SCRAP WITH TRUMAN

House Demanding Letter On Condon

WASHINGTON, April 23. (AP)—Congress, expecting stiff fights over housing, defense and other matters, seemed headed today for still another battle — this one with the White House.

A scrap shaped up between the Truman administration and the House of Representatives over a letter a House committee has demanded, so far without success.

This was the picture on that issue and others in Congress: CONDON — Rep. J. Parnell Thomas (R-NJ) promised to "get tough" after President Truman indicated that Congress could just try and get a letter which the FBI sent to the Commerce Department about the loyalty of Dr. Edward U. Condon.

Thomas is chairman of the Un-American Activities Committee, which quoted parts of the letter in accusing Condon of associating "knowingly or unknowingly" with a suspected Russian spy. Condon promptly defended his loyalty.

The committee asked the Commerce Department for the letter and didn't get it. Then the House passed a resolution demanding the letter.

Commenting on that yesterday, Mr. Truman referred his news conference to a Supreme Court decision said to have drawn this remark from President Andrew Jackson: "The Chief Justice has made the decision, now let him enforce it."

If the Truman administration doesn't hand over the FBI letter in 48 hours, snapped Thomas, "there is going to be a showdown."

DEFENSE—Chairman Bridges (R-NH) of the Senate Appropriations Committee said he is all for a 70-group air force—despite Secretary of Defense Forrestal's insistence that 55 would be just right and 66 the limit.

That stacks up the powerful Senate Committee alongside the House, which is on record as favoring the 70-group plan.

Urges Better Tax Collecting

WASHINGTON, April 23. (AP)—Rep. Knutson (R-Minn) today urged more tax collectors with more funds to run down billions lost through tax evasion.

"Too many people are escaping their fair share of taxes, by evasion and otherwise," Knutson said. He is chairman of the tax-framing House Ways and Means Committee and author of the new \$4.8 billion income tax reduction law.

Treasury reports indicate that uncollected taxes, some dating back to war years, now amount to about \$5 billion with the government losing \$1 billion a year because it lacks enforcement personnel.

Knutson urged the House Appropriations Committee to carry out recommendations of a committee of four tax specialists who called for a huge expansion and reorganization of the Internal Revenue Bureau.

The specialists committee, set up by Congress, said in its report yesterday the bureau's appropriations should be increased from \$188 million to \$250 million next year. It also recommended a boost in personnel from 51,524 to 67,700.

"We can't afford to pinch pennies so far as the Internal Revenue Bureau is concerned. For every dollar we invest in the bureau many dollars in additional revenue are returned."

Ex-Oilman Dies—Last rites were scheduled today for W. Joseph Simmons, 60, hotel owner and retired oil man, who died here yesterday.

New Quake Series—A new series of earthquakes in the Dominican Republic was reported today by the Rev. Joseph J. Lynch, Fordham University seismologist.

Father Lynch said they were not as severe as yesterday's tremors.

U. S. Abandons Its Palestine Police Plans

LAKE SUCCESS, April 23. (AP)—The United States has abandoned plans to call for a special police force to augment a Palestine truce commission, informed sources said today.

The American delegation was said to be prepared, however, to press for Security Council creation of a United Nations truce commission. This on-the-spot group, probably with five members, would be charged with enforcing the council's week-old cease-fire order which has been ignored by the Jews and Arabs.

The plan for a police-augmented truce commission has been under serious consideration in the American delegation since it became apparent that the Jews and Arabs would not adhere to the cease-fire directive. No explanation was available for the reported decision to drop the police angle.

R. Austin's offer of American troops for Palestine duty provided that other UN-selected nations would do likewise. At that time Austin stipulated that those troops would be for the period of truce-keeping, presumably remaining until order was established and a government functioning.

The truce commission plan comes up for debate in the Security Council today.

The American proposal for interim trusteeship in the embattled Holy Land was making little headway. It drew no support yesterday in the special assembly's 58-nation political committee. Australia moved formally that the UN stick to partition.

Jester Proposes More State Taxes

AUSTIN, April 23. (AP)—Gov. Beauford H. Jester yesterday proposed more state taxes and less federal taxes in order to preserve states' rights.

He said he will attend the governors' conference at Portsmouth, N. H., in June and will suggest "that the states must perform state duties to prevent the invasion of states' rights."

Turkey Declares Submarines Sighted

ISTANBUL, Turkey, April 23. (AP)—Istanbul newspaper reported today that two foreign submarines have been seen prowling in the Sea of Marmara.

There was no official comment. The papers said the submarines came from the north and slipped through narrow Bosphorus Strait unnoticed.

BITTERNESS FAILS

Reds May Switch Tactics In Europe

WASHINGTON, April 23. (AP)—European Communists may be compelled to switch tactics as a result of their defeat in Italy.

Officials studying this possibility said today that unless the Communists are willing to resort to violence amounting to civil war, they will, at the very least, have to slow down their time table for political conquest.

Two possible moves by Russia enter into speculation.

One is that the Kremlin may order a return to the early postwar efforts to form a common front with non-Communist left wing political forces which in recent months the Communists have attacked bitterly.

Another possibility—and this one is heavily but not entirely discounted by authorities here—is that the Soviets may take the initiative in seeking a meeting between Presi-

dent Truman and Premier Stalin.

Mr. Truman was asked at his news conference yesterday whether he would be willing to see Stalin. He replied that if the Russian leader wants to come to his country the President would be very happy to see him. But the President said again that he has no intention of leaving the country at the present time.

Stalin was never willing to leave areas under Red Army control for his wartime Big Three conference, and there is no responsible belief here that he would now do so.

That the Italian elections dealt a severe blow to Communist hopes for quick expansion into Western Europe is now accepted by American police makers as a fact beyond question. They say it must be a matter of utmost concern for the Kremlin.

Abdullah Urges All Arab Armies To Fight Jews

Wants Action After British Leave Holy Land

AMMAN, Trans-Jordan, April 23. (AP)—King Abdullah urged all Arab nations to send their armies into Palestine to battle the Jews when the British give up their mandate May 15.

Trans-Jordan's monarch told reporters yesterday the Arab world must act against Zionism — the push for a Jewish homeland in the Holy Land—because "our peace and liberty are at stake."

"I call on all Arab countries," he said, "to join my army in a movement to Palestine to retain the Arab character of that country."

Abdullah's two-year-old kingdom is just east of Palestine. Some 10,000 of his soldiers—about two-thirds of his Arab Legion—now are in the Holy Land.

He said they will stick to their job of helping British security forces and not start military operations until the mandate ends. Arab leaders here were calm about news of recent Jewish successes in the Palestine warfare. They said, "Wait until May 15."

In Cairo, reliable sources said yesterday as many as 50,000 men from the regular armies of six countries will move into Palestine from three directions May 16 unless United Nations action meanwhile changes the situation.

These soldiers, the informants said, will strike north from Egypt and Saudi Arabia, west from Iraq and Trans-Jordan and south from Syria and Lebanon.

Some 10,000 Egyptian regulars now are camped just south of the Palestine boundary.

Four 75-millimeter artillery batteries of the Syrian army moved out of their camp at Haiboun yesterday. An army source said they were Palestine-bound.

In London, the British War Office announced last night the Middle East Command is being reshuffled in view of plans to drop the mandate and to pull all British troops out of Palestine by Aug. 1.

The British cabinet met yesterday but there was no sign it changed the government's plans on Palestine.

Beating Of Coach Brings Charges

NEWARK, O., April 23. (AP)—Donald L. Dimick, 45-year-old woodworker, was charged with assault and battery tonight in the firewood beating of the high school coach at nearby Granville, O., Sheriff Roe Francis said.

Coach Larry Petersen, 39, was reported in fair condition at Newark hospital.

Deputy Sheriff Clarence Miller, who arrested Dimick, said Mrs. Donna Petersen, the coach's wife, told him her husband had been beaten with a stick of firewood by the father of a high school student.

Coach Petersen, his wife said, had disciplined the youth yesterday.

Petersen was beaten on his front porch.

Cattleman Claims Cow-Deer Is Fact

BALTIMORE, April 23. (AP)—Farmer H. Y. Thompson's calf, which he claimed was sired by a deer, had veteran cattleman by the union stockyards here scratching their heads.

Thompson said he didn't give a hoot about whether the half cow, half deer was scientifically possible.

"I know the facts about this critter," he added.

He claimed a big buck deer had been cavorting with his herd at Bel Air, Md., for years.

The calf, out of an Aberdeen-Angus cow, has a head and snout shaped like a deer and its hide is a mottled gray instead of the conventional Angus coal black. The legs are long and thin instead of stumpy and fat and it weighs only 300 pounds instead of the normal 1,000.

But whatever it is, it will soon be on meat platters. Thompson is selling the critter to a packing company.

Elizabeth Joins Order Of Garter

WINDSOR, Eng., April 23. (AP)—Princess Elizabeth and her husband, Prince Philip, and five other Britons were received into the knightly Order of the Garter by King George VI today in a ceremony of regal splendor.

The princess, in the traditional purple robe lined with white taffeta, bowed low before her father as he bountied around her left arm the inch-wide blue velvet garter with its motto, "honi soit qui mal y pense." ("Evil to him who evil thinks.") The order is the empire's highest rank of chivalry.

Judge Postpones New Lewis Penalty

Move Is Advised By Government

WASHINGTON, April 23. (AP)—Judge T. Alan Goldsborough today postponed indefinitely any further contempt penalty against John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers union.

Goldsborough accepted a government recommendation that he impose no further punishment at this time.

Assistant Attorney General Graham Morison said no useful purpose could be accomplished by new fines against Lewis and the union.

Last Wednesday, Goldsborough fined Lewis \$20,000 personally and the UMW \$1,400,000 for criminal contempt of court. The contempt finding was based on their disregard of an April 3 court order to stop the coal strike.

There was also a finding by the judge that Lewis and the union were guilty of civil contempt.

Today's court session was for sentencing on the civil contempt charge.

Morison told Goldsborough that 85 percent or more of the soft coal miners have returned to work.

Therefore, Morison said, he moved that a civil contempt sentence be put off "indefinitely." The judge agreed.

Morison said "the government is quite happy" over the back-to-work movement in the coal fields.

The government attorney indicated that the Justice Department might renew its contempt charge if there is a resumption of the walk out.

Goldsborough has issued an injunction under the Taft-Hartley labor act. This injunction, or court order, forbids continuance or renewal of the strike on grounds it would threaten the national health and safety.

Lewis's attorney, Welly K. Hopkins, agreed to Morison's proposal that the civil contempt sentencing be put off indefinitely. He said there were more than 85 percent of coal diggers back on the job—the figure used by Morison.

Westinghouse Sets Price Cuts

PITTSBURGH, Pa., April 23. (AP)—The Westinghouse Electric Corporation said today it is putting price reductions into effect on certain products to "save customers approximately \$3,125,000 a year."

The corporation said the reductions would average five per cent on electrical products used in connection with electric power distribution. The action followed a \$25 million cut by U. S. Steel yesterday on a myriad of steel products.

General Electric made similar cuts a few days ago.

The new prices go into effect immediately, according to T. I. Phillips, vice president in charge of the corporation's East Pittsburgh divisions. He said they were made possible "through increased efficiency and improvements in manufacturing methods."

Steel Price Cut Hailed By Senator

WASHINGTON, April 23. (AP)—Senator Flanders (R-Vt) today called the U. S. Steel Corporation price cut a "contribution to deflation."

"The company has done its duty in trying to reduce living costs," Flanders told a reporter. "Now it's squarely up to the union to accept in good grace the company's decision not to increase wages."

President Benjamin J. Fairless announced yesterday that the corporation was reducing steel prices by about \$25 million a year. He said it was an effort to halt rising living costs.

Fairless coupled this announcement with a rejection of the CIO United Steelworkers' demand for a wage boost.

Flanders is one of those in Congress who criticized the steel industry when it hiked prices last February. The increase resulted in

Communist Is Being Probed About Reuther

DETROIT, April 23. (AP)—An intensive police probe into the attempted killing of Walter Reuther was stepped up today with the continued questioning of an admitted Communist.

The 32-year-old Negro foundry worker was reported by an unidentified fellow employee at a Ford Motor Co. plant to have said he knew who fired the shot that shattered the arm of the CIO United Auto Workers president Tuesday night.

Prosecutor James N. McNally identified the man as Nelson Davis and said he had signed a formal statement that he was a member of the Communist Party.

He emphasized, however, that no charge has been placed against Davis. There is conclusive evidence that he was on the job when Reuther was attacked, McNally added.

Prosecutor McNally said he had talked to the tipster who gave police news of Davis, and had received "some valuable information." The informant's identity remained a closely-guarded police secret.

While Reuther was reported by his physician to be "doing fine," the House of Representatives in Washington considered a Pennsylvania member's suggestion that its Un-American Activities Committee immediately investigate "the Communist situation in the entire Detroit area."

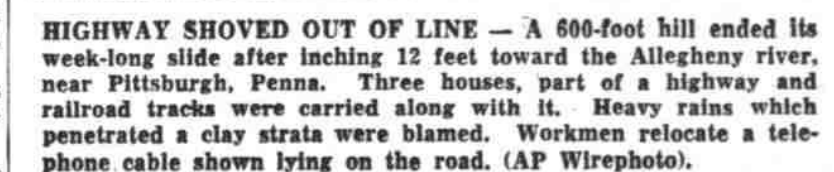
Board Considers Rent Tax Levy

PITTSBURGH, April 23. (AP)—The school board in suburban Crafton has a new idea for a tax—a five per cent levy on all rents.

The tax, believed to be the first such proposed in the nation, was offered yesterday with final action to be taken by the school board on May 17.

Walter E. Colborn, board secretary, said he thought the proposed tax—to be levied against all leases "written, oral or implied"—would be a fair way to get all tenants to support the school district. He estimated the tax would yield from \$20,000 to \$24,000 a year.

The levy would be enforced under a law enacted by the state legislature at its last session, permitting all municipalities and school districts—except Philadelphia—to tax virtually anything not taxed by the commonwealth.

SURPLUS PLANE CHARGE

Two Howard Hughes Concerns Indicted

HONOLULU, April 23. (AP)—Two Howard Hughes companies and six individuals were indicted yesterday by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiring to defraud the government in buying surplus planes.

The companies and five of the individuals were accused of using two war veterans as fronts in buying planes valued at more than \$800,000 for \$105,000. The sixth, a former government official, was charged with having approved the sales.

U. S. District Judge Delbert E. Metzger set arraignment for May 7 and fixed bonds of \$5,000 each.

The grand jury named the Hughes Tool Co., a Delaware corporation, and the Hughes Aircraft Co. along with these six individuals:

Edward J. O'Connell, Washington, D. C., until March 31 assistant chief of the War Assets Administration's territories division; Charles A. Loring, Los Angeles, attorney for the Hughes companies; Glenn Edward Odekerk, Los Angeles, assistant to the president of the Hughes Tool Co.; Joseph V. Petrali, Los Angeles, an official of the Hughes Aircraft Co.; Morris Pratt Woolley, Honolulu businessman, and Frederick M. Llewellyn, Honolulu, a war veteran.

Ray J. O'Brien, federal district attorney, and William Blatt, his assistant, said Hughes Aircraft is a subsidiary of Hughes Tool. They said the indictment identifies them as "The Hughes Tool Co., a Delaware corporation doing business as the Hughes Aircraft Company"—but both were charged in the indictment.

Noah Dietrich, vice president of the Hughes Tool Co., said in Los Angeles certain employees acted without authorization and "if there was any violation of law it was unintentional and inadvertent."

Dietrich said the incidents alleged became known to the Hughes management last year, the War Assets Administration was notified, and steps were taken to prevent repetition.

UAW Gets No Wage Offer

DETROIT, April 23. (AP)—The CIO's United Auto Workers, like its Steelworkers, were without a wage offer today.

A six-cent hourly boost proposed to the UAW last week by Chrysler Corp. was withdrawn yesterday as Chrysler and union negotiators sought to head off a threatened strike.

The action was taken only a few hours after the U. S. Steel Corp. rejected the Steelworkers' demands for any kind of wage increase.

Federal Mediator Leo Kotin said, however, that the Pittsburgh steel developments were not mentioned at the meeting here despite the close relation of the two industries.

Chrysler may reinstate the offer later, Kotin added. It was the only one made to the auto workers in 1948 negotiations and had been rejected by the UAW. The union is asking 30 cents an hour more.

BLOCK IS SOUGHT

Czech Tariff Cut Angers House GOP

WASHINGTON, April 23. (U-P)—Angry House Republicans found themselves up a blind alley today in their hunt for a way to block administration-granted tariff cuts to Czechoslovakia.

But they said they are determined to prevent any future concessions to other Soviet-dominated governments.

President Truman last night proclaimed new, lower import duties for Czech products in return for tariff reductions already put into effect by Prague.

Rep. Harness (R-Ind.), who had tried in vain to have the agreement held up, told newsmen he sees little chance that the chief executive might reverse his action "in view of past performances."

But Harness drafted a resolution to put the House formally on record as favoring a withdrawal. A State Department explanation issued along with Mr. Truman's tariff proclamation said this country had a legal obligation to make good the cuts it promised last October in a general agreement reached at Geneva with 22 other nations. That was before the Communists seized control in Czechoslovakia.

But Rep. Grant (R-Ind.) said Mr. Truman could have held up the Czech agreement under Article 27 of the Geneva agreement.

That article, Grant said, provides for the withholding of concessions from "a government which has not become, or ceases to be, a contracting party."

Order Prohibits Mass Picketing

LOS ANGELES, April 23. (U-P)—A temporary order today prohibited the CIO-United Packinghouse Workers union, Local 12, from mass picketing the strike-hampered meat packing plant of Armour and Co. Superior Judge Clarence M. Hanson issued the order, pending further hearing, on petition of the company which sued the union for \$350,000 damages. The restrainer also forbade harassment of persons going to and from the plant. Armour asks \$300,000 punitive damages, \$50,000 actual damages and \$10,000 a day as long as pickets prevent normal business operations. Armour's plant was struck March 16 along with Swift, Cudahy and Wilson in the nationwide walkout.

CRACK DOWN ON REDS

Carabinieri Are Keeping The Peace

ROME, April 23. (U-P)—Carabinieri keeping the post-election peace in Italy arrested Communists in three communities last night.

The Communist-dominated Popular Front lost to the Christian Democrats in the balloting for a parliament last Sunday and Monday.

Communist Leader Palmiro Togliatti subsequently promised his followers would not use force against the government. Some of the front's small fry, however, apparently were not taking the defeat so peacefully.

A flying column of carabinieri rushed to the Castellani Romani area behind Rome last night and arrested several Communists on charges of preparing punitive expeditions.

Terrified residents had barricaded themselves in their homes and in churches against Communist attacks rumored to be impending.

The carabinieri picked up seven machineguns, seven automatic rifles, 15 rifles, 10 hand grenades and other assorted weapons.

Carabinieri skirmished with leftists in the village of Rusciano near Naples last night, wounding one Communist and jailing 20.

They said they had surprised a Communist gang getting ready to blow up a church and a government building. They seized some hand grenades and 4,000 bullets.

In Ardena, some 25 miles southeast of Rome, one Communist was reported to have slashed at a Christian Democrat and three others to have stoned a carabinieri patrol. All four were arrested.

Trieste Free Territory also reported clashes between pro-Italians and pro-Communists in which two

of the former were wounded.

Final official returns from the election have not yet been announced. But Interior Minister Mario Scelba has said the Christian Democrats will have 307 of the 574 seats—a big majority—in the Chamber of Deputies and 130 of the 237 elective seats in the Senate.

Besides the elective seats, the Senate will include five men appointed because of distinction in arts and sciences and 107 "senators by right."

The office of President Enrico de Nicola said last night he had signed a decree authorizing these senators by right, named because of persecution by fascism or for outstanding service to Italy.

Forty-five of the 107 belong to the Popular Front. Seventeen are Christian Democrats. The remainder are potential supporters of the latter party.

Stassen Plans Talks In Akron And Canton

CLEVELAND, April 23. (U-P)—Sen. Robert A. Taft and Harold E. Stassen opened another round today in their campaigns for Ohio presidential support.

Stassen, seeking 23 of the state's 53 delegates to the Republican national convention, planned talks in the industrial centers of Akron and Canton.

Taft, halting his state tour for the time being, was to return to Cleveland for conferences and two radio appearances.

Both candidates, eyeing the state's May 4 primary, have spent the past two days campaigning in Ohio.

AUTO RIDE IS NOT ON DOCKET

EVERETT, Mass., April 23. (U-P)—Gene O'Connell, 7, and his sister, Margaret, 10, climbed into the trunk of Harold W. Flyers car, parked outside their Wilmington home yesterday. The trunk lock snapped.

They were taken for an unexpected 20-mile ride before Flyers discovered their plight. They were released uninjured—but plenty frightened.

Miners Lose In Walkout

WASHINGTON, (AP)—What did John L. Lewis gain by the coal strike and what was lost?

It isn't certain that Lewis gained anything. He supposedly won a pension for his miners. But now there's a court fight over that. But what was lost is clear. For the one month in which no miner worked and no coal was dug this happened:

The miners lost about \$106,274,000 wages.
Their welfare fund lost between \$4 million and \$5 million.
Coal not mined—about 52 million tons.

Those figures can be considered a minimum. The full strike lasted from mid-March till mid-April.

But in the past week many thousands of miners stayed away from work. So coal production has been spotty.

In addition to the figures listed above, there were these losses:

The miners' union was fined \$1,400,000 for contempt of court. Lewis was fined \$20,000 for contempt of court, too.

The government figures that when the mines are working full blast, the average number of men at work any given day is about 350,000.

Before their walkout, their average weekly earnings were \$75.91 or \$303.64 a month. For the full month of strike they lost \$106,274,000 of coal mined.

Under their contract with the union, mine owners pay into the miners' welfare fund 10 cents for every ton of coal mined.
From last July till mid-March, when the strike started, the owners had paid into the fund about \$33 million.

About 13 million tons of coal were dug weekly before the strike. The month's shut-down meant 52 million tons not mined.

(Not all the owners had agreed to the 10-cent-a-ton royalty contract but most had.)

With 52 million tons not mined—if 10 cents had been paid on every ton—the loss to the miners' welfare fund would have been about \$5,200,000.

(Since not all the owners pay the royalty, the minimum loss to the welfare fund was probably \$4 million or more.)

The \$1,400,000 fine on the union is not a crushing blow. How much the union treasury has now is not known. A year ago it was reported to have \$15 million. The union pays none of its money in strike benefits.

Affairs Of The World

Italians Lift Morale

The victory of the anti-Communist forces in the Italian national election is giving a mighty lift to morale among the democracies in their fight against totalitarianism.

This is particularly true of Western Europe, across portions of which the shadow of communism has been striking heavily. The reaction has been immediate and enthusiastic. The London Daily Express says the election is "the latest and most spectacular phase of the swing to the right which is now at work over Western Europe," and continues to sum up the situation thus:

"Marshall aid played a big part... but even if there had been no Marshall aid, (Premier) De Gasperi's (Christian Democratic) party would have won because Italy was asked to choose between the democratic outlook of the West and the authoritarian communism of the East."

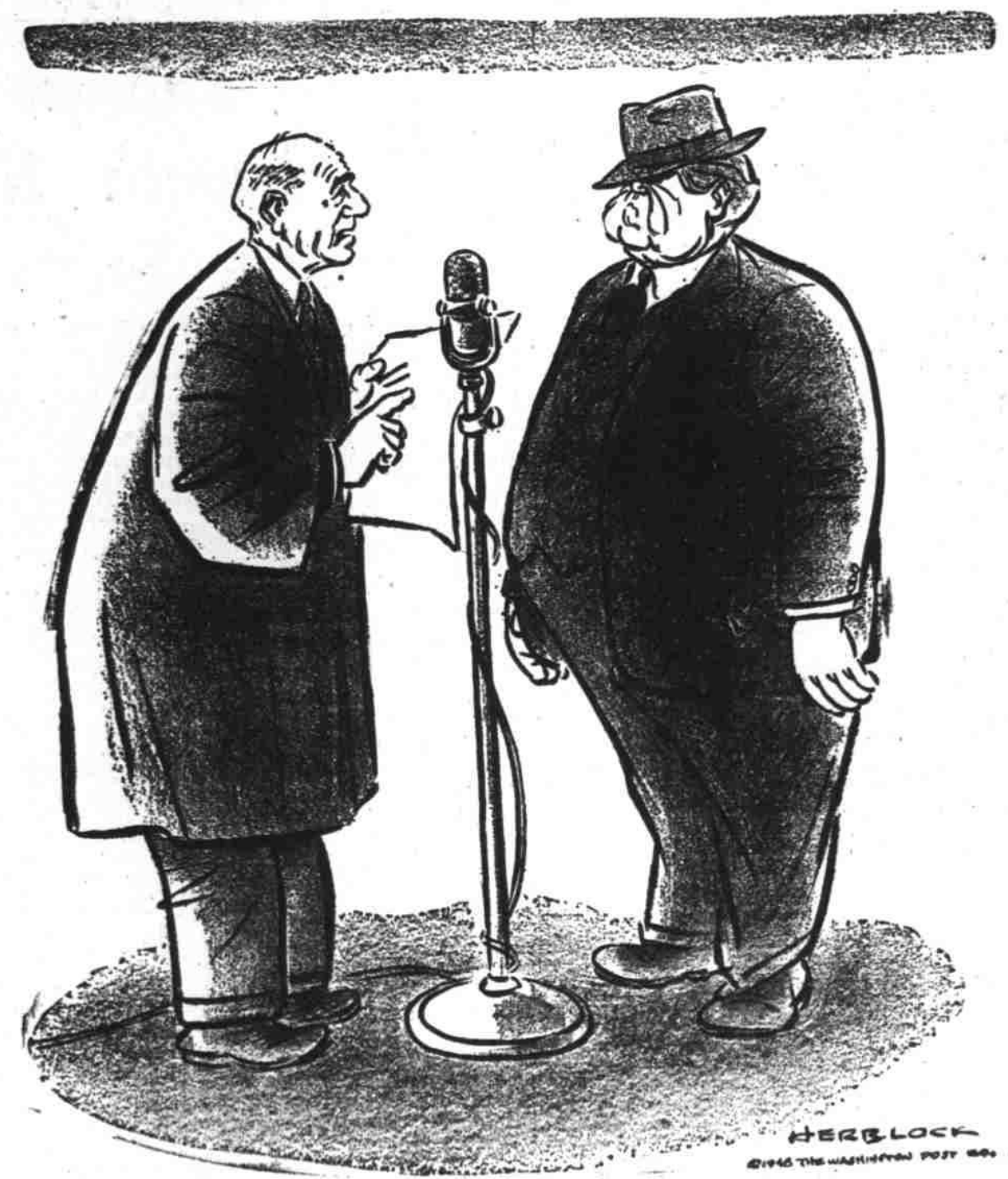
From Jacob Kaiser, head of the Christian Democrats in Berlin, comes a somewhat similar view. He declares that the outcome of the election "confirms that no population in this world voluntarily will choose dictatorship when given a free, democratic election." All the evidence at hand since Bolshevism came to power in Russia in 1917 supports Kaiser's view. The whole history of communism during the past generation is a study of an ism being thrust on unwilling peoples by trickery and force. There isn't a single one of Moscow's satellites in Eastern Europe which would have accepted communism if the people had been allowed a free vote.

Well, where do we go from here? Since Italian deputies are elected for five years, and senators for six, the assumption is that there will be an anti-Communist government in power until 1953—barring a rebellion. Within that period Italy must consolidate her democracy, and contribute to the general welfare of democracy in Western Europe.

What this means is well summed up by the London Times, which says the victorious Christian Democrats must now make good their claims "that they can give to Italy by constitutional means an economic and social rebirth that the Communists held out as a sequel to revolution."

That's the answer for Italy—and it's the answer for every country which is threatened with the red plague.

Move To Aid Nazi Industrialists

WASHINGTON — A damaging piece of paper has just been found in Germany. It is a memo, written during the war, asking authorization to erect a new crematorium big enough to burn 40 bodies daily at the Auschwitz slave labor camp run by I. G. Farben.

This evidence is expected to clinch the guilt of I. G. Farben director for their war guilt in helping to kill thousands of laborers drafted by Hitler from occupied Europe.

But just as this evidence was uncovered, a strange thing happened in Nuremberg. Gen. Telford Taylor, hardworking war-crimes prosecutor, got instructions to come home. Taylor, at first, demurred, but Washington insisted. Just out of the hospital after an airplane accident, Taylor obeyed orders and is now back in the U.S.A.

Simultaneously, certain highly placed defense chiefs have started a quiet drive to save both the factories and the personnel of I. G. Farben, the Krupp and other big Nazi munitions-makers.

This is probably the most significant development in Germany today.

GEN. CLAY OVERRULES

The shift in policy, it's important to note, comes direct from Washington. Gen. Lucius Clay, U. S. commander in Germany, has had nothing to do with it. In fact, he refused to sign one directive ordering the big munitions cartels exempt from decartelization.

After the war, it was unanimous allied policy (1) that the big munitions plants should be broken up, (2) that Nazi munitions masters be punished for war guilt. This was not the Morgenthau plan, but was agreed on by such men as Eisenhower, Secretary of War Stimson and his successor, Secretary of War Patterson. They disagreed with Morgenthau that Germany should become an agricultural state, but they were emphatic that the big war plants be broken up, also that munitions-makers guilty of plotting war be punished.

For, in 1932, it was the Krupp, the Thyssens, and the Ruhr industrialists who gave Hitler the money to take over Germany.

WALL STREET AND GERMANY
Incidentally, it was also the Wall Street firm of Dillon, Read and Company, of which James V. Forrestal was head, that loaned a lot of money to these same munitions-makers.

Today, Forrestal is Secretary of National Defense, William H. Draper, former vice president of Dillon, Read, is undersecretary of the Army, while Paul Nitze, another vice president of Dillon, Read, holds a key economic job in the State Department.

Finally, Phillip Hawkins, son-in-law of Dillon, Read partner Draper, is chief of the property division of the American Military Government in Germany and is the man who wrote the new memo decreeing a change in policy toward I. G. Farben and the Nazi cartels. This was the memo which General Clay refused to sign.

One year ago, when he was a brigadier general serving under Clay in Germany, Draper gave a talk to visiting American business executives criticizing U. S. policy of breaking up Nazi cartels. On learning of this talk, Clay reprimanded Draper.

Today, Draper is no longer subordinate to General Clay. He is now undersecretary of the Army working directly under his old Wall Street partner, Forrestal, where he, himself, can set policy. Furthermore, Draper's son-in-law, Phil Hawkins, is in Germany in charge of carrying out economic policy toward the Nazi munitions-makers which Dillon, Read once helped finance.

The Forrestal-Draper group argue

that war plants in Germany are needed to prepare for possible war with Russia. But General Clay and Chief of Staff Omar Bradley warn that if Russia attacks she will take all of Germany in a few days. Thus Nazi war plants, rebuilt with U. S. help, would then become the priceless property of the Red Army.

WAR NOTES

Russia is reported to be producing better war tanks than the United States... Large American air bases are being built located for flights across the arctic. They have underground hangars and the longest runways in the world... Believe it or not, but the armed services still have scarcely begun stockpiling strategic war materials. \$275,000,000 has been set aside for this, but little has been done. Some congressmen are beginning to ask Secretary Forrestal whether he plans to draft men, but not mobilize the factories and materials to supply them arms... National defense officials have decided to give top priority to the construction of 14 underground factories covering essential industries. These factories, all large in size, would be used to continue basic arms production in case American industry was atom-bombed... Ken Galbraith, one of the top New Deal economists, has been retained by Secretary Forrestal as a special consultant to work on the mobilization program... Secretary of Defense Forrestal's aides have already begun drafting a \$16,000,000,000 further expansion of the national defense budget. It will include (1) reopening of all major army bases, (2) building of additional aircraft and arms plants, and (3) taking about half the fleet out of moth balls.

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Joan Fontaine says she is determined to do another picture before the arrival of her baby.

Joan, who has been ill during the filming of "Kiss the Blood Off My Hands," tells me the worst is over now and she is feeling fine. When she finishes the film, she'll start immediately on "You Gotta Stay Happy," a comedy with Jimmy Stewart for her own Rampart productions.

The actress expects no difficulty with her clothes. "My designer tells me the current fashion favors pregnant women, what with ruffles and pleats and such things," she says. In the latter parts of the picture her costume consists of a G. I. type flight suit.

Bing Crosby is being wooed to co-star with Judy Garland in "Annie Get Your Gun" and Producer Arthur Freed thinks he'll nab the crooner for the film. Bing wants to do the role and all that remains is working out a deal. Since MGM allows no one to participate in its films' profits, Bing will probably get a monumental salary, similar to the one Irving Berlin got for "Easter Parade"... Irv got a mere \$800,000.

Odd Facts In Bible

Alfonso Johnson hunts through the Bible for human interest material.

He's found plenty in 115 years. Native of Iowa, Johnson was raised in Missouri, graduated from the University of Missouri, was business manager of a Japanese newspaper for a couple of years. Later he was U. S. trade commissioner for Japan and then returned to the U. S. where he was in newspaper work until, 10 years later, he became manager, in Dallas, of an insurance agents association, a job he still holds.

Johnson began teaching Presbyterian Sunday School 24 years ago. He started finding odd things in the Bible.

"The Bible," he says, "helps to complete and enrich our daily conversation. Our government, laws, trades and professions can be traced back to Biblical times and Biblical writers."

"The man who today has a bear by the tail" was described in Proverbs as "one that taketh a dog by the ears." Church quarrels are 1,900 years old. Paul had to write to the church at Corinth because of "contentions among you." The writer of Proverbs, with all his wisdom, admitted that one thing he could not understand was "the way of a man with a maid."

A few months ago, this friendly, grey-haired 56-year-old man decided to do something with his hobby. The result is a daily piece, "The Bible Says," that three newspapers now are carrying. It occupies two inches of type, a human interest eye-catcher.

Here are some examples:

"The ultimate in high pressure. The words in his mouth were smoother than butter, but war was in his heart; His words were softer than oil, yet were they drawn swords." (Psalms 55:21)

Age Of Meter

American cities, towns and even a few mere villages have turned to parking meters at a phenomenal rate during the past two years in efforts to solve parking problems in their respective business areas.

These parking problems, it seems, popped up overnight all over the country, putting in their appearance simultaneously with the end of the war and the termination of gasoline and tire rationing.

For persons who have not travelled extensively since the war, some statistics on parking meter installations presented herewith may be surprising. At least they surprised me, although I didn't travel over the country and compile them. I got them out of a book, which was published recently by Vehicular Parking, Ltd. (whatever that is) of Canton, Ohio.

At the end of 1947 exactly 1,364 cities and towns of the United States were operating parking meters. Of that number only four were in the "extra large city" population bracket, that is from half a million inhabitants upward. The population figures used are from the 1940 Federal census, which may be somewhat misleading for present-day comparisons, but they will serve the purpose for a general break-down. Although only four have parking meters, there are 14 cities in the country with population of more than half a million people each.

The percentage leaps upward in the 250,000-500,000 group, however, with 17 out of 23 cities operating meters, while 45 of 53 in the 100,000-250,000 range have meters. From there the percentage begins to drop, with 74 of 197 in the 50,000-100,000 group, 146 of 213 in the 25,000-50,000 group, 411 of 665 in the 10,000-25,000 group, 413 of 965 in the 5,000-10,000 group, 304 of 1,422 in the 2,500-5,000 group and 150 of 13,228 under 2,500.

No less than 13 major companies or corporations are in the parking meter manufacturing business, and products of each are represented in the total now in operation. They manufacture meters that require pennies, nickels and quarters, or penny-nickel and nickel-quarter combinations for parking time.

There are no quarter meters in Texas, but 78 cities and towns in the Lone Star state operate penny, nickel and penny-nickel combination meters. Points in Texas which operate meters range in size from Fort Lavaca, which had a population of 2,069 in 1940, to Houston, with a 1940 total of 364,514.

Annual revenue derived from meters in Texas vary from about \$4,000 to more than \$200,000 per city. Houston has the largest number of meters in operation, 2,612, but in 1947 Dallas, with 1,533, led in receipts with \$216,674.

Texas is not first in number of cities with parking meters, however. Illinois has 80, New York 85, Ohio 95, California 96, and Pennsylvania has an even 150. Other states have smaller numbers. So, if you're planning a summer auto tour, it may be wise to keep a supply of small change handy for meter fees during lunch stops.—WACIL McNAIR

Gray On Swing

NEW YORK—What, I asked Glen Gray, really has happened to the swing band business. I told him how, some 16 years ago, I'd thumbed a ride 100 miles to hear his Casa Loma Orchestra play a one-nighter.

"Have kids changed so much since my dancing days?" I asked the handsome, moustachioed band leader. No, he said, except that music of all sorts was available to youngsters these days by recordings, films, and that anyway, the business needed a rest.

"When bands got into the big business stages of personal appearances, there was the first hungry reaction," Gray said. "There was a big field, and there weren't enough bands to satisfy the demand. Band after band went in for one-nighters, got big money from hotels and night clubs, cashed in on radio shows. Personalities were exploited to the ultimate. One year it was my band, another Benny Goodman, then Artie Shaw, Harry James—the market yelled for more, and the trade then had all the bands anyone wanted."

"But then the kids decided they'd finally had it. The demand simply got saturated. Like any economic spiral, it returned to normalcy. But the normalcy of the band business was almost where it began. There always is room for a couple of big bands, but the majority had to take a rest for a while. That's a nice way of saying they quit."

Glen, who stashed away a neat rainy-day pile which will suffice until the business starts booming again, gave me some information on urban matters I hadn't, as they say, dug. I asked how it was that in Buffalo, a pretty big city, we'd had so few big name bands visit that town, while the little nearby farm centers, oil cities, mining communities and industrial burghs seemed to catch them all.

"The big cities just don't go for name bands regularly," he said. "The kids who work hard somehow seem to be ballroom types. The cities and their white collar workers are night club types. They like their fun sophisticated, like in the movies. That means a cocktail lounge, a floor show and the trimmings. Bands usually play in big, unadorned barn-like amusement parks and dancehalls. The mining and industrial towns, the farmers and steelworkers take their dancing straight. That is why we played Scranton so often and Buffalo so seldom."

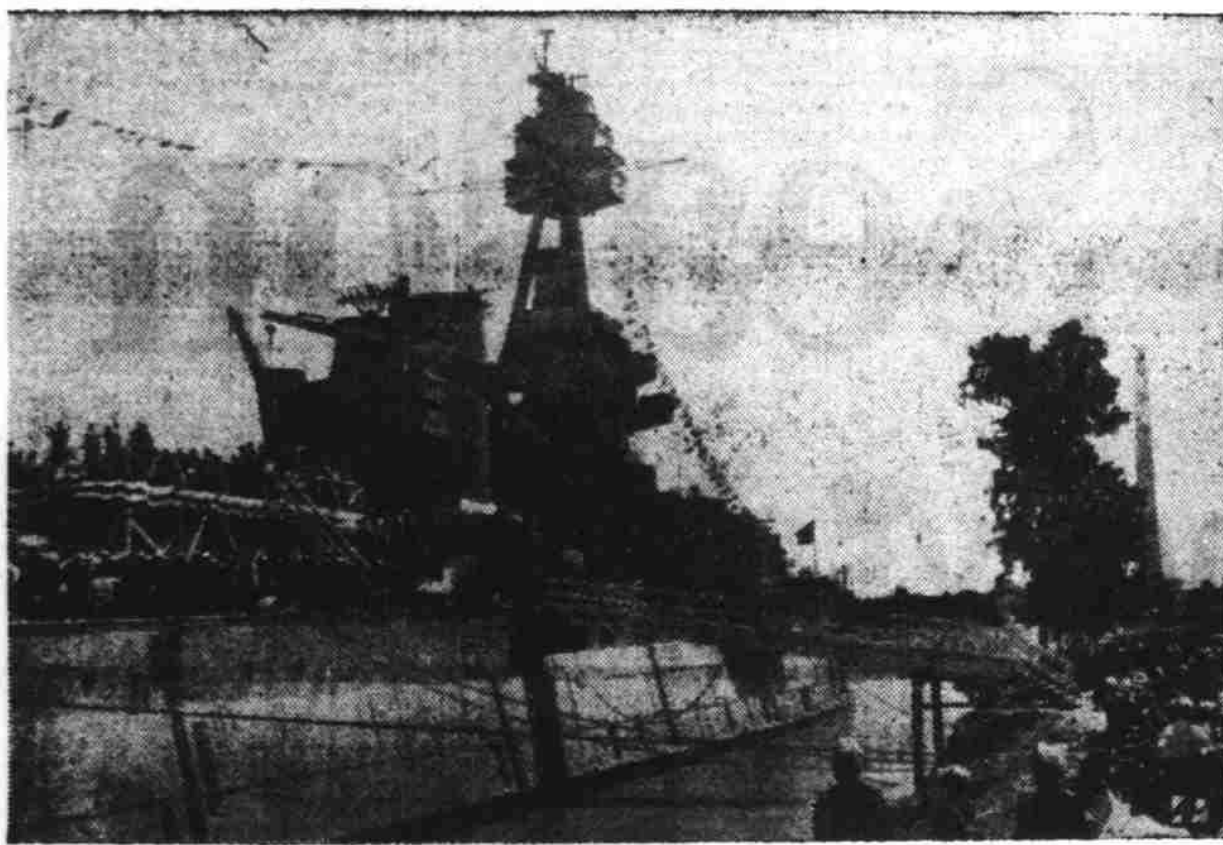

TO PUSH ITU CHARGES

Publishers Claim Collective Bargaining Not At Local Level

NEW YORK, April 23. (U)—Officials of the American Newspaper Publishers Association said yesterday they are planning to push charges against the AFL International Typographical Union "to restore collective bargaining to the

local level."

The ANPA's case—now before the National Labor Relations Board—was discussed yesterday in a closed meeting at the final session of the association's 62nd

annual convention.

Cranston Williams, ANPA general manager, said there is considerable feeling in the association that the ITU had violated terms of a federal injunction issued against it last month. Williams told newsmen of a report made at the closed session by Elisha Hanson, ANPA general counsel.

Hanson told the publishers, Williams said, that "in view of the situation in several cities, including New York City, it would not be surprising if it were necessary to go back to Judge Luther Swygert to see if the union was not violating the terms of the injunction."

His reference was to a federal injunction issued by Judge Swygert March 27 at Indianapolis. It was asked by the NLRB in an effort to halt strikes of AFL printers.

Earlier in the convention, the publishers heard that the ITU conducted 31 work stoppages against daily papers in 1947.

Williams said "the overall purpose" of the ANPA case before the NLRB "is to restore collective bargaining to the local level."

In Washington yesterday, an NLRB trial examiner held the ITU guilty of violating the Taft-Hartley law in a case brought by commercial printing firms. The examiner recommended that the international union drop any policy which would require its local units to refuse to bargain.

If this recommendation is supported by the NLRB, it would apply to ITU relations with newspaper publishers as well as commercial printing firms.

The ANPA's case against the ITU was filed last fall, and evidence is still being heard by the NLRB. Judge Swygert's injunction is in effect until the NLRB case is closed.

"We want to end the situation whereby Woodruff Randolph (ITU president) can say to a local that it cannot sign a contract which it thinks is all right," Williams said.

"New York City was a guinea pig in this," he added. "The local here agreed to a contract with the publishers and then got a telegram from ITU headquarters in Indianapolis saying it could not sign the contract or even submit it to the membership."

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Righteousness Plea

Scripture—Zechariah 1:1-6; 4:7-8.

AS WE read the Old Testament stories of the Israelites who lived over five hundred years before Christ, we wonder if people have changed in the 25 centuries that have passed since their time.

For 70 years the Israelites had been living in an alien land among stranger peoples, and grieving for their lost homes and country. They were now returned to their own land—not as free people, it is true. However, they were once more on home soil. Unfortunately, they did not remember the bitter lesson of their recent history. They continued on in the old way of life.

The world has just fought a devastating war, but the people of that world are forgetting the lessons of their recent history. Governments intrigue against governments, and against their peoples. We read with horror of cruelties practiced upon helpless people, but our memories are short.

Nations of today as of old seem eager only for power, without consideration of the common people who will still suffer from the lost war. A nation lusts for power; feels it must have access to the bounties that the earth yields, and if it cannot have them easily, it can scheme to get them no matter who must suffer.

Here and there a lone voice is raised against all this intrigue, like Zechariah's in that olden time, but we are all too confused or stupid, or both, to know what we can do to stop it, and bring about conditions that would insure peace and happiness for all peoples everywhere.

Zechariah was the grandson of Iddo, head of one of the 12 priestly families who returned from Babylon with Zerubbabel and the high priest Joshua. It is thought he was a very young man at the time of the return to Palestine, but he had the prophetic spirit.

The Lord spoke to Zechariah, telling him that his fathers had angered the Lord who had commanded that they turn from their evil ways. They refused to listen to Him, and now where were they and their prophets? Gone, and now the new generation was as stubborn and heedless as their fathers.

Zechariah saw strange visions which he could not understand, and these were explained to him as lamps symbolizing light, fed with olive oil symbolizing the Holy Spirit, and "two anointed ones," who apparently represented the priest Joshua and the king Zerubbabel, through whom help might come in the race's redemption.

Our prophets are less spiritualistic, but they see none the less clearly where we are going and what will result if we do not change our ways. Our preachers warn us, our statesmen tell us. Those who have traveled far and communed

with peoples of other lands warn us. They have heard the cries of those who find themselves no longer free, but under the domination of strangers; and those who have no homes, no freedoms and no security and little prospect of same unless the world changes.

The words Zechariah spoke to his people so many centuries ago are just as applicable to us as to them. During their exile the Israelites had set aside a certain time to go apart and weep over their plight. Should they still do so now they were at home? they asked their prophet. His answer was that even when they did so they were merely going through a ceremony that had no meaning for them and did not help them to change their lives.

"Thus speaketh the Lord of Hosts," proclaimed Zechariah, "Execute true judgment, and shew mercy and compassion every man to his brother. Oppress not the widow nor the fatherless, the stranger, nor the poor; and let none of you imagine evil against his brother in your heart."

But Zechariah did not leave his people hopeless for the future. He also told them that the Lord had said, "There shall yet old men and old women dwell in the streets of Jerusalem, and the streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets thereof." This is the ideal of all peoples everywhere, and how can it be realized? How can we bring it about that all over the world—the old and the young—can be happy and without fear? We can work toward it in our individual lives. In the words of the Lord spoken through Zechariah, "So will I save you, and ye shall be a blessing; fear not, but let your hands be strong."

Oil Operators Award Damages

CORPUS CHRISTI, April 23. (U)—Three oil operators were awarded a total of \$248,271.12 in their damage suit against Skinner-Eddy Corp., former operators of the East Alice field, by a federal court jury.

W. B. Osborne was awarded \$165,300.66 for damages in the Thigpen and bankers mortgage leases and Paul A. and Walter A. Henshaw were awarded \$82,970.46 for damages in the Thigpen and T & NO railroad right of way leases.

The three men alleged the 5,300-foot sand of the field was damaged by withdrawal in February and March of 1944 of 360 million cubic feet of gas, without concurrent injection of residue gas, and the subsequent sudden injection of the same quantity of gas. They said this caused fingering and channeling in the sand and pocketing of oil deposits. Skinner-Eddy Corp. denied the damage allegations.

TOTAL DEFENSE PLAN

Senators Commend 'Universal Service'

WASHINGTON, April 23. (U)—A "universal service" program to make sure every American does "his proper part" if war comes again was commended to Congress today for study.

The Senate War Investigating Committee set forth the proposal in a report on industrial mobilization. It says:

"The American people must realize that in another war this nation may at once become not only an arsenal but also a battlefield."

The report also says that "in this era of total war" new methods must be developed "to take unfair profits out of war and preparation for war."

The study came to Congress' doorstep in the midst of bustling preparations for military defense. But there appeared to be little chance for action this session on the "universal service" legislation suggested by the committee. The industrial mobilization document, made available to a reporter in advance of its general release, says:

"The essence of totalitarianism is universal service imposed by an authoritarian regime. The salvation of democratic institutions may be found only in universal service imposed by the good sense of millions of freedom-loving citizens. "Universal service envisions the

elimination of unfair profits and may measurably avoid the disruptions of our economic system by creation of an enormous debt."

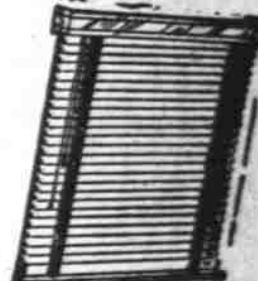
The report outlines no specific program. It simply says "consideration may well be given" to such a program. But the committee places great emphasis upon the recommendation that "adequate legislation" be passed by Congress now "to implement industrial mobilization."

The report says that in 1939, President Roosevelt was forced to turn to "an utterly outmoded" law of 1916 "for any semblance of authority for industrial mobilization."

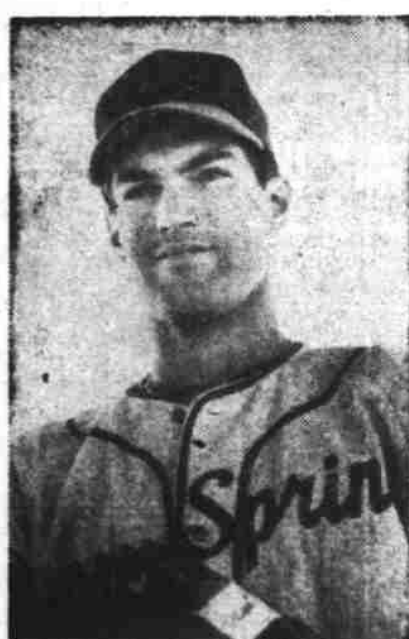

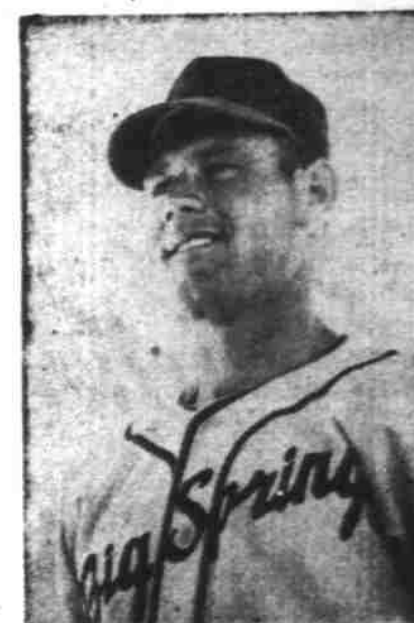

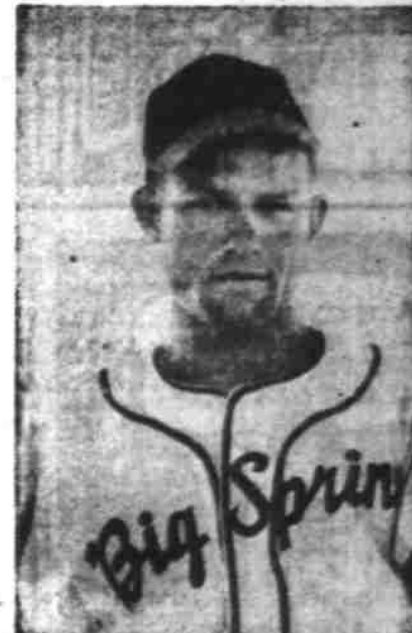

Bogota Meet Condemns Reds

BOGOTA, Colombia, April 23. (U.P.)—The Pan American conference unanimously adopted a resolution last night condemning international communism and other forms of totalitarianism.

The resolution recommends that each of the 21 participating nations adopt measures to combat communism.

It was a revised version of a resolution offered Wednesday by the United States, Peru, Chile and Brazil. Some delegates said the adopted resolution was stronger than the original.

As adopted, it condemns international communism and the methods which objected to the wording of the original resolution.

Dardo Regules of Uruguay said: "We combat communism as a regime of violence, but not as the doctrine of a political party. We closed the door to Communist violence."

Assistant Secretary of State Norman Armour said the United States was "quite happy" with the compromise draft.

The conference—driving for adjournment April 30—also voted yesterday to create a permanent commission to study a plan for the peaceful abolition of foreign colonies and occupied territories in the Western Hemisphere.

Argentina was reported to have made a reservation that any government which prefers not to use the services of the special commission should handle the problem individually. They have made territorial claims against Britain.

Asks Quarantine

MALLEN, April 23. (U.P.)—A committee of the Texas Citrus Advisory Council Monday is to ask Agriculture Commissioner J. E. McDonald to quarantine 32 South Texas counties against California citrus fruit, trees and other plants.

IN HOUSE

Housing Bill May Have Rough Time

WASHINGTON, April 23. (U.P.)—House members hoisted storm signals today for a Senate-approved program aimed at building 15 million homes in the next 10 years.

As in the Senate, which passed the multi-billion dollar Taft-Ellender-Wagner bill yesterday, the House controversy centers around the measure's 500,000-unit public housing section.

The House Banking Committee pigeonholed a similar Senate bill two years ago. Then, as now, many opponents called the public housing section "socialized housing."

Banking Chairman Wolcott (R-Mich) set "full hearings" for May 3 and told a reporter "some sort of housing bill" will pass. He declined to say whether it will make any provisions for public housing, whereby the government would build and operate dwellings for low income families.

But Rep. Frederick C. Smith (R-Ohio), a committee member, told reporters "I am opposed to public housing. I think there is a probability the House will stop this legislation."

Another Banking Committee member, Rep. Fletcher (R-Calif) said:

"I think there is a 50-50 chance that public housing will pass. I am for welfare housing, to help people who are not able to take care of themselves. But I don't believe in subsidizing a special class in this country through public housing, at the expense of other taxpayers."

Rep. Helen Gahagan Douglas

(D-Calif) had a different view. "I am sure we can get this bill through the House," she said. "I think the nearer we come to the election the more the members will be disposed to vote for this bill. The voice of the people will be clearer as the campaigns progress."

Mrs. Douglas already has 114 names to a petition to run the bill directly to the House floor. With 218 names the Banking Committee could be by-passed.

After a week of bitter wrangling, the Senate passed the controversial bill yesterday by voice vote. Only about a dozen senators were present for the final showdown.
