County Agents Report for Past Two Months

The following is a report of the County Agent's activities for the past two months:

Phone calls requesting information or service 82; days in field 45; days in office 9; calls on County Agent at headquarters 93; letters written 17; farms or homes visited 90; meetings held 22; attendance at these meetings 1612; field schools or demonstrations conducted 8; attendance 197; miles traveled 1534.

Farm Engineering Work

Five demonstrations were given in terracing during the last two months. Contour lines were run on approximately 400 acres; 35 farmers took part in these demonstrations. Plans for the construction of wooden drags were furnished and instructions in the proper building of terraces were given during the course of these demonstrations.

As a result of this work 12 applications for terracing have been filed with the agent. This work will be done just as soon as the rush of cotton picking is over.

Club Work

During the last two months seven club meetings were held. At these meetings instructions were given to the Club members in the selection of material for the Club booth at the county fair.

In addition to the above work two demonstrations were given in culling and judging poultry and in selecting birds for the poultry exhibit.

The results obtained from Club work so far shows that the members of the Rannels County Boys' and Girls' clubs were on the job as far as producing quality stuff is concerned.

Three of the organized clubs had booths at the Rannels County Fair. The prizes won by these booths as well as those won by individual members amount to over \$200.00.

Some fine sheep and baby beeves were shown. These animals besides winning some very desirable prizes brought a premium on the local market.

No doubt this will be an encouragement to the club members and ought to be an incentive for better work and higher quality of livestock in the future.

We believe that the showing made by the clubs will also be an incentive for larger and better clubs next year.

Poultry Work

Poultry culling has come in for its share of the County Agent's work during September and October. Two thousand three hundred and eighteen birds were culled. In connection with the culling work the agent assisted in selecting birds to be put on exhibition during the Fair. Instructions in Poultry Sanitation were also given.

The farmers are becoming interested, more and more, in getting rid of the loafers and unprofitable birds and in keeping quality stuff only on their farms.

Livestock Diseases

During the month of October 150 head of young cattle were vaccinated for blackleg. 8 head were treated for mixed infection,

four cases of fistula and 9 cases of minor troubles were attended to.

This is the time of the year when ranchmen and farmers should pay special attention to their young cattle and protect themselves from losses resulting from blackleg by having them vaccinated with life-time aggression.

Fairs

District fairs, county fairs and community exhibits have required a good part of the County Agent's time in September and October.

In co-operation with the Young Men's Business League of Ballinger and the Chamber of Commerce of Winters a county exhibit was carried to the West Texas Fair at Abilene and to the All-West Texas Exposition at San Angelo. These exhibits have done much toward advertising Rannels county and speak well for the class of farms in the county and the quality of stuff produced by them.

A number of meetings were held for the purpose of arousing a community interest in the county fair. At practically all of these meetings instructions were given in the selection of materials for exhibits and plans for decorating and arranging of booths were discussed.

As a result of this work nine communities decorated and arranged booths in which the products of their respective communities were displayed. The arrangement of the booths as well as the quality of the products were very pleasing indeed.

Splendid displays of individual farms were also made. The women's department was especially good. The general display of farm products, fresh fruits and truck was very good. The crowds were large. The spirit of co-operation and good will that prevailed throughout the four days of the fair was very gratifying. We feel that the fair has done much good toward stimulating better farming, better livestock raising and a better feeling of good fellowship among the people of the county.

SHARP DROP IN TEMPERATURE HERE

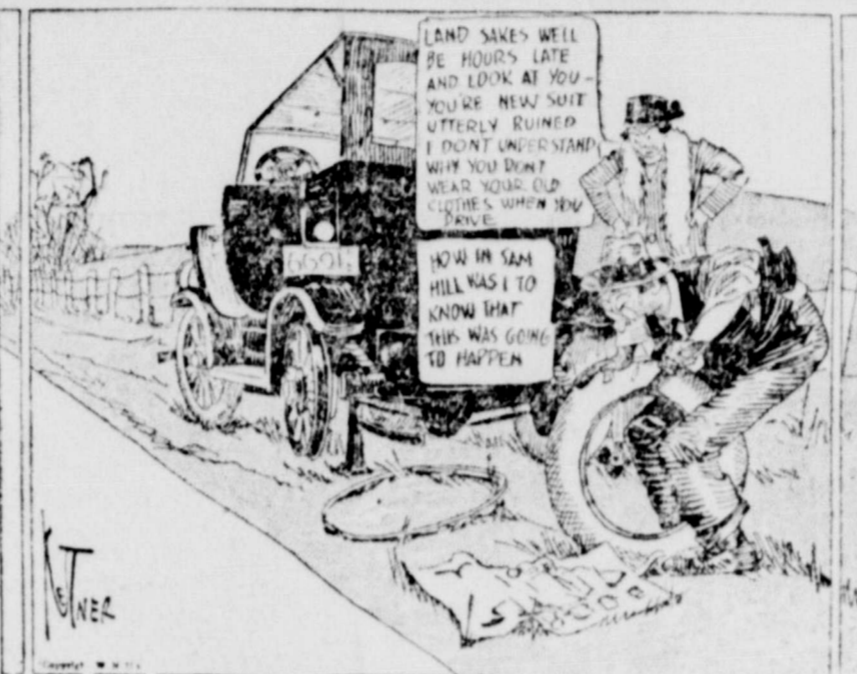

MAY RESIGN TO CUT EXPENSES

RAILROAD MEN SEEK NEW BILL

The bill seeks to abolish the United States Railroad Labor Board, and it is the first bill on the calendar when congress reconvenes.

REPUBLICANS TO BE IN CONTROL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, November 7.—As final returns from doubtful states and districts trickled in today it appeared that President Coolidge had carried North Dakota and probably New Mexico.

The later returns also indicated that the political line-up in the new congress would be as follows:
Senate — Republicans 54; Democrats 40; Farm-Labor 1; vacancy 1.

House of Representatives—Republicans, 246; Democrats, 184; Farm-Labor, 3; Socialists, 2.

At the adjournment of congress last June there were in the Senate 51 Republicans, 43 Democrats, 2 Farm-Labor members. In the House there were 225 Republicans, 207 Democrats, one Socialist, one Farm-Laborite, and one independent member.

EMBARGO ON TEXAS MODIFIED

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 7.—A modification of the state quarantine against Texas because of the prevalence of the foot and mouth disease, was announced by the director of agriculture yesterday. The new regulations will coincide with the federal quarantine orders and will apply only to Galveston and Harris counties, and those portions of Brazoria and Fort Bend counties lying East of the Brazos river.

SENATOR LODGE IS NO BETTER

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 7.—The condition of Senator Lodge, who has been unconscious since he suffered a stroke of paralysis last Wednesday at Charles Gates Hospital, where he was convalescing from an operation, is reported to be unchanged today. Physicians say there is little hope that any change will be for the better.

DALLAS, Nov. 7.—Complete returns from 80 out of 252 counties in Texas on the general election give Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Democrat, a majority of 32,634 over Dr. George C. Butte, her Republican opponent. Figures tabulated give Mrs. Ferguson 128,611, Butte, 95,977. The large counties like Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar are not included in the totals.

MARRIAGE IS A GOOD INVESTMENT DECLARES THIS CHICAGO OFFICIAL

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Marriage is the best financial investment a man can make, concludes Patrick J. Carr, treasurer of Cook county (Chicago), from a statistical survey in which averages were taken from 700,000 returns. "In fact, a man can hardly afford not to get married, if statistics mean anything," Mr. Carr added. "The survey of the tax situation here, made with a view of reaching any scientific conclusions on economy and money saving shows that at 24 years of age the average husband has about five per cent less property, money in bank and taxable wealth than the average bachelor of the same age. "But when both reach the age of 28, the husband will be three per cent ahead and will continue to distance the bachelor more each year," said Mr. Carr. "The cost of marriage put him back in the first comparison. "At 38, the married man will average, in proportion to numbers, 17 per cent more taxable wealth and at 48 he will be 20 per cent ahead, despite the expense of larger homes, children and heavier wardrobe and living costs. The married man seems to work harder, save more and is more intensive in developing his business ability. There is a greater percentage of shrinkage one year to the next in the taxable property of a bachelor than a husband."

MARRIAGES AND DIVORCES IN U.S. CALLS FOR FINAL COUNT IN VOTE

According to government statistics just made public for the year 1923, there were in the United States for that year 1,233,825 marriages performed and 245,139 divorces granted. For the calendar year of 1922 marriages in the United States numbered 1,129,045 and divorces 148,815.

The increase in marriages reported for 1923, with one county lacking, over the number reported for 1922 is 94,780 or 8.4 per cent. Nebraska is the only state in which there was a marked decrease in 1923 and this is due, to some extent, to an amendment to the marriage law passed in 1923 requiring the posting of applications for marriage licenses for a period of ten days before the license is issued.

Divorces reported for 1923, with three counties lacking, show an increase of 16,324, or 11 per cent, over the number reported for 1922.

The record for Texas shows 69,243 marriages in 1923 and 14,641 divorces. For 1922 marriages in Texas numbered 61,730 and divorces 12,527.

Arizona has the greatest number of divorces to its credit in proportion to marriages, the records showing that twenty-five per cent of the marriages are divorced. North Dakota maintains the lowest record of divorces to marriages, the number of divorces granted amounting to about 10 per cent of the marriages.

We are in receipt of a telegram from the Texas Election Bureau calling for the final and complete vote on the governor's race in this county.

This indicates that the interest in the contest demands that the Texas Election Bureau complete compiling the vote in order to ascertain the standing of the vote for Mrs. Ferguson and Dr. Butte.

It is rather expensive to gather the election returns from 250 counties, or nearly 5,000 election precincts, and the election bureau announced prior to the election that the returns would be compiled on election night only, unless it should develop that a final count was necessary to determine the winners, and correspondents of the bureau throughout the state were instructed not to wire any returns after election night.

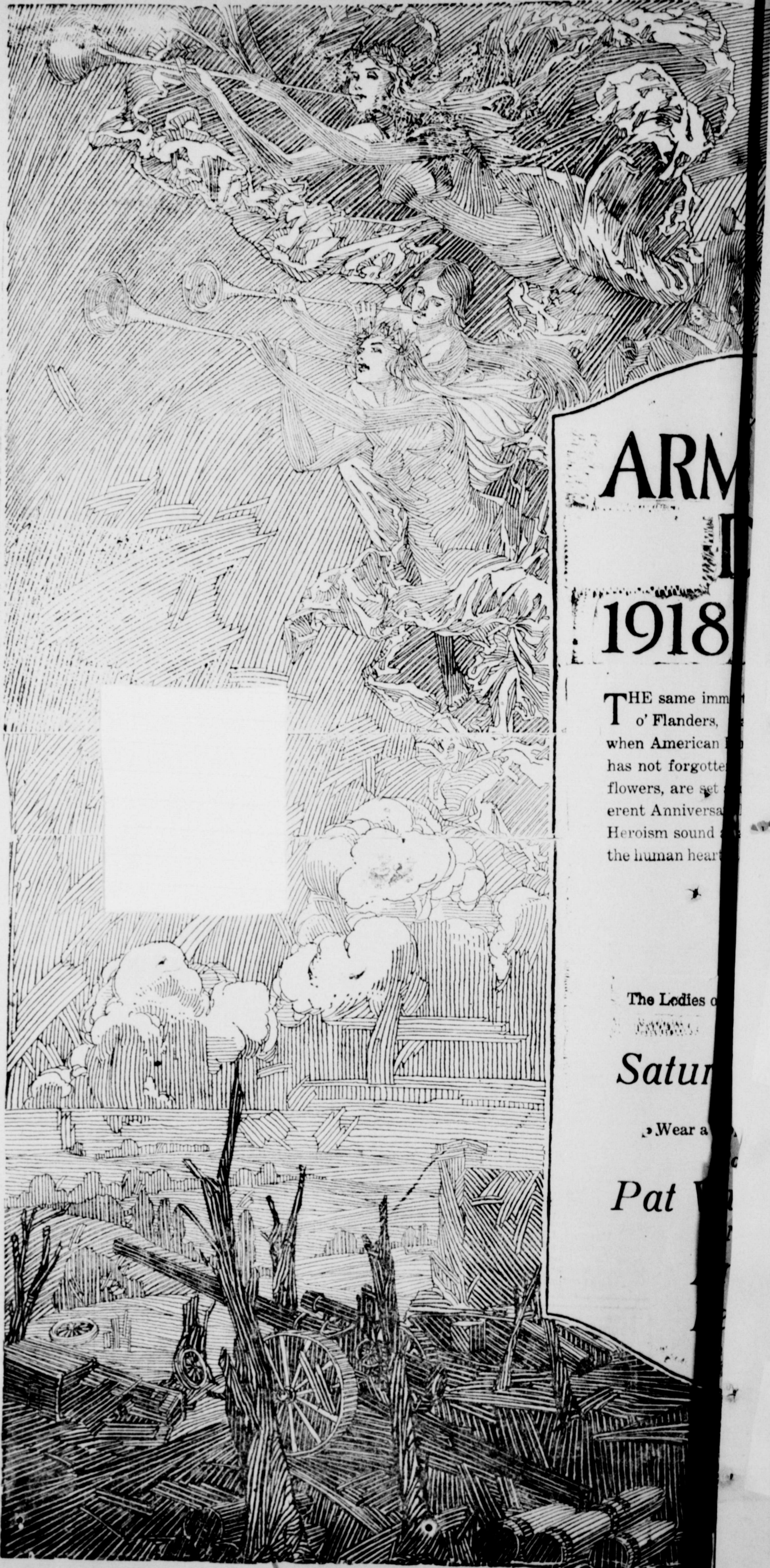
Less than one-half of the vote was reported on election night, and with Butte protesting the announcement that he has been defeated, and with Mrs. M. A. Ferguson running only about 40,000 votes ahead, those interested in the final outcome began demanding a complete count.

It is expected that the newspapers will be able to carry a final report not later than next Tuesday.

Col. William E. Hawley, who staked out the town of Casper, Wyoming, where Owen Wister wrote and laid the scenes of his classic novel, "The Virginian," and who was a pal of the novelist more than a quarter of a century ago, was consulted almost daily by Director Tom Forman, during the filming of the new picture version of the novel, which closes at the Maeroy Theatre tonight.

Col. Night Flight to Test Broadcasting Shows Way to Signal by Flashlight

Army Aviator Sets Out to Prove One Scientific Possibility and Proves Two.

STARTING out to prove a scientific possibility and proving something else as well has just been the experience of Lieutenant Brandt, U. S. A. He undertook a night flight over Palsades Park, New York, to demonstrate the possibility of broadcasting from the air. Before he returned to Mitchel Field he had not only succeeded in his undertaking but he had disclosed the fact that a small pocket flashlight was an admirable means of signalling while night flying.

For more than an hour, 3,000 feet in the air above Manhattan, Lieutenant Brandt talked with Announcer N. T. G. of Station WHN at Palsades Park, where some thousands of people were gathered for the demonstration. The one drawback was that the audience could not see the plane in which the army aviator was circling overhead. N. T. G. attempted to remedy this.

Uses His Flashlight
"You're doing great, old man, but we can't see you," was the way N. T. G. addressed the plane. "Won't you come back again? We want to see you. There are 3,000 people listening to you. They want to see you. It's too mystifying this way—some of them may be skepti-



cal. Won't you come back over the park at about 1,000 feet?" To this Brandt replied: "I'm right over your head at a thousand feet now. There are red and green flying lights on the wings and the red light on the tail, but I have a little flashlight in my pocket and I will flash it. I am flashing it now. Do you see me?"

Opens New Signalling Field
A mad cheer from 3,000 voices interrupted the conversation as the audience caught the little plane high in the air with Brandt's flashlight signals making flashes in the

sky. But the flashlight had been doing more than disclosing the plane's position. Brandt had been signalling a code message to a fellow officer stationed at the Park, and this officer, Lieutenant Rasch, had read the message and informed the sender that he understood.

Both army officers expressed their surprise at discovering that the beam from the flashlight had carried 1,000 feet. It had been a generally accepted fact in air circles that a flashlight beam could be seen for 500 feet, but that it was so plain at 1,000 feet came as a startling discovery. In the discovery they could see new possibilities in communication from plane to ground and vice versa at night time.

CHIMES FUND USED FOR STUDENT AID

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Nov. 7.—Money collected for a set of chimes at the University of Texas is being used to aid students. This fund was established by the graduating class of 1913 of the college of arts and sciences, and it was intended originally for the purchase of chimes to hang in the tower of the main building.

Dr. H. Y. Benedict, dean of the college of arts and sciences, said that about 1913 there was a movement to have chimes in the main building. The first of April was class day and the Seniors brought out an old copper kettle, according to Dean Benedict, and set it on three sticks in front of the main building. Then, after a parade, they marched around the kettle and threw in dollars. The first year the sum amounted to \$80.

Additions were made by the class of 1914, the class of 1915 and that of 1916. Then the war came and the fund was abandoned in 1917, but in 1918 the Senior class contributed \$100. Dean Benedict was secretary, treasurer for the fund and about 1919 he turned the account over to the auditor as it had been suggested to him that the chimes fund be made into a loan fund until enough money could be collected to buy the chimes. At present the fund amounts to over \$600. According to W. R. Long, auditor of the university, his office has many calls for loans from this fund, especially at the end of the year when a student needs small amounts of from \$40 to \$50.

BRITISH TEST INVENTION FOR DRYING FARM CROPS

(By Associated Press)
OXFORD, Nov. 7.—An invention is being tried by the Institute of Agricultural Engineers at Oxford University, which, if developed will remove one of the chief causes for grumbling on the part of British farmers and revolutionize English harvesting methods.

The invention is a new process for drying farm crops, a very necessary thing in the damp English climate. The plan is to cut the crop and make it into circular stacks of from 10 to 20 tons weight around a hollow central chamber. Heated air will then be blown over it by powerful fans. Haystacks have been dried by this means in ten hours without fermentation.

It is asserted that the new process will allow a harvest to proceed in any weather, save field labor, give a greater corn yield, make straw better, and facilitate plowing.

Jurisdiction of U. S. Consul is Extended Over Entire Free State

DUBLIN, Nov. 7.—Dr. Hathaway, who was American Consul in Queenstown in 1917 and 1918 and since 1922 has been American consul in Dublin, has been promoted to be Consul General of the Free State following the reception of Professor Smiddy as Irish Minister at Washington. Dr. Hathaway's jurisdiction hitherto confined to the provinces of Munster and Leinster will now extend over the whole area of the Free State.

TURKEY CROP CUT IN GRAYSON COUNTY

(By Associated Press)

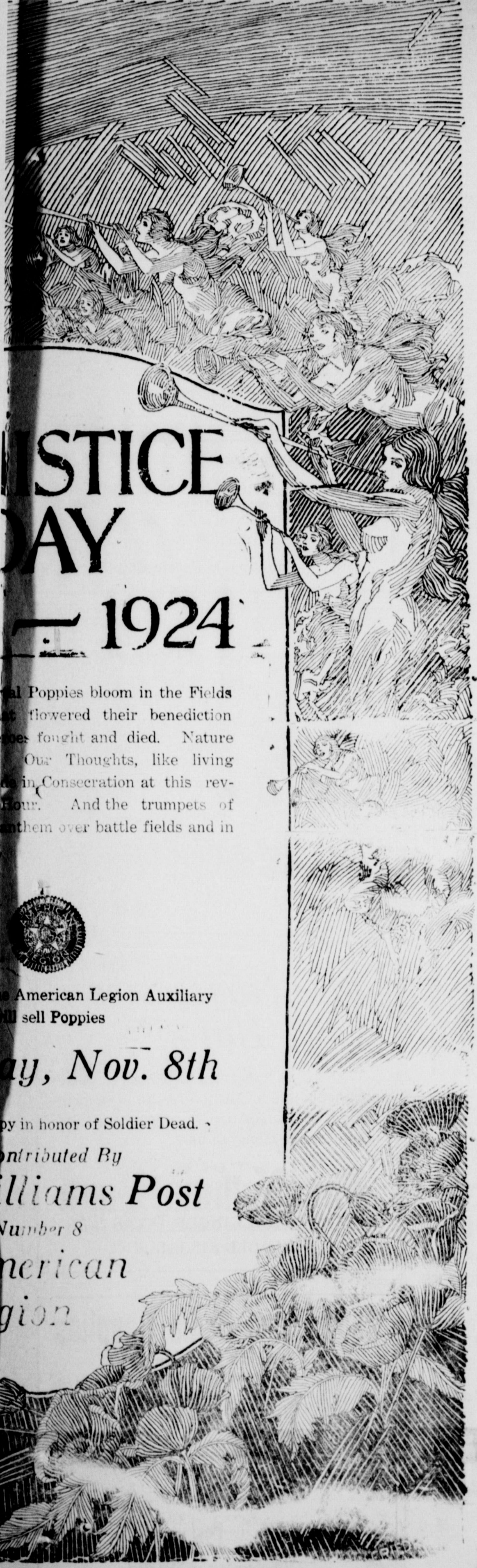
DENISON, Tex., Nov. 7.—The quarantine against turkeys in connection with the foot and mouth disease will not materially affect the crop in this county because Grayson has only about one-fourth the crop generally raised. Last year many went in for larger crops on account of the good price the year before that. Sales were not the best last year, however, and not much effort was put forth for the 1924 crop. Also, many of the Thanksgiving fowls have paid the price of the car driver who does not care how many he kills.

Russia Begins Work on 12 Ships As Nucleus of Merchant Marine

(By Associated Press)
LENINGRAD, Nov. 7.—Soviet Russia has begun the creation of its own merchant marine. It has just laid the keels of eight cargo boats and four passenger steamers. The vessels will be built entirely in Soviet shipyards, principally at the Putilov Iron Works and the Baltic Shipbuilding Yards here.

The total cost of the 12 vessels, which will have an aggregate of 35,000 tonnage, will be \$5,000,000. They will be completed early in 1926. The government hopes through these steamers to lower freight rates and to compete with foreign shipowners.

DAIRY FACTS

SOILING CROPS ARE REQUIRED FOR MILK

Because of a succession of dry summers in northeastern Minnesota it has become necessary to supplement permanent pastures, if dairy cows are to be properly fed and the milk flow maintained in August just as butter fat prices start on the ascending scale, says M. J. Thompson, superintendent of the Northeast Experiment station of Minnesota university.

Mr. Thompson believes this condition should be anticipated when seeds are being ordered and crops planned. Three things can be done to provide summer succulence, he says.

1. Sweet clover pasture. Not yet generally established; sow seed for 1925.
2. Summer silage. Not wholly practical since most farms with silos have winter capacity only and if there is a carry-over much of it spoils.
3. Soiling crops, that is, crops cut green, hauled in and fed.

"The last offers the cheapest and best solution of the problem," says Mr. Thompson. "Such crops require only a limited acreage. Full grown rye is the first available in the summer. Oats, though somewhat later, offers the greatest range of seeding late April to late June, and thus serves more need. Press may be sown with it. Second crop sweet clover, and later sunflowers (chopped) and corn all make excellent feed. Our herd consumes over 90 per cent of these feeds, so that waste is small. In this manner the milk flow is sustained and prolonged into the winter high price period."

Homemade Spray Mixture Helps Milk Production

Flies on the cows in hot weather often cut down the milk. A good fly spray, well put on, will not only quiet the cows and help the milk run freely, but will also save the temper and language of the milker.

A good spray for this purpose can easily be made at home, according to the cow men of the New York State College of Agriculture at Ithaca. Use 1/4 quart of coal tar dip; 1/2 quart fish oil; 3 quarts coal oil; 3 quarts whale oil; and 1 1/2 quarts oil of tar. Dissolve 3 pounds of laundry soap in water, add the ingredients of the spray, and bring up to 30 gallons with lukewarm soft water.

This spray, applied twice a day—in the morning after milking and in the afternoon while the cows are in the barn for silage or other green feed—will keep the flies away and keep the hair coats of the cow soft.

Thirty gallons of this mixture will spray 40 cows twice a day for ten days, at a cost of one cent a cow a day. Two men with a portable half-barrel cart carrying a spray pump and nozzle can spray 40 cows in five minutes and save a lot of time, milk, and general unpleasantness.

Average Profitable Age for Cows Kept for Milk

Ten years is the average age at which cows kept for milk are slaughtered for beef, according to investigations made by the United States Department of Agriculture. Thus one can expect a cow to produce for about eight years before becoming too old for profitable production.

In Wisconsin and other dairy states the average age is eleven years; in others, nine years is the average. But the general level for the whole country is ten years.

Cows, when sold for beef slaughter, brought an average price of \$31.69 a head. When sold for milk they brought about \$62.90. These two prices indicate that the average beef slaughter price of cows that had been kept for milk eight years is about one-half the average price of cows having a milking future.

Right Time to Cut Rye for Feeding Dairy Cow

Rye should always be cut for hay before the awns harden, and inasmuch as the cows like the hay better when rye is cut about the blooming time, we consider that about the best time to cut rye intended for dairy cow feeding. In fact, rye hay cut from the time of heading out to bloom is reasonably good feed. With all this hay the cows will readily clean up, plus 10 pounds of good legume hay daily for the roughage, a good ration may be had with one pound of the following for each three pounds of milk produced: Ground corn or barley, four parts; ground oats, four parts; wheat bran, two parts; alfalfa one part, gluten meal one part.

Feed Grain to Calves

Calves will begin to eat grain at three weeks of age, and at the end of six weeks will consume about one pound per day. At the end of eight weeks they will eat one pound per day. At three months they should be getting two pounds of grain per day, which is enough until six months of age, unless it is desired to push them very rapidly. After six months a little more should be given, or when ever they are weaned from the skimmed milk.

U. S. Mints Coins for Poland

WARSAW, Nov. 7.—The United States supplied 12,000,000 silver coins of one zloty and 6,000,000 silver coins of two zlotys. Great Britain and France are also minting coins for Poland from silver furnished by the Polish treasury. In 1925, however, silver Polish coins will be exclusively minted in the United States out of the 120 tons of silver purchased in the United States by the Polish government.
