MUSIC JUBILEE HERE IN APRIL

SCHOOL HOLDING FIRST MUSIC MEET HERE ON APRIL 1 AND 2; INVITATIONS OUT

Perryton's first music festival will be held on April 1 and 2, according to announcements made public this week by Supt. W. B. Irvin and G. Ward Moody, director of music of the Perryton schools. Invitations for the affair were issued the first of the week, the contest being open to all high schools in Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Colorado and Texas.

The affair, to be known as the Perryton Music Jubilee, was made possible through the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce, which organization pledged financial aid at the meeting of the directors last Thursday noon.

According to the rules of the contest, only contestants who are regularly enrolled, undergraduate students of the schools they represent are eligible. Cups will be offered as prizes in the major events while the soloist winning first place will be awarded silver medals.

To make the event possible, the school is offering to furnish rooms for all contestants. Capable judges will be employed to decide winners.

The contest will include events in class A bands, class B bands, and solo cups will be offered in the first two events and a first place cup in the junior event. A marching contest will also be conducted with bands with first and second place awards. An orchestra contest will be held in which first and second place cups will be awarded. An ensemble contest composed of less than three or more than three instruments will be judged, with a cup being given the winner.

On the glee clubs first place cups will be awarded in both girls and boys events. The solo events are divided into piano, strings, brass and wind, with three divisions, according to ages. Vocal contests will be held, one for boys and one for girls. An oratorical contest will be held in connection with the music festival.

Entries in the various events are due in by March 15, in order that reservations may be made for the visiting contestants.

ROBERT LAWRENCE ENTERS RACE IN PRECINCT NO. 2 FOR COMMISSIONER OF DISTRICT

The Herald this week is authorized to announce the third aspirant for the office of commissioner from Precinct 2, when Robert Lawrence entered the race as a candidate for the office.

Mr. Lawrence is well known in Ochiltree county, having resided here for the past twenty-five years, living on a farm in Precinct 2 all of this time, being actively engaged in farming. The voters of Precinct 2 will make no mistake in considering the eligibility of Mr. Lawrence when casting their ballot at the democratic primary next July.

Truck Driving Contest

Service Store, Farnsworth, Holds Big Demonstration Of International Truck, Wed.

Farnsworth, Feb. 17.—A truck driving contest was held here today, sponsored by the Service Store. An International Six Speed truck was used, loaded with thirty-two hundred pounds. The truck was equipped with a small gasoline tank containing a pint of fuel and each contestant took the truck and drove down the highway until the gasoline was used up and then coasted to a stand still. His distance was marked with a stake and the main gasoline tank turned on and the truck returned to the starting point for the next contestant.

Awards were given to the three driving the greatest distance on the pint of fuel. First among the twenty-eight contestants, was B. L. Heidebrecht, driving 24 miles and 14 yards. Second was won by Abe Janzen, who drove 24 miles and one and a half yards. Third place was won by Jas. Blasingame, driving a distance of 23 miles and 93 yards.

DISMISS JURY FIRST OF WEEK

DISTRICT COURT SETTLING NON-JURY CIVIL CASES; CRIMINAL COURT DOCKET NEXT WEEK

The petit jury for the first week of district court was dismissed on Tuesday noon at the opening of the court session after it was found that no jury cases were included on the civil docket. Up until Thursday morning, a number of non-jury cases had been disposed of.

The grand jury went into session Monday morning and adjourned Wednesday evening after returning six felony and three misdemeanor indictments. Arrests have been made in all cases. Doyle Hollingsworth is being held in the county jail on a charge of driving while intoxicated and unlawful transportation of liquor. Two charges each are filed against Leo Steel and Tommie Stotts on burglary and theft, a misdemeanor of receiving and concealing stolen property against Jack Steel, burglary charges against Claud Tennison and Elmer Dillingham and a charge of aiding prisoner to escape jail against Mrs. Lilly Jewel.

The petit jury called for Monday, February 22, has been notified not to report until Tuesday morning at 10:00 o'clock as Judge E. J. Pickens and District Attorney McConnell will both be in Spearman for the dedication of the New Hansford county courthouse on that day.

ELECTRIC CODE IN FORCE SOON

ALL ELECTRICAL CONTRACTORS MUST BE LICENSED BY CITY AND PERMIT FOR WIRING GRANTED

In an effort to eliminate fire hazards in the form of defective electrical wiring, the city council passed an ordinance several months ago prescribing a code for electrical wiring and requiring all electrical contractors operating in the city to pass an examination and be licensed by the city, the ordinance to go into effect on March 1.

An examining board has been appointed by Mayor Dave Shanks consisting of one member from the light company, one from the electrical contractors and one disinterested party. The board is composed of C. E. Whippo, J. H. Stansberry and Ernest Allen. J. B. Nash will be the electrical inspector for the city.

According to the electrical code, each wiring job must be inspected and passed before the power company can connect their lines. All electrical contractors desiring to do wiring work in the city must appear before the inspection board and submit to a written examination.

SPECIAL TRAIN HERE MARCH 25

A & M COLLEGE FARM AND HOME SPECIAL WILL TOUR ALL SANTA FE LINES IN ENTIRE STATE

College Station, Texas.—Carrying numerous exhibits showing results of tried methods in producing better profits and better living on the farm, the 1932 Santa Fe-A. & M. College Farm and Home Special, plans for which are rapidly maturing, will begin its tour of all Santa Fe lines in Texas, February 15 at Navasota. The tour, covering several thousand miles and including 147 stops over a period of forty-five days, will end April 6 at Snyder.

The special train is scheduled in Perryton on Friday night, March 25. It will arrive at 7:30 o'clock in the evening and will spend the night at this point. All farmers in this territory are cordially invited to be present to see these exhibits.

As in the case of similar trains in Texas in the past, the agricultural special will be conducted cooperatively by the Santa Fe Railway Company and the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College with the assistance of other institutions and agencies. Official approval of plans and arrangements for the special has been given by F. G. Pettibone, vice-president and general manager, and J. S. Hershey, general freight agent, of the railway company, and President T. O. Walton and Director O. B. Martin of the Extension Service, on behalf of the college.

The special, a nine-car train, will be operated by the Santa Fe while the exhibits and speakers, specialists in their various lines who will explain the exhibits and their application to local conditions at each of the numerous stops, will be supplied by the college. Programs will be from two to three hours in duration at each stop and an electrical controlled voice amplifier will be used at the open air meetings.

The train will cover the territory of both the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe and the Panhandle and Santa Fe. J. P. Jarrell, manager of agricultural development of the railway, will have general charge of the enterprise. L. F. Dinan, agricultural agent of the G. C. and S. F. at Galveston, will handle program arrangements for meetings in his territory, and J. D. Timley, of the P. and S. F. at Amarillo, in territory of the latter line.

The special will carry exhibits showing tried methods of making the farm self sustaining and of cutting production costs. Extension specialists will make brief talks on home improvement, dairying, poultry raising, advanced methods of livestock raising and farm practices. Livestock exhibit for demonstration purposes will be carried on the train.

Exhibits of special interest to women and girls will be included, these arranged under the supervision of Miss Mildred Horton, state home demonstration agent of the Extension Service. Farm electrification exhibit showing the many uses to which electricity may be put on the farm will be prepared by the Texas committee on the Relation of Electricity to Agriculture.

Following talks at the various stops, visitors will be invited to go through the train. Passenger coaches will be used for meetings in inclement weather. Similar trains were conducted by the Santa Fe and A. & M. in 1923, 1924 and 1928. During the 1928 tour, the special, which made 117 stops over a period of thirty-six days, was visited by more than 110,000 people.

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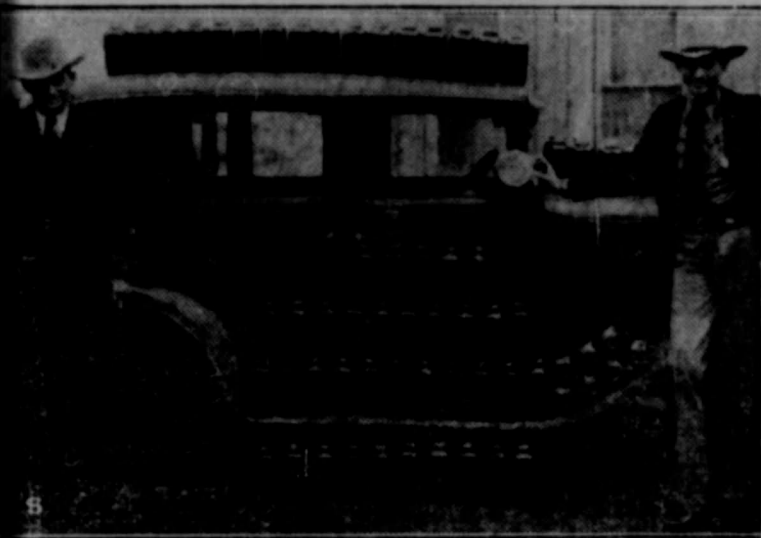

One Million Insurance

Amarillo is One of Four in State to Carry Over Million Dollars Life Insurance

Dallas, Jan. 21.—At least 313 Texans are insured for \$1,000,000 or more, according to statistics just released in "The Texas Index of Greater Patrons of Life Insurance."

The "Index" says: "It was impossible to secure all of the names of those who have a rightful place in the list but it is noteworthy that in spite of depression, the list continues to grow in number and in total amount in this, as well as every other year since it first was published. The total sum of insurance protection listed this year is \$70,285,275."

Dallas leads the list according to the "Index," with 78 names; Houston being second with 54; San Antonio third with 26; Fort Worth fourth with 24; El Paso fifth with 22; Wichita Falls sixth with 15; and Corpus Christi seventh with 11.

1922 and maintaining or exceeding that price until the drop to 20 cents per pound in 1930 and subsequent decline to the present.

During the period 1922-1929 sheep were profitable to the ranchman and to the farmer who had them, hence the increase to 6,050,000 head as of January 1, 1931. Despite the drop in price the past two years the careful farm flockmaster still finds his flock profitable from the reports of demonstrations to county agents.

The farm flock can afford usable and marketable products as wool, mutton, spring lambs and fresh meat for the farm family. Very often one lamb crop and one 12 month clip of wool will pay for the grade ewe flock. Barren ewes, poor milkers, light shearers, and broken-mouthed ewes will constitute the

surplus to be disposed of as mutton. Such ewe lambs as are not needed for replacement should accompany the wether lambs to market as finished lambs in the fall or winter or as genuine spring lambs in the late winter or spring. At the present time, thin lambs originating from small farm flocks are not desired as feeders by the larger feeder buyers. For that reason alone the farmer should market his lambs as fat lambs.

Sheep will improve the land and the appearance of the farm for they will destroy certain weeds and will keep the fence rows clean. However, sheep should not be kept as scavengers but for the profit they can return.

The profitable farm flock requires and will pay returns for intelligent husbandry. Chief among

the many factors which may be involved is that of protection from parasites, dogs, coyotes, and other farm stock. Shelter is needed for the period of chilling rains and during lambing time. Sheep do not require attention every day in the year, but the farm flock owner should be prepared to give the necessary attention when it is needed.

The production of early spring lambs or as sometimes called, Easter lambs, is a specialized feature in sheep raising. Many farm flock owners have found this type of production particularly profitable. The ewes must be bred ahead of their normal breeding season, which may require flushing (the supply of extra feed or pasture necessary to start the ewes gaining in flesh). Especial attention must be given the ewes to insure an abundant flow of milk. Since the lambs must be fat to fit the "genuine spring lamb" trade, a supplementary feed of grain must often be given them. This can best be done by placing feed, mostly shelled grain, in a creep, which the ewes cannot enter so that the lambs can have the grain free choice.

The advantages of this type of production are:

1. Quick turnover—the lambs are marketed between four and a half and five and a half months of age.
2. Lambs are marketed before summer heat and parasite infestation.
3. Genuine spring lambs command a premium on the market.

THE MACHINE AGE SPOILS A PROPHECY

By H. L. RUSSELL
Advisory Council, Agricultural Commission, American Bankers Association

A NOTED British scientist forecast thirty years ago that by 1931 all available wheat land in the world would be under cultivation, and if the yields per acre could not be increased beyond that which then prevailed there would be a world shortage. The average yield then was 12.7 bushels per acre. During the past seven years, the world over, it has been 14.1. On the 320,000,000 acres in cultivation this increase would amount to almost a half billion bushels more production than the world standards of thirty years ago. In place of dire distress due to shortage, we have had distress due to surplus.

Wheat farmers have shown no great inclination to curtail materially their output; perhaps a 10% decline compared with 70% reduction in steel. This unwillingness, or perhaps inability, to adjust production to current needs makes the problem all the harder to solve.

Not only are we now growing more wheat per unit of land, but acreage has been very greatly extended. In twenty years Canada has increased acreage 250%. Australia almost as much. Another significant fact is the materially lessened use of wheat. A much more diversified diet has developed. More vegetables and fruits are used than formerly. The reduction of 12 bushels consumed per person per annum since the last generation necessitates nearly 150,000,000 bushels less wheat than was formerly required.

Machines increase Supply
The factor that has exerted the most potent influence in this rising world flood of grain has been the rapid development of the machine. The old days of the cradle required from thirty to forty hours of hand labor to harvest an acre of grain. Then came the binder, which reduced the process to four or five hours per acre. Now the combine does the work in forty-five minutes per acre.

Where it used to cost ten cents a bushel merely to thresh the grain, the modern combine cuts and threshes at a cost ranging from 3 to 5 cents a bushel. With this reduced cost of production, the possibility of acreage expansion is tremendous. Lands heretofore regarded as worthless except for grazing have recently come into competition with the older wheat belts.

The Russian Effort
Within the past two or three years another disturbing element has come into the picture. Soviet Russia is attempting a comeback fraught with possibility that cannot yet be fully evaluated. Russia is eagerly utilizing the very latest of scientific knowledge to enlarge her agricultural possibilities. With feverish anxiety she is literally pouring millions into the expansion of her university research institutes, experimental stations and breeding farms. Her scientists are combining the earth for new crops and new methods. No country in Europe is manifesting more interest and activity in laying hold of the best science, wherever it may be found.

It is of more than passing interest that the wheat yields reported on the huge trust farm known as the "Giant" ran last year as much as 18 bushels to the acre. On this single farm the crop harvested is reported to have been 3,855,000 bushels. A single farm of 427,000 acres under government control and mechanized as fast as human energy can be applied is a new factor in the world's picture.

There can be but little doubt that the Russian situation may yet assume quite a different attitude from what obtained even in pre-war days.

Bankers Hold Farm Conference
A "feeders' conference" was held in a state bank at Presho, South Dakota, attended by fifty farmers. The conference stressed the feeding of low price wheat and barley, and marketing it through livestock. Later, booklets on the feeding of wheat were distributed among the farmers, and a feeders column was carried in the local paper each week.

"We have had more success with the conference and with the feeders column in the local paper, than with any other undertaking we have tried," the bankers said. "As a result there is about three times as much livestock being fed out in our territory than ever before. We plan to hold other similar conferences the coming year."

The benefits of civilization exist because of the capital accumulated by those who have gone before. Through accumulation of capital our great railroads have been constructed, our public utilities have been built and our mills, office buildings and homes have arisen.

SOME DEPRESSIONS WORSE THAN THIS

ONE of the most significant aspects of the present business period is that while we had a speculative panic and while we have had a general economic breakdown yet we have not had any semblance of a financial panic, such as occurred in 1907, and in other years when the credit and monetary machinery broke down and we had money panics, suspension of specie payments and kindred disasters.

None of these elements of a true financial panic has been present in this depression of the 1930's. At no time was the banking structure as a whole shaken, despite the unprecedented rate of small bank failures that it had to absorb. At no time was the banking and credit machinery unable to extend support to the panic-stricken and broken stock markets and cooperation to all kinds of business and manufacturing. Anyone would have been a wise prophet who could have foretold that our banking and credit structure would stand up so well under conditions so bad.

Finance Taking Cuts
And banking and corporate finance in this period of depression are unflinchingly taking their portions of short rations and enforced self-denial that the nation's need for readjustment demands. Interest rates on money, yields on securities and dividends on corporate investment have all dropped to levels that constitute drastic reductions in the compensation of capital. These are but part of the necessary economic realignments that all phases of the country's working life must go through before a general revival of business activity can start.

"It is my belief—indeed it is my hope—that the tempo of the next cycle of prosperity will be somewhat more moderate than the mad whirl of jazz that brought the last one to a close. I think it will be agreed that the worst aspect of the collapse of that period of false prosperity is the condition of insecurity for employment which it caused. Unemployment is our greatest public problem today.

Unemployment is the worst wage cut that the worker can suffer. It is the worst cause of stagnation that business has to strive against. The sooner we can get our masses of workers back into jobs on almost any terms the better it will be both for capital and labor.
