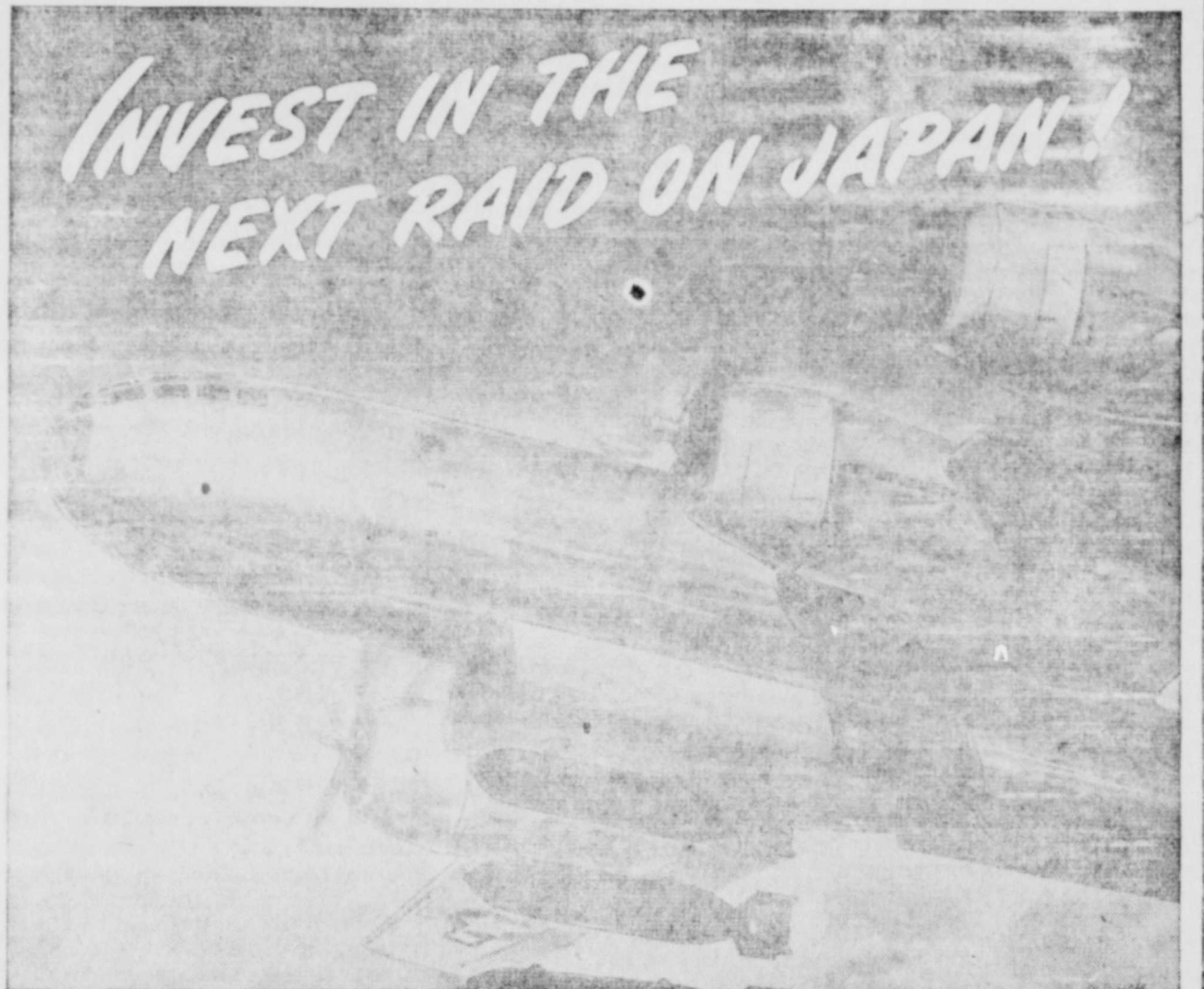

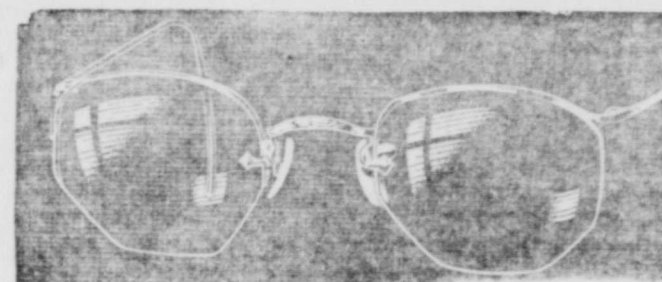

es with the woodwork and furnishings in the living-dining room. All this added attractiveness cost only \$1.50 for varnish and sand paper.

The Brown club also had on exhibit various articles made from feed sacks, remodeled hats, salvaged pictures that had been reframed, and frozen foods.

VALLEY VIEW

Visitors first were shown the whole home demonstration at the home of Mrs. Stanley Reid's. The Reids purchased their farm early in the year. They moved into the very run-down house and nearly froze to death when the severe cold spells came last winter. They saw that improvement would have to be done immediately. They did their own carpenter work and did it mostly at nights.

Walls were changed to enlarge the living room, a porch was enclosed to give space for a bath room. The entire house had hard wood floors added and large closets were built in the bedrooms, and two in the bathroom. Along with the improving were a built-in cabinet and a ventilated pantry. All floors were finished with shellac and then waxed. All window and door facings and base boards were painted white. All walls and ceilings were covered with sheetrock and then papered.

Outstanding in all the improvements were the large, properly arranged clothes closets and linen closets. The lower shelf of the linen closet belongs to Glen, the two-year-old daughter. Here she keeps all her play equipment and can get it without assistance from her mother. The 12-foot built-in cabinet takes care of the working space and all storage problems in the kitchen.

To show the family's food supply and storage had not been neglected, were the fairly well filled ventilated pantry and a growing frame garden about 5x20 feet.

At the home of Mrs. J. T. Mims, visitors were shown what yard improvement Mrs. Mims has done. These improvements included the building of walks, re-arrangements of running roses, screens, the addition of four crepe myrtle and the sowing of Bermuda grass. The drought and inadequate water supply kept the sod from getting firmly established throughout the yard but part of the grass has lived. The amount Mrs. Mims spent on her yard improvement was \$9.00. She and Mr. Mims built the walks.

Mrs. W. P. Reid showed her adequately filled pantry. The conserved budget, as according to the Texas Food Standard, was more than met by Mrs. Reid for her family of three. Canning all this food was not easy said Mrs. Reid. However, by always being "food minded" by taking advantage of fruits brought on in the stores, with the generosity of neighbors, plus the home-grown food, Mrs. Reid was able to can a variety of fruits and vegetables and meats. Included in the display were: peaches, pears, apples, pineapple, plums, tomatoes, beans, peas, pumpkin, okra, squash, corn, pork, fresh tomatoes, apples, dried peas and beans.

In order to meet this budget, Mrs. Reid spent only \$22.83. This included all her fruits, tin cans, glass jars, and extra lids.

Mrs. Reid canned a surplus of blackeyed peas. She's exchanging two dozen pints of these with an out-of-state friend for cherries, raspberries, and gooseberries.

She said she never realized until recently the advantage of having a well-filled pantry. Company came in unexpectedly for dinner and Mrs. Reid didn't have

a thing prepared. A hurried trip was made to the cellar and in 30 minutes an adequate and appetizing meal was on the table.

The last home visited was that of Mrs. Chas. Cravens. She showed her entire house but emphasis were on her living-dining room. Improvement here consisted of painted woodwork, varnished floor, new paper, lace panels, draperies, one picture, material for re-upholstering the chair seats, and a coffee table. All this improvement was done at a cost of \$44.63. Mrs. Cravens did all the improvement except papering the ceiling in her entire house.

Evidence in the Cravens home shows home improvement is contagious. When Mrs. Cravens began her living room demonstration all the rest of the rooms were refinished.

Featured here was an exhibit by all club members. Included in this exhibit were feed sack garments, household linens, made-over garments, and hand-made bags.

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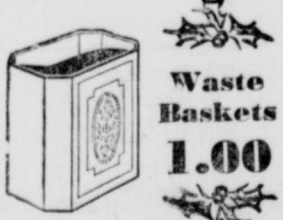
