Cooke County College holds Open House of new facilities

The public was treated to a campuswide open house and dedication ceremonies at Cooke County College on Saturday to mark the opening of the new Cooke County College Memorial Library and the Community Education & Cosmetology Building.

"These two buildings are so special because they will be the ones most used by the community," said CCC President Bud Joyner during dedication ceremonies, attended by some 100 people. Dr. Joyner thanked the public for its support of a bond to help build the facilities plus other support of the more than \$2 million of remodeling, repairs and new construction that has been completed at the college the past four years. Dr. Joyner also thanked the "hundreds of people" who participated in the projects, from those who helped to move furniture, to architects and contrac-

tos, to the CCC Steering Committee whose members worked closely with the board of trustees on the projects.

CCC Board President Urban Endres also emphasized that the college facilities are for the use of the county's citizens. He assisted Renee Jones, president of CCC's student government association, with the ribbon cutting formally opening the new library.

The new library features a greatly expanded study area plus a new computerized cataloging system that will greatly aid in the education of students and service to the county's residents, said Librarian Patsy Wilson. Unlike some college libraries, the general public is invited to check out books, said Lee Switzer, assistant librarian. Any county resident may check out a book during regular library hours, he said.

A three-hour open house featuring a vast array of changes at the

college followed the formal dedication ceremonies. The building that will probably be most utilized by the public will be the Community Education & Cosmetology building located on the west side of the campus near the gymnasium. The greatly expanded cosmetology center is being utilized by the public on almost a daily basis as people come to have their hair permed, cut or set by CCC students studying in a two-year certification program. Some 50 students are now enrolled in the program, with many coming from neighboring counties and states, said Sara Rogers, head of the cosmetology department. The new cosmetology facilities and the program itself are now considered one of the finest in the state, she said.

Also included in the open house were the Business and Industry Computer Lab, the Small Business

Muenster votes to a different drummer...

High voter turnout in controversial election

Muenster voters showed great interest in several of the political races in Tuesday's elections. A total of 957 area residents made the effort to go to the polls and support the candidates of their choice.

Most local people involved in agriculture felt heartened by Republican Rick Perry's victory over incumbent Jim Hightower. Agriculture Commissioner Hightower was unseated by a narrow margin of 49.1 percent to 47.9 percent. These percentages were released by the Secretary of State's office and were unofficial as of press time Wednesday.

There is still some concern that Hightower will call for a recount, according to information received by the Cooke County Farm Bureau on Wednesday, said Tim Hartman, local Farm Bureau director.

"It went the way we wanted it to go," commented Hartman. "I haven't talked to a farmer yet who isn't happy about it (Perry's victory). The whole agricultural community felt great relief." Perry is a farmer-rancher.

Local voters were also paying close attention to the contest between incumbent Ric Williamson (D-Weatherford) and Kyle McCain (R-Gainesville) for State Representative, District 63.

McCain proved to be the choice of the majority of Cooke County voters. In Cooke County, the final tally showed McCain 4,421; Williamson, 3,581. Locally, Muenster voted McCain 564; Williamson 297.

Williamson carried Parker and Wise counties and won a fourth term in the Texas House of Representatives.

"I am extremely grateful to all the voters who supported me," commented Williamson in a telephone interview Wednesday afternoon. "I wish the count could have been higher in Cooke County, but I understand why it was not," he said. McCain was the local candidate and his mother has been politically active in the county for many years.

The incumbent promised to continue to give support to Cooke County as he has in the past. He also stated that he was proud of the fact that he had run a clean campaign.

McCain stated, in a telephone interview, that he was very, very gratified by all the support he received in Cooke County. He was the choice of the majority of the county's voters and, by carrying Cooke County, said he had accomplished one of his goals. "I showed voters that a Republican can win in a countywide election in Cooke County."

"Muenster was one of the key battlegrounds in this election," remarked McCain. "As a community, they are much more likely

to look at the issues than to vote a straight ticket. Muenster and Lindsay have better informed voters."

Muenster seems to think differently than the rest of the state on many issues. Several of the area's choices for top state officers were contrary to the final outcome. Most outstanding was that Muenster favored Clayton Williams who lost the race to Ann Richards. Williams' many faux pax in the last month cost him many votes and he lost to Richards, who was trailing in the polls.

Landslide votes win Hess county commissioner's seat

Virgil Hess will be the new Precinct 4 Commissioner of Cooke County after defeating his Republican candidate, Ken Swirczynski, by an overwhelming 1,193 to 463 votes.

In Precinct 18 in Muenster, which is also part of Precinct 4, 772 voters came to the poll. Hess, a lifelong resident of Muenster, was strongly supported by the Muenster area. He received 555 votes and Swirczynski 214.

"I really appreciate the vote of confidence by the people of Precinct 4," Hess said. "I congratulate them on the great voter turnout. It's above the state average and they ought to be proud of that." His figures showed that Precinct 4 voters in Muenster had a 63 percent turnout and in Lindsay 60 percent.

Hess said that he was pretty excited and that the realization of victory was finally beginning to soak in. He attributed his landslide win to going out and meeting the people in Precinct 4 before the primary election and again before this election.

The commissioner-elect campaigned door-to-door across the entire precinct, taking the opportunity to meet as many people as possible and discuss the issues that concerned them.

Ken Swirczynski declined to make any comment on the outcome of the election.

Muenster falls short in fire prevention on State Board report

Muenster has received a report from the State Board of Insurance on the results of their inspector's findings during the recent key rate inspection of the city. Once every 10 years, every Texas city must be inspected by the State Board of Insurance.

Results of this inspection of the city's municipal fire defenses are used to figure the city's key rate for fire insurance premiums. It affects the amount paid by every business and resident of Muenster and also a few located on the fringes of the city limits.

The evaluation of this inspection was done by A.F. Whitney, chief engineer of Engineering Section - 011-3, Property Division of the State Board of Insurance in Austin. It was sent to Joe Fenton, City Manager of Muenster.

Fire prevention was an area in which the report called for changes that would save Muenster from an increase on fire insurance premiums. According to Mr. Whitney's report, "For the past two years, the Monthly Information Reports have not indicated a sufficient number of inspections.

To avoid a \$.03 charge, the fire marshal or a representative should inspect all nonresidential structures at least once each year."

There are over 100 nonresidential structures in town according to Joe Fenton. To meet the Board's inspection requirements, the fire marshal of Muenster should inspect at least nine

least three years, the city could send a letter to the Insurance Board indicating how many buildings had been built since the codes were enforced and many old buildings had been demolished. The State Board of Insurance would then determine if the city would receive a credit in its key rate scheduled, said Bradley.

"Compliance with these recommendations would benefit the people of Muenster."

businesses every month and make a record of any deficiencies found. The business owner would be notified and expected to correct the deficiencies within a given amount of time.

Joe Fenton is presently the fire marshal of Muenster. Fenton and Fire Chief Herb Knabe noted that in the last five years, the only structures that have been inspected were institutions that were seeking a license such as the nursing home, hospital, day care, or schools. "We've really met with resistance when we try to inspect some businesses and it is for their benefit," said the two officials.

It was also recommended that Muenster adopt a recent edition of nationally recognized building and electrical codes. "It is also necessary to appoint enforcement officials and keep verifiable records of inspections," said the report.

Compliance with these recommendations would benefit the people of Muenster because they would result in credits in the key rate schedule which would result in an insurance savings for all residences, said Whitney and Phillip Bradley of the State Board of Insurance in a telephone interview this Tuesday.

The topic of adopting building codes in Muenster has been brought up at city council meetings, but was always met with resistance, said Muenster fire officials.

During inspection of Muenster's waterworks, hydrant flow tests indicated that capacity requirements were satisfactory. There were a number of recommendations for improvements such as three additional three-way National Standard Fire Hydrants along Hwy. 82; and replacement of the 29 percent of the mercantile mains that are six inches instead of eight inches.

Muenster's 50,000-gallon elevated water storage reservoir was found to be 34-percent deficient in capacity as it had been in the previous inspection. A 75,000- to 100,000-gallon tank is recommended.

By analysis of the daily consumption records, it was determined that the well capacity is slightly deficient during periods of peak consumption. The city was encouraged to obtain additional supply capacity which would mean drilling more wells or building a lake.

In part the report on the fire department said, "The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department presents the image of an active well-organized group. We encourage the department to continue regular training reports each

quarter and active participation in Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M."

There was a reduction of \$.01 in the alerting system charge since fire phones are used by 100 percent of the firefighters. The report also stated that there could be a reduction of another \$.01 when the five-year Loss/Premium ratio is not more than 35 percent.

Every business fire and residence fire is considered in the fire ratio for five years. The ratio is determined by comparing the amount of money paid by fire insurance companies to the insurance premiums being paid by businesses and residents during the same period.

"Without the new 1987 Ford pumper truck, the fire department wouldn't have passed the inspection," said Knabe. The 1959 pumper wasn't able to satisfy the volume portion of the pump test and to be recognized as a reserve pumper/reserve hose truck, it must be repaired and retested by an independent third party.

The old truck will then have to be tested every year and satisfy the requirements of the "Standards for Fire Apparatus 25 Years or Older." Also the city must provide a letter from a supplier indicating that there are replacement parts available and they can be obtained within a two-week period.

The comments in the 1990 report were made by A.F. Whitney and based on the evaluation of the inspection made by Phillip Bradley and Muenster's current population was estimated to be 1400.

For the third consecutive year the Muenster Hornets' Cross Country team brought home the Regional title. The entire girls' team qualified for state competition by the strong finish of the remaining team members: Hiroko Miura finished 13th in 13:46; Cheryl Hacker 21st in 13:59; Amy Dankesreiter 22nd in 14:22; Marcia Vogel 14:52 and Tonya Knabe 14:55. The Muenster girls finished first with 49 points, followed by Satillo with 82 and Broch with 95 points.

Terry Felderhoff, Muenster's only boys' qualifier did a fine job competing Saturday. After contributing his part to the Hornet's

District football Championship title, Terry came out Saturday and placed 60th out of approximately 125 runners. There's a lot to be said for a football player who has this much determination!

"Our girls all showed superior efforts at Saturday's meet," reported Coach. Cross Country is a sport that you have to work out hard on your own all year long, no one else can run that race for you. "It's a whole lot of determination and self-discipline. It's a lot like life," commented one of the girls, "You get out of it what you put into it!"

The Lady Hornets will travel to Georgetown this Saturday to compete in the State Cross Country Meet. Good luck ladies! Muenster is proud of you!

Council seeks public opinion ...

Park Board recommends the removal of high board and slide

Muenster City Councilmen were not ready to accept Park Board recommendations Monday night, to remove the high diving board and the shallow water slide from the municipal pool. The Park Board submitted their idea last month, but the council quickly asked for time to consider the move. The suggestion was on the agenda again and, this time, Park Board member Ben Bindel was present to answer any questions. "Our main concern is not over insurance or lawsuits, but over removal of a hazard," Bindel said. "We feel like we need to do something to avoid accidents like the head injury on the last day of this season." He explained about falls from the high board and scrapes and bumps from hitting the pool bottom after sliding in. Mayor Henscheid asked if the question wasn't more a matter of horseplay or incorrect use rather than hazardous equipment. Bindel affirmed but said other area pools had removed high boards or even all diving boards to reduce hazards. Joe Fenton and some of the councilmen didn't like reducing the recreational attraction of Muenster's facilities, that abuse by a few does not justify depriving everyone.

Fenton felt that the public should know about this potential action and there had been no publicity on it yet. The council decided to actively seek public opinion concerning swimming pool equipment to help make the decision. They will also investigate the effect on insurance premiums. Mayor Henscheid said, "Please, let us know how you feel about these pool questions."

The second reading of a proposed cable TV ordinance was ac-

cepted pending approval by the city's legal advisor, Adrian Leonard of Dallas. Alvin Fuhrman of Muenster Cable TV says the franchise is acceptable now if section 626 of the Communications Act of 1934 concerning franchise renewal is included.

Other business handled by the City Council included:

- Zoning Board recommendations to allow construction of a carport at 823 N. Main was accepted.

- Angela Endres was hired as swimming pool manager at the existing minimum wage at the time the pool begins operation.

- The city will coordinate with the Chamber of Commerce to locate and identify spare parts and maintenance funds before performing maintenance on several of the antique street lights installed last year. The city originally accepted the maintenance job on the lights, but Joe Fenton said the spare parts and \$500.00 per year promised had not been received.

- Discussion was held about converting jail cell space to office or storage space in the crowded city hall. The cells have been unused

for years since all prisoners go to the Cooke County Jail in Gainesville.

- Discussion of allowing installation of gas tanks in the street easement at Neil's Kerr-McGee.

- Approved giving Christmas hams to city employees this year.

- Approved payment of monthly bills totaling \$89,095.64.

- Designated Muenster State Bank as the official depository.

- Approved selling old police radio for \$300.00. The proceeds will go into the police informant money fund.

- Dave Fette asked about rural residents using city garbage services. Joe Fenton replied that was against city policy and recommended dealing directly with Texas Waste Management, Inc.

- The council was agreeable to a request from the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District to "front load" payments for services such as quarterly payments of 30 percent and 30 percent, then 20 percent and 20 percent to cover the higher expenses earlier in the year. It did not, however, seem to a "done deal" yet.

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Just my Opinion ...

The city is faced with another tough decision. Not earth shaking, just tough. The Park Board has recommended that the high diving board and the shallow water slide be removed from the municipal swimming pool. Their official stance is a sincere desire to better protect the kids from injury. They say other area pools have removed diving boards because they are hazardous.

So here is our latest example of penalizing everyone for the abuses of a few. I maintain that the injuries result from lack of control or skill or pure horseplay; none of which are a fault of the equipment or those patrons who use them correctly.

The skills need to be taught and rules against horseplay need to be enforced. Yes, I know that's not so easy to do, but why do we have to accept this never-ending quest for the easy way out? Instead of teaching skill and discipline, let's just eliminate the opportunity so we don't have to worry about it.

Instead of belaboring the point, here are some possible solutions:

- The city should pay better wages to pool personnel for an important and highly responsible job. In turn, the employees, all of whom are trained and qualified, should train the patrons to avoid accidents and enjoy the facilities. Dangerous horseplay should earn immediate ejection with no tolerance. If all this means extra trained employees, so be it.

- Economically, the pool does well to break even. Therefore, how about charging higher admission to older age groups who may require more supervision and request more facilities? How about a season pass for frequent visitors? How about charging realistically for good facilities instead of downgrading the pool, making it less attractive?

- How about sponsoring a springboard diving clinic and show, with possibly some college diving team to properly train those who use the board and possibly even require qualifications before one can use the diving board?

I think I'm correct that the test in a lawsuit is negligence. Let's work to prove our concern and care in recreation.

We don't send football players out on the field without training. Why be less concerned with water sports?

Muenster has a reputation of excellence and the best "Learn to Swim" program around. Let's upgrade the pool, not downgrade it!

A REALITY CHECK FOR CONGRESS

"I am for the amendment. I am for the content of the amendment and what it attempts to do"

So, Mr. President, I want the record to show my violent objection to the content of the amendment"

U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford, Sept. 7, 1989

It's nothing more than a reality check, but I call it the "Lewis Carroll syndrome." It's the reaction I often have when reading the *Congressional Record*. It's when I find myself flipping back to the cover to make sure I haven't somehow picked up a copy of *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* by mistake.

The Lewis Carroll syndrome struck most recently when I reread the account of last year's Senate debate on whether to apply the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) to congressional employees.

Sen. Ford, chairman of the Senate Rules Committee, found himself in the rather uncomfortable position of having to defend publicly Congress' desire to continue its 60-year tradition of exempting itself from the laws it imposes on others.

From the Social Security Act of 1933 to the Civil Rights Restoration Act of '88, Congress has passed a slew of landmark civil rights and worker protection bills. And each time Congress has blithely exempted its employees from the protections and remedies deemed essential for all other citizens.

As per routine, the ADA included the sweetheart exemption until Iowa Sen. Chuck Grassley offered an amendment to extend its coverage to congressional workers. "This amendment is very straightforward," Grassley told his colleagues. "It says that, starting today, and at long last, Congress will begin to live by the same laws it passes for others."

The traditional practice says that Congress somehow thinks it's above the law, Grassley noted. "At a minimum, it goes to a lack of public accountability. At its worst, it is raw hypocrisy." Rising to take exception, Sen. Ford acknowledged that "this amendment puts us in a very peculiar position." He proceeded to offer the exceedingly peculiar defense of the position, excerpted above. It is the defense of one who wants to champion the forces of good — but doesn't want them messing around in his backyard. It is a position that can be expressed only through the twisted logic and tortured double-speak of the Mad Hatter's tea party.

The Grassley amendment was approved at the end of this debate. The Senate voided the amendment this July.

Sen. Grassley has vowed to continue his fight to make Congress live by the laws it makes. He will not be alone. In August, the National Federation of Independent Business began forming a coalition of business groups that will press Congress to give its own workers the same rights, benefits and remedies it bestows upon workers in the private sector.

Small-business owners believe Congress has operated above and beyond the law far too long. Removed from the real-world problems its actions create, immune to the consequences of its own handiwork, Congress is living in a Wonderland of privilege and exemption. It's time for Congress to end the exemptions. Time to take a reality check.

We wish to express the appreciation of our inspector for the cooperation given to him during the recent key rate inspection of your city. The following comments are based on the evaluation of this inspection. We estimated 1400 as the current population for the analysis.

WATERWORKS

A map is enclosed which illustrates the hydrant flow test results. The test results satisfy our capacity requirements. We recommend three additional three-way National Standard Fire Hydrants in the mercantile area. Also, 29% of the mercantile mains are deficient in size. Please refer to the map and respective sections of the enclosed Key Rate Schedule for specific details.

The elevated storage reservoir remains 34% deficient in capacity as established in the previous inspection. After analysis of the daily consumption records, we determined that the well capacity is slightly deficient during periods of peak consumption. We encourage the city to obtain additional supply capacity. We recommend that corrections to each of these deficiencies be carefully considered.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Muenster Volunteer Fire Department present the image of an active and well organized group. We encourage the department to continue regular training reports each quarter and active participation in Firemen's Training School at Texas A&M. Since fire phones are used by 100% of the firefighters, the alerting system charge will be reduced \$.01, and can be reduced another \$.01 when the five year Loss/Premium ratio is not more than 35%.

To maintain this reduction, the 24-hour dispatcher must continue to remain on duty to receive calls and dispatch equipment. The 1987 Ford pumper passed the three part standard pump test; however, the 1959 pumper was unable to satisfy the volume portion of the pump test. To be recognized as a reserve pumper/reserve hose truck, it must be repaired, retested by an independent third party, and annually satisfy the requirements of the enclosed "Standards for Fire Apparatus 25 Years or Older".

FIRE PREVENTION

For the past two years, the Monthly Information Reports have not indicated a sufficient number of inspections. To avoid a \$.03 charge, the fire marshal or a representative should inspect all non-residential structures at least once each year.

To continue credit for maintaining the arson reward, please send a list of 6 locations where an arson reward placard is properly posted. Refer to the enclosed memo for posting instructions.

We recommend cities adopt a recent edition of nationally recognized building and electrical codes. It is also necessary to appoint enforcement officials and keep verifiable records of inspections.

Appraisal District proposes new budget

The Cooke County Appraisal District has chopped some \$32,000 from its proposed 1991 budget, hoping that county taxing entities will approve it the second time around.

The CCAD board of directors have set a 6:30 p.m. public hearing for Monday to receive input on the new \$622,280 budget proposal. A copy of the proposed budget is available at the CCAD office or at any of the county taxing entities.

Nine of 11 taxing entities last month rejected a \$653,820 budget, sending CCAD officials back to the drawing board. That budget, however, included \$25,000 for legal fees, which has been deleted from the latest proposal. Officials said they will bill the entities as those expenses are incurred, as was done last year.

Since appraisal districts serve taxing entities, the budget must be approved by a simple majority of the entities before it can take effect. Should the entities approve this latest budget, it will become effective Jan. 1, 1991.

Following last month's budget rejection, several entity representatives expressed concern that the CCAD budget continues to rise at a time when there remained questions about the efficiency of the district. Some said they did not receive enough information which allowed them to compare the fiscal 1991 budget to the one from

last year. Others questioned raises, and some officials felt there was too wide a gap between the highest and lowest paid positions.

At a meeting last week, CCAD President Roger Martin said the district intends to adopt a defined salary scale for its employees this year. He blamed Chief Appraiser Pat Pickett, fired by the board in August, for proposing the rejected budget, but said some blame falls on the board. "We simply should have given her more guidance," he said. Martin pledged to work toward better communication between the district and the taxing entities it serves.

The new \$622,280 proposal includes \$477,990 for appraisal, \$120,290 for collection and \$24,000 for collection of tangible personal property for six taxing entities, which includes the Muenster ISD. It is estimated that some \$666,000 in tangible personal property, such as airplanes

and cars, will be collected in the Muenster ISD at a collection cost assessed by the CCAD at \$809. Muenster ISD will pay \$1,571 for appraisal of the same property, according to the proposal, bringing their total levy for tangible personal property to about \$2,300.

The City of Muenster collects its own taxes, so will not be responsible for paying any share of either the collection or tangible personal property budgets. The city will be charged \$6,453 and the school district \$21,000 as their portion of the appraisal budget if it is approved.

The appraisal budget is a \$35,980 increase from last year's \$442,010 budget, or an 8 percent increase. That includes a \$3,000 increase for appraising property, virtually the same budget for computer services, a \$12,000 reduction in the mapping department, a \$25,000 increase in administration, a \$10,000 increase in overtime costs and a \$7,000 increase for general expenses.

The new budget includes a 5 percent increase for all positions, a 26 percent raise for the business manager and a 29 percent raise for the chief appraiser.

In her budget summary, interim Chief Appraiser Brenda Urrutia

said she feels the chief appraiser's job position is worth \$36,000, but has proposed the higher figure to give the board of directors flexibility in their attempts to hire a new chief appraiser. The board will take applications until Nov. 15 for the chief appraiser's position, which they hope to fill by Jan. 1, officials said.

Mrs. Urrutia said the business manager's position carries a "tremendous responsibility concerning the overall operation of the district," so has proposed a salary increase from \$12,500 to \$15,750.

A new computer coordinator position has been created in the computer department, but a computer clerk position has been eliminated. The district will show a net personnel increase of two part-time positions.

Other changes include the deletion of an \$8,700 contingency fund, doubling costs for insurance bonds, from \$7,000 to \$14,000, and almost doubling of utilities, from \$5,600 to \$10,000. Office equipment and furniture purchases will increase from \$1,500 to \$6,000, which will include mapping supplies, recording equipment, microfilm reader and some other equipment.

Comptroller's office reports October rebates

AUSTIN - Checks totaling \$93 million in monthly local sales tax rebates were sent to cities and counties in Texas by the State Comptroller's office.

"Sales are staying strong throughout Texas and that means sales tax collections keep increasing at a steady pace," Bob Bullock said.

Checks to cities totaled almost \$84 million, an increase of 16 percent over last October's rebates. So far this year, rebates to cities are running almost 9 percent ahead of last year, Bullock said.

Cities in Cooke County received a total of \$95,732.55, a drop of 5.69 percent from last October. Muenster and Gainesville both saw decreases. Muenster's \$7,321.19 was down 8.76 percent and Gainesville's \$80,172.04 dropped 8.70 percent.

Receiving higher rebate checks

were Lindsay \$3,602.36, up 9.96 percent; Oak Ridge \$2,859.86, up 262.89 percent; and Valley View \$1,777.10, up 10.59 percent.

Rebate checks to counties totaled \$9.5 million this month for an increase of 19 percent over last year's payments to date. The sizeable increase is partly due to more counties collecting sales tax now, Bullock said. Cooke County received \$51,517.98 which was up 15.13 percent from last October.

This month's checks reflect taxes collected on August sales and reported in late September by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4 percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

#4. WHAT ARE THE ELEMENTS OF VALUE? NACRE... the thicker, the better. LUSTER... the higher the luster, the finer the pearl. COLOR... pink, white, cream, greenish, in order of value. SHAPE... round is most desirable. SIZE... the larger the pearl, the greater the value (sold by millimeter size). TEXTURE... most valuable are free from blemish.

Wildflower photo chosen for permanent exhibit at CCC

Sharon Gaston of Cooke County College has students in her botany classes collecting and preserving native plant specimens in a special way that keeps them looking as fresh and colorful as the day they were discovered in the field.

They photograph them. And the results can be spectacular - so much so that the best one submitted each semester is being enlarged, specially framed and put on permanent display on campus.

The latest addition to the exhibit is a striking picture of *Oenothera Speciosa* - a plant more commonly known as "showy primrose" from the evening primrose family. It was photographed back in April by Rodney Hess of Muenster during the past spring semester.

Gaston previously had required students in her botany classes to collect and, in the traditional way, press specimens of native plants between pieces of waxed paper. Recently, however, she started giving them the option of taking photos of the plants instead.

Before long, students were turning in as many as 500 photos per semester.

"I was overwhelmed by the exceptional quality and beauty of so many of these photos," Gaston said, "and it seemed a shame not to have some sort of public forum through which they could be enjoyed by others."

So Gaston initiated what will be a permanent on-campus exhibit of photographs of plants indigenous to the Cooke County area. She enlisted a committee of fellow faculty members to make the

choice each semester of the photo to be added to the permanent exhibit.

Photographer Hess, after spending several semesters at CCC, has since transferred to the University of North Texas in Denton, where he is majoring in history with a minor in biology.

"Rodney's beautiful photograph shows an often misidentified plant," Gaston pointed out. "Many people mistakenly call it a 'buttercup,' although it's actually very different from plants in the true buttercup family."

Hess took the picture just south of Gainesville along Interstate 35, and Gaston said there is generally an abundance of showy primroses

along this stretch of highway between Gainesville and Valley View.

A self-described "wildflower freak," Gaston regularly teaches non-credit courses and gives slide presentation talks on the many varieties of wildflowers to be found in Cooke County. Persons wishing to contact her should call 817-668-7731, Ext. 252.

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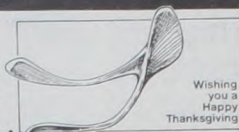
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Battle of Hornets won by Muenster!

When it really counted, Muenster's Hornets had something extra and that extra something gave them a 31-0 victory over Era and a District Championship last Friday night. Whether you call it pride, determination or defense, Muenster had more of it than their guests.

Much had been made of the fact that Muenster humiliated Saint Jo the previous week. Everyone was also aware that Muenster dropped the season opener to Callisburg by a 3-0 margin. But when it really counted, it was the Red Hornets and their fans who celebrated in the middle of the field while the Era players were groping their way to the showers in defeat.

"It was a tremendous effort by the young team," said Coach Grady Roller. "We've been improving every week, offensively and defensively. We quit making the mistakes and didn't allow Era any big plays."

Muenster won the coin toss, taking the kickoff to their own 36-yard line and then began to march down the field. On 8 running plays by Ryan Sicking, Troy Pagel and Mike Vogel, they moved to the Era 27-yard line. Jeff Young then picked off a Muenster pass, giving the ball to the visitors.

Era took the ball, but the offense couldn't gain a first down, punting the ball back to Muenster on Era's 48-yard line, and Muenster quickly put together a sustained drive. On the seventh play of the drive, Vogel burst over the top at the 1-yard line for a touchdown. Rajko Jelen booted the extra point, and the Red Hornets had a 7-0 lead with 3:31 to go in the third quarter.

Era started their second drive deep, from their 14-yard line, moving out to the 39 with the running talent of Cy Binder. The Muenster defense stiffened at that point, making Era punt on 3rd down, so they wouldn't have to punt into the wind. Muenster got off one run, but the next play was picked off by an Era defender. Era's three attempts failed to earn a first down, kicking the ball back to Muenster.

To start the second quarter, the backfield of Sicking, Pagel and Vogel, including a 41-yard run by Sicking, took Muenster to the 8-yard line. On 2nd and goal, Sicking ran a power sweep into the end zone for a touchdown. Jelen kicked the PAT, extending Muenster's lead to 14-0.

Era took the kickoff after the Muenster TD at their 23-yard line. The Gold team's offense couldn't gain a first down, punting the ball back to Muenster.

The Muenster offense failed to move the ball. A tough Era defense and 20 yards of penalties left the Hornets with a 4th and 31 situation. A punt turned Brad McDaniel into quarterback, throwing the ball to Sicking for a first down. The excitement ended on the next play when Young covered a fumbled ball for Era.

Era picked up 11 yards in 4 carries, when Ryan Sicking stepped in, intercepted a pass, giving the ball to Muenster on their own 32-yard line. Vogel ran for 42 yards, assisted by an 11-yard run by Sicking and a 5-yard gain by Pagel to take Muenster to the Era 17-yard line. With time running out, Jelen was called on to kick a field goal. The 31-yard attempt cleared the goal post, giving Muenster a 17-0 halftime lead.

The third quarter settled into a defensive battle with neither team being able to put a serious scoring threat together.

Era took the second half kick, but 2 yards later, fumbled the ball into the waiting arms of Kelly Colwell. Muenster lost a yard on the first attempt, punting possession back to Era. Dillon Enderby made two good runs for 11 and 10 yards, with Binder running a 15-yarder on Era's next drive. But the other four plays attempted saw Muenster's defense handing the Golden Boys a loss each time, including a 4th and 2 defensive hold. Muenster came out with zilch

their next attempt, again punting to Era. The Red Hornets' defense held Era again on 4th and 2, taking over at the Era 41-yard line. Short runs by Vogel and Pagel took Muenster to the 18-yard line. Era's defense stiffened at this point, leaving Muenster with a 4th and 10. Muenster then attempted a 36-yard field goal, but the ball went wide right, giving Era possession. Nathan Potts took the first play 13 yards, but the next four attempts failed, including a 4th and 5 at the Era 38. Good Muenster defense dropped Young for a 10-yard loss, giving the ball back to Muenster, just 28 yards from paydirt. Vogel picked up a first down on two runs. The third play saw Troy Pagel cross and play from the outside from the 17-yard line for a touchdown. A good block by Scott Hudspeth assisted in the score. Jelen kicked the PAT and Muenster had a 24-0 lead with 7:24 remaining in the game.

Era started their next drive from their 10-yard line, picking up 9 yards, then punting on 4th down. Muenster, starting at midfield, traveled 50 yards to the 1-yard line. Vogel led the way, gaining 37 of the yards. Mike Vogel did the honors on a 1-yard run. Jelen again kicked and the Muenster Hornets took a 31-0 lead with 3:07 on the clock.

Era attempted to come back on their last drive, but Muenster ended the game with two quarterback sacks.

"We're pleased and excited to be in the playoffs and to see how far we can go," said Roller.

Muenster's rushing attack was led by Mike Vogel, who picked up 168 yards in 32 carries. Ryan Sicking and Troy Pagel each had 13 carries for 90 and 65 yards, respectively. Cy Binder was leading rusher for Era with 49 yards in 11 attempts. Dillon Enderby picked up 45 yards.

Muenster will travel to Denton to take on TAPPS 2A Liberty Christian Friday, Nov. 9, for a 7:30 p.m. game.

"I'm expecting a good ball game," said Roller about the practice game. "Our boys will play good, they have a lot of pride and play real sound football."

Looking back at other district winners...

'90 Hornets honor MHS with another trophy

The 1990 Muenster Hornets' football team earned the honor as District Champions as they defeated the 4th state ranked Era Hornets 31-0 last Friday night. This is the 5th district title awarded to a Muenster squad.

The first district championship was in 1957 under the coaching of William "Bo" Ansley. Tri-captains were Dan Hamric, Butch Fisher, and Butch Hudspeth. The team finished 8-2 for the season, including a thrilling 20-19 win over Era for the title. Kenny and David Klement, C.J. Hellman and James Wolf were also main players.

The Hornets' next district championship was in 1968. Captains Ken Swirczynski and Don Hartman led the team to Muenster's first bi-district title. Clifford Sicking and Mike Cason were nominated to the All-State team. Glenn Richardson, assisted by Dan Hamric, coached the team.

Muenster shaded Era 38-30 in a season classic, taking the district honor. The bi-district game with Lake Dallas was played with Muenster winning 38-6. The regional game with Celina saw the Hornets fall 40-0.

In 1969, the Hornets repeated the honor reaching the finals with

a 8-1-1 season record. David Fette, Earl Koelzer and Bobby Bruns earned all-state honors. The Hornets defeated Windthorst 13-7 to take 9-B honors. The bi-district game was played in Gainesville against Lake Dallas, with Muenster edging a 29-28 victory. Leeper Stadium also housed the regional playoff game with Celina, which Muenster lost 13-0.

In 1976 Muenster earned its 4th district title. Coach Don Jones led the Hornets to a 10-3 season, 5-0 district record. The Hornets' defense allowed only 99 points with the offense scoring 423 that season. Tim Wolf, Mark Mollenkopf and Calvin Otto were captains. Nick and Neil Walterscheid, Greg Knabe, Dan Fisher, Jim Koelzer, Mark (Curly) Sicking, and Bryan Sicking sparked the team to regional champions. The Hornets defeated Pottsboro 30-6 and Whitewright 28-14 before losing to DeLeon 20-14 in the state quarterfinals. Muenster was ignored on the All-State teams.

Muenster fans are looking forward to following the Hornets through the playoffs to a state championship.

Starting deep on their 8-yard line, the Knights moved to the Tigers' 1 in 8 plays, to start the final period. The Tigers' goal-line defense was again tested. Gary Hess stopped Paschall on 3rd and goal for no gain. On fourth from the 1 foot line, the Tigers refused to allow 230 lb. Findley break through, giving possession to Sacred Heart.

The Tigers couldn't drive out of their hole, punting the ball near midfield to the Knights. A pass to Findley took the ball to the Tigers' 28-yard line. Sacred Heart's defense, led by two outstanding plays by Jason Endres, returned the ball to the Tigers on downs.

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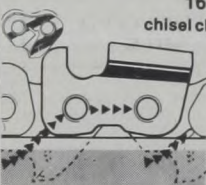
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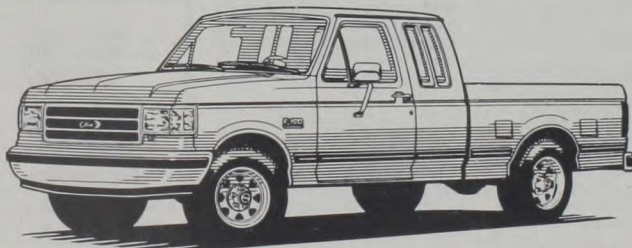
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Knights give away playoff position

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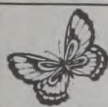

Diabetic mailout series offered

According to recent figures from the Texas Department of Health and Human Resources, over 800,000 Texans suffer from Diabetes Mellitus with over half of them undiagnosed. About 90 percent of all Texans with Diabetes Mellitus have the non-insulin dependent Diabetes, formerly known as the adult onset type. In most cases, symptoms can be controlled by weight loss, good diet and exercise.

November, recognized as National Diabetes Month, is a good time to learn more about this disease. Can you imagine having a disease which can lead to blindness, heart disease, kidney disease, limb amputations and even death? You may have diabetes and not

even know it. Ask yourself these questions.

- Are you age 40 or over?
- Do you have family members who have diabetes?
- Are you overweight?
- Have you recently noticed an increase in appetite or thirst?
- Are you of Mexican-American or Black descent?

If you answered yes to one or more of these questions, you may have a higher risk of developing diabetes. Early diagnosis and treatment can reduce your chances for developing the complications of Diabetes.

A Diabetic Mailout Series is currently available from the County Extension Office. The mailout is designed to help individuals understand Diabetes so

they can care for themselves or other family members. The more you know about the disease Diabetes Mellitus and the methods to control it, the better your health will become.

The six-part mailout series is free and will include the following:

- What diabetes is, who gets it and why we get it.
- Helpful hints for eating out on a diabetic diet.
- Health care and exercise for the diabetic.
- Skin, eyes, dental and foot care.
- Diabetic emergencies and illness.
- Precautions for travel and available diabetic resources.

A "Diabetic Meal Plan" and "Diabetic Exchange List" are also provided for planning a variety of nutritious meals.

Plant bluebonnet seeds, plants now!

Bluebonnet lovers should be planting them now for spring blooms. Both easily grown seed and bedding plants - now in red and white as well as blue - are available at nurseries.

"Although they bloom in the spring, fall is the best time to plant bluebonnets," said Steve George, Dallas horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "In fact, bluebonnets planted in the fall will produce approximately twice as large with twice as many blooms as those established in the spring. For best results, seed should be planted by mid-September and transplants no later than Halloween."

The new transplants were marketed for the first time last year and thrived in spite of the severe December freeze, George said.

The bluebonnet seed has been chemically treated (scarified) to assure germination within 10 days. However, transplants are easier to handle and establish in uniform plantings.

Eight years of development by the Extension Service has made it possible for Texans to not only grow the state flower in their home landscapes, but in several new colors.

"These colors are completely natural and have not been genetically engineered," said George. "Rather, these extremely rare color selections were simply isolated from other bluebonnets and grown in large numbers."

Worthington blue, best described as a sky blue, is named for the Worthington Hotel in Fort Worth because of its strong support of the bluebonnet development program. Seed called "Worthington mix," which produces plants in white, light blue and traditional blue, are in stores this fall.

Development of a pink bluebonnet was once thought to be impossible because of its extreme scarcity in nature. Named for Texas naturalist Carroll Abbott, the "Abbott pink" is available along with pure white bluebonnets, both as seeds and transplants.

To ensure success with bluebonnets:

- Plant in full sun in well-drained soil.
- Plant in early fall - seed no later than September and transplants no later than Halloween.
- Buy transplants or chemically scarified seed.
- Barely cover seeds with soil; don't bury crown of transplants.
- Don't overwater. Water seeds only on day of planting, transplants only when soil is dry to a depth of one inch.
- Protect against pillbugs.
- For maximum impact, use large drifts of a single color.
- Cover with a loose blanket of mulch during extremely cold weather (below 20 degrees F.). Uncover plants promptly when temperatures moderate.

Nov. 9 - Jupiter can be seen near the last-quarter moon in the early morning sky.

Nov. 17 - New moon. Look for the Leonid meteor shower which begins now.

Nov. 18 - The Leonid meteor shower peaks around 4 to 5 a.m. but is still faint. View the shower in a totally dark area completely away from the glow of city lights.

Nov. 19 - Mars, making a close approach to the Earth, is in a good position for viewing; it will not be so close again until A.D. 2003.

Nov. 21 - Saturn can be seen near the waxing quarter-moon beginning at dusk and into the evening hours.

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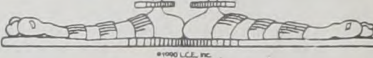

Congress meets on Farm Bill

WACO - In the final deliberations on the 1990 Farm Bill, Congress came through with a key waiver regarding emergency loans and crop insurance that has been described as extremely important to Texas farmers and ranchers.

At the recommendation of Congressman Bill Sarpalius (D-Texas), House Agriculture Committee

Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) inserted language into the Farm Bill Conference Report to "waive" a crop insurance requirement for Emergency eligibility from the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

The waiver insures that producers seeking emergency loan assistance from FmHA will be

considered even if they did not purchase crop insurance. A common complaint among producers is that crop insurance has not served as an effective risk management tool for Texas farmers.

Current FmHA regulations require that crop insurance be purchased, if available, prior to an individual's eligibility for an emergency loan from FmHA. Although this provision had been waived from the two previous disaster bills, the requirement effectively excluded most Texas producers from any assistance from FmHA.

The Farmers Home Administration is the "lender of last resort" in the farm credit system. Texas farmers who are unable to obtain credit elsewhere may now qualify for Emergency Loan Assistance from the agency.

Garst Seed, Super Crost to join forces

COON RAPIDS, IA - The Garst Seed Company announced recently that it has signed an agreement to purchase Edward J. Funk and Sons (Super Crost Seeds) of Kentland, Indiana. The sale is expected to take place after necessary government clearance is obtained. Terms of the sale were not disclosed.

The merger of the two companies accelerates the separation of Garst from a host of smaller national and regional seed companies, and strengthens its position as a leading North American seed company.

In joining forces, the combined company will have one of the largest research, production and distribution networks in the industry, with over 8,000 sales agents and dealers representing the product lines and an annual research and development budget of \$15 million. This year, Garst and Super Crost evaluated commercial and experimental varieties of corn, soybeans, sorghum, alfalfa, sunflower and canola in over 1/2-million yield trial plots. The combined companies have the capacity to condition well over three million units of seed annually.

Since emerging as a national company in the mid-80s, Garst has made a major commitment to research in the U.S., with 19 research centers across 13 states and Canada, the completion of its \$10 million Breeding and Bioscience research center in Slater, Iowa, and its network of international testing centers through ICI Seeds.

4-H Livestock Project Meetings

A series of 4-H Livestock Project Meetings will begin Saturday, Nov. 10, with a first session. 4-H members, parents, and adult leaders with Beef, Swine, and Sheep Projects are invited to attend the sessions.

The Nov. 10 session will be held for Swine from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the Jack Martin Farm at Valley View. To get to the Jack Martin Farm, go South on I-35 to Lone Oak Road (FM 3002) Exit. Go East approximately two miles and cross the first arm of the new lake. Take the first white gravel road North right after the bridge. Go one mile and you will see a barn on the North side of the road.

The Sheep session will be held Nov. 10 at the Gene Pelzel Farm near Gainesville from 10 a.m. until 12 noon. To get to the Pelzel Farm, take the Sivells Bend Road (FM 1201) North off Highway 82. Go approximately two miles and it will be the brick house on the West side of the road past the Marysville cut off (FM 1200).

The Beef session on Nov. 10 will be held at the M&L Limousin Ranch at Era from 10 a.m. until 12 noon. To get to the ranch, go to W.B. Hudspeth's grain elevator west of Era on FM 922. Take the gravel road at the elevator. Go approximately 1/2 mile and it will be M&L Limousin Ranch on the west side of the road.

These programs are designed to teach 4-H members, parents and leaders about Livestock Selection, Feeding, Health and other management principles that they will need in raising their livestock projects.

4-H members with livestock projects or interested in livestock projects are urged to attend the informative sessions.

Information about recent tax changes that affect farm and ranch tax reporting will be discussed. This is an opportunity for producers to get a practical check list of potential problems that can be discussed with their accountant.

Dr. Stokes will also present an update on the 1990 Farm Bill at the night's meeting. The 1990 Farm Bill has new guidelines that relate to crop planning. Make your plans to attend this informative meeting.

Texas Dairy Short Course scheduled at four locations

The 1990 Texas State Dairy Short Course is scheduled in four major dairy producing areas of the state to better serve the majority of dairy producers and industry representatives.

The same program will be presented at each location. Researchers, dairy specialists and

other outstanding speakers from throughout the country will give in-depth information on the critical issues related to dairy herd management.

The meeting dates and locations are Tuesday, Nov. 13, at the Civic Center in Sulphur Springs; Wednesday, Nov. 14, at the Fredonia Hotel and Convention Center, Nacogdoches; Thursday, Nov. 15, at the Holiday Inn, Stephenville; and Friday, Nov. 16, at the City Hall, Brenham.

All sessions begin at 10 a.m. and end at 3 p.m. A registration fee of \$15 at Nacogdoches, Stephenville and Brenham and \$20 at Sulphur Springs includes the noon meal and a copy of the proceedings.

The programs are designed for dairy farmers, but will be beneficial to educators, agri-business people, dairy service persons, and financial advisors. In addition to the regular program, commercial exhibits will be featured at each location.

Beginning at 10 a.m., the morning program includes "Parlor Efficiency and Milking Management," Dr. M.J. Gamroth, Oregon State University; and "Animal Care - A Public View," Dr. Dee Griffin, Pioneer Hybrid Seed Company, Guyton, Oklahoma.

Following lunch, four topics will be discussed: "Protecting Your Milk Supply - Drug Use," by Paul Childress, Milk Surveillance Officer, Texas Department of Health; "Water Management - Use and Waste," Dr. John Sweeten, Extension Service Agricultural Engineer, Texas A&M; "How to Efficiently Use Waste as a Fertilizer," Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., Extension Service Agronomist, Texas A&M; and "Feeding and Breeding for Maximum Milk Price," Dr. Chris Woelfel, Extension Service Dairy Specialist, Texas A&M.

The Texas Dairy Industry has expanded 43 percent during the 1980s to be sixth among the states in milk production. The state's dairy farmers produced 5.17 billion pounds of milk during 1989.

The value of milk, plus cull cow and calf sales, is \$804 million annually. This ranks dairy farming third behind beef cattle and cotton in agricultural income for Texas.

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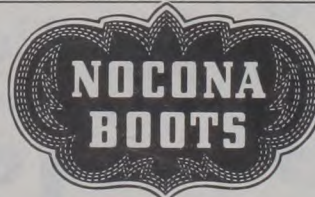

"I really don't know how good J.J. can be." "Ever since camp in Oklahoma, she has developed into

an outstanding basketball player." "We all know what Sharon can do after she displays her talents in the finals," said LeBrasseur. "I look for great things for her." "Robin will provide us with senior leadership and I expect her to be our defensive stopper," said the coach.

Maturity must come fast for the Tigerettes as Jennifer Walter will be called upon to take over the point guard slot and junior teammates Vickie Bayer and Shirley Henschel must provide the Tigerettes with a one-two inside-outside punch. "I am very confident with their ability," said LeBrasseur. "Jennifer is an outstanding ballhandler while Vickie will work the boards and pop out to nail the jumper." "Shirley is a fine defensive player and the three-point bomber of the team."

"As a coach you always look around for last season's stars on the first day of practice, but all that is left are great memories of some wonderful young ladies." 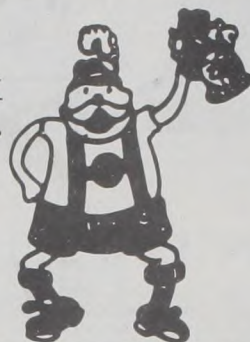
