Gilchrist, state highway engineer who also is advisor of the commission.

County Judge Robert H. Bean has advised of this in a letter from Mr. Gilchrist. Before this recommendation can be made, however, it will be necessary that the county commission approve the plan. The commissioners will take the matter under consideration Monday morning.

The recommendation will include the first unit of construction on the highway and will relieve the county from the obligation of final construction. The earthwork and drainage will be put in a condition so that it will be seasonable and in better condition when it is possible to finance surfacing.

MAN HELD IS BLAMED FOR MANY CRIMES

TWENTY-FIVE RECENT ROBBERIES LAID TO SUSPECT

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, April 19.—Police today captured Houston's "phantom" bandit, who had given officers a merry chase for the past few weeks, during which he was credited with some 25 robberies.

He was a 17-year-old youth who boasted of his criminal exploits as he talked freely with detectives. Police were convinced the boy gave his name as Tony Corona, was the "phantom."

Percy Heard, at the head of the officers who found the youth seated in an automobile here, said the boy tried to draw a pistol as the officers put him under arrest.

"I guess there is no end to my evil," the youth boasted. "I expected to get killed sooner or later but that didn't bother me. I got a little thrill out of it, but it was the money I was out for."

TERRACING TO BE SHOWN HERE

A demonstration in terracing is to be given today by Lubbock County Agent D. F. Eaton and John Patterson, of Idalou, terracing expert, on the Clyde Showalter farm, two miles west of the Liberty school.

Mr. Patterson recently was employed by the commissioners of this county, to aid Mr. Eaton in putting on a county-wide terracing campaign. Mr. Patterson did terracing work in all parts of the county.

A Corsican grader is being used in the demonstrations, in addition to other types of machinery. The event is free and the public is invited to attend. Many visitors from this and neighboring counties were expected.

Strong Wind Does Damage At Dallas

DALLAS, April 19 (AP).—A 54 mile an hour wind caused thousands of dollars damage here early today. No one was injured.

The wind, which frightened many for a time into believing a tornado threatened, blew down sheds, signs, shacks, lunch stands, and similar places of light construction.

Several trees were blown over against houses, and the streets in some of the residential districts were littered with foliage of trees and plants.

Three windows in the Dallas city hall were blown out, and several large display windows in the business district were smashed.

Three Face Federal Charges In Lubbock

Bonds of \$1,000 were set Thursday by United States Commissioner Leonard L. Pearson in the cases of Clyde Angley, R. H. Byrns and W. M. Murphy, of Oklahoma, who face charges of violation of the national motor vehicle law.

The three are charged with transporting a stolen automobile into Texas from Seminole, Okla. They were arrested here by Edwin Fore, government agent of the department of justice. They are each in the county jail and no attempt has been made to make bond.

A preliminary hearing was held before Commissioner Pearson Thursday. The men are each about twenty-seven years of age.

AMARILLO WILL PAY FOR OPERA

\$2500 DEFICIT FROM 'THAIS' IS TO BE TAKEN CARE OF

(By Associated Press)
AMARILLO, April 19.—The \$2,500 deficit sustained by the Amarillo guarantors of the Chicago Civic Opera Company's presentation of "Thais" here a month ago will be paid.

Mayor Ernest Thompson, spokesman for the guarantors, who two days ago declared Amarillo patrons of the opera had been duped and "dared" the Chicago company to sue for the balance due under its guarantee, said late today he and the other 16 guarantors had changed their minds.

"We have made our protest. We have accomplished our purpose, and the \$2,500 is too trivial to argue over," he said.

Pay Obligations.

In Texas we believe in paying our obligations regardless of whether we made a bad deal. Regardless of what the management of the Chicago Civic Opera company may say or think, Gene Howe did not criticize the company with the intention of seeking publicity. If Mary Garden had not referred to him as a "twine" and "skunk" his comment would have attracted little attention.

"Mr. Howe advised against 'Thais' being chosen for Amarillo," he said it would not be appreciated here, but he signed up as one of the guarantors upon representation of the company's advance agent that "Thais" would include the famous ballet of the Chicago Civic Opera company, of which he had heard so much."

Howe Left Opera

Mayor Thompson said that Howe was so disappointed in the performance that he left the auditorium at the end of the second act, after the street dancing.

"I am frank in saying that I do not know the exact definition of a ballet, but Mr. Howe says that instead of a ballet there merely was some dancing in costumes, comparable to dancing seen in any vaudeville house."

He then wrote his criticism in the Globe-News because he believed he was justified in doing so and because he felt the Chicago Civic Opera company had not kept faith with the people of Amarillo.

He would like a statement from Chicago management as to whether the dancing act given here was their famous ballet."

Mayor Thompson also pointed out that the opera company had promised to spend an entire day in Amarillo preceding the performance, as sort of advance ballyhoo, but that it did not reach the city until late afternoon.

WINNING RECIPES

CHEESE SOUFFLE

From Mrs. J. B. Skinner, 2410

Twenty-first street.

3 tablespoons minute tapioca.

1 cup of milk (scalded).

1 cup grated cheese.

3 egg yolks (beaten until thick and lemon covered).

3 egg whites (stiffly beaten with one teaspoon of salt).

Cook minute tapioca with milk in double boiler for 15 minutes or until tapioca is clear, stirring frequently. Add cheese and stir until melted. Cool. Add egg yolks and mix well. Fold in egg whites. Bake in greased casserole in pan of water in moderate oven (350 degrees), for 50 minutes. Souffle is done when it shrinks a trifle and is brown. Serves six. Excellent for Sunday night supper.

SOUTHERN BAKED HAM

Submitted by Mrs. H. D. Holt,

614 Avenue N, Lubbock.

1 slice of ham, either cured or fresh about 2 1/2 inches thick.

4 cloves, whole.

1 cup of maple syrup.

1 teaspoon salt.

4 medium sized sweet potatoes.

Parboil potatoes for few minutes, drain and place around ham, which has been salted and had the cloves stuck into the fat. Pour maple syrup around meat and bake in covered dish for one hour.

MAYONNAISE DRESSING

From Mrs. W. C. Rylander, 1627

Fifteenth street, Lubbock.

2 whole eggs, beaten well together

1 cup sweet milk.

1 teaspoon salt.

1-2 cup sugar.

1-2 tablespoon dry mustard.

1 heaping tablespoon sifted flour.

Mix above ingredients. Now put over a very low fire; 1 cup vinegar and butter the size of a walnut.

When this is just beginning to boil, stir in the first mixture slowly, stirring constantly until thick enough to coat the spoon.

This recipe will make a pint of

dressing which can be kept indefinitely in a cool place.

Keep in a tightly closed fruit jar until all is used.

The Hack takes a keen delight in knocking in runs and Joe McCarthy played to his weakness. "Batting in fifth place," the Chicago manager told Hack "you will knock in more runs than you will in any other position." And he added that he was on back nearly every time you go to the bat.

Wilson agreed that it would be okay with him to bat fifth and notified his managers. "Yeh and when they're on ahead of me I'll hit 'em in."

A New Era
One of the peculiar things about
human nature is that it will accept
almost any kind of change if the
change comes unannounced.

For instance, if a group of energetic
young men should come on the scene
and announce that they were about to
change the whole nation, so that countless
old customs and habits would be wiped
out and all the cities and towns
would be moved closer together, we
probably would resist it very firmly.

But when they simply go ahead
and do it, we don't mind—indeed, we
rather like it. Instead of defying the
young men who are changing our society
into a new kind of society, we applaud them.

The visitors are doing just exactly
what they are bringing with them
with us the United States, in common
with the rest of the world, will be
very different from its old self.
The change, probably, will be for
the better, but we won't even realize
that there is a change until after
it is accomplished.

Read this little news dispatch from
a recent issue:

"Edmonton, Alberta.—When PUNCH
Dickens' Edmonton flyer, brought
his monoplane to a landing on the
Edmonton flying field the other evening
he completed a record flight of
1600 miles from Fort Good Hope
on the rim of the Arctic circle. The
plane carried a valuable consignment
of furs from the northern parts."

In these two sentences there is
compressed a volume about the new
order that the visitors are bringing
with them. The flying field in the Cana-
dian northwest have been, for
centuries, among the most isolated,
unattainable sections of the world.
Each man was separated from his
neighbor by long days of hard travel.
To get to civilization was a task that
took weeks. Long canoe trips on
lovely rivers, endless hikes across
desolate waste lands, night of soli-
tary rambling in trackless forests
and limitless plains.

Now young Mr. Dickens, gifted
with the flip nickname, "Punch,"
soars off in his monoplane, and
puts the Arctic circle within 24
hours' time of the city of Edmonton.
Without saying anything about it,
he has simply taken the map of
northwestern Canada and made it
shrink. The era of isolation and
great distances is at an end, forever.

That is what all the airplanes are
doing, though we don't often realize
it. The fliers are bringing us closer
together. Our present form of so-
ciety was drawn up to fit a country
of long journeys and widely sepa-
rated cities. The airplanes are in a
fair way to make it as compact as
Holland.

If the airman declared themselves
in advance we might resent it; at
the very least we probably ask
them to wait while we figured things
out. But they don't. They are
pulling all of us into closer contact
with each other, without our old dis-
tances, killing isolation; and all we
can do about it is to recognize the
fact and adjust ourselves to a changed
era.

Death Under Wheels
Unless the motorists of the country
are very careful, the toll of traf-
fic accidents can be expected to rise
sharply during the coming month.

The arrival of warm weather
brings a much greater number of
cars on the highways than the win-
ter months had seen. The increased
congestion, naturally, renders the
possibility of accidents greater, and
puts on each driver an added re-
sponsibility for care and caution.

In addition, many cars did not get
the care during the winter that they
ret in the summer. A number of

mechanical adjustments or repairs—

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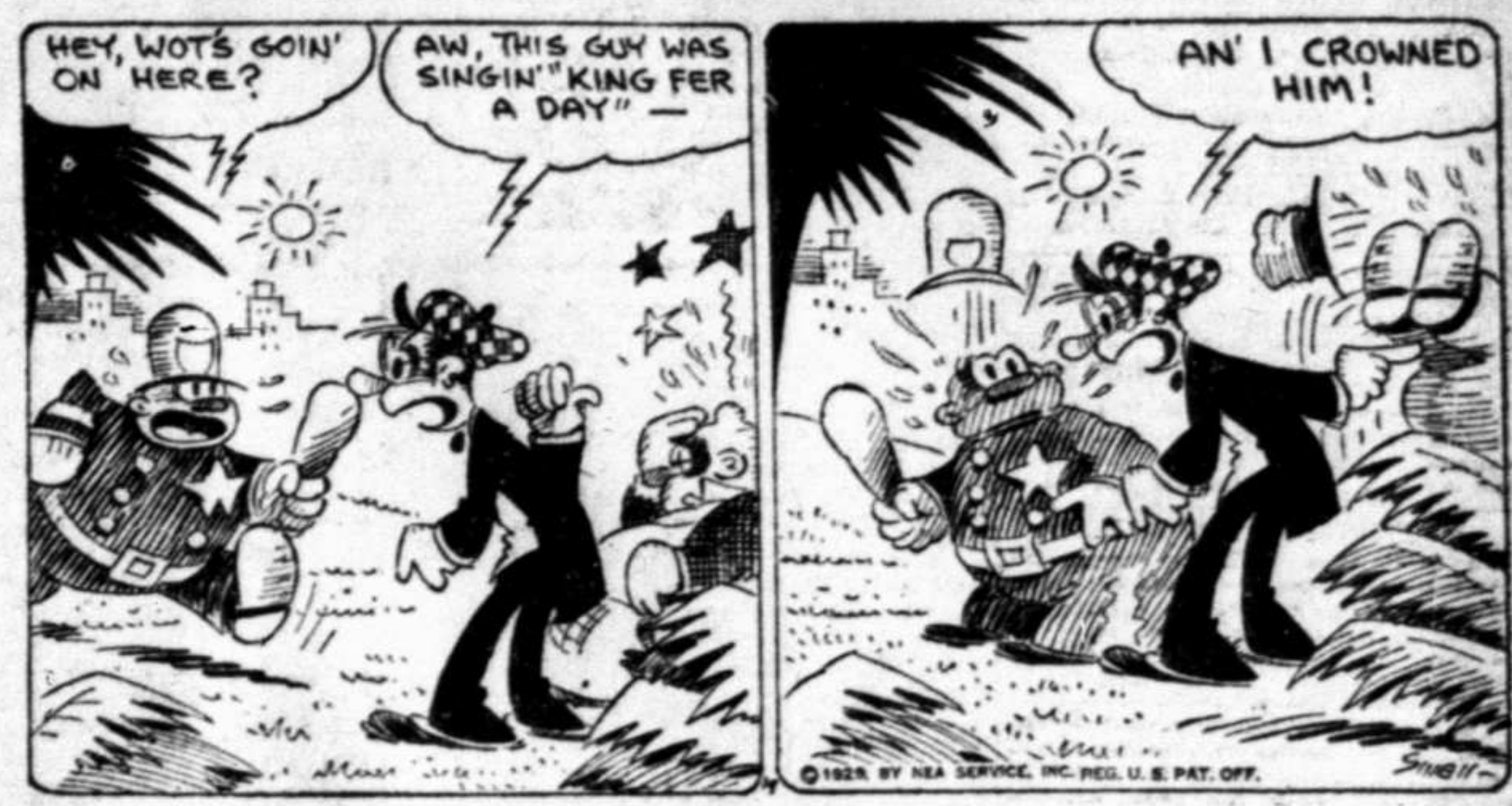

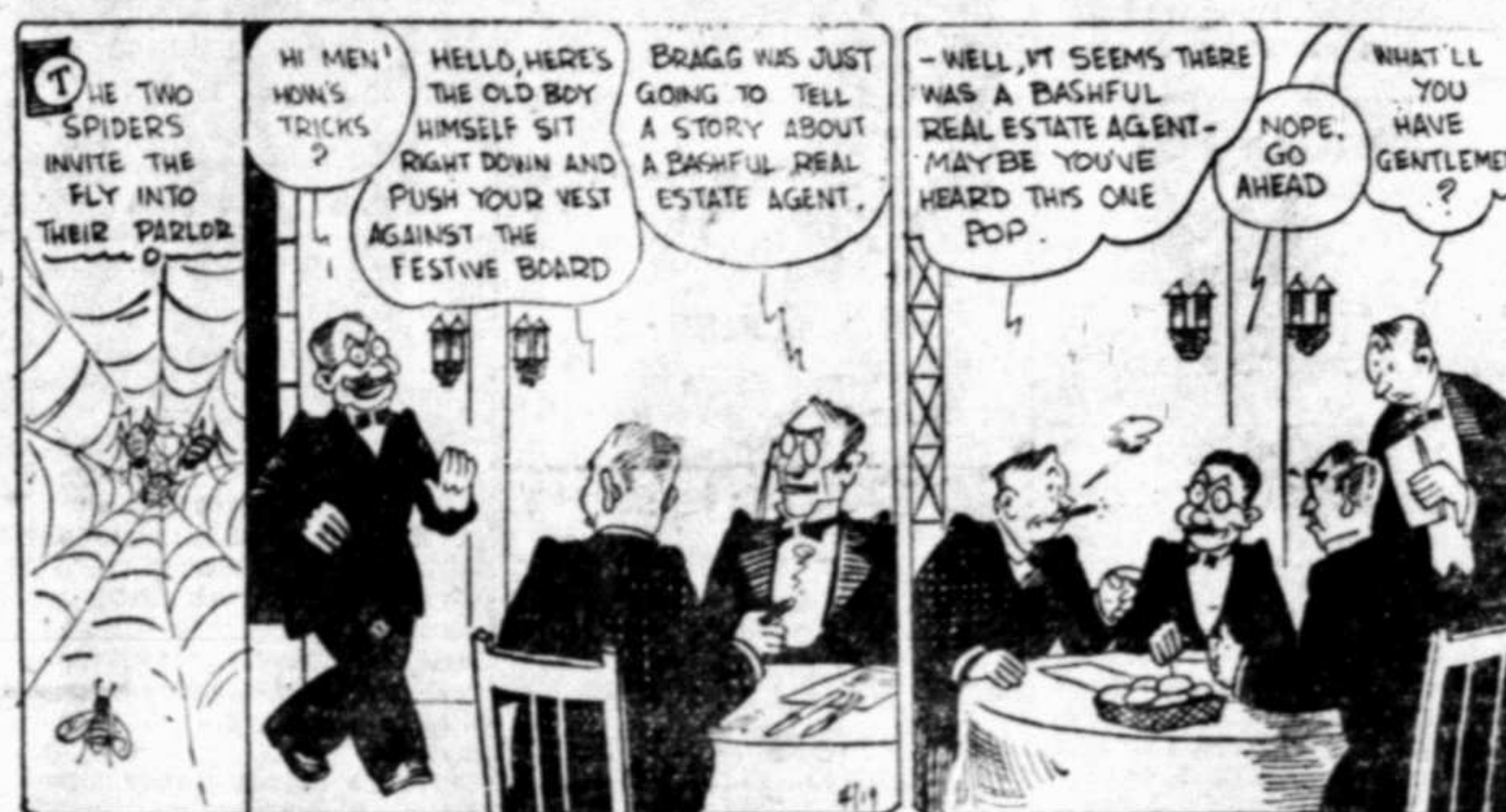

PRICES LACK UNIFORMITY

MAJOR TENDENCY TODAY WITH OPENING OF MARKET DOWN

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 19.—Price movements lacked uniformity at the opening of today's market but the major tendency appeared to be downward. Union Carbide dropped 3 1-4 points and Gold Dust and Columbia Graphophone a point each. General American Tank advanced 1 and Croley Radio 1 3-4.

Early selling was inspired largely by the small decrease of \$2,000,000 in federal-brokers' loans. The breaking down of the reparations conference also may have been a factor in the selling movement.

So-called pool specialties were among the hardest hit. Johns Manville, Marmon motors and American Can quickly dropping 1 3-4 to 2 points.

A sprinkling of issues continued to show independent strength. Woolworth ran up 2 1-2 points to within a fraction of the year's high and the advance Rumely issues, Julius Kayser and Atlantic Gulf and West Indies Preferred sold at their highest prices of the year.

Foreign exchanges were easier, with cables off 1-16 of a cent to \$4.85 5-16.

is shown on the program. The show will start at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon and will continue until 10 o'clock Saturday night, in order that people who have to work late may attend.

Committee in Charge
A senior student committee, one member from each of the engineering departments, is directing the show, while practically every student and faculty member connected with the school will be on hand to make the exhibition a success.

The program which gives the place the type of exhibits, experiments and work that will be offered the public Saturday follows:
Civil engineering laboratories: Compression tests on concrete, tension tests on steel on 200,000 pounds; universal testing machine; tension tests on bridges; highway laboratory; tests showing core drill; impact machine; dorry hardness machine; brick rattle; exhibits of bitumen laboratory and equipment of highway laboratory, an surveying equipment; concrete laboratory; tests on sand, cement.

Geological engineering displays: (Shown in civil engineering laboratory) general geology; paleontology; mineralogy; ore deposits; petroleum geology; petrology.
Architectural engineering department: Exhibition of architectural design; freehand drawing exhibit; a Greek frieze; salon des Venus.
Moving pictures: Engineering auditorium.

Engineering drawing department: Exhibit of engineering drawing work; blue print machine in operation; drawing class in room 263; drawings for U. S. Frigate constitution and lettering exhibits.
Electrical engineering laboratories: Climbing arc. Tesla coil; miniature electric magnet; effect of lighting; hand power generator; storage battery exhibit; meter exhibit; bucking broncho; tin can motor; street car motor control; the fisherman; synchronization of three phase alternators; synchronous rotary converter; mercury arc rectifier; ice cooking; the floating ring; starting and stopping of an electric motor by speech.
Mechanical engineering laboratories:

Chemical engineering exhibits: calorimeters; ovens and furnaces; autotometer; oil testing apparatus; spectrophotometer; orsat apparatus; sodium gun; continuous wood pulp paper process.

Hydraulic laboratory equipment: Measuring channel and weir; high pressure tank and orifice; venturi meter; gaging tanks.
Mechanical engineering test sets: Centrifugal pump test; gas engine; automobile engine and dynamometer; flow meter test set; steam engines; extra-turbo-generator; boiler with auxiliaries; condenser equipment; steam pump test.

Mechanical engineering shops: Pattern shop with wood working machines; machine tool laboratory; foundry; heat treating room; thermite welding.
Textile engineering building: Continuous process showing evolution from cotton to cloth. A complete department for each of the following processes will be visited: Cotton cleaning, picking and carding, spinning, knitting, weaving, finishing and testing.

which circles around a low area on the Arkansas side of the Mississippi river a few miles south of Knowlton. Merchants in Snow Lake expressed doubt that the circle levee could hold back the amount of water a crevasse at Knowlton would send against it.
A break at Knowlton would result in inundation of thousands of acres of the richest plantation land in Arkansas. Water from such a crevasse would flow back into the Arkansas and White rivers and join the back water, making it deeper over a vast section.

Hailstones Cover Ground Near Brady
BRADY, Texas, April 19 (AP)—Hailstones covered the ground with ice giving the landscape a midwinter appearance 45 miles south of Brady in Llano county yesterday evening. The hail fell over a five mile area, and destroyed crops. Small livestock, chickens and turkeys also were reported killed by the hailstones.

RAPS MOODY PARTISANISM

GOVERNOR FAILED IN PLEDGE BY NAMING ALDRICH, CHARGE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, April 19.—Gordon Griffin of McAllen, contestant for the district judgeship of the 93rd district court, charged here today that Governor Moody had failed in his announced effort to avoid partisanship in the Hidalgo county political controversy when he picked a district attorney to succeed the late S. H. Woods, of the 79th court.

Griffin said that Oliver C. Aldrich, the governor's choice as one who was free of political "alliance" in the valley, had joined hands with Sheriff A. Y. Baker's "administration forces" in helping to elect the candidate to the mayor's office in San Juan during the recent municipal election.

"The governor had an opportunity to select a district attorney from two applicants who absolutely were not aligned with either side," Griffin said. "The governor had plenty of chances to get information which would have directed him down the middle of the road."
Griffin is here in attendance on a decision over Judge J. E. Leslie, incumbent
