

Overtime!

FLSA means more pay, higher taxes, fewer services

Over one million Texas city and county employees will join 7.7 million other workers nationwide who will be in line for overtime, thanks to a decision by the US Supreme Court in February that brought those workers under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Previously, city and county workers, especially law enforcement officers and related workers, weren't eligible for overtime. But, since April 15, police officers, sheriff's deputies, dispatchers, jailers, and other city and county workers became eligible to receive time-and-a-half for their overtime hours.

For regular employees, overtime comes after 40 hours per week, and 160 hours in a 28-day period. For law enforcement officers, though, it's time-and-a-half for all hours

over 171 in a 28-day period.

It has already taken a toll on the Castro County pocketbook, and soon will on the reserves of the City of Dimmitt.

Castro County Commissioners met Monday with County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis, Sheriff Lonny Rhynes and Jerry Jansa of the CCSO to discuss the impact on the FLSA. Davis, Rhynes and Jansa attended a seminar of FLSA last week, and came back to tell commissioners dollars are going to be changing hands — from the county coffers to employees who are forced to work overtime.

"We can give our deputies some time off, but it has to be during the same seven-day period," Rhynes said. "They can't just drop things in the course of an investigation and say, 'Well, I can't work

anymore today or this week.' They have to stay with it."

"Staying with it" means the county will have to pay out over \$2,500 in overtime pay for employees who have had to put in extra hours because of the ongoing investigation of the murder of Robert Ballard, several burglaries and an arson case in rural areas of the county, plus extra time dispatchers and jailers have put in, some due to the STEP program being conducted by the Dept. of Public Safety.

Rhynes said that at least one dispatcher has put in extra hours to help with the booking and jailing of DWI suspects brought in during the STEP program.

Commissioners agreed to hire

another deputy for the Sheriff's office, and while that could cut down some on overtime pay, "we still won't be able to get away from having some overtime," Rhynes said.

"We're not going to abuse it, but if a man's on a case, trying to find leads, if he stops the investigation, chances are he'll lose most of what he's been working on."

City officials will be looking at similar problems, enhanced by an undermanned force.

The city currently has just three patrol officers plus police chief Don Franklin, whose last day on the job will be Sunday. The patrolmen are currently working from eight to twelve hours a day, seven days a

week, accumulating overtime hours that will have to be paid, since the court ruling stipulates the overtime has to be reimbursed retroactive to April 15.

"We'll have to revise our personnel policies," said City Manager Paul Catoe. "It's all going to be a long, drawn out process. I've ordered a manual (on FLSA), but I really don't know how (FLSA) is going to apply to us. It's kind of sketchy right now, and we'll just try to see what we'll have to do when we get all of the information."

All but elected officials will come under the auspices of the overtime provisions of FLSA, and it will create more record keeping for all department heads in the city and the county.

Commissioners agreed Monday to buy at least one time clock for the courthouse, and at least two commissioners will have time-clocks in their barns. Other county officials will have their employees keep a time log, so officials will have a record of the hours worked by the employees.

"There's a strong possibility that government services, in many areas, will be curtailed because of this (having to pay overtime)," said Davis.

"This is another great government idea," said Pct. 2 Commissioner Edd Wilson. "They make this mandatory, then don't give us any dollars to do anything with. They put the burden of all this directly on the taxpayer."

Wheat harvest nears completion

"This harvest wasn't anything like last year's harvest, but if you don't compare it with last year, it was a pretty good year."

That's how J. R. Brown of Flagg Grain summed up the county's 1985 wheat harvest, which is almost finished and should be wound up, weather permitting, by this weekend.

A wheat rust epidemic, untimely rains, hail and other bad weather, including too much dry weather at the wrong times, and other factors

held the county's yields to levels, for the most part, well below last year.

"We had some 60 to 80 bushel (to the acre) wheat this year," Brown said. "Overall, the crop seemed to be good. The rust hurt us, but it didn't keep it from being a good crop."

Carl Collyer of Bruegel and Sons Elevators said the harvest "got over much faster than I thought it would. Generally speaking, yields were probably below average. It

sure wasn't what I would call superb.

"There were some things in this wheat I've never seen before. I was raised around a farm, and I've been in the grain business since 1948, and I saw some deformed kernels in this stuff. I think part of the reason for the decreased yields is due to hail, some rust, some hot breezes during pollination, which is the wrong time, and if we had gotten all of this rain about two weeks earlier that would have

helped a lot.

"We had some of this dryland wheat that got hailed on that made nothing, other as low as 14 to 30 to 35 bushels to the acre. The irrigated has made up to about 83 bushels and there may be some a little better, but there's sure no 100 bushel wheat this year.

Bill Thornton at Dimmitt Agri Industries said DAI was probably "95% through, and we should have it wound up this week.

"There's so much difference from field to field it's really hard to determine an average, and there was so much difference in how the wheat was watered. The highest is probably around 70 bushels to the

acre on irrigated. 30 bushels is probably the top end on the dryland, but in isolated cases there might have been more.

"One thing we can tell is who got rains in March and April and who didn't get any rain. If they missed those rains in March and April it just burned up their wheat."

Dewayne Brown at Farmers Grain in Hart said farmers in that area "should be through by the weekend. It's been a little light in test weight, and some of this wheat headed out way too early. There was some rust that hurt the wheat, and the weather didn't help a lot."

Ricky Byers at Sunnyside Grain

and Supply said wheat in the Sunnyside area "has been a shade under last year. The top has been close to 90 bushels to the acre," with an average of 60 to 70 bushels to the acre.

Eddie Matthews at Easter Grain said the bushel weight was down somewhat in the Easter area among farmers who didn't have their crops hauled out in May.

"The last two years spoiled a lot of folks," Matthews said, "but we had a lot of irrigated wheat that didn't make but 40 bushels to the acre. In fact, we had one guy who made 40 bushels irrigated and 37 bushels dryland."

AFC okays expansion

A \$4 million expansion project is slated to begin at the American Fructose Plant in Dimmitt in the next few weeks.

"We started meetings this week, and our intent is to start on the project as soon as possible," said AFC general manager Randy Holme.

The project will enable AFC to double its current 55% High Fructose Corn Syrup capacity. "We'll be sacrificing some of our 42 HFCS capability," Holme said, "but we will also increase our marketability."

55 HFCS has been placed in

higher demand recently after announcements by Coca-Cola and Pepsi to increase, to 100%, the amount of corn syrup that may be used in soft drinks. 42 and 55 HFCS is also used in candies, bakery and other food products.

"This will also probably increase our annual corn grind," Holme said. "We will improve our marketability during our current slower seasons, November, December, January and February, and could increase the amount of corn we

grind by 10 to 15%, although it may not be as high as 10%."

More than one-third of the corn used by AFC is grown in the immediate area. The plant has a current capacity for grinding 35,000 bushels of corn per day.

"We'll be using as much locally contracted service as we can in the project," Holme said. "There should be some realization of this in the local economy."

The project should be completed by May, 1986.

County refutes charges

County officials are preparing their defense against two former roadhands who filed suit against the county on June 18, charging the county and Precinct One Commissioner Curtis Snitker deprived the men of their rights and discriminated against them because of their age.

J. R. Russell, Sr., and William L. Ford, both of whom are represented by Randall Marshall of

Texas Rural Legal Aid of Hereford, filed the suit in federal court after exhausting all of their appeals through the Texas Employment Commission.

According to documents obtained from county officials by the News, Russell was originally awarded benefits, and received \$502 in unemployment benefits. However, the county appealed the original decision, and an appeal tribunal reversed the decision.

Russell then appealed to the full Texas Employment Commission which also found in favor of the county and ordered Russell to refund the \$502.

The TEC ruled, on a split vote, that Russell should be disqualified because he was discharged for misconduct; the dissenting commission member, Mary Scott Nabers, felt Russell should be disqualified under another section of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act, claiming that Russell had been offered reemployment by Snitker when he assumed his duties on Jan. 1, 1985.

Ford, on the other hand, will be receiving benefits, but only to compensate for the loss he will incur from having to pay increased costs for housing.

Ford was living in a house owned by the county and was paying \$50 per month in rent for the house. The TEC recently ruled Ford was eligible for some benefits because of the increased amount of rent he will have to pay for housing in the Hart area after he quit his job on Jan. 2.

However, according to county officials, the TEC has ruled Ford is not eligible for full benefits.

County commissioners met Monday in executive session to select an attorney to defend the county and Snitker in the action, which will be held before US District Court Judge Mary Lou Robinson in Amarillo.

Suddenly it's open season on airlines, airports, and Americans around the world. And according to those who study such events, it's going to get worse before it gets better.

First came the hijacking of TWA Flight 847 by a pair of Lebanese Shiite Moslems who were later joined by compatriots to turn the hijacking into a hostage situation that has left the US in a state of helpless frustration.

Then, in quick succession, came the bombing of the Frankfurt Airport and two Air India planes that had taken off from Canadian airports, and the attack on a sidewalk cafe in downtown San Salvador that took the lives of four US Marines, two American businessmen, five Salvadorans, a Chilean and a Guatemalan.

"Terror waves come and go like earthquakes," said Robert Kupperman of Georgetown University's Center for Strategic and International Studies. "We are in the middle of a big shock wave that is not over yet, and it will be followed by smaller shock waves."

CIA Director William Casey called it right when he told the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, "The TWA hijacking was only the beginning." That was before the Frankfurt bombing, the San Salvador killings and the sabotage of the two Air India planes.

We can expect the US to continue to be the main target for terrorists. We are a world power that places prime value on individual human lives; we can be rendered powerless by a single, low-cost, high-yield terrorist act;

and we can guarantee total media coverage and public discussion of the terrorists' gripes.

The Lebanese terrorists had a legitimate complaint — against Israel. But who did they pick as their target to call attention to their grievances?

Security experts and analysts are saying that the other western democracies — especially Great Britain — also will be the target for attacks in the current wave of terrorism.

What can we do about it? Stepped-up security precautions are only a partial solution.

"Our Canadian airports are highly secure," said a Canadian Air Ministry spokesman after the two Air India tragedies, "but it's almost impossible to make an airport secure enough to guard against maniacs who don't mind killing innocent people and who are willing to die themselves to do it."

Retaliation? Perhaps. But against whom? As former CIA Director Richard Helms said, anyone advocating retaliation "ought to be condemned to pick the targets and specify the force that will be used to take out those targets." It's a sobering responsibility.

Apparently, the US is going to have to get on the turf with the terrorists. As distasteful as it may be for most Americans, we're probably going to have to start playing by the rules of gang warfare, with anti-terrorist squads and counter-terrorist activities around the world.

service before he accepted an offer to work for Littlefield International Corp. in Brownwood. Franklin kept that job just eight days before leaving, and has since filed theft of services charges against LIC head George Littlefield in Brown County.

Franklin then came back to the city, but has since learned he is still being accepted by the government.

Franklin will be receiving specialized training in the Washington area before receiving further assignment.

City officials are once again going through the process of taking applications to fill Franklin's job, but City Manager Paul Catoe said it could be some time before the chief's position is filled.

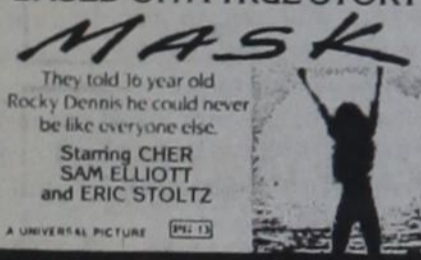

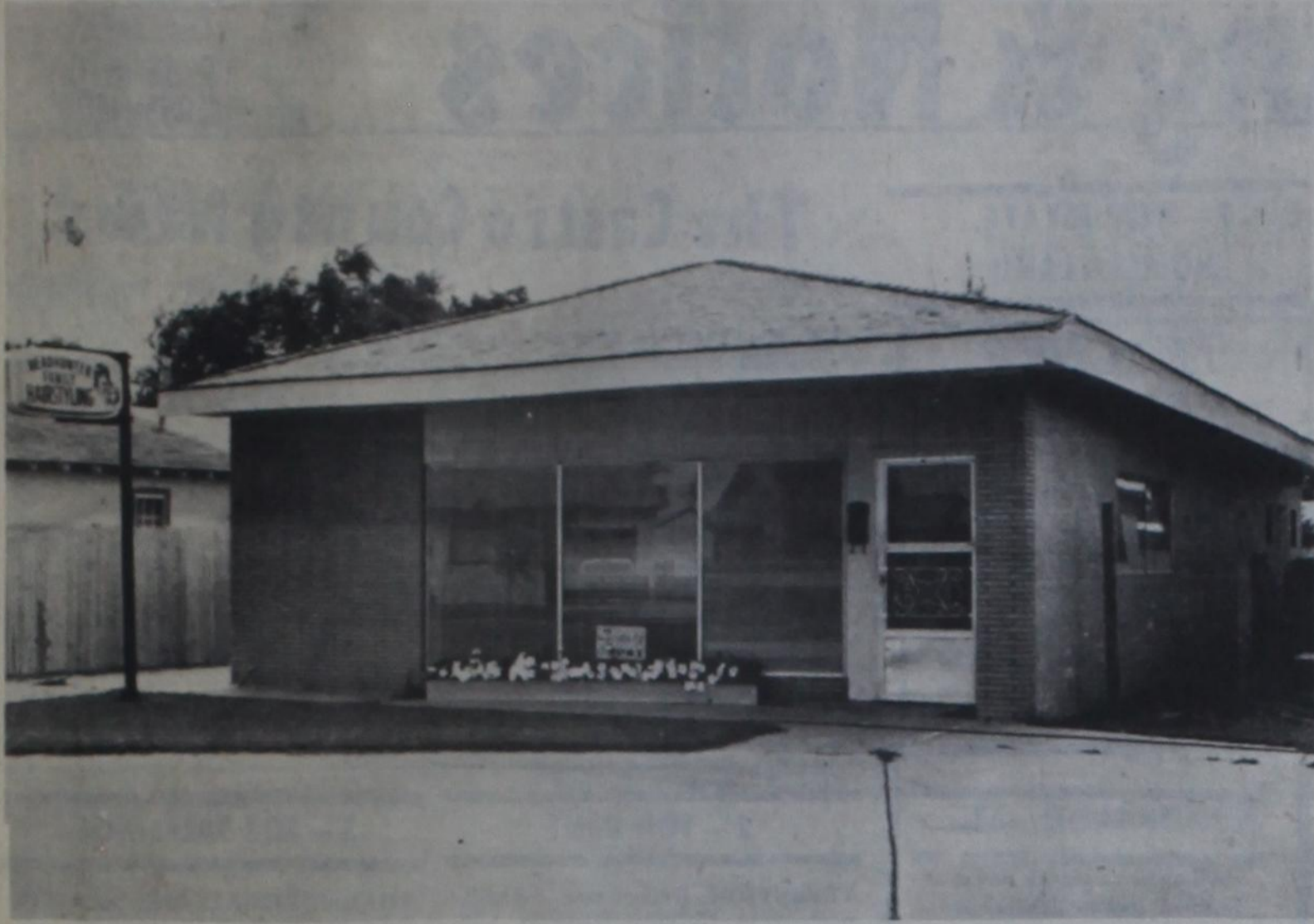

Social Security ...in Castro County

Jim is typical of many disabled people who receive social security or supplemental security income (SSI) checks. He'd much rather work but isn't sure if he could hold a job. And if benefits were cut off, he could be out a limb.

After getting a parttime job offer, Jim talks with a social security representative. He learns there are several provisions that help disabled people who want to work. That is, incentives to help those who wish to work in spite of their disabling impairment. They ease the transition from disability to ability. And they provide safeguards if things don't work out:

- Trial work period: Most disabled beneficiaries can continue to receive full benefits for up to 9 months while testing their ability to work. After the trial work period, a decision is made as to whether the work was "substantial and gainful." If it is, benefits end after a 3-month adjustment period. If it is not, payments continue;

- Unsuccessful work attempt: In some instances, short periods of work above the substantial gainful activity level can be treated as unsuccessful work attempts and discounted when considering whether disability has ceased;

- Deductible work expenses: Most impairment-related work expenses a person pays for can be deducted in deciding whether he or she can perform substantial gainful work. Examples include medical devices and equipment, attendant care, unusual transportation costs, and drugs and services required because of the impairment.

Special rules help disabled people who work:

- Extended period of disability—A severely disabled person who stops work or whose earnings fall below the substantial gainful activity level within 15 months after the trial work period generally can have payments started again without the need for a new application;

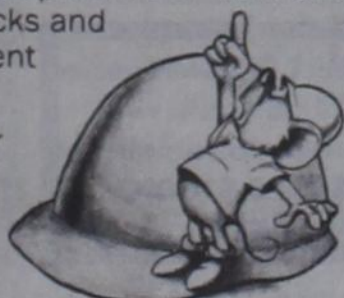
- Continuation of medicare—If social security checks stop because a person who is still disabled returns to work, medicare coverage generally can continue for 2 to 3 years after payments stop;

- Continuation of SSI payments—In some cases, an SSI beneficiary who is still disabled can continue to be eligible for SSI payments and medicaid even though performing substantial gainful work.

Out on the JOB WATCH UP FOR POWER LINES

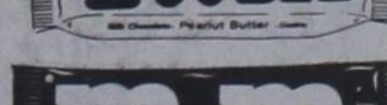
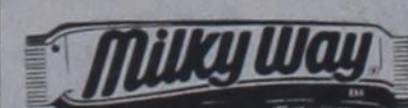

The announcement by American Fructose that the Dimmitt plant will soon be starting a \$4 million expansion project is good news.

The expansion will include modifications in existing facilities to allow the plant to produce additional amount of 55% High Fructose Corn Syrup, the product that is used to sweeten Coca Cola and other soft drinks.

Planning and organization for the expansion will begin immediately with completion of construction expected by May, 1986.

Local contractors will be used in the construction work wherever possible.

The project should generate local construction jobs. It is also an attempt by American Fructose to improve the profit performance of the Dimmitt plant. It is hoped that the market demand for the 55% High Fructose Corn Syrup will increase the overall output of the plant and that should increase annualized corn usage.

Months of planning and study have been invested in the proposed project by Randy Holme, Eddie Adams and others at the plant. We commend them on their work and wish them well as they begin a new chapter in the continued growth of the Dimmitt plant.

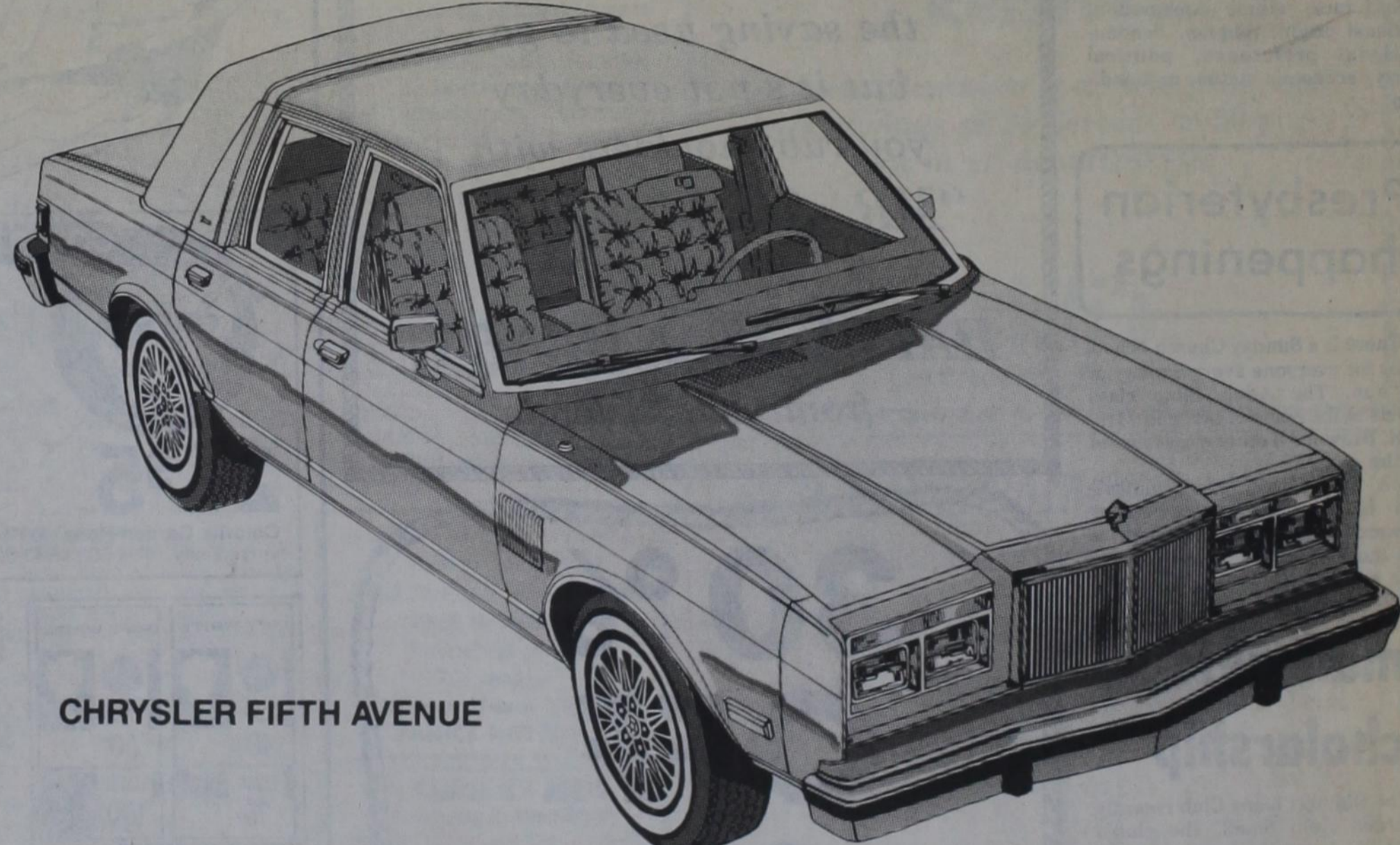

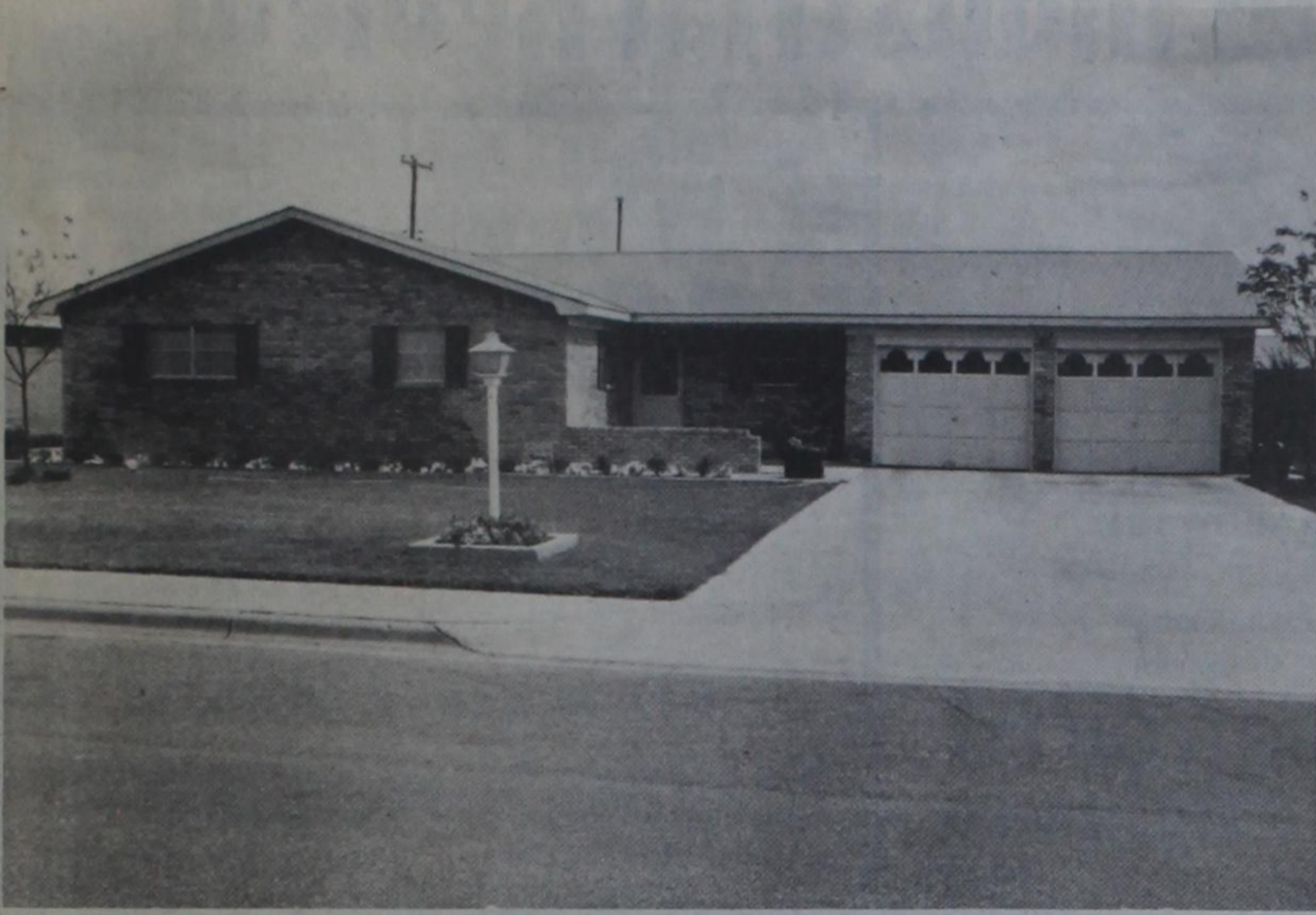

Babbling Brooks

On growing pains and the pains of growing . . .

The Dimmitt City Board of Aldermen:

- (a) wants Dimmitt to grow;
- (b) does not want Dimmitt to grow.

It's plain and simple, cut and dried, and the Board of Aldermen could literally have the future of Dimmitt in its hands Monday night when they meet at City Hall.

The aldermen, at their June 17 meeting, voted, on first reading, to annex three tracts of land on Dimmitt's southern edge along US 385. The State Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation, Bob Towler Equipment Co. and Dan and Oma Dee Heard want to annex about 38 acres of land along the highway.

SDHPT wants to build a new building there, as does Towler. The Castro County Economic Development Commission has an option on land owned by the Heards that could be used for future construction.

There was a tentative deal worked out in May that would have the SDHPT provide some labor and equipment for laying a new water and/or sewer line to the properties, while Towler agreed to pay for half of the cost of getting the utilities to his site. The lines wouldn't be needed at the other site in the near future.

However, the SDHPT had to back down, because funds were not available for the project. So the aldermen said yes, we'll annex, but we're not going to provide water, or sewer to anyone.

There are two things that bother me, and some others, about the whole thing.

I'm going to step on some toes that I don't really want to step on, because these people are friends. I'm going to make this as nice as possible . . .

Bob Towler is, of course, trying to sell you a green tractor. One of the aldermen (some say two) has a direct interest in trying to sell you a red tractor. Should the red tractor people take part in setting any rules — arbitrary or otherwise — regarding the green tractor people's annexation request?

This action taken at the June 17 meeting has the appearance of small-town politics.

I think the red tractor people should stay in the background on this.

The aldermen have a vested interest in what happens in this annexation proceeding. With the addition and potential addition of business to the local economy, the tax base will grow. But if the man selling the green tractors balks at the conditions the aldermen have set, and opts to withdraw his annexation request, it will cost the city an estimated \$5,000 to \$6,000 a year in taxes.

I know that might not sound like a lot of money, considering the city's total budget, but put that tax income for the next 10 or 20 years up against the cost of running a water line to that property, and the city would come out the big loser in the long run.

Is the board of aldermen really interested in the long run?
